





### The Summer Skating Story

### Eastern

The fourth summer at Hershey featured exhibitions every Saturday evening and each skater, in the season's course, presented a solo. Pair and group numbers were also skated. The season (June 14-Aug. 17) was sponsored by the Hershey FSC, and was under the direction of Felix Kaspar, with Harry Stafford and Lois Thomson completing the professional An innovation was the skating camp, managed and directed by Harry Stafford, along the Swatara Creek about a mile away from the Hershey Sports Arena. The skaters were housed in rustic cottages and a boathouse apartment. The skating schedule was enlarged to include swimming, boating, badminton and archery as popular diversions. As the Arena borders the Hershey Park, each Wednesday and Friday the students were guests of the Park at the Hershev Pool. A buffet supper combined with a swimming party at the skating camp was the final event; Chinese lanterns glowed along the shores of the creek and swimmers splashed a final farewell to the skating camp season.

The first ISU Gold Dance Tests to be given on this continent were held at Lake Placid on Sept. 6. After all the Gold Figure and Dance Tests were over for this 27th season, the totals showed that eight Gold Medals had been earned. The summer opened on June 9 with professionals Walter Bainbridge, Otto Gold, William Kipp, Howard Nicholson, Priscilla Snow, Cliff & Edwina Thaell and Jean Westwood. More than 80 persons participated in the 22nd annual Figure Judging School and Conference on July 18-20. The faculty included Col. Harold Storke, Alex Krupy, Mrs. Lloyd Sanderson, Mrs. Arthur C. McGowan, Jr., Spencer Cram, E. Newbold Black, IV, and Mrs. L. A. Graham—the latter two were Chairman and Co-Chairman of the Judging School Committee. A highlight of the three-day program was the second annual Free Skating and Pair Skating Championships on July 19 (see page 12). The outstanding events of the dance weeks (Aug. 3-17) were the Dance Conference and Dance Judges School on Aug. 9-11, and the Dance Championships on Aug. 14-16 (see page 9). Members of the Dance School faculty were Mrs. Lyman M. Drake, Jr., Minerva Burke, Mrs. Charles DeMore, Harry Keighley, F. Ritter Shumway, Webster Eshelman and Mrs. L. A. Graham, Chairman of the School. The weekly ice revues culminated over the Labor Day weekend with the annual operetta, entitled A Sky Fantasy. The program featured inhabitants of the sky-from the planets and nature's elements to Sputnik and airline hostesses. The group numbers were choreographed by Pro Beverley Bainbridge. Featured skaters were Andree & Donald Jacoby, U. S. Gold Dance Champions: Rhode Michelson, U. S. Novice Champion; U. S. and Canadian World Team Members Claire O'Neill, Beverley Orr and John J. Bejshak, Jr.; Svata & Mirek Staroba, Canadian Junior Dance Champions; and Pros Jean Westwood & William Kipp.

Ice Parade of '58 climaxed the season (June 18-Sept. 7) at the North Shore Sports Center, Lynn, Mass. The show, presented on Sept. 6-7, concluded the eighth annual summer sponsored by the North Shore SC. In the spotlight were performances by Bradley Lord (1957 U. S. Junior Champion), Maribel Owen & Dudley Richards, Faith Paterson & Peter Betts, Frank Muckian, Joanna Niska, Ronna Mae Goldblatt, Norvetta Tribby, and many others. The group numbers were produced by the professional staff: Cecilia Colledge, Thomas Mc-Ginnis, Maribel Vinson Owen, Lillian Tribby and Janus Waring. "South Pacific" opened the first half of the show with a South Seas flavor, while the second half returned the scene to New England with "Topsfield Fair." Additional groups were the military "Left, Right," the rock and roll "Sing, Sing, Sing," and the Fol-

lies number.

