

Once each year hundreds of skaters across the country pack their gear, spruce up their best skating dress or jump suit, cross their fingers and set off for the initial round of qualifying competitions—Regionals. The outcome of this annual meeting, set down in columns of official results and the commentaries of observers, is the substance of this issue. But what do these skaters think of Regionals, of the competition experience? When asked by SKATING to give their views, some responded enthusiastically.

Juli Ann Miller from the Northwest Pacific Region writes: "I very much enjoy the thrill of competition, and most of my competitive experiences have been happy ones." Juli Ann does, however, have a suggestion for improving competitions. "I feel...that the practice ice should be more equally allocated between local skaters and out-of-town skaters."

From New England, Laura Beardsley comments, "Competitions give the skater experience and the drive to improve. It would be helpful if the skaters could receive advice, either written or oral, from the judges on where they may have been weak or could improve."

Carolyn Fortuna and Robert Mock, Silver Dance competitors in South Atlantics, would like to see the introduction of Original Set-Pattern dances or Free Dance in Bronze and Silver Dance events. "A team can benefit from this procedure for it will lay the foundation for and provide a more gradual change to Gold Dance competition," they explain.

Southwest Pacific skater Terry Kubicka writes: "My own personal experiences have been extremely happy ones. However, I feel that regardless of one's personal placement, the experience of competition helps us to become better adults."

Stephen Savino from the North Atlantic Region echos his Pacific counterpart: "Be your own judge. Learn to evaluate your own skating with each competition or test. In this way we can learn to be honest with ourselves...I not only train physically, but I train myself to think a certain way—positively!

We hope these glimpses of competitors will make this Regionals '73 issue more interesting and meaningful.



NORTHWEST PACIFICS

Despite the lack of competition in five divisions, Northwest skaters had a busy schedule during their three-day meet, sponsored by the Overlake Skating Club. Seventy-six skaters and a dozen couples kept the officials busy. For the first time, the Anchorage FSC entered a competitor, twelve-year-old Karen Birch, in the Juvenile Girls division.

Responding to complaints about panel judging, the sponsoring club utilized elimination groups in the large divisions. In those classes having more than fifteen skaters, the competitors were divided into groups by draw. The top four finishers in each group then competed again in both figures and free style to determine the final placements. While the skaters felt the pressure involved in "doing their thing" twice, many agreed that limiting

a division group to twelve gives everyone a more equitable opportunity and simplifies the judges' task.

Bitter cold, inside and out, kept the figure standard at an unusually low level. Even in the Senior Ladies division, Donna Albert's back change loop was the only outstanding figure.

Three girls provided the only Senior competition in the meet. Surprisingly, Miss Albert, the defending champion from Tacoma's Lakewood WC, was hard pressed in the figures by both Susan Driano and Dawn Wieburg, newcomers to the premier ranks. In the compulsory short program, Donna barely clung to her lead, but she was overtaken in the free style final by Miss Driano, the fifteen-year-old Overlake challenger. The new Senior champion has amazingly high, clean jumps, but she has yet to develop the maturity and style required of a top Senior Lady.

Marcy Sulenes, Tacoma's defending



Junior Lady champion, was pushed all the way by Seattle's Terri Karis. Marcy retained her title, while winning the Babbit Award for artistic performance at the same time. The Bronze medal went to Colleen Clark, also of Lakewood.

Juli Ann Miller, Seattle, took an early lead in the Novice Ladies division to win easily. However, the most brilliant performance of the entire championships came when petite Robin Levi of Portland, just turned twelve, put on a sparkling exhibition to vault from seventh to second place. Her artistic program combined high, clean jumps, good spins, neat footwork and a changing pace. Holly Stuns, Overlake, skated consistently to pick up the third qualifying spot.

In the Intermediate Ladies division, darkhorse Valerie McBroom, Overlake, won both her elimination and the final round to triumph over KimWieburg, Lakewood, and Cynthia Kawano, Portland.

Tina Falcioni, Lakewood, surprised

the Juvenile Girls as she traded her fourth place in the elimination round for a Gold medal in the final standings. Staci Loop, Lakewood, was second, and Joanne Zwingenberg won the free style to pull from sixth into third place.

Overall, the Men's divisions were small in number and weak in ability. In Novice Men, Portland's Patrick Page was a steady winner over Bruce Hurd, Great Falls, and Craig Bond, Walla Walla.

