# Readers Write

To the Editor:

In the April '76 edition of SKATING you have an article ["Begin Your Beguine in the Ballroom"] containing several statements that do not give the true picture of amateur ballroom dancing in the United States and internationally... There is every reason to believe the article was written without sufficient knowledge of how true amateur dancers function in full compliance with the rules of the United States Amateur Ballroom Dancer's Association (USABDA) and the International Council of Amateur Dancers (ICAD). These two controlling organizations are comparable to the USFSA and ISU, respectively, in figure skating...

The article, in general, is quite good-if it would state that the content applies mainly to the chain dance studios and certain independent operators who function in a like manner . . . The statement that students always dance with their professional instructors in tests is true only if it applies to the chain studios. Authentic amateur dancers usually dance with their amateur partners in tests and in some cases are propped by other amateurs, just like in ice dancing. (An authentic amateur dancer, by definition, is one who complies with the national and international rules governing amateur status, which are traceable to the IOC.) Under certain conditions, again like in skating, professionals may prop dance test candidates.

Competing with a professional partner is also true only with chain studios and similar independents . . . In authentic amateur dance competitions, both members of a couple must be true amateurs . . . Just as a point of interest, there are over 50 amateur International Style ballroom judges in Europe—quite a departure from the writer's statement that all judges are professional. More judicious use of the words "always" and "only" could have presented a much more factual article without distortion.— Erwin C. Horst, council member of the U.S. Amateur Ballroom Dancer's Assn. (WRA) & Los Angeles FSC member.

[The author of this article, Stan Mersol, wrote from his experience as an instructor for the Arthur Murray Dance Studios, to which his statements apply. We are sorry the article did not give a full picture of ballroom dancing and thank you for giving us another viewpoint.—Ed.]

Linda his traditional "Good Luck" bouquet, so a pot of daisies borrowed from the Broadmoor's lounge had filled in. Very happy this morning, he just smiles and says, "I'm the father."

Linda, who projects so well on the ice, is surprisingly shy and retiring on a sofa. She, too, smiles a lot and says how happy she is and how much she loves to skate.

So it falls to her mother to tell Linda's story. Articulate and soft-spoken, Mrs. Fratianne soon makes it apparent that she has effectively used her teacher's training and experience to handle a skating career in a family of five children.

She recalls Linda as a toddler so full of energy that she climbed out of bed to play during the night, and as a pre-schooler so fearless and strong that she climbed trees with abandon and wore out the wheels on her first pair of roller skates in a matter of weeks. A slight frown crosses her face as she remembers Linda, the grade school student who just wasn't interested in school, even though tests showed above average intelligence.

Then when she was nine, some neighbors took Linda to the local ice rink where she discovered the sport that has held her interest and challenged her energy ever since. "It felt natural," says Linda. "I liked it right away and couldn't wait to go back each time."

Her mother enrolled her for some group lessons and, just doing what came naturally, Linda progressed from the beginners class to the intermediate class to the advanced class in three successive weeks—and even that didn't accommodate her natural ability.

Within a month of her first time on ice, Linda started private lessons. The same acceleration characterized her progress through the USFSA figure tests. She passed the First Test on July 20, 1970, and the Eighth (Gold) less than three years later on June 21, 1973. Not quite 13 years old at the time, she became one of the youngest USFSA Gold Figure Medalists ever.

Linda's effectiveness as a competitor was evident early on, also. As a Southwest Pacific Juvenile, she placed third in 1971. Skipping Intermediate, she finished fifth as a Regional Novice the next season.

# Hall of Fame SCRAPBOOK

#### Richard T. Button

When the great male champions of figure skating are considered, one name from the post-World War II period stands equally high among those from prior times. Dick Button from Englewood, New Jersey, who represented first the Philadelphia Skating Club and Humane Society and later The Skating Club of Boston, can be said to have been the pioneering leader, if not the founder, of modern free skating with its athletic content. In addition, he compiled an unequalled record in competition. The first person from the United States to win an Olympic Championship in figure skating, which he

did in 1948, Dick successfully defended his title while an honors student at Harvard in 1952. He also was five times World Champion (1948-1952), three times North American Champion (1947, 1949, 1951) and seven times United States Champion (1946-1952). Dick was also European Champion in 1948, the first and last American to win that title, the event promptly being closed to North American entrants thereafter! He also became in 1949 the only winter sports athlete to receive the James E. Sullivan Trophy as the outstanding amateur athlete in America.

