The third Ice International at Richmond, England (sponsored this year by St. Ivel cheese instead of Rotary Watches) took place from September 29 to October 2, and attracted forty-two competitors from ten countries. Two other entrants were unable to skate—the Czech, Miroslav Soska (injured), and the Austrian lady champion Claudia Kristofics-Binder, who was in the hospital with a fever.

Past winners of the Richmond Ice International have included Linda Fratianne, Robin Cousins, Krisztina Regoczy and Andras Sallay. Now that there have been the usual post-Olympic retirements, many younger skaters were hoping for success at Richmond as a stepping-stone to similar European or World championship fame.

The men's event included three who are likely to be vying for World top honors at Hartford, Connecticut—Scott Hamilton (USA), Brian Pockar (Canada), and Fumio

Igarashi (Japan). Scott who is a remarkable example of the medical value of skating (it helped him overcome a serious childhood illness), was easily best in figures and was placed first by all seven judges. Brian Pockar was second, although outskated by the Japanese champion on the final back paragraph-loop figure.

After the short programs, the Pennsylvanian was still in the lead although beaten in that part of the event. Incidentally, the old system of determining results was still in force, so a big lead in figures was a help. Scott tried a difficult combination of triple lutz and double toe-loop; he did the lutz but fell on the loop. Brian Pockar's double Axel was not quite steady, but he did a fine triple toe-loop/double loop combination, and won this section. Fumio Igarashi did a simpler combination, and fell later in his program, while Igor Bobrin (a real veteran at twenty-six) sat down on his double lutz and never looked in contention. A surprise was the excellent performance of Norbert Schramm (West Germany), third in the short program, who seemed inspired by his music, "Hold that Tiger."

On the third day, it was the twenty-one-year-old from Tokyo who proved best. Fumio Igarashi won this title in 1978 and went all out to repeat history. He did not quite succeed, but he gave a fine show, including four triple jumps. The other competitors all seemed off form; perhaps it was too early in the season to expect new programs to be working at their best. Scott Hamilton opened brilliantly with a triple lutz, but fell immediately afterwards on a triple toe-loop. A triple Salchow later was faulty, but fast steps, a flowing style, good use of the music, and some fine combination jumps made this look like the sort of program that with practice could be a world-beater. Brian Pockar stumbled on a double lutz, but jumped well otherwise, to take second place in the long programs and first place overall, by four judges to three.

In the ladies' event, the leader in figures was similarly not the final winner. The delightfully extrovert Canadian, thirteen-

year-old Tracey Wainman, skated some confident figures which were clearly best. She finished each one particularly well, not just sliding off as many skaters do, but adopting a brief, elegant pose to show that the figure was finished. Sandy Lenz showed a remarkable ability to get around the figures neatly and smoothly after the gentlest of push-offs. Sanda Dubravcic took third place, but was second on the back paragraph loops.

The girls all seemed nervous in the short programs the next day. Miss Lenz's beautiful style and musical interpretation made her a joy to watch, but her combination was a double Axel/single loop instead of the required double. Miss Wainman also failed on the combination, while Miss Dubravcic, after succeeding with a triple toe-loop/double loop, then marred her performance with a fall on a double Axel.

The long free was a triumph for Miss Lenz. Looking relaxed and happy, she glided through her program, with feather-light landings to high and well-controlled jumps. In the overall results, she was first on all but one judge's card. The exception was the British judge, who preferred Miss Wainman. The little Ontarian's program was beautifully presented, but she fell on a triple toe-loop and again later. It was just not her night—but what talent she has! Equal second with Tracey in the long free was the seventeen-year-old Leningrad skater Svetlana Frantsuzova, who was sixth in the 1979 Junior World Championships.

The ice dance event was a runaway victory for the British champions Jayne Torvill and Christopher Dean. At the end, their total score was more than ten points ahead of their nearest rivals—an enormous lead. Miss Torvill was once British pair-skating champion, but with Chris she is now clearly on the way to becoming one of the World's top dancers. The Russians, Elena Garaninga and Igor Zavoizin from Leningrad, stayed firmly in second place throughout, with Britain's second team Karen Barber and Nicholas Slater third. Kim Krohn and Barry Hagan from Califor-

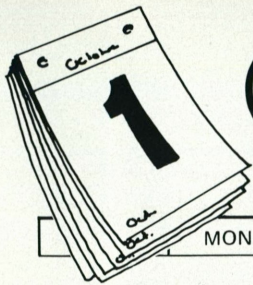

nia were fourth. The event was enlivened by the cha-cha-cha rhythm which has been chosen this season for the original set-pattern dance. The biggest sensation occurred when the skating was over; three days later came the news that the Czech dancers Anna Pisanska and Jiri Musil, who had finished sixth, had declined to go home. Instead, they have been granted political asylum in Britain.

