

The Championships of the World

(Compiled from reports furnished to Skating by U. S. observers in Paris)

THE 1958 CHAMPIONSHIPS of the World took place at the Palais des Sports, Paris, France, on February 13-15. Practice ice and the Men's figure event only were held in a new rink owned by the Federation Française, a modern, all-glass structure. A unique feature of this year's Championships—if not an unparalleled incident —was that all four events boasted Defending Champions, all of whom were successful in retaining their World titles. For the first time since World War II, the Soviet Union had entries in a World competition—three men and two pairs. As a class, the Russians are a little older than the other competitors, and very strong athletically. They have received no formal instruction, but have learned mostly from movies and books.

MEN'S CHAMPIONSHIP

Outstanding in the figure division were the tracings laid down by Tim Brown, notably a strong compulsory skater, who held a very comfortable margin over Defending Champion David Jenkins after the six figures were completed. Tim received seven first places. Without exception, the other U. S. contenders and the three Canadian men were down in the middle group, with Don Jackson of Canada the best of them (9th). Alain Giletti of France helped himself in the final result by winning a third place figure ranking with a compulsory performance which was improved from his usual standard.

Because of the large number of entries, the compulsory phase extended from 7 A.M. to 7 P.M. It was clearly evident that the time has come to evolve a way to limit the number of entries, for it is too difficult placing each one and justice cannot be done in the marking.

In the free skating, David Jenkins was at his very best, with practically a flaw-less performance. His spectacular exhibition filled with difficult moves brought him performance marks of a perfect 6, seven 5.9's, and a 5.8. His dazzling free skating display dissolved Brown's figure

lead and gave David firm possession of the title. Donald Jackson put on the show of his life, receiving well-deserved marks; he brought down the house with his combinations of double jumps and at least one triple. With a performance so outstanding that it surprised everyone he moved up to a final fourth place. Tim Brown, Tom Moore and Bob Brewer all did fine jobs in the free with good performances. Alain Calmat of France put on an outstanding free performance, and raised himself one place. Alain Giletti's free skating was up to his usual standard and he had no trouble holding his third place. Karol Divin of Czechoslovakia, who had beaten the French competitors a fortnight earlier for the European title, fell during his free program, and dropped to sixth from his fourth place figure ranking.

Charles Snelling, Canadian Champion, always a wonderful competitor, was down in the figures, and was disappointing in his free performance. Although he did not miss anything, he seemed to lack his usual pep and fire. Eddie Collins of Canada put on a smooth, workmanlike performance to better himself by one place.

The Russian competitors were quite impressive, considering that their figures were not very good. All did the modern free skating moves, and Lev Michajlov, in particular, was a good free skater. Although the Russians had no real technique they went into their programs with ambition and vigor.

LADIES' CHAMPIONSHIP

Carol Heiss, in quest of her third World title, ended up far ahead of the rest of the field at the end of the figures. It is rare to see such a large lead in a topranking competition—71.1 points over second place Ingrid Wendl of Austria, or an average of practically an 8-point lead on each Judge's card. Carol did almost perfect skating and amassed a commanding 1,011.7 points. Miss Wendl, European Champion, led her compatriot Hanna Walter by 61 points; from third

place down the other ladies were fairly well bunched.

Carol's thrilling free performance brought perfect marks of 6 from three of the European Judges-the successful defense of her title was already a foregone conclusion. Particularly impressive is her series of axels done first on the right foot and then on the left-a very difficult and very beautiful move. She is one of the few who jumps equally well off either foot. Ingrid Wendl performed in fine style; the improvement in her free skating over last year could easily be seen. Nancy Heiss put on a very pleasing performance but she was not impressive enough to hold her fourth place in figures and dropped to sixth. Also improved over her 1957 World showing was Ina Bauer of Germany; particularly noticeable was her better work in figures, and after the free skating she moved from eighth place to fourth. Patricia Pauley of Great Britain was impressive with an outstanding free program skated with verve and to the music. Other programs of unusual interest were that of Regine Heitzer of Austria, who is only about 12 years old and shows interesting promise; and Sonia Snelling, Canadian Junior Champion, who looked very good in a nice free program.

