



OBITUARIES



He is perhaps best remembered for his development of the "Murray Space Shoe" which was molded to the wearer's foot-and remarkably comfortable. ICE ABROAD

1979 Swiss Championships

There were three new champions when the 1979 Swiss Championships were over in Aarau, the silk and cotton city of Northern Switzerland, and once the capital of the Helvetic Republic.


As usual, the ladies' event was the best attended (2,300 spectators) with 16 girls competing for the title left vacant when the defending champion, Danielle Rieder, withdrew at the last minute because of an injury. Denise Biellmann, fifth last year at World's, was favorite, and after finishing second in figures, she went ahead in the short program to romp away with the title in the free skating.

The 16-year-old new ladies' champion was fresh from her triumph in the Ennia Challenge Cup in the Hague-where the Queen of Holland presented her with a new variety of tulip, the "Denise Tulip," the Dutch have named in honor of the young Swiss skater. She was in top physical condition. Her program included a triple Salchow and triple Lutz and some magnificent spinning, all harmoniously linked with an effortless flowing glide.

Fifteen-year-old Corine Wyrsch, of Zurich, who finished fourth at Prague Skate, won the silver medal. Anita Siegfried, also from Zurich, was third and presented two fine double Axels with an expressive program. Fourth was a newcomer, Miriam Oberwiler, a "jumping wonder" from the United States. Miriam is, however, 100% Swiss-born in Zurich and she lived five years in New York where she learned to skate. She and the new champion were the only skaters to execute triple jumps.

On the second day of the men's event, Daniel Fuerer, the defending champion, withdrew because of a high fever. Here was another triumph for the city of Zurich with Olivier Höner, a boy of 12, giving a surprising performance. Brother of the former Swiss champion, Daniel Höner, gave a free style performance full of promise, executing all the double jumps, except the Axel.

Another surprise was the fine pair presentation of Christine Eicher and Paul Huber of Bern who have skated together only seven months, They easily outdistanced last year's cham-

pions-their free program was original and was performed with unusual elegance and spiced with difficulty. Christine Eicher, after four seasons in the Swiss singles championships, seems to have at last found her medium.

Regula Lattmann and Hanspeter Muller of Weinfelden were the only 1978 champions who resisted outside challenges and retained their dance title. –*Nigel Brown*

1979 British Championships

Robin Cousins showed at Richmond Ice Rink, near London, that he has fully recovered from the fatigue fracture which kept him off the ice for some time. He gave a masterful performance to win his third British Men's title.

In the ladies' event, the defending champion was less successful. It was three years since a cheerful 16-year-old Karena Richardson defeated then British Champion Gail Keddie. This season Miss Richardson was defeated by 16-year-old Deborah Cottrill. Thus does history repeat itself.

Miss Cottrill, a shy blonde, scored the highest total points on each figure, although Karena did better on judges' placings on the final RFO paragraph loop. The first two figures, however, were disasterous for the defending champion. She was fourth on the RFO rocker and third on the back paragraph bracket.

After figures Debbie Cottrill was placed first by all but one of the nine judges. Second was Tracey Solomons, third was Californiabased Teresa Foy and Karena was fourth. Thus, the three-time ladies' champion was under considerable pressure for the short program. She has been known to "bounce back" (the same four girls finished in the same order in 1977 and Karena won) but this time, too much ground had been given up.

In the short program, Karena two-footed her double Axel while Debbie made no discernable errors. Tracey Solomons held onto second place but Teresa dropped to fourth.

The free skating confirmed that Debbie Cottrill was the new champion. Skating to Offenbach's *Grande Duchesse de Gerolstein*, she gave a beautiful and technically difficult program. Her triple Salchow was a double and her triple toe loop was landed on two feetbut everything else came off very well.

Karena does not normally do a triple jump, but she knew she must if her title was to be saved. She made her usual powerful start-a four-jump combination, a good double Lutz/ flying camel/double flip and then her triple Salchow. She landed forward and put down a a hand to save herself. After that she seemed to lose heart.

