

The North American Championships

THE GENESEE FIGURE SKATING CLUB, in its two short years of existence, is most honored to have had the privilege of rubbing shoulders with some of the greatest figure skaters in the world. We would love to hope that maybe a little of the magic might rub off on us. It was a pleasure to play host—in conjunction with the American Legion of Monroe County—to the congenial and delightful group of people who participated in the North American Championships. The two-day event commenced Saturday morning February 9 and came to its triumphant close the following Sunday afternoon.

Compulsory figures and dances were scheduled Saturday at the Ritter-Clark Memorial Rink. An amazing crowd was on hand to watch the figures. For the compulsory dances, people were turned away. On Sunday, 7,248 enthusiasts thronged Rochester's huge War Memorial to witness the Free Skating, Free Dancing, and the Pairs. It was a record crowd at the Memorial, and literally hundreds were

turned away.

It is unnecessary to say that captivating Carol Heiss dominated the Ladies' Singles. The 1956 World Champion proved herself "master of all she surveyed." Finish, vitality, charm, together with the fire of disciplined determination are the ingredients which make up the stuff of this spirited champion. Although figures are not famous for their audience appeal, it was a joy to watch Carol—in a neat black outfit with accordian pleated skirt and simple turtle neck—move effortlessly through each figure.

On Sunday, in her free program, Carol took to the ice clad simply in bright carnation red, the sequins on her collar, cuffs, and little Juliet cap sparkling gayly, and left no doubt as to her supremacy. The combination of her elfin grace, delicate sense of nuance, yet tremendous speed, together with a style of performance beau-

tifully suited to her own personality, was insurpassable.

Carole Jane Pachl, Canada's most serious threat to Carol, ended her figures with a 551.6 to Carol's 588.5. In spite of the somewhat formidable odds, Carole Jane, dressed in becoming deep blue, skated her free program with confidence, and displayed startling power in her jumps and spins. Joan Schenke, of Tacoma, skated with remarkable grace and rhythmic flow. The beauty of her glide revealed a real maturity of musical expression.

Karen Dixon, in fourth place, vividly covered the ice, and the beauty of her jumps and deep, controlled lean were a pleasure to watch. Margaret Crosland drew the difficult free skating position of following Carol Heiss. Nevertheless, Margaret's delicate femininity and well-skated program made watching her a pleasure. Claralynn Lewis displayed a nice musical interpretation in her program.

Turning to the Men's Singles, David Jenkins was the unquestioned favorite. In figures, David set the pace, but not by much as Canada's Charles Snelling made the going plenty tough. In the free skating, once David touched blade to the ice, however, the die was cast. The ensuing series of breathtaking triple loops, flawless, powerful jumps, magnificently controlled delayed double axels as if suspended in mid-air left no doubt as to the supremacy of the seasoned, polished performer. Charles skated a varied and competent free program to extremely well chosen music, but was unable to catch up to his formidable opponent.

Third place Tim Brown from California skated a very pleasing program with easy masculine grace. His slow sequences, concentrating on smooth rhythm rather than intricate trickiness, displayed an exceptionally good musical interpretation

Canada's Donald Jackson exhibited in-

credible speed. His vigorous, engaging personality on ice lends an unfettered quality to his skating. Donald is definitely someone to watch. Two falls unfortunately marred his performance. Tom Moore from Seattle skated a competent and smooth exhibition.

In the Dance, the top three couples were so close the final decision on the winners could not be made from a majority of ordinals but had to be determined by the lowest ordinal number total.

Geraldine Fenton & Bill McLachlan triumphed to bring this title home to Canada for the first time. They were consistently good. Their rich fluidity created by a soft knee bend and lovely lean lent a smoothness and flow which radiated from the couple's rhythm and lightness. Gerry wore an exquisite pale coral creation in the free dance, which was highlighted by her short, softly curling brunette hair.