After college, Dick went on to graduate from Harvard Law School and, following a brief career as a show skater, quickly turned to the production and commentating of sports for television, a field in which he has become a preeminent and recognized authority today. Married to Slavka Kohout, herself an outstanding skater and teacher of skating, with two children, Dick continues his pioneering work in behalf of the sport he represented so well. Never to be forgotten are some of his firsts: the double Axel. three consecutive double loop jumps, the triple loop jump and, of course, the "Button camel"!

Tenley E. Albright

It can truthfully be said that Dr. Tenley Albright has been an achiever in both sports and life itself. Coming from The Skating Club of Boston and its tradition of outstanding lady champions, Tenley established a unique first for the United States when she won the Olympic Championship for ladies in 1956, an event in which she had previously earned the silver medal in 1952. Twice World and North American Lady Champion (1953, 1955), Tenley was also five times Lady Champion of the United States (1952-1956).


Following her Olympic win, Tenley went on to earn her doctorate in medicine from Harvard Medical School and is today a successful surgeon in practice with her father and brother Nile. She is a director of the United States Olympic Committee and has become a recognized authority in the field of



sports medicine. Still an active skater with her three daughters, Tenley continues to epitomize—as she did during her competitive career—the true grace and artistry of the sport combined with athletic skill. This, perhaps, can be considered the ultimate goal to be achieved in competition.


#### Hayes Alan Jenkins

One of three members of a unique skating family (along with his sister Nancy and brother David, gold medalists all), Hayes Jenkins as a competitor represented, in the view of many, the ultimate combination of athletic skill and artistic achievement that could be foreseen in the skating of his great pre-



decessor Gillis Grafström of Sweden. Certainly no one who saw them will ever forget the masterpieces of interpretive free skating Hayes presented during his career. Winning the Olympic Championship in 1956, Hayes was also World Champion four times (1953-1956), twice North American Champion (1953, 1955) and four times United States Champion (1953-1956), as a representative of the Cleveland and Broadmoor Skating Clubs. A Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Colorado College, Hayes engaged in a brief show career while he attended Harvard Law School. He is now a successful international lawyer in Akron, Ohio, his original hometown, for the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company. Here again he follows a family tradition, since his father was also an attorney and officer of General Tire and Rubber Company. Hayes is married to Carol Heiss, herself a great champion in figure skating, and has three children.

#### Carol E. Heiss

Remembered not only for her own career, but also as one of the three skating members of the Heiss family from The Skating Club of New York (along with her sister Nancy and brother Bruce, both successful champions in their own right), Carol Heiss compiled

the best competitive record in international competition for ladies of anyone from North America. Earning fourth place in her first World Championship in 1953 at the age of 13, and after being runner-up in 1955, Carol went on to win the World Championship for ladies in 1956 by defeating the defending titleholder. She defended that title successfully four more times from 1957 to 1960. She was also North American Champion in 1957 and 1959 and United States Champion from 1957 to 1960. In the latter year she culminated her career by winning the Olympic Championship for ladies in Squaw Valley, California. Married to Hayes Jenkins in 1960, Carol now lives in Akron, Ohio, and has three children. She has continued to be active in promotional and advertising work, following a movie and some show skating after her retirement from the competitive ranks.

#### David W. Jenkins

No combination of brothers can equal the record made by David Jenkins and his older brother Hayes in competitive figure skating. Taking up where his brother left off, David became North American Champion in 1957



and won his first World title that same year in Colorado Springs, while representing the Broadmoor Skating Club. Successfully defending his World title in 1958 and 1959, David went on to win the Olympic Championship at Squaw Valley, California, in 1960. He was also United States Champion four times from 1957 to 1960.