Margaret Crosland, Canadian Champion, finished a disappointing thirteenth, as she apparently could not seem to get going in this competition. Carol Wanek, U.S. Junior Champion, is an even, workmanlike skater, who made a satisfactory showing in her first World appearance. Claralynn Lewis skated a nice program but had difficulty in her timing which interfered with her usual fine flow: this could have been the fault of the record machine, which jumped for some of the competitors. Here again, in a field of 29 ladies this year, it was felt that many were not up to the standard of a World competition.

PAIR CHAMPIONSHIP

The successful Defending World Champions, Barbara Wagner & Robert Paul of Canada, put on an outstanding, flawless display of a very fine program. Their unison, striking lifts, and smooth run in perfect time to their music was a

classic example of pair skating of true World Championship calibre. Maria & Otto Jelinek of Canada skated particularly well, with a program highlighted by their extremely smooth style. They placed a very close third to the second-ranking pair, Vera Suchankova & Zdenek Dolezal, European Champions from Czechoslovakia. The British team of Joyce Coates & Anthony Holles surprised everybody with their greatly improved style from last year; they skated a fine program remarkably well. The Paris crowd received the U. S. Champions, Nancy & Ronald Ludington, with enthusiastic howls, but their performance lacked its usual freedom and they appeared restrained and careful; their program contained some moves which are barred (or at least controversial) under a new ISU rule governing pair skating. For their initial entry, Mary Jane Watson & John Jarmon put on a pleasing performance and program, to place ninth.

DANCE CHAMPIONSHIP

The draw for the compulsory dances produced the Foxtrot, Viennese, Paso Doble and Tango, skated in this order. Because of the large field (16 couples) the starting time was moved up one hour.

The music selected for the Foxtrot was "Gimme a Little Kiss." Though one of the easier of the international dances, the scraping of threes and mohawks was far greater than would be expected from World competitors skating what is a Pre Silver dance in the USFSA. Naturally the top couples did well and quickly stood out in the field. The English skaters did particularly well with June Markham & Courtney Jones showing interesting expression with long, deep edges and knee bends, followed by much lesser ones on the shorter edges.

The Viennese, one of the really difficult Gold Dances to skate correctly, began to "separate the men from the boys." One saw a great deal of improper timing of Steps 1, 2 and 3, and 16, 17 and 18, but the music, "Vienna Blood," did not help because it lacked the typical Viennese phrasing. In the man's choctaw sequence (Steps 9, 10, 11) one saw a great deal of "Foxtrot" timing instead of waltz timing as the dance is written. The ladies seemed

to have a great deal of trouble getting on an edge for their mohawk, there being more true flats than edges skated. This was even true for Markham & Jones, whose pattern also "crept" quite noticeably on the repeat. This seemed to be one of Geraldine Fenton & Bill Mc-Lachlan's best dances skated with good flow, accurate edges and timing. Andree Anderson & Donald Jacoby had some trouble similar to what was mentioned above for Markham & Jones.

The Paso Doble was skated to true Spanish Paso Doble music, "El Germante." Reginald Wilkie, the Dean of English Ice Dancing (and Referee for the dance events this year) has said that in his opinion Steps 26, 27, 28 (the cross rolls at the end of the Paso) are the most difficult steps in all the ice dances to do correctly. From the performances in the Worlds he would seem to be correct. Most of the couples placed these steps on the opposite side of the rink from the Judges so it was a little hard to observe them accurate-Markham-Jones and Anderson-Jacoby executed the Paso exceptionally well, but the surprise was Beverley Orr & Hugh Smith of Canada, who were easily up there toward the top in this particular dance. Fenton & McLachlan had good flow and deep cross rolls that added up to a fine performance. It was surprising that six of the World dance teams (none of them from North America) started the Paso in the middle of the measure of music, that is to say, on count 3 rather than on count 1, as the dance is laid down in the Rulebook.