The Wissahickon SC, Philadelphia, operated its first summer season from June 23 to Aug. 24. A typical one-hour schedule included seven patch sessions and three free skating periods—six days a week. Senior dance sessions were held three evenings a week—Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays—and the public evening sessions were popular on Fridays and Saturdays. The professional staff included Albert Edmonds, Martin Forney, Bruce Mapes and Megan Taylor. Because the air in the rink had been air

conditioned—that is, temperature and humidity controlled—the net result was the complete absence of fog and drip from condensation, and an exceptionally excellent ice surface.

The third annual summer at the R. I. T. Ice Rink in Rochester, N. Y. opened on June 23, sponsored by the Genesee FSC. The complement of instructors included Mary Lou & Howard Butler, Peter Dunfield, Eleanor & Lewis Elkin, Slavka Kohout and Donald Laws. The first Judging and Dance School on July 26-27 added the latest chapter in the Kodak City's rapidly growing book on skating. Welcoming addresses were given by Alfred Davis, Director of Public Relations of the Rochester Institute of Technology, and Thomas Miller, Vice-President of the Genesee FSC. A large percentage of the summer skaters, almost every parent, plus many local club members and enthusiasts from nearby cities were present. Mrs. L. A. Graham conducted a thoughtfullyplanned program in which most of the highlights in both figure and dance judging were encompassed by the faculty, composed of Minerva Burke, Dr. Sidney Soanes, Mrs. Charles DeMore, E. Newbold Black, IV, and Mrs. Donald Archie. The summer pupils, willing "guinea pigs," added much color to their performances of the dances and figures for the special benefit of the embryo judges; Andree & Donald Jacoby, U. S. Gold Dance Champions, wound up the demonstrations with an exhibition, including the new version of the Foxtrot. Two picnics on July 9 and Aug. 8 featuring swimming and refreshments provided relaxation for the skaters. On the final day of the session, Aug. 24, the second R. I. T. summer dance competition was held (see page 11).

The seventh summer (June 25-Aug. 24) was marked by the largest number of figure and dance tests held in **Syracuse**, N. Y., on Aug. 24. On July 9, the Syracuse FSC held a "Reciprocity Night" inviting members of the Clinton, Cornell and Genesee FSC's. The guest night was given in appreciation of the hospitality extended by those clubs to Syracuse members during the winter. Ice games and Paul Jones dances filled the skating program while cakes, cookies and coffee filled



### Meet the New USISA President

"GOLD IS WHERE YOU FIND IT." In the case of Howard D. Herbert, our new USFSA President, we know that we have a valuable leader who at one time, ironically, was a gold prospector in northern Canada. Perhaps Howard's love for ice skating started when he was playing hockey for Cobalt and Kirkland Lake, Ontario, where ice and time were plenti-

ful during the winters.

Howard was born in Cleveland, Ohio. After completing his formal education, he spent nine years in the silver and gold mines. Returning to Akron, Ohio, Howard entered the rubber business. While in Akron, he became a charter member of the Akron Skating Club and served as a Club President. At Akron, Howard also served as a delegate to the USFSA meetings and in 1946 was elected to the Executive Committee, on which he has served in one capacity or another since that time.

He has been either a chairman or member of just about every committee in the structure. Howard was Chairman of the Summer Skating Committee for two years, Chairman of Finance for three years, Chairman of the Sanctions Committee also for three years, and was Association Treasurer for two years. These are just a few of the chairmanships that Howard has held, not to mention the numerous committees on which he has served. Through these years of working so closely with the Association, he has gained an outstanding insight and understanding of the workings of the Association.

Mr. & Mrs. Herbert (the former Mignon Ford, of Cleveland) moved to Buffalo in 1946. Later Howard served as president of the Buffalo Skating Club. It was here that he originated the Niagara Invitational competition and helped make the Buffalo Skating Club one of the most

Though no longer living in the Buffalo area, Howard's interest in his competition continues.