Following closely on Canada's trail, Joan Zamboni & Roland Junso, representing the Stars and Stripes, got off to a slow start in the compulsory, but gathered momentum with each successive dance. When Sunday afternoon rolled around, Joan, in bright red lace and sequined tiara, dazzled the crowd with her style,

vitality, and grace.

Sharon McKenzie & Bert Wright, in third place and also representing the United States, are a real threat in international competition. In the Rocker Fox, being accustomed to the longer rinks of California, their performance was unfortunately marred by running into the barrier. But, the couple went on to win the Free Dance. The beauty of this couple's dancing, with their subtle knee action, is inescapable.

Lindis & Jeffery Johnston skated smoothly with nice flow. Mr. & Mrs. Edward Bodel can be counted on to put on a polished performance; their nice control and sophisticated elegance was heightened in their free dance. Beverley Orr & Hugh Smith in their free dance had good change of pace and originality of artistic design. Some moves were regrettably somewhat suggestive of pair skating even though beautifully executed.

As we move on to the grace and beauty of the Pairs, where competition was also incredibly keen, Barbara Wagner & Robert Paul led Canada to another triumph. The smooth, perfect rhythm of their simultaneous movement was thrilling to watch. Skaters of equal ability, they exhibited shadow skating at its best. Their identical separation moves were highlighted by an exquisite knee catch, reminiscent of the stag jump in free skating, and by Barbara's beautiful lifts which always ended on a sure, soft knee.

Maria & Otto Jelinek, brother and sister team from Canada, performed with the beauty of disciplined timing, coordination and precision. Their youthful verve sparked the excellent variety and imagination of their program. Maria, dressed in a lovely aqua lamé costume, entranced onlookers with pigtails tied up in beguiling bows of matching colored ribbon.

The U. S. Junior Pair Champions, Nancy Rouillard & Ronald Ludington, finished in third place. Although the content of their program was simpler than some, their mature dignity and beautiful carriage radiated consummate grace. Mary Kay & Richard Keller of Buffalo brought youth, buoyancy, and zest to the varied and interesting content of their program.

And so another great championship came to a close. Genesee Figure Skating Club President F. Ritter Shumway, who so greatly inspired the bringing of this wonderful event to Rochester, can close another triumphant chapter in the annals of the Genesee Figure Skating Club.

"Someone is going to meet the train at 6:30 A.M.? The members of the Genesee FSC must be crazy or else the nicest peo-

ple alive!"

This was my frank reaction upon learning that we (Mr. & Mrs. Benjamin T. Wright and myself) were to be met on our arrival in Rochester. Before the weekend was over, both my snap judgments had been proven correct: Genesee members are crazy—about skating!—as well as being most friendly and hospitable!

On Friday morning (a pre-dawn and very dark 6:30) we stepped from the train to be met by Mrs. William Barrows, a very pleasant lady who took us to breakfast, and drove me to the home of Mr. & Mrs. Willis Zahrndt, my very hospitable

and helpful hosts.

Many social events marked the Championship weekend. On Friday evening, Club President & Mrs. F. Ritter Shumway gave a memorable dinner for visiting officials and judges. Saturday evening, preceding the dinner-dance, Mr. & Mrs. Rex V. Rial entertained out-of-town skating enthusiasts, judges and officials with a

cocktail party.

The dinner and dance at the Manger-Rochester Hotel was a sell-out and then some, as it was necessary to procure an additional room (the hotel bar!) for the overflow and tables were set up even in the hotel lobby! Brief speeches were made by various officials, including CFSA President Crispo, USFSA Vice-President Mc-Daniel, and F. Ritter Shumway. The Monroe County American Legion Winter Carnival Committee, co-sponsor of the North American Championships, was represented by Dennis J. Livadas, General Chairman. The speeches were climaxed with a hilarious talk by that "wildly" traveled lecturer, Mrs. Giles Blueblade, known to Skating's readers as the recipient of the "Letters to Brunhilda."

The final social event was a buffet luncheon for judges on Sunday at the home of Mr. & Mrs. Ernest C. Whitbeck, Ir.