After all the discussion over the past two years regarding the requirement in the ISU Rulebook for full outside or tango position in the 4-count rolls of the Tango, it was interesting to see how this was handled. Of the North American dancers, only Anderson & Jacoby were in tango position as required. Incidentally, they did an excellent job with this dance, both in expression, flow and technical accuracy. The Canadian couples went straight into waltz position after their chassé steps, while O'Neill & Bejshak were in "partial outside" position which is allowed by USFSA rules, but not by ISU. Many of the couples experienced difficulty with the U. S. GOLD DANCE CHAMPIONS Sharon McKenzie & Bert Wright did not skate in the World Dance Championship because of an infected Achilles tendon suffered by Sharon, which prevented them from training. They will not enter the Nationals, and Bert has turned professional to teach.

music ("Romanesca," a European orchestral recording) because the beat evaporated for about 10 seconds after the first 20 seconds of the record. It seemed that Anderson & Jacoby did not get quite the high marks that their performance justified in this dance, while the Canadians were not penalized as much as they should have been for very glaring infractions of the rules.

For the free dance, the British have introduced something new-a very fast time and equally fast footwork. (The first movement of Markham & Jones' music was going at 200-plus beats per minute.) The other British couples and some of the other European teams used very fast South American rhythms. Markham & Jones being such accomplished skaters handled this tempo remarkably well and made it look good. The others left something to be desired, because it was over their heads in difficulty. There can be no doubt that the British have added something new and very difficult—like the very fast footwork of the outstanding free skaters.

The best comparison of the free dance of Anderson & Jacoby with Markham & Jones was not possible in this competition because the tone arm of the record player jumped for the USFSA couple, throwing them off so that they never were able to catch up with their music. O'Neill & Bejshak, and apparently about half the other couples, had the same sad and shaking experience. In spite of these difficulties the free dancing presented interesting and varied interpretations of ice dancing.

Following the final events, the Champions were awarded their new titles in the presence of ISU officials and the President and members of the Counsel of the Federation Francaise des Sports de

Glace. The awards were made by the Referee of each event-Major K. M. Beaumont, Men: Josef Dedic, Ladies: G. Torchon, Pairs; R. J. Wilkie, Dance-during the Final Banquet, held at the Palais d'Orsay on Sunday morning from 2 A.M. to 5:30. At other events, Mayor Marcel Levegue and members of the Bureau of the Municipal Counsel of Paris entertained all skaters and officials at a reception on Saturday noon at the City Hall. A cocktail party on Saturday afternoon was given at the home of Madame Jean Potin by the Counsel on Administration of the Palais des Sports. Earlier in the week, Canadian Ambassador Jean Desi entertained the Canadian Team, the ISU officials, and many of the U.S. skaters and officials at his apartment.

The North American skaters left Paris to tour various cities in exhibition appearances before returning from Europe. Carol Heiss, David Jenkins and Ina Bauer skated in a TV show in London on February 19. While Carol, Nancy Heiss and Donald Jackson were skating at Vienna and Garmisch, the U.S. Team began a tour which included Munich, Garmisch, Warsaw,

Budapest and Berlin.

"The Goose Begins to Squeal!"*

By HENRY T. REATH

GET A GROUP of enthusiastic skaters together and as long as skating is the main topic of conversation, there may be as many varying points of view discussed as there are persons present. But get together a group of skaters who, in their spare time (and, for that matter, during most of their business hours as well!) have any of the responsibilities of running a club and attending to its finances and there is one subject which, if discussed, is guaranteed to bring sudden and dramatic accord out of discord. I refer, of course, to the "tribute we must pay to Uncle Sam" for the privilege of skating—in the form of the Federal 20% tax on dues and skating privileges.

The inequity of this tax becomes all the more apparent when we realize that individuals, skating at a public session at a commercial rink for profit, pay no tax at all if the admission price per session is less than 90¢—which is usually the case.

The 20% Dues Tax on clubs is one of a number of so-called "luxury taxes" imposed by the Federal Government. These include such taxable items as perfumes, whiskey, cigarettes, jewelry, leather goods, furs, and cabarets (i.e., where food and liquor are furnished along with music and facilities for social dancing), and all other forms of frivolous living for the idle rich—skating included, of course!

