

# Background to the Blues

by MURIEL KAY Professional

ONE OF THE MOST FREQUENTLY HEARD criticisms of the high test and competitive dancers is that there is a general lack of interpretation and variety of expression between one dance and another. A basic, smooth, controlled, and flowing movement is desirable in all the dances, but this movement, combinations of stepsdance sequences, can be ably demonstrated without any music at all. Dance steps skated harmoniously to music demand the interpretation of that music and its mood. Each dance has its own distinctive rhythmic pattern and the melody and harmony set the mood. From the combination of these two main factors stems the character of the dance itself. The stronger the characteristics of a dance the more evident is lack of expression, and an understanding and insight into the gradual evolution of the music of a dance should ultimately lead to better interpretation.

At first the blues was a wordless musical call from one Negro to another as they worked in the fields and plantations of the southern United States. The tribes had been purposely split up to prevent any gathering together, and so the Negro was often without any means of communication with his neighbor except through song. He was also without his drum, and these calls, intensely rhythmic, provided a compensating rhythmic outlet.

Most of the slaves sent to the U.S. were from West Africa where the music was based upon the pentatonic scale, having five notes within the compass of the octave, whole steps (3 major seconds) and one-and-a-half steps (2 minor thirds), in comparison with the Western diatonic scale with its semi-tones between steps 3 and 4, and 7 and 8. To the Western people today Oriental music sounds strange and different, so it is not surprising that to the Negro on coming into contact with Western music the semi-tone steps sounded like wrong notes or possibly didn't even

register in his mind at all. As he tried to sing the white man's songs the semi-tones either disappeared entirely, or what we know as the thirds and sevenths of the major scale became altered—flattened to flat thirds and sevenths, and these later became known as the "blue notes," and give the blues its characteristic melodic flavor. It is often difficult to tell whether unaccompanied blues songs are in a major or minor key.

The basic blues-form is simple and repetitive. It usually has a three-line stanza and a 12-bar construction, thereby differing from the standard 16-bar form. In the early songs the rhyming scheme was usually A, A, A, and the vocal part of the phrase often ended before the melody, leaving the accompanying instrument to improvise the remaining bars. This was the beginning of the "Break," which has played an important part in the growth and development of jazz. Most blues are in 4/4 time.

Many different environmental factors contributed to the blues. It is a fusion of tribal chant and spiritual, gospel song and devil song, street funeral march and Creole folk song. The spontaneous expression of the daily trials of a socially and economically oppressed people. A relief from tensions for a people whose very life had been inseparable from rhythm for centuries. A predominantly emotional and realistic people. There were work songs, prison songs, chain gang songs with the insistent beat of the hammer running through them; songs of love and lost love; of despair, of pain, of hope. Much more than the popular conception of the dusky singer in the smoke-laden night club, the blues are a way of life.

And so the blues found its way from the sad solitary call spread by the wandering guitar player and roustabouts to small groups of street musicians and minstrel shows, to the bands and big bands with which we are now familiar. Out of this complex pattern evolved the blues, which I heard most eloquently described recently by a colored singer as "The Mother of the Sorrows of Jazz."

So this is the background of the Blues. The slow tempo and strongly curving edges present the ice dancer with an almost unique opportunity to demonstrate the best of pure dance movement. Unfortunately the Blues often degenerates into nothing more than just another dance of the Foxtrot group skated a little slower than the rest. Perhaps the lack of expression and interpretation arises from the prevailing idea that the Blues is essentially sexy, and to the inhibited West-

erner something rather vulgar and certainly not quite nice to be seen in public—and at an ice rink! But pure art is never vulgar, and there are certainly many degrees of refinement from tribal dance to the Blues on ice still leaving room for it to be performed with real expression without becoming an entirely anaemic relation of its ancestor.

Although the dance should appear lazy, this is an end only achieved by hard work. It does not mean careless, untidy footwork and sagging body position, but a completely relaxed movement from a supple knee and pliable body positions, demanding a high degree of control, in complete harmony with the music.

# Comments from a Competitor-Judge

NOT ONLY AM I ACTIVE in all phases of competitive skating, but I am a figure and dance judge as well. Therefore, I want to write about my reactions as a figure judge and my feelings toward figure and free skating judging in general.

In order to become a figure judge, I agree completely with the extensive trial judging required, except in very special instances. I was called upon to trial judge what, at the time, seemed like endless tests before my appointment came through. However, I realize now this really helped me to become (I hope!) a good judge.