The Herberts not only skate for their own enjoyment, but further contribute to the sport by acting as judges for tests and competitions. On Sunday mornings in Buffalo, you could always find Howard taking a lesson on patch from Pro Lew Elkin and, later, "Red" Bainbridge. Howard enjoys nothing more than watching a Dutch Waltz executed by expert skaters.

Howard loves children. He has a son who is a research engineer with DuPont and five grandchildren living in Wilmington, Delaware. Children and skating just naturally go together and Howard has always been in the "juniors" corner, particularly when it came to competitions and carnivals. He watched keenly the early figure skating efforts of Hayes, Nancy and David Jenkins, and lent encouragement to many other youngsters at Akron, Cleveland and Buffalo.

In Buffalo, Howard was Manager of Sales of the Restfoam Division of Hewitt-Robbins, Inc. He is now Vice-President of the American Foam Rubber Company of Burlington, New Jersey. At the time of his promotion, the Herberts moved to Moorestown, New Jersey, where they have resided since 1956.

Golf is his one hobby other than figure skating. Here he is an average "business man" golfer having to go some to keep up with Mrs. Herbert, who is an above-average lady golfer. The Herberts are excellent bridge players and gracious hosts. If you have ever tasted Mignon's "wild rice and beef kidneys," you have had a real treat.

As Howard begins his term, we predict that his past achievements will be but a stepping stone to the new glories he will attain as President of the United States Figure Skating Association—a position he will fulfill with his usual efficiency, enthusiasm and loyalty.



### News About Skaters



. . . World Champion David Jenkins has accepted a four-year scholarship to Western Reserve School of Medicine, in Cleveland, and has entered the first year class. David spent the summer skating on home ice at the Broadmoor SC. In September, David and Toronto's World Pair Champions, Barbara Wagner & Robert Paul, flew to Berlin, Germany, to appear in a three-day show put on by the Berlin Eissport Verband and the Berlin Schlittschuh Club.

. . . Hayes Jenkins, Olympic Champion, worked in a law firm during the summer and managed to skate at East Lansing on several weekends. He plans to make some professional appearances this winter while he is in his third year at Harvard Law School.

... World Champion Carol Heiss last May was elected Secretary of the New York Chapter of the U. S. Olympians; she and Nancy and Bruce Heiss summer skated at East Lansing. Carol was one of the guests at the *Sports Illustrated* sponsored dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria, New York City, on September 22, kicking off the People-to-People Sports Committee program. Other prominent skaters present were Tenley Albright, Dick Button and Hayes Jenkins.

. . . Olympic Champion Tenley Albright vacationed from her first year at Harvard Medical School with a six-week European trip last summer which took her to Paris, Germany, the Brussels Worlds Fair, London, and Ireland. On her return in mid-August she was featured skating on one of the many floats in connection with General Motors' Fiftieth Anniversary celebration in Flint, Mich. Coincidentally, at that time Dick Button, former Olympic and World Champion, was playing that city in a skating-acting role in the musical, Girl Crazy.

. . . Canadian Champion Margaret Crosland was one of the debutantes presented last summer to the Lieutenant Governor

of Alberta at the Calgary Highlander Ball. Margaret will train in Winnipeg again this winter for the 1959 competitions. In preparation for studying pharmacy at the University of Manitoba next year, Margie will serve her apprenticeship this year in a drug store.

. . . Canadian Dance Champions Geraldine Fenton & William McLachlan passed the ISU Gold Dance Test in Lake Placid in September, making them triple Gold Medalists. Kathleen McCormick, Minto SC, also passed the ISU Gold in Lake Placid, giving her a fifth Gold Medal; she also holds her CFSA and USFSA Gold Dance and Eighth Test Medals. This was the first time that ISU Gold Dance Tests were given in this country.

. . . Canadian pair competitors Maria & Otto Jelinek were to leave for Switzerland in early October to attend the Alpine Mittelschule in Davos. Bronze medalists in the last two Worlds, they are planning to fly back from Europe in time to compete in this year's World Pair Championship.