Michael Lettengarver, Seattle, annexed the Intermediate Men's title over his teammate, Andy Reed, but not before Andy won the free style in his attempt to overtake him. Kevin Roddy, Portland, was third. Jon Wigen and Joey Draper were one and two in Juvenile Boys.

Defending Silver Dance titlists, Colleen Clark and Jean Rene Basle were a much

improved couple as they waltzed to a win over their Lakewood clubmates, Heidi Broback and Philip Carman and Lynn Carpenter and Peter Schindler.

In Bronze Dance, a Lakewood entry also triumphed as the Novice Pair champions, Staci Loop and Kelly Yoshida, won their second title of the meet. Sandra Deatherage and Ron Andersen, Lakewood, picked up the Silver medal, and the Bronze went to Kelley and Steve Elgin of the Burien SC.


Lakewood easily annexed the team trophy, collecting three times as many points as second place Seattle and third place Overlake. Plaudits all around went to the indefatigible chief referee, Ed Bold of Seattle, official-in-charge for the *thirtieth* consecutive year. Scurrying around the arena in his familiar Scotch cap, he set a brisk pace and a pleasant manner for officials, spectators and competitors.




The ever-increasing number of contestants in Central Pacifics led the sponsoring club to organize elimination rounds in several large events. Though this meant early mornings and long hours on the ice, a greater number of skaters were given an opportunity to free skate.

First to compete in the elimination rounds were the Pre-Juvenile Girls; the top four placers in each of the initial groups advanced to the final round. Dianna Boone of Crystal Springs ISC, who was third after compulsory figures, moved up to win the Pre-Juvenile Gold medal with an exciting free skating performance. Andrea Bauer, who also placed second in her elimination group, took the Silver, and Renee Biagi, the Bronze.

In Juvenile Girls, Stephanee Grosscup, Utah FSC, matched her first in figures with a first in the combined results to capture the Gold medal. Tracy Prussack, Crystal Springs ISC, took the Silver, and



her teammate Wendy Lufrano presented a lovely free skating program to jump from sixth after figures to third.

In a two-way contest for the Juvenile Boys' title, Scott Prussack, Tracy's brother, nipped Mike Smith's compulsory figure lead with strong free skating.

A large field of contestants for the Intermediate Ladies' title required three groups of elimination rounds. When the ice chips had settled, Teri Markley of Crystal Springs ISC had earned the Gold medal, bettering her third place finish in 1972. Patricia Maley, Marin FSC, who held the lead after figures, took the Silver.

In Intermediate Men, Tom Case, Utah FSC, led the field, but the big battle was for second place. Only seven-hundredths

of a point separated Silver medallist David Hicks, Diablo FSC, from Marc Pietroforte, ISC of Fresno, who placed third.





SOUTHWEST PACIFICS

The 1973 Southwest Pacific Regional Championships were exciting before they even began—being hosted by a revived San Diego Figure Skating Club that hadn't hosted a USFSA qualifying competition for twenty-three years and having six 1972 National champions competing again in higher classes. Local media rose to the occasion with excellent coverage including a full page of opening day photos and three filmed television reports.

Once again Southwest Pacifics was the largest Regional in the country with two hundred twenty-four skaters entered in seventeen events. As usual, an opening weekend was required, taken up mostly by elimination rounds in Juvenile, Intermediate, Novice and Junior Ladies.


The home crowd got a thrill that first weekend as Gail and Steve Heitert deepedged their way to a decisive win in Silver Dance, giving San Diego its first Southwest Pacific title in a decade.


Surprisingly, considering the large number of entries, three skaters won or placed in more than one event. Hal Marron had the Phoenix cheering section hoarse, as he placed third in Novice Men, second in Bronze Dance with his sister Cathleen and third in Novice Pairs with his sister Lyndy. Tai Babilonia and Randy Gardner won the Junior Pairs the opening weekend and then came back to score big as singles in the wind-up. Randy, second after figures in Novice Men, pulled up to first with a polished free skating program including many well-executed double jumps. Tai, seventh place after the Intermediate Ladies figures, pulled up to third with a dazzling free skating program including a double Lutz.

Senior Men's competition pitted veteran Senior Mark Rehfield against 1972 U.S. Junior champion Terry Kubicka. Mark led after the figures, but Terry took over in the free skating rounds to finish first. Terry's final free style program included a triple Lutz, triple Salchow and two rapid-fire, mile-high double Axels near the end that brought an already turned-on audience to its feet. It was the highest of several high points in the meet.

