



The North American Championships

THE NORTH AMERICAN Championships were held in Toronto under the auspices of the Toronto Cricket Skating and Curling Club on February 6-7. The Championships produced enough excitement and suspense to bring the crowd of nearly five thousand to their feet time and time again in roars of approval and appreciative applause. The "final events" show that taxed the capacity of Varsity Arena was a fitting climax to two days of keen competition. So much interest was aroused that the committee had to stop the sale of tickets for the Saturday evening performance by two o'clock in the afternoon and an estimated two thousand disappointed spectators were unable to gain admittance.

The ladies' and men's compulsory figures occupied all the first day and these were held in the Toronto CS & CC's spacious new quarters where the condition of the ice won the praises of contestants and judges alike. Carol Heiss, judged only fractions less than flawless, far outclassed her rivals in the compulsory figures, but the men's event was another story: less than half a point separated Tim Brown, Robert Lee Brewer and Donald Jackson who finished the compulsory figures in that order. The men's figures were considered to be of a reasonable standard, but not particularly high.

Saturday afternoon the scene shifted to Varsity Stadium where a suprisingly large crowd watched the compulsory dances. It was soon evident that this was going to be a close contest and the evening free dancing events confirmed this belief when Geraldine Fenton & Bill McLachlan of Canada retained their North American Dance Championship by the narrowest of margins. Without wishing to detract in any way from the fine skating of the United States pair of Andree & Donald Jacoby, we do think that Gerry and Bill had an off night that nearly cost them their championship. It was interesting to hear the comments of some of the old time figure skaters who deplore some of the modern trends in dancing as lacking the "flow" and "smoothness" of other vears, but the fact remains the huge crowd thoroughly enjoyed it and gave dancers like the Jacobys a great ovation.

With David Jenkins not present, great interest naturally centered on the men's singles and here, on the final night, Canada's Don Jackson outdid himself. Trailing in third place, admittedly by a narrow margin at the end of the compulsory figures, the diminutive Jackson gave a spectacular display in which he seemingly with great ease executed triple salchows and his famous delayed double salchow. Throughout his free skating performance he displayed an air of friendly confidence, and the crowd who rose to their feet and roared their approval were convinced he had won the North American crown.

The enchanting Carol Heiss, at present in a class by herself, thrilled the record crowd with her flawless performance, but Lynn Finnegan, in second place, impressed everyone with her fine skating. Many favorable comments were made about the up and coming Sandra Tewkesbury, top Canadian in this event.

As was expected, Canada's Barbara Wagner & Robert Paul retained their North American Pair crown without too much difficulty. Nancy & Ron Ludington, the U.S. National titleholders, in second

place, were roundly applauded.

The big regret of the final night was the poor condition of the Varsity ice. A rise in outside temperature plus the capacity crowd apparently caught the rink officials off guard and the referees continually complained about ice conditions. In the ladies' free skating each of the first four contestants fell in the same place, which added to the excitement of the crowd but to the chagrin of the committee. However, it was noticeable the ice made no difference to Carol Heiss, Don Jackson

A pleasing feature of the event was the fine appearance of the team of ten caddies, Kitty Stewart, Nancy Brunton, Heather Taylor, Judy Saunders, Mary Claire Moore, Bettsy Severs, Leslie Bertram, Barbara Ann Mills, Wendy Griner and Nancy Black. Attired in attractive red and black costumes, well trained and efficient, they made a decided hit in the performance of their duties.

Expression in Dancing

"What is expression in dancing?" Judges are asked this question many times. The dictionary states, "It is the art, or power of representing anything; a transient change of the countenance." The Rulebook tells us that it embraces that quality of dancing which interprets the character of the music, which designates the type of dance being skated. To do this and to express the music correctly one must show, by either rapid or slow changes of pace, the variation pattern of the music.

In watching contestants, it distresses us as judges to see two mechanical dolls execute perfect timing and form, unison and placement and to hear that called dancing, particularly when the skaters are devoid of any animation or spirit. Why don't we encourage dancers to feel the sheer joy of life in every step, and the throb in every beat? Let us try to make them conscious of the real thrill to be gained in expressing the lilt and swing of the music, not only by academic correctness, but also by incorporating life and character into the dance.

Putting expression in dancing is an art and we should realize that it is. For a comparison, take the old masters and the modern artists; both groups being human, they could see and appreciate life but, due to differences in their personalities, they expressed their individuality by entirely different methods.

