CORRECTION

The December issue of SKATING incorrectly reported in "A Success Story" (page 20) that "no American ever succeeded another to a World title" referring to Linda Fratianne succeeding Dorothy Hamill. However, that is untrue; Carol Heiss succeeded Tenley Albright in 1956, while defeating her in the process. In addition, Hayes Jenkins succeeded Dick Button in 1953 and David Jenkins, in turn, succeeded Hayes in 1957. In fact, American men held the World Men's title for 12 consecutive years, 1948-1959. SKATING thanks USFSA Past President, and Museum and Hall of Fame Committee Chairman Benjamin T. Wright for setting the record straight.

ISU NOTES

Please note the following changes made by the ISU:

Junior and Senior Short Program:

Remarks on the "Cross foot spin", group 3 e)

1. The spin must be commenced spinning either forward or backwards from a one foot flat spin with the free foot being placed on the ice as soon as possible after a minimum number of rotations necessary on one foot.
2. The second foot can be crossed either in front or behind provided both skates are on the ice, toe to toe.
3. There must be a minimum of six rotations in the required position.
4. The number of concluding rotations is not limited.

ISU Regulations 1977

Following the decision of the Congress, Rule 326, paragraph 7 must be completed with the following sentence:

Somersault type jumps are forbidden and must be penalized by the judges.

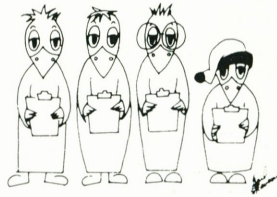
Announcement of International Competitions 1977/78.

A) March 25-26, 1978—Italy—Merano Spring Trophy.

Great Britain: Ten years ago, compulsory figures were worth 60% of the marks awarded in a competition. As the ISU progressively reduced their value—to 50% in 1968, 40% in 1972 and then to a mere 30% in 1975—it seemed that figures were no longer likely to exert a decisive influence on the outcome of an event. But the 1977 Richmond Trophy (November 6-7, London, England) showed that figures are still of great importance because this event was won and lost in the figures.

Priscilla Hill, the 16-year-old Eastern Ladies Champion from Lexington, Massachusetts, was fifth in the short program and second in the free skating, but she established such a strong position in figures that no one was able to overtake her. Thus she became the third American

winner of this coveted Trophy since it began 28 years ago. The other U.S. winners were Dorothy Hamill, 1972, and last year Barbie Smith won the trophy.

Priscilla Hill originally trained with Tommy Litz, who in his competitive days was the best free skater in the 1964 Worlds, but she is now working with Carlo Fassi and her victory reflects credit on both trainers.

Priscilla's neat style and geometrically well placed tracings made her the clear winner of the RFO Counter and LFO Paragraph Brackets. She easily won the figures event. The other American in the event, Jeanne Chapman—skating in her first international competition—finished fourth after the figures.

However, the remainder of the competition was dominated by 15-year-old Denise Biellman from Switzerland, who finished seventh after the figures. Her triple toe loop/double toe loop combination and imaginative spins were unrivalled and brought her marks of 5.7 and 5.8.

Priscilla's combination was a triple Salchow/double toe loop and she did it beautifully, however, she had previously fallen on a high double Axel. She received, interestingly, a 5.8 from the Swiss judge for presentation. Jeanne's program was notable for its good footwork.

The final free skating presented an interesting situation. On the combined figure-plus-short results, Priscilla was first, followed by skaters from Finland, Canada and Switzerland, in that order. Denise Biellman is known as a formidable free skater but the outcome was not entirely up to her because she had finished so poorly in the figures. The other girls would have had to skate terribly in order for her to win.

Because of the closeness of the competition, the free skating was a great strain to most of the competitors. In fact, it was a tense and somewhat colorless evening. The only lighthearted moment came when the youngest competitor, 13-year-old Yoko Yakushi from Japan, hurtled across the ice so fast that she almost crashed into the astonished panel of judges sitting at the edge of the rink.

The rink was tense because the skaters knew they had to do all their triple jumps in order to win medals and this plainly inhibited them—especially if they failed on a jump. Priscilla Hill, delightful to watch because of her balletic style, over-rotated her triple Salchow, making her ill at ease for the rest of her program and she left out her planned triple toe loop.

Jeanne, a pupil of that highly original free skater Jennie Walsh, tried everything she knew, but her first triple toe loop was faulty, and she fell trying another. Karena Richardson of Great

Britain, and Kristina Wegelius of Finland decided not to risk triples and their marks reflected it.

Denise Biellman skated last and by that time realized she could not win but she wanted a medal anyway. Hers seemed the only performance giving life to the evening. She tried the series she made famous in 1976—double Axel/half loop/triple Salchow. At the last moment she made the triple Salchow a double. She put her foot down on a triple Lutz and later fell on a triple Salchow. Despite the slight mishaps her performance brought her marks of 5.7 and 5.8 and third overall.

Kristina Wegelius of Finland finished second and Jeanne Chapman ended up seventh.

British Ice Dance Championships—Warren Maxwell and Janet Thompson, runners-up at the Tokyo World Championships in March, comfortably retained their British Ice Dance title at Nottingham Ice Stadium on November 19, 1977, fending off a keen challenge from Kenneth Foster and Kay Barsdell, who are currently rated sixth in the world. It was the 35th Championship, held for the 28th successive time at Nottingham.

The two outstanding couples displayed qualities befitting their reputations. The difference between them was apparent, but this handsome victory should not belittle the likeli-

hood that the first four couples would have impressed the best international company.

The third placed Christopher Dean and Jayne Torvill, rising proteges of Janet Sawbridge, surely merited national team selection with those above them.

The new team of Nicholas Slater and Karen Barber, fourth, looked as though they had been partners for years. The nine judges were unanimous in the order each placed the top four couples, a rare occurrence at this level.

Heartening was the distinct progress shown by the champions, even since their convincing Skate Canada victory only three weeks earlier.

After steadily building a lead in each of the three compulsory dances (Starlight Waltz, Kilian and the relatively new Tango Romantica) Maxwell and Thompson excelled in the set pattern dance to Paso Doble rhythm, quickly conjuring a Spanish bullring atmosphere with clever musical interpretation.

Even better was to follow in their free dance finale, a superb rendition of lively, often exciting originality, featuring skillful timing with slick changes of tempo.

Demonstrating a masterly mutual understanding, their smooth-flowing elegance inspired a maximum 6.0 mark from Mollie Phillips, the judge with the longest international experience.


In such an aura, it did credit to Foster and Barsdell that they, too, commanded high respect for creativity and expressive movements which so correctly captured each change of mood.

