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
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
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

The United States Championships

THE DATE WAS JANUARY 28, 1960. The place, the Civic Ice Arena in Seattle, reverberating with the din of rapt anticipation. The time, long awaited, had come.

"Ladies and Gentlemen, Greater Seattle and Seattle Skating Club are proud and pleased to present the 1960 United States Figure Skating Championships." Thus, with a resounding fanfare from the organ, the Nationals were officially opened, heralded by an impressive innovation in Nationals ceremony, the Pageant of Flags. An august color guard of fifty-four stately and dignified Boy Scouts presented the National Colors and the flags of our fifty states, fashioning a portal through which the contestants were presented. Denoting the added nation-wide significance of this year's event because of the Olympic Team selections, and reflecting an aura of ebullience ever-present through the preparation and execution of the competitions, the ritual bore a hint of Olympics-like pomp and ceremony despite the absence of some of the skaters from the presentation.

The four-day event was crammed with activity. The skaters devoured the too-little practice time as did the observers the too-few samples of coming performance. The joy of renewing acquaintances and the expectancy of a great competition prevailed over the ever-present minority of complaints; but the real Gremlin of the affair, an ominous virus, hovered near—just waiting.

Climax of the many social affairs was a dinner dance held for all participants at the Washington Athletic Club, marking the final curtain of a successful competition and the opening curtain for the newly chosen Olympic Games team members, slated to leave at once for Squaw Valley.

Three thrill-packed evenings concluded with the presentation of the Harned Trophy for team championship to the Broadmoor Skating Club of Colorado Springs, Colorado, with an amassed 48 points. Second with 42 each were The

Skating Club of Boston and The Skating Club of New York.

The Novice Ladies' division provided an electrifying opener, each of the contestants showing remarkable accomplishment. At the close of the compulsory figures, the field was led substantially by pert Carol Stephanie Noir, with Constance Brewster and Valerie Hvatum in second and third places. A real artisan, Carol easily held first position with an amazingly sure, though difficult, program. With startling free style programs, pretty Ellen Kullmann and petite Myrna Gail Bodek, youngest contender, moved from sixth and seventh to win second and third honors. Ellen is a charming and graceful performer and skated with stunning artistry. Myrna's program displayed an effervescence that completely dazzled the crowd. Eloise Morgan did a notable job which elevated her from eighth place to fourth in the final placements.

The Junior Pair event was won by Laurie & William Hickox with a polished and interesting program, closely contested by the enchanting pair from Chicago, Vivian & Ronald Joseph. Third place honors went to smooth-skating Mary Joan McGrath & Jeff Flowers.

Bob Madden, an ambitious 14-year-old from Tacoma, took an imposing lead in the compulsory figures and was able to substantiate the triumph with a well-executed free program to become 1960 Novice Men's Champion. To round out an exhilarating evening, Bobby Mecay bounced back from a bout with a high temperature to present a remarkable exhibition that moved him from third to second place in a close race with Walter Hypes, who also rendered a sound, splendid performance.

The culmination of the Junior Men's event on Friday night was an agonizing three-way tie in ordinal points between Douglas Ramsay, Bruce Heiss and Frank Carroll. None of the skaters having a

majority of first-place votes, Douglas Ramsay won a slim victory on subsequent majority, with a dazzling free style that rated him a first from the cheering crowd if not from the judges. Bruce, placing fourth after compulsory figures, shot to second place with his sensational style and artistry in free skating. Top free style performance of Frank Carroll charmed the audience and elevated him from fifth place to third in the final standing, while Tommy DeBaca skidded from the first place to a disappointing sixth. The difficult judging and the high calibre of ability made this event an outstanding one.

Highlighting the Senior Pair event, Champions Nancy & Ronald Ludington once again proved their unequivocal mastery of pair skating with their sensational lifts; their striking synchronization; their overwhelming strength, skill and daring. Winning a tantalizingly close race for second place was the accomplished team of Maribel Owen & Dudley Richards with a stellar performance of their impressive program. Ila Ray & Ray Hadley, Jr. demonstrated their prowess and technique in a difficult and imaginative number, skated well and in virtually flawless unison, to earn the much-coveted third spot on the World and Olympic Teams.