... USFSA official Henry M. Beatty, who accompanied U. Notes from Abroad: World Dance Champion Courtney Jones of Great Britain is skating this season with Doreen Denny; his former partner, June Markham, turned pro last spring to teach. Courtney has accepted a position as a dress designer with one of the leading wholesale manufacturers in Britain, but still skates quite a lot; it would "not be beyond the realms of possibility" for him to be competing again in international events. . . . British Champion Michael Booker has also left the amateur ranks to teach at Schumacher, Ontario this winter. . . . British Lady Champion Dianne Peach left England in July to join the ballet of Ice Capades and will understudy Chado and Helga.

... Correspondence from the Continent reveals that the two European Champions, Ingrid Wendl of Austria and Karol Divin of Czechoslovakia, will not be defending their titles-it is reported that Ingrid has turned pro to skate in the Vienna Ice Revue and Karol has retired from skating. . . . Czechoslovakia's top pair—European Champions and World runners-up—have broken up due to Vera Suchankova's marriage, which leaves Zdenek Dolezal without a partner. . . . Franz Ningel, West Germany, runner-up in the 1957 World Pairs, has a new partner, Margaret Goebl. . . . The Nagy's—Hungary's 1950 and 1955 European Pair Champions-retired at a "farewell to skating" party in Buda-

### Changes in Dance Rules for the New Season

A NUMBER OF CHANGES in dance test and competition rules for the coming season were approved by the USFSA Executive Committee upon the recommendation of the Dance Committee last May. While these changes can be quite easily spotted in the new *Rulebook* because they are printed in italics, it might be helpful, nonetheless, to point them out and to make a few comments on the most important of them.

The new rules become effective November 15, 1958. An earlier date could not have been used because the *Rulebook* was not published until early October and this issue of Skating calling the attention of all skaters to the changes is only being published at the end of October. On the other hand a later date could not be used because within a comparatively few days after November 15 the first Subsectional Championships of the new skating season, which will be qualifying competitions for the Pacific Coast and Eastern Sectional Championships, will be held.

Changes which affect both dance tests and dance competitions: Many skaters believe that it is more effective for the free leg of the partners to be parallel to each other at all times. This expression will now be "officially" possible in the Willow Waltz because Step 6 for the lady and Step 19 for the man may now be skated, optionally, as a slide chassé thus enabling the partners' free legs to match during the second half of the mohawk. (See Glossary of Dance Terms in 1959 Rulebook for definition of Slide Chassé, inserted there for the first time.)

After two seasons of permitting partial outside position in the four beat rolls (Steps 3, 6, 10 and 13) of the Tango and seeing mostly closed or waltz position which was not penalized by the judges, the USFSA Dance Committee believed that it would be better to return to the

original rule which required only outside position for these steps. Another factor influencing the decision of the Committee was to conform the USFSA Tango to the ISU regulation on this point. It is recognized that this rule will decrease flow in this dance so we may find a movement away from the use of a "once around" and back to one of several "twice around" patterns that can be used for this dance.

The ISU Foxtrot has been adopted in place of the former USFSA Foxtrot. The most obvious changes in this dance are that the first three steps which were formerly a progressive run now are a cross in back chassé sequence and that all the threes for both the lady and the man are cross rolled. Another change, but one which is not quite as obvious, is that at the end of Step 8 the partners must be in outside (hip to hip as in Tango) position. In this connection, it should be particularly noted that although many of the European skaters go into full outside position at the beginning of Step 6 immediately after the lady's three turn, our rules make explicit what is implicit in the ISU rules, namely, that the correct partner position for Steps 6 and 7 is waltz or closed position.

The attention of the ladies is drawn to Step 9 which is started with a cross in back roll to match with the man's cross rolled three.

It should also be noted that the Foxtrot now becomes a preferred rather than a set pattern dance. In tests, therefore, any pattern may be used which the candidate prefers, provided only that correct edges are skated. In competitions, however, the pattern shown in the *Rulebook* must be used when the Foxtrot is skated in a Final Round.

