

### JUDICIOUS ADVICE

I feel that anyone who is really interested in becoming a judge will take the time and the trouble to read, learn, think and accomplish the way we all did at one time when we were in school. In many places, there is a lack of education for the mass who would like to be more learned in this field, and hence, take it upon themselves to educate themselves. This is all well and good, but is it enough? I feel that maybe a few textbooks written in this area by judges of wide experience will help those who seek knowledge, both in figures and dance. I am aware that there are a few books in print today, such as the Evaluation of Errors in Figures, but what about ethics, practical exercises and the like being taught in the classroom as supplements to the on-the-ice education? Personal experience is also a great teacher, but how can it be used properly if many of us do not know what to look for, what something is and so forth?

I also think that such a book should be written about the other aspects of skating, such as dance, freestyle and pairs, along with books that discuss test and competition standards in each of the aspects of skating, evaluation of their errors and merits, and and the like. I find also that the monthly tips in the magazine are helpful to both skater and judge, but here again, this is not sufficient. Maybe someone should put these in a collection and make it available to the mass. It would certainly make for well-educated judges.—Emilie Anne Brewer, Norwalk, Conn. BITTEN BY THE TAPE-WORM

PACIFICS

One of the few times a major competition has been sponsored by an inter-club association in the history of skating took place in Seattle, Washington, January 7, 8 and 9 when the Puget Sound Inter-Club Association hosted the 1971 Pacific Coast Championships. The four member clubs worked efficiently together to produce a well-run competition, refereed by Ray Alperth, assisted by Edmund Bold.

The hospitalization of the chief referee, Bob McLeod, the day before the competition and the spiking of Joel Goodrich during the Junior Mens freestyle warm-up were the only unfortunate incidents.

While Los Angeles skaters took home the team trophy, the Northwest competitors were the winners of four singles championships.

In the Senior Ladies division, four-teen-year-old Juli Marie McKinstry, the 1970 U.S. Junior Ladies Champion, came from third in figures with a polished program to win. Figure leader Sheri Thrapp, even though she skated exceedingly well, dropped to second, as Julia Johnson put on the most dynamic performance of the evening to move into the third place spot. This year's Senior Ladies free skating was probably one of the strongest in the history of the event.

1970 Pacific Coast Junior Mens Champion, Jimmy Demogines, won the Senior Mens title. It was unfortunate that Robbie Bradshaw, Southwest Senior Mens titlist, was unable to skate due to an injury. Charlie Tickner skated a fast-moving program to nail down second place over Mark Rehfield.

In Junior Mens, Nate Alden skated a strong program to hold off the threat of Alex Rubio and win the title. Rubio presented a musically-oriented program to pull from fourth to second as figure leader Billy Schneider skated consistently but dropped to third.

A strong lead in figures enabled Donna Lee Albert to win Junior Ladies. Patty Shelley and Donna Arquilla skated strong and effective programs to take second and third places.

With no Senior Pair event, attention focused on the Junior Pairs, won by two experienced pair skaters, Cynthia Van Valkenburg and Jim Hulick, teamed together for the first time. Second place honors went to Richard Ewell and Michelle McCladdie

Crowd-pleasers Shareen and Curt Finley won over Karen Warloe and Richard Kolodziej in Silver Dance. Maureen Morrow and Glenn Parriott won the Bronze Dance division.

Wendy Mullender and Tom Huff

took the Novice Pair Championship with a well-coordinated program, followed closely by Roberta Loughland and Jan Prasniewski.

At the end of the Novice Ladies figures, Marcy Sulenes and Laurie Brandel were locked in a two-way battle for the title. Both girls skated polished, exciting programs with Marcy maintaining her first place lead. Patty Gyllenswan pulled from fourth to third.

Probably one of the most outstanding free style performances of any male competitor was that of Terry Kubicka, who moved from second in figures to win Novice Mens. Capable Johnny Carlow was the second place winner as crowd-pleaser David Kirby pulled from fifth to third.

Peppy Colleen Clark and smooth Perry Jewell both came from far behind in figures to win Intermediate titles.

At the end of the championships, the Los Angeles FSC had scored the most points. The combined total of the Los Angeles skaters was 70 points; for this they were awarded the Deane McMinn cup. Runner-up was the Arctic Blades FSC, with a total of 61 points.





# MIDWESTERNS

Excitement filled the Wagon Wheel Ice Palace in Rockton, Illinois, when the Midwestern Figure Skating Championships were held there on January 7-9. In some cases, each skater performed so well that victory was won by only the narrowest margin. The judges, as well as the skaters, were put to a hard test.