The same thing can happen in dancing. By harmonizing the basic steps and introducing freedom and latitude in movement, couples may express their individual feeling in their own special way and comply with the character of the music. For example, first consider the Blues, which gives ample scope for expression. The beat is slow, rhythmic and slightly melancholic, and long, powerful, but seemingly

lazy strokes can best express the music. Skaters should feel the pulse of the music and dance to it, using the free leg and strong skating knee to advantage.

The Quickstep, unlike the Blues, is gay and flashing, and the free leg, body lean, plus good edges can help express quickness and vivacity. Gaiety and animation are the very essence of this dance.

The Viennese is another beautiful dance. From its name we get the impression of a delightful waltz, with strongly curved edges and a lightness of footwork in the faster steps. In this dance there is scope for freer expression and the personalized touch. So often these lovely dances are spoiled because the dancers look like robots executing the steps, with no feeling for the nature of the dance.

In discussions on expression by judges, one frequently finds many differences of opinion, especially in their ideas on marking. Some contend that, should a free leg not be extended to their satisfaction, the dance lacks expression. Another is unable to recognize individual appeal when a dance is executed differently from the way that particular judge has been taught.

In mentioning these things I do not mean to infer that a judge should forsake everything else for an apparent fleeting vivaciousness, but one phase has been noted many times and should be recognized: too often expression is sacrificed for pattern and accuracy. In observing the seemingly effortless skating of the English dancers, one sees projected their great feeling for expression and their alive awareness of each beat of music. Even though I have mentioned only a few methods of showing a feeling for expression in dancing I feel that, in this rapidly moving skating world of today, expression will come to embody many new facets that have yet to be explored.













Meet the New Champions

In the Senior classes, all those who defended their National titles did so successfully, and because they have been written up in previous issues are not included with the other thumbnail sketches printed here. The defending titlists were Carol Heiss, U. S. and North American Lady Champion; David Jenkins, U. S. Men's Champion (he did not defend his North American title); Nancy & Ronald Ludington, U. S. Pair Champions: Andree & Donald Jacoby, U. S. Gold Dance Champions. In Canada, Margaret Crosland, Canadian Lady Champion; Barbara Wagner & Robert Paul, Canadian and North American Pair Champions: Geraldine Fenton & William McLachlan, Canadian and North American Dance Champions.

* Dynamic describes Donald Jackson's free skating, perhaps accurately, but not adequately. The 1959 North American and Canadian Champion has been heralded as a "coming World Champion" since winning his first national title—the Junior Men's Championship in That, incidentally, was Don's first entry in National competition, at age 14. His competitive career started when he won the interclub Novice title in 1952 for the Oshawa SC. Then he continued competing annually in interclub competition among the Oshawa, Hamilton and Granite clubs until advancing to the Canadian level.

In his childhood, it did not seem as if there would be a top-ranking skater in the making. Born prematurely 18 years ago, with yellow jaundice, he later at age three was operated on for a rupture. Besides the usual children's diseases, Don has also had pneumonia three times, the last seizure being of the virus type.

After the Oshawa arena burned down in 1953, Don traveled regularly about three days a week and on weekends to ice areas in Peterborough, Bowmanville and Stouffville. He now represents the Toronto CS & CC, but for the past two years has been coached by Pierre Brunet—in New York in the winter and at East Lansing, Mich., in summer. He has been

obtaining his schooling by being tutored from a private school in New York, taking a special course at New York University, and a correspondence course through the Ontario Department of Education in Toronto. Because of missing classes, he is studying subjects equivalent to both Grade 11 and Grade 12 of high school.

Don has one brother, William, and his parents, George and Patricia Jackson, are avid skating fans and Directors of the Oshawa Skating Club; Mr. Jackson is a Past President, and Mrs. Jackson is a Publications Advisory Committee Member for Skating.

Don will reach his 19th birthday on April 2; a brunet, he is a small, but compact, 5'4", and his outstanding features are his wide, engaging smile, sparkling blue eyes, and slightly upturned nose.

A special highlight of his skating career was winning the Lake Placid Sportsmanship Award in the summer of 1955; he is especially proud of this honor because the voting was done by fellow skaters and competitors training there. Besides the thrill of winning the North American title this year, he "felt good about it" because he was on Canadian ice near home in the Varsity Arena, the same place where he won the Canadian Junior title four years ago. Now with the acquisition of the Canadian Senior and North American crowns, Don's goals are centered on the Olympic and World contests in 1960.

