The United States Championships

THE 1951 UNITED STATES CHAMPIONSHIPS, held under the auspices of the Seattle Skating Club January 31, February 1, 2 and 3, were a feature of the City's Centennial Celebration. Clear, sunshiny weather greeted officials and competitors to the Evergreen State although some rain did fall before the end of the week.

The Benjamin Franklin Hotel provided a congenial atmosphere for competitors who welcomed the Washington Delicious apples and daffodils placed in their rooms by the Reception Committee.

Patch sessions began early Monday morning at the Civic Ice Arena and continued through Thursday at the Ballard Ice Arena with approximately four hundred patches available to competitors. Free skating and dance periods were also provided every day throughout the week.

Newspaper and radio publicity were excellent. A number of competitors participated in radio interviews and the press made a great effort to cover the competitions intelligently, which no doubt was largely responsible for the capacity crowds which filled the rink for the evening performances.

Gay tulips and skating figurine favors made a delightful setting for the Judges Dinner at the Washington Athletic Club on Tuesday evening.

Many familiar faces were missing among competitors as the competitions got under way. Yvonne Sherman and Lois Waring & Michael McGean, Senior Lady and Gold Dance Champions, respectively, did not appear to defend their titles. Many have turned professional in the past year and Uncle Sam may reduce the ranks even more by next season. Nevertheless, the standard of skating remained high and competition keen as new, promising skaters emerged.

The competitions began with Senior Ladies' figures on Wednesday morning, Sonya Klopfer holding a comfortable lead throughout. In the afternoon, Novice La-

dies' and Men's figures were skated; however, two of the men's figures were postponed until Thursday morning as time became a factor.

On Wednesday evening, from 6:00-8:30, Junior competitors were guests of the Junior members of the Seattle Skating Club at a buffet supper and dance.

Competition officials and officers of the Seattle Skating Club were guests of the Lakewood Winter Club at Tacoma at a buffet supper on Wednesday evening, after which guests were invited to visit their club-owned rink.

The Novice Men's figures were completed on Thursday morning followed by Senior Men's figures, in which Dick Burton again demonstrated his superiority on steel blades although followed closely by Jimmy Grogan. Junior Ladies' figures were skated Thursday afternoon.

Thursday evening the first skating of Junior and Senior Pairs and Senior Ladies' and Men's free skating took place. Peter Kennedy, entered in Senior Pairs with his sister Karol, had contracted a virus infection and was excused from the first skating of Pairs.

A large class of Junior Men took the ice for their figures on Friday morning, in which Dudley Richards led the field. Silver Dance eliminations followed in the afternoon. Due to qualifying dance restrictions in National competition, effective for the first time this year, the Silver Dance class was considerably smaller than last year while the Gold Dance class showed an increase.

Friday night is one which everyone present will long remember! The program included Junior Ladies' free skating, Silver Dance finals and the second skating for Junior Pairs and Senior Men.

In Junior Ladies, Frances Dorsey retained first place while Janet Gerhauser came up to replace Patricia Firth who had held second place in figures. Frances Dorsey's lovely interpretive style, Janet

Gerhauser's spontaneity, Slavka Kohout's unusual interpretation and Patricia Quick's mastery of technique and speed presented decided contrasts.

Caryl Johns & Jack B. Jost were unanimously elected to first place in Silver Dance, while Terryl Johnson & Gerald Woodstrom's flow and ease won second. Johns & Jost, with delightful sequences beautifully executed, also won Junior Pairs; Barbara Ziem & Armando Rodriguez placed second with an exciting, dynamic program including many solo movements.

The Senior Men's free skating will be the topic of conversation here for some time. Jimmy Grogan's magnificent jumps, Hayes Alan Jenkins' intricate footwork and Dick Button's finesse provided the thrilling events of the evening. Dick Button retained the Senior Men's Championship and although Jenkins' free skating was outstanding he could not overtake Grogan's lead in figures.

Awarding of prizes by President Keighley and Competitions Committee Chairman Beatty to winners in completed events thus far concluded the evening's program. Following the competitions Friday evening, officials were invited to the home of Miss Gladys McFerron for refreshments and to see her collection of antique and interesting skating figurines.

H. Kendall Kelley, Dance Committee Chairman, conducted an open dance forum at the rink on Saturday morning. The structure and functions of the USFSA Dance Committee were explained and dance problems discussed. There were demonstrations of new dances for consideration in the Preliminary and Bronze Dance Test program, free dancing and various phases of the standard dances.

The program Saturday afternoon included Gold Dance eliminations and Novice Ladies' and Men's free skating.

In Novice Ladies, charming little 11-year-old Carol Heiss overcame Georgiana Sutton's lead in figures to finish first. Other promising little Misses participating in this event were Sherry Dorsey, 11, and Sylvia Beth Sundene, 12.

Arnold Savage, in Novice Men, relinquished his first place to Noel T. Ledin after free skating, placing second himself.

Little Tommy Moore, 11 years old, was considerably out-sized in this event but not out-skated.

Costumes, of course, were varied as to color and trimming, but princess lines and long sleeves were favored. Dancers preferred all black or black and white.

Junior Men's free skating, Gold Dance finals and the second skating of Senior Ladies and Senior Pairs completed the program on Saturday night.