Interestingly enough the tax was imposed at the 20% rate at the beginning of World War II as a temporary measure. One of the objectives at that time was to curb inflationary tendencies in a war-time economy, by discouraging purchase or use of the facilities being taxed. Since then, two wars have come and gone, but the 20% Dues Tax, like Methuselah, lives on and on.

*One of the most insidious forms of taxation which has become increasingly popular in the last 25 years is the excise tax — a hidden, indirect tax. It has been said that the purpose of an excise tax is to remove the maximum number of feathers from the goose with the least amount of squealing.

It is encouraging to report, however, that during the last year, considerable progress has been made to remedy this situation—insofar as skating clubs are concerned.

As this article goes to press, the writer is hopeful of receiving word very shortly that he and several other persons representing individual clubs, and also the USFSA, will be given an opportunity to testify at a Congressional public hearing in support of remedial legislation which will be proposed and could be adopted at this session to remove the present inequity.

In presenting the case on behalf of an exemption for skating clubs, the following points will be stressed:

points will be stressed.

(1) Skating clubs serve a primary function of providing a healthy form of recreation for children.

(2) The construction and maintenance of such facilities, particularly by private skating clubs, avoids the need for the use of additional tax money to provide these recreational facilities.

(3) It is in the national interest to promote, rather than discourage, a healthy recreational sport such as skating—for the physical fitness of American youth is a matter of vital concern to

our National Defense.

(4) It is unfair to penalize a non-profit club which is well organized and offers a carefully planned, diversified, and supervised program by taxing such clubs at the rate of 20% and, at the same time, imposing no tax on a commercial skating rink for profit that admits members of the public to its facilities and offers no program that is remotely comparable to that offered by the non-profit skating clubs.

At the public hearings, it will be argued that the well-planned youth programs of member clubs of the USFSA undoubtedly

have the wholehearted endorsement of President Eisenhower's Citizen Advisory Committee on the Physical Fitness of American Youth. In this connection, it will be asked whether or not it should be the policy of the Congress to discourage (as it now does by the 20% Dues Tax) or to encourage the activities of such clubs that do provide a healthful recreational and athletic activity during the winter months for children, especially, to participate in.

We will also point out that through the carefully organized and supervised athletic programs such as sponsored by member clubs, we are all contributing to the development, in the *children of today*, of those qualities that *our citizens of tomorrow* must have if our country is to remain strong and respected—qualities such as strong, healthy bodies; physical stamina; endurance; "stick-to-it-iveness"; self-confidence; a keen competitive sense; pride of accomplishment; teamwork; and a sense of fair play and sportsmanship.

We will also stress that community lead-

ers, educators, public recreational officials and leaders from many other fields have wholeheartedly endorsed the splendid youth programs sponsored by the many skating clubs throughout the country.

Finally, we will point out the tremendous financial squeeze which so many of our clubs are experiencing. With the costs of operating a rink still going up and, at the same time, signs developing of a declining national economy which will undoubtedly make less funds available from club members to spend on skating for themselves and their children, it would seem only fair that the tax relief, so desperately needed if these clubs are to continue to offer the splendid programs they have done in the past, should be granted as soon as possible.

Any member clubs of the USFSA who wish to go on record as favoring the legislation we seek should have their officers direct a letter, preferably on club stationery, to Henry T. Reath, Esq., 1617 Land Title Building, Philadelphia 10, Pennsylvania, in which they state their position.

Introducing the New Canadian Champions

Four of the contestants in the 1958 Championships of Canada were successful in retaining their titles: Charles Snelling, Men's Champion for the fifth successive time; Barbara Wagner & Robert Paul, Pair Champions for the third year; Geraldine Fenton & William McLachlan, Dance Champions for the second time, Tenstep Champions for the fourth year, Waltz Champions for the third time. As "repeat" champions they have been introduced previously to Skating's readers through feature stories, and other items of interest have been published about them in relatively recent issues.