A significant emphasis of a national resurgence in depth was the fact that last of the ten couples were Mark Reed and Wendy Sessions from Birmingham, the ISU International Junior Champions last March at Megeve, France. Obviously bright prospects, they need time to settle in the senior ranks, as do the two new-look teams of Slater with Barber and seventh placed Kim Spreyer with Kathryn Winter.

Slater, third in this event last winter with Miss Winter, and Preyer, ISU Junior International runner-up with Miss Barber, have swapped partners during the off season. Confusing, of course, but the switch has produced two new duos which, given more time together, clearly have high potential.

All of this could mean, from a hopeful, long-term British viewpoint, that the days of Soviet dominance are numbered. Britons have won 13 of the 25 World Ice Dance Championships.

SOUTH AFRICAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

Improved standards in all divisions was the impression from the 1977 South African Senior Figure Skating Championships in Johannesburg from October 2 to 4. The most notable improvement came from students of Raymond Wilson, in ice dancing.

His four couples from Capetown were the only competitors entered in the Junior and Senior dance sections, both of which included compulsory dances, an OSP and a free dance program for the first time.

While the standard of most performances (except in figures) showed improvement, the relatively few entries in the event's ten divisions indicated the shallow depth that still exists in many centers of the country.

The fourth attempt by Natal's Jeremy Dawson to capture the Senior Men's title was crowned with success, after leading in figures and putting in sure compulsory and free style performances. In 1974 and 1975, Jeremy placed second in this division, and in 1976 he was edged to third place by Lenel van den Berg from Port Elizabeth who placed second again this year. The 1976 Junior Men's Champion, Garry Braid was the only other competitor.

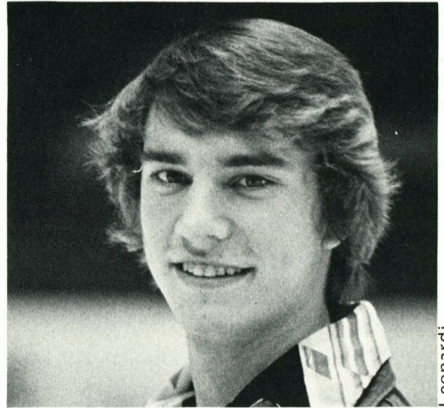
The Senior Ladies event was a repetition of last year's contest with Lynne Rayner (Natal) confidently winning the title for a third consecutive year. There was a struggle for second place between Tammy Granfell and Irene Anderson and Tammy edged out Irene. These two were in the same position last year but Irene defeated Tammy in 1976.

The Senior Pairs title was contested by only two pairs, Gavin McPherson and Helga Balk (Western Province) who defeated Gary Culverwell and Tracey Egan (Natal). McPherson's and Balk's free program was a highlight of the final night's program, reflecting the experience they gained by participating in the ISU Junior Championships in Megeve and the St. Gervais and Oberstdorf international competitions.

Gavin McPherson, this time coupled with Carol Brown, were the only entrants in the Senior Dance event and they had no difficulty in surpassing the minimum standard required to be awarded the title.

To add extra sparkle to the Championships, South Africa was privileged to have British dancers Kay Barsdell and Ken Foster present exhibitions during the Championships. They were inspiring to watch and provided skaters and spectators alike with that championship style that always generates enthusiasm for skating.

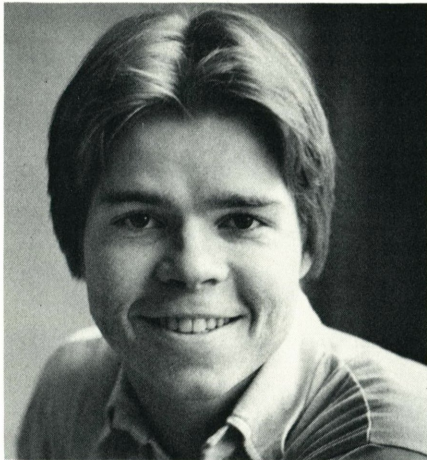

Book Review

The Technique of Skating by Otto Hügin and Jack Gerschwiler.

At long last Jack Gerschwiler's system of figure skating has appeared in print. In spite of his success in teaching that spans four decades, (which at one period in skating circles bore the flattering trade-mark "Well, Gersch says. . .") he was never interested in putting his theories in book form.

We are indebted to Otto Hügin, President of the Swiss Association of Skating Instructors for assembling Mr. Gerschwiler's theories on figure skating. It is a translation of the original German edition published in Switzerland. A French printing is scheduled for 1978 and a Russian edition will be out in 1979.

Jack Gerschwiler demonstrated his skating principles with pure and simple logic, bewitching pupils, teachers and judges alike. Readers will find the same magic in his analysis of the school figures, the branch in which Gerschwiler is described as "the father of modern school figure skating".

Mr. Gerschwiler began studying skating in the days of Sonja Henie when *figuring* was supreme with a medley of ostentatious styles—the Viennese fling, the Swiss knee, the Trop-pauer lean were among those in special favor on the Continent (Europe). When he arrived in England in the early 1930's he beheld the ramrod English style with a mixture of stupor and wonder. These stiff, ungainly skaters were unique for they executed the most intricate turns without any body tremble. "Gersch" began to dream, and that reverie after more than forty years experience and success in the championship arena is set down in his book. The revolutionary element here is that all movements of the torso are executed and controlled by the four thigh muscles (quadriceps) so the skater maintains a straight body and uses the arms. So, the turn is made not with the shoulders, but with the hip muscles only, eliminating all unnecessary movement.

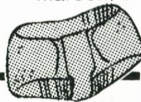
Mr. Gerschwiler does not deal with all 41 ISU figures because the book is in no way meant to replace the instructor. The object is to help skaters improve their understanding of skating techniques and to provide opportunity and encouragement for the theoretical study of skating. It is confined to a profound study of the basic figures, i.e. the Curve Eights, Changes of Edge, Threes and Double Threes. An exception was made to examine the Forward Loop which, the author justly claims, "has a special fascination for all skaters".

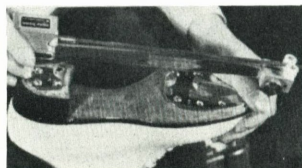

The numerous technical illustrations are outstanding for their clarity and a quick glance is usually sufficient to obtain complete comprehension.

The free skating section is limited to a description of jumps to one full turn, some classic spins, spirals, pivots and spread-eagles and some simple step combinations.

There is a chapter by Karl Enderlin, President of the ISU Technical Committee on judging figure skating and a competent section on ice dancing by Harry Monas.

