Skating Behind the Iron Curtain

AFTER CANADIANS Barbara Wagner and Bob Paul won the World Pair Championship, and Jackson, Collins and Snelling free skated so brilliantly in Paris, representatives from Germany, Hungary, Czechoslavakia and Poland descended on me with requests that the Canadian skaters join a tour with part of the United States World Team. After two hectic days, skaters Wagner and Paul, Fenton and McLachlan, Charles Snelling, Eddie Collins and Jan Carnegie, and their various chaperons, flew from Paris with me as Canadian Tour Manager. We formed a party of twenty-six with the Americans, whose skaters were David Jenkins, Tim Tom Moore, Bob Brown. Claralynn Lewis, and the Ludingtons. After exhibitions in four German cities, we left Nurnberg for "Behind the Iron Curtain."

We were all pretty excited and I think some of us had a few qualms when we were told that only two Canadians and no Americans had been in Hungary since the revolution.

This was February 23rd and the plane was to fly from Nurnberg to Vienna to Budapest and arrive early in the afternoon. However, owing to poor flying weather it didn't work out quite that way. After a most tiring day on buses and in planes we arrived at the airport in Vienna about 10 P.M. We were met by Ester Jurek, who had come ahead to interpret for us and to smooth our way. We were dismayed to find that we had missed both the last train and the last plane for Budapest. After some discussion of plans, it was decided to take the bus provided for us and drive directly to Budapest. First we had to go to the Hungarian Embassy, which was being kept open for us. Kenneth Brown, manager of the American Team, Mr. Radix of the American Team. Ester and I went in with the passports.

The rest of the party waited for us in the bus—which by the way was unheated

and had no springs. About midnight, with visas completed, we drove through Vienna headed for the border. didn't seem to be too much formality about us leaving the country. It was a bit eerie in the middle of the winter, in the middle of the night, when we started across "No Man's Land" and I am sure a few of us were wondering just what we were letting ourselves in for. We drove some miles, I should probably say kilometers, and came to the Hungarian border which was being patrolled by soldiers with tommy guns and bayonets. Mr. Brown and I got out, complete with all the passports and flanked by Esterwe were sure we would be on our way in a few minutes.

Ivan wasn't quite so casual about it all. The barrier was raised for us and we were given to understand, through Ester and with the help of gestures, that we must bring all 47 pieces of heavy luggage and 147 pieces of small luggage and all passengers into the cold barracks of the border building. When the bus was completely emptied the soldiers went over it meticulously with flashlights, even picking up stray gum wrappers and candy papers. They looked over the top and under the bottom and under the hood before they were finally satisfied all was in order. The border formalities took two hours. The tension finally eased considerably, the officer in charge eventually going so far as to drink vodka with some of us and to have coffee served. About 5 A.M. we loaded the luggage back in the bus, without any help from our hosts, and were on our way. We had added three rather formidable looking men in leather coats to our party. They sat silently in the front of the bus and didn't add particularly to our gaiety.

The drive through the Hungarian countryside at dawn was most depressing. Several times we passed barracks where the soldiers were coming out, always with guns and bayonets. Finally, about eight-

thirty, we pulled up to our hotel, a pretty subdued crowd.

Everything in Hungary seemed to be shabby; the only people who looked at all prosperous were the Russians. times there were several of them sitting on the mezzanine just above the hotel lobby obviously listening. Our bedrooms were equipped with microphones. Whereever we went in our bus we were accompanied by several Russians.

If we were interested in what we saw, the people were plainly as interested in seeing us. They stood in crowds outside the hotel, and followed us when we walked down the street. We weren't sure whether we felt more like goldfish or visit-

ing royalty.

We were taken in our bus on a sightseeing trip. We were proudly shown the beautiful new Sports Palace which seats 100,000 people and is ultra, ultramodern. The building is decorated with the Olympic insignia, although they have not had Olympic Games there. The bomb damage from the war was pointed out, but the very obvious machine gun damage from the revolution, which is all over the downtown area, was pointedly ignored. I am sure Budapest was once a very beautiful city.