CHANGES AFFECTING ONLY DANCE TESTS: Because of the great difficulty encountered by many dancers in finding a partner who had the necessary time and ability to work up a free dance for completion of the Gold Dance Test, it has been decided to award the Gold Medal to dancers who have passed all the compulsory dances. To encourage Free Dancing, however, the former free dance portion of the Gold Dance Test has been made a separate test which can be taken after (but only after) all the compulsory dances have been passed. Completion of the Gold Free Dance Test will be recognized by the award of a bar to the Gold Dance Medal. On the bar will be inscribed the words "Free Dance."

In the solo portion of the Pre Gold Dance Test the candidate is now required to show some evidence of dance expression in addition to being able to keep in time with the music and in general to follow the pattern of the dance.

CHANGES AFFECTING ONLY DANCE COMPE-TITIONS: A new "twice around" pattern for the Blues will be found in the 1959 edition of the Rulebook. The USFSA Dance Committee believes that the new diagram is a substantial improvement on the old pattern, especially in Steps 9, 10 and 11, which formerly had to be skated on quite shallow edges; in the new pattern they will be skated on a good curve. The new pattern also seems to lend itself to more flow, particularly for Steps 1, 2 and 3, as well as Step 7. While the Blues remains a preferred pattern dance and, therefore, any pattern which follows the correct edges may be used when taking a test or when skating in the Initial Round of a competition, the new diagram must be followed when the Blues is skated in a Final Round of dance competition.

In general, the number of patterns of a compulsory dance which must be skated in dance competition has been reduced. In the Final Round the number of patterns has been reduced, in general, to four with the exception of the Argentine, which must be skated only three times through the complete sequence. For the Initial Round, the Referee has been given authority to determine whether the number of patterns for that particular competition shall be three or four. His decision in this matter must be announced to the judges and to the contestants not later than immediately prior to the official warm-up for the competition.

According to our present rules every entrant in National Gold Dance competition must have skated at least once in National Silver Dance competition. This requirement has been slightly altered so that in the future every entrant in National Gold must only have been *eligible* to have skated at one time in National Silver Dance competition.

There have been several rather technical changes made in the methods for breaking ties in dance competitions. For example, in a dance competition in which Free Dancing is used in the Final Round, one additional step has been added in the breaking of a tie by letting the mark received for "method of execution" in the Free Dancing decide the place after all other steps have failed. The previous rules provided for a skating off of an extreme tie for fourth place. This provision has been eliminated and instead other simpler and more positive provisions have been made (for details see CR 26.20-26.30 in the 1959 Rulebook).

### It's a Thought

So you think our dance tests are tough? British and French dancers must pass all the dances of a test at one and the same session. In addition, a candidate for the French Silver Dance Test must begin his test by skating passably one of the Bronze Test dances, selected by the judges and announced at the start of the test, before being permitted to continue with the Silvers.—furnished by Margaretta Drake, Skokie Valley FSC.

### Olympus Is for the Gods

The identity of the author of the comments which follow is known to the Editor of Skating and is available to anyone interested. The reason for this qualified anonymity will probably become apparent; at least, it will be suspected—which is not much different. The writer is a low test judge who has developed a feeling that high test judges should graciously refuse, when practicable, to enter the field of operations of low test judges.

This feeling is based on some observation of the fate of candidates for First and Second Test honors who have encountered a panel of high test judges. This can happen when a club has a schedule which requires, for one or two tests, judges of high rank. So the visiting "brass," possibly to their dismay, wind up working on the low tests, too. Far from appreciating such honor, the low test candidates are, in many instances, stunned, demoralized and

failed.
Consider the elements of the situation. The candidate is a youngster trying the First Test, or a lovely lady who was a little late in discovering the pleasure of skating and is determined to make up for the wasted years. Let us assume that they have practiced diligently. They are, however, definitely in the low test area of skating ability. They are on trial and, if they were to be tried by a jury of their "peers"—by definition, those of their rank—the panel would consist of low test

There is a reasonable presumption that the low test judge is somewhat more understanding of the low test candidate's tension and inevitable errors than ladies and gentlemen whose normal diet includes the nation's, or even the world's, best executed brackets, loops, counters, etc.