Preceding the technical chapters is a brief introduction into the development of skating and here occur a few historical inaccuracies, the only blur in a work that is a contribution of value to the art of figure skating and a useful textbook for the skater and teacher.

OFF THE ICE AT LAKE PLACID

A skater's training does not always include skates or skating. A large part of proper conditioning and overall training is accomplished off-the-ice. And that is just what many skaters learned and practiced at the North American Training Camp held last summer at Lake Placid, New York.

Skaters from across the country attended the Olympic-type training camp learning and experiencing all aspects of skating from teams of experts.

The training programs included a wide variety of topics and activities. Each of which was designed for the skaters' benefit. Part of the training took place as discussions and seminars from skating fundamentals to proper attitudes toward competition.

Classes were held in ballet and ballroom dancing. These helped the skaters with certain moves and even changed how many skaters had been approaching and performing some moves.

Part of everyone's training was jogging. As shown here, the area is ideally suited for conditioning and for the serious business of skating. Beautiful Mirror Lake, nestled in New York's Adirondack Mts.

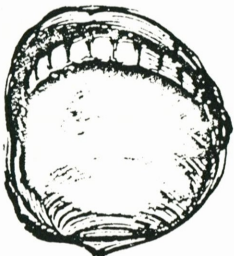
provided the background as the skaters jogged and jogged.

There were also programs dealing with the importance of physical fitness. After certain prescribed exercises, the skaters would be measured in various ways to test their performance level and any difference before and after the exercises. The example shown here is on "stretch jumping" from a standing still position. The skater would be tested before and after the exercises and any performance difference would be recorded.

In addition to the jogging, jumping rope was an exercise used to build stamina and physical fitness. All of these activities were in addition to the training that took place on the ice leaving almost enough time to eat and sleep. But, the skaters and staff all came away from the sessions knowing more and benefitting not only themselves but all of skating.

Learning Steps

By Dr. Marvin I. Clein and Teri Klindworth

The identification of qualified and able figure skating teachers is one of the most important of all concerns among those interested in the advancement of figure skating in America. Yet, evaluating the methods and procedures of teaching at any level usually lacks a certain degree of objectivity.

Figure skaters, who tend to discuss their teaching pros, sort out those they label as "good" teachers with a number of personality related traits. For example, the "good" skating pro is often described as one who is "expert" in developing an understanding of skating skills. And, is one who is able to stimulate the skater's desire to learn. This teaching pro is most often patient and understanding and displays genuine feelings for all his students.

Such descriptive phrases are difficult to quantify, that is difficult to measure. In fact, there is relatively little reliable information available regarding the characteristics of the teaching process.

In the summer of 1965 preliminary investigation began at the University of Illinois toward developing a system that would serve as a guide for the teaching of motor skills. This investigation focused its attention on the learner as the key to the teaching process. Since that time, project research consultants William J. Stone and Marvin I. Clein have published materials relative to the University of Illinois study that has important implications for the figure skating teacher. Specifically, this study lists a step by step progression of how individuals learn motor skills which provides: a) a guideline for the skating teacher to follow, and b) a means of evaluating the teaching progression of the teaching pro.

The Teaching Progression

The major organizational principle of the following step by step teaching progression is that of moving from the lowest

to the highest order of complexity in terms of that which is required to learn a motor skill. For the sake of illustration, a skater learning to perform a jump is described, although it is applicable to all skating skills. The figure skating teacher simply follows the order of progression to the appropriate level. Below is the progression:

1-Perception—This is the process of becoming aware and attaching meaning to the skill to be learned. It is interpretation, and the first link in the chain leading to learning the jump.

1.1-Sensory stimulation—This is the impingement of stimulus upon one or more of the sensory organs. The varieties of sensory stimulation are not listed in any particular order of importance. Examples are given only for those which are associated with the motor skill of a figure skating jump.

1.11-Auditory—Stimulation occurring through the sense organs of hearing. The student listens to the instructor explain how to perform the jump.

1.12-Visual—Images obtained through the eyes. The student observes a demonstration of the jump, either by live performance, motion pictures or still pictures. Vision is the dominant sensory apparatus for many individuals.

1.13-Tactile—Stimulation pertaining to the sense of touch. The student is encouraged to hold the position prior to the jump and feel the ice's texture.

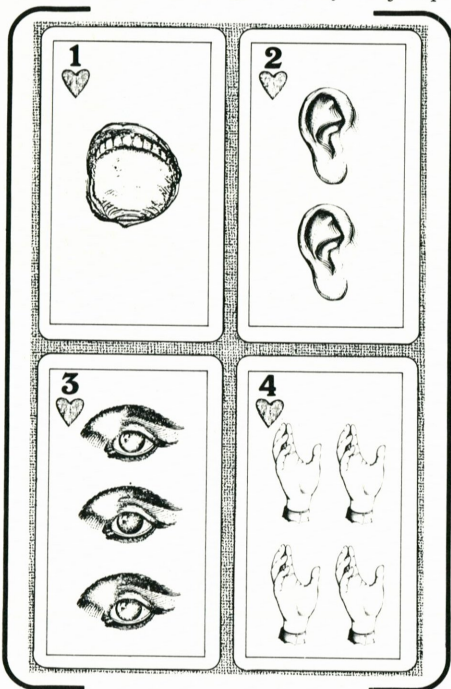
1.14-Kinesthetic—Sensations arising in a variety of receptors located in the joints, muscles and tendons. The learner gets the feel of the preparation into the jump and the feel of leaving the ice surface.

1.2-Cue selection—The process of selecting the appropriate cues to which one must respond in order to complete

the task. The skater must sort out the distracting cues and surroundings and concentrate directly on body position and position on the ice.

1.3—*Translation*—The process of relating perception to action both during and after performing a motor act. The skater is mentally relating his movement to results and is aided in this process by feedback, especially visual and kinesthetic feedback.

2—*Set*—The preparatory stage or readiness to respond. This stage is best illustrated by the skater as he gets ready to jump.



2.1—*Mental set*—The mental readiness to perform the task, thus mentally concentrating on the task of jumping.

2.2—*Physical set*—Physically ready to perform the task by assuming the optimal posture or body position. The skater concentrates on his body position and speed prior to the jump.

2.3—*Emotional set*—A favorable commitment toward performance, hence the skater has a desire to jump skillfully.

3—*Guided Response*—The initial response in the development of a skill and is illustrated as the skater actually tries the jump

for the first time. The skater may or may not receive manual guidance from the instructor.

3.1—*Imitation*—Performing an act as a direct response to the perception of another person performing it. The skater jumps as he perceives the way in which the instructor demonstrated.

