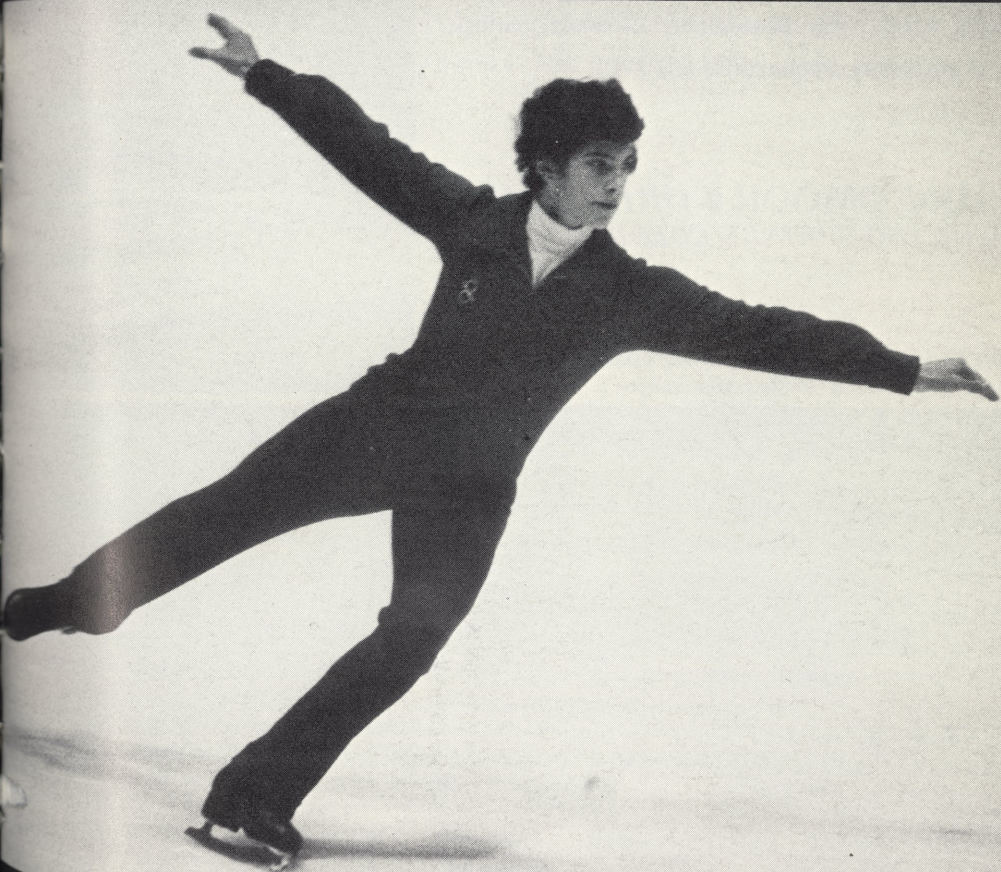

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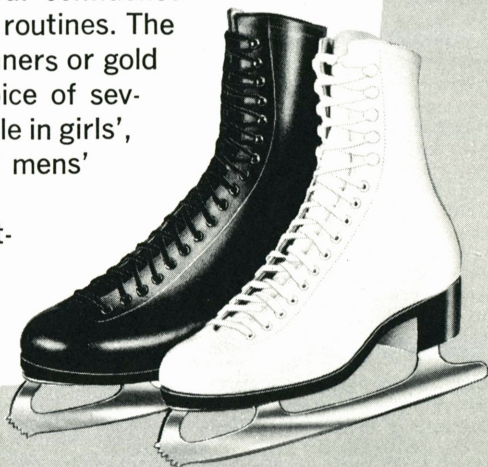
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COVER: With innovative free skating, Stephen Savino captured the audience's imagination and the 1973 Eastern Senior Men's title. Photo by David Leonardi.

EASTERNS

Wherever parents, pros, skaters or judges were to be found in conversation at the Eastern Championships this year, the topic under discussion was the same: the Senior singles compulsory short program. It was generally understood that the maximum length was to be two minutes, and that the program was to be kept uncomplicated. Just how simple and how short a program would still earn high marks was the question.

As it turned out in performance, most of the competitors appeared severely pressured and consequently skated in a perfunctory fashion, apparently preoccupied with the actual mechanics of

the jumps and linking moves. Programs were marked by falls, two-footed jumps and missed combinations. Indeed, except from the standpoint of endurance and consistency, this short program is easily as demanding as the longer free skating program, and once the requirements are fully understood, will give an accurate account of total proficiency.

The Senior Men's free skating program which was conceived with a triple Salchow, not in the middle or near the end, but within the first four seconds, was not—as it appeared at first glance—inspired in a moment of lunacy. Far from it. Stephen Savino was as confident of that jump as he was of a mazurka. And as

if this were not enough, shortly thereafter having secured the long outside edge in preparation for a double Lutz, Stephen did not take his free arm behind him as one would expect, but rather left both arms dead ahead of squared shoulders, and thus gained a sharply peaked upward vault before he even thought of the ensuing rotations. The spectators, stunned into attention at the outset, rose at the conclusion of his performance in tribute to his superb strength and technique.

And then there was Cathy Foulkes from the Hayden Recreation Centre FSC, skating in the Junior Ladies division. Her whole body, to and including her hands—which at times seemed connected to electrical fuses, so staccato were their movements—interpreted each phrase, at one moment caressing the melodic lines, and then in a stark musical segment, reacting in a contracted response. Applause after each section indicated approval of this individually stylized treatment, rarely seen in competitive programming.