Our skaters put on two exhibitions for wildly enthusiastic audiences of 10,000 each night. The high spot on the program was Barb and Bob's "Rock and Roll" number, which really rocked them! After each performance we were banquetted and presented with gifts typical of the country. The Hungarians seemed very pleased to have us there and most anxious that we enjoy ourselves. Dr. Tertak, who had been our contact in Paris, was most hospitable, as was his charming wife, and all the others. It was very, very hard to say good-bye.

February 26th we flew from Budapest to Bratislava, Czechoslovakia. They loved us in Bratislava! We were met at the plane by the friendliest of crowds, with flowers for everyone. The skaters were besieged for autographs, and we were whisked on our way with a minimum of red tape. We were entertained by the Burgermeister and loaded with souvenirs. After an interesting sight-seeing trip and

dinner we were taken to the arena where the 1958 European Championships had been held. For the first time the skating was under a roof. The ice was good and the skaters were all in top form because of the enthusiasm of the crowd, who were certainly skating-minded. Maybe the Russians were breathing down our necks, certainly there were the ever-present microphones in the bedrooms. The tension was still there, but somehow it was easier to ignore it. Crowds of our good friends were at the airport to see us off the next morning on our way to

Prague—in a Russian jet!

February 27th—Prague—we were in the same country, but somewhere along the way we had lost the feeling. Maybe we were up too late the night before. We were treated courteously and formally. We stayed at the huge International Hotel, new and very modern, on the outskirts of the City, and felt that we were being segregated. We were shown the City and politely invited to a banquet after the exhibitions. We wore our best clothes and best manners. At the banquet we could understand only our official interpreter and a handful of guests who had been invited from the Canadian and United States Embassies.

February 28th. The exhibitions were in Ostrava. We were well received but were beginning to feel that we were a

long way from home.

March 1st. We took a bus from Ostrava to Katowiez, Poland. We were met at the border by M. Sobolewsky, the friendliest of Poles, who spoke delightful American English. Bob Brewer of the American team had his birthday in Katowiez. We had a cake and sang the Polish birthday song, "A Hundred Years to You."

March 2nd and 3rd were in Warsaw. Everything possible was done for our pleasure and comfort. Fresh fruit and frozen eggs were flown in for us and steaks had been ordered many weeks in advance. We stayed at the M.D.M. Hotel and were given every opportunity to see the City. There is no space here to tell of the destruction and rebuilding, or of the life of the Polish people; however, there was no barrier to free talk. The Canadians were entertained at the Cana-

dian Legation and the Americans at the United States Legation. This was most enjoyable, and we celebrated another

birthday, this time Eddie Collins'.

The exhibitions were held at 6 P.M. The first night the snow was so heavy that the ice had to be scraped between every two or three numbers. The crowds were terrific and the newspaper reports most flattering. One night we were told that 1600 workers had come from a town

260 kilometers away. One complete program was televised. The people of Warsaw were most hospitable and generous and we had a wonderful time.

March 4th we flew from Warsaw to the Military Airport in East Berlin. We were escorted by bus through East Berlin to the Brandenburg Gates-where we were met by the West Berlin bus, and taken through the Gates to the right side of that invisible curtain.



United States Skaters in Japan

THE HUGE LOBBY of the Tokyo International Airport terminal was buzzing with excitement. One of the large time zone clocks on the wall indicated 10:00 A.M. Japan time. It was still two hours and 15 minutes before the Japanese Airlines flight carrying Carol Heiss, Tim Brown, Nancy & Ronald Ludington and Mr. & Mrs. Henry Beatty was due to land in Japan.

Already on hand were many Japanese skating officials, representatives of the press and newsreels, dozens of Japanese figure skaters and scores of well-wishers. Pretty Japanese girl skaters, dressed in brightly colored spring kimonos, carried huge bouquets of flowers to be presented to the Americans upon their arrival.

A skating official remarked that they were again most fortunate to have such noted skaters visit Japan. Four years ago Tenley Albright and Hayes Alan Jenkins thrilled thousands of Japanese with their sterling skating performances.