Probably the most exciting skater at the Midwesterns was Johnny Johns, who became one of the comparatively few skaters in the history of the Midwesterns to compete in three senior events. This task was made even more difficult when a schedule quirk forced him to compete in all three events—Senior Men, Gold Dance and Senior

Pairs—in one three hour period.

Johnny, a nineteen-year-old college sophomore from the Detroit SC, also skated with different partners from different clubs in Gold Dance and Senior Pairs.

Johnny and his Gold Dance partner, Mary Karen Campbell of the Lansing SC, breezed into first place in the two-couple field. After an official announced that there would be a brief delay to give Johnny a few moments, the skater found a king-sized cheering section in the 1,500 people present.

Following his brief rest, Johns took to the ice for the Senior Mens free skating. He demonstrated remarkable endurance and skated his way to the Midwestern Senior Mens title. Johnny's program was highlighted by spectacular jumps. He had been second after figures.

Another breather, and Johns joined with Laura Johnson of the SC of Lake Placid for the Senior Pairs final. Johnny and Laura skated a smooth program and retained their second place spot. Douglas Berndt and Barbara Brown of the Denver FSC took first place. Their near-perfect execution of a difficult program left the crowd awed.

Saturday night, Johnny finished up his heroics by winning the Gold Dance crown with Mary Karen Campbell. This last win assured skating enthusiasts going to the National Skating Championships in Buffalo of an opportunity to see this magnificent young skater in three events once again.

In Junior Ladies competition, Kathy Lee Malmberg gained a slim lead after figures, but the final outcome was in doubt until the end of free skating Friday evening. Kathy, from the host Wagon Wheel FSC, had a narrow edge over Bobbie Chadd of the Denver FSC and Paula Larson of the Braemar-City of Lakes FSC.

Alice Cook, from the Lansing SC rose from ninth to third place in the Novice Ladies at the 1970 Midwesterns. And no one doubted her ability to do it again. Alice, a first year Junior,

skated well again but could only pull herself from tenth after figures to an

overall eighth place.

Every Junior Lady exhibited ability in the free skating, but Kathy Malmberg skated a sparkling program and won her first Midwestern Junior title. Paula Larson took second, and Althea Samson of the Detroit SC won third.

Another highlight of the competitions came just before closing Saturday night. The Junior Pair competition had been exciting from the start. Each couple seemed just a bit better than the preceding one. Surely the judges would have a hard time deciding the champions. The seventh and last pair, however, performed just that much better than the others. In their first Midwestern championship, Sheryl Trueman and Jack Courtney of Troy, Ohio, skated a difficult program that would make a Senior Pair proud.

Sheryl and Jack won the 1969 World Roller Skating Pair Championships, and Jack was also the World Mens Champion that year. In July, 1970, they turned to ice, this year competing for the first time.

Another dazzling part of the competition was the Senior Ladies free-style. Cindy Watson of Tulsa skated her way to first place, after finishing second in figures. If repeated, Cindy's performance could make her a stiff competitor for national honors.

In another close race, Betsy Hobson, from the Braemar-City of Lakes FSC, came from third after figures to win the Novice Ladies title. Katie Tamminga, Wagon Wheel FSC, slipped from first after figures, but skated well enough to finish second. In an astonishing finish, Diane Dennison of the Denver FSC zoomed all the way from sixth after figures to third overall.

Other champions crowned during the three day meet were: David Santee, Junior Men; Myra and David Chrien, Silver Dance; Sven Krevald, Novice Men; Rosemary Wiltzbacher and David Bolton, Novice Pairs; Ruth Johnson and Frank Recco, Bronze Dance; Ron-

ald Green, Intermediate Men; Lynne Ellison, Intermediate Ladies.

The Detroit SC, thanks mainly to Johnny Johns, won the team trophy, presented by the Cleveland SC.

But next in line for accolades must be the host Wagon Wheel club. Although a newspaper strike eliminated any widespread publicity of the event in the area, the Wagon Wheel Committee still put on an excellent competition. Despite the lack of publicity, a standing-room-only crowd of more than 2500 people turned out for Saturday night's finale.

Janet Lynn, the reigning U.S. Ladies Champion, gave three exhibitions

to appreciative audiences.





# EASTERNS

Skaters from as far south as West Virginia arrived at The Skating Club of Boston for the 1971 Eastern Figure Skating Championships. With many skaters vying for a chance to qualify for the National Championships, the competition was indeed exciting.

The initial round of Bronze and Veterans Dance began Friday evening's events. The Intermediate Men were the next to take the ice. Michael Botticelli and Kingsford Swan, the first and second place winners in this class, both skated well. Michael's program was performed with feeling and sureness. Kingsford's difficult program was slightly marred by a fall on a double Axel.

