





To the Editor:







Readers Write, continued

To the Editor:

In my entire experience of figure skating, nothing disappoints me as strongly as the selection of music used by skaters. How many times have we gone to competitions and said to ourselves, "Where have I heard that before?" or "Oh! This is the music so-and-so skates to"?

I've had it up to my ears with classical music. Being a member of the younger generation, I've stumbled over hundreds of dynamic instrumentals, all written within the past 20 years. To name a few are works by Jeff Beck, "Yes," "Emerson, Lake and Palmer" and "Pink Floyd."

Even if you have already decided to dislike modern music, what about modernized classical music? With the age of the computer, more and more instruments are being invented and used. Everyone is familiar with the sound of an orchestra, but what about the sound of a Moog Synthesizer or an electric guitar? Please note that I am not suggesting we eliminate classical completely. Just try other types, try something no one has ever used,

In reality, I think all of us are aware of modern music but stay away simply because we want to play it safe. I have discussed this with judges, and their objective reply is that they are impartial to the music selection. As long as the skater interprets the music well, that's all that matters. But many skaters feel that if two identical programs were skated, one to classical and one to modern music, the classical program would receive higher marks. Why? Perhaps because judges are more familiar with classical.

As a teacher I have discovered that my students can relate better and "get into" aesthetically music from their own time. They are proving to their fellow competitors that they're hip to what's going on musically as well as to the latest maneuvers...So why not take a chance and try something truly different? Perhaps you will contribute something great to the fantastic sport of figure skating.—Charlaine Ward (professional), Framingham, Mass.

New York Council: The Central New York Figure Skating Council was formed in July 1976. The clubs involved in the Council are the Binghamton, Cornell, College-Community, Elmira and Syracuse Figure Skating Clubs.

The Council was formed, primarily, to promote and further skating interests within and among clubs in the central New York state area. The Council will also distribute information to its members about pros, test sessions, club competitions and ice carnivals.

The Council's goals for this year are to develop drill teams in each member club for inter-club precision skating competitions and initiate an adult social dance group to learn a variety of low-level dances (on a non-competitive basis) to increase adult interest and participation.

The officers of the Council are: Mrs. June Silberman, College-Community FSC, President; Fred Hottenstein, Binghamton FSC, Vice President; Mrs. Helen Bartow, Cornell FSC, Secretary; and Ron Taylor, Cornell FSC, Treasurer.

One of the Council's member clubs, Binghamton FSC, presented "The Spirit of '76 Ice Show" last spring. The club's home is an outdoor rink with very limited seating. The day of the event was cold and snowy. The crowd. however, was large and enthusiastic. The show was very successful due to the cooperation from the town and other skating clubs in the area. Glenwood FSC: Last spring the still young Glenwood FSC held its first annual Ladybug Free Skating Invitational, Featured skaters were Olympic and World bronze medalists Colleen O'Connor and Jim Millns in their final amateur appearance and Olympic, World Team and National silver medalist David Santee, along with other National level competitors.

Wagon Wheel FSC vs. Chicago FSC: A "Super Star" competition with contests in softball, basketball, tug-of-war, obstacle course, relay race and volleyball was held last May in Chicago. It was a fun day for members of both clubs. The Wagon Wheel FSC won the tug-of-war contest. The Chicago FSC was victorious in all of the other events. So the Wagon Wheel FSC will have to wait until next year.

Philadelphia Skating Club & Humane Society: Miriam Procopia, who directs the office for this active club, adds this item to the "now you've heard everything" list. She gets a number of inquiries each year about where the animals are kept, but recently someone stopped in the office and wanted to buy a large chunk of ice.

Ice Abroad

Skate Canada, held October 28-31 in Ottawa, provided a rocky beginning for U.S. hopes for the new season. A week before the competition got underway, the two American ladies—Linda Fratianne and Priscilla Hill—had to withdraw because of muscle pull injuries. They were replaced by Suzie Brasher, reigning ISU Junior Ladies' Champion, and Midwestern Senior Ladies' Champion Karen DeAngelo, making her first appearance in international competition.

This fourth annual edition of Skate Canada brought teams from nine nations to contest events in men's and ladies' singles and ice dancing in Canada's capital. Karen placed fourth and Suzie was close behind in sixth place. David Santee placed third in the men's event and Mahlon Bradley finished ninth. American dancers Judi Genovesi and Kent Weigle finished in seventh place just in front of Michelle Ford and Glenn Paterson, Jr. who finished eighth. Exhibitions by Americans Babilonia & Gardner closed the event, Complete results next month.



Forty-five skaters, representative of all six Provinces of the South African Ice Skating Association, competed in the six singles and two dance and pairs events of the 1976 Na-

tional Senior Championships, which were held at Johannesburg's SkyRink from September 29 to October 1. British World Judge Mrs. Diana Stevens refereed all sections of the event, which coincided with her visit to the country, principally to conduct judges' and coaches' clinics in the various skating centers.

Britain's European, World and Olympic competitor, Glyn Jones was on hand to present exhibitions at the event. He also stayed on after the championships to serve as "demonstrator" at Mrs. Stevens's clinics.