By the time the huge plane, named "The Wings of the New Japan," touched down at Tokyo, hundreds of Japanese had lined the railing of the long observation platform. A cheer went up from the crowd as the American skaters stepped from the plane. After being rushed through customs, the U.S. visitors were introduced to the Japanese skating officials and skaters in the lobby of the terminal. Following a press conference the party was whisked away to the hotel.

Between practice sessions at the Korakuen Ice Palace, the skaters were able to shop along the famous Ginza Street of

On April 1, U. S. skaters Carol Heiss, Tim Brown, and Nancy & Ronald Ludington-accompanied by Mr. & Mrs. Henry M. Beatty-left San Francisco for Tokyo, as guests of the Japanese Association. Tokyo, view the cherry blossoms which were in full bloom, and even tried their luck with chopsticks over delicious Japanese dishes.

Then the moment arrived for the skaters to give their first skating performance before the Japanese public. The skaters were introduced to a hushed crowd of 5000 by Mr. Beatty. Carol and Tim then pleased the crowd with a dual synchronized demonstration of compulsory figures performed with precision timing.

Following this, the Japanese skaters gave an excellent free skating performance for the American skaters and the audience. The U. S. skaters were impressed with the new Japanese skaters they were seeing for the first time and the marked improvement shown by those who had competed in the 1957 Worlds at Colorado Springs.

Now came the time for the free skating performances by the U. S. skaters. This was the moment the crowd had been waiting for. Tim was first to take to the ice

followed by Nancy and Ronald and then Carol. The assembly of spectators burst into spontaneous applause each time the skaters executed a jump, spin or axel. Many Japanese skaters lined the railing around the ice. Their eyes never left the skaters as they flashed over the sparkling ice. This was skating at its best. These Japanese skaters had often watched movies of these same skaters shown over and over again in a packed club room. Few of them ever believed that they would some day have the opportunity to see them in person. Fewer vet ever believed that they would sometime have the thrill of skating in the same program with them.

All too soon the evening of skating was over, but not to be forgotten. The memory of this evening would live forever in the minds of the Japanese skaters, and Japan itself would long remember the visit of the United States skaters to Japan in 1958.

Our charming young skating ambassadors had scored again.

Impressions of Japanese Skating

There is tremendous interest in figure skating in Japan. Many young skaters are coming along and it seems most natural, while unfortunate, to describe their skating by describing both the strong points and shortcomings with possibly

more emphasis on the latter.

Largely because of their shortness and compact build, the Japanese are amazing jumpers. Mr. Sato, the present champion, who is about 16 years old, does a triple salchow. However, virtually all the skaters either fall a great deal or fail to complete a jump properly and in control, because they are attempting too much. A jump may be included in a program even though the skater executes it successfully only 50% of the time. They have not developed the really fast spins, of which many American skaters are capable. Some of the skaters are so intent on jumping that well placed spins and lovely connecting steps are almost absent from their programs.

Because the Japanese are a completely undemonstrative race, they make no effort to "sell" their programs. The skating is done in a placid, workmanlike manner with practically no change in facial expression, be a highlight successfully done or completely missed. Peculiarly enough, the Japanese audiences readily respond to the gaiety of Carol Heiss's skating and the

quiet smile of Tim Brown.

Although the same record player and sound system was used for their records and ours, we found a great difference in the music. Apparently, their records are not well cut as even familiar orchestrations sounded shrill and tinny. The quality of their music is most detrimental to getting the most out of a program.

We felt that their skaters have moved ahead too rapidly. One little girl about nine years old was skating a four-minute program and competed in their Ladies

Senior class.

The interest in figure skating seems to know no bounds. Even when our practice session started at 7:00 A.M., we often

found a large crowd waiting at the rink to watch. And, at every city, many conferences were held at which we were asked to criticize the Japanese skating from a constructive approach. Many of the skaters, parents and professionals listened carefully, taking notes of everything we said.

By asking questions of the skaters, we found that they tend to spend much more time free skating than practicing compulsory figures. As we saw none of their skaters do figures, we cannot comment on their skating in this field.