The pairs' event was dominated by the Canadian champions Barbara Underhill and Paul Martini. Their strong style and dramatic twist-lifts put them in a class by themselves. Second place was fiercely contested by the Russian pair and the British champions, Susan Garland and Robert Daw. Inna Volanskaia from Moscow fell on a double jump and stumbled on a throw, and with her partner Valeriy Spiridonov skated to ugly, raucous music. The judges were evenly divided in awarding second place; three judges voted for Britain, three for the USSR. The American judge tied them—but her vote went to the Russians because she gave them 0.2 more for free-skating. It was a tight finish. Fourth were the excellent U.S. pair Sheryl Franks and Michael Botticelli.

About two hours of the competition was televised over three nights, with commentaries by Alan Weeks and the Olympic champion Robin Cousins. The St. Ivel International was a successful meeting, and some of the competitors are likely to make an even bigger mark on the world scene soon.

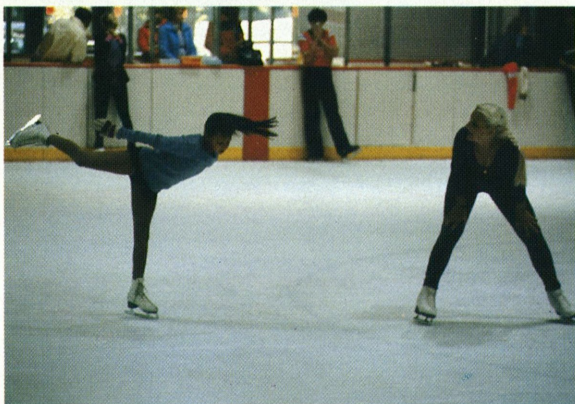

BROADMOOR SKATERS SPEND WEEKEND TRAINING IN VAIL

What do you do when your home ice suddenly becomes unavailable? Well, you might pack up your skates, grab your scribe and head for the hills as the skaters from the Broadmoor World Arena did recently when they found their ice had temporarily become a convention site. The hills in this case, however, were the Rocky Mountains that surround the ski resort of Vail, Colorado. Special rates for the skaters were arranged with the Kiandra-Talisman Lodge; and for three mornings the second floor of the Lodge resounded with the sounds of ringing alarm clocks rousing the skaters for the five o'clock patch, and their whispering to each other to be quiet so as not to awaken everyone else.

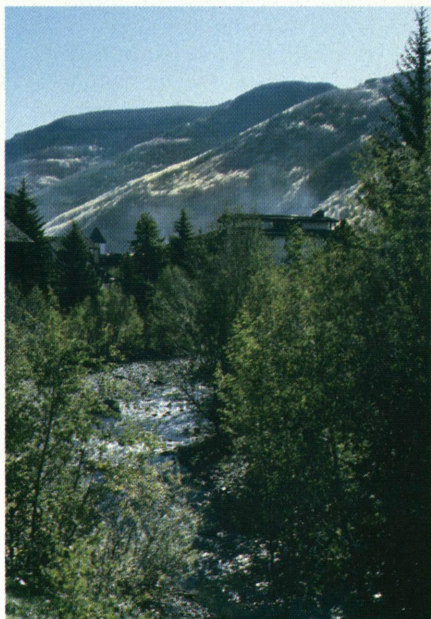

When not on the ice, skaters and coaches enjoyed the gorgeous fall colors of the aspen, browsed through the shops in Vail Village, dined at fabulous restaurants such as Pepi's, and boogied the night away at the Shadows Disco.

In Memorium
JACQUES FAVART
1920 – 1980



Jacques Favart, President of the International Skating Union, died on September 27, 1980. His untimely death is a tragic loss to the world of amateur ice skating and all its participants.

All of those who had the privilege of working with him, held him in the greatest respect and affection. He was intelligent, fair, honest, forceful, innovative, gifted with a marvelous sense of humor, and in every way a person eminently fitted to lead our sport.

Jacques was active as a competitor, judge, referee and official of the Federation Francaise des Sports de Glace, of which he was President for many years, and of the International Skating Union. He was French Champion in Singles in 1942 and in Pairs for 1946 to 1950. During these years, he also competed in Euro-

pean and World Championships and the Olympic Winter Games.