Truly one of the great free skaters of all time, David—like his brother Hayes—demonstrated an outstanding ability to interpret and express his music, while at the same time carrying to new levels the athleticism of skating. He is particularly remembered in the field of the triple jump, which he pioneered and which no one did better! An honors graduate of Colorado College, David went on, while still competing, to the medical school of Western Reserve University and is now an outstanding physician in Tulsa, Oklahoma. He is married and has three children.

#### **Peggy Fleming**

When Peggy Gale Fleming gained the Olympic Championship for ladies in 1968, she did more than continue the tradition of success established by her predecessors in that event. More importantly, Peggy represented the return to the top of American figure skating following the loss of the 1961 World Team. In that rebuilding process, Peggy herself had an important role, winning her first United States ladies' title in 1964 and World title in 1966. She went on to win five United States ladies' (1964-1968), three World (1966-1968) and one North American (1967) title, while representing the Arctic Blades and Broadmoor Skating Clubs. In addition to a successful career as a featured performer in the traveling ice shows. Peggy has also brought a new dimension to the sport as a featured star in television specials, which have been highly successful and well received by the viewing public.

Now married to Dr. Greg L. Jenkins and living in the San Francisco area.



Peggy is soon expecting her first child. Peggy's unusual grace and almost ethereal beauty, combined with the steel and determination of a great competitor, will always be remembered, perhaps best recalled from her first defense of her World title in Vienna in 1967, the last outdoor championship.


- Skaters from throughout the world who have compiled outstanding competitive records or who have made notable contributions in style or technique, and who have been retired from competitive skating for at least five years;

The newest concerns of figure skating instructors—from triple jumps to off-ice conditioning to free skating creativity—featured prominently among the topics discussed at the tenth annual convention of the Professional Skaters Guild of America last May in Las Vegas, Nevada. For the four-day meeting, chairman Janet Champion and her assistant Frank Carroll gathered an exceptional staff of lecturers and discussion leaders.

First up for scrutiny was the role of dance in developing a skater's individual style and creativity in free skating. Ricky Harris, who teaches a creative dance workshop, discussed the fundamentals of dance movement, and three of her students demonstrated how these principles can be applied in off-ice sessions. During a later rink session, the students demonstrated the same creativity exercises on the ice. Each girl then skated a program she had choreographed herself; the result was three completely different styles, even though each girl had received the same training from Ms. Harris.

From art the subject changed to science. Dr. Jack Wilmore, of the National Athletic Health Institute in Los Angeles, analyzed ways to apply scientific principles to coaching. As examples he cited assessing the potential of an athlete through tests of body composition, flexibility, strength, work capacity and muscle fiber types. He also compared several types of endurance training.

Further suggestions from the scientific/academic world came from Dr. Bryant Cratty, director of the perceptual-motor learning laboratory in the UCLA Department of Kinesiology. Dr. Cratty focused on the effects of numerous kinds of stress upon the athlete and how these stresses may be alleviated, avoided, ignored or overcome.

Perhaps the most lucid evaluation the PSGA has ever received regarding the physiological and psychological parameters in athletic training and performance was given by Dr. Marvin Clein. He is chairman of the University of Denver Department of Physical Education and

Sports Sciences, and he has acted as the off-ice sports science trainer of Dorothy Hamill and several other champion figure skaters. Dr. Clein included a slide show presentation of his work with skaters and other athletes, which communicated his ideas well to those unfamiliar with this type of training.

The evenings offered more informal fare. A "film festival" the first evening ranged from one of Peggy Fleming's television specials to National Championship highlights of the past 20 years to Shipstad & Johnson performing one of their early routines, still a masterpiece of comedy. On the second evening rap sessions predominated. Gary Visconti outlined selection of content for programs; Bill Bain suggested ways to prepare a skater for an ice show audition: Sid Moore and Ron Plank discussed video taping in teaching; Fritz Dietl and Sid Moore gave tips on blade mounting and sharpening. The discussions were informal, with questions abounding from the audience of about 50.