Another gathering of note-not social -took place on Saturday afternoon at the R. I. T. rink. Dr. Sidney V. Soanes, CFSA Dance Committee Chairman, assisted by Minerva S. Burke, USFSA Dance Vice-Chairman for Tests, led an informal discussion of the differences in the dance test structure of the two countries. However, when news reached the group that a capacity crowd plus-the rink was turning people away-was to attend the compulsory dances, the discussion halted a half hour before scheduled. This fact served to underline my conclusion that Rochesterians are "crazy" about skating. Another indication of the enthusiasm in Rochester for the event was that the Championships programs were sold out, and became a collector's item.

A milestone was reached with the addition of the North American Dance Trophies—the Dance Championship initiated in 1947 was the only event for which there had not been a trophy. The handsome, hand-fashioned silver bowls, products of the School for American Craftsmen, part of R. I. T., were donated by F. Ritter Shumway and the Rochester Institute of

Technology.

Personal highlights of this, my first experience attending a North American Championship, include . . . the gay exuberance of the Canadians, with their Toronto Skating Club pennants and beanies . . . the sound of 7,248 spectators holding their collective breath at the one slight hesitation during David Jenkins' free skating and the sigh of relief from 7,248 persons when they saw there was nothing to worry about . . . the limp feeling of exhaustion after having watched Carol Heiss and David perform . . . admiration for the superb organization of the competition, the publicity "campaign" in particular . . . and last, and most outstanding, the cordiality and friendliness of everyone!

Blueprint Of A Club President

The season for annual skating club meetings approaches and, with it, the troublesome problem of choosing club presidents. Reference material on this subject is rare, but the writer has happened upon a pertinent, though rather lengthy, report by Dr. Norman Loop-Bracket, eminent psycho-sociologist, who has studied the case histories of some 700 skating club presidents. His observations and conclusions can be presented here only briefly but, even thus compressed, they should have value. Not necessarily, but probably, in order of importance, Dr. Loop-Bracket's findings follow:

1. The Candidate should be married. This state of life establishes him basically as a man of adventurous spirit, tested in situations of great stress and unlikely, even under extreme tension, to succumb either to suicidal or homicidal impulse. (Dr. L-B supports this finding with extensive footnotes.) The Candidate's wife, however, should have a detached attitude toward skating and skaters and would, ideally, devote herself to church and women's club affairs. Such a person will probably have the poise and tolerance to handle amiably the problems her husband will, inevitably, bring home to dinner.

2. The Candidate should have children who skate well enough to support his own efforts, and person if need be, but not so well as to become a crucial problem in the club or give rise to suspicion of ulterior motives in the president's decisions about the Carnival.

3. The Candidate should be a reasonable facsimile of a "man of distinction"—slightly gray at the temples, well turned out; but positively no active, or latent, heart condition. This last is very important—more so off ice than on.

4. The Candidate should be independently wealthy, but not unemployed: the complete loafer lacks social respectability. Any token job, however, will cover the requirements, especially if it involves



a secretary who will devote most of her time to handling club correspondence.

5. The Candidate should have a working knowledge of psychology and practical politics, plus the understanding heart of a spiritual advisor, the sympathetic urge of a mother with a hurt child, and the authoritative bark of a top sergeant.

6. The Candidate should skate elementary school figures moderately well—say through the First Test—and should be a reasonably competent dancer able to attempt, and sometimes even to perform, the Silver group. Wary of the Vice-President, he will, of course, always skate single in the Kilian.

7. The Candidate should be so devoted to skating and all its intricacies that he will allow no other interest, summer or winter, to distract him from this single, overwhelming obsession.

Thus the comments and recommendations of Dr. Loop-Bracket. Strangely, his final footnote seems to bear little scholarly relation to his lengthy text. It reads, cryptically: "Brother, I WAS a club president!"

The Championships of Canada

Winnipeg Winter Club

WE AT THE WINNIPEG Winter Club had Canada's top 50 skaters with us for a week, and we enjoyed every minute of it.