In the men's event, Robin Cousins showed a marked improvement in the figures. Last year he was beaten by Andrew Bestwick, who did not compete this year because of an injury. Cousins traced a fine paragraph bracket and was awarded several marks over 4.0. However, his back paragraph loops received a couple of 2.9's.

In the free skating Cousins was unchallenged. The short program included a double flip/triple toe loop and some imaginative spins to Richard Strauss' *Zarathusra*. He used Russian music for the free skating–Tschaikowsky and Shostakovich–and did a fine combination double loop/triple toe loop. His other triple was the Salchow and the whole program was presented with style, grace and power.

Christopher Howarth was unanimously placed second—his high double Axels and triple Salchow were excellent. Mark Pepperday was third.

The pair championship, first held in 1914, attracted just one entry—only the third time in its history that there have not been two or more pairs. Last year's champions, Ruth Lindsey and Alan Beckwith could not compete because Alan's hand had been badly cut by Ruth's skate during practice. Susan Garland and Robert Daw, a young pair from the same club as Robin Cousins, showed they were worthy of the title. Twelve-year-old Susan and her partner, two years older, were fifth in the 1978 World Junior Championships, and have considerable potential. —Dennis L. Bird

1979 Japanese Championships

The 47th All Japan Figure Skating Championships were held in Shinagawa Skate Center in Tokyo, December 22-24, 1978.

After Fumio Igarashi's two huge international successes in October, his top adversary, Mitsuru Matsumura, had been somewhat depressed. But, last December he broke out of his depression and captured the 1979 Japanese Men's Championship. It was a very close battle but a very happy one for Mitsuru.

Matsumura won the figures with Igarashi close behind. In the short program, Matsumura did a double flip/double toe loop combination lacking in flow. Igarashi skated a much better short program including a double flip/triple toe loop combination and earned him first place from all nine judges after the short program.

The free skating witnessed Matsumura's flawless program with four triples-Lutz, loop,

BOOK REVIEW

Tackle Skating

by Howard Bass. Stanley Paul, London

Tackle Skating by Howard Bass is a concise volume dealing with everything the prospective skater wants or needs to know, and of much interest to those already initiated in the art of skating. Howard Bass is one of the foremost writers on figure skating, on all winter sports, in fact. With seven other books already to his credit and twenty years experience reporting on major skating championships, he can be relied upon to provide comprehensive knowledge in simple and straightforward terms. The book is not designed to take the place of professional instruction, but rather, to complement it by assisting the pupil to a clearer understanding of basic points.

There is a lot of sensible and practical advice suitable dress etc., for the on equipment, beginner. Every aspect of skating is dealt with competently-from the first hesitant steps to school figures and free-skating, with additional advice on choosing music, and finally-how to become a professional. There are chapters on pair skating, ice dancing and even speed skating. Throughout are numerous helpful diagrams illustrating positions and school figures. All but one of the many excellent photographs are by Tony Duffy who has won awards for his work in international sports photography. Tackle Skating is well worth study by those interested in learning to skate and those already "hooked" on this exhilarating sport.

Howard Nicholson 1896-1978

Howard Nicholson, elected to the USFSA Hall of Fame in 1976, died Christmas Day, of cancer in Lake Placid, New York, at the age of 82.

Mr. Nicholson is perhaps best remembered for his great coaching career. Among his pupils were the great Sonja Henie, whom he began working with in 1931, Carlo Fassi, Mary Rose Thacker, Sonya Klopfer and more recently, Toller Cranston and Priscilla Hill who became the youngest USFSA Gold Medalist at the age of nine.

Mr. Nicholson began as a speed skater and hockey player but around 1910 be began figure skating and started his professional career



as a show skater, appearing at the Hippodrome in New York City and later at the College Inn in Chicago.


Mr. Nicholson won the Open Professional Championship of Great Britain in 1931, and again in 1932 and 1933.

Regarded as a master of compulsory figures, Mr.

Nicholson wrote of his theories in his only book, *Nicholson on Figure Skating*, which deals with the figures and how each should be performed-plainly, simply and succinctly.