When the convention meetings moved to the Las Vegas Ice Palace, conversation centered on applying the techniques discussed in earlier classroom sessions. In addition to Ricky Harris's informative presentation, the pros learned Gary Visconti's ideas on choreography, as demonstrated by Perry Jewell and Teresa Foy; and Betty Berens's practical suggestions for training pair skaters. For all pairs, Betty emphasized the importance of a good foundation in stroking, footwork, varied free skating, lifts and pair spins. In an earlier classroom lecture, she suggested off-ice exercises for the various lifts. At the rink she related these exercises to skating performances of lifts and spins by Cathy Normille & Greg Taylor and a Novice pair.

The basics for children training for hockey were discussed by Pieter Kollen. He divided the skating skills needed for hockey into four levels of ability, and several boys demonstrated Kollen's exercises for each skill level.

lce sessions on the final day commenced with figure tracings by Dianne de Leeuw, who skated figures from the Second through Gold Tests to demonstrate the techniques of her coach, Doug Chapman. Chapman concentrated on showing ways to help the skater avoid turning her head as a means of reducing wobbles and increasing the accuracy of the tracing.

A comprehensive study of the techniques for teaching basic spin positions was conducted by Janet Champion and Ray Balmer, who were assisted in demonstrations by four of their San Diego students. As if running the convention were not exhausting enough, Janet skated butterflies in a row and a beautiful layback spin of nearly 20 revolutions with changing arm and free leg positions.

New to the convention was the discussion of triple jumps. Frank Carroll and Barbara Roles, whose students number among those spearheading the triple-jump emphasis in competition today, related the similarities and differences between single, double and triple jumps. They explained the purpose of the crossed-ankle position for triples and stressed the importance of fundamentals of jumping and rotating, if a skater is to achieve triple jumps consistently. Their untiring demonstrators were John Carlow, Jr., Mark Cockerell, Linda Fratianne, Ken Newfield and Garnet Ostermeier. Topping off the icy excitement, the San Diego FSC Firecrackers, otherwise known as "Janet's Champions," skated a lively precision drill team exhibition.

At the convention banquet, PSGA members welcomed the newly-elected President of the USFSA, Charles A. De-More, and the secretary of the world professional association, Pablo Garcia Marquez. The relaxed social gathering allowed members and their honored quests to talk about the full days' offerings. Conversation jumped from the lectures on compulsory figures and music editing to the new ideas about off-ice conditioning and testing, sure to play a greater role in figure skating's future. All could agree that the four days provided a wealth of information that teaching professionals will find valuable in their everyday contact with figure skaters, rinks and fellow professionals.

# Meet the Pres.

Last May, Charles A. DeMore of Cleveland was duly elected the 19th President of the United States Figure Skating Association. Chuck, as he is best known, brings to the presidency a wealth of administrative experience, as well as a comprehensive background at the local level in the Cleveland Skating Club, from which he is the fourth USFSA President, his predecessors being Messrs. Henry M. Beatty, H. Kendall Kelley and Spencer E. Cram.

A graduate of Syracuse University in 1947 with a Bachelor of Science degree in landscape architecture and recreational management, Chuck is today a registered consulting engineer of the State of Ohio. He is president of his own firm of consulting engineers, Woodruff, Inc., as well as a partner in F.A. Pease Engineering Company, both of Cleveland.

First joining the Cleveland Skating Club in 1953, of which he served as a Trustee for three years, Chuck holds the Pre-Silver Dance Test and on three occasions won the Veterans' Dance event at the Lake Placid Summer Dance Competitions. However, the skating and golf he enjoys today are not his only athletic endeavors. He was twice a varsity letterman in lacrosse while at Syracuse and received an honorable mention for the All-American Lacrosse Team in his senior year.

Chuck has been actively involved with the competitive scene, having served as general chairman of the 1964 National Championships, the 1969 Midwestern Championships and the 1975 World Championships. He is also a National Accountant and served in that capacity at the 1972 FISU Games at Lake Placid, the 1974 Nationals, the 1973 Midwesterns and no less than seven times at the Eastern Great Lakes Regional. He has also served as a Team Leader at five World Championships and has twice been a USFSA Delegate to the ISU Congress.