Olympic Symbol

THE OFFICIAL SYMBOL for the VIII Olympic Winter Games at Squaw Valley, 1960, has been selected from among more than 600 preliminary designs and will be imprinted on posters, windshield and baggage stickers for world-wide distribution. The symbol, available in a combination of colors or in black and white, consists of three overlapping triangles forming a background for the traditional five-ring emblem of the Olympic Games. Encircling the triangles are the words, "VIII Olympic Winter Games, 1960, California." The emblem was designed by the art department of the Knollin Advertising Agency, San Francisco.

Meet the 1958 United States Champions

The incumbent champions in three classes—Carol Heiss, David Jenkins, and Nancy & Ronald Ludington—were successful in the defense of their National titles. Because they have been featured in relatively recent issues of Skating, all that is included here are further news items.

Carol Heiss was successful in winning the Ladies' title for the second consecutive year, following her domination of the World Championship in Paris when she chalked up her third World victory. Earlier in the winter Carol was interviewed nationally on live television by Ed Murrow; and Look Magazine in April featured her in an article illustrated with colored photos. Carol, a freshman at New York University, will spend this summer as usual at Michigan State University summer season, and will be studying to make up a semester that she missed at college because of competition.

In his last year of undergraduate study, Colorado College student David Jenkins whirled through the competition season to defend his World and U. S. Men's titles. On his return to college in early March David learned that he had won the added distinction of making Phi Beta Kappa. A premedical student, David has been accepted by three medical schools-Harvard, Western Reserve in Cleveland, and Colorado University. At this writing David is still not completely definite on which scholarship to accept, but had strong inclinations toward Harvard. This summer he hopes to find work of some kind and skate, too, either at Broadmoor Ice Palace or at Sun Valley.

Pair Champions Nancy Rouillard Ludington & Ronald Ludington, who were married in November 1956, have a little girl, Karen Irene, born last September. They live with Ronnie's parents, which enables them to have permanent babysitters and leaves them free to continue with competitive skating. Ronnie is employed as a design draftsman by an electronics firm in Cambridge, Mass. This

summer they plan to work on a completely new pair program at the North Shore Sports Center in Lynn. Ronald makes up half the dance team, with Judy Ann Lamar, which won the U. S. Silver Dance Championship, to make him a two-time winner in this year's Nationals.

** Wedding bells are to ring out for the Gold Dance Champions, ANDREE ANDERson & Donald Jacoby, on May 31 when they are married in the chapel on the campus of Syracuse University. That is the day Andree will be graduated, after majoring in fashion merchandising. Andree, an attractive blonde standing 5' 5", has blue eyes and light hair worn page boy style. She celebrated her 22nd birthday the day they won the Gold Dance title. She is a resident of Chicago, but, with Donald, represents the Buffalo SC while attending the University. Donwhose friends call him "Jake"-is a good looking young man of 27 years, 5' 10" tall, and has blue eves and dark brown hair worn in a brush cut. His home is in Syracuse, and he manages the Syracuse area of the Rochester Envelope Company. A graduate of the University of Pennsylvania in 1953, he majored in the school of Finance and Commerce, was president of his senior class, held the position of head cheerleader, and took part in the famous Mask and Wig shows. "Andy's" sorority is Gamma Phi Beta, while Don belongs to Phi Delta Theta fraternity. In line with her major, Andy makes her own skating costumes and most of her street clothes. Don is a golf enthusiast, and plays a game in the low 80's. He has two older brothers, Bob and Bill, both married: Andree is an only child. Lucky Thirteen! Her thirteenth gold medal in singles competition was annexed by BARBARA ANN ROLES, new Junior Lady Champion, five years after winning her first one-for the Southern California Inter-Club Novice title. Barbara, who reached 17 years of age Easter Sunday, is of medium height, 5' 4", wears her blonde hair in page boy style with bangs, has brown eyes, and wears glasses usually, but not while free skating. "Rolesy," as her friends call her, is a senior at Arcadia High School and is planning to enter Pasadena Junior College next year. She skates for the Arctic Blades FSC, and has passed the Seventh Figure and Silver Dance Tests—with two dances already credited toward the Pre Gold. Not just a singles skater, Barbara has been competing for several years in dance events—always with James Short, this year's Junior Men's Champion. Barbara likes music and collects classical records as a hobby; she also engages in swimming for pleasure, when not working out on frozen water. She has one brother, Carl, 14 years old; her mother, Bunny Roles, is active in skating club affairs and is a USFSA Intermediate Figure Judge. This summer Barbara plans to work on her Gold Test in nearby Pasadena, and hopes to continue in competition "as far as I can go." Record: U. S. Novice Lady Champion 1956; Pacific Coast Senior Lady Champion 1957-1958, Junior Lady 1956, Novice Lady 1955, Juvenile Girl 1954, Silver Dance Champion 1958; California State Senior Lady Champion 1958, Junior Lady 1956, Novice Lady 1955, Juvenile Girl 1954, Silver Dance Champion 1958, Bronze Dance 1955. Instructor: Nancy Rush.