Some very fine free skating was evidenced in the Junior Men's class in which Dudley Richards was unanimously awarded first place. David Jenkins, Ronnie Robertson and Evy Scotvold, II, are all terrific free skaters. Carmel & Edward L. Bodel became the new Gold Dance Champions.

Upon completion of the Senior Ladies' event, Sonya Klopfer became the new Senior Ladies' Champion, with Tenley Albright and Virginia Baxter second and third, respectively. These girls are all excellent free skaters and figures will, no doubt, prove their destiny in the future as they did in this instance. Andra McLaughlin's daring skating and showmanship again thrilled the audience. Gloria Peterson's program was artistically arranged and beautifully skated.

In Senior Pairs the "Kennedy Kids," Peter & Karol, retained the Championship but were not up to their usual performance due to Peter's illness. Janet Gerhauser & John Nightingale, placing second, had a pleasing program and their progress should prove interesting.

Before winners of the final events were announced there were exhibitions by winners of events completed Friday. Prizes were then awarded by Harry N. Keighley and Henry M. Beatty for the final events, which included Gloria Peterson as lady winner of the Oscar L. Richard Artistic Award and Hayes Alan Jenkins the Richard Award for outstanding skating among men. The Skating Club of Boston became the winner of the Harned Trophy as the club totalling the greatest number of points in the competition.

A party for competitors, judges and officials was held at the Washington Athletic Club following the competitions on

Saturday night, with dancing into the wee small hours. Disappointments were quickly forgotten as competitors wholeheartedly joined in the fun and one could not but marvel at this fine group of young people and hope that we would all soon meet again.

The Championships of Canada

THE CONNAUGHT SKATING CLUB had the honor this year of holding the Championships of Canada, and this was the first time that any Canadian Championships had ever been held in Vancouver. The unusually large number of entrants (58) and the very keen competitive skating were immediately noted as the Championships got under way on February 9. In fact, the general saying was—they were the keenest in many a year.

The Junior Ladies' figures proved very exciting. Not until the last skater (19th) had finished her free skating did we know who was the winner. Elizabeth Gratton of the Toronto Skating Club proved herself to be a true champion in winning the Howard Trophy. Rosemary Henderson pulled up to second place with a brilliant free skating performance. A newcomer to Canada, Yarmila Pacht, who hails from Czechoslovakia, placed third. Yarmila is 13 years old, has long blonde hair and speaks English fluently. She is clever in school besides being a very talented young skater. She has been skating for seven years but this was the first time that Yarmila was eligible for Canadian Championships as she has just become a Canadian citizen. The youngest skater this year was little Pamela Willman of the Connaught Skating Club, a Junior competitor, 9 years old.

Keen competition was also witnessed in the Senior Ladies' event for the Devonshire Trophy. After the school figures, defending Champion Suzanne Morrow of the Toronto Skating Club was just leading petite Vevi Smith. For her free skating performance Suzanne wore a black lace costume studded with rhinestones. The spectators were held breathless while they watched blonde-haired Suzanne skate with ease and grace to retain her title. Junior Men's for the Howard Trophy was skated off by Peter Dunfield—again another Toronto Club skater. Not only did he perform terrific double loops, double

flips, and open axels with ease and skill, but Peter also presented us with a magnificent personality. (Although Peter was unaware of it, another title he unconsciously attained while in Vancouver was that of "Idol of the Bobby-Soxers.")

Peter Firstbrook, last year's Junior Champion, skated off with the Men's Senior title and the Minto Cup. Although the crowd enjoyed the excellent performance of Roger Wickson from the Kerrisdale Skating Club, Champion in 1949 and 1950, Roger did not have quite that splendid finish of Peter's presentation, and placed second.

The new Pair Champions, Jane Kirby & Donald Tobin, also advanced from Junior ranks in one year to take the Senior Pair title and the Minto Cups. They presented a wonderful exhibition of skating in unison with ease and grace. Close runners-up were Frances Dafoe & Norris Bowden over Gayle Wakely & Dave Spalding. Worthy of mention were the terrific death spiral Gayle & Dave performed, and the stag-jump finish which Frances accomplished into the arms of Norris Bowden.

Surprise performance of Audrey Downie & Brian Power won them the coveted A. L. Dysart Cups for Junior Pairs. Audrey wore a very charming coral pink crepe de Chine costume, lily-pointed sleeves, studded with sequins, and a braided hair band to match. In close second place were Patty Lou & George Montgomery.

For the next event, Fours, the Connaught Skating Club had two teams entered. It was the first entry for either team in a Canadian Championship. Both Fours executed their programs very well, although Gayle Wakely, Patricia Spray, David Spalding & Norman Walker had that all important finish to their skating to win first place. Audrey Downie, Connie Cantlon, Brian Power & Charles Murphy were extremely well applauded.

After the final round Pierrette & Donald were awarded the title for the second year. Frances Dafoe & Norris Bowden retained the Waltz title they won last year; and Mary Diane Trimble and David Ross won the Tenstep.

Spills were frequent as the skaters went through their programs. Alfred Williams of Calgary, CFSA President, took a very nasty fall, but got up immediately and continued his work as Referee of the Senior events. No one ever writes anything about the judges, but they deserve sincere thank yous and credit for helping to make a Championship run so smoothly.

The champions were presented with their trophies at a banquet given at the Stanley Park Pavilion, and Alderman

Archie Procter congratulated them on winning, after which Mr. Williams made the presentations.