From the viewpoint of the South African Government's policy to "normalize" sport in the country, by opening competition at all levels to all racial groups, these figure skating championships represented an historic occasion in that the final free skating program on Friday night, Oct. 1, began with a precision skating competition in which all members of the Johannesburg Ice Sports Club participated with distinction. By next year, it is hoped not only to attract precision teams from all the Association's Provincial areas, but also to have the singles, pairs and dance events contested on a multiracial basis. This should be possible now

that more of the country's rinks are becoming integrated.

All four National Senior titles were contested this year, three being retained by their 1975 holders. The Senior Dance title was not awarded to the only contending couple, Anita Gray and Garry Braid (Natal), because they failed to attain the minimum standard in the three compulsory routines and the free dance.

The Senior Pairs section also attracted only one entry, Margaret McIntyre & Lenel van den Berg (Eastern Province), who had little difficulty in retaining the title they won last year. This was, in fact, Lenel's fourth consecutive win in the pairs event, which he also took in 1973 and 1974 with Louise Buttle.

The experience of competing in this year's St. Gervais and Oberstdorf competitions and the Richmond Trophy and Skate Safari events last year, as well as a year's training in Britain in 1974, certainly stood 17-year-old Lynne Rayner from Durban in good stead in easily retaining her National Senior Ladies' title. To my mind, she presented the finest performance of her career to date, with a polished number, skated at a brisk pace, that technically and artistically well deserved her 5-plus marks. Lynne's two Transvaal challengers, Irene Anderson, the 1975 National Junior Lady Champion, and Tammy Grenfell, this year's Transvaal Provincial Lady Champion, placed second and third.

Seventeen-year-old defending Men's Champion Hannes Potgieter's free skating program, the last competitive number of the championships, became a nightmarish replay of the experience of Rodnina/Zaitsev at the '73 Worlds, Barely two minutes into his program, his music faded. was heard again momentarily, and then stopped. Unperturbed, Hannes (from Pretoria) continued skating and completed his routine without music, for which he received marks from all five judges between 5.0 and 5.6, more than sufficient, with his already substantial lead from figures and short program, to hold off the challenge of Lenel van den Berg (Eastern Province) and Jeremy Dowson (Natal) and take the Senior Men's title for a second consecutive year.

This was certainly an unusual ending to these championships, which also included Primary and Junior Singles and Junior Pairs and Dance divisions. Most gratifyingly, the final night of the event was recorded by South Africa's nine-month-old television network, for broadcast the following afternoon. During the prime Saturday sports program, two 20-minute segments of the championships were televised.

Book Review

Better Ice Skating for Boys and Girls by George Sullivan; Dodd, Mead & Co. N.Y. (The book may be ordered from the USFSA Central Office for \$4.95 plus 35¢ postage and handling per copy.)

While the title says "Boys and Girls" even the beginning adult will find many helpful hints as to equipment, how to properly fit the equipment and how to cope with those first few times on the ice.

There are excellent photos of correct positions for push offs, stops, beginnings, stroking, the basic figure eight and the first simple jumps, such as the "bunnie-hop" and the "waltz jump."

The book also covers gliding, stroking in rythmn, three turns, simple spins and all the basic, simple moves that, once mastered, add much to the enjoyment of ice skating, be it recreational, basic skill badge testing or preparing for USFSA testing.

There are also several good chapters on hockey and speed skating. All the chapters stressing the fact that in all types of skating the key is good glide and stroking in rythmn.


The book is written in simple language so a

youngster may read it, but the adult will not find it so simple as to be boring.

From the USFSA point of view there are several corrections. One may be a member of the USFSA either as a member of one of the 370 (not 200 as stated in the book) skating clubs or one may apply for Individual membership. The description of pair skating and ice dancing is not very well done in the text. In the glossary of terms "Patch Marker" is confusing. Patch Markers may be traffic cones or merely small marks on the boards around the rink. Markers that put circles on the patch ice are scribes, these are devices much like a compass used by skaters to make perfect circles on the patch ice so they may get the feel of skating a true circle.

All in all, it is a fine book for the beginning skater no matter what phase of ice skating he or she is interested in.

Hall of Fame Ballot

Now it's time to nominate your candidates for the USFSA Figure Skating Hall of Fame. Any person may participate, using the nominating form printed below or obtaining a copy from the USFSA Central Office (please enclose a stamped, self-addressed envelope with request). You may submit one nominating form per year. Up to 10 nominations may be made, from any or all of the following categories:

- Skaters from throughout the world who have compiled outstanding competitive records or who have made notable contributions in style or technique, and who have been retired from competitive skating for at least five years;
- 2) Persons who have made noteworthy contributions to figure skating in a non-skating capacity through service to an amateur figure skating association and who have not been active in this category for at least a year;
- 3) Persons who have made noteworthy contributions to figure skating as professionals.

Nominations are not limited to living persons, nor to Americans; any person filling the qualifications listed above is eligible.

The 27 electors (three from each Region) will vote on the nominees, and the next induction to the Hall of Fame will take place at the USFSA Governing Council Meeting in May, 1977.