Younger skaters performed well and showed great potential in Novice Pairs. Small Lorene and Donald Mitchell won first place, executing a beautiful overhead lift and moving with considerable speed. Michael Botticelli teamed with Sheryl Franks to place second, in a well-skated program that nevertheless lacked the flow or difficult moves of the Mitchells.

Many of the skaters in Novice Pairs have excellent singles credentials. A. Roland Bessette competed in the Novice Mens division. Sheryl Franks is New England Juvenile Girls Champion, and her partner, Michael Botticelli, is New England and Eastern Intermediate Mens Champion. Mahlon Bradley, who with Eve Corning placed fourth in the pairs, is New England and Eastern Junior Mens Champion.

There were many changes in the standings from figures to final results in the Intermediate Ladies. Ingrid Blomstrom, skating an interpretive program with high jumps and nice spins pulled from seventh place to second. Ingrid Brenner, whose free skating style reminds one very much of Carol Heiss, moved from second place to first, while Tracey Cahill rose from fourth to third. The caliber of the skating in the Intermediate Ladies was surprising; most of the girls had difficult moves and jumps, including double flips and Lutzes.

For the most part, the Novice Men lacked polish. Mark Henry did the most notable program with high jumps, which enabled him to pull up from a fifth place in figures to become the 1971 Eastern Novice Mens Champion.

There was not a remaining seat in the rink Saturday night when the first event began. Bronze Dance was won by John Summers and Rosemary Briand, who showed fine style and flow for a couple at the Bronze level. In second place were Debra Beardsley and Kent Weigel who, despite a fall in the initial round, demonstrated great poise and maturity. Rounding out the third spot in this exceptional group were Judy Genovesi and Keith Wennik.

Leading after the figures in Junior Ladies, Mary Marley who drew the difficult first spot in free skating, was more than equal to the task, skating one of the best programs of the competition. There was no doubt that Mary was the champion after having skated her beautifully composed program with technical consistency.

In the Junior Pairs, Gale and Joel Fuhrman, a brother and sister team from the Rye FSC, had the spectators on the edge of their seats with an exciting and highly interpretive program. A unique overhead lift featured Gale doing a complete flip before she landed. Look for this pair in the future.

The final performance of Saturday evening was the exciting Senior Men's free skating event. Teaming with success, Gordon McKellen, Jr., retained his reputation as a crowd pleaser. From the beginning, Gordon was in command. An exceptional triple toe loop and a triple Salchow were the highlights of his difficult program.

"You see how these pictures bring out their personalities?"

Pro Peter Dunfield was going over some new publicity pictures with his two pupils, Mark and Melissa Militano, and their father in the Skyrink Lounge of The Skating Club of New York. "It shows them as people, and that's what we're looking for."

The Militanos are ice skaters, but they are also human beings. And, perhaps like many skaters, they are finding that it is hard to be both at the same time. Even harder in their case, since their being a brother-sister team tends to obscure the fact that they are two separate individuals with their own opinions, joys, anxieties and frustrations. But Mark and Melissa realize the pitfalls of just plain too much skating, and their attitudes on the ice and off reflect their continuing efforts to maintain the proper balance between Militano-skater and Militano-person.

Not untypically it was their parents whose idea it was to put them on the ice. At about what age? "About age two and three—no, before we were born," replied Mark jokingly. By ages six (Melissa) and seven (Mark) they were taking lessons; two years later they teamed up one day just for fun, and a mere five years after that they placed eighth in the World Championships in pairs.

"We had no idea all this stuff was going to happen. We just did it for fun *then*," said Mark. But when "all this stuff" started happening, Mark and Melissa soon found that, if they wanted to skate competitively, skating would have to be more than fun. It would also have to involve a great deal of hard work.

Hard work for a skater means one spends more time on the ice than he does in school. Mark and Melissa get up at 5:00 A.M. in order to catch a train into New York City from their Long Island home and be on the ice by 7:15. By 10:15, they have spent an hour a piece on "patch," free skating and pairs, and then it's off to Manhattan's Professional Children's School for a few hours of "normal" schooling. ("If you just go to school and sit in class and learn something, that's okay; but if they pile on the work, I don't like that too much," says Melissa—and most fifteen-year-olds would probably agree!) But there's more to skating—and to skaters like Mark and Melissa—other than just ice time. "Some skaters spend constant hours

on the ice, and I'm surprised they don't go crazy if they don't do any-


thing else. I know I would," said Mark.

### THETWO-IN-ONE PAIR

equipment is to periodically leave their skates to be sharpened (and possibly ruined) at the local skate shop, and then to wonder sometimes why their skates don't "feel

right" when they try to do a difficult movement on the ice.