Wendy Burge, 1972 U.S. Junior Ladies champion, led all the way in the Senior Ladies event. Although somewhat off form in the compulsory short program, as most of the ladies were, Wendy skated a near-perfect final free style program with great height on her double Axels for a strong finish.

Barbara and Michael Wayland won the Gold Dance event for the third time, topping 1972 U.S. Silver Dance cham-





pions Michelle Ford and Glenn Parriott.

Johnny Carlow, Jr., and Perry Jewell both skated outstanding free style programs to maintain their first and second positions after figures in Junior Men. Johnny is once again greatly improved over last year, particularly in flow and height of jumps, and Perry peppered his fine overall performance with a triple Salchow. David Kirby, 1972 U.S. Novice champion, was fourth in Junior Men after the figures and never got a chance to see if he could pull up because he suffered a broken ankle the day before the final free skating.

In Junior Ladies, Roberta Loughland and the 1972 U.S. Novice champion, Kim McIsaac, who fought it out all last season in Novice Ladies, were at it again with Roberta triumphing this time. The real excitement in Junior Ladies, however, was provided by tiny, twelve-year-old Linda Fratianne, who has passed seven tests in two years. Linda pulled up from fifth to third with a stunning interpretation of excerpts from "La Boheme" featuring all of the double jumps and several outstanding combinations.

Clear winners from start to finish in initial and final rounds were springy Barbara Smith in Novice Ladies, with a flashy double Lutz/double loop combination in a fine free style program, and graceful Jeanne Chapman in Intermediate.

Eric Johnson skated well to pull from second to first in Intermediate Men, and


Brian Haack was also noteworthy in that group, pulling from fourth to second.

Sundee Witt and David Nottoli gave the Phoenix fans more to cheer about as they topped a class of seven Novice Pairs, and converted roller skaters Leslie Kiser and Micky McCann showed fine form to win out over eight other couples in Bronze Dance.

Juvenile champions Vicki Heasley and Robert Wagenhoffer, both of whom pulled up in their free skating to win, skated well above their rank and showed great promise for the future. As a matter of fact, the overall quality of skating in the meet was excellent, apparently demonstrating the validity of the American axiom that more competition produces higher achievement.

Southwest Pacific skaters, who won eight of the ten National titles in 1972, appeared ready to reap another harvest of honors this year.


UPPER GREAT LAKES

On Sunday, December 3rd, the vanguard arrived for the Upper Great Lakes Regional Competition, sponsored by Skokie Valley Skating Club, at the new Willow Ice Chalet in Willowbrook, Illinois, a southwestern suburb of Chicago. Arrivals by car and by plane at nearby O'Hare Airport swelled to some one hundred sixtyeight competitors, twenty officials, an army of committee chairmen with their crews of workers, uncounted coaches, parents and friends.

Special interest centered on the new schedule for Senior singles. The three compulsory figures left a slightly incomplete feeling among the judges, used to double that number, plus some uncertainty that they had been able to assess properly the relative merits of the top competitors. But it was the compulsory short programs that aroused greatest interest.

The two Senior Men went to the post first in this phase. Ted Engelking had been



first in figure placement, but David Santee began to close the gap with his short program. The ease and elevation of his jumps, the form and excellence of his spins, his overall greater clearness and sureness gave him the edge. David's free skating performance swung the title to him by a four-to-one decision. In artistic impression, he has matured somewhat in style over last year, and his music suited him well. Ted's weaving together of interesting, varied and beautiful skating moves was a richer fabric on which to display good highlights and was more expressive of his musical selection.


In Senior Ladies, Kath Malmberg led all the way—in figures, compulsory short program and free skating—though closely pressed by Paula Larson and Teri Klindworth. Cara Markham, fifth after figures, moved into fourth with her compulsory short program and free skating performance and clinched her right to go to Midwesterns, since Kath, defending Midwest champion, does not count in the Regional quota.

In a two-man contest for the Junior Men's title, Chris Kales was first in figures, but Frank Sweiding reversed the placements with his free skating performance and captured the Gold medal.

From twenty-six Junior Ladies, Betsy Hobson emerged first in figures and maintained her lead through the free skating to take the title. Kay Tani, fourth in figures, must have been inspired by a huge paper banner unfurled in the stands as she took her place on the ice and waited for her music. In letters three feet tall, the banner urged, "THINK TRANQUILITY! SKATE GOOD, K.—St. Paul FSC." Kay skated "good" enough to pull up to second place in the final standings. Candyce Wenborg, second in figures, dropped to third after free skating.