Skating in Central Park

The following is from Harper's Weekly, January 28, 1860.

Skating on the Ladies' Pond at the Central Park has become an agreeable exercise since the managers of the Park have made arrangements for the season.

There are two, or rather several ponds, which are divided into two large headsthe Ladies' Pond and the Gentlemen's Pond. The latter is a large space, which when the skating is good, may be seen covered with a couple of thousand people. Here everyone may try his skill and tumble about on the ice as he pleases. The Ladies' Pond is reserved for the fair sex, and no gentlemen are allowed to skate on it unless they are accompanied by ladies. It is kept in good order, and policemen on skates effectually repress all tendencies to rowdyism. Both ponds are flooded from time to time from the reservior, and thus, however much the ice may be cut up by skaters, every morning presents a clean, pleasant surface to visitors-provided the night has been cold enough for the water to freeze.

The scene when the ladies are on the pond is attractive in the extreme, and usually draws a large concourse of visitors.

Shakespeare, when he puts into the mouth of Touchstone that celebrated dissertation on the different degrees of removal in a quarrel, is able to dispose of his subject under seven heads. It is not so with the degrees of tumbling. This voluminous and most important topic can be done justice in no fewer than eight divisions.

There are—to deal with the matter after the Touchstone manner—eight degrees, forms or modes of tumbling. No more and no less. There is the "Fling

utter"; the "Smash complicated"; the "Stag ger victorious"; the "Scramble ineffectual"; the "Drop sudden"; the "Fall facetious"; the "Tumble truculent"; and lastly, the "Crash unresisted".

Let us now examine each, and go into the fearful subject a little more in detail, beginning with the Fling utter. He who having attained the highest possible degree of speed known in the annals of skating, strikes suddenly against some particle of foreign matter which has become embedded in the ice-be it a stone, a frozen twig, etc.-he who when checked, finds his feet cast up into the air, and presently his body in such violent contact with the ice that he slides along his shoulder and his ear fifteen yards before his legs have descended to the same level with the portions of his anatomy just hinted at-this man, and he alone, knows what it is to have experienced the Fling utter. It is a condition of tumbling wholly dependent upon, and inseparable from, a great degree of speed, and is associated with the phenomenon known to skaters as the "outside edge". This Fling utter is a piteous accident. It is frequent and terrible, and is attended by the following symptoms: a smart tingling in the ears, a sensation as of a rush of blood to the back of the head, a vision before the eyes of nymerous black tadpoles ornamented with diamond frontlets or coronets, and floating in the air, sudden taste of base metal in the mouth, a conviction on the part of the sufferer that his neck has become shorter, that his vertebrae are jammed together, that his heart is between his teeth, that his legs are in his body, that his body is up in his head, that his stomach is collapsed, that his hands are affixed to his ankles and his feet joined to his wrists. Let us go on to the Smash complicated.

This is an accident strangely connected with the peculiar states of the nervous system. You see a man swooping down upon you; you have time to avoid him, but you can't; a hideous fascination draws you on, you meet with a dread concussion, you embrace him and cling to him, and he to you; your hand drops off, so does his; you perform together a frenzied waltz, which brings you to a slide; you are falling; remember, all this time, the sliders descend upon you, and you form the center of an entangled mass of arms, legs and bodies, in which no person can identify his own, till, the great crash is over, the sufferer crawls out of this seething mass of humanity on his hands and knees, and very commonly finds a recess or dimple in his hat, which brings the career of that article of costume to an untimely end. This is a brief history of the Smash complicated; so called from the number of persons involved in it, and the manner in which all the victims of the accident become mixed up together in one common ruin.

We now come to the Stagger victorious and the Scramble ineffectual. It has doubtless been the lot of most persons who have looked on at the sport of skating to have their attention drawn to the conduct of some individual engaged in that pastime. who suddenly, and for some unexplained reason, flings his head and body back, stamps seven times with the heels of his skates, and whirls his arms around, casts his stick into a distant parish, plunges forward, swerves, advances several hurried paces, stamps more wildly than before, revolves, clutches at the air, bows himself double, again flings his arms back, recovers himself and his balance without any actual fall, and stands perfectly still for several minutes, with his hands supporting the small of his back. This is the Stagger victorious, concerning which it may be said, in one word, that it is a mistake, and that it is better to tumble down at once than risk the back, strain the abdomen and dislocate the limbs generally. But if the Stagger victorious be a mistake,

the Scramble ineffectual is a performance in which our acrobat goes through the whole of the above-mentioned extravagances and tumbles down after all. This is the most disappointing and the most humiliating of all modes of falling: the unhappy victim of the Scramble ineffectual having the attention of everybody present by the prolonged struggle which precede his ruin.

Perhaps, the most undignified of all tumbles is that which has been characterized as the Drop sudden. It is a very simple transaction, commonly unattended with serious results, and consists, to put the affair in two words, of a sudden (and involuntary) sitting down act on the part of the sufferer, who drops, without any apparent cause, upon the ice in a sitting posture, with his legs stretched out straight in front of him. It has been remarked by great observers and profound thinkers that the patient in this case will ordinarily remain in this position for some minutes before attempting to rise; that he is apt to look about him; and that, after picking up his hat, which the Drop sudden invariably jerks off, he will take a handkerchief therefrom, and carefully blow his nose while still in the sitting posture. From these observations the profound thinkers aforesaid have drawn the conclusion that the Drop sudden is a less alarming seizure than any other to which skaters are liable.