Two Championships in Two Weeks

TWO CHAMPIONSHIPS in two weeks and I was nearly killed with kindness! I had a wonderful time and am sure the official reports will omit many interesting details, so here is my personal story.

Left Boston by air just ahead of the ice storm that tied up the East and was helped on my way by Norman and Gladys Gregory who met me in Montreal during a three-hour layover. Then off into the blizzard by night. At four A.M. arrived in Winnipeg, with engine trouble and temperature 40 below! After an hour took off again and went back to sleep only to return to Winnipeg with the same engine trouble and no warmer. After three hours flew safely on. It was daylight across the apparently empty plains until we got to Calgary nestled against the Rockies and from there flew over marvelous mountains to Vancouver. Took off almost at once for Seattle into a brilliant sunset and saw countless islands in a ruddy sea.

Next day the excitement began for me as I went first to the competitors' hotel and saw many friends and then on to the rink where I met the Seattle committees and saw what a fine organization they had. With two rinks in Seattle and two others (Tacoma and Bremerton) nearby, there was ample ice time for all. Hot meals were served in the lobby all that week and made it a wonderful gathering place, as the rink itself was extremely cold. The official dinner was Tuesday evening with clever skating place cards made out of pipe cleaners and paper by two of the Seattle ladies. The next night the Lakewood WC officers invited the judges and officials to a buffet supper in Tacoma and later drove us out to see the Lakewood rink, which is of attractive rustic design built on the edge of a lake. In the cellar a second, smaller ice surface is used for teaching and a practice patch.

The same evening, the excellently-organized Junior Club of Seattle carried out an idea new to Nationals by entertaining

the competitors at a buffet supper, where all could become acquainted.

Thursday evening was in many ways the most interesting with the pre-view skating of Senior and Junior Pairs, Senior Men and Ladies.

Friday the competitions were broken by a very interesting Chamber of Commerce luncheon where some of the officials and top skaters were guests of honor. The skaters were introduced and then short speeches were given by Harry Keighley, Harold Storke, and your Editor.

After the Friday evening events, Miss Gladys McFerron kindly invited the officials to a supper so we all could see her wonderful collection of skating items—an extensive array of china, glass, and metal figures and a variety of paintings, etchings, etc.

Saturday came with Novice free skating in the afternoon and such finished and accomplished programs have seldom been seen in Novice classes. A hurried meal and back for the final evening, and a wonderful display of skating skill. Sonya swept to victory with a dashing and difficult performance. We all held our breath while the Kennedys went through their program as we felt so sorry for Peter who had virus flu and fever of 103 the day before. Karol, I was told later, kept urging him to give up but he kept at it and collapsed after he got off the ice. Hayes Jenkins did two of the most athletic and difficult performances I ever expect to see; after Thursday's I was sure he would flop on Friday but he did even better! His award of the Richard Trophy was very popular as was Gloria Peterson's for the Lady Richard Trophy—her performance was outstandingly artistic and she looked lovely in a simple bright blue chiffon dress with a low, wide collar of silver sequins. Exhibitions by Friday's champions and awarding of prizes followed, and then all went on to the final party which lasted until daybreak or longer.

John Heater of the Los Angeles FSC

did his usual fine job of announcing; when Johnny is at the loud speaker, which is practically continuously, even the spectators most uneducated in the technicalities of figure skating cannot fail to realize what is going on. Newly-appointed as National Figure Judges this winter, J. Howard Bobbitt, San Diego FSC, and Mrs. Robert Sackett, Omaha FSC, did their first National judging, although Mrs. Sackett is an experienced Gold Dance Judge and has officiated in former U. S. Dance Championships.

On the following Monday evening, Mrs. Jensen of the Seattle SC took me to a session of the Rainier ISC at the Ballard rink. There I saw rehearsals for their show and met many friends. The evening ended pleasantly with coffee and pie at the home of Seattle SC President Vernon Campbell. I tried to express all our thanks for the well-conducted Nationals and the wonderful week, but words are quite inadequate on such an occasion. On arrival I found a marvelous heart-shaped box of candy from the Seattle Juniors, followed next day by a lovely hyacinth plant from the Senior club. At the Official Party all were given handwarmers which proved very useful in the chilly rink, and when used in future will serve to remind us of the warm hospitality of the Seattle SC members.

Tuesday morning I drove to Vancouver with Mr. Williams, CFSA President, who had been in Seattle for our competitions. I was especially interested in a memorial arch at the border in Peace Park dedicated to "Children of a Common Mother." Certainly Canada and the U. S. have proved that two nations can live side by side and keep their own characteristics yet work for a common cause of world peace and happiness. A smaller version of this is the pleasant cooperation between our two figure skating associations and the friendliness among the skaters.

My old friend Margaret Davis, a member of the famous Minto Four who is now living in Vancouver, drove me around the city on Wednesday. That evening Competition Chairman Simmers and his wife came to the hotel to leave flowers for all the lady officials, kindly including

me in this list and paying me a short call, so next day I felt quite at home. Tiny lapel pins in the form of a totem pole were given to the visitors as a souvenir of their trip to Vancouver.

Thursday at a general luncheon I was seated at the head table with other guests. It was very pleasant to meet many whose names have long been familiar, such as Mrs. Abbott of Winnipeg, Mrs. Robbins of Regina, Jack Abra of Winnipeg and many good skaters I was to admire during the competitions. Roy Barnes, Melville Rogers and John Greig, judges, and William de Nance, auditor, were old friends among many there. After lunch the drawing for starting order in all events took place and I was asked to draw, being completely neutral. The last time I had done this was in the 1948 Olympics and it was an honor to be invited to serve again.