There was a new high in interest evident in Senior Ladies' compulsory figures, an event which left Carol Heiss with an enviable five ordinal points and Laurence Owen and Barbara Ann Roles with 12½ each. The successful defense of her title a foregone conclusion, Carol retained supremacy with a superb program and a perfect final ordinal score of five. Carol was a vision in a resplendent black costume, and though perhaps a bit tired, kept the capacity crowd enraptured as evidenced by the anguished murmur over her single falter on a double Salchow and ecstatic clamor after her ever-popular reverse axels.

The ovation of the evening, however, was awarded to Barbara Ann Roles for a scintillating performance of an ambitious program lavish with artistic moves and interspersed with sensational jumps and spins. The judges, though less generous

than the crowd, granted her a second berth, with 12 ordinals. Laurence followed closely with 13 ordinals, proving her appeal to be profound and her abilities bountiful.

Stephanie Westerfeld made a bold challenge, entering the senior division in the final hours and skating a creditable fourth place. It was vastly disappointing that Nancy Heiss was unable to participate.

In the Junior Ladies' event touching off the final night, the entire field of eight was a delight to the audience, a study in grace and beauty. Karen Howland had taken the lead in figures and with a most unusual composition of bold technique and graceful artistry came to a decisive win in the fray. In a fierce encounter for second place between Vicky Fisher and Rhode Lee Michelson, the favorite Rhode was victorious with her extravagant repertoire of electrifying jumps and spectacular spins. Vicky held her third place with a charming program while Lorraine Hanlon slipped from second to fourth despite a creditable display of polish and style. An imposing line of charmers in this stepping-stone event, these talented eight provide a real promise for the future.

In the initial round on Saturday, seven Silver Dance teams were eliminated from a worthy field. Patricia & Robert Dineen held their first place in the final round with their smooth and stylish performance, followed by versatile Ila Ray & Ray Hadley, Jr. Dorothyann Nelson & Pieter Kollen won a third place victory and enthusiastic plaudits for gallantry after a collision during Friday night's practice session hospitalized Dorothyann with a painful injury.

Always a high point in competitions, the Dance Championship won rounds of applause from the appreciative spectators. 1959 runners-up Margie Ackles & Charles Phillips, looking like royalty in regal wine costumes, won top laurels with a majestic free dance program that was both intricate and smooth, worthy of royalty and a repeated perfect five ordinal points. In second place with 10 ordinals were dapper Marilyn Meeker & Larry Pierce, whose chic free dance was provocative and

imaginative. Edging out Thomasine Pierce & Roy Speeg to move into third spot with 17 ordinals was the comely and highly popular team of Yvonne Littlefield &

Roger Campbell.

In a thrilling climax to the four-day event, the Senior Men's aggregation enthralled the already empathy-exhausted audience who rocked the rafters in appreciation of the top-flight presentations. Execution of the exacting compulsory figures left Tim Brown once again with a three ordinal edge over David Jenkins, and Robert Brewer and Bradley Lord on the third and fourth rungs. However, David's supremacy is virtually impregnable and he once again proved his eminence in free skating and dissolved Brown's figure lead with his dynamic program, including two triples, so nearly perfectly executed that no judge rated him lower than a 5.8, with one judge awarding a 5.9 in both content and performance.

Becoming a perennial runner-up, Tim Brown proved his mettle with a sensational program of true championship calibre skated with charm and mastery, constantly interrupted by thunderous applause from the approving crowd. As in similar contention in 1959, Robert Brewer and Bradley Lord tangled in an arduous foray for the fervently sought third seat on the Olympic Team, to the tune of a 19 ordinal point tie. Even with the more spectacular free skating demonstration, Lord lost to the figure leader by .94 in total points. Gregory Kelley, 1959 Junior Champion, drew a full measure of response with a good showing in this higher division.

If Carol had to share accolades with Barbara Ann on Friday night, the audience was in her pocket exclusively on Saturday when the Champion gave a dazzling exhibition to thousands of Seattlites, newly awakened to the splendor and stimulation of figure skating. Lured by the provocation of widely-televised segments of the skating of compulsory figures and prior performances, crowds of the uninitiated thronged to share the elation and melodrama of the contention for national honors and berths on the World and Olympic Teams. Unprecedented

newspaper coverage kept cadence with the pulse of a potpourri of skating hopefuls, enthusiastic devotees and rapt observers.