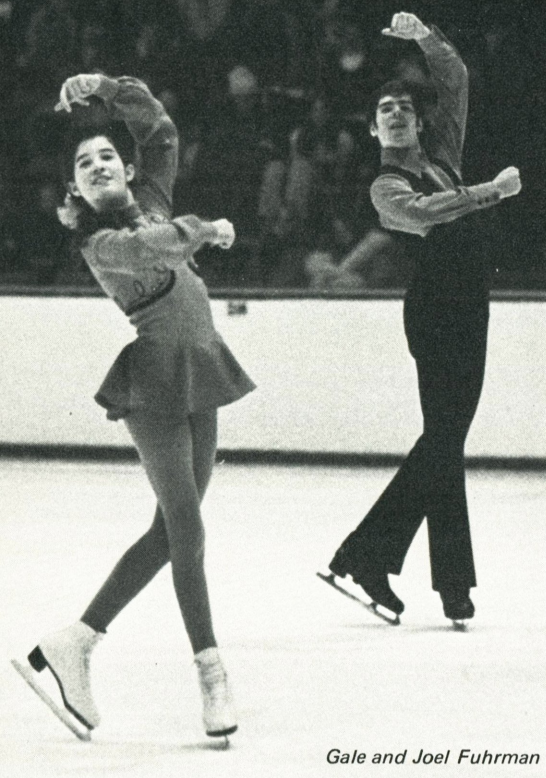
However, the name of the game is still jumping, and so it remained for Christine Messina, a Senior lady from the Commonwealth FSC, to win the hearts of everyone. This girl literally jumped for joy and came down only to go back up, until at the end there was truly nothing left undone, and the audience was left as breathless as Christine.

What can you say about an eleven-year-old who last year passed her eighth test? Priscilla Hill, with not a fall, stumble or hair out of line the whole three days, placed third in Senior Ladies. No one who has watched her over the years was surprised. She is a small diamond of a skater with unequalled purity, and the brilliance has only just begun.

In the dance events one is so often caught up in the total effect of beautiful costumes, lilting music, leaning bodies and sheer envy that it is difficult to comment critically. Jane Pankey and Richard Horne of the SC of Wilmington were, as always, outstanding. Their performances were marked by great professionalism and their Gold free dance generated a quality of fun and excitement. Christine

Linney and Bruce Bowland, also from Wilmington, imparted a very special kind of grace and flow to their free dance which was also particularly inventive and suited to their height.

On the Bronze Dance level, Karen and Doug Mankowich, skating with a very strong lean, so noticeably lacking in young skaters, were as sure footed and well matched as any of the dance couples in the higher categories. Although they will not go to Nationals this year, someday they will be strong contenders.

It must have been a Trojan chore to judge the Senior Pair skating at this competition. First place went to Gale and Joel Fuhrman in spite of the separate double jumps and strong independent skating of Emily Benenson and Johnny Johns. The Fuhrmans for the most part stuck to their perfectly timed lifts and paired moves. Both pairs were exciting to watch.

These, then, were the highlights of the 1973 Eastern Championships.

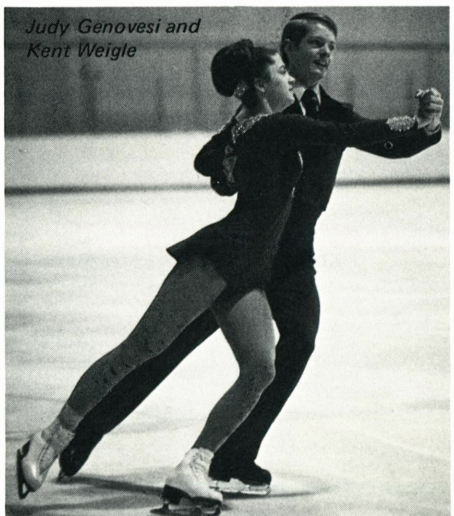

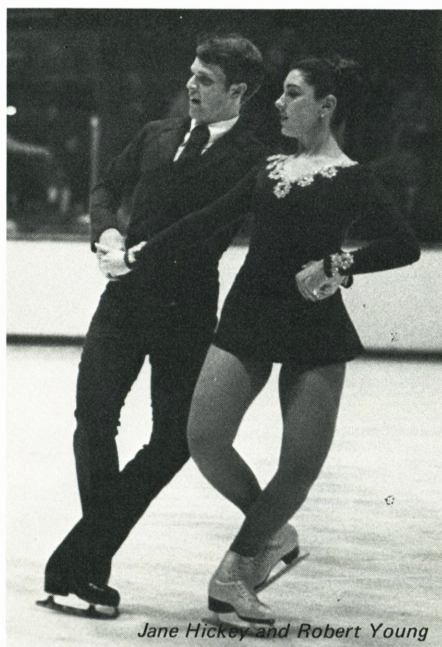

Keen competition keyed the 1973 Midwestern Championships, the first meet to be staged at the new Colorado Ice Arena in southwest Denver. Denver FSC members from four different rinks cooperated in production of the 22-state Sectional skatefest, which was masterminded by Co-chairmen Elsie Weinstein and Irwin Steiner. Crisp temperatures heralded the start of the meet, but the weatherman soon relented and thereafter favored the approximately 150 skaters with Colorado's "typical" mildness and sunshine.

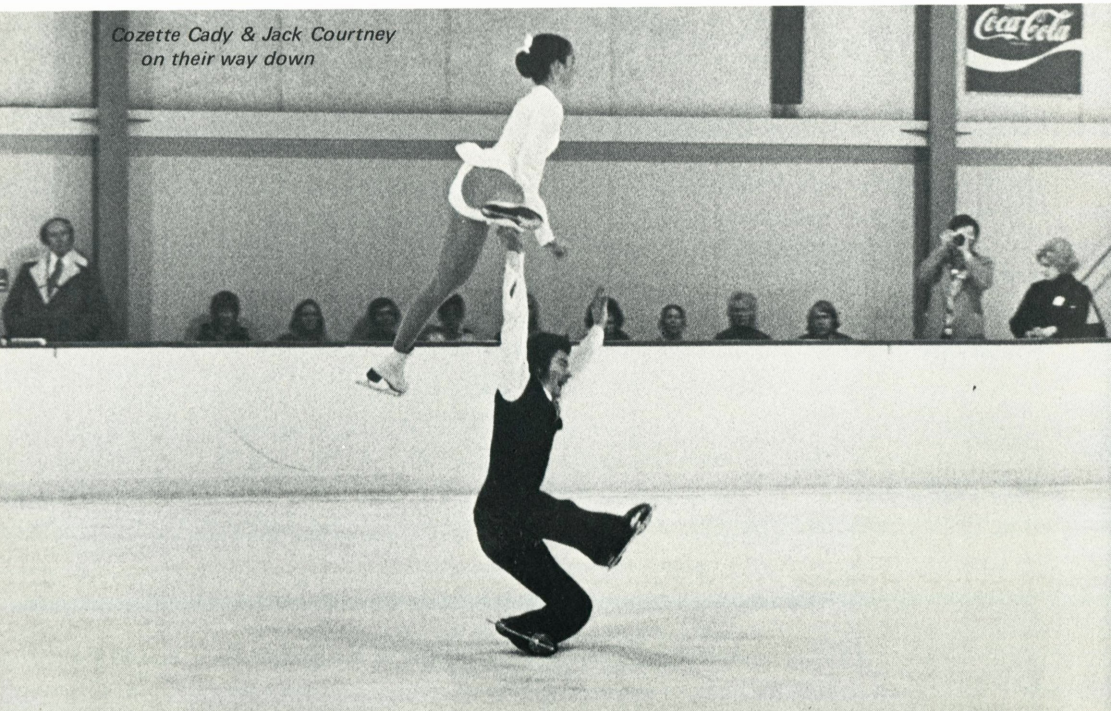
Collecting the Junior Pairs trophy at the close of first-day competition were 16-year-old Patty Morton and 18-year-

