**Lili Kronberger Szent Györgyi,
1890-1974**

Long-time devotees of figure skating learned with sorrow of the death of Lili Kronberger Szent Györgyi, World Ladies' champion from 1908-11, on May 21 in Budapest, Hungary. She also held the Ladies' Championship of Hungary from 1908-10.

Lili Kronberger's skating programs were characterized by her devotion to musical interpretation. In a 1965 interview with SKATING she said, "It is first necessary to hear the music inwardly, then to interpret." She credited her ability to relate each skating movement to its musical measure for much of her competitive success.

In 1911 Lili married Imre Szent Györgyi, and together they worked for the development of figure skating in Hungary.

Newsmakers

British ice dancers Janet Sawbridge and Peter Dalby have announced their retirement from competition. Janet, 27, compiled a remarkable record, competing in 12 World Championships, earning World or European medals with three different partners and winning the British title with two of them. For these achievements, plus the courage that saw her through numerous injuries and setbacks, Janet was named a Member of the British Empire (MBE) on June 15 in the birthday honors list of Queen Elizabeth II. Peter, 28, said he plans a career as a jockey and hopes someday to train and breed race horses. He emphasized that it was he who wanted to retire.

On June 1, Louise and Barry Soper, four-time Canadian Dance champions, also announced that they would no longer compete. Louise is currently working as a dental hygienist, and Barry has entered the real estate and mortgage investment field. The couple will skate in club carnivals as amateurs through 1974, then as professionals in 1975.

Club Notes

Atlanta FSC: A new light dawned in Dixie when on June 29 and 30 the Atlanta FSC sponsored the first judges' school ever to be held in the South. Beginning the Saturday afternoon activities at Maxwell's restaurant was a classroom session taught by William H. Barnes, Eastern Vice Chairman for Dance Judges of the USFSA Judges Committee. Joining Mr. Barnes were National Dance Judges Mrs. William O. Hickok, IV, and Jerome Ross.

On Sunday the 29 prospective Bronze and Silver Dance Judges practiced newly acquired skills during on-ice sessions at the Parkaire Olympic Ice rink, new home of the Atlanta FSC. There official and trial judges marked 55 Preliminary, Bronze and Pre-Silver dances, 48 of which were actual tests. These actual-test situations, interspersed with on-the-spot discussions of individual dances and marks, created an extremely effective training atmosphere. The pressure associated with test judging pervaded the rink, too, when all eligible judges formed a "mystery panel," whereby only the judge in charge knew which judges constituted the actual panel. SC of Lake Placid: With an eye to ice dance's debut in the 1976 Olympics, judges studied the importance of mood and emotion in dance portrayals at the Dance Judges' Workshop sponsored by the SC of Lake Placid on September 6, 7 and 8. From Peter Kadel, ballroom dance instructor and member of the Imperial Society of London, the judges in attendance learned that there is a structure for ballroom dance similar to the USFSA test levels and that there are both social and competitive forms of each dance. The judges then watched, enthralled, as two of Mr. Kadel's pupils demonstrated the American Waltz, Foxtrot, Paso Doble, Rhumba

and various tangos. The dancers subtly conveyed the mood and meaning of each dance through their facial expression, beautiful body lines and partner relationship.

Later participants judged a mock ice dance competition, for which skaters were paired at random, allowing no one to skate with his or her usual partner. Even so, the competitors imparted greater expression to their dancing, indicating that they, too, had been impressed by the ballroom dancers. The workshop pointed out to all that there are many areas of ice dance, and especially free dance, yet to be explored.


SC of Wilmington: Skating competition "for adults only" can be an enjoyable experience. This was proven on May 4 when the SC of Wilmington held the first Wilmington Adult Dance Competition. Organizers hoped to reach dancers of varying abilities and that they did. 





Frank Loeser knows skating, he knows music, he knows dance. I take pleasure, therefore, in introducing "Loeser on Music." I hope you enjoy getting to know him, too.



Recordings from Pavlova

This is the first in a monthly series of record reviews, which I hope will be helpful to skaters and their instructors. Since I want to start off on an absolutely positive first step, I have chosen an album that has a wealth of skating music suited to any number of different skaters. The pieces on the album are, in the main, original and yet perfectly in keeping with the more traditional tastes of skaters and their audiences.