These were the 1960 Championships—the culmination of years of dedication to the rigors of training and to the perfection of the rudiments;—the consummation of dreams and aspirations;—and for the 1960 United States Olympic Team, the embarkation.

The Olympics: 1956

THE VIITH WINTER OLYMPIC GAMES Opening Ceremonies created a day full of pageantry and color. The morning of January 26 dawned clear and bright, and a true Alpine sun shone on the new Stadium and on the flag-bedecked streets of Cortina, Italy. The U. S. skaters donned their official Olympic uniforms for the first time—snow white jackets, blue ski trousers, and red hats, in the colors of our National flag.

The men skated the first two figures, starting at 7:30 on a morning cold and damp, without benefit of sunshine and with electric lights burning. The ice was marvelous, excellent for turns, and there was no wind. As World Champion, the pressure was on Hayes Jenkins' shoulders; he appeared nervous on his first figure and received a 3.8 from the Australian judge for the counter. He recovered on the second figure like a champion, and skated a fine double-three-change-double-three. From this point the U. S. men were nip and tuck with first one and then the other gaining a slight advantage in marks. The sun came out around noon and the last three figures were skated under almost perfect conditions. At the end of the figures, Hayes was first, with Ronnie a very close second, and David only slightly behind in third place. It was really a competition among the U. S. boys.

The ladies' competition was over-shadowed by Tenley's accident. Two days after the U.S. Team arrived in Cortina, during a practice session, Tenley was skating backwards at a high rate of speed and caught her right blade in a rut. As she fell, the heel of the left skate blade hit her right ankle joint with force, penetrating three layers of boot and the blunt blade cut through a large vein and coursed obliquely downward, scraping the bone severely. She remained in bed for 48 hours until her father, Dr. Albright, arrived by plane; he strapped the lower leg and ankle joint and got her up immediately to prevent the leg muscles from becoming softened. The next day Tenley returned to the ice, and from then on skated figures daily.

The ladies' first figure was skated in a heavy snowstorm, so dense that it was almost impossible for the judges to examine the tracings during this figure, the forward inside counter. The snowfall diminished during the second figure and had stopped before the third figure was skated. After the first three figures, Tenley appeared to have won the first two and Carol Heiss the third. The remaining two figures were skated the next morning; although it was cold and damp, there was no snowfall. At the end of five figures, Tenley's lead was fractional, setting up a situation for a terrific free Tenley had 13 skating competition. ordinals (nine of 11 first places) and 1070.7 points; Carol had 201/2 ordinals and 1055.7 points. Ingrid Wendl of Austria was third with 39 ordinals and 1006.1 points.

For the men's free skating, the weather continued cold and the sun was unable to warm the day or soften the ice. As a result, the ice was as hard as steel, so brittle and flint-like that it handicapped the skaters by injecting an unnatural caution into their programs. David told me that the sun on the ice was very bad as the glare made it hard to tell where the ice was when landing a jump—half the ice was in shadow and half in the sun. David did not skate his best, for he fell twice; he probably suffered more from the ice conditions than the others due to the powerful way that he goes into his jumps. On his triple loop, he could not quite hold the finishing edge and fell, very briefly, after a perfect landing; he did everything else perfectly, and received good marks for an easy third place. Charles Snelling seemed to outdo himself; he had a fine program and skated it extremely well. Karel Divin has good form and flow, and Michael Booker has improved a lot since I saw him in the 1953 Worlds.

The real battle was between Ronnie and Hayes, and I never felt such a strain; everyone was exhausted from it. Ronnie came on the ice smiling and skated a fine program, doing everything perfectly. He

had marvelous jumps and spins which amazed the crowd, but not elaborate connecting steps. His was a dramatic program, full of real showmanship, and several of his highlights, such as the "crawl" into a sit spin, drew a tremendous ovation. He received very high marks and won the free skating, with six first places.

Haves had terrific pressure on him to hold his first place. He looked calm and the perfect gentleman and sportsman he has shown himself throughout. He started in a restrained manner, a little tense in his first few jumps. But then he steadied down and really cut loose, going all out with confidence. It is the general consensus among European critics that there has not been such an athletic and artistic skater since Gillis Grafstrom. He went back to his 1953 music, "Scheherazade," which suits him and his polished rhythmic style. It seemed to me that his program was a masterpiece, with plenty of jumps and spins beautifully blended with fascinating and surprising connecting steps. After the marks were calculated, Hayes had won his biggest victory, the Olympic Competition, and the United States' first Gold Medal of the 1956 Winter Games.