3.2—*Trial and error*—The skater responds in various ways, gradually refining his performance until the appropriate response is achieved. The skater eliminates extraneous movements and rejects inadequate responses until he can perform the jump.

4—*Mechanism*—The learned response has become habitual and the performer can now land the jump consistently with confidence and some degree of skill. This stage assumes more complexity than the previous level and may include performing the jump for an audience.

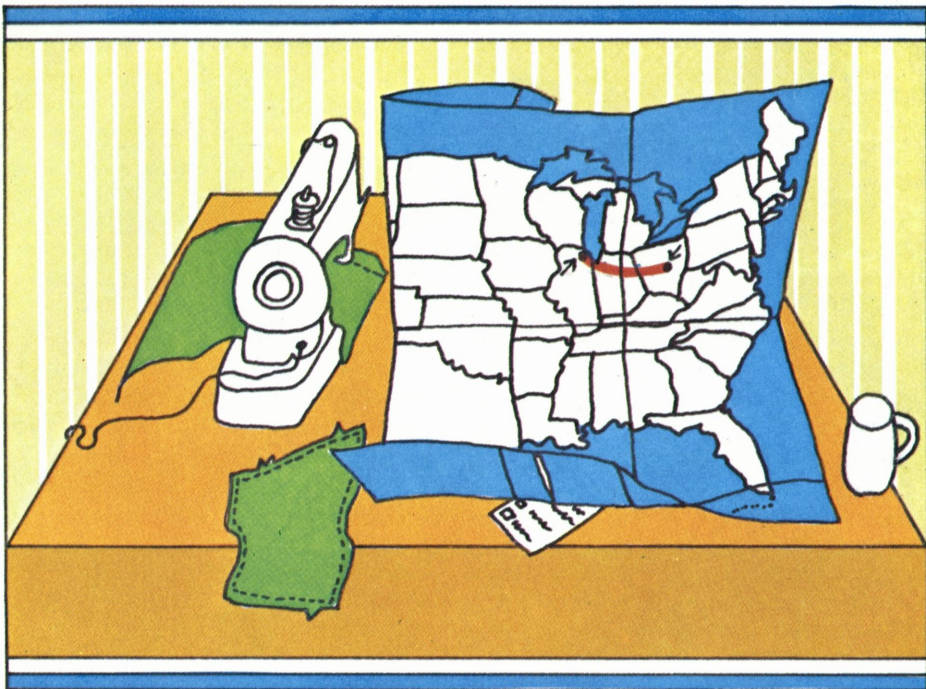
5—*Complex Overt Response*—At this level the skater can accomplish a complex motor skill with a high degree of skill (i.e., smoothly and efficiently). The skilled skater in competition presents the best example.

5.1—*Resolution of uncertainty*—the task can be accomplished without resorting to a prior mental picture of the task sequence, hence the skater can step onto the ice and perform the jump without the necessity of having a mental image of the process.

5.2—*Automatic performance*—The skater can perform a finely coordinated motor skill with a great deal of ease and muscle control. The skater can now execute the jump with ease under far more complex conditions, such as a varied speed, with a variation in the approach steps or a change in the landing position.

Dr. Marvin I. Clein is Chairman of the Department of Physical Education and Sport Sciences at the University of Denver. Teri Klindworth, a National Senior Ladies competitor in 1975 and 1976, is now studying with Dr. Clein, majoring in Sports Sciences at the University of Denver and teaching at the Colorado Ice Arena.

And that's only part of the bills. How about the new skating dress, the extra ice-time and lessons and the new music? Come to think of it, how about the old skating dresses, the normal ice-time, the regular lessons, the old music, the skates and equipment?

Forget what I'm doing in Columbus. What was I doing spending five hours in the A/V studio dubbing a tape? What was

I doing clearing the table and cleaning the kitchen while my wife spent three nights a week making a special competition dress? Why couldn't my 13-year-old daughter help with the dishes?

My confusion has hit new highs (or is it lows) and shows no sign of stopping. I wish that Chairman was here now. Maybe she could tell me what I am doing here in Columbus, Ohio.

There is little chance that my daughter will place well in this competition. That's not sour grapes. She just does not yet have the stamina. As an asthmatic, she does not have the power needed for some of the movements and jumps. The skating seems to help. In any case, it is the only strenuous physical activity she is capable of without constant asthmatic attacks. The exercise is helping her growth and general development but she just doesn't yet have the strength.

So what am I doing here in Columbus, Ohio? Why am I so nervous and tense as the last few seconds tick away before she comes onto the ice? Why does my stomach jump when her name is announced and again as her music starts?

I hope she doesn't forget her program and embarrass herself. God forbid that she falls and gets hurt.

Please audience, she's just a little girl, please like her and her personality and her program. She's doing her very best to please you.

What if she finishes and nobody applauds? My stomach turns. She's halfway through her program now. The minute seems like twenty. I'm grinning like a funhouse clown, just in case she should see me in the audience and need encouragement. This is worse than watching a figures test. I think I am going to be sick. Why am I here?

Then it's over. The applause is polite, but warm. I take my first breath in two minutes, the oxygen goes to my head, my eyes blur. I can't see her face as she skates

off but I hope she is smiling. I hope she is happy with herself.

I do hope she is happy. A large part of her young life went into those two minutes. I know what it cost in dollars, but I could not compute what it cost in effort.

Now, in the dressing area, she is smiling, her eyes as bright as the rhinestones on her sleeve. I'm still grinning, but now it is a proud father grin. I doubt if it differs from a funhouse clown grin but it feels different.

"You were super, Dolly, just super!" I tell her. "Wherever you place, you did very well." We both know what I mean by that. We will both be excited when we find she placed in the middle of her division. "You really looked good." And she looks good now with her shiney eyes and pink cheeks lighting up her face. "Wasn't she good?" I say to mother.

Well she was good, very good. She was graceful and elegant. I was proud she was my daughter. She looked so pretty and feminine—not girly-girly feminine but healthy, athletic, self-confident feminine; attractive, able-to-survive, hard working feminine; natural, pretty-without-makeup feminine.

She is healthier and stronger now than eighteen months ago. Her school grades have improved. She is up early and to bed early. She has a better appetite.

Her skating friends have the same outlook and routine. Her relationships with skaters both younger and older, child and adult, have a common foundation.

"I'm really proud of you. So is your mum and your sister. I wouldn't have missed it for anything."

And, I would not have missed it for anything. I'm not sure why it all happens, and I still ask why I am in Columbus, but I am glad to be here.

I wonder if I can get away for a few days later this year. I understand there is a competition in Houston, Texas.

Two To Tango

"Ice dancing is the most restricted form of ice skating but because we are confined to so little athleticism we do more with the music," according to Andrew Stroukoff, who, partnered with Susan Kelley, were Silver Medalists in last year's U.S. Dance Championships.

