Official Notes

The following procedures in respect to basic competitions were recommended by the USFSA Program Development Committee and approved by the USFSA Executive Committee at its Fall Meeting in October, 1975, to become effective immediately:

BT 1.02 - The USFSA Basic Tests are entirely independent from, and are not prerequisite to, the official Figure, Pair and Dance Tests and competitions of the USFSA.

BT 2.03 - Basic competitions featuring moves in the Basic Tests Program and open to skaters who have passed no official USFSA tests may be sponsored and conducted either by USFSA Member Clubs or by other organizations in the same manner as the Basic Tests.

.031 - Basic competitions sponsored by a USFSA Member Club may be open to skaters who are not registered with the USFSA as well as USFSA members.

.032 - No sanction shall be required for basic competitions sponsored by a USFSA Member Club.

.033 - For basic competitions all judges shall be chosen in accordance with BT 2.00, and along with other officials, be approved by the USFSA Member Club or other organization sponsoring and conducting the competitions.

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The qualifying standards of the Presidential Sports Award are designed to assure regularity of participation and an investment of time and effort conducive to physical fitness for those fifteen years or older.

Qualification is based on 50 hours of participation, spread over at least 50 activity sessions, within a period of four months. Concessions will be made only in sports where seasons may be short or access to facilities limited. In such cases, the 50 hours of required activity may be accomplished in fewer than 50 sessions.

Ice Abroad

U.S. Junior Men's Champion Tim Zink helped wind up the Southern Hemisphere's winter skating season when he gave exhibitions at the 1975 South African National Junior and Senior Figure Skating Championships. Also claiming the spotlight at the national events were record numbers of entries, who qualified through Provincial Championships held in all six Provincial areas of the South African Ice Skating Association—including for the first time Eastern Transvaal. The generous sponsorship of the National Championships provided by Barclays National Bank made Zink's participation possible.

At the Junior Championships, held on September 28-29 in Pretoria, 53 skaters contested the six single skating (Girls and Boys under 9, 12 and 17 years), Elementary Pairs and Elementary Dance titles. The National Senior Championships took place at Carlton Centre Sky-Rink in Johannesburg soon afterward, on October 2-3. Several of the 44 entrants, as was the case in the Junior Championships, doubled (if not trebled) up to compete in pair and dance events as well as singles skating.

The organizers' (Northern Transvaal Provincial Committee of the SAISA) bold experiment of using two panels of judges to judge compulsory figures simultaneously at either end of SkyRink's Olympic-size ice area (with warm-up patches in the middle) worked like a charm. This time-saving arrangement was made possible by the rink's rapid resurfacing capacity, aided by the country's only "Zamboni."

Two of the four senior titles were contested by last year's winners, only one of whom was successful. Lenel van den Berg, with his new partner Margaret McIntyre, a strong solo skater in her own right, had little difficulty in retaining the Senior Pair's title, which he had won in 1973 and '74 with Louise Buttle. In Senior Men, Johannes Potgieter led all the way in figures, short and free skating to unseat former champion Stephen Melville. Edged for second by Jeremy Dowson, Melville had to be satisfied with third place.

In the Senior Ladies' section, Lynne Rayner also had no difficulty holding off the challenge of Tammy Grenfell, Jane Howard and Vivienne Shooter to become the new National Lady Champion. Lynne, who trained in Britain last year, later competed in the Richmond Trophy in London.

This year's Senior Dance title again went, as it did in 1973 (the last time it was contested),

to a couple whose home rink is nowhere near regulation size. Lesley Robinson and John Bonny, the only entries, easily attained the minimum standard in all three compulsory dances as well as in their attractive three minute free dance to be awarded a much deserved National Senior Title.—*Rev. Kevin Reynolds*



Also held recently "down under" were the 1975 Australian Championships. Pictured above: Australian Men's Champion Billy Schober (left), Pair Champions Elizabeth & Peter Cain, and Ladies' Champion Sharon Burley. The Cains trained with John Nicks in California for several weeks before winning the British Junior Pairs' title last April, and Miss Burley has trained in England for longer periods. Experience gained abroad and increased availability of films at home contributed appreciably to the highest overall standard (particularly for artistic impression) to be demonstrated at the Australian Championships in years.

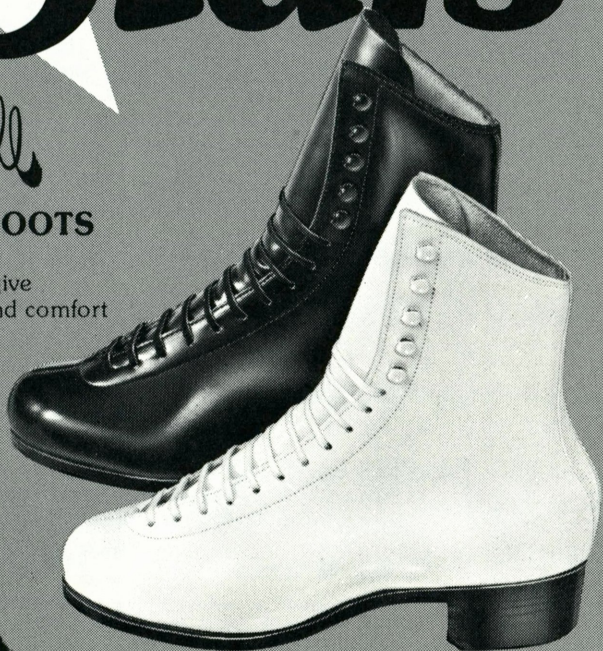

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Book Review

Ice Dancing: A Manual for Judges and Skaters,
2nd edition, Sidney V. Soanes, Ed., Queen City
Syndicate, 1975

This book may be regarded as a textbook on ice dancing and should be looked upon as required reading for all dance judges and professionals. In fact, dance skaters in general will find it useful and interesting. Among its contributors are Gold Dance Test Judges and professionals from the United States and Canada.