Not to be outdone by his dance partner's feat of winning a Singles Championship,

JAMES SHORT came through in fine style to win the title in the Junior Men's division. Jim, who lives in Alhambra, Calif., and skates for the Los Angeles FSC, is a 20-year-old student in his second year at the University of California, where he is studying architecture. Although missed this last semester at college, Jim intends to go back in the fall and has his sights set on majoring in interior or landscape design. He makes a hobby of collecting long-playing classical records, but admits he does this mainly for skating purposes. A fine looking young man, Jim stands 5' 7", weighs a trim 140 lbs., and has the gray-blue eyes often seen with light auburn hair-which he wears in a close cut. He has passed the Sixth Figure and Pre Gold Dance Tests, and plans to skate in Pasadena this summer, working on his Gold Figure Test and practicing the dances with his partner, Barbara Roles. In the Silver Dance division this year, they placed in runner-up position. Record: U. S. Novice Champion 1955; Pacific Coast Senior Men's Champion, 1957-1958, Champion 1955, Silver Dance Champion 1958; California State Senior Men's Champion 1956, Junior Champion 1954, Silver Dance Champion 1958, Bronze Dance 1955. Instructor: Nancy Rush.


The new Junior Pair Champions, GAYLE & KARL FREED, have been skating together for five years. In October 1956 they made their pair a permanent partnership; now Gayle is at home, and spends time making some of her skating clothes. Karl has been in the sales field since he was 19 and is supervisor for a storm window company in Cincinnati, their home city. Karl is a decided blond, with bright blue eyes, and has a sturdy build; he is $5' 7\frac{1}{2}''$ tall, and weighs close to 150. Tinier Gayle has green eyes and black hair worn short with soft curls around her face. She is a light 105 lbs. and just Gayle and Karl skate for the Queen City FSC in Cincinnati, and both have passed the Pre Silver Dance Test; Gayle has her Third Test medal, while Karl has his Second. They each have one older brother-Gayle's is now serving in the Marine Corps. Record: Midwestern Senior Pair Champions 1958, Junior Pair 1956, Bronze Dance 1956; Niagara Invitational Senior Pair Champions 1957. Instructor: Daniel Ryan.

* When not on the ice, RHODE LEE MICH-ELSON, Novice Lady Champion, studies modern ballet; she is a sophomore in Progress High School, Long Beach, Calif., and takes a college course. Rhode Lee skates for the Arctic Blades FSC, and has passed the Fifth Figure Test. A brunette, she is 15 years old, about 5' 3", wears her brown hair short with bangs, has hazel eyes, and very pink cheeks. Speed skating is an interest of others in her family; last year her younger brother Mike competed in the North American and National meets in the midget class, where he placed second. Rhode Lee's father, Arthur Michelson, is president of the Demoiria Racing Club and vicepresident of the national speed skating association. Rhode Lee plans to continue with figure skating and has her sights set on making an Olympic Team. Record: Pacific Coast Junior Lady runnerup 1958; California State Junior Lady runner-up 1958; Southern California Junior Lady runner-up 1955-1956. Instructor: William Kipp.