Let us speak of the Fall facetious. The Fall facetious is, in its earlier stages, intimately mixed up with the Scramble ineffectual. It is generally preceded by the same resistance and staggering, and even the fall itself has no distinguished character of its own. It is in this case a question of the tumbler and not of the tumble. He who treats his fall in the facetious manner will (with anguish in every limb) get up with a smiling countenance, joining the laugh against himself, and even sometimes muttering, in a gay manner, disparaging remarks about his own clumsiness, or faintly humming a lively air. Let no persons be taken by this. Instances have been known in which the sufferers by the Fall facetious have skated for three minutes

tarbans on ice

Morning patch in New England was never like this. That thought was unavoidable as I walked briskly along a precipitous path zigzagging the backside of a 7.300-foot mountain in the foothills of the Himalayas. Heading for the skating rink in the northern Indian town of Simla, I passed smiling Tibetan refugees busy at their roadside stalls, chattering monkeys that lumbered across the road and leaped onto a nearby tree branch, and Indians crouched around a fire at the local tea stall, pulling their long woolen shawls close and sipping the traditional Hindustani chay to ward off the early morning chill.

Several months previously I arrived in India to pursue fieldwork for a Ph.D. degree in anthropology, specializing in South Asian ethnology. I wanted to meet the Indian people in natural settings, and I soon found that my skating background made this possible. During my 13-month stay, I visited all the rinks in India. For two months I served as guest professional instructor at the Calcutta Ice Skating Club, the country's largest year-round facility. While teaching the Calcutta skat-

ers something they wanted to learn very much, I in turn learned much about my students and gained insights into their society.

My desire to learn more about the skaters of Simla led me to that mountain path and thoughts of how different my earlier skating experiences had been. I finally reached Scandal Point, where once the Maharaja of Patiala stole the daughter of the British Viceroy in an act of defiance, which resulted in his banishment from the hill station of Simla. From the Point I first glimpsed my destination, Simla's natural skating rink nestled in the shade at the mountain's base. All around stood splendid examples of Victorian architecture-stone churches in the Tudor style and lovely hotels with great wooden turrets-testifying to Simla's pre-eminence in the 19th century as the home of Rudvard Kipling and summer capital of the British raj (provincial governor). Perhaps to preserve the ambience of the Victorian era, Indians still do not permit automobiles to glut the streets of Simla.

On my final descent to the rink, my ears picked up the strains of a Strauss waltz and later the newest theme song from the Hindi cinema. My eyes caught the brilliant colors of Sikh turbans and native caps whirling on the ice below. The

rink itself, with an open air cafe to one side and walls lined with a pictorial chronology of the skating club, is reminiscent of turn-of-the-century Davos or Geneva, with a distinctly Oriental twist, of course! The Skating Club of Simla, established in 1920 by a British enthusiast, was a typical "Europeans only" club. After India gained independence, however, membership was opened to all. I soon found that one could circle the rink armin-arm with Simmi, a prominent Hindi film starlet, one moment and the next moment lead a troop of schoolboys through their paces, all the while being peppered with questions in mixed Hindi and Punjabi.

Little did I suspect that my intended two-day visit would become a two-week adoption by these engaging people. I skated in their annual fancy dress carnival on Christmas Day and later judged for their winter sports competition.

I found the skaters in Simla quite sophisticated, showing skill and ingenuity culled from the techniques of roller skating and ballroom dance and the written works of Maribel Vinson Owen and Capt. T.D. Richardson. Surprisingly enough, the men pursue the sport most ardently there, interspersing deep theoretical discussions of a spin or figure with demonstrations. The skaters had never heard of the toe jump or even the waltz eight, so I quickly instructed them. They then initiated me to "Tequila," a complex ice dance, the Lord Siva spin and the angel, a spiral in which the free leg moves from back to front until the skater's back is parallel to the ice.

Impressed by the Indians' abilities, I also learned of thier difficulties. Several years ago the Portland Ice Skating Club generously donated 100 pairs of used skates and blades to the Simla club [see feature in SKATING, Nov. '71]. But these are nearly worn out, and the increasing membership, which numbers over 500 now, makes figure skates a valuable commodity. It is my hope that clubs in the United States and elsewhere might follow Portland's example by donating used skates—for which Simla would gladly pay the postage and import duties.

On my last day in this tranquil town, the Chief Minister of the state presented me with a plaque bearing the insignia of the Simla Skating Club. I joined club members for a final cup of tea, and we parted with my promises to visit again and to do what I could to obtain the needed skates.

Although Simla is the oldest skating club in Southeast Asia, it has been followed by two artificially refrigerated rinks in the Birla Park of Calcutta and the newly opened Hotel Chola in Madras. I visited the rink in Calcutta shortly after leaving Simla, to skate exhibitions at the All-India Championships. This event attracted great interest from the growing body of serious skaters in the country.