Dee Oseroff and Tim Hodges, a new Silver Dance couple skating out of Rockton, carried first place over a close second for Ron Radke and his new partner, Candy Anderson. The two couples, backed up by Marcia Fugina and Charles Larson from Milwaukee, will give this region strong representation in dance at the Sectional ahead.

In Novice Men, Scott Sherman of the hosting Skokie Valley SC was unanimously first in both figures and final placements. Patrick Hughes, from the FSC of Green Bay, took the Silver.



Among thirty-one Novice Ladies competitors, Kathy Gelecinskyj, second in figures, clearly dominated in free skating as she had done last year in the Intermediate level. Her unanimous first place, together with her mature and brilliant performance, hint strongly that she should qualify at Midwesterns to show her skills for the first time at the National level. Lisa Horween, third in figures, pulled up to second in the final placements. Lynn Johnson took the Bronze medal.

From a field of thirty-one Intermediate Ladies, Mary Schuster emerged to win the compulsory figures. But in the free style, Kelsy Ufford was a tiny, blond



whirlwind as she skated to a unanimous first place; Mary dropped to second and Amy Ketchum pulled into third in the final standings.

In the eleven and twelve-year-old Juvenile Ladies ("A"), the young Glenwood Club left its calling card by skating off with all three top places. And in the ten years and under class ("B"), Wagon Wheel showed its skilled hand by taking first and second.

One young Intermediate Lady doubtless spoke for the many who will not be going on to Sectionals. She had just missed being one of the winning contingent, and she said to her father, "I don't really mind so much. Now I'll go home and work on my fourth and fifth tests and make it next year in Novice." That's the spirit!


SOUTHWESTERNS


Eva Barton-Dobenin captured the honors in Novice Ladies. Eva won despite a strong second-place finish by Jacqueline Dean, who was first after figures.


EASTERN GREAT LAKES


Even with one hundred sixty-four entrants in the seventeen events, everyone found enough leisure time to share this wonderful experience and make many new friends.


Ron Veirs maintained his lead in In-

ting the judges in an unenviable position.




After this full week of travel, practice, competition and emotion, everyone found time for relaxation and a hearty round of

Judges' meals ran to Lucullan lengths, and even a Zamboni breakdown saw judges and pros join rink staffers behind scrapers while the replacement part was flown in.

In contrast to the athleticism and big jumps of Elizabeth Freeman and the fiery accelerations of Debbie Milne, Ruth Cohens' quietly lyric program won the final free skating and brought her up to second in Senior Ladies. Her compulsory short program with a double Lutz and double Salchow/double toe-loop had a complex serpentine sequence laced with mazurkas and cross-foot hops.




competitors' party after the Saturday evening events.

providence free 'n figure

While the free skater—with dramatic spins, turns and jumps—catches the eye and the imagination(not to mention the applause and the rewards), the school figure performer for years has been virtually unsung. The Providence Figure Skating Club has made a move to change this.

The Providence club believes it achieved a marked success in focusing the spotlight not only on the free skater but also on the compulsory figure skater at its invitational competition held October 28-29 in Rumford, Rhode Island. For the first time, separate medals were awarded to the winners of the compulsory figure events and the free style events. The sweet taste of victory and recognition was shared, evoking expressions of satisfaction on the part of the skaters themselves, their coaches and their friends, parents and relatives, who often spend hours on end watching the tracings on ice.

The Providence competition, which drew entrants from New England and beyond, attracted seventy-three competitors to the compulsory figure events and one hundred thirty-seven to the free style.

To the uninitiated, school figures may look as exciting as watching the grass grow, but to the dedicated skater, they offer a high degree of challenge and a full measure of thrill. Recognizing this challenge, Mrs. Claire W. Ferguson, chairman of the Providence competition, proposed the plan to give credit to both school figure and free style skaters. She saw a need to stimulate the school figure skater to persist in his or her pursuit of excellence.

Mrs. Ferguson expressed the belief that the free skater often tends to forget that the intricacies of edge and the forms he or she executes had their genesis in the school figures. The club's move serves to underscore the importance of the school figures in the overall performance of the free skater and calls to mind what figures did originally to develop grace, poise, coordination and control. The youngster who puts in hours on patch, circling and circling, perfecting and perfecting, comes to a coordination of shoulders and feet that a judge can spot immediately.