This second edition (in paperback) has been updated to reflect rule changes and suggested revisions. Many pictures and diagrams are included, most of which are helpful, particularly those diagrams which show faults in the patterns of dances. Those which are used to show foot positions are more difficult to understand, as are the few graphs that are used.

There are chapters on dancing terminology, judging principles, music, on each of the dance tests as well as free dancing, original set-pattern dance and competition judging. There is also a bibliography, among which are articles published in *SKATING* that are available through the magazine.

Among the eight appended sections, the ones on musical rhythms and the selection and timing of dance recordings will bear particular attention. Indeed, each of the sections on music and timing ought to be read and reread because it is the very close relationship between music and dancing that makes ice dancing unique among the branches of figure skating. Dr. Soanes continually makes strong statements about the importance of timing, the error of skating out-of-phase with the music and the logic of making these major considerations in the marking of ice dances.

Now that attendance at judging schools is required of all judges once every four years, those who will be organizing the sessions might give some thought to basing seminars on coming to grips with the opinions compiled and set forth in this work. These are views which ought to be accepted and acted on by dance judges or challenged overtly on similarly logical grounds. Certainly the conceptions brought forth in this manual provide a strong platform on which to build standards that could be widely accepted.—

Hall of Fame

As outlined in the May 1975 issue of SKATING, skaters and skating fans will be able to nominate candidates for the USFSA Figure Skating Hall of Fame this fall. The nomination form, in addition to appearing here, may be obtained from the USFSA Central Office (please enclose a stamped, self-addressed envelope with request). Any person may submit one nominating form per year. A total of 10 nominations may be made, from any or all of the following groups:

1. Skaters from throughout the world who have compiled outstanding competitive records or who have made notable contributions in style or technique, and who have been retired from competitive skating for at least five years.
2. Persons who have made a noteworthy contribution to figure skating in a non-skating capacity through service to an amateur figure skating association and who have not been active in this category for at least a year.
3. Persons who have made a noteworthy contribution to figure skating as a Professional in Skating.

Nominations are not limited to living persons, nor to Americans; any person filling the qualifications listed above is eligible.

The 27 electors (three from each Region) will vote on the nominees, and the first induction will take place at the USFSA Governing Council Meeting in May, 1976.

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Loeser on Music



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Conductor Richard Bonyngé has undertaken a task that is close to the musical hearts of today's skaters. He is reviving many of the long neglected Romantic ballets by such composers as Auber, Adam and Burgmüller, and also spiriting new vitality into such classics as Tchaikovsky's "Nutcracker" and Delibes's "Sylvia."

Some of these ballets are not great individual works of music; in fact, on first listening, they make your head swim with similarities. The stories behind the music range from the sublime to the ridiculous (more frequently the latter), and more often than not, the dances that make up the complete score of each ballet bear only minor relevance to the libretto. At times the ballets were actually excuses for ballerinas to dance as many little dances as possible. George Bernard Shaw would have called these compositions "the oddest medleys of drinking songs, tinder box trios, sleigh rides and skating quadrilles imaginable." (He actually made this reference to a work by Meyerbeer.)

Despite this tongue in cheek (or tongue in full view) criticism, it is this huge variety of dances that makes the music ideal for short, rather innocent skating programs. Each little musical variation can be extracted from the ballets with a minimum amount of insult to many composers and a maximum amount of satisfaction to most skaters.

To date, the series under Bonyngé's baton includes the well known **Nutcracker** by Tchaikovsky (full ballet, CSA 2239; and Suites, CS 6890), **Giselle** by Adolphe-Charles Adam (CSA 2226), **Coppélia** and **Sylvia** by Leo Delibes (CSA 2229 and CSA 2236, respectively), and three volumes of famous excerpts from the ballet classics—**Art of the Prima Ballerina, Vol. I and II** (CS 6342 and CS 6343 or, as a set, CSA 2213), and **Pas de Deux** (CS 6418).

The lesser known ballets, which are equally rich in variety, include Adam's **Le Diable a Quatre** (CS 6454), Johann Burgmüller's **La Peri** (CS 6627), Jacques Offenbach's **Le Papillon**

(CS 6812) and the newest release, Daniel-François Auber's **Marco Spada** (CS 6923).

The jewel of the series is entitled **Homage to Pavlova** (CSA 2232). This album is a total immersion in the style and aura of Romantic ballet and should be the touchstone for any skater desiring to know how the music should be interpreted. For a more extensive review of this release, refer to the November 1974 issue of **SKATING**.

All of these records are on the London label. The engineering is excellent, and the playing by the London Symphony Orchestra and its first violinist, John Georgiadis, is of comparable quality.