Stunning, red-headed MARGARET CROS-LAND won not only the Ladies' Championship but a berth for herself on the 1958 World Team. The 18-year-old miss, who skates from the Winnipeg WC, downed the opposition of five other competitors in taking the title left undefended by the former champion (Carole Jane Pachl did not enter this year because of a leg injury). Margie lives in Calgary and attends Mount Royal College; she is in her senior matriculation and plans later to study pharmacy at the University of Manitoba. Her talents extend into the field of the arts -she used to play the piano and paint in oils, when time was not as pressing as now, and she is also a student of the ballet. A Canadian and U. S. Gold Medalist. Margie makes a striking picture on and off the ice-she is slender, 5'5" tall, a light 106 lbs., and wears her "carrot top" hair short and softly waved. She has large blue eyes and the very fair complexion that is typical of one with red hair. Margie's older sister Donna is taking her BSc. in Nursing at Queens, and her 14year-old brother John attends school in Winnipeg. Record: 1956 Canadian Junior Lady Champion; member of 1957 World Team. Professional instructor: Hans Gerschwiler.

A little of her brother's success rubbed off on Sonia Snelling, new Junior Lady

Champion, when she captured the title in a field of 13 aspiring young competitors. A Granite Club skater, Sonia is in grade 11 at Lawrence Park Collegiate in Toronto; extra-curricular activities include playing the French horn in the high school orchestra, and swimming when the occasion permits. After school, she has hopes of attending a University. Sonia holds her CFSA Gold Medal and has passed the Silver Dance Test. She is of slight build, 5'1", with sandy-brown hair worn short and softly curled around her face in a modified Italian cut. She has a fair complexion and blue eyes. Sonia reached her 16th birthday on February 22 of this year. Her older brother, Charles, needs no introduction as the 20year-old Men's Champion of Canada who won that title this year for the fifth time; sister Linda, 12, is the third skating member of the family and is currently working on her Sixth Test. Record: Granite Club Champion, 1957-58; 1957 Central Ontario Lady Champion. Professional instructor: Marcus Nikkanen.

Toronto's Granite Club produced another winner when 20-year-old CARL HARRISON moved into the Junior Men's title spot. Carl is not at school at present —he was graduated in 1956 with senior matriculation from New Toronto secondary school-but divides his time between training and working part time. He stands a handsome 6', has hazel eyes, and light brown hair worn in a brush cut. His other sports interests are track and field (specializing in the pole vault and 100yard dash), tennis, and baseball before skating occupied his time. Carl used to pitch and play shortstop on a rural ball team outside of Woodstock, Ont.; and last summer he won a tennis tournament in his home city of Toronto. Carl is a Seventh Test skater and has completed the Gold Dance Test. He is not definite about competing in the future but does plan to continue skating. He has one

brother, Lawrence, who is 23 and married. Record: 1957 Canadian Junior Pair Champion (with June McLeod); 1958 Central Ontario Men's Champion; Club Champion, 1957, in Men's, Pair, and Dance events. Professional instructors: Marcus Nikkanen, Margaret Roberts Hyland.

The team of Judith Rudd & Alastair Munro brought first-place medal honors to the Minto SC when they annexed the Junior Pair Championship. Residents of Ottawa, both are 17 years old and in grade 13-Judith at Fisher Park High School, and Al at Glebe Collegiate. Judith's interests run especially to sports, and she participates in track and field events at school. Last spring she took two firsts in an intra-city track meet among Ottawa schools, winning the 75-yard dash and breaking the record in the standing broad jump. She also plays the piano. Al's tastes run to music, as he is a "hi-fi" enthusiast, sings bass in the Glebe Lyre's Club, and plays first French horn in the school band. Judith is tall, 5'8", slender, with brown eyes, and brown hair worn medium long with shaggy bangs. Al reaches a lofty 6'21/2", has brown eyes, and black-brown hair; he generally wears glasses when off the ice. Al hopes to enter Carleton University in Ottawa next fall and is uncertain about his future skating plans. He has passed the Second Figure and Senior Bronze Dance Tests. Judith has hopes of entering Western University in London, Ont., and would like to continue in competition. She is a Gold Medalist and has passed the Senior Silver Dance Test. Judith has no brothers or sisters, but her parents are active in club affairs—her mother serves as Vice-President of the Ladies' Committee while her father is currently Club Vice-President. Al has one brother, John, who is three years younger, to the day, than Al. He is a second cousin of Toronto's William McLachlan, the Canadian and North American Dance Champion. Professional instructor: Ray Lockwood.