I was the first Westerner to come in contact with skaters at the Calcutta Ice Skating Club, and this proved to be the most meaningful experience of my yearplus in India. Not only did I further my academic goals by meeting the people on a daily basis, but I was able to contribute to thier knowledge of figure skating. I skated several more exhibitions, including one for an educational program presented on All-India Television. I also wrote a book, *The World of Ice Skating*, published last August, which speaks expressly to skaters in India.

These skaters, isolated from the bustling skating scene of Western Europe and North America, are nevertheless talented and artistic devotees of the sport. Hampered only by the lack of skilled professional instructors, the Indians have developed a branch of figure skating with a flavor all its own. Seasoned with curry, perhaps?

Editor's Note: Paul Toomey will be remembered by competition followers as the 1965 Eastern Novice Men's Champion and two-time New England Junior Men's Champion. His most recent endeavors in the academic field led to an M.A. in Social Anthropology and a Certificate in Oriental Studies from the University of Virginia. Having returned from India this fall, he continues to work toward a Ph.D. at the same institution. He remains active in skating as a professional coach and choreographer.

Dorothy's Gold Bronzed

The months leading up to the Olympic Games, both summer and winter, call for fund-raising activities around the country to support our Olympic teams. The Delaware area figure skaters played a major role in contributing to the success of the U.S. Olympic Committee fundraising efforts. An ice show hosted by the Skating Club of Wilmington and an art exhibition sponsored by the Delaware Olympic Committee helped support the U.S. Figure Skating team. Mrs. Dorothy Baker, Delaware Chairman of the U.S. Olympic Committee, Bronze Dance Judge and a member of the Skating Club of Wilmington's Board of Directors offers this report.

I began formulating plans for a fundraising event trying to combine my love of sports—skating in particular—with my deep interest in art. I had an idea for an art show so I decided to call Mr. Charles Parks, President of the American Sculpture Society, to see if he would enter something in an art show. Mr. Parks was happy to work with us and then the art show idea really began to work. Mr. Parks mentioned how much he had admired Dorothy Hamill in the Winter Olympic Games in Innsbruck and spoke of wanting to sculpt her.

I then met with Mr. Parks and gave him some pictures of Dorothy taken by David Leonardi, along with some old SKATING Magazines and programs from past shows and competitions. He then went to work on his sculpture, carefully choosing a pose that would reflect Dorothy's style, grace and charm. He also wanted another model and Kirsten Abrahamson, also from the SC of Wilmington, posed for Mr. Parks. Kirsten was captured in a sit spin.

It is appropriate that Mr. Parks chose to sculpt Dorothy in a spiral because she is known for her long, graceful and beautifully positioned spirals. The 36" bronze sculpture of Dorothy is unique in that her boots and blades are cast in stainless steel. The silver skates provide a vivid con-

trast to the green dress and the natural bronze skin tones.

Sixty pieces of Charles Parks' work, featuring the two skating sculptures done for our art show, have been on tour of the United States since October. The art will be on display in Los Angeles in December, in Dallas in January, in St. Louis in February, in Chicago in March and in Pittsburgh in April.

The Olympic Tribute in Art started as an idea and became an event held at the Carspecken-Scott Gallery. Much of its success was due to an earlier successful fundraiser, an Olympic Tribute on ice.

The Delaware Olympic Committee sponsored the Olympic Tribute on Ice. Dorothy Hamill, who earned her first trip to the Nationals from Wilmington, was the highlight of the show. She took time off from her valuable and rigorous training schedule to perform for the show. She gave her first public performance of her "short program." Our first large fundraising event was made possible by the Board of Directors of the Skating Club of Wilmington for being the host and much thanks is due to Dorothy Hamill for making the show more spectacular.

I have received a great deal of personal satisfaction by working with our Olympic teams, being a part of the tremendous effort that goes in to putting a team together and sending them to the Games for competition. It takes a great deal of time, money and cooperation so every bit we raise puts that much less pressure on our athletes.

Hall of Fame SCRAPBOOK

JACQUES GERSCHWILER

Senior member of a unique Swiss family of skating teachers, which includes his brother Arnold and nephew Hans, Jacques Gerschwiler remains active today after a most successful career of more than forty years. Originally establishing himself in England in the late 1920's, Jacques discovered and taught Cecilia Colledge, the great British champion, throughout her entire competitive career. She was World Champion in 1937, three times European Champion (1937-1939) and runner-up to Sonja Henie in the famous Olympic Winter Games of 1936.

Jacques demonstrated his skill as a competitive skater in his own right by placing second and third in the Open Professional Championship of Great Britain in 1933 and 1934, respectively.

Following World War II, Jacques continued his success with such skaters as Jeannette Altwegg of Great Britain (Olympic Champion in 1952, World Champion in 1951 and European Champion in 1951



and 1952) and more recently, Karin Iten of Switzerland, winner of the separate gold medals for compulsory figures in the World Championships of 1974 and European Championships of 1973, 1974 and 1975.

Jacques is recognized as an excellent teacher of compulsory figures, with all of his leading pupils becoming outstanding exponents of that aspect of the sport. Jacques is also the author of a definitive work on figure skating in German, which will hopefully become available in English.