Sonja Henie was skating's Anna Pavlova, or—was it the other way around?—Anna Pavlova was ballet's Sonja Henie. I guess one has to concede to the former, for ballet preceded skating. Nevertheless, both women were genuine artists whose fame transcended their mediums and whose names became household words. Both changed their art forms in an irreversible grand manner, and their spirit and style run through to the skating and dancing of today. Their names alone stir rose-petaled memories of an era undeniably romantic and opulent in manner.

Pavlova's greatest ballet was a short, two and one-half minute solo set to a section for

cello and harp from Saint-Saëns' "Carnival of the Animals." Dramatically entitled "The Dying Swan," this short creation is still a show-piece for great classical ballerinas. Sonja Henie placed "The Dying Swan" on ice, and more recently, in a professional competition from Japan, we saw the Protopopovs give a beautiful interpretation of the music. (Theirs was really the only progressive, worthwhile program of that competition, which consisted mainly of repeats of past amateur programs and styles.)

"The Dying Swan" is just one of the gorgeously played works on a recently released double album entitled **Homage to Pavlova** (London ffr Stereo). My own two favorite cuts from the album are "Ballet Egyptian" and the frivolously named but lush sounding "Le Reveil de Flore" or "The Awakening of Flora." Toller Cranston used part of the latter ballet for his free skating program last season. Many of the pieces are little known but still vivacious works by somewhat obscure composers such as Luigini and Krupinski.

The London Symphony Orchestra, under conductor Richard Bonyngne, plays all of the ballets with a professional sound that hides none of the delight of such light, gay music. The zest of the deliberate dance tempi makes the compositions ideally suited to skating. The engineering of the album is excellent, and the album includes a booklet with superb text and many photographs. The number of cuts on each record side is blessedly bountiful in these days when record companies are reducing the amount of music put on one album.



The Sun Shines on Tai & Randy

The answer to that tantalizing question "What's it going to take to beat the Russian pairs?" may lie in the combination of circumstances and qualities that have already made Southern California's Tai Babilonia and Randy Gardner the youngest pair ever to represent the United States in world competition.

Tai and Randy's rapid rise from novice-

to world-class pair in just four seasons has been characterized by a superabundance of natural talent and a non-stop capacity for hard work and improvement, brought under expert coaching at the optimum stage of development. Equally important, they have the backing of solid, sensible parents who, though a bit awed by the responsibility of such talented offspring, are willing to make the enormous sacrifices necessary to turn out winning amateur athletes under our American system. Hopes are high that a continuation of this winning combination will culminate in not only national honors but in Tai and Randy capturing that long-elusive World

Pairs title won only once by Americans—Karol and Peter Kennedy in 1950.

Tai and Randy's skating careers got started quite unintentionally because of a father's fond recall of childhood skating parties and a godfather's loving indulgence.

It was Randy's father, an accountant with memories of skating parties on frozen rivers in North Dakota, who decided a father-and-son outing to Hughes Aircraft night at the Culver City rink would be a great idea. Dad quickly lost his enthusiasm after a bellyflop on the unfamiliar artificial ice, but 9-year-old Randy took off with a big smile and has been going ever since.

Surrounded by her brother's tennis and football trophies and her own skating awards, Tai enjoys a quiet moment with part of the Babilonia animal menagerie, which includes a black Manx cat given to her by the Gardners.

In addition to his pair accomplishments, Randy has a long string of singles honors to his credit, leading up to the National Novice Men's silver medal in 1973 and the National Junior Men's title in 1974. Another Southern Californian, Ken Shelley, has always been Randy's skating "idol," and Randy hopes to become the fourth American man (Ken was the third) to hold two concurrent national senior titles.

Randy's mother, a second grade teacher, is most impressed by the discipline that skating develops. "It's so wonderful to have him find something he loves enough that self-discipline takes over,"

she says. "He makes such good use of his time."

His father says, "Randy gets me up in the morning to get to the rink. If that attitude ever changes, we'll have to think things over. It is a tremendous commitment."