Surprisingly, Richard Bonyngé's prime concern is opera. (His wife is the famous singer Joan Sutherland.) The recordings of his conducting in this field are lengthy, and they include several issues of opera overtures that are rich sources for skaters. These albums are **Overtures to Forgotten Operas** (CS 6486), **French Opera Overtures** (CS 6643), **Eighteenth Century Overtures** (CS 6735) and **Music from the French Opera** (CS 6744).

On the record jacket of "Marco Spada" a story of two conflicting ballerinas is told. It quotes the 19th century writer, Saint-Victor, who called their battle a memorable contest, "a struggle between spirit and flesh, between the imponderable elf...and the robust bacchante."

This all reminds one of both the excitement and slightly hysterical atmosphere of figure skating. Any music written for such a physical art must surely be an appropriate source for skaters.—*Frank Loeser*

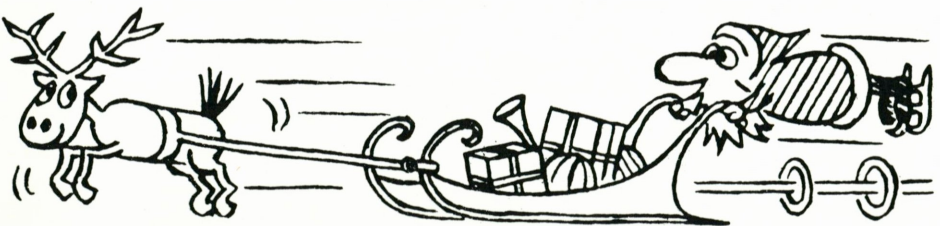

Jeffrey Goforth is probably unknown among skaters, yet he represents a corpus of ideas which is likely to become increasingly important for competitors in all sports. Mr. Goforth, president of the Pacific Institute of America in Millbrae, California, is a psychiatrist who has been working with American championship swimmers.

"What we tried to do for them," he says, "was to help them paint positive pictures in their minds that might lead them to success. Pictures of them winning, for example, or touching and turning to see they had swum a personal best time. We want to build their confidence, dismiss negative thoughts."

Mr. Goforth is an exponent of "self-image psychology," which sounds like another name for Norman Vincent Peale's "positive thinking." The idea behind it is of crucial importance to skaters, their families and their coaches.

Parents in particular often have a mistaken idea that technique is the only thing that passes medal tests or wins titles. If only, they believe, their son or daughter practices hard enough—has more and more lessons—then success will inevitably follow. When it does not, their disillusion is painful to see.

It is always distressing for skaters when they find themselves unable to produce, under the stress of competition, the standard of skating they regularly achieve in training. And yet this is the crucial test, and it teaches an inexorable rule: *good skating is not enough*. Natural ability, disciplined by hard work and expert tuition, can be forged into the comprehensive technique that is the most essential weapon in the skater's armory; but like the sword of the medieval knight, it needs to be reinforced by a strong shield. That shield is provided by personality—character—nerve—call it what you will; its development is a vital part of a would-be champion's training.

In some skaters, the personality element is so strong that it can even overcome deficiencies in technique. Christine

Errath, the 1974 World Ladies' Champion, has never been renowned for her expertise in school figures, and in last winter's European Championship she was only fourth in that part of the event. Many skaters would have given up mentally at that stage; not so Christine, who refused to admit defeat, hurtled into her free skating program like a true champion and grimly held on to an over-rotated double Axel on which most skaters would have fallen. It was a triumph of character over circumstance and won her her third European title. (A month later she lost the world crown, but that only shows you can't win them all, no matter how strong your psyche.)

The greatest champions are those who can be relied upon to produce their best form at any time and under any conditions. From the earliest days, therefore, instructors have a duty to teach their pupils not only the physical requirements of the ISU rules, but also the right mental approach to competition.

To do so, the trainer needs a good working knowledge of the way a pupil's mind functions. Character is formed at a surprisingly early age, and the basic personality of a five- or six-year-old beginner has already been quite firmly established. The trainer's teaching methods therefore need to be adapted to the individual child's requirements as well as family relationships. For, as former European Men's Champion Edi Rada once said, teaching skating requires a "harmonious triad" of trainer, pupil, family. Sadly, the triad is sometimes anything but harmonious, and parental disagreement and sometimes even interference can blight many a young skater's prospects.

The truly "harmonious triad" depends on a sound threefold relationship. First, the pupil must be eager, intelligent and have genuine faith in the trainer's abilities. Second, the trainer must be skilled in the art of teaching and knowing which pupil needs constant reinforcement and praise or which one needs good-natured bullying at times. Third, the parents should ensure a happy and affectionate home background, while maintaining an attitude at the rink

balanced judiciously between enthusiasm and tolerance. Sympathy, understanding, serenity in success and failure alike and, above all, a sense of humor—these are the vital qualities with which parents can sustain their children.

As the skater grows up and it becomes clear that he or she has both the aptitude and the desire for a championship career, psychological development becomes ever more important. The talented skater must, I believe, undertake some serious self-analysis before deciding that she really wants to win a title. What, in the technical jargon, is her motivation? And is her personality sufficiently robust to stand up to the unceasing toil, the inevitable disappointments, the restriction of her life and outlook to the narrow confines of an ice rink? Can she develop self-reliance, discipline, a sporting spirit and a true sense of values—or will her successes lead to arrogance and her failures to bitterness and neurotic regression? These are questions each skater must answer.