HOWARD NICHOLSON

Originally from St. Paul, Minnesota, Howard Nicholson first learned to skate as a speed skater and hockey player. Taking up figure skating as early as 1910, he began his professional career as a show skater, appearing at the Hippodrome in New York and later at the College Inn in Chicago.

Traveling to Europe in 1923, Nicholson taught for 16 years in England and Switzerland, while at the same time actively exhibiting and competing. He earned the ISU First Class (Gold) Test in 1926 and he was the first Open Professional Champion of Great Britain from 1931 to 1933. This was the only competition open to professionals for many years and considered by many to represent an unofficial World Championship. He also found time to write a definitive instructional book on the sport.

In 1924, 11-year-old Sonja Henie became his pupil and Nicholson thereafter guided her throughout her competitive

career in which she achieved the unassailable record of three Olympic, ten World and six European Championships.

Returning to the United States before World War II, Nicholson has since continued his outstanding teaching career in New York, Detroit and Lake Placid, now his permanent home, right through to today. An acknowledged master of the teaching of compulsory figures, Nicholson has also demonstrated his skill in the teaching of free skating.

Among his pupils are Mary Rose Thacker, North American (1939, 1941) and Canadian (1939, 1941-42) Champion; Sonya Klopfer, North American and United States Champion in 1951; Carlo Fassi, European Champion (1953-54); and Toller Cranston, Canadian Champion (1971-1976). Another pupil, Priscilla Hill of Lexington, Massachusetts, became the youngest Gold Medalist in the United States at the age of nine.

GUSTAVE LUSSI

The contributions to the development of modern figure skating in North America by Gustave Lussi can be said to have culminated in the career of his greatest pupil, Dick Button, twice Olympic Champion and five times World Champion.

This, however, represented many years of developing methods of instruction, particularly with respect to the athletic content of free skating. No one has done more to establish and define the science and technique of multiple revolution jumps and jump-spin combinations than Lussi.

Coming from his native Switzerland to Philadelphia in 1919, with a background in ski jumping, Lussi quickly established a reputation as a teacher with his first champion pupil, Egbert S. Cary, Jr., the United States Junior Champion in 1924. Moving to Toronto, Lussi taught Montgomery "Bud" Wilson and his sister Constance, who dominated competition in singles and pairs in North America from the late 1920's through the 1930's. Lussi also taught Barbara Ann Scott of Ottawa, the 1948 World and Olympic Champion. He passed the Canadian Gold Medal test in 1931, only the sixth person to do so and the first teaching professional ever to pass the highest figure test of the United States or Canada.

Returning to Philadelphia, Lussi was fortunate to have as pupils just before World War II an outstanding group of young champions with whom to develop the athletic techniques of modern free skating. They included Jane Vaughn, United States Lady Champion in 1941 and 1942; her brother Arthur, United States Champion in 1943, and William H. Grimditch, Jr., United States Junior Champion in 1941. Following World War II, Lussi continued to produce outstanding champions, including Eileen Seigh, Barbara Jones, Yvonne Sherman, the Jenkins brothers, Ronald Robertson, Margaret Anne & Hugh Graham and many others.

Teaching regularly in Lake Placid, New York, as early as 1921 and ultimately making his permanent home in the village, Lussi helped establish there the first regular summer skating sessions in North America. He has contributed immeasurably to the program's success ever since. Lussi is also the author of a well recognized text on figure skating and in recent years has worked to promote instruction in the teaching methods of skating.

EDDIE SHIPSTAD AND OSCAR JOHNSON

Coming originally from St. Paul, Minnesota, Eddie Shipstad and Oscar Johnson began their skating careers when the sport was very popular in that area, with many carnivals and exhibitions being held, particularly the famous St. Paul Winter Carnival. Eddie and Oscar, not having ready opportunities to compete, turned to exhibition skating and quickly became famous for their comedy number, "A Bicycle Built for Two." This resulted in many invitations to appear in amateur carnivals across the country, then the only form of show skating.

Their success culminated in a long-term engagement at the College Inn of the Sherman Hotel in Chicago, skating on a small tank rink 20 by 40 feet, one of the first such hotel shows in the country. The success of their engagement in Chicago (originally booked for one month and held over for sixteen) prompted Eddie and Oscar to form a small touring show—the first of its kind—of only 28 performers to appear in major arenas.

Thus was started in 1936 the Shipstads and Johnson Ice Follies. The show was built around Eddie's brother Roy, Bess Ehrhardt, Lois Dworshak, Everett

McGowan and Ruth Mack, as the featured stars; also featuring Heinie Brock, Eddie and Oscar handling the comedy, with Eddie and Oscar as co-producers.

Traveling originally by bus, the show opened in Tulsa, Oklahoma, moved on to Kansas City, St. Louis, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia, receiving only moderate public support. From Philadelphia, however, bookings were made in New York and Boston, where the show was an immediate success and was soon firmly established as a popular and permanent form of entertainment in the United States and Canada.