Originally from St. Paul, Minnesota, Mr. Nicholson first taught in Europe, passing his ISU First Class (Gold) Test in 1926. He returned to the United States after World War II and continued his distinguished teaching career in New York City, Detroit and finally Lake Placid. Howard Nicholson's legacy lives on-never forgotten and never replaced.

Mr. Nicholson is survived by a nephew, Robert Nicholson.



Smith & Summers:

Stacey Smith had quit skating for two years and was cooking in a French restaurant when Ron Ludington called her up. She had asked him at a competition in Lake Placid before she quit to call if he ever needed a dance partner for a student.

As a little girl, a singles skater representing Cleveland Heights SC, she had always wanted to take from Luddy. "But I didn't want to break my back to stay in shape without a partner, and I knew if I went back it wouldn't take long." she said.

And, it didn't take longonly four years of skating together for Stacey Smith and John Summers to win the United States Dance Championship. In three years at Nationals they moved from ninth to first in 1978, becoming the 25th in Ludington's legacy of national champions.

Stacey, 24, started skating "like everyone else," she said, when she got skates for Christmas at age five. At eight she started lessons, and began to skate seriously at 11. "I was sucked in. You don't realize how involved you are, and when you finally do, it's too late. "Then I was working on my Eighth Test when my coach moved so I took up dance, but I wasn't in-



terested in dance until I saw my idol dancing," she said. Stacey's idol, she found out later, was Barrett Brown, John Summers' first dance pro from the SC of Boston.

John Summers' skating origins were more deliberate than Stacey's. How did he get started?


"My dad's ulcer," he said. "He had to get exercise, and so he dragged the whole family into it."

Barrett Brown, a gold dance champion from the Midwest (who also coached World competitors Kent Weigle and Judi Genovesi), said, "John taught me as much as I taught him. He was an exciting pupil who learned easily-very musical, very talented and well coordinated."

John, 21, was Brown's first competitor, eight years ago. "I remember at his first competition," she said, "he looked at me with his big eyes and said, "I'm scared.' I said, "That's OK, John. You're supposed to be scared.' He was endearing."

Stacey and John now skate from 11 p.m. to 4 a.m. six nights a week in Wilmington, and as a result "don't see much sun," John said. This year they skated in the Sports Festival at Colorado Springs and Skate Canada, and still have Nationals and Worlds ahead of them.

Ludington is "more a consultant than a trainer" for them, Stacey said. She



and John only take two hours of lessons a week from him, "a drop in the bucket compared to our competitors," she said.

Ludington encourages all his students to be independent, since he is away at competition quite often. "We don't need him there at a competition if he can't come," John said, adding "he's not doting."

"It's hard to keep going sometimes. You have got to be self-motivated and goal-oriented. We've learned a lot about handling pressure," John said. "Every year has been important to our growth.

"I treat a competition as an exhibition, and judges as members of the audience. They're not putting any pressure on you—it's all coming from within.

"You learn to anticipate that tightness in your stomach, and think, 'oh good, I'm nervous, so I'll skate well.' We used to try too hard. Now we take the attitude, 'let's go out there and do our normal job. "Sometimes I think there are 200 million Chinese out there who," he said laughing, don't care what happens to us.

"If you usually crack under pressure, you'd have been weeded out a long time ago," Stacey added. "Skating sure gives you an edge in dealing with stress. After skating in front of 20,000 people,

and then seeing someone get nervous in a classroom before making a speech it's just ridiculous."

Stacey and John have had to postpone their college careers until they retire, probably after the 1980 Olympics.

"I have to work to pay for my habit," John said. One year he worked (then as a busboy), attended the University of Delaware, and skated, and it was too much. Now he works as a front desk clerk at a Wilmington Holiday Inn.

Both of them are interested in business, but for now when they are not on the ice or at work, they "do some serious relaxing," John said. Stacey sews (all their costumes), reads, and plays the piano. John "tinkers with his car," he said.

But adding more and more exhibitions to competitions where the team must now defend their title, they find their commitments growing and spare time shrinking.

Defending their title won't be easy this year, since they face stiff competition from Carol Fox and Richard Dalley, who placed first over them last July at the Sports Festival.