Those who place highest in the compulsory figures may not have the same success in free skating, but this should not dampen their enthusiasm for honing their skill in figures. Though the satisfaction of completing a well-proportioned figure may be its own reward, the special recognition bestowed in competitions like the Providence invitational is nice too!



Howard Bass, SKATING's correspondent for England, filed the following report on the British Ice Dance Championships:

"Hilary Green and Glyn Watts became the new British ice dance champions by a unanimous judges' verdict at Nottingham, England. Janet Sawbridge and Peter Dalby could not defend their title because Janet had a minor abdominal operation a week prior to the competition, but hoped to resume skating within a fortnight.

"Rosalind Druce and David Barker, eighth in Europe last year, found their passage to the second British spot more difficult than generally anticipated, pressed hard all the way by a much improved Janet Thompson and Warren Maxwell.

"Lilting serenely through the Original Set-Pattern Waltz and afterwards in their element during the final free dance, Hilary and Glyn must have heartened their national team selectors. David and the well postured Rosalind look well set until faltering in the Blues. Janet and Warren drew almost level before being ultimately outshone in the free by their more mature rivals."

A few weeks later, Correspondent Dennis Bird commented on the British Figure Skating Championships:

"The reigning champions in two events were defeated when the British figure skating championships were held at Richmond ice rink on December 6 and 7. Jean Scott, who has suffered both physical injuries and ice-time difficulties this year, was decisively beaten by Maria McLean, while the 1971 Pair champions, Jayne Torvill and Michael Hutchinson, lost to a new partnership—Linda McCafferty and Colin Taylforth.

"The ladies event drew the largest entry since it was first held in 1927. Sixteen girls skated the three figures of Group II.

"Miss Scott still held a small lead after the figures, but it vanished after the compulsory short program. Jean fell on a double Lutz and landed the double toe-loop in her combination jump on an inside edge. She was only fifth in this part of the event. Maria was first, with Jenny Bartley second and Linda McCafferty third.

"In the final free skating, Maria again excelled, giving one of the best performances of her life. Second best in the free was Gail Keddie, who skated elegant, powerful jumps from strong edges. Linda McCafferty was third with the most artistic performance of all. Jean Scott looked uninspired and was unsettled by a fall on her double Axel. So the title changed hands for the first time since 1963, when Sally Stapleford beat Diana Clifton-Peach. By a coincidence, both were judging on this occasion.

"The Men's event was won in fine style by John Curry. Michael Fish was second, but was beaten in free skating by the very promising fifteen-year-old junior champion Robin Cousins, whose jumps showed a mastery beyond his years.

"Janet Sawbridge and Peter Dalby, unable to defend their crown a few weeks earlier, made a strong comeback to retain the R.J. Wilkie Memorial Trophies. This event was instituted to commemorate the inventor of several of the international dances, and competitors on this occasion had to skate the Argentine Tango and the Quickstep. The new champions, Hilary Green and Glyn Watts, were second.



It is a truism of competitive figure skating that talent and money are rarely married.

The difficulties that many of our skaters encounter in meeting skating expenses and the increasing costs of gaining a college education are well known to anyone who has been around the skating scene in the United States during the past decade. In many instances talented skaters must choose between skating and a college education that will prepare the individual for a productive life after the skates are hung up. In too many cases, skating is the loser. The Memorial Fund Scholarship project was designed to alleviate, at least in a small way, the pressure of college costs.

Competitive skaters who desire scholarship assistance and can present valid reasons for a real need, may apply for aid through their member clubs. Applications are forwarded to the Sectional scholarship chairman. Applications from each region are then sent to the USFSA Memorial Fund Scholarship Committee for final selections. Funds are divided equally among the three sections.

The scholarship program is one of the most important projects underwritten by the Memorial Fund and should receive wider promotion among member clubs to insure that the most deserving and promising figure skaters are considered for aid. The Scholarship Fund, which distributed \$6,000 in the 1972 calendar year, is presently underfunded when the magnitude of need among our skaters is considered. The Memorial Fund Committee would like to channel more money into the program and plans to do so as more funds become available.

The scholarship program is just another good reason why we must all support our USFSA Memorial Fund.



Looking Back

THE FIRST FIFTY YEARS

In April, 1939, SKATING first published some tiny sketches by Guy H.B. Smith, of the now-defunct Newton FSC. The sketches ("which are used as 'breaks' and tailpieces," wrote the editor) decorated the pages of SKATING each issue until the 1960's. Though other drawings by other artists were also used during this period to serve the same purpose, Mr. Smith's held the longevity record.