On Thursday evening President and Mrs. Wakely held an informal reception for officials at their home where the Connaught SC directors met the visitors. Friday was taken up with figures and in the evening a party for all was given at the Shaunessey Golf Club by Mr. and Mrs. Tom Downie.

The Forum is an unusual rink; originally huge, I was told, it is now divided into a normal-sized rink with seating capacity of 5000 or more, and a back rink about 100 feet square. This rear rink makes competitions move much faster as most of the practice can take place there; it is available for figure skating any time the big rink is needed for other activities.

Saturday the senior figures took place and immediately afterward the junior free skating began. In Canada they do not use more than one panel of judges and these five certainly were put through a strenuous program on Saturday as they started at 8 A.M. and did not finish until midnight; hour breaks were taken at lunch and supper and occasional stops for short rests during the day.

Many excellent programs were skated and I watched them all with interest. Canada has a flock of promising young skaters coming on rapidly and competition is

keen. It was interesting to see Elizabeth Gratton execute a fine program to win the title which her younger sister held last year. Barbara justified my impression of her a year ago by placing fourth in a fine senior class. These two are following in the footsteps of earlier Toronto sisters—first the talented Smiths and then the dynamic Caleys.

Peter Firstbrook, the new senior champion, has fine form and a natural run to his skate which makes his free skating and figures a joy to watch; as he is only 17 he may well equal the record of other famous Canadian men such as Mev Rogers, Bud Wilson and Ralph McCreath. Competitions always bring disappointments to those who don't win and I was sorry that Roger Wickson could not retain his title the first time he competed

for it in his own city. I don't think I have ever seen him skate better; his fine footwork was at its best, but it was not to be. Nor could his close rival Bill Lewis come better than third in spite of much improvement this past year.

After the skating a buffet supper was held at the Stanley Park Pavilion which went on for hours as everyone satisfied his appetite at a beautiful buffet table on which towered a figure skate carved from a block of ice. President Williams made a nice speech and presented the trophies. The Earl Grey Trophy for the club competition was not presented as this year no club had entries in all classes. On the Harned Trophy basis I am sure Toronto SC would have won as they took first in all four singles—men and ladies, senior and junior!



Hints on the Back Split Jump

THE BACK SPLIT is a jump that is not done very often, at least not in comparison with jumps such as axels, double salchows, etc. Since I have specialized in the Back Split, I shall try to offer some suggestions that I think might help.

It really is very simple. Let us say we'll do a mohawk for the take-off to a straight LBO edge, dig with the right toe, split with the right leg forward and land on the RBO edge. That's all there is to it. However, one must remember not to break from the waist while reaching back to dig, and to spring from and land on a well-bent knee.

The method that I've always used has been to do a regular split jump, land on the LFI edge (in my case), quickly turn a three and dig with the right toe for the Back Split. There should be no hesitation between the forward and Back Splits because not only is the effect ruined, but the timing is altered. Of course it differs with the individual and only you can get the timing to suit yourself after a little practice.

Well, that's about all there is to it and I really hope that this article has been of some help to you and will serve to popularize the jump a little more.

Is Your Child Right or Left Handed?

IT IS MOST DISHEARTENING to skaters and their parents to find that their progress in free skating is slow and difficult, although it is rapid in school figures. The trouble may be due only because a right-footed skater is trying to land jumps on a weak left leg, or a dominant left-footed skater is trying to land on a feeble right leg.

This problem of the left or right-handedness of a skater is one that needs to be given more attention by professionals and club supervisors.

A dominant right-handedness and footedness offers few problems to an instructor if he gets such pupils early in their free skating efforts. A problem which may arise is for such pupils to spin on their right foot because it is stronger and thus start the habit of spinning to the right, or clockwise, direction. This is a serious mistake, and they should be changed immediately to the left foot and taught to spin in a counter-clockwise direction; otherwise, these skaters will start jumping in their spinning direction, which will lead to landing on the weak left leg. To the dominant right-handed or footed skaters, landing jumps on the weak left leg will invariably lead to shaky landings and frequent falls.

A right-footed skater should do spins to the left and on the left foot. To a right-footed skater the left leg is the "peg-leg" because of its stiffness, and it should be trained to do all the spins and spirals. This will lead the skater into a natural rotation and landing of jumps on the more powerful right leg. The left leg should be used to skate one-foot free skating moves requiring long and steady balance.

A few right-footed skaters will start as a child to spin to the right on the right foot and later realize he cannot jump to the left foot, so will change only his jumps to land on the right foot. At the same time the skater will continue to spin on the right foot, and do all spirals on the right foot. This is even a more serious mistake,

for such a skater is a one-legged skater, using the right leg for all skating of importance. Such a skater will overdevelop the right thigh and, in the case of girls, this condition will soon become quite obvious. A one-legged skater can never be considered a free skater of championship caliber.

A skater with a dominant left-footedness should be treated in reverse of the dominant right-footed skater. A left-footed skater should spin to the right on the right foot, and jump in the same rotation to land on the strong left leg. It is best to do long edge spirals and continued one-foot free skating sequences on the weak right leg.