The new Novice Men's Champion, HARVEY BALCH, would like to work on the engineering side of rockets when he goes to college. His rocket-like free skating could be compared with his tastes in the area of guided missiles. Harvey, 15, is a freshman in Arcadia High School and he likes all sports; he belongs to the Blade & Edge Club in Pasadena and has his Fifth Test medal. Harvey used to play the saxophone and clarinet until skating occupied most of his time. About 5' 5", he is dark, with black-brown hair and a generous mouth with teeth set wide apart. (At this stage, Harvey is wearing braces.) His 18-year-old sister, Bonnie, skates, but just for pleasure. Record: Pacific Coast Junior Champion 1958, Novice Champion 1956, Juvenile Champion 1954; California State Junior Champion 1958, Novice Champion 1956, Juvenile Champion 1954; Lake Placid Men's Silver Free Skating Champion 1957. Instructor: Larry Ward.

One of Judy Ann Lamar's biggest thrills, since winning the Silver Dance Championship with RONALD LUDINGTON, was being the recipient of an honorary letter for figure skating, awarded by her school, Belmont High; it was the first time a letter was awarded for a non-school activity. A person of varied abilities, Judy is an artist, an actress, a pianist since she was six, and a straight "A" student. She designs her own skating costumes, and with her cravon has created a character named "Dorabrat"—the skating version of the copyrighted "Eloise." She has won art awards, and her design was selected in a contest for the best AMVET float. Judy belongs to the Belmont Dramatic Club and played the part of Eliza in "Pygmalion." A junior in high school, Judy reached 17 years old the middle of April; she is quite tall, 5' 9", has short, titian-colored hair with curly bangs, and blue-green eyes. She skates for The SC of Boston and has passed the Seventh Figure and Pre Gold Dance Tests. Judy's ambitions are to attend Radcliffe College and make Phi Beta Kappa, and, main desire of all, to go to medical school and work on cancer research. Thanks and Congratulations

IN THE DECEMBER 1957 issue of Skat-ING the readers were informed that this was the 200th number of the periodical, the first having appeared in December 1923. If one reckons it out one sees that Skating must be in the 35th year of its existence, and indeed the inscription "Vol. 35" has appeared on the cover of every

number during the past winter.

I really do not know which of these two figures is the more impressive but, in spite of the fact that 35 is a number not usually associated with the word "Jubilee" I am personally more inclined to give preference to it. For with patience, perseverance and luck even the 200th issue of a periodical can finally be published provided nothing special occurs to disturb one at the work. But to publish a figure skating magazine regularly and without interruption under the circumstances that have prevailed during the past 35 years, and steadily to improve it in quality—that seems to me an achievement deserving of the highest recognition.

But whatever the relative value the readers of Skating may prefer to attach to the two figures, this double jubilee provides me at any rate with an opportunity to give expression to something that many readers have felt for a long time, namely heartfelt thanks. I am thankful that a figure skating periodical of the character and standing of Skating should exist at all, and thanks are due to all those responsible for its production, namely the USFSA and the genius of Mrs. Theresa Weld Blanchard together with her staff of able and faithful co-workers.

If one attempts to characterize Skating in a single expression, the slogan "Facts not Gossip" occurs to one impellingly; for the principal contents of each issue consist of reliable information and helpful suggestions. The social and personal items appear under definite, easily recog-

nizable, separate headings which attain their object completely without disturbing the balance of the whole. Just because Skating, both as regards contents and make-up, avoids all sensationalism, it is so interesting to the reader. Contributions of an ironical and even sarcastic nature see to it that the church always stands in the middle of the village and that every child is called by his own name.

Accordingly I send Skating my best wishes for the future. May it long continue, as hitherto, to serve the best interests of the sport of figure skating, to dispense reliable information and useful ideas, and to be a faithful friend and ad-

viser to all figure skaters.

pionships.

World Pair Champions BARBARA WAGNER & ROBERT PAUL, who have put in many exhibition appearances since their return from the Worlds, were guests at the Sports Celebrity Dinner in Kingston, Ont., in April—in aid of Crippled Children; they have made many appearances for this cause. Incidentally, Barbara & Bob were honored with the first two life memberships at the new Toronto Cricket Skating and Curling Club last year.