Test and competition record: Canadian and U. S. Eighth Tests, Canadian Gold Dance and U. S. Pre Gold. Canadian Junior Champion 1955, Senior runner-up 1956, 1957, 1958; Worlds, seventh 1957, fourth 1958.

UNITED STATES

In 1958 she placed third in the Junior Ladies' event; and in 1956 she had to withdraw from the Novice class when she broke her arm during practice. Laurence, 14, represents The SC of Bos-

ton; she was born in Berkeley, Calif., but now makes her home in Winchester, Mass. with her mother, Maribel Vinson Owen, her grandmother, Mrs. Thomas Vinson, and her 18-year-old sister, Maribel. She has a long and impressive skating heritage, for Maribel, Senior, was nine times U. S. Lady Champion, six times U. S. Pair Champion, and North American Champion in 1937. Her father, the late Guy R. Owen of Ottawa, was a member of the Minto Four which won the North American Four title four times, and the Canadian Four Championship from 1933 through 1937; he was also Canadian Junior Champion in 1929. Laurence, a stately 5'51/2", has brown eyes and dark brown hair cut in a Dutch clip, with bangs. She is a sophomore in Winchester High School, where she is taking the college preparatory course. Her interests and hobbies are varied, ranging from the piano, ballet, modern dancing and art, to swimming, tennis and sailing on the sports side. Her flair for writing short stories and poems is probably inherited from her mother, who is the author of two books on figure skating and has contributed special features to magazines and Sister Maribel, currently newspapers. Eastern Senior Pair Champion with Dudley Richards, placed third in this year's U. S. and North American Pair events. Test and competition record: Seventh Figure, Pre Silver Dance. New England Junior Lady Champion 1956, Senior Lady Champion 1959; Eastern Junior Lady Champion 1956, Senior Lady Champion 1958, 1959.

The record of Gregory E. Kelley, Junior Men's Champion, in the short span of five competitive years shows a string of firsts from Sub-sectional to National level. Stepping from the U. S. Novice Championship of the previous year, Gregory in 1958 made a bid and a near miss for the National Junior title which he took this year. Fourteen-year-old Gregory is a freshman at the Sacred Heart School, a high school in his home city of Newton, where he is following the college preparatory course. Slight, 5'5" Gregory has brown hair and blue eyes, and a scattering of freckles across the bridge of his

nose. He belongs to The SC of Boston; his other sports interests follow fishing, swimming and tennis; a serious hobby is his collection of coins and stamps. The son of a Boston surgeon, Gregory has older brothers and sisters, and one in particular, Nathalie, usually accompanies him on his skating trips. Test and competition record: Eighth Figure, Bronze Dance. Eastern and New England Juvenile Champion 1955; Eastern Novice Champion 1956; Eastern Junior and U. S. Novice Champion 1957; New England Senior Champion 1958, 1959; Eastern Senior Champion 1958, 1959.

The sister-brother team of JUDIANNE AND JERRY FOTHERINGILL, Junior Pair Champions, live with their parents in Tacoma and represent the Lakewood WC. Judy, 14, is a freshman in Clover Park High School, and Jerry, 17 since this March, is in the junior class. Brown-eyed Judy wears her chestnut-colored hair short, and stands 5'4" to Jerry's 5'101/2"; he has close cropped brown hair and blue eyes. They both like swimming and water skiing for summer sports, and Jerry's interests carry on to baseball and basketball, too. They started skating five or six years ago and entered their first competition, the Northwest Junior Pair, in 1955 and placed third. Test and competition record: Second Figure, Silver Dance for both. Northwest Pacific Junior Pair Champions 1956; Pacific Coast Junior Pair Champions 1958; Northwest Pacific Bronze Dance and Senior Pair Champions 1958.

The new Novice Lady Champion, MARY BATDORF, is in the seventh grade at Harding Junior High School. Representing the Hershey FSC, she lives in Lebanon, Pa. Mary stands 5'1", and has light brown hair cut short, and hazel eyes. Her twin sister, Anne, is also a skater and a competitor, and 1959 South Atlantic States Junior Champion; she narrowly missed qualifying for Nationals this year. Mary's other sports interests center around water skiing and swimming. Test and competition record: Fifth Figure, Pre Silver Dance. Middle Atlantic Novice Lady Champion 1957; Eastern Junior Lady Champion 1959.