He said, "Dancing is the most restricted yet the most free form of skating." Because the dancers must use the music to its extreme creative limits, the programs are the freest in all of skating.

Andy said, "We skaters are only scratching the surface of what can be done with skating." The creative possibilities, he said, are just beginning to be realized. First, however, the skaters are expressing, through their programs, what is inside of them. Andy and Susie said they have become more conscious of their skating through creative and expressive awareness techniques shown to them by Ricky Harris and Bobby Thompson.

Susie said that skating what is inside of you is part of the art of skating. Susie, 22 years old from Needham, Massachusetts, first started ice dancing after an accident that occurred when she was 10 years old, on Mother's Day, at the rink that resulted in her left leg being broken. She was on the ice five months later and discovered she could no longer land jumps and do certain spins on her left leg.

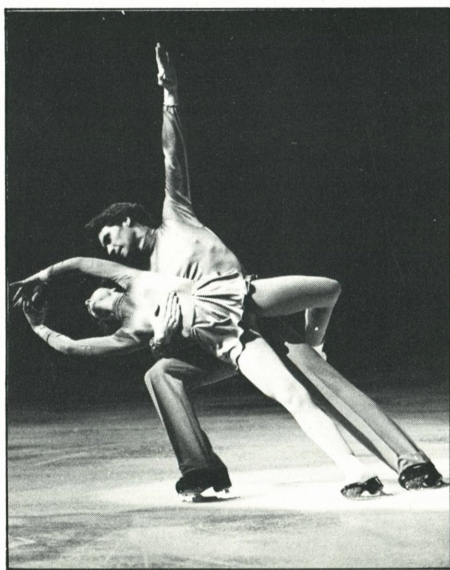
To keep skating she turned to ice dancing and partnered with her brother, Rohn. However, Susie became too tall for Rohn and, she said, "We couldn't skate, but we were cute." She soon after began skating with Andy. Now, seven years later, they are still skating together with as much enthusiasm as ever. And, Andy said that enthusiasm is the stuff that keeps them skating.

Andy, 27 years old from Claymont, Delaware, began skating when he was 14 years old because, he said, "when you dance you get to hold a girl's hand."

Their training and their coach, Ron Ludington, play an important role in their skating, of course. They are training in Wilmington, Delaware, and Susie said, "I really like where I'm skating." Andy

added that "the environment [in Wilmington with Ludington] is so conducive to training." This is partly because of the presence of good skating, coaching and facilities. Andy said that skating centers like Wilmington, Colorado Springs, Denver and Los Angeles encourage skaters' performances and in the long run benefit all of skating.

One training technique they find particularly helpful is what Ludington calls "totaling the programs". Andy explained that each practice session finishes with a complete run-through of all they have been working on, so, if anything should happen during a performance they will



not lose their place in the program.

Andy has also worked with Dr. Maurie Pressman, Chairman of the Division of Psychiatry at the Albert Einstein Medical Center in Philadelphia. Andy said he sometimes worked himself into a rage while skating and Dr. Pressman, he said, "showed me how I was not helping our skating." Dr. Pressman evened out his temperament, he said.

Andy noted some differences between singles and pairs skating and ice dancing. He said that in singles and pairs the skaters' moves are compared and evaluated by the judges, and a skater who falls doing an Axel will be marked accordingly. But,

COACH OF CHAMPIONS

A Close Look At Ron Ludington

Ron Ludington, coach and former U.S. Pairs Champion said, "Skating is a means of conveying a message to an audience." The skater, he said, tries to paint a picture of his feelings through the program he presents.

This basic idea of skating is prevalent in all of his students, be they singles skaters, pair or dance teams. Ron Ludington developed this idea through years of experience; his experience being U.S. Pair Champion, with Nancy Ludington, from 1957 to 1960, while also National Silver Dance Champion in 1958 and Bronze Medalist in the Pairs event of the 1960 Olympic Games in Squaw Valley.

Mr. Ludington was a roller skater before turning to the ice. When he was 19 years old he went to an ice rink to watch

a friend skate and was so impressed that he has been ice skating ever since.

Mr. Ludington said Maribel Vinson had the biggest influence on his skating and his competitive career. It was Maribel Vinson who took his roller skating technique and molded it into ice skating. "She taught me how to train," he said. "I attribute much of my success to her guidance. She also taught me the value of an education." He credited Cecilia College for sparking his deep and lasting affection for ice dancing. She was his ice dancing coach.

It has been almost 18 years since Ron and Nancy Ludington won their last pairs title in 1960. During that time, however, skating has changed. The lifts and throws in pair skating are now certainly more difficult than in 1960, he said. "Ice dancing," he added, "is now more intricate

and more sophisticated in regards to understanding and expressing the music.”

“But, David Jenkins could hold his own today,” he said. “In 1958 he [Jenkins] was doing triple jumps and had a triple flip in his program.” He said the depth of singles skating has increased, especially in ladies’ singles, but still has not yet changed as much as pair skating or dancing.

Much of the change in pairs is due to new and different moves. And, Mr. Ludington invented some of those very same moves. He invented the throw Axel (known by quite a different name at first), the split double twist and the one hand overhead. The throw Axel was created in only two lessons. It was conceived during a lesson with Cynthia and Ron Kaufman and matured right after in a lesson with Patti Gustafson and Pieter Kollen.

The throw Axel was first performed by the Kaufman’s in the World Championships and it, Mr. Ludington said, “brought down the house.” They went on to introduce the split double twist and the one hand overhead.

One of Mr. Ludington’s greatest satisfactions in teaching is “working with kids and seeing the results—the expressions on their faces.” But on the other hand, the frustrations are the hours necessary for his teaching. He makes his schedule to fit the students’ availability and that means teaching at night, all hours of the night.

But teaching at night has its advantage because, he said, “I know I’m keeping the kids out of trouble.”

A good coach, according to Mr. Ludington, is a strict coach. “If a coach isn’t disciplined then the students won’t be disciplined.” A good teacher, he said, is a positive teacher. He “criticizes but also offers hope,” he said.

Mr. Ludington uses the group method for much of his teaching. He said the “group breaks down the barriers”. The group is a give and take of skating ideas between the skaters themselves. Each couple, pair team or singles skater receives the same number of lessons and the time of each lesson is changed every week

so there are no favorites, no rivalries thus leading to few resentments and little jealousy among “Luddy’s Army”, as his students often call themselves. Each of his students knows he is no better, according to Mr. Ludington, than any other student—they are all equal.

