## THE 1963 NORTH AMERICAN

Canadians will long remember the 1963 North American Championships as the competition in which their country made a clean sweep of all events for the first time since 1933.

The final count of the Championships, hosted by the Capilano Winter Club in Vancouver, B. C., read: Canada, four firsts, three seconds, one third; United States, one second, three thirds.

While outstanding, Canada's sweep was not altogether unexpected since the United States is still rebuilding its Team following the tragic air crash near Brussels in 1961 in which the U. S. Team perished.

The first competitors arrived on Sunday, February 10th. They had just completed the U. S. Nationals and the Canadian Championships the prior week. By Thursday all skaters had arrived, and that evening the drawing for the order of Ladies'

figures and dancing took place at the club, followed by a supper for competitors, officials, judges, members and guests.

On Friday morning at 9 A.M. the Ladies' compulsory figures commenced at the Vancouver Forum. Wendy Griner of Toronto took the lead, with Shirra Kenworthy of Vancouver holding second, and Lorraine Hanlon of Boston following in third place.

At noon, while the Ladies' figures were coming to a close, a luncheon was held for officials and judges at the Hotel Georgia. Later that afternoon the competitors, professionals and parents had tea at the Winter Club.

The Ladies' free skating on Friday evening was exciting but, with the exception of Petra Burka of Toronto, the skating lacked the sparkle generally expected at top competitions. Miss Burka gave a splen-

did performance and won the hearts of the spectators with her glowing personality and clean, high double jumps. Wearing a brilliant red dress, she leaped from fourth

place to second.

Shirra Kenworthy dropped to third place, despite her smooth skating of a difficult program. Wendy Griner, the leader in compulsory figures, skated to victory with her usual effortless grace despite the fact that she appeared a bit tired.

The compulsory dances followed. Paulette Doan and Kenneth Ormsby from Toronto compiled a sizeable lead to gain

first place in the compulsories.

Vancouver's Donna Lee Mitchell and John D. Mitchell followed the Toronto couple in second place, while Sally Schantz and Stan Urban of the U. S. gained third place.

Saturday morning the Men skated their figures. Donald McPherson of Stratford took a commanding lead, with Scott Allen of New York and Don Knight of Dundas running second and third.

The Saturday evening performance drew some 4,000 spectators. It was a night of outstanding skating—Free Dancing, Pairs and Men's Singles—all a sight long to be remembered.

Starting off the Free Dance, Doan and Ormsby, dressed in grey outfits, skated a routine of beauty and grace in an enchanting manner to carry off top honors. The Mitchells, Donna Lee looking regal in her white lace dress and "J.D." in black, had a touch of polka music in their well executed routine during which the crowd joined them by clapping hands to the beat. They maintained their second place while Schantz and Urban pleased the spectators with their grace, and finished third.

The closest race came in the Pair competition. Only 2.5 points separated the three place winners. Debbi Wilkes and Guy Revell of Unionville earned the approval of the crowd and judges with a daring exhibition of overhead lifts and double jumps. Toronto's Gertrude Desjardins and Maurice Lafrance showed both power and steadiness in a well combined program of jumps, spins and lifts. Vivian and Ronald Joseph of Chicago were only one-tenth of a point away from second place. This brother-sister pair displayed an excellent program—artistic, well balanced and varied to a high degree.

One unfortunate note in the competition came when Patti Gustafson of The Skating Club of Lake Placid sustained an injury during practice. She and her partner Pieter Kollen also of Lake Placid were unable to skate in the Pairs.

Scott Allen, the youngest competitor, skated first in the Men's division. Even though Allen skated an exciting program, he fell from second to third place, as Tommy Litz of Hershey, Pa., jumped from fifth to second. Litz had a dazzling display of double and triple jumps.

Donald McPherson held on to first place with his easy style. He attempted his triple loop but did not complete it. However, his routine of double axels, delayed double lutz and brilliant spins made up a splendid

performance.