MONTY HOYT, the Novice Men's Champion, is a product of Baltimore, Md., but now makes his home with his parents in Denver where Mr. Hoyt is editor and publisher of The Denver Post. Monty moved his club affiliation this year to the Broadmoor SC from the Denver CC. Fourteen years old, with sandy hair and blue eyes, Monty is a tall, slight 5'11". He is in the ninth grade at Hill Junior High School, and is taking a college preparatory course. His hobbies and outside interests are numerous and high up come acting and drama; stamp collecting and bridge also occupy his time, and football is a favorite activity. Test and competition record: Fifth Figure, Pre Silver Dance. Midwestern Junior Champion 1959.

MARILYN MEEKER AND LARRY PIERCE brought Indianapolis back into the spotlight by winning the Silver Dance Championship. Products of the WC of Indianapolis, both live in that city. Marilyn, 17, is a senior at Broad Ripple High School, and Larry, 23, attended Indiana University but is currently in the U.S. Marine Corps. Marilyn has brown hair and eyes and stands a petite 5'2", while Larry is 5'10" and has brown hair and blue eyes. Marilyn likes vocal music, and swimming is another activity; Larry is interested in photography and in collecting guns. Test and competition record: Marilyn-Fourth Figure, Pre Gold Dance; Larry-First Figure, Pre Gold Dance. Midwestern Bronze Dance Champions 1957, Silver Dance Champions 1958.

CANADIAN

With the winning of the title—Junior Lady Champion—Wendy Griner fulfilled the prediction in Skating's report of the 1958 Canadian Championships: "Her display of dainty perfection should carry her fast toward the top." The 14-year-old petite blonde makes her home in Toronto and represents the Toronto CS & CC. She attends Branksome Hall where she is in Form 1B of Grade 9 and is taking a general course. Her style of skating and appearance is said to be reminiscent of Barbara Ann Scott; Wendy, a slender girl with blue eyes, stands

5′2½″ tall. In the field of sports, swimming and tennis engage her non-skating moments. Her brother, David, is a hockey player and the only other skater in the family. Her future plans include attending college and the hope of skating in the Worlds and Olympics. Test and competition record: Eighth Test, Gold Dance. Central Ontario Junior Champion 1957, Senior Champion 1958.

The new Junior Men's Champion is young Donald McPherson—13 when he won the title, he celebrated his fourteenth birthday on February 20. The youngest entry in the 1959 North Americans, Don has been skating since he was three years old, and represents his home town club, Stratford FSC. In his initial entry in national competition last year (he placed fourth), Don caught the crowd's fancy; to quote the Canadian story: "Like a small, quick sprite in contrast to his taller competitors, he gave the impression of a sensitive young poet expressing his art on ice instead of in the pages of a book." Fair-complected, with brown hair and grey-blue eyes, he is 5'2" in height. A member of Grade 10 at Stratford Collegiate, he is in the general course and would like to become a nuclear physicist. His ambition is to compete in the Worlds and Olympics. Also a dance competitor, he and his partner, Joanne Houghton, placed third this year in the Western Ontario Gold Dance event. Test and competition record: Eighth Test, Senior Silver Dance. Western Ontario Novice Champion 1957, Senior Champion 1958,

Among the youngest competitors in the Canadian Championships this year were Deborah Ruth Wilkes and Guy John Revell of the Unionville SC, the Junior Pair Champions. Debbie is only 12 years old, and Guy is 14. A tiny 4'11" tall and weighing 77 pounds, Debbie has blue eyes and short blonde hair in contrast to Guy's brown hair and hazel eyes. He is just 5'3½" in height. Debbie is close to the top of her class—Grade 7—in Unionville Public School, and works hard to keep her marks high as she hopes to attend college. Guy, who lives in New-

market, is in Grade 12 at Newmarket High School, where he is majoring in Latin, French and Geometry, and he thinks it likely he will go to a university. Debbie, a Girl Guide, and Guy have two other sports in common—water skiing and swimming; Guy also likes to ski on snow. Guy has a sister, Jean Lynn, who is with Ice Capades. Debbie's brother, Robert, is a mechanical engineer and her sister, Susan, is a laboratory technician. Debbie has competed in dancing as well as pairs, and placed fourth with another partner, Brian Bailie, in the 1958 Central Ontario Junior Dance. Guy has skated singles and was runner-up in the Novice Men's class of the 1958 Central Ontario Championships. At the 1959 North Americans, the pair was pleased with their fifth place. Test and competition record: Debbie and Guy-Fourth Figure, Silver Dance. Debbie-Central Ontario Senior and Junior Pair Champion 1958.