Despite television, the Ice Follies has continued its outstanding success ever since and has continued to emphasize throughout the years the basic concept conceived by its founders of being a wholesome form of entertainment, placing skating first and spectacle second.

The Shipstads and Johnson Ice Follies have always sought outstanding talent for the show, perhaps no better exemplified than by the career of Richard Dwyer, United States Junior Champion in 1949, who joined the show when he was 16 as successor to Roy Shipstad, and has been a star performer for more than 25 years.

Small = Better Judges

There is a strong need for more and better dance judges. This was the idea behind the New England Inter-Club Council's judges school held at Ridge Arena July 17 and 18 in Braintree, Massachusetts. The concept called for a small number of students (21) so that more individual attention could be given by the five faculty members. The faculty was Mr. Benjamin T. Wright, Mrs. Mary Louise Wright, Mrs. Betsy Talbot and myself, dance judges; and Mrs. Vera Bowen, dance professional.

The sessions were each held for four hours on Saturday and Sunday, with the time equally divided between classrooms and on-the-ice demonstrations. Classroom space for a group this size is not difficult to find, as it would be for a larger group. The instruction was broken down into four parts, each followed by a demonstration and a question and answer period. There was a section on the elements of dance and the Preliminary Dances, the Bronze Dances, the Pre-Silver Dances and a final section which emphasized trial judging and procedures for becoming a judge, judging standards and the duties of a judge-in-charge. An overhead projector was very useful to show dance diagrams and to discuss lobes and patterns.

We used four dance couples as demonstrators. In addition to skating the dances well, each couple was asked to skate a second time making errors which are most commonly seen in the dance. One member of the panel stayed on one side of the rink coaching the demonstrators on the errors each was to make, while the rest of the panel and the students were on the other side. Student judges were asked to pick out these errors. Then each dance was discussed by the faculty, and in some cases, Mrs. Bowen went on the ice to describe how a pro might teach a particular position or sequence.

There was short session on the use of stopwatches to time dances. Students were shown how to time a record, then listened to music and used the watches to decide whether the record was too fast, too slow or on time. The speeds were varied to make the demonstrations more interesting.

The final event was a mock competition in which the students separated to judge and score the couples. They then compared their judgements with the verdict of the panel, dance by dance, and discussed their decisions.

At the end of the sessions, each student received a certificate, and notification of his attendance was sent to his club and to the Sectional Vice Chairman for Dance Judges. Articles on ice dancing which have appeared in SKATING were made available to the students. They also were given a folder of other handouts, including an application to become a Bronze Dance Judge.

We need new judges and we need good ones. Schools of this type can insure that we get both.

The Executive Committee's Fall Report

Deliberations at the USFSA Executive Committee annual Fall Meeting, held in Chicago at the Ramada O'Hare Inn on October 8-10, 1976, centered on new horizons in cooperation with other organizations concerned with figure skating and proposed rule changes for the 1978-79 Rulebook.

In-depth discussions in many areas were held. Some decisions were made, and other proposals were referred to committees for reports at the May meeting.

Financial. The Executive Committee approved the following: (1) donation of one dollar from each registration fee to the USFSA Memorial Fund to be used for the Competitors Skating Education Program and investment purposes; (2) signing of a contract with Hamilton Projects, Inc., for commercial sponsorship. Appropriations were made for use of computers in qualifying competitions and for the Building Fund. An ad hoc committee was ap-

pointed to investigate the Building Fund's Central Office needs and cost of rental versus ownership, as well as locations for the Central Office, following a review of rising rent costs and the possible sale of the building in which the Central Office is now located. Members of this ad hoc committee appointed are: Joseph L. Serafine, Chairman, E. Newbold Black, IV, George T. Yonekura, Rolf E. Hessler, Albert L. Beard, Oscar T. lobst, Jr., Dr. Ronald F. Fry, Dr. Franklin S. Nelson, Benjamin T. Wright and Roy Winder, Secretary.

The Executive Committee approved the President's proposal in principle to include up to three PSGA representatives on the mailing list of each USFSA committee. The ballots of such PSGA members would be recorded and reported on an advisory basis. This would be a means of informing the PSGA, whose members are constantly on the skating scene, and giving them an opportunity to voice an opinion.

Considerable discussion was held on the proposed national sports governing body or "highest sports authority" now being considered by the President's Commission on Olympic Sports, reports of which are scheduled for mid-January. In line with preliminary discussion of the advent of this new body, the Executive Committee voted to recommend to the Governing Council that amendments to the By-Laws be adopted permitting non-amateur members of the USFSA to serve on USFSA Standing Committees.

By-Law changes approved were: an increase in dues from \$2.00 to \$3.00 per member and from \$25.00 to \$30.00 for individual members with the second individual member in the same family paying \$18.00 instead of \$15.00. Also approved was provision to allow skaters to accept merchandise orders for appearances in exhibitions and carnivals rather than restricting such gifts as is the case in the present rules.