Presentation of awards on the ice was impressive, with the trophies and medals being given alternately by CFSA President Nigel Stephens and USFSA President F. Ritter Shumway. Sashes in green and gold, British Columbia's colors, were given by George Sherwood, Chairman of the North American Championships.

A buffet Supper Dance started at 11:30 P.M. Saturday night and lasted until 4 A.M. The affair was completely filled and most

of the guests stayed until the end.

Sunday morning a brunch with ice dancing was held at the club. Two hundred turned out and it was here that most good-byes were said.

Hopefully everyone had as much pleasure during the four-day weekend as did

the hosts.

# Trends in Skating . . .

# As Seen by the Judges

THERE IS A DECIDED TREND now-a-days in dancing for couples to appear enraptured with one another. Now, this in itself is no crime, but the methods being employed by many dancers and this includes high test and championship skaters as well are ludicrous at times. They all follow a set pattern—eyes glued together and a set, fixed smile on their faces. You have probably noticed many of these couples: (a) the girl who is considerably shorter than her partner and, therefore, obliged to force her head back in a strained, unnatural manner in order to gaze upwards; (b) the tall girl who tilts her head to one side and peers upwards somewhat like a bird; (c) the man with his mind somewhere off in the Wild Blue Yonder going through the motions of the dance quite automatically, unaware of the impression his partner is trying to create and, in fact, ignoring her completely.

Dancing on ice should create a picture of two happy, relaxed people moving as one, interpreting the music in a smooth and effortless manner. There are many occasions throughout a dance where it seems natural to smile spontaneously, but to maintain a fixed expression soon becomes tiresome. It is possible that many dancers believe that "expression" means the smile on your face, which was the definition given to me, quite seriously, by

a so-called advanced skater. It often appears as if more stress is being placed on "The Act" rather than on the quality of the dancing.

And now for a few remarks on the "slow part" of free skating. It seems to me that many skaters are losing sight of the fact that this part of the program was intended to represent a change of pace, but in far too many cases this has developed into a crawl, with resulting loss of continuous movement, flow and, most important of all, content. There are many ballet moves done in this part of the program, especially by the girls, which are badly executed and done on two feet, which is hardly competitive skating. One, in particular, that I find very ugly is where the skater leans forward, arms extended sideways, with the posterior skywards. Very few skaters are able to perform this feat gracefully.

I have always been amazed to find the number of skaters, and this includes all classes, who do not own a *Rulebook*. They go along depending on a pro or someone else to tell them what is expected of them, showing little or no initiative or inclination to become self-reliant. This is unwise for they become too dependent; when they have to go out on the ice alone, too often they become so nervous and lost that they cannot do their best.

Right from the beginning, it is a good habit to study the *Rulebook* and note the diagrams for figures and dances and become familiar with the terminology. Parents can also be a great help here by reviewing the *Rulebook* with the skater, and the knowledge they gain themselves will give them a much better understanding of the problems facing the skater. Also, they might be less prone to criticize and blame others for a test failure.

# The 1963 United States Championships

THE OUTSTANDING BEAUTY of the 15,000 seat Long Beach Arena was a fitting atmosphere for the 1963 United States Figure Skating Championships, sponsored for the first time by the Arctic Blades Figure Skating Club, on February 7-10.

The competitors began to arrive early in the week and were delighted with the sunny, ninety-degree weather which prompted many to take a swim in the blue

Pacific.

Practice sessions were scheduled at Iceland, Paramount, home rink of the host

club, as well as at the Long Beach Arena where the Arctic Blades Club's Memorial Plaque was on display with the National and Club Trophies.

The competition got underway on Thursday morning. The soft, blue tint put on the ice during the night so that the judges could see each skater's tracings brought a certain glamour to the occasion. Said one observer, "That's very pretty, but will they make the ice pink for the girls?" (They didn't!)

The usual hush fell inside the Arena when the Junior Ladies took to the ice for

their figures, followed in the afternoon by the Novice Men and the Silver Dancers.