The new Junior Dance Champions, VIVIAN TUTTON AND GILLES VANASSE, are separated by ten inches—in height. Viv is 5'1" tall, to Gilles' 5'11". These Noranda WC skaters are both 17 years old, and both are brunettes. Gilles has dark hair and eyes. Viv wears her brown hair in a short fluffy style; she has blue eyes and an attractive smile. A resident of Tecumseh, Ont., she attends Noranda Business College where she is in her final year. Viv will put her studies into practice as she plans to work as a secretary later this spring. Gilles, whose home is in Hull, P.Q., is taking a business course also, and he is in Grade 11; he plans to become an accountant. They both competed in singles events in this year's Northern Ontario Championships. Referee for ISU Championships

As is usual in Davos, the organization was excellent, and the ice and weather perfect. Four ISU officials, eight Referees and 26 Judges were present. There were too many entries, especially in the ladies', half of them not yet ready for such a competition. The ladies' compulsory figures were on the whole better than the men's. Hanna Walter won comfortably although her free was weak; she had quite a lead in figures and is reported to have said she left out some difficulties in order to skate a safe performance. Sjoukje Dijkstra's free was the best, while Ina Bauer and Joan Haanappel were a little disappoint-

In general, the men's free skating was very good. Divin, Giletti and Calmat were outstanding, especially Calmat. Ice dancing has improved greatly; however, Doreen Denny & Courtney Jones are in a class by themselves. Kilius & Baumler were very good in winning the pair title; the Russian pair, Nina & Stanislav Zhuk, were

also excellent.

The Jelineks of Canada, who are here at school, gave an excellent exhibition but the culmination of the Championships was a superb interpretation of "The Dying Swan" by the Russian girl, T. Nemcova.

An Unsuitable Compulsory Figure

An extract from "The Kinesiology of Figure Skating"

It is necessary to omit from the regulations of the International Skating Union Three No. 7, "the moon three," since it has a take-off which cannot be carried out. From the description, in existing world literature, as well as from the illustration in the rules of the International Skating Union, it is clear that in the conclusive take-off phase, the take-off leg and the starting leg, skating leg to be, must be turned in such a way that the tips of the legs are directed outwards and the heels are together. When commencing the second part of the "moon" Three No. 7, i.e. when repeating it, the take-off tracing should be a continuation of the arc and the takeoff leg should not be turned, in the takeoff phase, into a position turned less outwards. If we were, however, to use a natural take-off, as in the case of the backward inside Eight No. 4, and this at the moment when starting the second curve,

where for the take-off we turn the tracing leg inwards, then it would not be a case of the "moon" Three figure No. 7, but an ordinary forward outside three. The forward outside three is then contained, according to the rules of the International Skating Union, in the figure No. 8—forward outside three-back inside three.

A skater whose sinews and whose capsular joints of the lower extremity are not extended cannot control the take-off in the Three No. 7. And it is certainly not our desire in sport to make cripples of sportsmen, who in the end would even have difficulty in walking properly.

The bent lower extremity cannot be turned outwards by 90 degrees or even more, as would be necessary for the take-off of the "moon" Three No. 7, but at the most only over half of the given value. The extended lower extremity can even be turned outwards only at a 30° angle.

Another Viewpoint

THE VIEWS of our European friends are welcome and interesting, and even though we may not agree with Dr. Marek's views, it seems a good idea to express them.

It may be remembered that Heaton Robertson, when he was serving as Test Chairman about ten years ago, dropped ISU 7 from our First Test. We usually refer to this figure as "threes to a center" instead of Dr. Marek's term of "the moon Three." The name he gives it sounds so peaceful and beautiful that one might question its appropriateness. Anyway, there was a great deal of opposition to our dropping ISU 7 and Heaton courageously restored it to our test structure a year or so later.

The arguments in favor of this figure stressed the importance of a controlled open hip position, as well as helping to develop moves involving spread eagles. Though the take-off part does not relate closely to any other compulsory figure, it does seem to have considerable value along the lines of free skating moves. Finally, it was argued that as long as the ISU might continue to use this figure as one of those eligible to be drawn in World and International competition, it would seem advisable for us to leave it in our tests.

Olympic Notes



Additional Ticket Information

Sports fans attending the VIII Olympic Winter Games at Squaw Valley, California, will be able to see every skiing and speed-skating event, and a majority of the ice hockey games, for \$5.45 a day on a Season Ticket basis, according to admission prices released by Prentis C. Hale,

Organizing Committee president.