Chuck first came to the USFSA Executive Committee in 1966 and has served continuously in a wide variety of positions of responsibility ever since. After serving as Chairman of the Amateur Status Committee, he took over the chairmanship of the International Committee on short notice in 1971, following the untimely death of William Haigler. He has been the Midwestern Vice President for the last two years.

However, perhaps Chuck's outstanding attribute in his service to the sport has been his willingness to accept unhesitatingly special and difficult assignments whenever called upon, and to fulfill them in an exemplary and efficient manner. Outstanding examples have been his chairmanship of the 1975 World Championships and succeeding ISU Exhibition Tour, as well as his pioneering work in commercial sponsorship.

There is a saying that behind every good man usually stands a good woman, to which Chuck is no exception! His wife Elaine, a graduate of Ursuline College, has herself served the sport faithfully in many capacities, particularly in the field of Judges' Education and Training. She holds the Fifth Test and Silver Dance Test and is a Judge for World Championships in both Figure Skating and Ice Dancing. In these capacities she has represented the Association as one of its most senior judges. She also has served as a Team Leader and Judge at Skate Safari in South Africa and at the first ISU Junior Championship in Megeve, France.

The DeMores have one daughter, Elaine (known as Lainie), who is presently studying at Connecticut College in New London, Connecticut. Lainie holds the Seventh Test and Pre-Gold Dance Test. Her achievements are representative of the efforts and experience of Chuck and Elaine as parents of an active skater, which have stood them in good stead in their service to the Association.

All in all, the DeMores represent an outstanding team to lead the USFSA during the challenging years ahead. It can be said that none are better capable of meeting the myriad problems from both external and internal forces that face an amateur sport today. We look forward with full confidence to the success of President DeMore's administration and wish him well as he embarks on this new task.

To visitors arriving for the 1977 United States Figure Skating Championships, Hartford will convey the mood of a sleek, on-the-move city. And move it does. Certainly the scene of competition action—Veterans Memorial Coliseum at the Hartford Civic Center—encompasses all one expects of a modern sports arena. While the championships unfold from February 2-5, competitors and spectators will enjoy the convenience and central location of Hartford's newest facilities.

But the city known as the insurance capital of the world has two faces. Shadowed by the clean, tailored skyline lie streets lined with reminders of colonial days: the Old State House, completed in 1796 and now a Registered National Landmark; the Center Church and Old Burying Ground, dating from the early 1600's; and the Butler-McCook Homestead, built in 1782 and recently added to the National Register of Historic Places, just to name a few.

Hartford offers a superb blend of old and new—a character all its own. That character, and the local pride it fosters, will shine among members of the Skating Club of Hartford, hosts for Nationals '77. The club is tackling the big event with the same enthusiasm that made the 1970 New England Regional, the club's last qualify-

ing competition, a memorable, well run championship. The SC of Hartford has enlisted as co-sponsor The Travelers Insurance Companies, which are headquartered in the city. The Travelers agreed to participate in Nationals '77 through their PEP (Physical Exercise Pays) program. The two organizations are welllalong in their preparations now, and the information they want you to know in advance about schedule of events, hotel accommodations and tickets appears in the centerfold of this magazine.

Those who attend Nationals will find all their needs met within Hartford's remarkably compact downtown district. The Civic Center, of which the ice arena is a part, contains a department store and over 50 shops offering everything from the latest fashions to antiques and art. Also in the complex a dozen restaurants offer the ethnic flavors of Italy, Greece, Japan, Mexico, China, Germany, France and, of course, the United States. Dining ranges from casual, stand-up style on the Market Level to continental formality in the elegant Signature Restaurant on the Second Level.

Housing will be equally convenient. Competitors and their chaperones will lodge at the Sheraton-Hartford Hotel, which adjoins the Civic Center and boasts the added luxury of an enclosed walkthrough to the arena. Other visitors will be glad to hear that all of Hartford's major hotels are located within two and one

half blocks of the Civic Center.