About a year ago I was watching competitions on TV and saw an unusually bad fall by a pair team. Although there was no indication that the condition of the ice had anything to do with this particular accident, it started me wondering about the possible effects of bad ice. It seemed to me that there must be some way of quantitatively measuring the hardness of ice, thereby guaranteeing that skating conditions will be at their best. I would like to report here on certain experiments I have made which prove it is possible to measure the hardness of ice, and that the hardness so measured does strongly affect the performance of a skater.

The usual methods of measuring hardness, such as the Rockwell and Brinell hardness testers, involve the penetration of a steel ball or a diamond needle into the material to be tested. These were developed to measure the hardness of metals and are obviously unsuited for a soft material such as ice. However, I have found that a standard instrument used to measure the hardness of rubber does, in fact, yield definitive results when used with ice. This instrument is known as a Durometer and consists of a one-twentieth of an inch diameter pointed needle which penetrates directly into the material. The resistance to penetration is transmitted to a spring, and a dial which reads from zero to one hundred measures the degree of penetration. The instrument is calibrated to give a reading which is accepted by the American Society for Testing Materials as a quantitative measure of hardness. For ice, the hardnesses of interest to a skater are most accurately measured using the "Shore B" scale.

During the past year I have made some fifty measurements of ice hardness under varying conditions at the open rink at the University of Connecticut and the enclosed heated rinks at South Windsor and West Hartford. Typical results are given in the table. I have found that the hardness of the ice depends on many things including the brine temperature, the temperature of the air in the rink, the thickness of the ice, the outdoor temperature, etc. However, regardless of the conditions existing at any particular time, the hardness tester always gives measurements which directly relate to the

skating conditions. For results see table, page 45.

On the basis of these experiments, the following conclusions may be drawn:

1. Instruments which measure quantitatively the hardness of ice are available. The hardnesses of interest range from about 50-80 on the Shore B scale.

2. The great advantage of such an instrument is that it eliminates arguments and dif-

ferences of opinion as to whether or not certain ice is good for skating.

3. Most figure skaters seems to prefer a hardness of about fifty-five. Values above sixty result in complaints that the ice is too hard, and hardnesses over seventy make skating very dangerous unless the blades are razor-sharp.

4. In a heated indoor rink, the hardness of the ice is determined largely by the brine temperature. At South Windsor, the ideal brine temperature is 19-20° F. Room

temperature in a heated rink has only a small effect on hardness.

5. Much greater variations in hardness are found in an outdoor rink, and the hardness is affected much more by the air temperature. Cold windy days produce very hard ice.

6. Strangely enough, the hardness does not appear to be appreciably affected by the

presence of water on the ice.

7. Hockey players prefer colder and harder ice. For this reason, most rinks operate with brine temperatures of about 16° F. However, it is a simple matter to raise the brine temperature, and there is no reason why we can't get better ice for figure skating if we recognize that something can be done about it.

8. I recommend that the USFSA establish a scientific committee to study more precisely the best ice hardness for figures, dancing and free skating. Eventually it may be suitable to specify a desired hardness range for competitions, since unusually hard or unusually soft ice makes skating more difficult and may cause accidents.

### T. D. RICHARDSON-AUTHOR AND INNOVATOR

His many friends throughout the skating world will learn with sorrow of the death on January 7, at his London home, of Captain Thomas Dow Richardson, the foremost British authority on ice figure skating. He would have been eighty-four if he had lived a few days more, to January 16. His long life was devoted to the

improvement of the art he loved, and he was one of the few skaters of his generation who thoroughly understood the complex new techniques developed since the Second World War.

He was born in Yorkshire (hence his nickname "Tyke") in 1887, the year of Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee, and was

first put on the ice at the age of four, in the Great Frost of 1891. Later, as a teenager, he was taken to Grindelwald in Switzerland, where he learned to skate in the stiff, formal English style. About 1905 he saw an exhibition of the then new "international" style—the type of skating we know today—and was so attracted by its freedom, athletic grace and artistry that he took lessons from some of the leading exponents and passed the National Skating Association's Gold Medal test.

A few years later, he formed a skating partnership with a young English girl, Mildred Allingham, and they won several ice dancing competitions in London in the years up to the outbreak of war in 1914. They were married on June 1, 1915. It was a happy and enduring marriage which lasted over fifty-five years, until

his death.

T.D. then turned to judging. He officiated at all three events in the 1928 Olympics, and thereafter judged or refereed countless championships; the last one was the British Pair Championship of 1965. For many years he was chairman or member of the principal NSA committees.