old Bill Fauver, runners-up in 1972. The Troy SC duo, whose superior program was marred four times by miscues, squeaked past Rose Mary Wilzbacher and David Bolton of St. Paul, when a three-way tie for first place was broken by a subsequent and greater majority of seconds. The third-place twosome in the deadlock were 13- and 16-year-old Vicki and David Assafi, a brother-sister team from Denver.

By contrast, the Senior Pairs event dissolved into a "no contest" race when one of the two couples took a spectacular spill during an attempted one-arm lift in the final free skating round and was unable to continue. The victims, Cozette Cady and Jack Courtney, consequently weren't given marks. Their only rivals, Debbie Hughes and Phillipp Grout, both of the host club, had only to skate their program to cinch the Championship. Miss Cady wasn't injured. Courtney suffered a mild concussion, but was back at the rink the following day.

David Santee

Denver's major dailies gave prominent headlines to the Senior singles events. David Santee, former National Junior Men's champion, parlayed a 1-2-3 combination into the winner's circle, while Juli McKinstry, former National Junior Ladies champion, used a 3-1-1 formula for her stunning triumph. Skating for the Chicago FSC, Santee placed first in compulsory figures, second in the compulsory short program and third in free skating. David uniquely used his compulsory routine as the opening of his free skating.

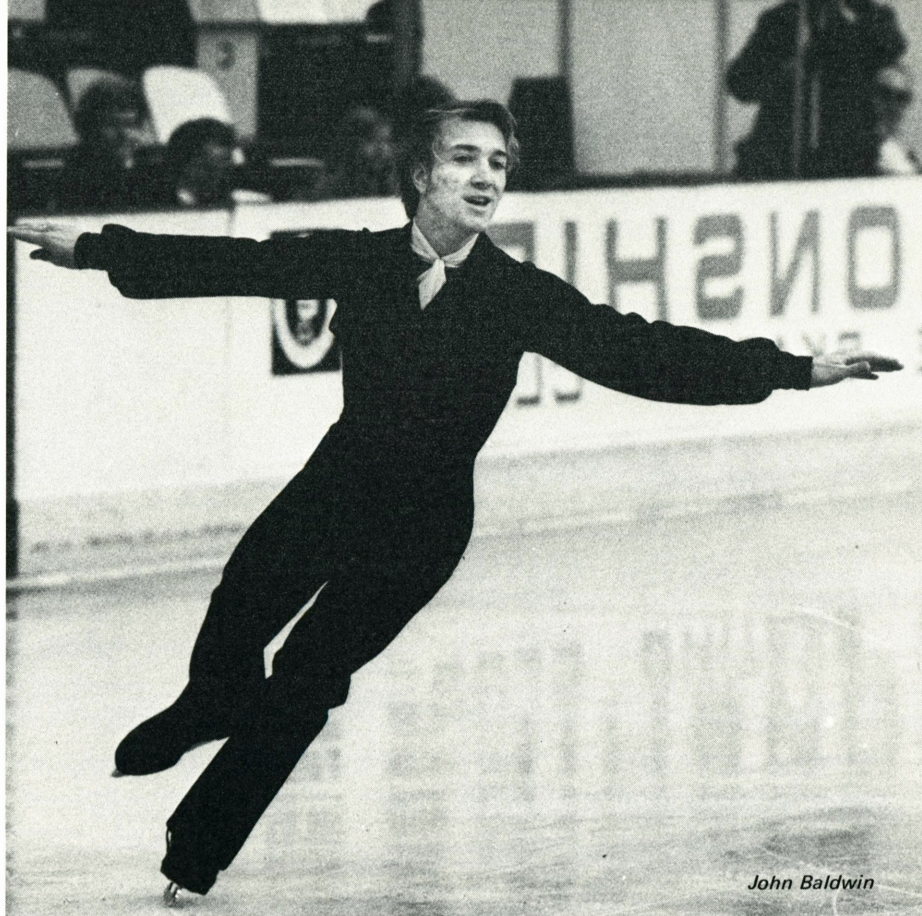
Only two men executed all six compulsory free skating moves correctly. One was Santee and the other was John Baldwin, first in the compulsory segment, whose career encompasses three national titles. Baldwin later gave novices and pros alike an impressive lesson in perseverance. Missing both the triple Salchow and triple loop jumps in his free skating program, the 23-year-old veteran completely revised his choreography and went back to the same spots to make history by successfully completing not one, but both of the jumps. Baldwin, a disappointing fifth after school figures, paid for his

determination—which numerous pros and colleagues described as “guts.” In rearranging his program to accommodate the repeat tries, he sacrificed probably 1½ minutes of content as well as continuity and had to settle for second in both free skating and the overall standings.

“But I knew I could do them,” he explained.

Stealing the limelight in Senior Men's free skating was Charlie Tickner, a Denver newcomer who settled the outcome of the contest even before it was one. First in the skating order, the former Californian dazzled an overflow crowd of 1,200 with a virtually flawless presentation containing all the standard double jumps, including three double Axels, plus triple Salchow and triple loop jumps and a pair of unusual toeless Lutz jumps. Enhancing his program were several original jump combinations, such as the concluding reverse jump/bracket jump/toeless Lutz/double toe-loop sequence, which was barely completed before the appreciative audience was on its feet applauding and whistling approval.