Practice time was made available at the club rink for three days prior, and on the Championship days (February 14-16), the skaters rehearsed at the new Winnipeg arena where the final evening's events were run off before a gallery of 2,500.

The Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba, Hon. John S. McDiarmid, and Mrs. McDiarmid gave their patronage to the Championships. His Honor presented the trophies to the winners, with the exception of the Arthur L. Dysart cups for Junior Pairs and Victor Sifton's Tenstep cups which were presented by their Winnipeg donors.

Mr. & Mrs. McDiarmid had a special interest in the Championships. Their granddaughter Margaret was one of the judges' caddies. The five caddies are all active skaters who won a ticket-selling contest and they lent a colorful note in their gold lamé leotards, representing the Golden Boy which sits atop Manitoba's Legislative building.

We were delighted with the high calibre of skating right through the Junior and Senior events. Canada's skaters are definitely out to reach the top and they take their performances seriously.

Although there was disappointment over 1956 Champions Lindis and Jeffery Johnston's withdrawal from the Senior Dance, the event was well contested by three other couples.

The Championships were a happy reunion for Canada's skating family, officers of the Canadian Figure Skating Association, judges, competitors and their chaperones, and professionals. It was a return to his skating "home" for CFSA President F. Herbert Crispo of Toronto who first skated inside and outside edges at the Winnipeg Skating Club, forerunner of the Winnipeg Winter Club. For the first time in Canadian Championship history, an American, Arthur F. Preusch of St. Paul, Minn. served on the judging panel. Another "first" was chalked up—coverage on the sports, rather than the society, pages of the local newspapers.

papers.

The skaters were welcomed at a luncheon given by the Hudson's Bay department store on the day preceding the Championships, when they drew their order of skating from a rose bowl. Winter Club Pro Hans Gerschwiler and his wife were hosts to visiting professionals at their party on the eve of the meet. The social round for officials continued during the Championships at parties given by Dr. & Mrs. John Abra, Dr. & Mrs. A. C. Abbott, Mr. & Mrs. J. Halliday, Mr. & Mrs. C. I. Keith and Mr. & Mrs. H. O. Jones. Following the trophy presentations, the competitors gathered at the home of Mr. & Mrs. J. R. Murray and the adults had their party at Mr. & Mrs. Alex Robertson's home.

Among the lovely costumes chosen by the lady skaters was Senior titleholder Carole Jane Pachl's royal blue chiffon, outlined with silver sequins. Her usually bobbing pony-tail hairdo was caught up with a large sequined ornament.

The men all wore black with the exception of Hugh Smith who matched his partner Beverley Orr's shadow blue costume for the dance events. The naming of the Smith-Orr pair to Canada's World Team came during the Championships and added to the excitement.

Dr. John Abra was chairman of the Championships Committee with George McCullough as Co-chairman. They and their committee members did a masterful job, for there wasn't a hitch throughout.

It was an exciting time for the host club, and an inspiring one for our young skaters. We hope it won't be another 15 years before the "Canadians" return to Winnipeg. The results follow:

Judges as People

WILLIAM EVAN LEWIS is a partner in the firm of Lewis, Christensen Investment Company, dealing in investment securities. His main interests center around subjects of business and commerce; he spends the majority of his time with the operation of the company for, as he says, "A new business has many, many problems to work out and it takes considerable time to build from scratch." For athletic activity he likes all sports in general, and is very active with the skating clubs, judging, and working with judges schools. William Lewis is single and lives with his parents in Vancouver. He attended the University of Washington in Seattle, receiving his B.A. in Business Administration, Insurance and Finance. As a skating competitor, not too many years ago, he represented the Vancouver SC, which is still his home club. He won the