His intensive study of school figures resulted, in 1930, in "Modern Figure Skating," a book which was to have a great influence on the development of British skating. In it he analyzed all the possible causes of skating error and expounded his "Theory of the Sixteen positions" (each of the four basic figure eights should be learned in four different positions, so that the skater never finds himself or herself in an unfamiliar attitude even when learning advanced figures).

In the next thirty years or so, some eight or nine other books followed and were widely read throughout the world. Among them were "Champions All" (1939), an interesting collaboration between T.D. and the photographer and motor-racing driver E.R. Hall; "The Complete Figure Skater" (1948); and his technical masterpiece "The Art of Figure Skating" (1962), in which he presented the mellow and yet thoroughly topical views formed after a lifetime of skating.

He was a most prolific writer; in 1966

his wife estimated that he had written "the best part of a million words on skating." His first published article was in "The Westminster Gazette," a London evening newspaper, in 1912, but it was in the mid-20's that he really came to the notice of the reading public. His cogent arguments in "The Field" (an English sports magazine) and "The Times" of London led to the "one judge per country" rule in skating championships—before then, a panel might include as many as three Austrians, much to the advantage of the Viennese skaters. He was the skating correspondent of "The Times" for some thirty years, until 1958, and wrote for many other journals, such as "The Daily Telegraph," "Country Life," "Skating Times," and "Skating World." He also contributed to the American-produced "Encyclopedia Britannica."

As a judge, his outspoken comments sometimes brought him into conflict with his colleagues. His relations with the International Skating Union were not, in general, very happy, but his outstanding abilities were more readily recognized in Britain. He and his wife were made Honorary Life Members of the NSA in 1967; twelve years earlier, Queen Elizabeth II appointed him an Officer of the Order of the British Empire (O.B.E.) for services

to British skating.

On three occasions T.D.R. was responsible for major revisions of the NSA test schedules; he instigated the introduction of pair skating tests, was concerned in the foundation of the Ice Dance and Technical Advisory Committees, and with Mrs. Richardson presented two cups to be awarded annually to the British Junior Pair Champions. In 1958 he founded the Commonwealth Winter Games and was their chairman until his death. They were intended as a kind of "Commonwealth Olympics," held every four years since 1962, and included skiing and bobsledding as well as skating. One of his last innovations was the NSA Star tests for advanced school figures such as the rocker-three and bracket-counter-bracket. They were introduced in 1967, but he had first proposed them as long ago as 1930.0

Equidistant from the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, Winnipeg, grain capital of the world, proved a pleasant choice of locale for the 1971 sixtieth annual Canadian Figure Skating Championships from January 18-24.

The perennial giants, British Columbia and Ontario, sent the greatest percentages of the more than 190 entries—easily a re-

cord for the national gathering.

The Novice events were savored as appetizers over the first two days. The opening championship result was decided late Tuesday night, the announcement coming long after everyone except a knot of weary-eyed reporters had made their way home through a swirling blizzard.

Emerging as the winners of Novice Pairs were Marie and Bernard Souche, brother and sister from Ontario's Upper Canada Club. The Souche youngsters have a European background with parents originally from France; instructor Hyland likens them to Maria and Otto Jelinek, the Czech-born couple who climbed to World Pair dais from the same tutelage.

In second place were Janice Maikawa of Dundas, Ontario, and Reid MacDonald of Preston, Ontario. The pair barely nosed out the British Columbia Junior Champions, Carol Kreuzinger and Orin Cox of North Vancouver's North Shore WC.

The standard of the Novice Ladies was particularly high, although for the six top contestants this was their initial national meet. The usual seesawing of positions was absent as the youngsters showed they were achieving a good measure of stabilized concentration, accepting both figures and free as essential parts of their art.

Two Junior Champions battled for the Gold Medal. Kim Wylie, ahead after the compulsories, held on to her first place in

spite of a fall on a double Axel.

Runner-up Barbara Terpenning is driven to skating practice each morning by Karen Magnussen, and some of the Magnussen magic seems to have rubbed off. It will be interesting to watch her pro-

gress. Cynthia Zachar, interpreting Donizetti's "La Favorita," retained her third figure place. A highlight of this Novice contest was the exciting free of Cheryl Richardson which pulled her from eleventh to sixth.

The clear winner of the Novice Mens section was Lee Armstrong up from last year's fourth position. He consolidated his figures' advantage with a precise three-minute free utilizing Spanish music. Kevin Robertson held on for the Silver Medal, but Robbie Dick lost the Bronze Medal to Jean Desmarais, an electronic technician from Montreal. One to keep your eye on in the future—Bob Houston, whose performance to "Cheveaux Caucasian" hurtled him from twelfth to fifth.