I found that having passed the tests myself made me too hard on the candidates at the beginning of my trial judging, but as time went by I realized that a First Test can't come anywhere near an Eighth Test in standard. (I think that's when I finally got my figure test appointment.) I certainly feel that someone who has skated figures is much better qualified to be a good judge, on the whole, than a person who has never skated figures.

In free skating it is terribly important to those of us who compete, that every judge knows the name and, especially, the difficulty of each jump. For instance, that the difficulty between a double toe loop and a double flip is enormous.

Judging free skating is not like judging a swimming race where the first one to the finish line wins. In a free skating program one, two, or even three skaters may have almost identical tricks. But one will have the best flow, music interpretation, and the most gracefully executed jumps, spins and steps. There should be sufficient spread in the marks under these conditions so that the best one has a chance to pull up.

Things which I feel important are: Holding landing positions; finishing out dance steps; ending spins with proper finish; skating precisely to the music. There are other factors which I have not mentioned, but I feel that these are some of the things which should be marked up in manner of performance scores.

It is terribly difficult to judge accurately when you see a program only once; you must see and evaluate so much in such a brief period of time. I hope soon that some method can be found where the judges can first learn to know the program, and then be able to concentrate on the skater's performance. I feel this would be a real step forward for all of us.

# Publications, Publicity and Policies

What happens when skaters come off the ice? A few of their activities were touched upon in the Club Operation Survey Questionnaire.

The first topic: Does the club publish a News Letter? Forty out of the 90 clubs returning the questionnaire said that they did put out a bulletin of one kind or another. About 35% of these bulletins were obviously of a formal nature as they are published monthly. Others seem to be more impromptu as they are published "ad lib," "spasmodically," "as needed," or "whenever news is considered of general interest."

A more individual question was what the clubs named their papers. Here are some of the replies: Tracing Talk, Anyone for Skating?, Inside Edge, Skating Blade, Off-the-Ice, Ice Shavings, The Figure 8, Chips, On Your Edges, The Beacon, Essex Edges, Gay Blades, etc.

Does the club publish brochures or informational pamphlets for its members? Clubs were about evenly divided as to whether they do or do not do this. The question, "Does it put out some literature for prospective members?" brought a slightly different response with 56% of the clubs replying yes.

Does the club seek publicity in local news media? Almost 80% of the clubs do try to publicize their sport and activities. In answer to which methods have proven most successful, the overwhelming number—four-fifths—said that newspaper publicity has been most advantageous, while the remainder had been successful with radio and television coverage.

Money matters are close to the functioning heart of a club. Some of the subjects coming under this category are insurance, taxes, and budgets. Do clubs carry public liability policies? Only 35% of the clubs do. Do they have a medical payment policy covering treatment of injuries suffered by members at scheduled sessions? Very few do this—14%. When queried whether experience indicated that such forms of insurance are desirable or necessary, a third of the clubs felt they were.

Then that inescapable subject: taxes. Is the club exempt from income taxes? Almost all—92%—are exempt. Do they have exemption from Federal Excise Taxes on dues and skating fees? Most clubs do: 87%.

In the budget vein, clubs were asked if they prepare annual operating budgets. Two-thirds of them do. The other one-third use different methods of estimating anticipated income and expenses in advance of each season. What method of fiscal control has been found to be satisfactory? About a third of the clubs filled in this blank; among the methods mentioned were: budget, audit, Board, Treasurer, membership, bookkeeper, and committee.

Are periodic audits of the club's books made and by what methods? About three-quarters of the clubs have audits. The methods used include Certified Public Accountant, Treasurer, Vice-President and President, officers, Board of Governors, financial report, committee, bank, associates, etc.

Another monetary question centered about carnivals: Are they successful financially? Forty out of the 47 clubs answering this said they did make money. Another carnival query was: Does the club hold an annual carnival? Fifty-eight per cent of the clubs reporting said they do, but only four clubs reported holding several shows a year.

# HINTS FROM COMPETITORS

THE SKATER'S BLADES are the most sensitive and important part of a skater's equipment. Through proper care and attention, you can insure a long life of dependability and service for your blades. For those who skate most of the year, the average life of a free skating blade is one to two years. It is two to three years for a figure blade. (This is assuming your feet and boot size don't change and also depends upon the number of times the blades are sharpened.)

Unfortunately, the most important factor in the longevity and the service of a blade is the most frequently neglected. Blades are made for performance on ice and not (as some skaters think) for walking on wood, carpets, cement, or other foreign objects. At all times, when not using your blades for the purpose for which they were designed, i.e., skating—be sure to protect them with a pair of guards. Most skaters will agree that rubber guards offer greater protection without dulling the blades.