For the well-adjusted skater (and that goes for the great majority of the enthusiastic young people who have brought such vigor to the sport), a championship career can bring enrichment in personality. It offers an unrivaled opportunity to travel, to meet people, to learn how to overcome difficulties by one's own efforts. It can bring increased self-knowledge through the stress of competition and the ability to integrate with the world outside Self.

The girl or boy who steadfastly decides to try to become a champion should keep this goal in perspective. The skater needs to remember that when (if?) it is achieved, some other goal—not necessarily in skating—must be set. The precious years of youth must not be *totally* absorbed in pursuit of the coveted title. The skater who takes an interest in the world and the people in it, who cultivates intellectual and artistic abilities—particularly in music, ballet, and so on—will be a much more fulfilled person, as well as a better skater perhaps. For as the personality matures, so the skating is likely to benefit. A free program, instead of being a mere mechani-

TRAINING PAIRS AND JUDGES

On September 5-7 judges and skating professionals from Boston to Atlanta, from Chicago to Dallas, gathered in Lake Placid for an intensive and enlightening seminar on pairs and free skating, under the direction of Ardelle Sanderson, National Vice Chairman for Judges' Education and Training. Mrs. Sanderson, who has dreamed of organizing such a forum for several years, scheduled this seminar at a most propitious time. Coach Ron Ludington was holding a pair training session in Lake Placid during the same week, so the judges present could see what went into the training of pairs.

Meeting in classroom, Mrs. Sanderson opened the seminar by introducing Louis Bodek, chairman of the newly established USFSA Singles & Pairs Committee, who gave an in-depth description of the new rules related to figure and pair tests and discussed the free skating requirements for the Third, Fourth, Sixth and Eighth Figure Tests, as well as the Preliminary, Bronze, Silver and Gold Pair Tests. Mrs. Elaine DeMore, Mrs. Ramona McIntyre and Mrs. Mary Louise Wright, also on the faculty, reported on the free skating seminar that was held at Worlds last March in Colorado Springs. Discussed in detail was the new marking system for short programs, which dictates that specified point values be deducted for each failure or omission of the prescribed elements. Demonstrations of short programs were then arranged and "practice marked" by the judges. USFSA President Benjamin T. Wright led the discussion of the marks as the judges reviewed a video presentation

of the short programs skated the previous day. Also on the panel of the judges seminar were professionals Ron Ludington, Tom Litz, Mark Militano, Gordon McKellen, Jr., and George Valle, all of whom added their extensive knowledge to the discussions on pairs and free skating.

During this same week in early September, Ron Ludington held a pairs' training session, with the cooperation of Kerry Leitch of Canada. Both men, being dedicated skating professionals, felt that a week of intensive training would be of value to their students. Arriving from both the United States and Canada, 24 pairs attended this compact training session. Professionals who are specialists in particular aspects of skating—Arthur Bourke, Mark Militano and Danny Murphy (a former ballet master who knows how to train skaters at the barre)—helped expand the scope of the sessions.

By the weekend of September 5-7, when the judges arrived, these pairs had progressed enough so that those attending the seminar could see some of the results of this intensive training. In addition, the judges had a marvelous opportunity to study the make-up of all lifts while watching the pairs practice first on floor mats and then on ice.

It was a fantastic scene to see all the skaters on the ice at one time and wonder how they managed to avoid an accident, but under the careful supervision of those professionals, manage they did, working together in complete harmony and discipline. There was no fooling around on the ice; each pair worked quietly together and studied the others being instructed.

Points that were stressed with the pairs

included using one's peripheral vision to know where one's partner was without actually watching each other constantly, and learning to know one's partner so that there was complete harmony and trust between one another, enabling the skaters to move as one in time to the music and with fluidity.

The participating skaters were divided into groups and a program carefully followed so that each skater knew where he or she was to be at any given time. From 7:30 P.M. until after midnight, these groups worked out first off the ice, on ballet and practice lifts, under the direction of the professional staff. Then all groups took to the ice for stroking, in pairs. Following a half hour of stroking, there was class instruction in four groups to work on lifts, pair moves, footwork, spins and, of course, unison. At 12:30 A.M. there was a period of endurance

stroking, after which the weary but exhilarated skaters left the ice.

All in all, this was a most impressive session to watch. Especially interesting was the discipline that existed, for there was no wasting of time nor talking on the ice; each skater concentrated solely on how much he or she could learn from working with such a dedicated group. As an observer, one could only be awed by the amount of work that this training session accomplished in such a short time. By the end of the week, pairs that had been struggling in the beginning were showing the form and grace which could perhaps make them champions one day.

The success of this intertwined judges seminar and pair training session has already led to plans for a similar joint program for judges and pairs next September in Lake Placid. It was a great learning experience for all. ○

Ron still skates for the fun of it

In 1956 Charles Snelling, who eight years later would stun the skating world by winning the Canadian Men's title after a five-year absence to complete medical school, ably represented Canada in the Olympic Winter Games at Cortina, Italy. That same year five-year-old Ron Shaver attended a skating carnival in Galt, Ontario, and immediately decided to take up skating. "I knew right away I wanted to skate," says Ron. "It was totally my decision. Imagine how it's changed my life."

Today Canadian Ron Shaver stands on the verge of another Winter Olympics. His very real hopes for a medal in 1976 represent the giant strides he has made since his introduction to the sport two decades ago.

"For two years after, I remember just skating the junior sessions without a lesson," Ron says. "Then my mother suggested I might start with one lesson a week."