The Novice Dance final round of Fourteenstep and Rocker Foxtrot was hotly disputed by the eventual winners, Toronto's Ginnie Grieco and John Rait, and a trio of British Columbia couples. These four pairs of dancers were the survivors from the initial round which included the Foxtrot, European Waltz and Tango.

The first Junior Championship to be completed was the Ladies event. Leading after the compulsories was the 1969 Novice Champion, Julie Black, who has been training in Colorado Springs. This season a leg injury prevented her from exhibiting her best form and may have contributed to her inability to gain the championship. In contrast, Vancouver's ballet-trained Karel Latham treated us to one of the most artistic free skating performances of the whole week. Her choreography is superb and Karel interprets Stravinsky's exotic "Firebird" with the poise and polish of a prima ballerina. Carol Farmer took the third stand on the rostrum of honor.

After training together for only five months Junior Dance Champions, Barbara Berezowski of the Toronto CS & CC, and David Porter of the Unionville SC, gained a 4-3 majority decision from the judges over the St. Thomas couple, Judy Currah and Keith Caughell. The compul-

sory dances, Foxtrot, American Waltz, Paso Doble and Blues, had also resulted in a 4-3 majority for the victors. Third place went to Linda Peckinpaugh, daughter of the Canadian Skating Association's President, and Eric Gillies of Edmonton.

In the Junior Mens, former Czech Junior Champion, Stan Bohonek, followed the same pattern he had set in the 1970 Canadian Novice Mens Championship. He climbed out of reach in the compulsories and, although an early fall on an attempted double Axel unsteadied the rest of his performance, the judges were unanimous in awarding him first place. This prompted the daily Winnipeg Free Press newspaper to report, "Upright or otherwise, there's no doubt about Stan's class."

Trailing at the half-way point by twenty-seven marks, individualist "Skip" Groff presented a less ambitious but fault-lessly executed four-minute free which delighted the audience. Skip's fellow teammate from British Columbia, Kevin

Cottam, was third.

Roger Uuemae showed the most potential. When he accomplishes everything he attempts, we shall see a very skillful skater. As it was, a triple toe loop and a triple Salchow, are a considerable achievement in Junior competition. With his partner, Daria Prychun, Roger was the 1970 Novice Pair Champion, and this year using music by composer Glinka, they were runners-up in Junior Pairs.

Junior Pairs was won by the 1969 Novice Pair Champions Linda Tasker and Allen Carson. Highlights of their four-minute program were a strong opening overhead triple and a change foot forward outside to inside death spiral. Lacking were solo jumps. They also entered Senior Pairs but had the misfortune to suffer a spill early in their compulsory program, a mishap which seemed to effect the rest of their performance.

The Bezics, capturing the Senior Pairs title for the second straight year, demonstrated the improvement they have attained in the last twelve months. Sandra and Val competed in Worlds and won the St. Gervais International, and this experience has bestowed upon them a greater

sense of confidence. Their compulsory was fast, lively and extremely well-received while their free proved them to be in a class ahead of the other contestants. Including double and one and a half twist lifts and a backward outside to forward inside death spiral, their program was formulated well. Particularly impressive was their one-handed overhead. Unfortunately, in the last half-minute Val fell on footwork unsteadying his double Salchow.

Mary Petrie and John Hubbel took the Silver Medal in the Senior Pairs with an exciting display of their potential. However, John has yet to reach the skating maturity of his new partner. Third were the 1970 Junior Pair Champions, Marion

Murray and Glenn Moore.

No one was surprised at the outcome of the Senior Ladies event. The champion was, of course, delightful eighteen-year-old Karen Magnussen, fourth in the 1970 World Championships. She skated brilliantly and thoughtfully, undoubtedly aware of all Canada's hopes for the North Americans and Worlds.

It was a great disappointment to find Cathy Lee Irwin on crutches at the barrier instead of on the ice. By placing tenth in Ljubljana she had opened the gate for three Canadian Ladies to compete in Lyon. However, only two weeks earlier while training in Colorado Springs she pulled out of the way of another skater resulting in a fractured pelvis.

Mary McCaffrey was a strong second in the compulsories, but a weak free dropped her, just as it did last year, to

fourth position.

Not previously known as a great free skater, Ruth Hutchinson seemed to sense her chance for a long awaited medal and pulled out all the stops in possibly the most determined free of her career. For the graceful Vancouver skater it brought a well-earned Silver Medal. Incidentally, Ruth will be representing the maple leaf country at Worlds with Canadian-flavored music—Beethoven's "Fourth Piano Concerto" as played by eccentric Canadian, Glenn Gould.