Honors in the Junior Dance Championship went to the brother-sister combination of SVATA & MIREK STAROBA. They

are transplanted Czechoslovakians, live in Toronto and skate for the University SC. They have one older sister, Stela. Svata (19) is in her second year at the University of Toronto where she is majoring in French; Mirek (15) is in the second form at Upper Canada College and hopes later to attend University and study engineering. Svata, a 5'6" attractive brunette with a lovely, slender figure, wears glasses on the street; her hair is long but is sometimes rolled in a bun. Mirek stands 5'10", is of medium build, and has light brown hair and blue eyes. He is a stamp collector, likes all sports in general, and coaches his high school football team. Svata is particularly fond of swimming and has done ornamental, synchronized type of swimming; she also participates in gymnastics. This team—both are Senior Silver Dance Medalists-would like to continue competing in the Senior divisions. Record: 1957 and 1958 Central Ontario Senior Dance Champions; runners-up, 1957 Canadian Junior Dance. Professional instructor: Jean Westwood.



Advice from a Dance Champion

WHEN ASKED FOR TIPS on dancing, Sharon McKenzie, 1957 U. S. Gold Dance Champion, made these observations:

"Friends are always speaking of my posture and carriage while I skate. My first professional, Gene Turner, told me what to do. He said, 'Always keep your ear over your shoulder, your shoulder over your hip, and your hip over the skating foot. If you do that, you just have to hold yourself erect.'

"Pro Bill Kipp gave me the thing most needed for good competition skating, and that is self-assurance.

"The only advice I can give to dancers is to work hard on a good basic stroke; if you can master that, the rest will come with ease."

Junior Coaches

My NAME is Gerry Williams. I am 13 years old and working on my Fifth Test. I belong to the Town of Mount Royal Figure Skating Club. Once a week I help to teach the novice group of our club their Preliminary Test, under the supervision of our pro.

This session is an hour and a half. The first three-quarters of an hour is spent on

To fit Skating's layout requirements for the Children's Corner, photographs should be glossies about 8 by 10 inches in size. Snapshots and small prints cannot be used. The youngster's figure should be large and clear. Light backgrounds reproduce best. Material should be submitted through the club's Publications Advisory Committee Member.

Why Do Skaters Dress So Badly?

This article is not likely to make the writer popular with the ladies. But it comes from one who is devoted to the sport and art of skating and who is anxious to be proud of our skaters at all times and under all conditions.

Figure skating is a sport which differs from almost any other sport in that it combines both athletic and artistic elements. Figure skating, moreover, is—at least we like to think so—a sport for ladies and gentlemen. Is there any reason why they should not dress with the discrimination of good taste which would

naturally be expected of them?

Grace, rhythm, and general beauty of execution are, of course, prime factors in the excellence of a skater's performance, and the costume a skater wears can either enhance or destroy the charm and beauty of the ultimate effect. One would naturally look to the ladies to take the lead in choosing that which is becoming and appropriate. Yet the costumes of many of our feminine skaters are, we submit, little

less than appalling!

One of the cardinal points of good dressing is that it should be becoming to the individual. Except in rare instances, however, the dresses now worn by our women skaters, whether in competition or in formal club sessions, have no relation whatsoever to the individual figure of the wearer. The most common fault is, of course, in the length of the skirtif you can call some of them skirts at all! How the vogue for the excessively short skirt ever got started is a mystery. Did it originate with some misguided or crafty tailor who with his tongue in his cheek and a leer on his lips undertook to perpetrate a huge hoax? Did newcomers to our sport, many of them young and unsophisticated (and others not so young nor unsophisticated), fall for it and follow like sheep in the mistaken idea that this must be the thing to do?