His service as an official of the International Skating Union began with his election to the Technical Committee for Figure Skating in 1955. He became Chairman of that committee in 1957. Beginning in 1959, he served as Vice-President, and succeeded to the Presidency upon the death of Ernest Labin in 1967. He was re-elected to the Presidency at every ISU Congress held since then.

He had been decorated by many countries. In France, he was a Chevalier of the Legion of Honor and an Officer of the National Order of Merit.

It will be difficult to find the like of Jacques Favart again.

The competitive year following an Olympic competition is always an interesting one for it brings new faces to the forefront and, in a sense, reverses the process leading up to the Olympics—instead of a narrowing of the field down to an elite few, there is a broadening of the field to include new possibilities. Everyone takes a step back to look at the whole competitive picture.

The competitive picture in Senior Ladies should be particularly interesting this year, as there are several “ladies-in-waiting” for an opportunity to move up in the national standings and possibly claim a national title. After three years of being “always the bridesmaid,” Lisa-Marie Allen can look forward to a Nationals minus her nemesis, the now retired Linda Fratianne. Sandy Lenz, 1980 U.S. Ladies’ Bronze medalist, has become known for providing fans of amateur figure skating with the kind of personality-packed performances they previously got from Dorothy Hamill. After an outstanding first year in Senior Ladies, Elaine Zayak placed fourth in Nationals, and is hoping to better that this year with some spectacular triple jump combinations. Simone Grigorescu, who placed fifth in Nationals last year, is hoping that her dramatic, balletic style will secure for her a standing in the top three of the nation. As a first

year Senior Lady, Tiffany Chin’s senior record in Nationals remains to be written, however, the word from the West Coast is that Tiffany skates with a sophistication and feeling beyond her years, and could very well spoil the dreams of the more experienced Seniors.

Here then is a look at a few of our “ladies-in-waiting,” waiting for the 1981 Nationals in San Diego where their dreams will be decided.

A New Home New Hopes

In 1981, the Women's U.S. Figure Skating Championship will be up for grabs and there are at least four skaters with the potential to take the title. Among them is eighteen-year-old Simone Grigorescu, a skater known for her utterly classical skating style.

Simone has competed in Nationals, in Senior Ladies, for the last two years. In 1979, she finished in seventh place. In 1980, she moved up to fifth place and missed out on going to the Olympic Games by just one point. In 1981, she hopes to make it to the top spots in the sport. Simone says, "The 1981 National competition will not be easy, but my goal is to make it to the U.S. World Team."

Although only two Senior Ladies will be on the U.S. World Team in 1981, Simone's goal is both realistic and feasible. She has the talent and the determination that go into the making of an American skating champion. She also has an unusual personal background that has taught her to be patient, to cope with difficult situations, and to dream seemingly impossible dreams.

Simone was born in Bucharest, the capital city of Rumania. She began to skate when she was seven-years-old on an outdoor artificial ice rink and before she was nine, she was taken into the Rumanian government's skating program. Simone explains how this program worked: "We lived at home; we skated only five months out of the year; we received group skating lessons which were paid for by the government; and we were given two pairs of skates each season free of charge. At the end of the season, the skates were to be returned to the government and they were then passed along to someone else."

Skating in Rumania was a second-class sport and Simone adds, "The instruction we received was terrible. The instructors were all self-taught and they had no idea what they were doing. One of my instructors was an ex-gymnast who took up skating at the age of twenty. By the time I was twelve, I was Junior National Champion; but the standards were very low and the title didn't mean a