In spite of a fall late in her program, Diane Hall vaulted into third place. She performed the only double Lutz into double Axel of this championship. It was a shame it had to be hidden in a corner of the rink. Her talented younger sister, Arlene, last year's Junior Champion, wound up in seventh place.

In the Senior Mens event the retirement of Toronto's David McGillivray, for the purpose of concentrating on his medical studies, brought the anticipated thrill of a new champion. After the first three figures Paul Bonenfant was ahead by a slight margin over last year's runner-up, twenty-one-year-old Toller Cranston. However, by the time fifty percent of the marks had been allocated, their positions had been reversed. In the deciding free Bonenfant was unable to match the showmanship and experience of Cranston.

Cranston, thirteeneth in last year's World Championship, produced a triple loop and triple Salchow, leading to one of three standing ovations accorded the

men's contenders.

The other two went to Ron Shaver of Hamilton, Ontario, and Patrick McKilligan of Vancouver, younger brother of Betty and John McKilligan former Canadian Senior Pair Champions. McKilligan's marks were very unpopular and were greeted with a chorus of boos from the audience. To prevent this happening it might be worthwhile to consider adopting the U.S. policy of making public the marks after all the competitors have skated. This has an additional benefit in speeding up the process.

Shaver once again proved that his free skating talents are in a far superior class to his figures. His array of triples electrified the crowd and resulted in his selection to the Canadian team for the North American Championships in preference to the claims of Kenneth Polk who finished with a better overall standing. Nevertheless Polk's day will undoubtedly come if he continues to improve as he has in the

past year.

The most startling upset of the week came on the final day. Defending dance champions Mary Church and David Sutton of Toronto had the crown virtually lifted from their heads by the good-look-

ing Vancouver couple Louise Lind and Barry Soper. Although the 1970 Champions skated as well as, if not better than last year, from the opening Starlight Waltz it was apparent that Lind and Soper might dethrone them. They look so happy on the ice that it comes as no surprise that, as of June, they will make the partnership permanent with Louise changing her name to Mrs. Barry Soper. Lind and Soper are the first Canadian dancers to have held all three levels of national championship: Novice in 1967, Junior in 1969 and their new Senior title.

A struggle developed for third place. After seesawing in the compulsories with Victoria's Linda Roe and Kevin Cottam, Brenda Sandys and James Holden presented a snappier free to capture the Bronze Medal. Brenda and James now live in Toronto, having left England only

five years ago.

As a climax to the week, teams for the international events were announced:

For the Sapporo pre-Olympics three country invitational competition—Karel Latham and Mary McCaffrey, who was subsequently replaced by Arlene Hall.

For the North Americans—all top three finalists in each Senior category with the exception of the Men in which Ron Shaver replaces Ken Polk.

For the Worlds—all four Senior Champions plus Ruth Hutchinson and Diane

Hall.

Hosting a farewell party, the Winnipeg WC had reason to congratulate itself on its admirable organization of the event. Amongst praise for the officials, one heard expressed hopes that the 1972 championships would go as well, interspersed repeatedly with, "See you next year in London, Ontario."

#### THE TWO-IN-ONE PAIR

To keep from being "just skaters going through the movements," Mark and Melissa take jazz dance once a week (they had studied ballet the three previous years), and Mark attends a combination breathing/gym class three times a week. This latter class, claims Mark, really makes it easier for him to pick up his sister by teaching him to coordinate breathing with movement. And all three things, ballet, jazz and the breathing class, work together to help Mark and Melissa be more than just athletes, more than just skaters who have practiced jumps or turns so often that they can do them flawlessly, but perhaps not artistically. Mark summarized their feelings this way:

"I consider myself an artist first. To skate a five-minute program you have to be an athlete. To skate it right, you have to be an artist. I think of skating as an art, a sort of sustained form of ballet. Since there is so much speed involved in skating, you have to learn to cope with speed by stretching out the movements more slowly and by making them more definite and accurate so they can reach the audience. This is where the off-the-ice classes come in."

This attitude is reflected in their approach to their two programs for the Worlds this year. Mark and Melissa work very closely with their teacher, collectively deciding on the mood and the music and generally "combining all our thoughts until they form a whole." But, as Mark explains, their new awareness of what competitive skating entails, or rather, their new outlook on skating as a whole, has led them toward different goals:

"Last year we just had a set program: we could do this or that. This year our program is of a higher caliber. I wouldn't say we are totally happy with it, but that's what we're aiming for. That's a goal you should have in skating: to have time to be happy while you're doing it. Usually, for most people, it's just a program."