Stacey and John's free dance program this year is



to a combination of a Russian folk piece, "Summertime from **Porgy and Bess** (a blues), "It Aint Necessarily So" from the same show, and a piano rag by Liberace.

In addition to the compulsory dance, a contest of exactness in John's words, they will skate to the "Embassy Waltz" from My Fair Lady for the OSP. "Stacey has poise and a style uniquely hers," Barrett Brown said. "I noticed it the first time I ever saw her skate, and I saw it again at World's last year. It's not something anyone has taught her.

"And John and Stacey. . . their hallmark is a quiet, smooth and technically accurate performance," she said. "They are warm people and it comes across on the ice."

John Curry's ICE DANCING

Whether John Curry is a skater who dances, or a dancer who skates, this slim, 29 year old Briton is at the center of a gathering ice storm as he blends the two disciplines into what may well be a new art-ice dancing.

That, indeed, is what he calls his ice show, "Ice Dancing," which appears to be repeating the reception of his London show last year as it glided from a sold-out benefit preview at Westchester Ice Skating Center, Hawthorne, New York to a two-week engagement in December at the Felt Forum, New York City. Curry has since mentioned a national tour.

"Ice Dancing" is different from the typical ice extravaganza since there are no clowns, slick M.C.'s, production numbers or lavish costumes. An evening of Curry and company of 13 on skates is more like an evening out at modern dance or ballet, with solos and ensemble pieces.

The same balletic grace and style that won him the 1976 World and Olympic gold medals for figure skating is stamped on this show. Although the audience might expect athletic exhibitions, it warms to the complexity and variety of these ballets on ice, minus "stunts."

In fact, competitive skating appears in name only in "Tango, Tango" skated by Curry and Jo Jo Starbuck, (United States Pair Champion, 1970-1972) with choreography by Peter Martins that is far more intricate and demanding than any other tango. The

vivacious and blonde Miss Starbuck, World bronze medalist with partner Ken Shelley 1971 and 1972, is brilliant with Curry, as she has the necessary dance background to understand his requirements.

The list of choreographers attracted to this young company is most impressive. Besides Martins, there is Jean-Pierre Bonnefous. also a principal dancer with New York City Ballet, Kenneth MacMillan, Robert Cohan, Donald Sadler, Douglas Norwick and Twyla Tharp. In the second time around in New York for Miss Tharp's "After All," Curry's solo was better than ever as her ideas of speed and energy have found their best medium in skating.

Norman Maen is responsible for Curry's most compelling work, "Afternoon of a Faun." reminiscent of the Nijinsky original but not a copy. In his spotted faun costume (a faun is a being, half man. half goat), Curry uses his long line, body and head movements with such telling effect that it is as if he were no longer skating, as his solo becomes a "third art." Cathy Foulkes of Lexington, Massachusetts is the perfect nymph to Curry's faun, repeating her London role.

John Curry, quite clearly, is the star of this show. Even though the other skater/dancers have impressive competitive and professional credentials. no one can match Curry's ice dance, except, perhaps the dazzling Starbuck. Although all the ballets are not "winners," the work by Jean-Pierre Bonnefous is a classical delight. Bonnefous uses conventional ballet groupings and movements, catching Curry's vision of translating ballet terminology to ice dance.

"Ice Dancing" is a delight—not only to the eye, but also to the ear, as the classical and modern music has been carefully chosen.

Time seems to be on John Curry's side as he prepares his own 20-year plan to educate the worlds of dance and ice skating to ice dancing. Curry trains his skaters in an original office ballet-skating barre, as he knows that a dancer's second position becomes the spread eagle on ice. Curry knows that it is impossible to translate dance, step for step, to ice, but he has already come a long way to discover the shortcomings and potentials of both disciplines.


In time, perhaps a stable of Curry-trained dancer-skaters will be to ice dancing what Balanchine is to ballet. A Curry-choreographed work at "Superskates" in Madison Square Garden introduced the phenomenal nine-year-old Katherine Healy, reflecting her ballet training in the arm movements and smoothness of combinations. With other Olympic hopefuls borrowing from dance to improve the drama in their ice dancing. Curry perhaps not only offers an alternative to competition. but a training style.