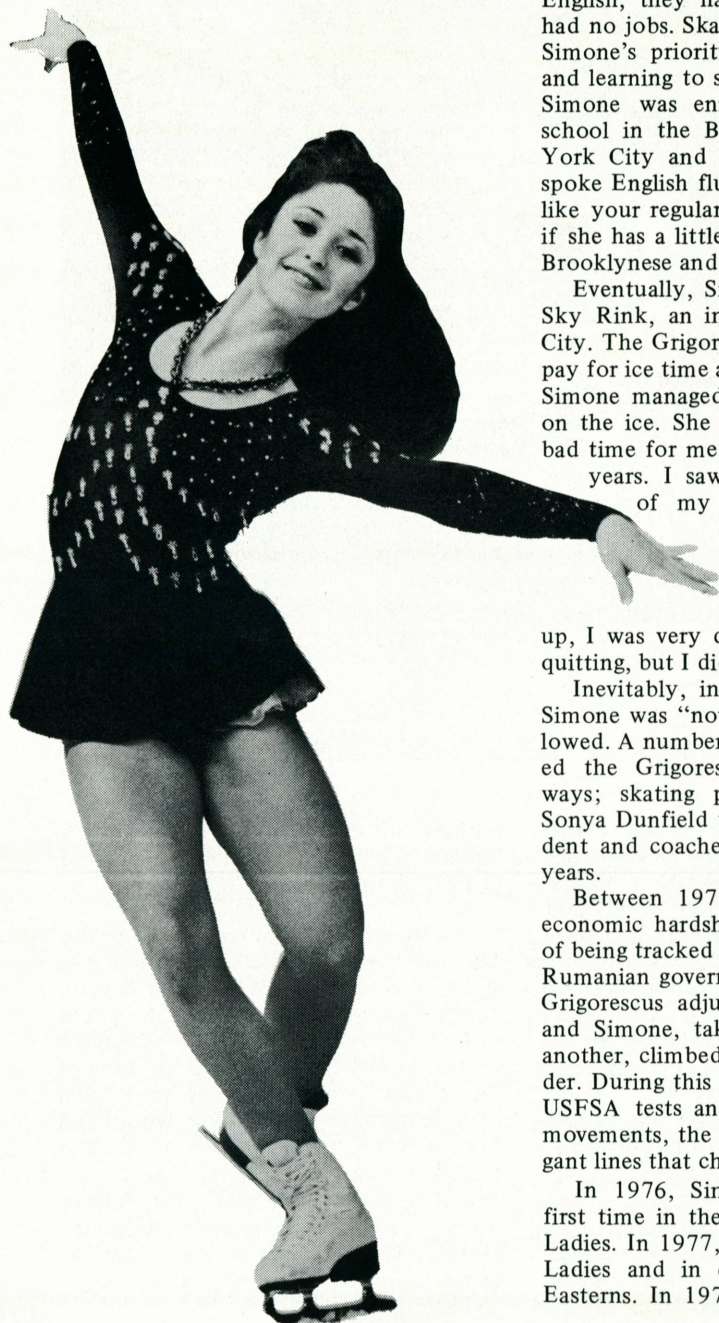
thing." Also, by the time Simone was twelve, her parents had enough of the communist government of Rumania and were planning to defect. Simone, being so young, was not told of their plans.

Simone's father was an engineer. In the winter of 1972, he quit his job and became a vocalist with a band. Shortly thereafter, the band went off to Yugoslavia to play in a night club and Mr. Grigorescu went with it. Mrs. Grigorescu, who was a lawyer in Rumania, spent the next six months trying to get a passport for herself and for Simone, and a government permit to visit her husband in Yugoslavia. When it was granted, she and Simone left Rumania. Simone, who still did not know they were about to defect, says all they took with them when they left was one suitcase of clothing and one pair of government issue skates.

In Yugoslavia, the Grigorescus were reunited and together they hitch-hiked across the border into Austria. Simone recalls, "We waited for a long time on the roads to get a ride into Austria. I guess we must have looked like defectors because nobody would stop for us! Finally, a German tourist picked us up and drove us across. When we got to Vienna, my mother told me we were never going back home. At first, I did not believe her. Later, I felt very sad because I realized I would never see my grandparents or my friends again."

The Grigorescus spent three weeks in Vienna and then moved on to Cologne in West Germany. They tried to find work, to settle down and to make a life for themselves there, but they encountered many difficulties. In Cologne, Simone tried to keep up her skating, but was unable to do so. She found an indoor rink and an instructor willing to take her on, but the Grigorescus could not afford to pay for the ice time or the lessons. Simone says, "We stayed in Cologne for nine months, but we really wanted to go to America. I wanted to go to New York City; I knew all about that city from movies and going there, for me, was like an impossible dream."

In 1974, Simone's dream came true and the Grigorescus arrived in New York



City. In the beginning, life in New York was very hard for them: they spoke no English, they had no money, and they had no jobs. Skating was the last thing on Simone's priority list, survival was first, and learning to speak English was crucial. Simone was enrolled in a public high school in the Brooklyn section of New York City and in less than six months spoke English fluently. Today she sounds like your regular American teenager and, if she has a little trace of an accent, it is Brooklynese and not Rumanian.