Two lower division titles also were de-



terminated in the second night's slate prior to the Senior Men's finale. Dee Oseroff and Tim Hodges prevailed in Silver Dance, with Jackie Booth and Michael Podmore placing second. Candy Anderson and Ronald Radke took third.

A championship free skating performance enabled two-time Southwestern champion Gail Hamula, of the Broadmoor SC, to soar from fifth after school figures to first overall in Junior Ladies, while Betsy Hobson, Braemar-City of Lakes FSC, claimed the runner-up spot and Sherry Kilmer, Cleveland SC, took third.

Saturday's parade of talented lower division free skaters augured well for the future of figure skating in the Midwestern states. School figures leaders Eva Barton-Dobenin, of the Broadmoor, and 14-year-old Scott Hamilton, Bowling Green SC, won the Novice Championships. Jackie Dean, who trains at the host arena, was runner-up to Miss Barton-Dobenin, and

Kathy Gelecinskyj, of Minneapolis, catapulted from ninth after school figures to third place with a victory in free skating.

Trailing Scott Hamilton, who also triumphed in free skating, were Mark Hayes, second, and Scott Sherman, third. Hayes had been fifth at the midway point.

Douglas Swisher maintained his first place after school figures in Intermediate Men. Wagon Wheel's David Kinser and Eric Werschin were second and third. Top marks in free skating, however, were garnered by Chuck Abbott, Denver FSC, who finished fourth.

Kelsey Ufford, a 10-year-old dynamo from Edina, Minn., literally leaped onto the Intermediate Ladies throne with a precocious and difficult routine opening with a crowd-pleasing Russian split and featuring several jump combinations not usually seen at her level. Second place went to polished Sharon Meredith, Broadmoor, and third to school figures leader

Kathy Fitzpatrick, Denver FSC.

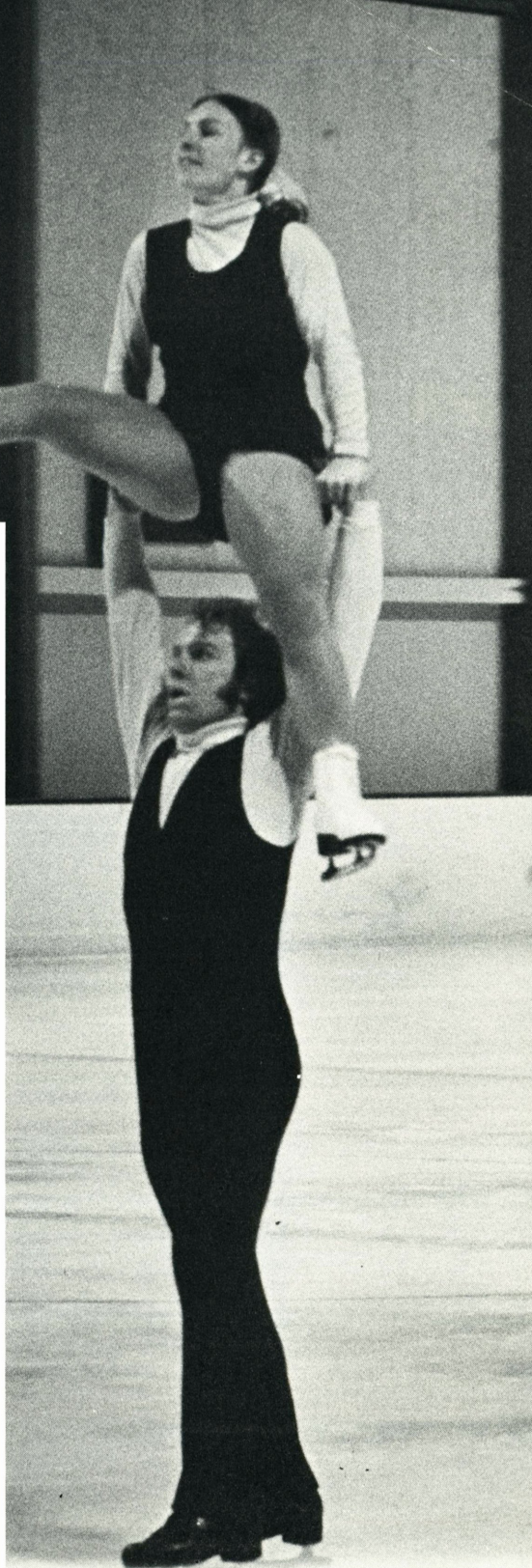
The Novice Pair medallists, in order, were Elizabeth and Gordon Black, Detroit SC; Julie and Peter Williams, Broadmoor SC; Adrienne Chang and Rick Turley, Wagon Wheel FSC.

Standings were identical for the first and final rounds of Bronze Dance as Carol Fox and Richard Dalley annexed the title. Laura Pierce and Rick Berg were runners-up, and Debbie Weinstein and Steven Goff were third.

Junior Men contenders opened the meet's closing session with a sparkling demonstration of free skating virtuosity. Southwestern champion Ronnie Green, 15, garnered his second straight Midwestern title. School figures frontrunner Bill Schneider and Chris Kales were second and third. Missing a National berth by .33 of a point was Denver's Robert Steiner.

Collecting Gold Dance laurels were Colleen O'Connor and Jim Millns, runners-up in 1972. Susan Ogletree and Gerard Lane were second, and Elizabeth Blatherwick and Robert Kaine, third.

Going into the final round of Senior Ladies competition, Denver's Diane Goldstein held a commanding two-round lead based on first place in compulsory figures and third in the compulsory short program. Kath Malmberg, the 16-year-old defending champion, was in second place, and Juli McKinstry was third. The title was settled in the wrap-up, however, when Juli—last in the skating order and obviously bidding for victory—closed the



four-day competition on a high note with an electrifying interpretation of Leonard Bernstein's ballet music, "Fancy Free." Her inspired performance, which was notable for its subtle blending of artistry and precise timing, gave the 16-year-old ice ballerina her first Midwestern crown and insured the Broadmoor of its 14th team title since 1945 with 85 points.

The meet concluded with an elegant buffet-supper dance at the nearby Green Gables Country Club.