The students (among them dancers Susan Kelley and Andrew Stroukoff) respect Mr. Ludington for his fairness and in turn he respects their ideas and candor.

Mr. Ludington said the qualities of desire and determination are essential for top-notch skaters. Not every skater will be a champion, he said, but as long as a skater enjoys skating and is doing his best he deserves continued coaching and training.



He said, “Champions are not always the best skaters but often the hardest workers.” The most important factor in training is, he said, “man hours.” Nothing comes easy in ice skating.

But when those “man hours” are over and Mr. Ludington needs to relax, he seeks out his 28-foot fishing boat and escapes for a weekend and leaves his students in the competent hands of his assistant, Christine Linney. Or he may find his way to a golf course where he shoots with a six-handicap.

Is the word skate an “etymological anomaly”? So Grandpa says [SKATING, April, 1977, p. 50.] but is he right?

Just what is an “etymological anomaly” anyway? An anomaly is something that is out of place, out of an expected position; it’s irregular or inconsistent. And etymology is the study of a word and its history, its roots so to speak.

Actually there is nothing irregular or inconsistent about the history of the word *skate* in the English language.

The noun *skate* is a loan-word from Dutch. It derived from the Dutch forms *schaats*, *schaetse*, the plural of the former being *schaatsen*. Because in English the plural is regularly formed by adding the suffix *-s*, the *s* on the end of the singular Dutch noun *schaats* was erroneously thought to be a plural ending and was dropped. So, today, we speak of *one skate*, *two skates*, instead of *one skates*, *two skatees*. This has been the case for the entire history of the word, with only one exception: in 1688, a W. Carr referred to “The nimble Dutchmen on their Scatses.”

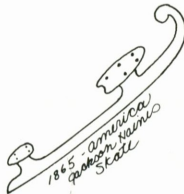
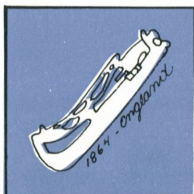
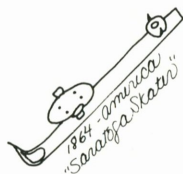
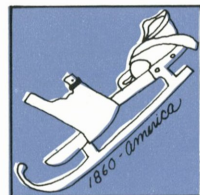
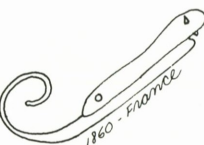
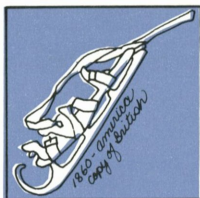
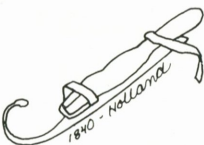
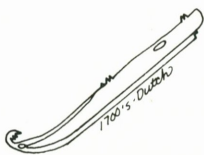
It is interesting to note that the Dutch *schaats* did not originally mean what we now think of as a skate at all. *Schaats* was the Dutch word for “stilt” and scholars are still not sure how the shift in meaning from “stilt” to “skate” came about in the Dutch language. It is not hard to see a connection between the two meanings, however. The earliest skates consisted only of crude blades attached to shoes with leather straps. Like stilts that consist of a footrest attached

to a pole, skates elevate their wearer above the ground—or ice—level. Only the poles are missing.

Skating first became popular in England in the seventeenth century, and some of the early references to the sport are both informative and entertaining. Samuel Pepys, in his *Diary*, recorded on December 1, 1662, that he had been “Over the Parke, (where I first in my life. . . did see people sliding with their skatees, which is a very pretty art).”



On January 31, 1711, Jonathan Swift entered in his *Journal to Stella*: "Rosamond's Pond full of the rabble sliding, and with Skates, if you know what those are."

As early as 1806, James Beresford, in *The Miseries of Human Life*, bemoaned "learning to cut the outside edge, on skaites that have no edge to cut with."

The verb *skate* derived from the noun, and commonly refers to the act of gliding "over ice upon skates." On November 30, 1696 Samuel Sewall used the word in this way by recording in his *Diary*: "Many Scholars go in the Afternoon to Scate on Freshpond"; and in a letter to Henry Wadsworth Longfellow dated December 24, 1842, Nathaniel Hawthorne wrote: "If you like skating, there is enough of it on the river. I get up at sunrise to skate!"

Used as a verb, *skate* has several meanings, all of which are variations of the definition above. Ralph Waldo Emerson used the word figuratively in his essay "Experience" (1844) by commenting: "We live amid surfaces, and the true art of life is to skate well on them."

The verb became sufficiently generalized so that it could also be used to indicate any act of gliding or sliding, or of moving "lightly and rapidly." Thus, Emerson wrote in *Poems* (1847): "The train along the railroad skates."

One of the first uses of the expression "to skate on thin ice" is recorded in the *Church Times* for September 17, 1897, where a certain Cardinal Vaughan is said to be "an adept at skating over thin ice. In his address. . .

there were many points which every one knows were weak, but he glided over them with surprising deftness."

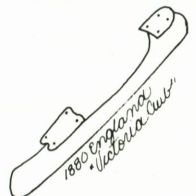
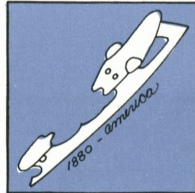
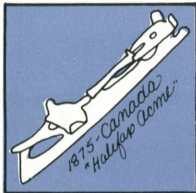
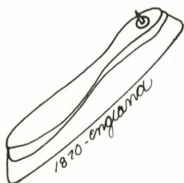
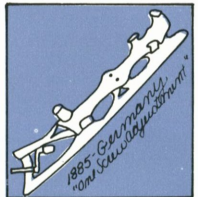
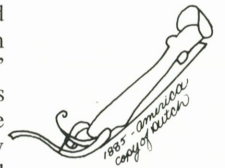
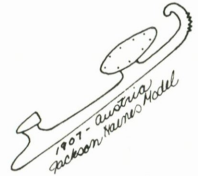
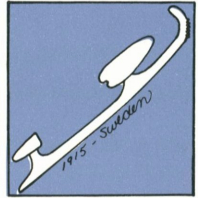
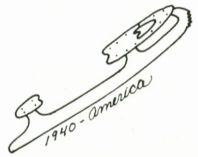
Skate was also used in a more specialized way to refer to the act of knocking someone down while skating. This is what Mme. D'Arblay had in mind when she wrote in her *Diary* in April 1788: "To skate a man down is a very favourite diversion among a certain race of wags."