USISA Annual Meeting

For the first time in the history of the Association, the Annual Meeting of the USFSA Governing Council was held in Boston—at the Hotel Somerset on May 10 and 11. The attendance was unusually large; 81 clubs were represented, 43 by delegates and 38 by proxy. The Executive Committee met all day on Friday, May 9, Friday evening, and Sunday noon. An open meeting of the Competitions Committee on Saturday evening, and the open forum on Friday evening attracted unusually large audiences with a large group from The SC of Boston taking part.

The meetings were presided over by Kenneth L. Brown, President, assisted by Secretary Harold T. Leroux. Special guests for the weekend sessions were E. Richard S. McLaughlin, Oshawa, President of the Canadian Figure Skating Association, and F. T. (Andy) Carnegie of Toronto, Assistant Manager of the 1958

Canadian World Team.

Highlights of the action taken by the Executive Committee and by the Governing Council during the three-day sessions are set forth here.

The Amateur Status Committee recommended the following skaters be reinstated as amateurs, without the right to compete, and this was approved: Walter M. Bauer, Louisville FSC; Velma W. Best, Los Angeles, Calif.; Jane S. Dyer, Cleveland SC; Robert N. Gierse, Willow Brook FSC; Patricia Harrington O'Neill, Somerville, N. J.; G. Thomas Richards, III, Philadelphia SC & HS; Betsy Nichols Talbot, The SC of Boston.

At the request of the Amateur Status Committee the following motion was approved by the Executive Committee: "That all participants in the Ice Carnival held by the Michael Kirby Ice Skating Schools on April 20, 1958 be suspended as amateurs, such suspension to extend for a period of one year; suspension to be lifted on April 21, 1959; further, that notice of this suspension be sent to all clubs and individual members of the USFSA, the AAU and the ASU." This action was prompted by the fact that the ice carnival was an unsanctioned event.

The Competitions Committee presented many changes and revisions in the Competitions rules for next year; these were approved and will be published in and effective with the next Rulebook. Primarily, they include establishment of Sub-sectional Championships as qualifying events for the Eastern and Pacific Coast Sectionals. The three sub-divisions in the East are the New England States: New York and Northern New Jersey; Southern New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland and the District of Columbia. The Sub-sectional divisions in the Pacific Coast Section will consist of the Northwest-Oregon, Washington, Idaho, and Montana; Central-San Francisco, Berkeley, Sacramento, Fresno, and Salt Lake City: Southern-Los Angeles region, and Arizona. Those skaters qualifying for the Sectional will be fourth place and higher and the winner of a Sub-sectional in the preceding year who is not permitted to requalify.

At the suggestion of Mr. Brown on delegating authority to the Vice-Chairmen of the Competitions Committee to sanction Sub-sectionals lying within their sections, the following motion was passed: "In the event that a qualifying Sub-sectional cannot be held, the Sectional Vice-Chairman of the Competitions Committee shall be responsible for devising and putting into operation a method for determining which skaters from the area may enter the Sectional. The Chairman of the Sectional Committee shall assist him in this. Either or both of these Chairmen

may delegate this responsibility."

The Dance Committee proposed many changes, most of which were approved and will be printed in the next *Rulebook*. These changes include a new twice-around diagram for the Blues; reducing the number of patterns in final round of dance competition; adoption of the ISU Foxtrot; and entry in Sectional Gold Dance to qualify for National Gold.

In addition, completion of the compulsory dances of the Gold Dance Test will constitute passing the Gold Test. A separate Gold Free Dance Test will be

added to the test structure, and the medal designation is to be a bar, inscribed "free dance," on the Gold Dance medal.

Various changes in rules affecting World Championship Entries and Expenses were proposed by the International Committee and were approved: Eligibility for Pairs to be considered from the first five (instead of first four) in National Senior Pairs; reducing eligibility of Dance couples to those placing among the first five (rather than six) in the National Gold Dance event; consideration of the Silver Dance winners for eligibility for World Dance competition.