It is amazing that women usually of

great good taste and discrimination in clothes seem to become confused when they choose their skating costumes and fail to exercise that independence of judgment and discrimination which they normally use with such good effect. Instead, we find them arraying themselves in the most fantastic manner, evidently thinking that this is expected of them if they are to be regarded truly as skaters.

Whether one believes in short skirts or longer skirts, surely the conformation of the wearer is something to be considered. Obviously, a woman with slender legs and hips can wear gracefully a shorter skirt than one with thighs and hips which are not so slender. Yet in countless instances no attention is paid to this fact. Women over-generously endowed in certain areas will wear a little fringe of a skirt which merely serves to accentuate features which are better left unemphasized, whereas four inches or more of skirt length would add grace and beauty to the general appearance. Clearly, the place to cut off a skirt is where it does the most for the figure.

Even a girl with a thin, boyish figure will in most instances look better with more length to her skirt. The additional grace which a little more length gives to a skirt, whether it be in whirling or jumping or just plain skating, seems to be completely ignored by many of our

women figure skaters.

Then there is the diaper motif! This is really something unique in the history of women's apparel. They come in many colors—blue, green, yellow, orange and, of course, flaming red. The most realistic effect is attained by white ones. Usually the skirt is an inch or two shorter than what is underneath, so that the diaper peeps coyly from below, even though the wearer be standing still! The diaper motif is particularly effective when adopted by ladies of ample proportions. Here again the color white is a favorite and the result

is extremely striking. Can some eager skating fan who is also a camera enthusiast help us drive home the point?

Please don't get the idea that this appeal for longer skirts is inspired by any sense of prudery on the part of the writer! Indeed, he would be perfectly happy to see the ladies skate à la Bikini. There is nothing more beautiful—if it happens to be beautiful—than the human form. And the forms of all skaters, of course, are beautiful. The point is simply that if we must undertake to adorn the human form by draping it, let us be sure that we improve upon it and not transform it into something grotesque. Nor do we entertain anything but admiration for amplitude in the female figure. Curves are vitally important assets to any woman's charm. One has only to look at the paintings of the great masters, particularly the undraped ones, to see how curves are regarded as a universal attribute of beauty. None of us males is indifferent to the spheres of influence of a Monroe nor do we recoil from the generous contours of a Lollobrigida or a Bardot. But even a Hollywood costumer would shrink from dressing any one of these charmers in such a costume as one can see in any skating event. To find a parallel one would have to seek out a Minsky burlesque.

Then there are the ladies of mature age—some of them grandmothers—who have beautiful legs and know it. Skating gives them an exceptional opportunity to display these charms. The shorter the skirt the greater the opportunity. So they permit their fawning dressmakers, always alert to curry favor, to encourage this weakness and cut off their skirts until they are nothing more than a mere frill—always accompanied by the diaper motif. Why don't these mothers and grand-


mothers realize how much more effective their charms would be if displayed under a skirt of graceful length? Instead, their efforts to look "cute" have only made them look silly.

No woman over forty can really look attractive in a get-up which makes her resemble an animated mushroom! Surely many of these ladies, when they first looked at themselves in the mirror wearing the outfit which their dressmakers had made for them, wondered if after all they did not look a little bit ridiculous. What a pity this sound reaction failed to prevail!

When it comes to men's costumes for skating, the problem is more difficult. We are at a loss to know what the well-dressed man really should wear when skating. We are inclined to think, however, that we could find a more desirable substitute for the monkey suit, which seems to be the prevailing mode for competitive skaters. A very wise and sophisticated dowager once remarked to us as she observed an admiral of the British Navy faultlessly attired in full dress tailless tropical evening uniform, "I have always believed that the tail of a man's coat performed a very useful function."

We do not seem to remember that the former leaders of our sport, such as Irving Brokaw and Nat Niles, were ever seen to skate in monkey jackets. We have no suggestion to make, but earnestly hope that someone competent to judge matters of this sort will put his or her mind to it and come up with something really smart and appropriate.