But it happens that these extremely competent ladies and gentlemen are not, at the moment, observing and judging the performance of an Albright or a Button, a Heiss or a Jenkins. Can it be expected that always they will have that firmly in mind?

The instant fact is that they are passing judgment on young Johnny Hopeful or Mrs. Ima Gonnadooit, a couple of eageredgers who have been told by their instructors that they are ready to try a low test. So they do, and they wind up stone cold dead—failed by one or another of the high test judges who have become accustomed to near-perfection and who, quite understandably, are unable to gear down easily from a caviar to a hot-dog standard of performance.

Judging, in figure skating, could be described as the expression of an informed opinion of the performance of the skater observed. There is, however, this other consideration: the quality of performance reasonably to be expected at the skater's level. The low test skater who does not reach the appropriate level of accomplishment should not, of course, be passed out of an excess of charity. Nor should the skater be failed because the level of performance is below that which a high test judge has come to expect.

The only thing suggested is this: When practicable, let low test candidates be judged by low test judges. When the norm of judgment, by general understanding, is as high as an elephant's knee, it is unfair to the skater to have it become suddenly, through some happenstance, as high as an elephant's eye.

. . . . . .

Although the author's suggestion is contrary to both the letter and spirit of our judging rules, it appears to be well written and interesting. As long as the writer's attitude is clearly concerned with the best interests of the sport rather than some local personal situation, it seems perfectly all right for him to speak his opinion about this subject.

National (and higher) judges are supposed to be qualified to judge from Preliminary through Eighth Tests and it has been my observation that most (but not all) of them properly differentiate between "what you would expect" of a low test skater and a Gold Medal candidate. Because of our ever increasing work load of judging tests and competitions, and because of the fact that the higher figures can be judged only by the higher judges, most of the lower tests must be handled by low and intermediate test judges anyway. Still there are some very good reasons for using National judges in lower tests. Among these are:

(1) A National judge in a panel is often of great help to the other judges in the discussion *after* the tests, by compar-

ing standards, opinions, etc.

(2) National judges *must* keep their hand in at judging lower figures as they are often required to judge them in

competitions.

(3) Where judges must be "imported," as at summer centers, National judges must be used on all levels for obvious reasons of economy.

(4) It has been my experience that where one of the judges is a World judge, most of the skaters want him to judge, and even request it if he tries to take his turn off duty. This may be because they think he is a "rest period" compared to the stern low test judges, or because they imagine some special distinction attaches to a "Pass" if granted by such a judge.

Anyway, thanks to the author for the article. His implied comparison of National and World judges to the Gods on Olympus is indeed flattering. Wait until he gets to be a National judge! He will join us in wishing that more people would say such nice things.—H. Kendall Kelley, Chairman, USFSA Figure Judging Committee.

In checking the results of the Junior Pair division of the 1958 Pacific Coast Championships, it was found that fourth and fifth places were in reverse order. Mary Jo McGrath & Jeff Flowers, Seattle SC, placed fourth, while Cynthia & Ronald Kauffman, Seattle SC, finished fifth.

### Lake Placid Dance Record List

### By WEBSTER S. ESHELMAN

THE LAKE PLACID LIST of dance records, which is published annually, indicates the tunes found satisfactory during the summer dance sessions in August of each year. A free copy may be obtained by writing to the Olympic Arena, Lake Placid, N. Y.

Through the cooperation of the Rinx Record Co., more Waltz records are now available, which have been recorded at Metronome 138 (Ice Metronome 46). This permits us to discontinue a number of the Metronome 108 Waltz records, which were speeded up for our use in the Dutch Waltz as well as the European and Willow Waltzes. An improvement in the quality of music for these dances has been achieved, since the distortion due to a change in speed has been practically eliminated.