In the ladies' free skating, Tenley skated a beautifully finished program, just as artistic and rhythmic as possible, to a Jacques Offenbach medley. Dressed in dark rose, she seemed poised and confident. Skating beautifully, she covered the ice with artistic flow and motion, with intricate connecting steps between tremendous jumps and spins. Only after landing the double loop did she falter—a landing made on the gashed right leg. The ovation from the 8000 spectators was long and vociferous as she finished.

Carol Heiss, dressed in aquamarine with a sequin cap, skated with daring and appeal. Fast, and with complete assurance, she performed an intricate program, and faltered only on one double jump. At the conclusion cheers rang throughout the stadium. Ingrid Wendl of Austria skated very rhythmically as did Rose Pettinger and Sjoukje Dijkstra. Ann Johnston never skated better, nor did Carole Pachl. Catherine Machado performed splendidly; she is a fine showman and skated with dash and good form,

pulling up two places with her excellent free. When the marks were up Tenley had won the Ladies' title, and made history in becoming the first United States Lady Olympic Champion. Free skating marks gave her 795.7 points to 794 for Carol Heiss. Catherine Machado received 758.9 points for third in the free skating phase, ahead of the Austrian girls in fourth and fifth positions.

The pairs drew a day that was cold and windy, but sunny. The U. S. pairs both were excellent and much improved over last year. Carole Ormaca and Robin Greiner are very graceful and skated well throughout except for one slip. Lucille Ash and Sully Kothman were striking in bright blue and gave a fine per-

formance.

The European Champions, Sissy Schwarz and Kurt Oppelt, have a program which I liked very much, but many did not. It did not seem to have as much variety nor seem as spectacular as ours; however, several European critics claimed that the two U. S. pairs and Frances Dafoe and Norris Bowden violated the ISU pair rules on lifts. The Nagys, who skated sixth, had less grace and flow, skating with more effort, but they had a good program. The World Champions, Frances Dafoe, dressed in a beautiful shade of aquamarine, and Norrie Bowden, in black, to me were splendid. They have many unusual lifts and deserve credit for their originality. They had an unfortunate break at the end of their program when Frannie faltered slightly on a lift, but recovered quickly. They lost to Schwarz-Oppelt by a hair and failed to gain the Olympic title.

The German pair, Marika Kilius and Franz Ningel, gave a dashing performance, but the crowd objected to the judges' marks, feeling they were too low. They threw oranges at the judges and referee; the ice was cleared three times and still the oranges fell and people booed and screamed. Young Marika is 12 years old while her partner is 19 but looks younger. Barbara Wagner, dressed in bright red, and Bob Paul, who followed the Germans, skated well despite the strain of waiting during the uproar. They looked extremely well together, in a close

knit performance, although their pair was not as spectacular as some of the others; they well deserved their sixth

place.

At the Closing Ceremony on February 4 the flagbearers of the competing nations marched into the Stadium, with Norris Bowden carrying the flag of Canada, as he did in the Opening Ceremonies. The President of the IOC pronounced the closing words, the band played the Olympic Hymn, and then the Olympic Flag was lowered and the Olympic Flame extinguished, followed by a salute of five guns. As the VIIth Winter Olympic Games became history, our thoughts instinctively jumped to the future: "Now for 1960 and Squaw Valley."

Jeanwork Helps

Social ice dancing can be so much fun and contain so many benefits to the adult skater that ways and means of making it more interesting to a larger number of people are ever sought. Many of us feel that the greatest improvement in ice dancing is achieved via the group lesson.

Even though a few adult skaters are taking individual lessons in figures and dancing, the greater number of social ice dancers simply come to the senior session and continue to skate the dances in the same way, secure in their knowledge that they are doing the numbered steps correctly, and unaware that there are ways in which they can make the dance easier for their partners and, incidentally, make themselves much more popular. We note that after a lesson, for instance, in the proper way to navigate the choctaw in the Blues—with a partner, showing clearly how not to as well as how to hold the shoulders-much more cooperation is shown between the sexes in working out the various problems involved in this intricacy.