Nicks along with rust are a blade's worst enemy. Out of necessity, our family has created a protective blade covering made of terry cloth which helps to prevent nicks while travelling or while our skates are being jostled around in our lockers. These terry cloth covers also absorb any drops of moisture which might have been missed in the wiping of the blades. This brings up the point that whenever you take off your skates, be sure to wipe your blades immediately and thoroughly. This is just common sense rule # 1. And then, be sure not to put your guards on again, for you will just be defeating the purpose of wiping your blades; your wet guards will hold the moisture on your blades, which multiplies the chances for rust.

I would like to correct one of the most common fallacies concerning blades. Occasionally, when your guards are not at hand, it will become necessary to walk on your blades. In this instance, I have heard so many people say, "Walk on your toe picks and save your blades." It would seem to me that, since it is very difficult to sharpen dull toe picks and much easier to sharpen blades, the rule should be "Walk on your blades and save your toe picks" (which are so vital for jumps and spins). This rule would not hold true for figure blades where the toe picks are not used.

I'm sure every skater knows these few simple measures concerning blade care. My point is that they should be practiced as well as preached.—Monty Hoyt, *Broadmoor SC*.

THE KEY WORD TO PAIR SKATING is togetherness. However, there is a third party—the professional—who is the brain behind the pair, who works and instructs us in all our movements.

Pair skating is not just two soloists on the ice surface, but two skaters who look as one. The program should contain difficult maneuvers and lifts, but be free and easy in appearance. Music interpretation is a "must," and both partners should be able to "feel" the music they are skating to. Always remember to smile and keep your head up and enjoy what you are doing. If it isn't enjoyable, you shouldn't be out there. If it is, show it, and any spectators will react accordingly.

The girl must learn to let her partner "wear the pants." By this, I mean she should do what he asks without putting up a fuss. In a perfect pair the boy leads and the girl follows, and all energy and time should be directed toward perfecting the pair and not in petty arguments.

The boy is not the only one who should do exercises to build up his muscles; so should the girl. There are various exercises that will enable you to straighten your elbows from the very beginning of the lift to the very height of it, and then to return to the ice with a smooth, continuous flow.

The most enjoyable part of pairs is dieting? (Ugh!) Everything that tastes good is fattening and weight building, and with hours of hard work for perfection your stomach begins to growl for that

dreaded word "food." Thus, the inner

fight begins.

However, when your aim is the top, all these things, plus hard work and a few sacrifices, will be worth-while if that goal can be reached; or even if in the attempt to reach it, I know I have done all I could do, to the best of my ability.—Linda Ann Ward, Galt FSC.

An important thing to remember when pair skating is not to compete with each other but work together to accomplish your goal. The boy should take a back seat and should show the girl off.

Remember not to stray away from pair moves. Read your *Rulebook!* If you separate then both do the same steps,

jumps, or spins.

In competing I believe the only thing that will help is experience but maybe I

can help a bit.

When you are practicing pretend that it's your test, or competition, also pretend your arena is full of people—smile at them and this will relax you.—Guy Revell, Unionville SC.

I have found that the more advanced skater becomes more dependent upon the basic compulsory figures, jumps, and spins. The perfection of these basic principles requires long hours of diligent practice on the ice. This brings to mind the saying, "Practice makes Perfect."—Theresa Von Engeln, Broadmoor SC.

LOOKING OVER THE PAIR SITUATION WE find that at the moment there are not enough junior pairs coming up. From experience, we can say that pair skating can be most enjoyable.

Several years ago, a professional from the Sudbury Skating Club teamed us up for dancing for Sectional competition. A few weeks later, we won the Dutch Waltz event. We branched into pair skating the following year and, at first, it was rather difficult.

We wish to warn pairs who are starting not to get discouraged for it takes time to develop coordination and timing together. Once this is established you will enjoy your skating because you are now able to develop new and original moves. Of course, an expert professional in pairs is needed to guide you in your work.

We have found that pairs are in great demand for carnivals and are very much appreciated by the viewing audience. Finally, we sincerely hope to see, in the near future, a great number of new pairs in competitions.—Gertrude Desjardins & Maurice Lafrance, Toronto CS & CC.

I have learned in competing and taking tests that perfection in practice is a necessary requisite. With this perfection I find that my general skating in competition and in tests is less apt to result in faulty

and defective performances.