A Valley Season Ticket for the 11 days of activity, Ferbuary 18-28, 1960, will cost \$60 and will enable the bearer to see 15 skating and ski jumping events, 8 speed-skating races, and at least 15 hockey games in addition to the colorful Opening, Closing and Victory Award ceremonies. Daily Valley Tickets are priced at \$7.50. A Valley Season Ticket purchaser will therefore effect a \$2.05 daily saving.

Choice seats will be the Reserved Seat Ice Arena Season Tickets at \$200, plus a limited number of Reserved Loge Seat Ice Arena Season Tickets at \$250. Holders of these Arena tickets will have access to all competitive venues, inside and outside, including ringside seats at the key ice hockey games, the finals of the figure skating events and the Opening, Closing and Victory Award ceremonies. The 11,000 seat Ice Arena will be covered, thereby insuring Arena Season Ticket holders protection from the weather.

More than 10,000 ticket requests had been received by last December by the Organizing Committee. Daily ticket sales will be limited to approximately 30,000—

the Valley's capacity.

Ticket applications may be obtained through the Organizing Committee headquarters, 333 Market Street, San Francisco 5, California.

The Lodge

The new Squaw Valley Lodge, just rebuilt last year, will be used by Olympic officials, staff and press.

Roads and Parking

Four-lane highways will lead to the entrance to the Valley, with a planned six-lane access road taking off the highway and into the Olympic area. Parking for more than 1000 staff and press vehicles and buses will be located right in the Olympic area, with public parking designed to handle 10,000 automobiles located nearby.

Public Housing

Public Housing accommodations for more than 30,000 persons are available within a radius of 40 miles of Squaw Valley. These efforts and facilities will be coordinated by the Housing Committee and Housing Director of the Organizing Committee.



Transportation

Leading United States airlines fly to within a few miles of the Valley. Transcontinental trains stop at Truckee, just 10 miles from the Valley. Bus lines serve the area on regular, daily schedules. Major highways make the area easily accessible by private automobile.

Spectator Centers

Two large public restaurants are planned for the Olympic area. Each of these two unique six-sided buildings will have lounge, first-aid, rest room, restaurant, bar and souvenir shop facilities within its 372-foot (114 m) perimeter.

The Olympic Creed

"The important thing in the Olympic Games is not winning but taking part. The essential thing in life is not conquering but fighting well."—Baron Pierre de Coubertin, founder of the modern Olympic Games.

The Olympic Oath

"We swear that we will take part in these Olympic Games in the true spirit of sportsmanship and that we will respect and abide by the rules which govern them, for the glory of sport and the honour of our country."—Pronounced by the host country's representative for all athletes on opening day.

The Olympic Flag

The Olympic flag, which appeared at Olympic competition for the first time at Antwerp in 1920, has a white background with no border. In the center it has five interlocked rings whose colors are blue, yellow, black, green and red.

Meaning of the Rings

The rings or circles forming the Olympic symbol represent the five major con-

tinents. Linked together they denote the sporting friendship of the peoples of the earth. The colors were chosen because at least one appears in the flag of every nation in the world.

The Olympic Motto

The words, "Citius, Altius, Fortius," which frequently appear under the circles, mean "Swifter, higher, stronger."

Speed Skating Rink

The first artificially refrigerated speed skating rink ever to be used in Olympic competition is being built in Squaw Valley. The 400-meter track is located adjacent to the Ice Arena and is flanked by terraced standing and bleacher areas.

Practice Rinks

In addition to the main rink in the Ice Arena and the speed skating oval, there will be three practice rinks. Two will be located in the main Olympic area next to the Arena and the other will be at the site of the Olympic Village. It will require refrigeration equipment with a 750-ton capacity to maintain these five ice surfaces.

Skating Around the World

Czechoslovakia

The National Championships closed this season's period of competitions in the senior class on January 18. Every year there are three competitions in this category which determine the skaters' ranking. The top lady is Jana Docekalova, the double winner, though former Champion Jindra Kramperova won the National Championship again.

Karol Divin defended his title in a class of eight with a brilliant free skating program. His lively performance sustained the rich contents in smooth harmony

with difficult step combinations.