It seems perfectly natural that the man should blame all the errors on his lady partner, and also that the lady should feel that it is all the man's fault. After the group lesson, however, each is ready to believe that he (or she) could be at fault, and various couples are noted skating around the rink, amicably discussing the evening's special effort.

Our professional chooses one aspect of one dance to dwell upon at length for our group. Usually this is on a universal fault which he has observed in most of the skaters. He gives us a half-hour lesson in which there is explanation, demonstration, and then imitation by all.

Seventy Years on Ice

Montreal Silver Blades Skaters

Last November, the Montreal Silver Blades Skaters gave a party in honor of J. Thorold Smith, commemorating his 70th skating season. At this gathering attended by his fellow club members and friends, he was presented with an engraved silver tray.

Mr. Smith, who reached his 75th birthday in February, donned skates when he was five years old. Born near Napanee, Ontario, he skated in his early years between Kingston and Belleville. At the age of six, he shared his pair of strap-on wooden skates with his brother who was one year his junior, each wearing one skate to propel themselves across the ice.

By 1906, having learned to "straight" skate, he decided that skating to music and with the ladies gave more pleasure than looking at the shore line, so he took up ice dancing and learned the Waltz and Tenstep, which were in vogue then. A Montreal resident, he attended sessions at the old Victoria rink. Mr. Smith took his figure skates with him when he moved to Vancouver in 1910; he joined the Vancouver Skating Club and danced with the ladies on the West Coast.

In 1914 he returned to Montreal and rejoined the Victoria Skating Club, becoming its President in 1920. After the sale of the rink, he skated outdoors at the Montreal AAA in Westmount, with the figure skating section. While skating there, he met some of the persons who were present at his 70th skating anniversary; they admired his skating skill, popularity, and dancing ability. It was only natural that, when the Montreal Figure Skating Club was formed, he became one of the cofounders; he remained a Director for many years.

In the late 1930's he joined the Montreal Winter Club and also became a Director of this club. When the Winter Club was sold and skating activities transferred to

the Montreal Badminton and Squash Club, he stayed a very active participant.

Later the senior members of the Montreal Figure Skating Club and some ex-Winter Club members felt the necessity for a "senior club" in Montreal. Mr. Smith became one of the pioneer organizers of the Montreal Silver Blades Skaters and continues to be a loyal supporter of this group. In addition to the Silver Blades Skaters, he still belongs to the Montreal and Verdun Figure Skating Clubs and, for many years, has been a member of the St. Hyacinthe Figure Skating Club.

Mr. Smith is both a figure and dance judge and, no matter how bad the weather or how tired he may seem, he is the first to volunteer when judging services are

required.

Hints from the Dance Judges

As a sequel to "Hints from the Figure Judges," Dance Test Judges also were queried as to their impressions of the most prevalent faults which they observed while judging dance test candidates, and here are some of their answers.

From recent dance judging experience, common faults observed in Bronze and Pre Silver Dances include:

Music Interpretation: There is far too much concentration on what the feet are doing, and not enough feeling of rhythm and expression of the light manner of dancing . . . spotty timing, especially during the execution of the 2-1 beat part of a progressive sequence (Steps 9, 10, and 20, 21 of the Willow Waltz). I have often seen these steps skated at 11/2-11/2 beats, thus eliminating the lilt the 2-1 beat action gives. A similar error is often committed during the execution of the mohawk in the Fiesta Tango: The 1-1 beat turn is skated at 2-2 beats, omitting the fast motion at that point, and also disrupting the timing for the remainder of the dance.

Form and Unison: Heads droop. There is leaning forward above the waist, uncontrolled bent free leg, and the free foot is lifted too high off ice during the execution of the second step of a chassé sequence (probably to convince judges that two feet are not on the ice). In closed and open positions, the man's right hand is not maintaining a steady position on his partner's back; the lady's right arm and man's left arm are bent close to the body, or pulling and pushing to and from the body; the lady's left hand is nearly on the back of the partner's neck; and the partners are too far apart.

Good unison, which is obtained by continuous practice with one partner, is a rarity at Bronze and Pre Silver Dance

Tests. This, in my opinion, is because many lady candidates are obliged to take their tests with partners with whom they have seldom skated. The most common errors I have seen in Unison are: free legs not matching in motion; employed legs not matching in length of stride or depth of knee bend; and lack of parallel rotation of shoulders.