Judges. The Executive Committee approved the list of judges pursuant to current rules together with the following new appointments: Mrs. Paul Hollos, New York, NY to National Judge; Alfred Beeler, Tacoma, WA, Comdr. Joseph T. Glab, Paramount, CA, George Ludlow, Jr., Kent, CT, Ronald T. Pfenning, Newport, NH, Mrs. Coco Gram Shean, New York, NY, Florence D. Sifferd, Washington, D.C., Nancy Steffen, Hampton Bays, NY and Mrs. Irmy Wieburg, Tacoma, WA, to Gold Test Judge; and Mrs. James Cunningham, Hudson, OH, and Mrs. Robert Head, Milwaukee, WI to Gold Dance Test Judge. The Committee also approved the following for recommendation to ISU appointment: Mrs. Claire W. Ferguson, Jamestown, RI, Janet G. Griffiths, St. Paul, MN, (subject to ISU reinstatement of amateur status) and Mrs. Ida S. Tateoka, Riverton, UT, as International Judges; Mrs. Margaret H. Freepartner, San Diego, CA, as International Dance Judge; and Mrs. Harry W. Meiss, Cincinnati, OH, as World Dance Judge.

Authorization was given for a judges school for the three new competitive dances, one for each section to be underwritten by the USFSA, and an ISU Judges Seminar next fall at Lake Placid.

Various By-Law changes in regard to appointment of judges, eligibility to judge in competitions, requirements to maintain appointments, home club designation, ratings and historical records of judges and trial judging records were adopted. The Executive Committee accepted the resignation of Mrs. Margaret Porter, Encino, CA, as a Gold Test Judge.

New Free Skating Structure. A new free skating tests structure independent of the current figure tests was adopted as proposed by the Singles and Pairs Committee. Details on the implementation of this structure will be developed by the appropriate committees for approval at the next Governing Council Meeting.

Tests. Approval was given to a standard method for the reskate of figures, a method of marking centers for the Preliminary Figure Test, and authorization to the Judge-in-Charge to refuse to give a test if ice conditions are unsuitable.

Competitions. Junior Singles and Junior Pairs Short Program proposals, along with guidelines for qualifying competitions in regard to public relations, standardized practice schedule and the posting of draws, skating order and results was also adopted.

Appointed as National Accountants were Patricia Soanes, Ottawa, Canada, and Janet Fry, Portland, OR. Appointed as Sectional Referee were Dr. Ronald Fry, Portland, OR, Joseph Driano, Bellevue, WA, Lou Bodek, Birmingham, MI, and George Ludlow, Jr., Kent, CT.

Executive Committee members heard an interesting discussion on the subject of sports medicine by Dr. Franklin S. Nelson, a member of the new ISU Medical Advisory Group, and Dr. Hugh Graham, Jr. Among the duties of the Medical Advisory Group are the revision of the "Doping Control List" and the preparation of menus for competitors.

Delegates appointed to the ISU Congress, in addition to ISU Representative John R. Shoemaker and ISU Technical Committee Member Benjamin T. Wright, were Dr. Franklin S. Nelson, Charles De-More and F. Ritter Shumway.

and a half after their accident just as if nothing had happened, have then cast a hurried look around the swift circle in which they have been performing, and coming to the conclusion that nobody was looking, have limped off to some secret island, and have been found there, hours afterward, sitting among the water-fowl and groaning in anguish.

The Fall facetious, though less than candid, is a more amiable view of our subject than that exhibited in the Tumble truculent. The Tumbler truculent is a man of a somewhat savage but a sincere and open character, who when he is in a rage and in considerable bodily discomfort, is at no pains to conceal the fact. It is his habit, as is the case with most dangerous characters, to dine early, and he has come out to skate immediately after his meal. Under these circumstances the shock of a severe fall is no doubt anything but conducive to digestion; yet is this no efficient defense of the fury with which the Tumbler truculent turns upon the small boy upon the bank and asks him what the devil he is laughing at? It must not be forgotten that (at least as far as the present writer's knowledge extends) the Tumble truculent has not arisen from any fault on the skater's part. He has been tripped up, or has stumbled over some defect in the ice; and the tripper-up, or the ice itself, as the ice; and the tripper-up, or the ice itself, as the

tain remarks which are the reverse of complimentary. It is a factual error to display emotion on the ice; and a man will meet with no sympathy who resents his fall as a deadly injury.

We have now got in our examination of the great subject to the eighth and last division of falls, and Crash unresisted remains alone for consideration. Perhaps, of all the orders of tumbling, there is none so opposed to this last upon the list as the Scramble ineffectual, Just as the skater in that instance declined to accept his doom, so in the case of the Crash unresisted. he takes the accident as it comes, makes no resistance, and only devotes the half instant between the flying of his legs into the air and the descent of his body upon the ice to a rapid act of self-preservation, in so ordering his fall that the fleshiest portions of his frame, and not the bony angles, shall sustain the full force of the impending crash. This is prefect wisdom; and, in carrying it out, he will find the advice of Sancho Panza, on the best means of enduring a blanket-tossing, of incalculable service. "If such mishaps do come," he says, "there is nothing to be done but to shrug up one's shoulders, hold one's breath, shut one's eyes, and let one's self go whither fortune and the blanket please to toss one."

SKATING hopes that this article will be of service to you in the future, if and when you happen to find yourself in such a tumble.