At that time Ron's present coach, Neil Carpenter, was still an active competitor at the same club. Neil's father mentioned to Ron's mother that that first lesson often has a snowball effect. "My mother reacted very calmly and brushed off the warning by saying, 'Oh, no. Ron's just

skating for the fun of it. He won't get involved.'"

Mr. Carpenter, of course, was right. One lesson did lead to another, and pretty soon Ron was well on his way as an active skater. Professionals Alex Fulton and Felix Casper had a hand in Ron's early development. But Jerry Woodstrum, now a coach in Springfield, Ohio, trained Ron for 11 years and gave him the background knowledge he draws on as a competitor. Under Woodstrum, Ron passed the Canadian Gold Figure and Gold Dance Tests.

Now Ron divides his training time between his home club, Hamilton-Stoney Creek FSC, where he is coached by Neil Carpenter, and Denver, Colo., where Carlo Fassi advises him. Ron credits Fassi for changing his attitude toward compulsory figures. "For years I hated figures, just hated them," he says. "I am now very satisfied when I lay out a good figure. To me it's more of a challenge to lay out consistently good figures than to skate a flawless free program." In the 1975 Worlds Ron's placement in figures was his best yet—sixth.

"I remember my first juvenile competition at the Galt club," says Ron. "The judges said, 'Okay Ronnie, let's see some good back edges.' I just stood there and cried. I didn't know what they were. Right from the beginning I guess I enjoyed and



did better in free skating, so ultimately those were the lessons I got."

After that "horrible experience" Ron realized there was more to figure skating than the freedom of free skating. "It's definitely a sport enhancing superior freedom on one hand and classic discipline on the other," he says.

Since 1973 Ron has been second in Canada to Toller Cranston. One might expect this to have a discouraging effect on Ron. "Toller is a super person and a close personal friend. We're both doing our own thing. I think we're so opposite that I don't even consider the possibility that I may be skating in his shadow. I

hope we are both recognized as individuals with our own personal styles."

Certainly Ron's dapper style has been a leading presence (though less widely recognized than Toller's innovations) on the World level. His competitive record confirms this view. After a promising eighth-place debut in the 1973 World Men's Championship, Ron demonstrated a mature style at Munich in 1974. In this World event, he placed second in the short program, third in free skating, and second in the combined free skating standings to join Toller in bringing Canada a one-two sweep of the World medals for free skating. He placed fifth overall.

Ron started off last season by winning Skate Canada '74—his first international victory. It promised to be a good year. But all that changed when Ron suffered a groin injury that put him on crutches just three weeks before the Canadian Championships. Still off the ice when Canadians began in mid-January, Ron opted to advance directly to Worlds, which his placement in the top five the year before allowed him to do. Another week went by before he could return to skating, however, leaving him only three weeks to train for the World Championships in which he had hoped to break into the top three—before the injury.

Whether or not Ron should have competed at Worlds was a frequent subject of discussion in Colorado Springs. For Ron, though, there was only one answer. "It was just something I had to do," he maintains. "I couldn't have sat it out." Compete he did and placed a disappointing—to him—eighth. His disappointment lies not in the fact that he had an injury, but rather that the weeks off the ice dulled his competitive drive. "I wasn't ready mentally!" he says. That gives Ron all the more determination to do well in 1976. "I know I didn't give 100 percent, so I know I have to come back next year and do better."

Just what "coming back" entails is skating seven hours a day, taking stretch, ballet and jazz classes and working out at a health club at least three times a week.

Report from Chicago

When the USFSA Executive Committee held its annual fall meeting in Chicago on October 10 and 11, 1975, it was a time for new beginnings in the Bicentennial year. The 1976-77 Rulebook had just been thoroughly revised and published, and the Executive Committee had time to consider thoughtfully new proposals and give direction to committees without the pressures of urgent rule changes.

Financing was the subject of much of the discussion. USFSA President Benjamin T. Wright and Secretary William J. Brennan, Jr., were authorized to enter into agreement with Hamilton Projects, Inc., for commercial licensing, as recommended by the Ad Hoc Committee on Commercial Sponsorship. Hamilton Projects will act as the licensing vehicle for contracts between manufacturers and the USFSA.

New Executive Committee members introduced were: Charles W. Dillie, Jr., Mrs. Claire Ferguson and Mrs. Anne Gram Gerli for the Eastern Section; John Klindworth for the Midwestern Section; and Dr. Ronald F. Fry and Les Seale for the Pacific Coast Section. Mrs. Eleanor G. Schultz of Burbank, Calif., was elected a member-at-large for the Pacific Coast Section to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Norman E. Fuller.

Elected to the Nominating Committee to serve with the three Sectional Vice Presidents were: Frederick C. LeFevre, Chairman, Robert T. McLeod and E. Newbold Black, IV.

Reinstated from Professional to Reinstated Amateur Status were: Tod Bartholomew, Bay Village, Ohio; Gayle H. Chapman, Cincinnati, Ohio; Mrs. Mary L. Clarke, Weymouth, Mass.; Carol Davis, Anchorage, Alaska; Carolyn Welch Grimditch, Hillsboro Beach, Fla.; Mrs. Marion M. MacDiarmid, Portland, Maine; and Mrs. Linda G. Quest, Brooklyn, N.Y.