After a day of figures for the Novice Ladies and Senior Men on Friday, the evening performance opened with the finals of the Silver Dance. In a field of eleven couples, Carole MacSween and Ray Chenson had no difficulty achieving the goal they narrowly missed last year, as they won the event with their poise and effortless style. The team of Darlene Streich and Charles D. Fetter, Jr., who were third in the initial round, were a pleasing couple in the finals and succeeded in placing second over Sally Crook and Edward H. Smith, Jr.

Johnny Moore was the unanimous choice

of the judges for his accuracy in figures and maintained his strong lead by a dashing free style to become the new Novice Men's Champion. John Dystel's fine free skating performance moved him into second from a third place in figures.

Tina Noyes, with her red hair and Kelly green costume, retained her narrow lead in Junior Ladies' figures with a sparkling free skating routine. She delighted the spectators with her double jumps and her unusual spread eagle to gain the Championship. Runner-up Joya Utermohlen in deep red velvet, showed remarkable ability in her free skating which brought her from a fourth place in figures to second. Her excellent interpretation of an exciting musical selection, and the amazing height of her jumps rated well-deserved praise.

Friday evening's events concluded with an exceptionally good Junior Pair class which showed great promise. Although lacking the polish which comes with experience, the potential was evident in the many interesting and original ideas which were used. The musical interpretation of Yvonne Littlefield and Peter Betts, combined with intricate footwork, gained second place for them. The Junior Pair Champions, Cynthia and Ronald Kauffman, drew a gasp from the audience with their death spiral maneuver when he quickly changed hands and spun around while she was in the spiral position.

There had been some apprehension over the gathering clouds on the horizon on Friday afternoon which turned into rain on Friday night. Disappointment led to dismay when a torrential downpour descended and continued during the remainder of the competition, reaching flood proportions in some areas. Unfortunately, many would-be spectators chose to remain home by the fire and the attendance was lighter than expected. It did not in any way dampen the spirits of the competitors, however, and the loyal fans who braved the weather were rewarded with a brilliant performance by the skaters on Saturday night.

Little nine-year-old Janet Lynn, who was the first Novice lady to skate in the evening, won the hearts of the spectators. The pert little miss shows promise of becoming a future champion. True competitive spirit was evidenced by spunky Jennie

Walsh, who startled the onlookers by her appearance with a cast on one arm, the result of a recent ice injury which did not prevent her from skating with an air of complete abandon. Lynn Yonekura's graceful performance brought her a second, and Taffy Pergament's strong free style matched her first place in figures to win the Novice Ladies' class.

Highlight of the evening was the Senior Men's division. Defending Champion Monty Hoyt had surprised no one by his lead in figures, followed closely by Scott Ethan Allen, and last year's Junior Champion, Tommy Litz. Unfortunately, Monty's fall in his free style program appeared to disturb his usual poise and control and mar his otherwise fine performance.

Easily the most exciting performance of the competition was given by Tommy Litz,

whose phenomenal routine was filled with effortless triple jumps, coordinated with amazingly intricate footwork. His musical interpretation and brilliance of execution left the crowd breathless and gained for him the only standing ovation of the Championships and the title of 1963 United States Men's Champion.

Scotty Allen, following the Champion's performance, certainly did not suffer by

comparison, as he presented his program with ease and confidence, displaying interesting footwork and excellent control in his jumps and spins to maintain his second place.

It made a striking picture on the ice when all three couples in the Senior Pairs appeared in various shades of brown. However, there was quite a contrast in their style: Patti Gustafson and Pieter Kollen with their flair for rhythmic interpretation to the lilting strains of "Porgy and Bess"; Vivian and Ronald Joseph, lively and vivacious, showing ingenuity and skill in the execution of many unusual moves; Judianne and Jerry Fotheringill claiming the victory for their sterling exhibition of flawless unison, smooth, flowing style and superb technique.