Among the words derived from the verb *skate* are *skateable* and *skatist*. The adjective *skateable* can be used to mean "fit for skating upon," as in: "The river Cam is covered with thick ice, and is skateable from the university town to some distance below Ely". (Daily News, 23 Dec. 1890). It can also mean "capable of being skated," as in reference to a figure, turn or other skating maneuver; for example, "I have a design for a cross-cut in which the lines are crossed five times; it is quite 'skateable'" (*Field*, 7 Mar. 1891). The term *skatist*, no longer in common usage, identifies "one who is fond of skating."

In 1876, in *All Year Round* (XVI.18), it was noted that "Even in Chicago. . . persistent and fanatical 'skatists'. . . have shown a decided preference for rollers."

So you see Grandpa, there is nothing anomalous about the history of *skate*. Etymologically speaking, it is a perfectly good loan-word. And those of us who figure skate should be aware of our debt to the Dutch, not only for the sport, but for the very term by which we identify it.

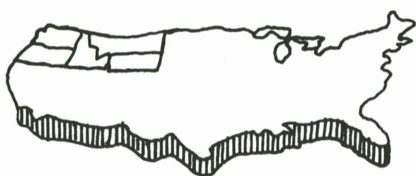

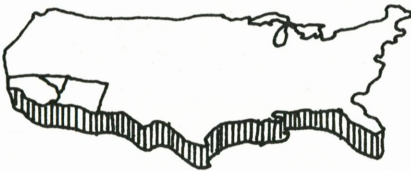

The results of the Regional Championships were computed with equipment provided with the courtesy of **Honeywell Information System, Inc.** The terminal, that looks like a typewriter keyboard, is used with the accountants as they record the judges' marks during the competition. It is placed with the accountants on the ice level. As the judges' marks are recorded they are also fed into the computer. With the terminal at the rink, placements, standings and other important data is available at the touch of a button. The results listed below include interim standings; for the Senior and Junior Men's and Ladies' events, placements given from left to right after the final ranking are for compulsory figures, short program only and free skating only. With the exception of Junior and Novice Pairs, all other events list interim placements for compulsory elements (figures, pairs' short program or dances) and free skating (free dance for Gold Dance, OSP for Silver Dance).

Skate/Canada '77

At national and world competitions skaters and coaches have honed technique to a fine edge. The pattern of build-up to the competitive apex in February and March is well established and built right into the structure of figure skating. Consequently, competitions such as SKATE CANADA catch international skaters in the middle of their yearly training. Technique often appears tattered; jumps and spins less consistent.

Such a situation forces the focus to choreography, musicality and individual expression. Unfortunately, at this year's SKATE CANADA in Moncton, New Brunswick, no excitement could be found in these artistic aspects of figure skating.

Ladies figure skating, which has been at a dull plateau since the retirement of Janet Lynn, provided cases in point at this competition. The top three ladies all chose music from Rimsky-Korsakov's *Sheherazade* for their long programs. One could evaluate the women in terms of technique quite easily, and, that is how the astute Linda Fratianne emerged as the champion. (Who can question that she is a jumping wonder?) But, in the area of "artistic impression" there were no distinctions save perhaps for the near incidental allusion to exoticism by Fratianne's costume.

That the ladies skated to the same piece of music was not objectionable—that they all displayed an equal lack of insight into this musical Arabian fantasy was. Any other sound in 4/4 or 3/4 time could have been spilling forth and it would have been as appropriate as *Sheherazade*.

I am not entirely sure how the artistic aspects of women's figure skating have reached the sorry state they are in. The emphasis on the triple jump and technical accomplishment is only a portion of the problem. Uninformed coaching and judging are additional significant factors. The current system selects the fabulous technicians and, for the sake of making objective decisions, the individual and the personality are sacrificed.

In Canada the situation is perpetuated by poor television announcing. The announcers are essentially sports people who are neither versed in the arts nor able to grasp the history of figure skating. They lack perspective on this movement which embodies both art and sport. To inform is their function and they do it poorly. An exact example rears up every time one of the men skaters appears to move into a posi-

tion which might be called innovative. It is immediately labelled as a "Tollerism" or "Currenque" or whatever. Skating would be in a sorry state if the only awareness of style has to be pinned to these two unique innovators.

As to individual expression, the men still give hope. The Japanese, Mitsuru Matsumura, has a flying energy that makes him exciting and he conjured up drama with a near triple Axel. His wildman style however was practically neutralized by a choice of guess what?—*Sheherazade*. One could never say that Charlie Tickner's efforts were not sincere and Robin Cousins has a big open way of moving and a clean sense of line even though the gamboling piece of music that centered his long program tended to trivialize these qualities.

In the last decade ice dancing has proven to be the most innovative aspect of figure skating. The effects of the exquisite Irina Moiseeva was seen everywhere at SKATE CANADA. Many of the dance couples were taking the tragic sculptural poses that the Soviet champions made credible in the free dance last year plus the ladies were adopting arm movements that darted in straight lines every which way—a mannerism also characteristic of Moiseeva. This great dancer puts purpose behind her actions—the others rarely do and consequently where her and her partner can allude to a great romance the others only seem like a plot from a Harlequin paperback.

Once a particularly successful and meaningful style has emerged, as in the case of Moiseeva and Minenkov, there appear countless imitations. The British couple, Janet Thompson and Warren Maxwell, struck me very much this way by sacrificing their breezy open movement of several years ago for a ponderous imitation of the Soviets. Lorna Wighton and John Dowding of Canada presented a sophisticated free dance opening and then slipped at the conclusion to an imitation of the bell like virtuosic display to a rapid piano arrangement that Moiseeva and Minenkov displayed several years ago. It was brilliantly executed, but like good mimicry.

The problem of a lack of awareness of style in figure skating is a severe one. It is particularly difficult because it can never be clearly defined and it is usually inexorably tied to the individual. Competition, although it eventually recognizes it, has a tendency to either suffocate or cause it to conform for the sake of easy objective evaluation.

USFSA HALL OF FAME BALLOT

All members of the USFSA Figure Skating Hall of Fame are determined by you. You nominate the candidates and nominations may be made by everyone. They are in no way restricted to members of the USFSA. Use this nomination form to list those persons you feel are worthy of induction to the USFSA Hall of Fame, skating's highest honor. Keep in mind that only one nomination form per person per year is allowed; each form may contain no more than ten nominees; and all nominees must be from at least one of the following categories:

- 1) Skaters from throughout the world who have compiled outstanding competitive records or who have made notable contributions in style or technique, and who have been retired from competitive skating for at least five years;
- 2) Persons who have made noteworthy contributions to figure skating in a non-skating capacity through service to an amateur figure skating association and who have not been active in this category for at least a year;
- 3) Persons who have made noteworthy contributions to figure skating as professionals. Nominations are not limited to living persons, nor to Americans; any person meeting the qualifications listed above is eligible.