Competitions

The proposals made by the Professional Skaters Guild of America for conducting competitions were discussed for future consideration. The use of computers at all qualifying competitions was formally authorized. Attention was called to the fact that a competitor who changes his home club membership no longer represents a city, and that the matter of representation is no longer of great importance since team trophies have been retired.

USFSA participation in the World Junior Championships was authorized by the Executive Committee. The first such Championships, approved by the ISU on a two-year trial basis, will be held in Megeve, France, on March 9-13, 1976.

A proposal to hold USFSA Junior Olympic Championships was approved in principle.

The Executive Committee voted to recommend Charles U. Foster of Duxbury, Mass., to the ISU for appointment as a World Referee. The Committee appointed the following persons as Sectional Accountants: Barbara Gloeckner, Hamilton, Ohio; John Holdsworth, Lexington, Mass.; and Howard Van Camp, East Lansing, Mich.

A resolution of congratulations was adopted for George Häslar upon his election as Life Honorary Secretary of the ISU. Congratulations were also extended to the USFSA's ISU Representative, John R. Shoemaker, who was elected First Vice President of the ISU, and to USFSA President Benjamin T. Wright, who was elected as a member of the ISU Figure Skating Committee.

All members of the Executive Committee purchased new 1976 Booster Buttons to kick off the USFSA Memorial Fund campaign. ○

New from the Program

Basic Competitions Defined

Basic competitions, open to skaters who have passed no official USFSA tests, have become increasingly popular. Young skaters have gained much poise and experience as a result of their participation. More advanced skaters who have been permitted to judge these competitions have gained knowledge and understanding of "the other side of the picture." All in all, these competitions, though often attended only by family and friends, have done much to encourage young skaters to continue in the sport and to influence others to take up the sport.

Such an opportunity for non-test skaters to become oriented to competition was provided last April in Needham, Mass. As a result of the interest of a small group of Boy Scout Explorers, who had introduced figure skating as an accepted feature of the Explorer Olympics, a competition featuring 150 young skaters was sponsored by the Country Skating Club of Walpole, Mass. The event was supported by the Needham YMCA, as part of its progressive recreation program, and by the Explorer Division, Boy Scouts of America, Boston Council.

The competition was open to skaters enrolled in recreational programs throughout the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The skaters skated a program of their own composition including compulsory figure movements and combinations of jumps and spins, depending upon the level of ability for each group, while background music was continuously played. USFSA registered skaters—active competitors for the most part—judged the event. The competition was chaired by National Judge Roger F. Turner, president of Country SC, and by Tom Sobell and Andrea Micek, former competitors and judges for the host club.

Such competitions sponsored by USFSA Member Clubs have traditionally been closed to USFSA skaters. The clubs have been reluctant to have their members compete against non-registered skaters because USFSA skaters are not permitted to compete against non-registered skaters in regular figure skating competitions and because there have been no established procedures for basic competitions. The Program Development Committee has taken measures to correct this situation. According to Mrs. Howard J. Jackson, Chairman of the Program Development Committee, under the procedures approved by the Executive Committee on its recommendation, USFSA-registered skaters will now be permitted to compete against non-registered skaters in basic competitions that are sponsored by USFSA Member Clubs. No sanction will be required. A member club will still retain the option to close its basic competition to non-registered skaters. Judges may or may not be official USFSA judges, but all judges and officials must be approved by the sponsoring USFSA club. *[The exact wording of these procedures is found under "Official Notes" on page 6 of this issue.—Ed.]*

The acceptance of the Program Development Committee's guidelines should ease the way toward more young skaters' enjoyment of basic competitions. ○

Dance Music Timing Demystified

The club's weekly ice dance session has just ended. The members present, social dancers for the most part, enjoyed the evening, as they always do. But you're the dance music chairman, and you can't help thinking that the session needs a musical lift. The same tunes played for the same dances are beginning to sound tired. Where do you find new dance music? And when you do find a good tune, how do you make sure it plays at the correct tempo for the ice dance you have in mind?

Frazzled music chairman, take heart. Your questions will soon be answered in the USFSA Program Development Committee's *Program Aid #6—Timing of Music for Ice Dancing*. An earlier version of this booklet was authored several years ago by Ethel W. Badger, II, and F. Ritter Shumway. Mr. Shumway, former Chairman of the USFSA Dance Committee and now that committee's Vice Chairman for Music, is amending and updating this guide for ice dance music buffs.

In *Program Aid #6* Mr. Shumway recommends several sources of ice dance tunes. A stickier problem for most new music chairmen—What do I do once I've found a record?—is dealt with in greater detail. The booklet will contain a set of metronome-speed tables for dance records and instructions for their use. These metronome-speed tables will



help you determine the proper speed (RPM) at which to play a record in order to produce the correct tempo for the dance you have selected. The tables are based on the metronome speeds of records played at the standard 45 or 78.26 RPM. If the record you want to use doesn't provide this information (and recordings made by the large commercial companies do not), the booklet will tell you how to determine it. If you do not have access to a variable speed turntable, the guide will explain what additional steps to take when using your home record player to time dance music. Finally, to help you vary your dance programs, the booklet will suggest how a record may be used for several dances through minor adjustments in playing speed.

Copies of *Program Aid #6—Timing of Music for Ice Dancing* will soon be available upon request from the USFSA Central Office.