Satisfactory single tune records for the American Waltz have disappeared from the market and it is now necessary to use 45 r.p.m. Extended Play discs with two tunes on a side. These selections are shown in the record list.

The larger number of outdoor ice rinks as well as additional indoor arenas has produced many new groups of skaters. Some of these skaters have become interested in ice dancing but lack proper guidance or experience to produce satisfactory dance sessions. Some of the more important essentials of ice dance music are outlined in this article for their benefit.

The use of the Lake Placid list should help all dance groups to obtain satisfactory records for ice dancing. Considerable money is wasted each year by inexperienced music committees in buying records which are unsatisfactory under rink conditions.

The purpose of dance music is to help two partners do their respective steps in the proper sequence and at the same time keep in unison throughout the dance. Both the strong beat and the melody have a function to perform in achieving this objective.

If the beat is too strong, the effect of the melody is largely lost and the dancers tend to skate in a mechanical manner. If all records used a strong beat, like Elmer's Tune (Tempo), our dancers would become mentally fatigued by the end of a dance session. In contrast the Tango record Bandoneon Arrabalero (Decca) does not have a loud beat but it is so distinct that the tune has been used for many years.

Some test candidates ask for a record with a prominent melody, not realizing that a distinct beat is also required. Dancing is made more enjoyable by properly selected melodies, which permit the beat to be heard. The skater can dance in a more relaxed manner and the lilt of the music often helps the dancer to change the lean or body positions when required.

New dance groups often fail to appreciate the need for uniform and accurate tempos for ice dance music. Speed Dials are placed on records to provide uniform timing under varying rink conditions and, when properly selected, furnish accurate dance tempos. For example, 53 different 45 r.p.m. dials are available for the 28 r.p.m. range in speed between 30 and 57.60. This system is simple, involves little expense, and is in general use for tests and competitions.

A variable speed turntable should be used so that a wide selection of records can be used for ice dancing. The most widely used turntable has a continuously variable speed from 25 to 100 r.p.m. and plays 33, 45 and 78 r.p.m. records. Unfortunately, some dancers are located in rinks which have a fixed speed turntable and not a variable speed turntable. The 1958 Lake Placid list offers a few records providing correct tempo for eight dances and approximately correct tempo for seven other dances.

### Book Review

"This Skating Age," by Howard Bass, published by Stanley Paul, London, England. 212 pages. Illustrated. Price 15s. net.

Skating enthusiasts, especially younger ones and beginners, will find much of interest and value in this charming volume about their favorite sport. Characterized throughout by the "light touch" and embellished with many personal anecdotes, this book really covers skating in its broadest aspects, including not only ice figure skating, but roller skating, speed skating on both blades and wheels, dancing on skates, and show skating, as well.

In addition to advice for beginners about proper equipment, the fundamental elements of skating, school figures, free skating programs, it also reviews briefly the historical highlights of the sport, the establishment of championship competitions, early championships and champions, and skating in the Olympic Games. Although the author's experience with the sport of skating is limited to post-World War II, he has developed an enthusiasm for the sport which bubbles forth from every page, and indicates every "symptom" of the now well-defined syndrome known as "skating fever." After free-lance writing about the sport directly after the War, he organized, in December 1948, his own publication, The Skater, Skier, and Ice Hockey Player, and from his writing, editing, and publishing experience, he has enlarged his knowledge and has come in contact with almost every important skater of the post-war era.

While this book is not intended to be an exhaustive expert treatise on skating and skating techniques, and indeed it is not, it has a disarming lack of sophistication that makes it most pleasant reading. On this basis, it could be a desirable addition to the skating library of the younger enthusiast, who will share with the author a wholesome growing devotion to a great

sport.—RICHARD L. HAPGOOD.