Eventually, Simone found her way to Sky Rink, an indoor rink in New York City. The Grigorescus were still unable to pay for ice time and lessons, nevertheless Simone managed occasionally to get out on the ice. She recalls, "This was a very bad time for me. I had not skated in two years. I saw what American skaters of my age were doing and I knew I was very far behind them. When I realized the work I had to do in order to catch up, I was very discouraged. I considered quitting, but I didn't."

Inevitably, in New York's Sky Rink, Simone was "noticed" and help soon followed. A number of local skaters supported the Grigorescus in many different ways; skating professionals, Peter and Sonya Dunfield took Simone on as a student and coached her for the next three years.

Between 1975 and 1978, in spite of economic hardship and the constant fear of being tracked down in New York by the Rumanian government and deported, the Grigorescus adjusted to life in America; and Simone, taking one slow step after another, climbed back up the skating ladder. During this time, she passed all eight USFSA tests and developed the flowing movements, the soft landings and the elegant lines that characterize her skating.

In 1976, Simone competed for the first time in the United States in Novice Ladies. In 1977, she moved up to Junior Ladies and in competition made it to Easterns. In 1978, she competed for the

first time in Senior Ladies' and in 1979, was first seen in this category on a National level. Looking back, Simone says, "I had a slow start in skating and a long interruption along the way. When I first came to America, I lost confidence in my ability to skate and it was hard work to build it back up. Now I know that if I have managed to come this far, I will make it the rest of the way to my goal."

In 1978, Simone and her parents pulled up stakes again and moved from New York to Denver, Colorado. For the last two years, Simone has been training there and her skating has matured and taken on a refined lyrical and expressive quality. But the milestones for the Grigorescus during this period had

nothing to do with skating: in 1979, Simone graduated from high school, and in 1980 all three became U.S. citizens.

Although the Grigorescus are probably over the biggest hurdles in their long journey from Rumania, life still is difficult for them. Simone's parents have jobs now, but extra money for Simone's skating is still hard to come by. Lots of talent and little cash is not an unusual combination in the skating world and Simone, in this respect, is not unique. But Simone's spunk and courage *are* unique and at the 1981 Nationals, where four or more equally talented and determined skaters will be competing fiercely for the Senior Ladies' title, these qualities might give her the winning edge.

Fourteen years ago, a six-year-old girl was fascinated by the challenge of a climbing rope hanging from the gym ceiling. She proceeded to climb it, discovering to her delight that it fulfilled her expectations, and consequently refused to obey her peers and teachers calling to her to come down.

Now, twenty-year-old Sandy Lenz refuses to "come down" from her skating ambitions, still striving to climb higher and higher on her rope of success. Most skaters entering their twenties and having skated in the Olympics might consider it time to retire from amateur skating to skate professionally, but not Sandy. As far as she's concerned, her work isn't over. She hasn't reached her peak. Now Sandy is training to prepare herself to "win" the Nationals and a medal from Worlds. "Psychologically she's very hungry—she's not at all satiated by her past accomplishments," her coach, Evy Scotvold, explains.


Her past accomplishments include placing ninth as an Olympic team member, third in National Senior Ladies, and first in the Midwestern Senior Ladies in 1980. She placed in the upper third in fifteen out of nineteen competitions since 1975.

When I asked her to list her accomplishments, she looked at me in disbelief and struggling with her memory, completed the task in fifteen minutes. "I didn't know I did so much!" she finally said with astonishment.

But she has done a lot, and she is competitive. Perplexing as it may be, she remains humble. "She doesn't think of herself as anything special," observes her coach. He attributes this to the stressed definition of a "good" skater as being the number one skater.

Her parents feel that her attitude is partly the result of their emphasis on leading a normal life. "It's a God-given talent that she has," Sandy's mother explains. "She's just developing what she's been given."

Prior to Nationals, Sandy experienced a dilemma of her identity as "Sandy the person" and "Sandy the skater". She was concerned that people saw her as a skater stereotype. Now, however, she has

balanced the two and perhaps realizes the tenor of her individual talent. "I've worked hard to get the label 'Sandy the skater,' and I'm proud of it," Sandy declares.

The hardest obstacles she overcame to achieve this label were dealing with nerves and discipline.

"I was petrified. I used to get off the ice and [be physically sick] I was so nervous," Sandy recalls of her childhood with a twinge. The skater explains that she wasn't comfortable with competitions until the pressure and stress was relieved from her.