Although John Curry, who resembles English dancer Anthony Dowell and in fact the two danced with London's Royal Ballet recently, moves with ease in both worlds, it is lucky for Baryshnikov that Curry prefers skates to ballet slippers.

But if you still have any doubts about how far John Curry, the gentleman revolutionary, has brought the art, the *New York Times* listing for coming events read: DANCE: John Curry's Ice Dancing!

NEW ENGLANDS

The 1979 New England Championships, hosted by the Yarmouth IC, were held November 15-18, 1978, at the Cape Cod Coliseum. It was the biggest skating event in local history with more than 170 competitors and 2,000 spectators.

The Senior Men's event was highlighted by double and triple jumps, splits and flying sit spins. Reggie Raiford, Pilgrim SC, easily captured first place. He won all portions of the event but his short program was exceptional. Patrick Hughes, SC of Boston, took second place with an enthusiastic performance that made the rink appear too small. Silver medalist Nathan Birch, SC of Boston, second in figures and third in the short and long programs, had excellent footwork. Timothy Murphy placed third, although he was second in the short program and free skating, giving one of the crowd's favorite performances.

The Junior Ladies' were less outstanding than the men. Pam Fates, Southern Connecticut FSC, won the event with consistantly strong programs after finishing fourth in figures. Jann Johnson, SC of Boston, was second, and figures winner Sharon Desmond, SC of Boston, was third.

Two pairs competed in Junior Pairs and repeated the results from last year's event. Rosemary Sweeney, Colonial FSC, and Daniel Salera, North Shore SC, successfully







The two Juvenile Boy's competitors skated a closely contested duel with Anthony Acello placing first in both figures and free skating. Brandon Lorry was second.





Milwaukee FSC was second, followed by Alicia Bongiorno, FSC of Minneapolis in third.






whose good layback and spread eagle brought her the silver medal, followed closely by Lisa Zick for the bronze.





mediate event. Tracey Moore emerged the winner from 40 competitors. She had a slim edge over Kristen Miller and Suzy Sanitate.



Eddie Shipstad carried away the Juvenile Boy's title. Figures winner Joel McKeever was second and Jeffrey Cannon was third.





SOUTHWEST PACIFICS



Two hundred thirty-seven competitors, converged on the "Southland" city of Costa Mesa, California for the 1979 Southwest Pacific Regional Championships, sponsored by the Mesa Verde FSC and the Santa Monica FSC. The talent and enthusiasm displayed by skaters, judges, staff and viewers radiated through the arena.


Cindy Moyers, showed her superiority throughout the Senior Ladies' event. Leading comfortably after figures, she skated a strong short program despite a fall on her double Axel. Her well-choreographed Spanish style free skating included a double flip/double loop combination and forward camel spins in both directions.

Lori Benton, fourth after the short program, brought it all together in her long program. She did an excellent flying reverse sit spin and a lovely layback spin moving her into second place. Stephanie Anderson worked her way from sixth place in figures up to the bronze medal.

Junior Lady Kimberly Hassler was given first place by all seven judges in figures. In second place was Joyce Newell followed closely in third by Michelle Schelske. A strong short program helped keep Kimberly in first place. However, it was Joyce who shined in the long program. Skating to snappy Spanish music, she delighted the audience with the only triple jump-a triple toe loop. Two

double Axels were also beautifully executed. Kimberly, in her long program, landed two double Axels but had difficulty on a third. She also missed a triple Salchow. Still she skated well enough for the silver medal. Michelle skated a good long program, although she, too, faltered on several landings, and kept third place.

Novice Ladies' was by far the strongest group of the competition. Twenty-eight initial entries were reduced to twelve for the final round. Vikki de Vries won the gold with her superb technical skating and elegant high jumps which included a triple toe loop, triple Salchow and double Axel. Maria Causey skated with beautiful style and expression to finish in second place. Tricia Burton skated well to maintain third place.