The Judging Committee reported on the number of Low, Intermediate, and High Test Judges on whom action had been taken the past season: For Low Test, 31 had been recommended for appointment from all three Sections, and 17 were approved; Intermediate, 11 proposed, eight promoted; High, five proposed, four promoted. From this total of 47 presented for appointment or promotion, only 29 were approved, showing significantly why there are not more Judges; the clubs are not proposing them, and in some cases the appointment requests are not carrying the complete information and prohibiting action.

The Judging Committee also reported on its "Notes on Pair Tests" which is in rough draft form. For further study and development on this subject it was voted that copies be mimeographed and distributed to interested persons, the mailing list to be made up by the Judging Committee Chairman.

At the suggestion of the Membership Committee it was voted to omit the list of USFSA Individual Members from the annual *Rulebook* since such list is not current during the year. Up-to-date lists will be made available to anyone desiring a copy.

On recommendation of the Membership Committee the following Probationary Clubs were admitted to Full Membership: Beacon Hill Club, Summit, N. J.; Memphis FSC, Memphis, Tenn.; Old York Road SC, Elkins Park, Pa.; Oxford FSC, Bronx, N. Y.; Plaza FSC, Warrensville Heights, Ohio; Portage Lake FSC, Houghton, Mich.; The SC of Phoenix, Phoenix, Ariz.; Willow Brook FSC, Little Falls, N. J.; Wilmington SC, Wilmington, Dela.

The following Interim Probationary Member Clubs were voted to Probationary Membership: Aspen FSC, Aspen, Colo.; Atlanta FSC, Atlanta, Ga.; Cape Cod SC, Hyannis, Mass.; Columbus FSC, Columbus, Ohio; Cornell FSC, Ithaca, N. Y.; Evansville FSC, Evansville, Ind.; Fort Wayne ISC, Fort Wayne, Ind.; The SC of Brunswick, Brunswick, Me.; Suburban FSC, La Grange, Ill.; Yakima ISC, Yakima, Wash. The Central New York FSC, Syracuse, N. Y., was also accepted, with certain reservations, for Probationary Membership.

It was voted to accept the resignations of the Houston FSC; Silver Springs FSC, Milwaukee; Wausau FSC.

The Summer Skating Committee has sanctioned 19 summer skating schools—eight in the Eastern Section, eight in the Midwest and three on the Pacific Coast. To clarify some confusion which exists on what sessions require a sanction and what are merely extensions of club sessions, SSR 2.01 was modified.

The Tests Committee presented revised Figure Skating and Pair Skating Tests and Rules, which were approved and will be included in the 1959 *Rulebook*. These pair tests, established for the first time, go into effect in October and will consist of Bronze, Silver, and Gold classes. Other changes have set up a minimum ice surface for the free skating portion of tests as



125' x 75', or 9375 square feet overall; and a restriction that the USFSA Seventh and Eighth Tests may be taken only within the geographical jurisdiction of the USFSA.

In order to present a balanced budget for the forthcoming year, it was proposed that the skater's registration fee be raised from 50 cents to \$1.00 in order to raise approximately \$10,000, and this was passed unanimously. The Special Committee to study the Constitution and By-Laws with respect to dues and registration fees made several suggestions for changes, which were adopted.

The Public Relations Committee Chairman made congratulatory motions in regard to World Champions Carol Heiss and David Jenkins and their performances, and to Ed Sullivan for his contributions to the USFSA and the Olympic Fund in connection with the appearance of the World Champions on his show, and these

were approved.

The site of the 1959 Annual Meeting of the Governing Council came up for discussion, and a bid from Sun Valley was presented. After consideration, it was voted not to accept the bid. The Pacific Coast Chairman was appointed to investigate possible sites for the Meeting in the Pacific Coast Section and to confer with the President in selecting a metropolitan location.

A motion was made and carried that announcement of the time and place of the Annual Meeting of the Governing Council and of the Executive Committee be sent to all clubs a minimum of four months prior to the actual dates. The foregoing announcements are to be sent also to all members of the Executive Committee.

The Nominating Committee presented the following slate of Officers and Executive Committee members, who were unanimously elected, and made recommendations for Committee Chairmen, with terms to begin September 1, 1958, and these were approved: President, Howard D. 