The pair category has somewhat leveled with the absence of the 1958 European Champions Vera Suchankova & Zdenek Dolezal. There were three or four couples of nearly equal ability which made the pair event the most interesting one of the Championships. Hana Dvorakova & Karel Vosatka won the title. For the first time, an ice dancing competition was announced. The great interest in this aspect of the sport was stimulated by the European Championships in Bratislava last year, and six couples competed.

In February the Novice and Junior Championships were to be held and it was expected that there would be about 20 skaters in each event.—Contributed by

German Democratic Republic (East Ger-

many)

There are four artificial ice rinks in the Republic—at Berlin, Rostock, Erfurt and Karl-Marx-Stadt. This winter another rink will be opened in East Berlin and one in Dresden; in 1960 a rink is planned for Leipzig. The German Democratic Republic Skating Association has about 8000 members and includes hockey, speed skating, curling and figure skating.

National Championships are held annually. Last winter there were competitions between Berlin and Katowice, and also Berlin and Budapest. In November two ladies took part in the Richmond International competition, and later others



competed in the Pokalwettkampf in Warsaw. This winter for the first time East German men entered the European Championships. In March skaters were to exhibit in Prague, Budapest and Warsaw.—

The 1959 Canadian Championships

IT WAS A WONDERFUL EXPERIENCE for me to attend the Canadian Championships held January 29, 30 and 31 in Noranda, P. Q. The skating as a whole was of a very high standard and, combined with the excellent organization, made this, my first Canadians, one of the best champion-

ships I have ever seen.

It is most difficult to comment on the figures from the side. There was, as is always the case in competition, a strong difference of opinion between the knowledgeable and not so knowledgeable spectators, and the judges on the ice. By and large the judges did their job well and must have felt proud to judge such good


The Junior Ladies' free skating was the first event on Friday evening. Janet Carnegie, skating a fast and snappy program, executed some good jumps, only marred by a touch down on a double loop, and fast spins. Lynne Irwin landed a very neat double axel but seemed to be off form on the rest of her double jumps. Joy Barnard, Rosemary Hoeck, Rose Bilyk and Judy Cosby skated sound programs but lacked the difficulty of their competitors. Particularly high jumps and strong skating came from Heather Henderson. Jocelyn Davidson was also a high jumper. Touching down on double loop and double flip were the only errors that spoiled Shirra Kenworthy's really beautiful skating. Wearing a very lovely orange chiffon dress she skated her program in beautiful easy style with very fast footwork and was one of the few skaters to interpret her music. Another excellent young skater, Eleanor McLeod, also used her music very well and executed her program in good style with plenty of speed. After leading in the figures Wendy Griner proved in her excellent free skating what a fine skater she is. She executed double flip, double cherry flip*, axels,

double salchows and fast spins with complete ease. Ability to cover the ice at a good speed and in first rate positions gave her the first place in free skating and the Junior Championship.

The Junior Men's title was won by 13vear-old Donald McPherson who is an outstanding free skater for his age. He opened his program with a beautiful double lutz and went on to land the rest of his double jumps in fine form. He was very fast, maintaining this pace and a good style throughout his difficult program. This young man's potential is terrific. Louis Stong also skated his program well. He has a nice style and landed some very good jumps; although missing his first double flip he did it the second time. He came second in the free and should feel very satisfied. Gilles Vanasse is a very strong skater, although a little rough. He gave us one of the comedy spots of the evening by finishing on his seat and receiving his applause, much to the enjoyment of the spectators, in this unusual finishing position. I wasn't sure whether he would receive higher marks for "Contents" or "Manner" for his unique ending. Bradley Black struck me as being a good skater but he was having an off night.

It must have been difficult to separate the seven entries in the Junior Pairs. The winners, Debbie Wilkes & Guy Revell. were very polished and moved well together with some nice lifts and good footwork. I liked the way they did their program; it was smooth and they maintained an even pace throughout. Jane Sinclair & Larry Rost had some very original moves in their pair. I particularly liked their back spiral into a back camel spin. The Northern Ontario Champions, Gertrude Desjardins & Maurice Lafrance, skated their very smooth pair in excellent style but lacked contents in the form of lifts. Their spirals and shadow skating were a joy to watch. Alexis & Chris Shields had some excellent and original lifts. Their

good program was only marred by a slip in their shadow axels.

The standard of the Senior Ladies' and Senior Men's figures was very high on the whole. Margaret Crosland and Margaret MacDougall skated very good change loops and back bracket-change-brackets, while Donnie Jackson and Eddie Collins

fought neck and neck for first place as each figure progressed. After a very good forward bracket-change-bracket, Eddie Collins came very near to catching Jackson, whose lead was so reduced that the final decision would be made in the free skating.