Reducing four initial rounds of 38 skaters to twelve finalists provided an outstanding Intermediate Ladies' event. Debbie La Verde, the eventual winner, was third after figures. An exceptionally well-skated program, which included a double Axel, assured her of the gold medal. Kathleen Haines won the silver. Jennifer Newman moved from sixth in figures to a final third place.

Juvenile Girl's champion, Michelle Muramota, combined steady skating with good figures for her win. Laura La Riva, placed second with Jenny Hardin finishing third.

The Junior Men's division was marked by a switch of placements between figures and the final rounds. Tom Dickson, fifth after figures, won the short program. He went on to win the long program as well as the title showing exceptional power and speed on the ice. His long program excited the audience with daring jumps that included a triple Salchow, triple toe loop, triple loop and a double Axel/ double toe loop combination. Bobby Beauchamp advanced

from seventh in figures to second overall. He skated an artistic program featuring a triple toe loop and the best double Axel of this division. Todd Sand, figures winner, dropped to third in the final standings.

Scott Williams, winning Novice Men, skated a showy freestyle program to Western music. He had the only triple jump in the division, a solidly landed triple toe loop, and a double Axel. Christopher Bowman was all style with exceptional power and speed. His brilliantly interpreted program earned him second place. Jim Cygan skated to third place.

Sergio Ballongue won the Intermediate Men's title with a strong free skating program. Jim Reamy, second place winner, was also consistent in his freestyle performance. The surprise of the event was Darryl Hollingsworth, whose dynamic freeskating program bounded him from tenth place after figures to the bronze medal.

Terry Davis' exceptional showmanship in his freestyle program combined with a first place figure standing made him the Juvenile Boy's Champion. Second place went to John Davidson. Aladin Sulemanajic was third.

Larry Schrier and Maria DiDomenico, 1978 National Junior Pair Champions, were a well-matched senior pair. They packed their program with exciting and difficult moves and fine unison, highlighted by their split double twist, side-by-side double flips, one-handed press and a sharp somersault descent from an overhead lift. Edward and Dana Reisman and Hal and Lyndy Marron placed second and third respectively.

Novice Pairs Champions Deborah Lynch and Keith Green were by far the superior team in their event. Their well-choreographed program featured full overhead press lifts and good unison. The silver medal went to Elaine Asanakis and Gregg Moon. Tammy Stephens and Taylor Hawes were third.

Gold Dance competitors included Karen Berzon and Gary Forman and the winning team of Dee Oseroff and Craig Bond. Dee and Craig's compulsory dances were skated with their unique characteristic style. Both their OSP and free dance were executed with technique, consistent unison, fast flowing edges and movements done on supple knees.



The Silver Dance couples demonstrated a variety of styles. The champions, Robi Shepard and Kelly Witt, led from the beginning. The Silver Tango was by far their strongest compulsory dance. Robi and Kelly's free dance was distinguished by fine transitions from tempo to tempo, with moves and unison that comes from experience. Stylish Susan De Rose and partner Mike McIntyre maintained second place throughout the event, with the bronze medal going to Deanna Stone and Randy Branca.

Colette Huber and Jason Aloisio emerged as Bronze Dance champions from a field of eleven couples. They danced with confidence and surety of edges demonstrating their control and flow. The silver medal went to Barbara Howell and David Purves and the bronze medal went to Terri Demers and David Dartt.

Rashness the Scater goeth upon the outer Edge: over a Slippery and Brittle Floor he moveth, with but a Hair's Breadth betwixt him and Destruction!"

This picturesque 18th century quote might well apply to the competitive skater of today, for the daring athletic feats that are performed on skates today require superb skill and almost reckless courage.

We now have the triple Axel. Is the first quadruple jump far behind? And how will it look? Will it be a beautiful skating movement? or a circus feat?

One of the highlights of skating carnivals used to be the performance of a skater jumping over a number of barrels. It was exciting to see him tear around the rink, gathering speed for the big leap, and hurl himself over the casks and slither to a spectacular stop. It was great because such a long jump could not be performed on *terra firma*. And when he added another barrel the crowd became super-excited in expectation of even a greater thrill. But, the additional effort required for a record-breaking leap, destroyed much of the elegant body action.