The air was tense on Sunday afternoon as the final climax was reached. Richard Callaghan, with his easy, flowing style and erect carriage, was outstanding in the free skating portion of the Junior Men's division, and well deserved his second place. The crowd anxiously awaited the well-known, exciting performance of Billy Chapel, whose program was high in content. He thrilled the spectators with his exceptional flying camel and dauntless, devil-may-care execution of his most difficult moves, to become the Junior Men's Champion.

Always popular with the spectators, the Gold Dance couples had already skated their way through the Foxtrot, Viennese Waltz, and Argentine Tango, into a vivid interpretation which seemed to be inspired by the stirring music of the Paso Doble. Although the charming team of Yvonne Littlefield and Peter Betts presented a Free Dance rich in content and showmanship, it was not sufficient to overcome the lead acquired in the compulsory dances by the handsome duo of Sally Schantz and Stan Urban, who successfully captured the title of Dance Champions of the United States.

In Senior Ladies, Karen Howland skated a well-balanced program. With her regal manner, her poise and assurance, she was

the epitome of elegance. Pretty Christine Haigler, 1962 National Junior Lady Champion, made the transition easily into the Senior class. Her sparkling and vivacious performance pleased the crowd and judges alike, since she moved from fourth in figures to second, earning that coveted place on the World Team. With the grace of a ballerina, Lorraine Hanlon skated a program filled with artistic moves. Especially outstanding were her toe-balance spin, split jumps and lay-back spins which helped her capture the Senior Ladies' crown.

When the final results were tallied Sunday evening Club President Robert T. McLeod joined with F. Ritter Shumway, President of the USFSA, and George B. Jenkinson, Referee, in the presentation of awards to the winners. After relinquishing possession of the Harned Trophy to the

# The 1963 Canadian Championships

THE CANADIAN Figure Skating Championships of 1963 were hosted by the Royal Glenora Club, Edmonton, Alberta, on February 7th, 8th and 9th. There were 70 entries, representing 30 CFSA clubs across Canada.

At the finish of compulsory figures in the Junior Ladies, the standings were as follows: Jeannie Marie Sanders first, Marjorie Hare second, and Gloria Anne Tatton third. However, in the final standings following the free skating, second and third were reversed, bringing Gloria Tatton to second place, and Marjorie Hare to third place.

The Junior Men's standings at the completion of compulsory figures were: Jay Humphry first, Bryon Topping second, and Robbie Alan Fiddes third. Final rankings after the free skating were: Jay Humphry first, Phillip McCordic second (he advanced from fifth place in figures), and Toller Cranston third (he came up from sixth in figures). The winner of Junior Men's singles, Jay Humphry, is 13 years old and he took the Senior Men's title in the British Columbia Sectional Championship, prior to competing in the Canadians. In the Senior Ladies' class Wendy Griner, Defending Champion, won again, with Petra Burka as runner-up, and Shirra Kenworthy in third place. Compulsory figure standings were as follows: Wendy Griner first, Shirra Kenworthy second, and Petra Burka third.

Donald McPherson, runner-up for the past three years in the Senior Men's class, finished well in front of all competition, with Don Knight second, and Bill Neale, Junior Champion of 1962, in third place. Donald, the 17-year-old Champion from Stratford, Ontario, did not waste a single stride in his flawless free skating performance. Nimble hands and feet smoothly tied in each stride with every movement in his five-minute program. He capped off his performance with a perfect triple loop, the first time he has mastered it in competition.

In the Senior Dance event Paulette Doan and Ken Ormsby emerged Champions, and Donna Lee Mitchell and John D. Mitchell were runners-up, with Carole Forrest and Kevin Lethbridge in third place. The flaxen-haired Paulette, 17 years of age, fascinated spectators with her vivacious personality as well as with her near-perfect performance.