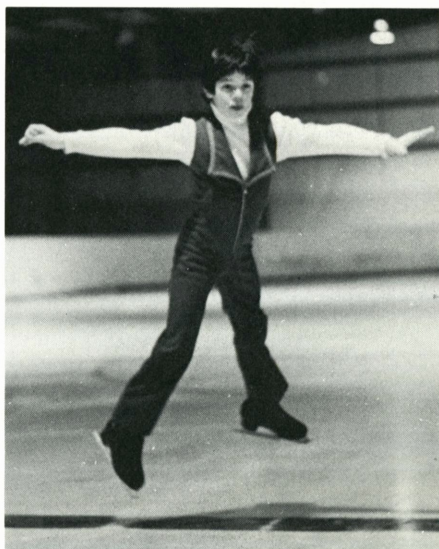
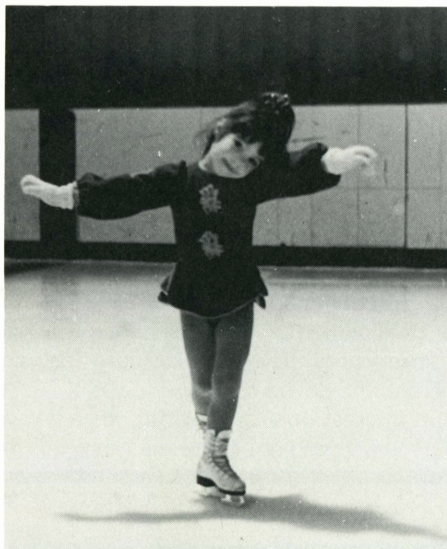

Many people have asked me the secret of being an active and successful worker for our USFSA Memorial Fund. Often adults say that they don't have the "nerve" to approach strangers and ask them to either contribute directly to the Fund or buy our Booster Buttons and Decals.

When I hear these reservations, I remember President Franklin Roosevelt's famous statement, "The only thing we have to fear is fear itself." Our Memorial Fund strikes me as a project that all of us who are interested in competitive figure skating must consider vitally important. 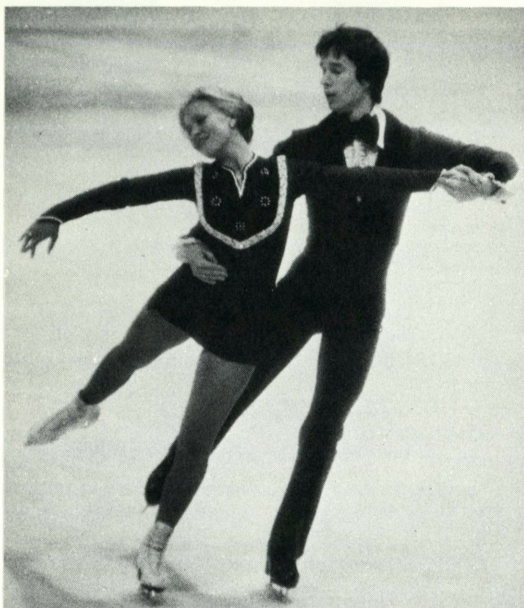