Skating today would seem to be following the pattern of the barrel jumper-a continual search to discover how to twist in the air more and more and land without falling down. It is a search for circus feats.

Before another word is said about this appraisal, it would be wise to ponder what *skating* was, is, and should be.

Skating is sliding. It began in the late Middle Ages on the ice-bound canals in Holland as a speedy means of travel. It was imported into England at the Restoration by the Royal House of Stuart—who had learned to skate during their exile in the Netherlands.

It quickly gained favor as a delightful passe-temps among the nobility, but the English pond was small and not suitable for racing or the long gliding movements fitting the Dutch canals. Quick turns and twists were needed in such a small space (a motive to cut all manner of designs upon the ice), and Figuring began. Later in the Victorian era, "Figure Skating" developed into a veritable passion among the gentry. It was on these quiet stretches of frozen water that most of the basic movements of skating were discovered and developed.

For a very long time skating was a scientific art. Figures dominated over any frivolity of the skater's imagination such as

spinning, jumping, or dancing and so on. Through the years "Figure Skating" developed into a splendid grammer of the science. It was the beginning and not, as once thought, the zenith of the art.

Lyrical expression of poetry in motion that had always been present on the ice rink—and an accomplishment particularly suited to feminine charm received an all important impetus when women indulged in skating in great numbers, facilitating it to develop the ingredients of a fine art.

Then abruptly this idyll was quashed. Athletics in the form of jumping invaded the ice rink. The idea was not new. Nearly two centuries ago, the Edinburgh Skating Club, the first ice club in the world, required for qualification for membership. a candidate to successfully jump over first one, then two and then three hats that were placed on the ice. Although such a feat cannot be truly termed an athletic performance, it does possess the ingredients of daring and courage on a dangerous surface such as ice, and shows very early one direction in which skating was destined to turn.

But jumping today has overlapped the stage of conformable intregration in a beautiful art form—it monopolizes skating. Style and aesthetics are being swept away by speed and the craze for circus feats. Sliding (skating) is now confused with sprinting, to gather the momentum necessary to execute a "triple," turned rapidly, almost rolled up, with a minimum of elevation. A jump is beautiful when it has height and length and performed with elegance.

In the top competitions today, it appears to be an unwritten rule, that whirling as many revolutions in the air as possible is the passport to the title. John Curry had to perform "triples" before being acclaimed World Champion. Yet, two years earlier, his skating, and in this case the term which designates art should be underlined, was just as beautiful and immaculate to warrant him a title then.

Fortunately John Curry possessed the athletic ability and muscular power to perform triple jumps, so finally no one could ignore his right to the supreme skating crown.

Leaving Curry alone on an enchanted island, observe what is happening in the modern ice arena. Competition programs are fantastic exhibitions of skill on skates through their jumping feats. One after the other, the competitors, like robots, hurl themselves in the air attempting double and triple jumps, too often falling, and repeating the "missed" jump, which make these performances painful to follow.

However, a gleam of hope appears on the ice from figure skating's "poor relation," ice dancing. Sliding, artistry, elegance, body comportment, music and choreography combine to make ice dancing the art form of modern skating. The box office shows the general public's first choice in the big competitions is Ice Dancing.

We must be approaching the limits of what is possible and what is not in acrobatical athletics, so perhaps officialdom should begin to consider curbing this craze for circus feats, to be less fascinated by extraordinary things that can be done on a pair of skates, and concentrate in guiding figure skating along natural lines where harmony and proportion, as in the older arts of ballet and dance, are supreme.

Qualification is based on 50 hours of participation, spread over at least 50 activity sessions, within a period of four months. Concessions will be made only in sports where seasons may be short or access to facilities limited. In such cases, the 50 hours of required activity may be accomplished in fewer than 50 sessions.

Before undertaking any physical activity program, you should have a thorough medical examination. This is especially important for persons over 40, or for anyone who has not been physically active on a regular basis.