With calm efficiency, the officials and Senior Men started the Pacific Coast Championships right on time under a cheerful, sunny Southern California sky. The All Year FSC is noted for hosting well run competitions, and this one was no exception as it progressed smoothly for three full days. Top performances were skated in each event to the enjoyment of over one thousand spectators in attendance each of the three evenings.

Robert Bradshaw again won the Senior Men's title, leading in compulsory figures and skating a most difficult program with superb footwork and style. Terry Kubicka won the free skating and moved from a third after figures to a solid second place. His finish with a delayed Axel and two double Axels into a blurred spin brought an ovation from the large, enthusiastic audience. Third was Mark Rehfield, who continues to show improvement in both figures and free skating.

In Senior Ladies, Wendy Burge was a little below her normal free style excellence, missing one double Axel, but she did another very well and finished in first place. Donna Arquilla climbed to second with a free skating program featuring two double Axels, with one in a combination. Donna Albert, first in figures, moved to third.

With superior loops, the Junior Men displayed the best figures of the competition. John Carlow, Jr., led during this segment, and his free skating—with very fine footwork—was also good, enabling him to win the Gold medal. Perry Jewell's exciting program, which contained many high jumps, earned him first in free skating and a Silver medal in the combined results. Ken Newfield won the Bronze with well executed jumps and spins.

Although the fine performances in Junior Ladies made the judges' decisions most difficult, Laurie Brandel captured the title. She opened her program with a double Lutz/double Axel combination and continued to show superb technical capability as she skated to music from "Carmen." Twelve-year-old Linda Frati-
anne, who won the free skating portion

and took the Silver medal, performed all her jumps with difficult entries and exits (a double Axel from a spiral combination take-off) and with the appearance of effortless ease. With a very strong, athletic free program, Kim McIsaac moved from sixth in figures to third place.

Thirteen-year-old Scott Carson held a convincing lead in both figures and free skating to win the Gold medal in Novice Men. His free skating to the *Comedienne Gallup* was quick and bright with several double jumps. Patrick Page skated a clean program with good content, holding onto second place. Randy Gardner skated with poise and improved form, completing a nice double Axel for third.

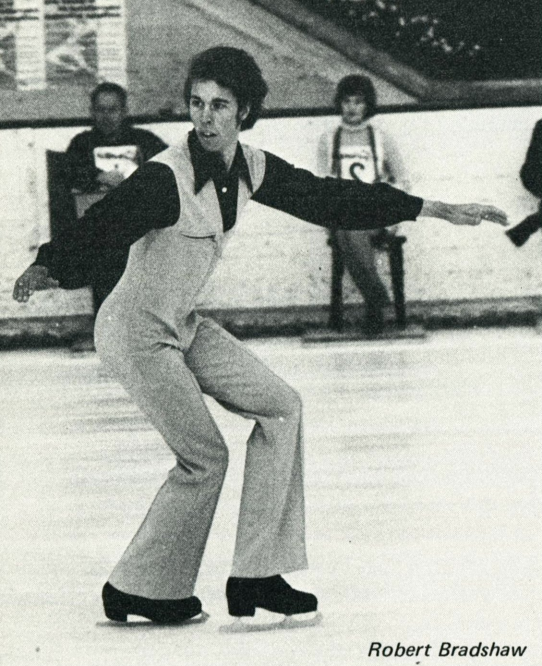
Novice Ladies found Barbara Smith, who led after figures, successfully completing all her jumps and finishing her free skating program with a double Lutz into a blur spin to win a solid first overall. Tiny Teresa Foy skated a beautiful program including lovely ballet moves to the "Boston Pops Festival" and moved from third to second place overall. With her unique style, Sandra Starbuck received a third after finals.

Eric Johnson, with a strong lead, held off his Intermediate Men rivals to the very end. With a good feel for music, Michael Lettengarver skated a very enjoyable free style program to place second. Brian Haack gave a good but cautious performance, ending his program with a fast spin, and finished third.

Intermediate Lady Teri Markley won first with a fine showing in both figures and free skating. Jeanne Chapman skated a flawless program for the second spot. Then followed Rachelle Ottley, especially talented in her musical interpretation.

Karen Raile and Curt Finley are a delightful young Gold Dance team, whose good flow and ease of interpretation helped to put them in first place for all three events of Gold Dance. Silver medalists Barbara and Michael Wayland pleased the audience with their execution of the Blues rhythm in their free dance.

The Silver Dance Initial Round found Gail and Stephen Heitert and Vicki Scheurn and Roger Fortin tied for first

position. The accountants went to Total Points to break the tie, and Gail and Stephen won the Initial Round by three-tenths of a point. This brother and sister team showed good flow and a smooth, refreshing air to maintain their lead in the Final. Leslie Kiser and Mickey McCann, with good edges and a very confident style, won Bronze Dance.

Again this year we had only two Senior Pairs. Jodie Martin and Robert Berry, newcomers to the division, held the lead all the way to win the championship. Cynthia Van Valkenburg and James Hullick have a pleasing style which suits them well, but were unable to skate their

best and finished in second position.

The Junior Pairs event was won by tiny Tai Babilonia, who also competed in Intermediate Ladies, and Randy Gardner, who won the Bronze medal in Novice Men. Tai and Randy had the most flow and the strongest program in content and unison. They executed side by side double flips and good, mature lifts for so young a pair. Silver medallists Erika Susman and Thomas Huff have great presentation and appearance on the ice and are musical and interpretive. Vicki Carr and Paul Tassone had no errors, but lower content and not as difficult a program, and finished third. This pair has improved greatly over last year.

Ten and twelve-year-old Tracy and Scott Prussack showed amazing skill and maturity in Novice Pairs to win the Gold medal. Sundee Witt and David Nottoli did a breathtaking throw Axel and also skated well to their music for a close second. The Bronze medal was won by Jackie Hanson and David Hicks.

Because a Honeywell computer was used to determine unofficial results at both the Pacific Coast and Midwestern Championships, we were able to post the standings from both Sectionals within minutes after each event had been skated.

Besides the fine skating, the pleasure of seeing old friends and making new ones made the Pacific Coast Championships a memorable experience for All Year Club members, skaters, officials and spectators alike.

getting a break

The key question in every struggling skater's mind is: What does it take to become a figure skating champion? Fourteen-year-old Colleen Ann Cahill, of the Plaza FSC in Ohio, knows the answer—but her painful experience isn't recommended to everyone as the best way of reaching the top!