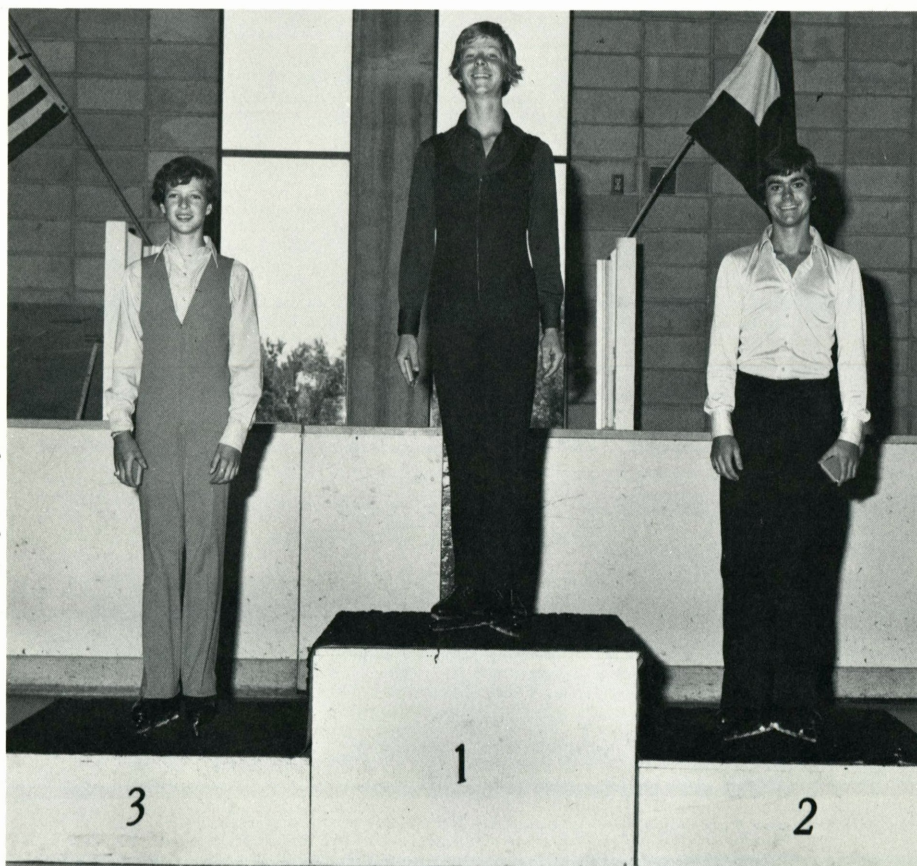

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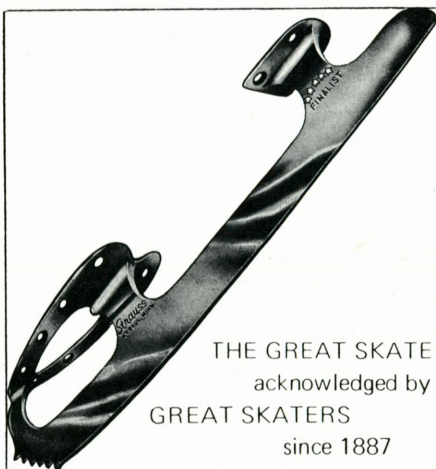

cal succession of jumps, spins and steps, will become a vivid projection of an individual, creative mind.

One of the earliest lessons that has to be learned is how to deal with both failure and success. When you have set your heart on winning an event and you fail, it is tempting to resort to the defense mechanisms of childhood: to sulk or be angry, or to behave unpleasantly to your rivals. This is a wholly undesirable reaction and if persisted in may lead to character difficulties in later life.

The proper way to meet defeat is to make an objective and self-critical study of how it happened. Was it really only because the ice was bad, or old Judge X doesn't know an Axel from a double Salchow, or your rival Y has influence in the right quarters? Or could it be that some of the others just skated a little better than you did? If your review convinces you that you still should have won (and you may be right), then you must face the hardest character test of all, which is to accept the decision with good grace.

It is equally important to know how to win. And right at the start it is good to accustom yourself to the idea of winning. Think, "I might do it—I *can* do it," and (provided you do not get carried away by the dream instead of the reality) you may be able to say, "I *have* done it."

At the PSGA/PSAC joint convention in Boston last June, former Olympic champion Dr. Tenley Albright was asked whether she thought the absence of pre-competition nerves among the Russian skaters was due to hypnosis. She replied that she didn't know, but the difference between hypnosis and positive thinking is not great. Indeed it is not; both induce a conviction that a desired goal is attainable, but whereas one is a reaction to an outside stimulus (the hypnotist), the other comes from within the mind of the "positive thinker" herself, and may therefore have a more lasting effect.

Competitions always produce a certain amount of emotional tension, and this is no bad thing if it does not become obsessive. When the event is actually taking place, it may be advisable not to watch your rivals perform. Your aim should not be to beat them, but rather to surpass your own previous best performance.

A true champion keeps a sense of proportion, taking an honest pride in achieving a goal, but not exalting Self beyond the limits of modesty and good manners. Fortunately, there have been many such in the recent history of skating in North America. To name only three, there are Tim Wood, complete master of himself; Karen Magnussen, justifiably confident in her own power; and Peggy Fleming, serene and cool, ever seeking perfection and achieving it as nearly as human exertion can. Few can hope to do as they did, but everyone can try. O

In addition to this steady training, he has worked with André Denis, a choreographer from Montreal, to devise a new free skating program that Ron calls "the best I've ever had." Coach Neil Carpenter sums it up as a dynamic opening, a classic slow part and an Oliveriel ending. "It's definitely audience oriented. We're bringing out another side of Ron in this new five-minute program. It's going to be different all right."

Although Ron's love affair with his sport is time consuming, he still plays golf, water skis and enjoys all outdoor sports. "I like to be busy. I couldn't stand just sitting around the house. Most of my friends are in skating, but I have other old school friends I keep in touch with. I never get to the point of having nothing to do."

Ron is looking forward to a great year and isn't setting any time limit on his retirement from amateur competition. "I'm hoping to accomplish what I have in mind before I retire. I'm now looking forward to the Olympic Games and being involved with other people and other sports. It will definitely be a completely different outlook. Skating will be part of the games, but in perspective to other sports. It's rather special for Neil, too. It will be the first time he's been back to Innsbruck since competing there in the '64 Olympics with partner Linda Ward."

The camaraderie Ron has found among competitors also ties him to this demanding pursuit. To illustrate his point he relates an incident that occurred last May when he was part of an exhibition tour in England. "For a year and a half Warren Maxwell (British ice dance competitor) had warned me I was going to get a pie in the face during one of my programs. Well, I'd done many exhibitions with him and nothing happened, so I forgot all about it. However, at the end of my program in Bristol, Robin Cousins (British Men's competitor), motioned me over to meet a friend of his who was watching. Well, I went over, there was the pie and I got it dead on. Shaving creme went all over. I did my encore dripping in creme. At the end of the night the announcer called Warren and me over. We were presented with two pies and had had a chance to square up with Robin when he came out for the finale. That's the kind of comradeship that's part and parcel of skating. It's tough to give it up."

After talking with Ron it's difficult not to describe his life in superlatives. His unassuming manner puts one in mind of the Rudyard Kipling poem "If" and particularly.... "if you can talk with crowds and keep your virtue, or walk with kings nor lose the common touch." For this young man, after receiving letters from a grade two class addressed to "Ron Shaver, a famous person," openly asked, "Me, famous?" and smiled that infectious smile. O

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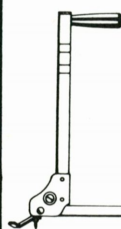
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