Technique: Prevalent faults include incorrect timing before stroking the edge very common in the execution of a progressive sequence, in which a candidate will actually run the first and second steps around on very nearly a 90 degree axis, leaving no room on the same dance lobe to complete the third and longer step and still adhere to the pattern. Also the lady's LFO of the Fourteenstep mohawk more often than not is a definite LFI or flat. There is failure to complete one edge before starting the next, thus causing toe pushes, wide take-offs, and deviation from pattern . . . failure to complete the edge before a mohawk, thereby causing the turn to be executed in an unbalanced, shaky manner . . . and lunging forward above the waist when executing a forward three turn, producing an off-balanced, uncontrolled edge after the turn—Alfred M. McCullagh, Rye FSC.

The opening steps of the dance frequently show lack of planning or thought. In some cases in the Fourteenstep we have seen seven steps in place of the five allowed. In many instances in other dances, the opening steps make the skater start on the weak beat or the weak measure and, in some extreme cases, even the middle of the measure. This fault is frequently found in skaters from smaller clubs where little attention is given to the fundamentals of dancing.

In the Preliminary Dances, chassé and progressive steps are frequently reversed in the Dutch Waltz and the Swing Dance.

This is easy to do, as many people feel like doing a chassé to waltz time.

The most common faults in the higher dances seem to be timing and incorrect edges or flats.—George Brusin, Sun Valley FSC.

** Common faults observed while judging Bronze and Silver Dance Tests:

Bronze: 1. Improper timing between the skater and the music. 2. Lack of knee bend and smoothness in knee bend. 3. There should be smooth stepping at this level, but quite a bit of jerky stepping is seen.

Pre Silver and Silver: 1. Lack of smooth shoulder rotation and control of this rotation. 2. Pointing of the toe should have been started in the Bronze dances and improved here. 3. Lack of good lean. 4. Lack of continuous flow of free leg, especially on rolls where the free leg flows from the beginning to the end of the roll. 5. Lack of good body positions, including the arms and hands.—Mrs. R. A. Rasmussen, Buffalo SC.

"Most of the faults which I observed in judging dance tests seemed to stem from the fact that the candidates were dancing before they were able to skate. Examples: missed timing on mohawks, lack of control on threes resulting in partner problems or rushed steps after the move, wide stepping and lack of control after push-offs. These faults seem to be the most common and, as the dancer improves and becomes a better skater, these faults seem to disappear, and music expression shows in the dancing.—Frederick W. Amery, Broadmoor SC.

** Common faults observed were:

1. Failure to skate on the music, loss of timing.

2. Lack of accuracy: (a) not on the right edges; (b) incorrect mohawks not open when so specified.

Beginning skaters only get the sense of timing by skating on the beat of the music, and here again practice and working with older skaters and professionals is the answer for preparation for dance tests. It is believed that near the end of

the season some take dance tests when they are not really ready for them.—ARTHUR R. HOUSER, St. Louis SC.

** PRELIMINARY DANCE: Poor timing was the only fault common to most test candidates that I observed from my short judging experience. This may have been due, in a large number of cases, to the skater's inability to hold the proper edge for the full number of beats.

Bronze Dance: Lack of proper timing shows up here, too, as well as lack of appropriate musical expression. Many times, technique on three turns and mohawks is an obvious fault of Bronze dancers.—Marilyn E. Perl, St. Moritz ISC.

"One prevalent fault is the lack of good dance expression—there is purely mechanical and technically correct skating which, to my mind, is not dancing. Each dance has its own distinctive characteristics and, in Silver, Pre Gold and especially in Gold, I think the skater should demonstrate these to a degree well above average. I think that being technically correct is all well and good and we expect it of our better dancers; however, I feel in overemphasizing the techniques we are, in many instances, losing the real feeling of the dance.

Secondly, in dances of Bronze and Pre Silver standard, there are many scraped three turns, mohawks, etc., weak back edges, and poor transitions. All these faults can be worked out nicely on a patch, utilizing all the figures of the First Test. If daily patch work is put into practice, I think we would see many better turns, etc., executed by our novice skaters. Instead of just coming down for the dance session, why not come earlier and work on your basic edges and turns? I am certain, in time, the results will be most rewarding.—MARY Ross, *Rye FSC*.



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
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