As far as Randy is concerned, it's not going to change, especially now that he's had a taste of world travel. "That's the best part, the traveling and having friends in other countries. It makes all the hard work worthwhile," he says.

Randy has a 24-year-old brother, Gordon, who is a dental student and has never skated. The Gardner household is enlivened by an assortment of animals

including a dachshund named "Nicksy" and a three-legged Siamese cat.

Tai's first experience on skates came at age 7 on an outing with her Japanese godfather, who is also responsible for her exotic first name. "Tai" translates into English as any one of several nice adjectives—beautiful, tranquil, lovely—all of which accurately describe this young lady.

Actually, with Tai, it was just a question of what sport she would take up. The entire Babilonia family (the surname is of Philippine derivation) is sports-oriented. Her father, a Los Angeles police detective, and mother met on the tennis court and still play whenever possible. Her 18-year-old brother, Constancio (Connie), Jr., lettered in both football and tennis in high school. Tiny Tai found her sport that afternoon at the ice rink. It was love at first stroke!

Competing as a single in the densely populated Southwest Pacific Region, Tai also has an impressive record. In 1973 she finished third in Intermediate Ladies, pulling up from seventh in figures, and last season she was sixth in Pacific Coast Novice Ladies.

When she learned that, if Randy does win two concurrent national senior titles, it would put the men one up on the women in this accomplishment, Tai vowed to redouble her efforts toward this goal too—just to keep things even. "If Randy can do it, so can I," says the spunky 14-year-old, who hopes to make her national singles debut in Junior Ladies this season.

Like the Gardners, the Babilonias feel they can make any sacrifice as long as it is for the fulfillment of natural talent. "We don't want the child to skate for our

Worlds in the Rockies





Oberstdorf & St. Gervais

The American team selected to compete in the best known summer international events—the Nebelhorn Trophy and Grand Prix of St. Gervais—set off for Europe on August 13. First they made their way to Oberstdorf, West Germany, by way of a plane and two trains, with seven minutes to transfer people and baggage from one train to another. Traditionally, it looms as an impossible task, but with gigantic team effort all 17 skaters, parents, coaches and judges, and their

baggage, got on board the second train.

The beautiful Bavarian city of Oberstdorf, where flowers bloom from every window and handsome cows with tinkling bells wind their way through the main streets twice a day, lies in the shadow of the Nebelhorn mountain. The rink, covered but open on three sides, offers a tantalizing view of the mountains.

Each of the five Americans claimed a medal at the competition for the Nebel-

horn Trophy. Judi Genovesi and Kent Weigle, first at the end of the compulsory dances, skated a fine Blues for their original set-pattern dance and an excellent free dance to take first place in each category.

David Santee led the nine men at the end of compulsory figures, then won the short program and free skating. His high, sparkling triple toe-loop and three double Axels at the end of his free program gave him a solid first place.

The two American ladies, Priscilla Hill and Barbara Smith, were evenly matched throughout the competition. At the end of compulsory figures Barbara was first, Priscilla, second, and Eve Kopfli of Switzerland, third. Petra Wagner of West Germany won the short program, but the free program was won by Priscilla, with Barbara a close second. Each showed fine ability and different interpretation. Final result: Priscilla Hill, first; Barbara Smith, second; Petra Wagner, third.

On to St. Gervais! The Nebelhorn exhibitions ended Sunday evening (the 18th), so the Americans and fellow competitors, coaches and judges from Canada, South Africa, Great Britain and South Korea set off Monday by chartered bus for St. Gervais, where competition would begin anew on Wednesday. The 12-hour trip proved quite grueling, but the travelers were fully compensated by the breathtaking scenery. St. Gervais, nestled in the French Alps, is only 22 kilometers from Chamonix and lovely Mont Blanc.

The eighth Grand Prix International began with Men's figures at 7 A.M. on Wednesday. David Santee built a large lead with seven first places, followed by Paul Cechmanek of Luxembourg and Kevin Robertson of Canada.

Ladies' figures began at 7 A.M. the following day, but after six skaters had completed the first figure, the referees stopped the competition because of poor ice conditions and visibility. With marked improvement in the ice by 11 A.M., the figures were restarted from the beginning.