For those who wish to do some sightseeing, a self-guided walking tour of downtown Hartford takes one past the Wadsworth Atheneum, one of the nation's top ten art museums; Constitution Plaza. one of the finest examples of urban renewal; Phoenix Mutual Life Insurance Company, housed in the world's first twosided office building; Travelers Insurance Company, one of the largest in the nation: numerous municipal and state buildings. including the Connecticut State Capitol: and the Old State House, where three signers of the Declaration of Independence served, 30 governors of the State of Connecticut were inaugurated and seven Presidents of the United States visited while in office.

Famous people not only visited Hartford, but many were born or lived there. Mark Twain built a mansion where he raised his children and wrote several of his major works, including *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer* and *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn.* His neighbor was Harriet Beecher Stowe, author of *Uncle Tom's Cabin.* Their homes still stand in an area called Nook Farm and are open yearround. The birthplace of Noah Webster, "the father of the American dictionary," is located in West Hartford. This and many other 17th and 18th century homes of persons prominent in Connecticut history have been either preserved or restored and are open to the public.

The appeal of these historic structures ties Hartford to the colonial heritage for which all New England is famous. The old stands alongside the new, giving the perspective of history to the city's glasswalled skyscrapers and broad plazas. The two faces of Hartford are waiting to greet all at Nationals '77.

# Window on Worlds

An unexpected corner of the globe will hug the limelight this season when Japan hosts the World Figure Skating Championships in Tokyo on March 1-6. The 1977 championships will mark the first time these events are contested in Asia, though still fresh in our memories is the efficient Japanese organization of the Sapporo Olympics

The championships will be staged at the National Athletic Stadium, an impressive indoor sports complex used in the 1964 summer Olympics. All officials and competitors will stay at the palatial Keio Plaza Inter-Continental Hotel in the western suburb of Shinjuku, within comfortable walking distance of the rink.


For those fortunate enough to head for this exotic venue, the busy Tokyo international airport at Haneda will provide a striking first impression of the country. Japan Air Lines and several independent tour sponsors have pulled out all the stops, arranging varied travel plans for North Americans and Europeans alike. (Several tour options are advertised in this issue.) As a result, a surprisingly large contingent of spectators from abroad is expected for Asia's first Worlds.

While several tours will include optional sidetrips to other centers in the Orient, Tokyo itself has so much to offer to the visitor with time to spare. Wherever one looks, Western-style modernization contrasts with Oriental tradition. The grounds of the imperial palace form Tokyo's core. In addition, more than 250 parks, some fascinatingly steeped in history, dot the city.

A television tower built in 1958, modeled after the Eiffel Tower in Paris, dominates the city center. This and, at night, the neon-lit Harumi street in Ginza, one of Tokyo's principal shopping districts, are sights not to be missed. But to many the vision bound to remain indelibly in the memory will be of that famous Japanese artistic theme, the symmetrical snow-capped cone of Fujiyama.

While timeless beauty and treasures of past eras will color the visitors' view of To-kyo, World Championship action will definitely turn their thoughts to today and the future. New names inevitably must hit the headlines after the withdrawal of last season's top performers, as usually occurs after an Olympic season. Based on past performances, likely medal contenders in the Men's event will be David Santee of Chicago FSC; Canadian Ron Shaver, now fully recovered from his injuries; and Britain's Robin Cousins, the only man to achieve five triples at Innsbruck. Their main rivals may be the two Russians, Vladimir Kovalev and Igor Bobrin, and East Germany's Jan Hoffmann.

The Ladies' title vacated by Dorothy Hamill could spur an intriguing duel between East Germany, most likely represented by Anett Pötzsch, and the United States, always strong in this event. In both singles' contests, the Japanese hosts can expect good performances from local favorites. Emi Watanabe, the country's lady champion, and Mitsuru Matsumura, a talented newcomer, are training extensively for Tokyo '77. Skating fans worldwide will have good reason to be there to cheer them on.