Canadian Junior title in 1948 and was twice runner-up in Senior competition. When the Capilano WC came into being two years ago he was instrumental in its organization and is a Director, as he is in the Vancouver SC. Mr. Lewis passed his First Test in 1943, became a Gold Medalist in 1949, and passed the USFSA Gold two years later. JANE STEINWEDELL CODY, and, pioneers themselves, they were founders and are still members of the Cleveland SC, were the first family in the club to all pass their First Test, and Mrs. Cody was the first lady to pass the Silver Dance Test. They have enjoyed doing their skating together and loved it as a family sport. From first becoming judges in 1939 and 1940, Mr. & Mrs. Cody have advanced on the panel to each becoming a National Figure and Gold Dance Judge; and in 1951 Louis Cody was promoted to International Dance Judge status. The Codys' children are Jane-Mrs. H. D. Meinke, Ir.-who lives with her husband and three young children in Northfield, Ill., and William F. (named for Buffalo Bill), who with his wife lives in Cleveland. Mrs. Cody was educated at the Laurel School in Cleveland, Dana Hall in Wellesley, Mass., and Finch Junior College in New York City. For years she was active in hospital work, but right now centers most of her non-skating activities around the work of the Republican Committee. Besides their service to skating as judges, the Codys have served on club and Association committees and have "enjoyed tremendously our many fine friends and association with young people."

Mr. Lindstrom is President of the Mercer Island Lumber Company, Mercer Island, Wash.; he studied civil engineering for three years at the University of Washington. We believe this one simple remark by one of our junior skaters, and for obvious reasons she must remain anonymous, should be a subject for serious consideration by each of us "skating mothers."

Understandably, we are ambitious for our children. Also, we want our young hopeful to make as much progress as any other child. But, in setting the standards for our children, are we taking into consideration the fact that some children have been blessed with more natural coordination, better balance, less fear of falling? By forcing them to compete with other children who may enjoy these attributes, are we not robbing them of the actual fun of skating?

How many of us "skating mothers" can do on the ice the things we ask our children to do? How many of us actually know what goes through the minds of our children as they strive to improve, to learn one more jump or spin, one more

difficult figure?

We feel we can help our children in numerous ways to work at their figures, to practice their free skating and to develop into excellent skaters, but we cannot do so by demanding of them more than they can possibly deliver at their

particular stage of development.

We are presently involved in planning the Annual Ice Show of the club. Into this planning will go hours of deliberation, the goal being the presentation of an Ice Show that will be a credit to the club as a whole, that will impress the general public with the talent within our club, as concerns individual skaters, group numbers, and the men and women who work behind the scenes designing costumes, purchasing material and doing the myriad tasks that must be done before the curtain can rise. The "drones" who do these tasks are really the unsung heroes.

The skaters who will be assigned solos will have *earned* them by hard work.

They are *strong* skaters with the ability to cover the ice with grace and precision. Only by awarding solos purely on the basis of accomplishment can we build a club of strong skaters and put the Dallas Figure Skating Club on the map.

Each skater in the club, regardless of ability, will be seen in the show. This will help them to develop poise and build them into the soloists of tomorrow.

Remember that there are other years and other shows. Don't spoil your child's fun in skating and doing his or her part in the show by being overly ambitious for him. Give your help and understanding, and help us to build the best show we have ever had!

The toil is over, the show is past But in our hearts it's there to last. The stars who shone so brightly there Will grace our memories everywhere.


You all saw Davie, and Kellers too Excel on ice as they always do. But I think not of these, and I must Write these few lines about our star dust.

Natural Counter-Correct: This is skated in the natural manner. The measurements were taken from various counters skated by first class skaters, and there seemed to be no significant difference in the size and shape of the curves when accurately made. The first half is similar to a bracket and, like it, is not much longer than the length of the skate. The second half is a natural shallow three curve, and requires a little more length in which to ease into the following circle. A counter should be lightly skated, not gouged out of the ice.—from THE EVALU-ATION OF ERRORS IN FIGURES, published by the USFSA.

Mrs. Burnham is a member of the CFSA Dance Committee and a Championship Judge for Dances.

He enjoys swimming and playing tennis, also, but claims not to be very good at either.