It all started on November 4, 1971, when she broke her ankle as she came out of an Axel jump on the ice at Northfield Plaza. It was just three weeks before the Eastern Great Lakes Championships, in which she had placed second among twenty Juvenile Girls the year before. Having won the Silver medal in the 1970 meet, she naturally was determined that the Gold would be hers in '71. But the elusive end of the rainbow seemed forever beyond reach—impossible with a broken ankle!

Or so everyone thought. They regretted Colleen's unfortunate accident but crossed her off as a possible future champion.

Colleen, however, wasted no time regretting her broken ankle and the missed chance for the Gold medal. Neither did her devoted mother or her dedicated skating coach, Phil Racine.

As soon as the cast was off, Colleen began a program of therapy at the neighboring Ramada Inn pool—four to six a.m., every day.

Then, starting last February and working through all of March and April, she passed Figure Tests Four, Five and Six. On April 26th the goal of all great skaters, the Seventh Test, was conquered. To pass four tests, which normally requires about five years of work, in less than five months is a truly fantastic achievement. To top it all off, Colleen passed all four tests on the first try.

On March 25, 1972, Colleen won the Junior Ladies Interpretative Free Style event in the Cleveland Invitational. She has passed her Silver and Pre-Gold dances and now is working on passing her Gold dances. Only a Tim Wood or a Peggy Fleming could understand the work involved.

Colleen's usual day runs like this:

Out of bed	4:45 a.m.
On the ice	6 - 9 a.m.
School	9:45 - 3:15 p.m.
Back on the ice	6 - 8 p.m.
To bed	9 p.m.

To overcome a handicap, to set such a rigorous recovery therapy and to follow it up with a daily physical exertion of such magnitude takes great dedication, perseverance, and love of figure skating. In addition, Colleen has studied ballet, tap and modern jazz dance and acrobatics for six years. She also maintains a straight "A" scholastic average and won honors in the March, 1972, Northeastern Ohio Science Fair.

Quite a few of us "oldsters" have taken up figure skating late in life and we love both figures and ice dances. As one who competed and excelled in tennis, badminton and golf, I still prefer figure skating, a never-ending joyful sport. Over the years I have known and watched great champions train. It was my special pleasure to patch next to Tim Wood. I felt inspired as he worked out daily on counters, rockers, and paragraph loops.

Now I've become an observer and admirer of Colleen Ann Cahill, a fourteen-year-old who started figure skating at the late age of eleven. I give this very special teen-aged skater my unstinted support and admiration. There are few such cases of dogged determination to overcome the handicap of a broken ankle and make such a comeback in so short a period of time.

Colleen has not yet won her coveted championship, but those who know the stiff requirements for championship in this sport are backing her all the way as a winner in all categories of technique, style, spirit and performance. O

Are the Olympics Dead?

The recent Olympics in Munich, West Germany, brought to the fore many of the questions that have been lurking in the shadows for the past several years. Amidst an aura of impeccable organization and computerized monitoring, a whirlwind of paradoxes burst forth. Millions of dollars poured into producing what was hoped to be an Olympics devoid of all slip-ups and inaccuracies. What resulted was a playground for nations and a battlefield for soldiers.

At first glance, the injustices in the athletic arena at Munich appeared sudden and unexpected. Never before had politics played such a crucial and overt role in amateur athletics. Incongruities in judging in gymnastics, diving, basketball, boxing, and wrestling blazed a painful mark on the idealism of the Olympic games. Brotherhood and inspired peace died at the hands of the guillotine of political

mania. Nationhood and patriotism flashed their banners until the banter of idealism drowned in the uproar. Pacts of peace and international co-operation that have materialized recently seemed not to have quelled the political hysteria that infected this pristine setting.

However, this rather superficial observation does not hold up under persistent investigation. These inconsistencies in fact did not just suddenly appear, but rather originated from long-standing undercurrents of tensions and traditions. On the one hand, the tension among countries so apparent in our age has contributed greatly to the infiltration of politics into the Olympics, while simultaneously rituals inherent within the Games

have set the stage for that infiltration.

Before leaping into the subject of politics which paints such an obviously disturbing picture, it is valuable to determine what Olympic traditions contribute to the gloomy tone of the Olympics picture.

For many years, audiences at the opening ceremonies have quaked and shivered at the majestic and glorious sight of the athletes marching into the stadium ranked according to country. Smart, neat uniforms present an impressive spectacle. Yet, before the events themselves even begin, an ominous omen rides the wind over the stadium. Athletes arrayed behind their respective flags represent the approaching competition as that among countries rather than among individuals.

The end of the opening ceremonies only sounds the toll for further national segregation. Practice sessions are organized according to country to stimulate comradery among competitors—unfortunately only among athletes from the same country. The omen is slowly becoming a reality—the reality that athletes from different countries have come to the Olympic Games to represent their countries in a battle of nations on the playing field. From the beginning, the spirit of dichotomy between athletes of diverse nationalities is distinctly portrayed.

The brandishment of national colors does not in fact terminate with the end of the opening ceremonies or the training sessions. The participants stand tensely waiting for the commencement of a match in their country's colors that proudly boast their nationality. Once the meet has ended, the top three placers receive their medals to the raising of their flags and to the playing of the winner's national anthem. To drive the point home, a record of the total medals won by each country is assiduously kept.

Therefore, with the blatant emphasis on national representation, is it no wonder that politics enter in to the actual playing of each sport? When the stature of a nation receives an uplift from an impressive display of talent at the Olympic Games, which are watched by mil-

lions of people, it is not difficult to understand why a nation might follow extreme courses of action to accomplish that end. In fact, since we oftentimes witness instances of bias in athletic events in the United States, we certainly must expect to find equally as much if not more manipulation at the Olympic level where the stakes are far higher.

Intervention by political institutions for the prominent positions is expressed through a rather superficial medium—the judging. As the readers well know, adverse judging in skating is as prevalent as it is in the sports mentioned at the beginning of this article. Finding examples of such judging does not require a lengthy search. Regie Jones and the United States basketball team are only two examples of the effects of biased judging. There have been many more.