The key to this happiness on the ice is a combination of two things. The first is confidence. By practicing every day as if they were competing in the Worlds *today*, Mark and Melissa hope to "reach a point where everything is natural and we can go out there and do anything we want," as Melissa put it.

The second thing, however, is as important as the first, at least to Mark and Melissa. It in-

volves their attitude toward competition and judges, and toward skating in general. "I don't wait for the judges at all," says Mark. "I'm out there for myself....I try not to think of skating as pressure. I just try to think of it as going out there and doing the best I can."\*\* In other words, with enough confidence and with the right attitude, Mark and Melissa hope they can achieve their goal of being "happy while you're doing it."

It is their off-the-ice lives, however, that completes the true picture of Mark and Melissa Militano as people.

Not surprisingly, it is here, too, that the twoin-one pair begins to break down into two unique individuals, one determined to keep skating in perspective and one perhaps too involved in it to be able to do so.

"I try to make myself as much of an every-day person as I can when I'm not skating," declares Mark flatly. "I don't want to let skating ever get to the point where I feel it's making me miss other things." The main thing he doesn't want to miss is his music. Mark writes songs, and, in fact, he and his sister skate to one of them. He is seriously considering going into music after his skating career. What would he do if he weren't skating: "I'd go home and write songs. I'd go skiing or mountain climbing. I'd do everything!"

In fact, Mark has a dream which is a good example of how he tries to combine the best of both parts of his life, the skating and the non-skating. What he'd really like to do would be to build a rink in the Colorado Rockies with "the biggest ice surface in the world." Then he would gather "a bunch of artists from all kinds of fields and a certain number of skaters," and they'd live there and "they'd learn about everything, not only about skating." In other words, Mark would try to make his pupils not only fine skaters but complete people as well.

Mark's Mega-Rink would also give him a chance to get away from society, for which he holds little hope. As he sees it, there just aren't enough concerned people to make protest effective. He realized, too, that "protest can only go so far. I mean, you have a war in the streets and a war in Vietnam, and you can't get much accomplished by either of them, much less both at the same time." He feels a part of the new mainstream of so-called "politicized youth,"

port of their child. Melissa added that parents should not involve themselves in gossip, in jeal-ousies, in pressuring the teacher to give their child more time: "In fact, I don't think they should get that involved in skating—unless they're going to get out there themselves."

<sup>\*\*</sup>A curious—or maybe not so curious—offshoot of this self-fulfillment philosophy is Mark and Melissa's attitude toward skating parents (their own excluded, they assured me): Mark feels that the only thing that should concern a skating parent is the moral and financial sup-

but, as he says, he'd "rather be outside (the mainstream) unless things were really going to change drastically, which I don't think they will."

"I really don't know what I'd rather do (than skate), because I'm in this and I never bother to think about it." Thus, Melissa points out the biggest difference between her involvement in skating and her brother's. "I'd like to go skiing. I'd like to draw and paint, but now I don't have time."

Perhaps one of the reasons she doesn't have time is that Melissa, unlike her brother, skates competitively in singles as well as pairs; so, naturally, she would tend to be more involved in the skating world than is her brother. A good example is the fact that Melissa finds most of her good friends inside the skating world, while the opposite is true of Mark.

The difference extends to their enjoyment of the actual act of skating. Mark likes "going through the air and getting my edges into the ice." Melissa doesn't think about the fun involved—perhaps because, for her, there isn't any. "If you can do something and do it right, then you like it....If I was just skating for fun and not competing, I'd probably be doing

something else."

Mark, in a somewhat heady exaggeration, might have hit on the difference when he said: "This is the difference between her and me: she hasn't done much, and I've done everything that I can do. That's why she doesn't realize what it's like." Mark, with a year's more growth behind him, perhaps finds it easier to enjoy skating as he enjoys other things: because the things themselves are enjoyable. Melissa enjoys being good at something, and skating is her "thing". There is certainly nothing wrong with this, for, as she realizes, this is enough to set her apart from most teenagers her age: "Most kids just go to school, go home, go out with their friends. They don't do anything."

Melissa and Mark do something, and they do it extremely well. They skate. Like anything one does well, it takes a good deal of hard work and a great many sacrifices. And there is always the danger of the work becoming so hard and the sacrifices so great that the human beings involved are transformed into automatons "doing their thing" and doing it well, but not doing it as people, Mark and Melissa Militano are aware of this problem, and that is half the battle. They have a good jump on the other half, too: when asked what they would do if, after all the hours of skating they have put in, someone were to call them up and say, "Let's go skating!" Mark replied: "If it were just to mess around, yeah, I'd do it." Melissa smiled and nodded agreement.O