The skater who uses the left hand for eating and writing but throws a ball with the right, and uses the right foot to kick a ball, should be instructed as a right-footed skater.

Parents with twins should realize that in most instances one of the children will be right-handed while the other is left-handed. In these cases the children should be instructed in their left and right-handed fashion, and not made to change to conform to one or the other in order to do pair work together. Pairs can very well be put together spinning and jumping in their opposite directions.

Children in clubs without professional instruction should be cautious in mimicking other skaters, because they may perform in what is for them the wrong direction.

If you are one of the skaters who spins and jumps in your unnatural way and have been trying for several years to master your jumps, then you will have to do leg exercises to strengthen the weak leg. If you are just a beginner, then start in your correct way as outlined above. In any case, discuss your left or right-footedness with your professional before the problem becomes too serious and gets out of control.



New CFSA Medal

WHEN CANADA WAS YOUNG and figure skating was in its infancy, the Canadian Figure Skating Association was formed and with it came the advent of the Championships. Trophies and cups were donated to be competed for annually and a medal was presented to each of the winners.

The design on this medal was very fine indeed, depicting a natty young gentleman skater in knee breeches, with touches of fur on his tunic. Countless generations have admired this medal, but owing to considerable changes in men's attire (not to mention ladies') in recent years, it became apparent that an up-to-date model would be more acceptable. So, with this idea in view, a Dominion-wide competition was held. Over thirty clubs responded.

To choose the winner, a committee was formed under the chairmanship of Donald B. Cruikshank, First Vice-President of the CFSA, and consisted of Mr. Y. Karsh, one of the world's outstanding photographers, Mr. E. A. Gardiner, as-

sistant chief architect of the Department of Public Works, and Mr. H. Wright of the Department of Agriculture, who has had much experience in medal design.

Frances Dafoe of the Toronto Skating Club was acclaimed the winner and the CFSA congratulates her for the excellence of her work. Her beautiful design for either side of the medal is shown in the accompanying photographs. Honorable mention and a second award goes to Violet Doucette of the University Skating Club, Toronto, for her splendid idea of laurel leaves which are incorporated on the back of the winning design.

The medal is the size of an American silver dollar and, unlike the cups and trophies which are re-awarded annually, is kept by each winner. In the Canadian Championships, there are as many as 18 silver medals awarded for first places and 18 bronze for second places.

Frances Dafoe, an attractive brunette of 5'3", is the 20-year-old daughter of Dr. and Mrs. William A. Dafoe, and has been an enthusiastic figure skater for eight

years. She holds the CFSA Seventh and Canadian Silver Dance Test medals, and with her partner, Norris Bowden, in 1950 won the CFSA Waltz Championship; she will be one of the first to win the medal of her own design.

She is a graduate of Branksome Hall and Central Technical School Art Department, is a keen swimmer and member

of the Dolphinettes, and with a Winchester 61 also holds the Dominion Bronze, Silver and Gold pins for shooting. One of her chief hobbies is dress designing. She is also famous in the Toronto Skating Club for her attractive posters and lovely decorations, and the cover design of the Club's 1951 Carnival Program is a clever example of her art.

The Championships of Europe

THE PRESENTATION OF PRIZES at the banquet on February 4 terminated the three-day 1951 Championships of Europe, held by the Zurcher Schlittschuh-Club, Zurich, Switzerland. Four new champions succeeded to the titles left open by last year's winners.

The Ladies' Championship was a close battle all the way between Jeannette Altwegg and Jacqueline du Bief. In the Men's Championship, Hellmut Seibt and Horst Faber finished up with equal total points at the end of the school figures. In the eyes of some, the free skating, a contest only among the top four, would have given an unofficial free skating placing to Faber, Carrington, Seibt and Fassi. The other four men lacked experience and quality of skating, in both school and free, to be serious competition.

The Baran-Falk pair, stylish for their shadow skating, gave a clever and exact performance to make their first place position a popular one.

WESTERN CANADIANS

THE WESTERN CANADIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS were held on January 19-20 during fairly mild weather for the time of year and the location of the competition.

Larson, president of the Western Division, presided at the banquet and introduced prominent sponsors of figure skating in Western Canada who were seated at the head table, including CFSA President Alfred Williams of Calgary. Mr. Larson also welcomed and introduced the visiting professionals, fourteen in all. Mr.

P. Noble, president of the Saskatoon Board of Trade, which body sponsored the banquet, then welcomed to Saskatoon the 160 contestants and visitors from Fort William, Ontario, to Victoria, B. C.

Mr. Williams addressed the gathering and in a few well-chosen words gave a history of the rapid development of figure skating in Canada, especially in the West. The banquet was over by 8 P.M. and the contestants were back on the ice for practice which continued until after midnight.

Friday morning the competitions began at 8 and ran through until 11:30 P.M. During the intermission, from 5 to 8, a large buffet supper was served at the home of Mr. & Mrs. C. McClockling to all prominent out of town figure skating enthusiasts who were attending the Championships.

An innovation at figure skating competitions was a party given by Mr. & Mrs. H. R. Larson to all the professionals attending the Championships.

On Saturday morning the competitions were underway again at 8 o'clock. Advancing the hour of starting was necessitated by the large entry list. During the noon recess a plate luncheon was served to the judges and officials at the home of the president of the Western Division; and during the intermission from 5 to 8 Mr. & Mrs. Ralph Cantalon, a former president of the Saskatoon FSC, held a reception in their home for the judges, officials and out of town club executive members. At the same hour a buffet supper was served all Novice and Junior contestants at the home of Miss Joyce Clair, president of the University FSC.