The grand illusion of the spirit of the Olympics may at first seem shattered by the lack of idealism and brotherhood as expressed through the judging. However, two distinctions are mandatory before we can decide whether the spirit of the Olympics has faltered. First of all, what we see is what is fed to us by the press. Secondly, we witness through the press primarily what ensues from the actions of the officials in relation to the athletes rather than directly from the actions among the athletes themselves. Since the press does not always base its stories on the grassroots of each incident (and understandably so), we are often receiving reports of what is happening between athletes and the officials rather than the occurrences among the athletes. I can assure you that from my own experience, the happenings in each instance are radically different. The athletes themselves generally exhibit extraordinary compatibility and brotherhood. It is only when the upper echelon of the organization sticks its grimy finger into the works that the Olympic machine sputters. Yet, it is the entire organization which must be considered since the Olympic Games include athletes and officials alike.

log your ice time!

Are you an adult who is apathetic about skating? How often have you said, "I started too late to do anything with my skating!"

If you are one of these skaters, you may take heart from the recognition that the President's Council on Physical Fitness is offering. Men and women aged eighteen years and older may now win a Presidential Sports Award simply by participating regularly in figure skating or ice skating.

The object of the program is to encourage adults to be actively involved in exercise programs in the interest of physical fitness.

Standards for the Presidential Sports Award Program were developed by the President's Council on Physical Fitness in cooperation with forty-five major sports' governing bodies and coaches' associations. Currently, the award is being offered in thirty-one sports. No tax monies are used since individual fees sustain the project.

The USFSA representative who assisted with the qualifying standards for the figure skating award was Edward Picken of Chevy Chase, Maryland. The USFSA Program Development Committee has been given the responsibility for implementing the program in the organization.

In figure skating, those who participate in figures, free style and ice dancing for a total of fifty hours are eligible to receive a certificate signed by the President, an enameled pin and a colorful embroidered emblem. No more than one and one half hours of figure skating may be counted in any one day in order to insure regularity of participation. There is no test to take.

Another award is offered in ice skating. The requirements include participation in skating a minimum of two hundred miles, no more than six miles in any one day credited to the total.

Both awards are available to any man or woman over eighteen years of age who wishes to participate, and he or she need not be affiliated with any group.

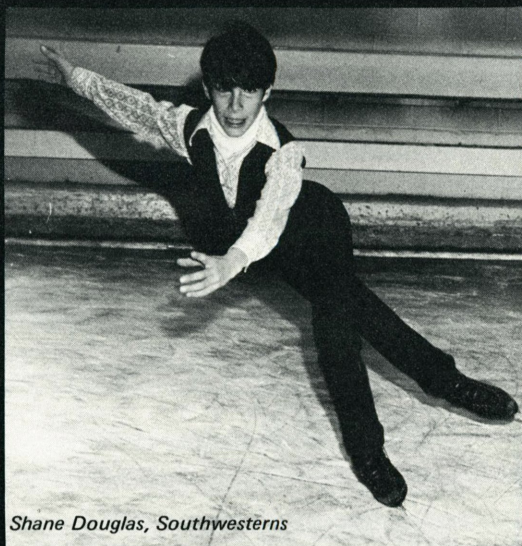
The basic principle governing qualification for these awards is fifty hours of participation, spread over at least fifty activity sessions within a period of four months. Some concessions have been made in sports where seasons are short and access to facilities limited. Consequently, in the case of figure skating, the required fifty hours of activity may be accomplished in fewer than fifty sessions.

The award is obtained by submitting a logbook with the record of skating activity within the above requirements, together with a fee of \$3.00 to: The Presidential Sports Award, P.O. Box 129, Radio City Station, New York, New York 10019. Logbooks for your record are available on request from this same source.

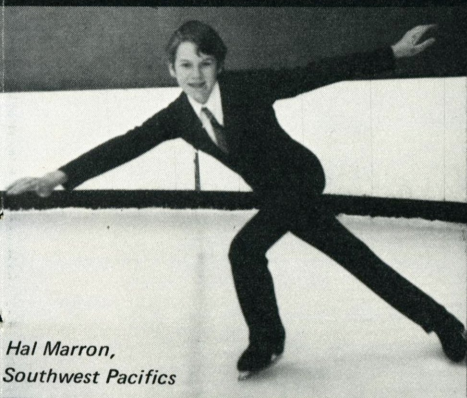

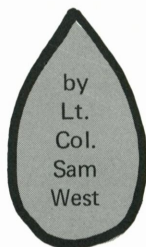

If grains of sand make a beach and drops of water an ocean, more efforts like those of the Mission Valley Ice Skating Club in San Jose, California, will make our Memorial Fund grow to the goal of \$750,000 that has been set for it. In early September, Robert Thornell, new president of the Mission Valley club, proposed to his board of directors that the club make periodic contributions to the Memorial Fund.

The board approved two projects aimed toward that goal. First, they agreed to contribute to the USFSA Memorial Fund each month half of the guest fees received for the month, the remaining fifty percent of these fees to be assigned to the Mission Valley ISC Memorial Scholarship Fund. As the second project they earmarked an as yet undetermined percentage of the receipts of all non-dues, general fund raising activities to be split 50-50 between the USFSA Memorial Fund and the Mission Valley ISC Memorial Scholarship Fund. The percentage will be determined by the board of directors prior to the first fund raising activity of the 1972-73 season.

The first contribution under the guest fees project came to the USFSA Memorial Fund in late September: a check for \$18.50, which represented fifty percent of guest fees collected in September.

For those who might say, "that's not much help," we remind you that there are presently two hundred eighty member clubs in the Association. Just one hundred dollars a year from every club in the Association would pay for a lot of five hundred dollar scholarships. Another good reason to support your Memorial Fund.

Looking Back

THE FIRST FIFTY YEARS

In the third part of our series of reprints, we take you to the year 1942, when World War II disrupted nearly everyone's daily routine. A sense of urgency befell the nation, and people tried to make sure their every action was worthwhile. Could skating on a pond or rink be termed justifiable during days of crisis? SKATING's editor, Mrs. Theresa Weld Blanchard, wrote the following inspirational message in the January, 1942, issue, telling how skating was, indeed, a highly justifiable activity in the time of war.