David Santee continued his winning streak, emerging victorious in the short program and free skating over the 13-

pleasure," they say, "but we accept the responsibility because she loves it so much and is working so incredibly hard for her goals."

Tai and Randy's matching lines were first spotted by coach Mabel Fairbanks, who was choreographing a club show in which they skated as Dr. and Mrs. Doolittle. They followed up her suggestion to try competitive pair skating and, after just a few months training, made their debut in the 1971 Southwest Pacific Regional, placing sixth among ten novice pairs. Their talent and hard work paid off the following year with second place in Regionals and third in Pacific Coast Novice Pairs.

At the end of that season, Tai and Randy took on the legacy of being trained by former British and World Pair champion John Nicks. Nicks, trainer of U.S. Pair champions and World bronze medalists JoJo Starbuck and Ken Shelley, had coached two successive National Junior Pair winners. Tai and Randy were not about to break that streak.

"We wouldn't have dared not win!" they say of their National Junior Pair title at Minneapolis in 1973.

Because of their superb polish at such tender ages, they were immediately seen as a possi-

ble challenge to the Russian domination in World Pairs. On the closing night of that meet, Tai and Randy skated such a goose-bumpy perfect performance of their difficult, beautifully choreographed program that the crowd roared to its feet in a huge ovation. When things quieted down, master of ceremonies Dick Button said, "We've just had a call from the Russians, and they say to cut that out!"

Following a year of continued progress and seasoning in international competition at Oberstdorf, St. Gervais and Moscow, Tai and Randy wowed both crowds and judges again in Providence, making the World Team with six second-place votes and one first.

Coach John Nicks feels that Tai and Randy's potential, both as singles and as a pair, is unlimited if the present course continues. At Munich last season his experienced eye picked out the other new young pair he felt Tai and Randy should beat if they were to have a winning future in world competition. Beat them they did, finishing tenth out of 18 pairs.

Dual national titles, and world honors too, may seem like pretty big dreams in today's skating scene. But, somehow, an aura of solid endeavor, orderly progression and downright destiny surrounds Tai and Randy, making those dreams seem entirely possible. O

(many say *the* most) beautiful American cities.

"The City" offers more than its share of tourist attractions: the chic shops of Ghirardelli Square and Union Street, the blatant schlock of Fisherman's Wharf, the authentic mystique of Chinatown and the calm beauty of Golden Gate Park. The San Francisco experience requires a cable car ride; while cowards may stay inside the car, true aficionados know the outside ledge is the *only* place to stand when headed down a 45-degree slope. Then there are the less well-publicized delights: the majestic Palace of the Legion of Honor, the walk across Golden Gate Bridge, the sidewalk string quartet at Grant and Post and the excellent restaurants of every cuisine from African to Yugoslavian.

It should be known, however, that Oakland, across the bay, has come a long way since Gertrude Stein cursed it. Aside from spawning Ms. Stein, Oakland lays claim to the writer Jack London, who is memorialized by Jack London Square. There is also the Art Deco Paramount Theater (home of the Oakland Symphony and Ballet), the Oakland Museum (specializing in Californian history) and Knowland Park, to prove that there is more there there than there used to be.

Just north of Oakland is Berkeley, with its excellent university and other accoutrements. It is a complex and sophisticated community with a tolerance for lifestyles varying from very straight to very hip, and a stroll around the University of California campus and Telegraph Avenue can present the whole array. Linking Berkeley, Oakland and San Francisco directly with the Coliseum is BART (Bay Area Rapid Transit), the newest and most modern rapid transit system in the United States.

An even more adventurous visit will reveal that there are not just two but many Californias. Just north of San Francisco, across the Golden Gate Bridge, is pastoral Marin County, which contains, in addition to artsy Sausalito, Muir Woods and the beginning of the redwood country. This grove, open to visitors, has some of the tallest redwoods and most serene atmosphere in the state. Just north of Marin are Sonoma and Napa counties, the center of the California wine industry. The best vineyards are generally in the Napa Valley, and many wineries, especially around the town of St. Helena, welcome visitors to tour their cellars and sample their product.

Coming to 1975 Nationals in Oakland is a good excuse for a great vacation—and we'd love to have you! ○