The Championships were completed at 12 midnight, followed by the presentation of trophies to the winners and engraved certificates to all runners-up. The Kerrisdale Figure Skating Club Trophy for the Most Artistic Skater was won by Dorothy Hall of the Saskatoon FSC.

THE 1951 MIDWESTERN CHAMPIONSHIPS, held at the Broadmoor Ice Palace in Colorado Springs on January 18-20, with Henry M. Beatty as Referee, attracted a large number of ambitious skaters and interested spectators. Members of the Broadmoor Skating Club and entire staff of the Broadmoor Hotel cooperated to make the competition a memorable one. W. Thayer Tutt of the Broadmoor Hotel presented officials and judges with imported Scotch caps which were not only becoming but very effective.

The list of competitors numbered 91, and included two sets of twins—Doris & Mary Seign and Gerald & Jack Woodstrom—of the Winter Club of Fargo-Moorhead, who were entered in Fours. Since there were no other entries in this class the foursome skated an exhibition on Saturday night. Also, there was a deaf mute competitor in Junior Pairs, charming Patty Ann McGarry of Kansas City Junior FSC. On Friday evening, when Miss McGarry and partner, William Ketchum, skated their pair program, interested spectators included students from the famous Colorado School for Deaf and Blind, who were greatly inspired by the excellent performance of the accomplished couple.

Ten closely-matched Senior Ladies made their event an interesting one. Even the brief warm-up period before free skating presented an unexpected picture of whirling colors in ever changing combinations, which was beautiful to watch. (Coincidentally, no two colors were alike.) The brilliant free skating programs of Slavka Kohout, Chicago FSC, Janet Gerhauser, St. Paul FSC, and Betty Lynne Stogner, Broadmoor SC, won the applause of spectators as well as the decisions of the judges. It was interesting to note the three distinctly different styles of skating. Miss Kohout's dramatic interpretation and flowing rhythm was accented by her well-chosen costume of flame red chiffon. Miss Gerhauser's light-as-a-feather grace gave delicacy to even her most difficult jumps; she

wore a soft yellow chiffon costume. Miss Stogner's super-powered performance, in a dress of purple chiffon, bordered on the sensational.

In the Senior Men's class, all seven competitors showed real senior skating ability with outstanding jumps and splendid programs well executed with ease. To Hugh Graham, Tulsa FSC, Carl Chamberlin, Broadmoor SC, and David Jenkins, Cleveland SC—well earned congratulations.

The Junior Ladies' event numbered the largest group of competitors. Sylvia Beth Sundene, Chicago FSC, won much applause for her beautiful free skating effort; but Kay Servatius of the Broadmoor SC, who led in figures, retained her position with a splendid program of masterful content. Kay wore a fuschia chiffon costume; Beth's white lamé dress was trimmed in French blue taffeta; and Beverly Young, Cleveland SC, who was third, was costumed in lilac-hued velvet.

Eleven-year-old Gladys Irene Jacobs, Chicago FSC, in the Novice Ladies' event added another first to her record and captivated all with an artistic free style program, with strength of content and flair for interpretation. Charlene Adams, Dallas FSC, is definitely one to watch in future competitions. Carole Anne Carlson, Broadmoor SC, remarkably improved her position by her inspired free skating.

Although there were only three entries in Novice Men, they gave their best efforts to justify their awarded positions.

Judges and spectators were amazed at the contents of program and high standard of figures skated by the Juvenile Girls. Carol Keyes of the Cleveland SC, Marilyn Mullin, Tulsa FSC, and tiny Stephanie Westerfeld of the Broadmoor SC skated like veterans and received spontaneous cheers for their ambitious programs.

Tommy DeBaca, Broadmoor SC, entered in Juvenile Boys, ably presented one of the best free programs of the competition.

Only two couples competed in Senior Pairs, but honors were justly won by Janet Gerhauser & John Nightingale. The intricate patterns, unusual lifts, jumps and rhythmic unison of the contestants made the decision a very close one. Patsy Ann

Buck & Martin P. Coonan, Jr., St. Paul FSC, impressed all with an unusual, smoothly finished performance in Junior Pairs.

Absence of sufficient contenders forced officials to cancel the Gold Dance competition, and the only couple entered in that event, Terryl Johnson & Gerald Woodstrom, were permitted to enter the Silver Dance Championship, where they were winners. In the Bronze Dance event, it was one-two for the Tulsa FSC in a three-couple competition.

It would take a special article to describe the beauty of the costumes worn for figures, but noted especially were: the marked improvement of simplicity—the accent on quality—the vibrant and dark colors replacing the once popular pastels—the distinctive blacks and navy blues.

Social activities included a cocktail party at the Cheyenne Mountain Country Club which preceded the dinner for judges and officials given at the Broadmoor Hotel on Wednesday evening; and a supper dance at The Broadmoor following the final skating and presentation of awards. Many friendships were made and renewed at a number of charming small parties given by various club members.