In 1973 she gained her first national notice, advancing to Nationals and winning the Junior Ladies' free skating while finishing second overall at Minneapolis. That summer brought international notice as well. She was the silver medalist at the Nebelhorn Trophy competition in Oberstdorf, West Germany, and she won the gold medal in the VII Grand Prix International at St. Gervais, France.

In 1974, Linda ran into some more experienced Senior Ladies in the Pacific Coast Sectional and, though she won the free skating, finished fourth, failing to advance to Nationals.

What must have been quite a disappointment, at the time, hardly seems worth mentioning the morning after Linda's dramatic vault from seventh in the 1975 National Ladies' Championship to second place and the World and Olympic Team in 1976. The "lost" year seems fully recovered!

At this point Frank Carroll, Linda's coach from the beginning, returns from a practice

At this point Frank Carroll, Linda's coach from the beginning, returns from a practice session at the Broadmoor World Arena and joins the interview. He has coached a trio of National Novice Men's Champions—James Demogines in 1969, Scott Carson in 1973 and Robert Taylor in 1976—and a previous World Team member, Robbie Bradshaw in 1973.

Today, however, his thoughts are all on Linda as he helps catalog the factors that have contributed to her success in skating. First there is that inborn, natural talent which, Frank says, includes "an innate sense of pacing that enables her to peak at the right time.

"Sometimes when I've been worried about her progress, she has assured me that it would all come together at the right time and, sure enough, it has," he grins.

Next Frank mentions Linda's placid nature— "she never gets upset about anything"—and ties it closely to a "great relationship with her mother and a very supportive family."

Obviously, sound coaching, music selection and choreography have also figured in, but (continued on page 60)





Frank passes over that lightly. Instead, he muses on the fact that at just 15½ years of age, Linda can't possibly have reached the peak of her potential. "With less than seven years on the ice behind her, she is bound to improve a great deal yet." He plainly finds the prospect exciting.

\* \* \* \*

The scene shifts to a sizzling summer day in Southern California's San Fernando Valley.

During the intervening months Linda has enhanced her international stature by finishing eighth at Innsbruck, despite a somewhat "off" free performance, and fifth overall in Worlds at Gothenburg, with a definitely "on" free performance that won her the bronze free skating medal. She has also grown an inch or two, gained a pound or two and turned 16.

Just back from their annual week at the beach, all of the Fratiannes have gathered to talk about their "supportive family" role. Neat scrapbooks on the coffee table, kept right up to date, hold clippings and memorabilia from Linda's skating career. In one there is a photo of the banner raised across the cul-de-sac where they live that welcomed Linda home last winter. It was put up by loving neighbors who've watched her grow from that feisty tree-climber into a world-class athlete, and now enjoy bragging that they took her skating for the first time.

Linda's 20-year-old sister Mary, studying to

be a court reporter, acknowledges that her contribution is running the household when her mother travels with Linda. "I serve TV dinners mostly—there isn't much time to cook after school—but no one goes hungry," she laughs.

Brother Nick, 19, is home from the Sigma Chi house at nearby California State University, Northridge, where he is preparing to follow in his father's legal footsteps. His role is serving as companion and chauffeur for eight-year-old Bobby while his mother is busy doing the same for Linda, to the tune of about 100 miles a day on the Los Angeles freeways.

Thirteen-year-old Angela, a National Honor Society student, resembles Linda closely and seems to be her best friend. They giggle privately over things that come up in the conversation and compare heights during the picture taking... Angela is a few inches taller.

As for Bobby, with mischievous eyes under a crop of dark curls, he shows off his hamster, tells about the goldfish he got for Linda when she made the Olympic team and definitely is the family cheerleader.

The interview ends and words like "hectic" and "pressure" have never come up. Instead, a headline in one of the scrapbooks—"WE" IS PROMINENT WORD FOR FRATIANNES—has proven true. Here for sure is a "supportive family" thoroughly enjoying the challenge and fun of having a champion figure skater in its midst.