The European Championships

FOR THE SECOND TIME since the War, the European Championships have been held behind the "Iron Curtain." The 1958 events took place at Bratislava in Czechoslovakia from January 30 to February 2, and the free and pair skating were televised on "Eurovision."

The men skated Group III of the ISU European figures, and Alain Giletti, the title-holder, led at first. Soon, however, the impressive Karol Divin went ahead, and the event became a duel between these two. It ended with Divin comfortably in the lead. Michael Booker was third.

The pair skating on the first evening was notable for the great progress made by the Russians. Stanislav Zhuk and his wife, formerly Nina Bakuscheva, who were sixth last year, were runners-up, while their compatriots Ludmila Belousov & Olek Protopopov delighted the 11,000 spectators with a program of refreshing novelty. Last year's Champions, Vera Suchankova & Zdenek Dolezal, retained their title, and Britain's Joyce Coates & Tony Holles did splendidly to come third.

The ladies' figures took two days. The Austrian girls, Ingrid Wendl (Champion in 1956 and Olympic Bronze Medallist) and Hanna Walter, led all the way, closely followed by the Dutch skaters. Dianne Peach was fifth at the end of the first day, but moved up to fourth on the second. The other British entrant, Pat Pauley, was unable to skate because of illness, as was German Champion Ina Bauer.

The men's free skating was a triumph for the young Frenchman, Alain Calmat, who beat all the other 18 competitors and moved up from fifth to third. The judges found it hard to choose between Divin and Giletti, but the Czech's figure lead earned him the title.

The ladies' free skating on the last day made little difference to the final places; Dianne Peach and Jindra Kramperova

both did well, but could not prevent the top places going to Austria.

In the dancing, Great Britain, as always, came first, second, and third, but Continental skaters, particularly the French, are catching up.

Learning to Skate Simple Edges

The principle on which figure skating is based is the circle (a true edge will complete a circle). There are four edges—outside forward, inside forward, outside back and inside back, usually learned in this order. These edges affect the character of all movements in figure skating. The first thing in learning to skate is to relax, keep carriage erect and head up.

Push-offs are very important. A skater should bring the free foot beside the skating foot before pushing off. If the new stroke is started ahead of the skating foot, it causes lunging and breaking at the waist which, besides being unsightly, causes loss of balance and power. A thing to remember is that there is a push-off for every skating stroke. The power for this comes at the end of the previous skating stroke. When skating on outside edges, the skating foot drops to the inside edge before the new push-off. On inside edges, push-offs are from forced inside edges. The changing from one skating foot to the other is known as the "transition."

At the time the skating foot is ready for the push-off, the skating leg sinks slightly on a flexible knee and straightens as it leaves the ice giving impetus to the new stroke. As the new skating foot touches the ice, the new skating leg is slightly bent and gradually rises to acquire glide. Power in the push-off and control of a flexible skating knee determine the extent of glide. Then, of course, the skating knee bends slightly again in preparation for the new push-off.

Shoulder rotation is an important factor in controlling edges. Common practice is that, on outside edges, the same shoulder as skating leg leads, the other shoulder is well back. As the edge progresses, the shoulder for the new skating leg gradually rotates so that it is in position to lead at the time of the new push-off. On inside edges, opposite shoulders usually lead. Regardless of technique, shoulder rotation must be consistent.

In skating edges, leaning into the imaginary circle will assist the skater. However, this lean should come directly from the skating blade—not from the waist or hip.

It is suggested that skaters practice edges (half-circles) on each side of a straight line (used as an axis). Perfect control will result from coordination of the above, and the skater is well on his way toward accomplishing the figure eight.

The Meldrum twins won the Ladies' Pair event for the third consecutive year, wearing costumes of silver trimmed with vivid blue, reflecting the bounce and verve of

the pair.

Feature attraction of the Championships was a two-hour live telecast from the Capilano Winter Club giving exhibitions of free skating, figures and judging. 