My experience in the 1962 Nationals has taught me to carry spare equipment to every competition. As a rule my skates are not ground until a day or two prior to leaving for a competition. However, last year several days before leaving for Boston the man who expertly grinds my skates had taken ill and was unable to do them. After many phone calls to various skating experts another grinder was recommended. Although he did an excellent job and conformed as well as possible to the grind I am accustomed to, I found it very hard to adjust to it.

In addition, my professional and my father informed me after the competition was over that the steel in one free skating blade was defective, and this condition could have become more severe. I was not informed of this prior to the free skating because both knew what it would have done to my morale. After examining the defective blade I was both amazed and thankful that I managed to perform at all.

To avoid similar experiences I have acquired one additional pair of fitted boots, one extra pair of figure blades, and one extra pair of free skating blades. The extra blades are ground exactly like the blades in use.

I highly recommend other competitors should consider taking the same action as I have.—Tommy Litz, *Hershey FSC*.



# 1963 GERMAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

by JOHN NOEL

JANUARY IS ALWAYS championship time in West Germany. On the first weekend of the month the different "Lander" (the States within the Federal Republic) hold their original events, and a fortnight later there are the "Deutschen"—the "Nationals."

Berlin was host for the West German National Championships, on the weekend of January 18-20. In the ladies' figures on Friday, Defending Champion Inge Paul found herself outskated. The five judges unanimously put her predecessor Karin Gude first; Miss Paul was second, with Angelika ("Antje") Wagner third.

On Friday night the pairs provided the highlight of the whole weekend. Marika Kilius and Hans-Jurgen Baumler were better than ever before, I thought, and that seems to be the opinion of many here in Germany too. As always, they were supremely elegant, with perfect synchronization of movement. They have some lovely fast backward steps, executed hand in hand at almost Don Jackson speed, and of course some tremendous double-axel lifts and other overhead lifts. They received six 5.8s and four 5.9s, and thus won back with ease the title they previously held in 1958 and 1959. (In the three following years, they were always beaten by Margret Gobl and Franz Ningel, now professionals.)

The other pairs were naturally overshadowed by the new Champions' magnificent display, but there was an excellent contest for second place. Sonja Pfersdorf and Gunter Matzdorf skated very gracefully and with considerable feeling for their music; their jumps included axels, double salchow, and butterfly. They were runners-up by one judge's place, just ahead of Sigrid Riechmann and Wolfgang Danne. All three pairs are eligible to compete at Budapest.

The men's figures next day produced the expected lead for Manfred Schnell-

dorfer, ahead of the holder, Sepp Schonmetzler. Schnelldorfer, winner every time he has competed since 1956, could not skate last year because of injury.

Karin Gude was also unable to compete in 1962, but she has now made a good comeback. Skating fast to Verdi's "Sicilian Vespers" overture, she included a fine double loop jump, and axels off each foot. Her figure lead enabled her to win, but in the free she was just beaten by the 1962 Champion Inge Paul.

In the Men's event, too, the holder was defeated. Sepp Schonmetzler, renowned in comedy as well as free skating, was at his very best, with a difficult program skated at speed, and including two high double axels in succession. Nevertheless, he could not overcome Manfred Schnelldorfer's figure advantage, and so the title changed hands.

Only in ice dancing were the Defending Champions successful. Helga Burckhardt and her husband, Hannes, won for the second time, beating Rita and Peter Kwiet, who previously held the title from 1958 to 1961.

# Granville Mayall

THE FIGURE SKATING WORLD has been deeply saddened by the loss of Granville Mayall who, on Saturday, Feb. 2, passed on. Mr. Mayall had served on the Canadian Figure Skating Association Executive since 1947 and as its President from 1959 to 1961.

Since April 1955, Mr. Mayall served most helpfully as CFSA Advisor to Skat-ING.

An outdoor sports enthusiast, he loved figure skating for fun and was interested in its administration, contributing greatly to its growth and progress. He also enjoyed hunting, fishing and skiing. Mr. Mayall joined the Connaught Skating Club of Vancouver, B.C., in 1924. He served the club as President and continued his membership until 1955 when the Capilano Winter Club was built.

For two years Mr. Mayall chaired the CFSA Judges Committee and this year he was a World Figure Judge. He was the 1960 Canadian Olympic and World Team Manager.

A member of the Masonic Lodge Gizeh Temple, he was Guard Head of the West Vancouver Chapter. Mr. Mayall was senior partner in the Mayall and Dallas law firm in Vancouver. He was born in 1906 and raised in Vancouver where he articled for the law in 1924 and went into private practice in 1928. He is survived by his wife, Myrtle, two children, Laurie and Brent, and by his mother and sister.