Skating's Part in the War

By Theresa Weld Blanchard, Editor

WAR CAME to the United States when our December issue was in the mail. Since that day we have received many letters from personal friends, and readers whose names are so familiar they seem friends, all asking "what can we do as individual skaters and as skating clubs?" . . .

As to what we can all do, I can give only some general suggestions, which are perhaps obvious. The article on "Skating All Over the World" in December proves that it is neither wise nor necessary to give up our sport entirely. Everyone will

want to do some sort of war work and, to do so most efficiently, must be physically fit.

One of the most important premises to any plan of becoming fit and remaining fit is that we exercise *regularly*. A second is that we avoid undue strain and too strenuous participation. Skating lends itself extremely well to these two requirements. Skaters may skate alone or with others. We may plan our skating so that we will get a healthful work-out at regular intervals throughout the winter. Each one

can skate as much as he individually requires to stay fit and need not overdo; this is one of skating's advantages as exercise of any sort may become harmful if overdone. You know your own abilities and limitations.

Participation in sports is important for another reason, too—*mental* relaxation. In the months ahead we are all likely to find ourselves working harder than we have before, and working under much more strain and pressure than we have become accustomed to in normal times. Relaxation, particularly of the type that is healthful as well as relaxing, will be very necessary if we are to maintain our ability to work smoothly and well. Our participation in sports, if we arrange our schedules carefully, will become welcomed intervals during which we may refresh ourselves mentally *and* physically.

It is also important that we retain our active interest and participation in club and group activities. We must carry on the skating clubs we have already established and encourage the organizing of new ones.

It seems to me this is an obligation of our clubs and their officers. Every member should be given a good time, and more social activity and dancing could well be planned. Another very important obligation of our clubs is to open their

doors to the young men in service from other clubs who may be stationed in their neighborhood. A chance to skate and possibly have dinner with a skating family is certainly going to send any young soldier back to camp refreshed and stimulated.

Another way clubs can be of service is to give informal exhibitions or junior carnivals for Red Cross and other war charities. Canada has already pointed the way and now it is up the United States clubs to follow. Toronto's sponsoring of Blood Banks is an outstanding example of this. Such carnivals, large or quite informal, will serve to hold the younger members and continue the life of the club as the older skaters are forced to curtail their activity.

This magazine was started, shortly after the last war, by a few of us who were advantageously situated in the East near the best skaters. Our object was to spread knowledge of figure skating, and the benefits and enjoyment to be obtained from it, all over the country. As SKATING's part in a united war effort, we will try to make the issues helpful in this emergency if our readers will co-operate by sending suggestions that they have found practical. We also will do our best to assist skaters in the Service to get in touch with officers of nearby clubs.

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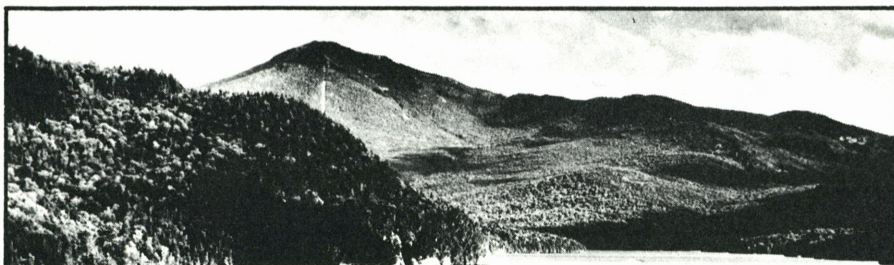
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Can the Olympics ever rid itself of this dirty cloak of politics? Yes, I believe it can but not totally. The Olympics are not an oasis away from the mainstream of real life. They simply manifest another form of real life. On the other hand, reducing the influence of nationalism in the Games represents an achievable goal.

While the solution is not simple, there are a number of Olympic traditions which when altered or eliminated entirely could commence the building of the road to rectification. The elimination of elaborate national uniforms, the placing of the competitor's name on his uniform in bold print with the name of the country in small lettering, the elimination of the raising of the top three winners' flags accom-

panied by the playing of the winner's national anthem could all enhance the increment of idealism in the Olympics. Though these actions may dull the excitement and magnificence of the events, the spirit of brotherhood would benefit. The Olympic Games offer the best athletes who happen to come from different countries an opportunity to compete against each other. Therefore, the eclipsing of national significance in the Olympics could greatly enhance the road toward fair and equal competition.

The road to brotherhood may be free of snags if the organizational committees begin to emphasize the athletes as individuals. If, on the other hand, the members of the International Olympic Committee continue to receive instructions from the natural evolution of the bureaucracy, the road to rectification will become snarled and impassable. If the organizers continue to uphold the unfeasible traditions of the Olympics, the death knell will sound for the Olympics. The setting presently inherent in the Olympic Games can only further stifle the spirit of brotherhood if not changed. Politics will remain as long as implementation of political ends is provoked by these outdated rituals. Competitions among individuals who happen to come from different countries will tend to drive politics out the back door and the spirit of brotherhood in the front door. ○

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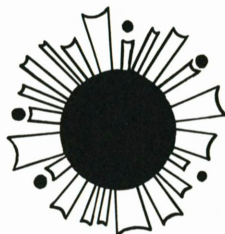

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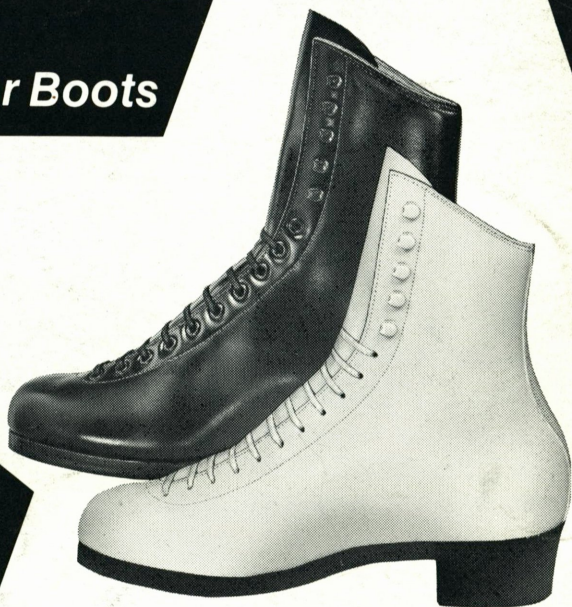
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