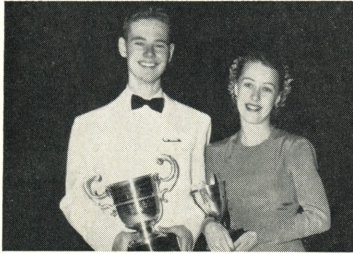
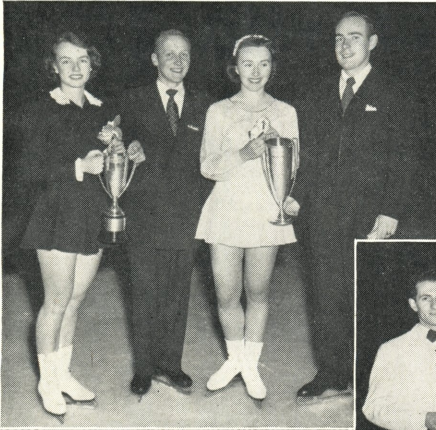

Sheila Dawson, the diminutive 9-year-old from Berkeley, wearing an adorable gold jumper and white blouse, completely captivated the spectators with her personality and determination and was accorded a resounding round of applause and cheers. However, La Ree Coyle, a little more mature (12 years old), skated with exceptional technique and poise for so young a skater and followed through with her previous school figure placement to win the title. The Juvenile Boys provided the audience with rare delight as they went through their programs with zest and enthusiasm. At the conclusion, Robert Lee Brewer was proclaimed the winner.

Saturday evening brought with it the grand finale with magnificent skating. The Junior Ladies' event was captured by lovely Georgiana Sutton who executed her difficult program with a brilliant performance that was thoroughly applauded. Moving from fourth in figures to place second, Catherine Machado held the audience spellbound with the artistry, power, and brilliance of her performance.

Outstanding among the Senior Men were Evy Scotvold, the champion, and Armando "Pancho" Rodriquez, whose remarkable performance almost displaced the winner. "Pancho," who gives his all when skating, was completely exhausted at the completion of his program and required the attendance of a doctor. This momentary lapse of consciousness in no way detracted from his desire to skate, as only minutes later he appeared on the ice once more in the Senior Pair event. Evy Scotvold's skating was beautiful to behold, his manner of execution, his intricate and precise footwork impressed everyone.

The Senior Ladies' free skating provided the spectators with exquisite beauty of poetry in motion. Each of the contestants, with the greatest of skill, displayed speed, grace and precision. Nancy Bates-Lane beautifully executed jumps in unusual coordination and height. Zella May Harrington received a tremendous ovation when she finished a powerfully skated pro-

gram with a very fast cross foot spin which brought wave upon wave of applause. Zella May wore a beautiful dress fashioned of red velvet, with a very effective yoke and a scalloped neckline. Frances Dorsey, who won first place, skated a very artistic program, and looked as light and graceful as the delicate costume she wore. She chose black with the neckline fashioned to give the appearance of being off-shoulder, and her little black cap was the perfect finish. We could not leave the Senior Ladies without mention of the flawlessly-executed program of Patricia Quick whose jumps leave you breathless.

The English language lacks sufficient superlatives to describe the thrilling exhibition skated by Anne & Austin Holt. Throughout their program one felt as if he were watching a beautiful ballet with added thrill of the speed given them by their skates. Their unison, in particular the manner in which they used their heads and arms, was perfection. Above all else, the lifts executed by this pair left the audience breathless. It is superfluous to add that they were crowned the Senior Pair Champions.

Skating through the routines of the Blues, the American Waltz, the Tango and the Westminster Waltz, Janet Maeder & Wesley Farrington established their superiority and were crowned the winners of the Veterans Dance.

The competitive program came to an end with the skating of the Gold Dance finals. Carmel & Edward Bodel repeated their outstanding performance of the previous evening to continue their domination of the Pacific Coast Gold Dance division.

Dee Dee Wayland, in addition to receiving the award for the Novice Ladies Championship, was also presented with the perpetual trophy by Kim Carson of the Los Angeles FSC, who had held the trophy during 1950. With the conclusion of festivities at the rink, an overflow crowd of competitors, judges, officials and skating friends made their way to the Beverly Hills Hotel to attend the Competitors Buffet Supper and Ball.

In conjunction with the competitions, a Dance Conference was conducted by Mrs. Myrtle Girten with discussions directed to-

ward Silver Dancing. Five Gold Dance Tests were held immediately upon adjournment of the Conference.

Otto Dallmayr, Chairman of the Competition, his entire staff of committeemen, the judges and officials should be proud of the smoothness and precision of the entire program and the beauty they helped bring to this, our Fair City of the Angels.

Club Forum



THE OFFICIAL MAGAZINE of the USFSA was started to promote the sport and to bring official news and rulings to the attention of Association members. It is not a profit-making enterprise and for years the Association absorbed annual deficits. Ten years ago the CFSA also adopted SKATING as its official magazine.

Interest in SKATING has grown, and its subscription list has shown a steady increase through the years. Although many different methods of collecting subscriptions from clubs have been tried, much of the work falls on the willing Subscription Representatives. They are club members appointed each fall to take charge of subscriptions within their own clubs.

Various methods are used, and it is some time since they have been described. The simplest one is to allocate \$1.50, the club subscription rate, of each member's dues for a subscription. That results in the club absorbing the \$1.50 subscription rate, and only a few clubs can afford to do this. The Rye plan, originated by the Rye FSC, is now used by many. This plan adds an item to the bill for dues, marked "SKATING (optional) . . . \$1.50." Experience shows that most members will pay this item except in cases where it would mean two or three subscriptions in one family. A third plan is to enclose a subscription circular (furnished to clubs free on request) in bills for dues or other club notices.