The 27 electors (three from each Region) will vote on the nominees, and the next induction to the USFSA Figure Skating Hall of Fame will take place at the USFSA Governing Council Meeting in May, 1978.

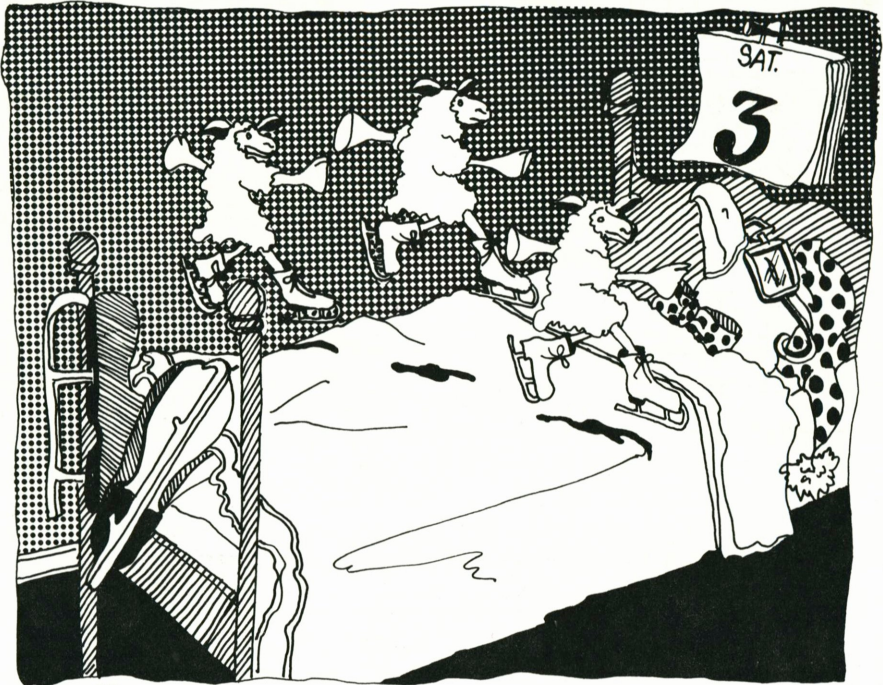

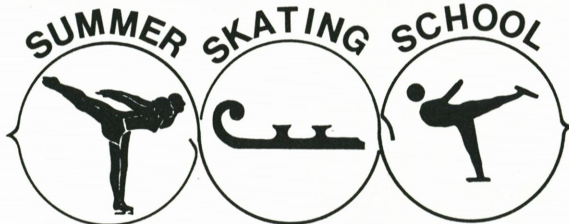

Andy said, in ice dancing the judges mark on their impression of the dance. He said, a couple may do a "willowy Argentine Tango and another couple may do a strong one" but the judges may mark on the basis of their own style and technique preferences.

Susie's and Andy's dancing goals are to win the U.S. Dance Championship. Andy said, "being a national champion will improve your skating and placement. The title is knowing you have that much more going for you." Another goal for them is to place in the top ten at the World Championships.

Other couples that have been an influence on their style and presentation are, Andy said, "Anne and Skip Millier, for their musical interpretation; Jim and Judy Sladky because they were great technicians; and Colleen O'Connor and Jim

Mills for their presentation." Each was entirely different and the combination of the three couples would be the ideal dancers.

The brightest moment for Andy and Susie occurred at the 1976 National Championships in Colorado Springs. It came as they were approaching the winners' podium (they placed third that year) having just been told they were to be members of the U.S. Olympic Team. Those are moments they will never forget.

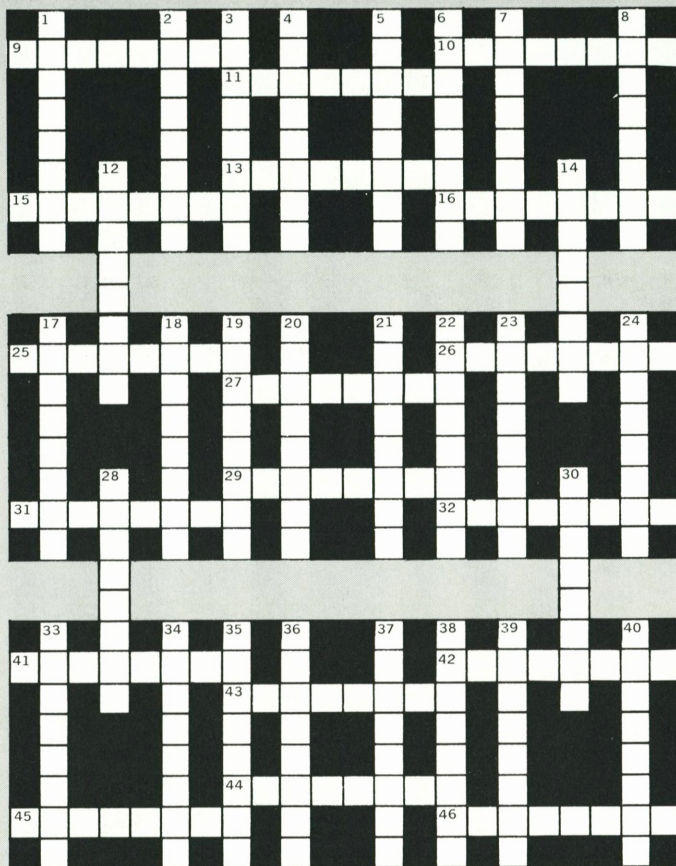
After their competitive days Susie believes she would like to teach skating. Andy on the other hand, said he might "enjoy being in a show because you learn so much more about presentation."

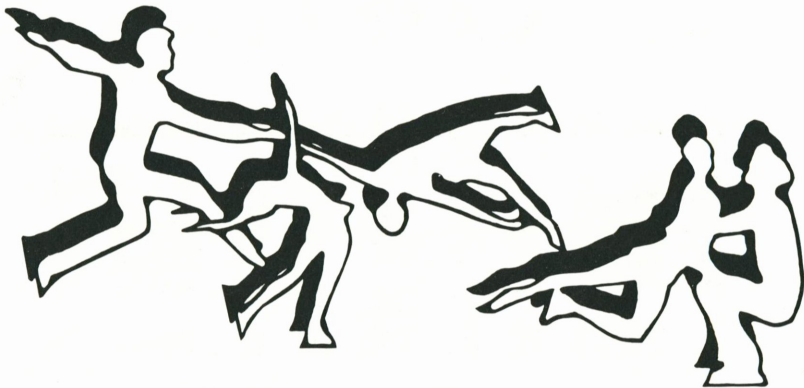