The Senior Pair Championship was won by Debbi Wilkes and Guy Revell; runners-up were Gertrude Desjardins and Maurice Lafrance, who also placed second in the 1962 Championships. Third place went to Linda Ann Ward and Neil Carpenter—this pair also entered Junior Pairs and won that Championship. Runners-up to this ambitious couple in the Junior Pairs were Wendy Warne and Jim Watters, with the brother-and-sister team of Susan and Paul Huehnergard in third spot.

Bunne Lilley and John Booker were declared Junior Dance Champions with Lynn Matthews and Bryon Topping runners-up, and Judith Ann Richardson and Brian Bailie placing third.

The social aspect of the Championships included a reception on Wednesday evening, a Friday luncheon, and a wind-up dinner party attended by 350 guests.

# THE EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS, 1963

by JOHN NOEL

THE EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS, held in the open-air Kiss Stadium at Budapest, Hungary, from February 5 to 9, proved once again the undesirability of holding ISU figure skating events outdoors. Snow, sleet, and wind necessitated the postponement of the men's fourth figure on the opening day and, during the evening's pair skating, the ice had to be swept after each performance.

FEBRUARY 5. The Championships began with the 21 men skating Group I of the figures. Defending Champion Alain Calmat led Manfred Schnelldorfer by less than eight points, with Peter Jonas third.

As in 1962, the pairs were required to skate their programs twice, on successive days. The marks for the first performance were published with Marika Kilius and Hans-Jurgen Baumler, Champions since 1959, placing first by all but two of the judges; the Russians—perhaps put off by bad weather—were not at their best.

February 6. In the remaining figures, Alain Calmat had no easy task. After the FO paragraph double threes, in fact, Schnelldorfer was in the lead; but the Frenchman overtook him on the back change loops and paragraph brackets, to finish with six first placings and a 13.6 lead over the German Champion. Jonas dropped to fourth, behind his compatriot Emmerich Danzer.

The World Champions, Eva and Pavel Roman, had a surprise in the four compulsory dances—Foxtrot, Westminster, Kilian, and Argentine. They were beaten by the young British Champions Linda Shearman and Michael Phillips, and the other British couples were not far behind in third and fourth places.

There were some splendid performances in the second pair skating programs. The Protopopovs, however, were disappointing compared with last season.

Both Czech pairs were good, and I thought Agata Wlachowska and Peter Bartosiewicz particularly artistic. Marika

Kilius and Hans-Jurgen Baumler skated beautifully; they were so clearly in a class by themselves that even the Russian judge placed them first. Without doubt, they are the finest amateur pair in the world today.

The last two pairs to skate were very good indeed. Margit Senf and Peter Gobel had a well-varied program, with some excellent steps, and including a cartwheel lift. The second Russian pair were delightful. Tatiana Zhuk is the younger sister of the famous Stanislas, and great skating clearly runs in the family. Artistically, she and her partner Alexandr Gavrilov ran the Protopopovs very close.

February 7. Sjoukje Dijkstra, as expected, was unchallenged in the Ladies' event. After four figures she led Regine Heitzer by 41 points, with Nicole Hassler third.

In the evening, Alain Calmat retained his title with a brilliant program, very well fitted to the music. He almost fell on his triple loop jump, but saved himself with a hand on the ice. He did a fine double axel, and included some dazzling footwork. None of the others quite came up to this standard, but the young Russian, Meshkov, and the likeable Sepp Schonmetzler were both very good. Schnelldorfer skated last of all; he was livelier than usual, and managed to beat Schonmetzler in the free.

February 8. On the last two figures of Group II (back paragraph double threes and paragraph loops), Sjoukje Dijkstra went even further ahead. Regine Heitzer stayed second, more than 70 points behind. Another 45 points back lay Nicole Hassler.

The free dancing brought the Dance Championship to a very exciting close. Linda Shearman and Michael Phillips gave a very polished display of traditional English-style dancing, very much in the Courtney Jones tradition. The Romans' performance was more original, but not, I thought, as artistic as last year. Eight judges placed them first in the free (only

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
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