As there are many variations of these basic plans, the Representatives in some of the clubs with a large number of subscribers were asked to explain their meth-

od, and answers are given below. The following clubs have obtained the objective this year of being a 100% subscribing club—in that the magazine reaches every family and every single member. A special thanks is due them and their Representatives:*

All Year FSC (Los Angeles); Brooklyn FSC; Chicago FSC; Denver FSC; Detroit SC; Duluth FSC; Hershey Junior FSC; Milwaukee FSC; Outdoor SC (Toronto); Omaha FSC; Philadelphia SC & HS; Pittsburgh FSC; Providence FSC; Rochester FSC (Minn.); Seattle SC; The SC of Boston; Town of Mount Royal FSC; Trail SC; University SC (Denver); Washington FSC; Wichita FSC.

The Pittsburgh Figure Skating Club includes cost of the magazine in its dues, and a subscription goes to each family and to each single member.

We have included a SKATING subscription in our membership dues the past years. We allow only one subscription to a family, however. Dues must be paid before we send the subscription in, as we did have some trouble in the beginning when members did not pay their dues. It now works out very satisfactorily. Most of our members are under 18, so we now have a non-skating membership for parents who do not skate. As this is only \$3.00 we

do not include the magazine. It encourages the parents to work in the club and gives them a vote in the club elections.

I think personal contact with each member, with a good sales talk, is the only way to get more subscribers. I've worked hard on this system and it is the only one that has brought me any results. I am thoroughly sold on SKATING magazine as well as the USFSA *Rulebook*.

When we send out the annual bills we also send one of your SKATING circulars. Our response is almost 100% from the senior members and about 80% from the juveniles. The lower percentage among the juveniles is due almost entirely to large turnover and the fact that the new members are not aware of the value of your magazine. Among the juniors who have been members for more than one year, I think that they would also approach 100%.

The All Year Figure Skating Club (Los Angeles) issues statements covering dues; Inter-Club fee; USFSA Registration fee; and they require the first member of a family to subscribe to SKATING. It is not 100% membership subscription, but it certainly is next best, having one issue in each family.

The Blade & Edge Club (Pasadena) issues similar statements, breaking down the various amounts and including as an optional item the magazine subscription. It is my opinion that the greater number of members send checks covering the entire statement, which would include the magazine. If the statements were issued and no mention made of the magazine, I feel there would be fewer subscriptions.

We have not been able to include the fee for the magazine in our dues since we bought our rink. The reason for this is that, until our purchase obligation is met, our contract specifies that all money taken as membership fees must be used to meet payments on the principal.

When the rink is paid for, we hope to return to our former and better plan of including SKATING subscriptions with the annual dues. It is a much better method, assuring better distribution of the magazine and keeping everyone informed on what's happening in the skating world. Indeed, how any skater, young or old, can skate along without SKATING is something I just don't understand.

1. On page 58 of the *Rulebook*, the Swing Dance diagram shows Step No. 7 as a LFO roll. This is an error; it should be a LFO roll. Please make the necessary correction in your copy of the *Rulebook*.

2. Effective immediately upon publication of this notice, Preliminary Dance Test candidates will be allowed to take their tests with skaters who have passed either or both of their Bronze Dance Tests, but none of their Silver Dance Tests. No dancers (Preliminary candidates or higher) are permitted to take tests with partners of the same sex; the rule that "a couple shall be composed of a lady and a man" still stands. (Dance Test Rule 2c, page 46.)

3. During Summer Skating Seasons, failed dance tests may be retaken after 15 days instead of after 30. This is a modification of Dance Test Rule 2d. Summer Season is defined as the period June 1-August 31, incl.

4. Effective upon publication hereof, failed Preliminary and Bronze Dance Tests cannot be retaken for 30 days in the Winter Season (September 1-May 31) or for 15 days in Summer Season (June 1-August 31). (Note: in paragraphs 3. and 4. above the period for Summer retakes is 15 days, not 14. Clubs which have tests weekly on a certain night must allow three weeks, therefore, instead of two.)

5. Effective at once, the "exceptional circumstances" paragraphs in Dance Test Rule 2d are deleted. It was deleted from school figure tests last year. Experience has shown that the circumstances are never really exceptional, and the only results of the "appeal" are unnecessary correspondence and disappointments.

6. Vice-Chairmen of the Dance Committee for Eastern, Midwestern, and Pacific Coast Sections, and for Judging, are hereby authorized to grant sanctions for the holding of Gold Dance Tests. Ten days advance notice instead of 30 is required. Applying clubs must set forth the place, date, names of proposed judges,

and name of judge-in-charge in their application. Vice-Chairmen must prepare five copies of their sanctions: 1. to applying club; 2. to Chairman USFSA Dance Committee; 3. to Association Central Office (Ass't Sec.); 4. to Vice-Chairman of the Dance Committee for Judges; 5. to Vice-Chairman of the Dance Committee for the Section in which the tests are to be held. Vice-Chairmen for Sections are requested to confine their issuing of sanctions to those within their own Sections. This modification of Dance Test Rule 4c permits clubs to obtain sanctions from any one of three people, instead of just one as at present (Chairman, also Vice-Chairman for that Section, and Vice-Chairman for Judges).