Saturday night found us in the arena

where the usual high tension prevailed. The ladies were the first to skate and the dreaded first place was drawn by Frances Gold. She was dressed in a gold lamé dress with the skirt made in separate panels so as to give a petalled effect. She opened up with a fine double cherry flip and later did a very powerful double lutz. I thought her a very strong skater and was a little disappointed when she touched down on her double axel, as I had seen her do some very good ones in practice. After falling on her double flip I got the impression that she was suffering from nerves. First is not a very nice place to skate; it can upset the best of skaters and I felt that this is what happened. Beverley Orr skated her program with considerable confidence. Although it was not a difficult program, containing only one double jump, it was skated in a manner such that the "Performance" mark exceeded the "Contents." To me Beverley proved that a simple program really well presented can look much better than a more difficult one skated carelessly. Sonia Snelling has improved considerably since I saw her last year in the Worlds. She was very fast and has a litheness that is most appealing. She landed, to her obvious delight, a very nice double axel and went on to skate her difficult program with speed. Her only slip was a touch down on a double flip. In a beautiful emerald green dress, the defending Champion Margaret Crosland took the ice. Her program was beautifully balanced, she interpreted her music very well and generally had the look of a Champion about her. The slow movement was really beautiful and a complete contrast to the slick footwork that appeared in other parts of her program. Touch downs on her double loop and double flip were entirely overshadowed by the excellence of her performance. Lise Petit is a very strong and powerful skater who did some really high jumps. She skated her difficult program without a mistake and received some very good marks. In a beautiful peach velvet dress Margaret MacDougall presented her really difficult program, making double loops and double flips look a matter of course. She interpreted her music very well and generally had a

formidable program. Judy Weiss skated a very nice solo but missed her double lutz. This young lady is very powerful and a strong jumper, and should prove a strong contender in future. The highlight of the Ladies' free was provided by Sandra Tewkesbury who skated one of the finest free programs that I have ever seen. Apart from the difficulty-double lutz, double flip, double loop and double cherry flip all done with breathtaking ease-her program was most artistically presented. Beautiful positions and movements, slick footwork combined with graceful ballet positions interspersed throughout the program made her four minutes all too short.

Undoubtedly the thrills of the evening were provided by the Senior Men-Donnie Jackson and Eddie Collins. The warmup period was as good as their actual programs. First one would do a breath-taking jump, only to be followed by an equally good jump by the other; and so it went until the Referee blew the whistle. Eddie Collins was first and opened his program with the biggest and highest axel I have ever seen. He is tall and skated his very difficult program with that effortless look that can be obtained from skaters of his height. His style is impeccable and his jumps give the impression that he is flying through the air, quite literally, with the greatest of ease. To try and list his contents would take up too much space; just to say that he had an enormous double axel and lutz, plus all the other orthodox moves and jumps, is sufficient. He was followed by Donnie Jackson whose fantastic jumps are known by everyone. He is fast and very slick, and executed his double jumps and triple salchow with an attack and assurance rarely seen. He did a sequence of fast footwork that made it difficult to see if he was on the ice or just skimming it; that is without trying to see what his feet were doing. With these two men we saw two different types of skating: the elegant stylist Collins and the fast slick wizard Jackson. Both were equally good in their way and I think no one could have argued with the verdict whichever way it went. Jackson by sheer difficulty won the free and the Champion-

The second highlight of the evening

was provided by Barbara Wagner & Bob Paul. Their pair was a joy to watch. I am told it is a completely new program and as well as containing some new lifts, Bob and Barbara did axels, double salchows and double cherry flips together. The five minutes was skated with speed and in beautiful style. It is the finest pair in the world today.

The Junior Dance Championship was won by a pair from Noranda's home club. Vivian Tutton & Gilles Vanasse skated with both speed and strength, very neat and correct footwork combined with the rhythm that is so much of dancing. Their compulsory dances were skated in great style and a very nice free dance clinched the verdict. I was a little surprised at the sometimes sloppy footwork and even wrong steps in the compulsory dances by some of the couples. It seemed to me that "open" three turns and indefinite edges were the order of the day as far as some competitors were concerned.

The Senior Dance Championship was dominated and won by Geraldine Fenton & William McLachlan. They were by far the best in the compulsory dances and I particularly liked their Westminster Waltz.