In fact, people said that they could sense something different about Sandy's presence at the Olympics. They told Sandy they hadn't seen a performance like hers since Janet Lynn's.

The comparison to Janet Lynn is a telling one for it was Janet who introduced Sandy to the elegant art of ice skating—at a family outing when Sandy was eight. Since then Sandy has professed to amazed, yet believing listeners, "I'm going to be in the 1980 Olympics."

The secret ingredient of Sandy's famed free style and short program is simply Sandy. She integrates her personality into her skating.

"For the last two years, I've really put a feeling in my skating and I'm becoming more widely known for that feeling. I want the audience to enjoy it as much as I'm enjoying it," relates the 5-foot-2-inch sandy blonde. As for her Olympic performance, "I was just doing my normal thing," Sandy said.

And indeed her audience enjoys it too. One glance at her onlookers reveals their participation in her every movement. She skates with grace, poise and expertise while wearing an honest, almost perpetual smile.

Sandy is a perfectionist of her craft, and ideally self-disciplined, but her coach says that she tends to handle criticism defensively. When he criticizes her, she steps back onto the ice and tries, Sandy says, with a determined voice, "to prove him wrong." "She can't stand not to do things well," Scotvold retorts. She also takes a longer time to do things, needing time to "chew" on new ideas, he says.

"Discipline," Sandy defines, "is when nobody has to tell you to do it. It's just something you want to do, and you teach yourself to stick to it." Her father's concern that, "It's hard as a parent to teach them discipline, but also, to be *individually* disciplined," has been marvelously accomplished.

From her experiences with criticism, Sandy finds ample room in her heart to help the younger skaters. As a child herself, she remembers crying after practices and contemplating quitting. But her previous sacrifices prevented her from giving up.

Sandy also finds time away from her busy schedule to help her friends. "She's always willing to listen," her best friend says with admiration. Sandy feels that listening is a very important ingredient in friendships, because it helps people to think things through and solve problems on their own.

Aside from her serious side, Sandy's parents, boyfriend, girl friend and coach are in general agreement about Sandy's lighter side. "She's a character. She absolutely will not *not* have fun in life—anywhere and anytime," her coach insists. He adds with a hearty laugh, "And of course she picks some of the most inauspicious times to decide she's going to have some laughs."

Sandy is optimistic, yet doesn't ignore the unpleasant things of life. She prefers viewing life with a light-hearted attitude—but acknowledges that seriousness has a

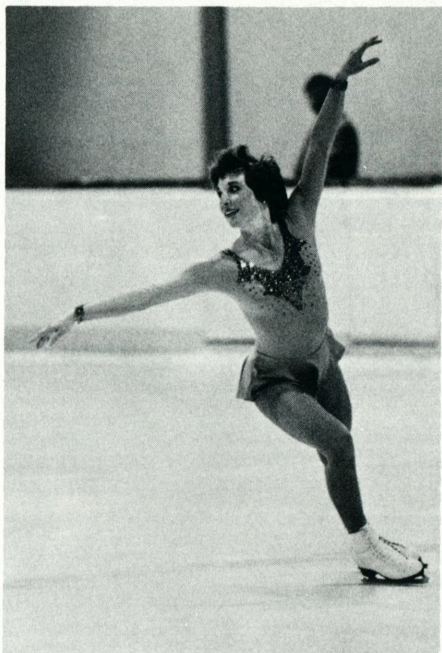

necessary place in life also: "We're here only for a short time, and we should make the most out of it."

Sandy's dream came true and her expectations were met at the 1980 Olympics. "I was free to go out and just have fun," she exclaims. It was quite a relief for her compared to the pressure from Nationals—which she had never before felt or imagined. Sandy speaks with enthusiasm of memorable experiences from the Olympic tour covering twelve cities and shows in eighteen days.

Having fulfilled her childhood dream, it now remains to be seen whether Sandy will realize her adult goal, a National title, at the 1981 U.S. Nationals in San Diego in February.

Serious Senior

In June 1979, *Skating* published an article on Elaine Zayak titled *Jubilant Junior*. The story ended with Elaine planning to take her Eighth Test, hoping to make it into Senior Ladies and having butterflies at the prospect of competing in this category. As everyone knows, Elaine passed her Eighth in September, made it into Senior Ladies, overcame the butterflies, and in competition had the Senior Superskates glancing over their shoulders.

The last ten months have been jam packed with excitement and plain old hard work for Elaine. During this time, she spent more than 1500 hours on the ice, participated in Regional, National, International and World Competitions, traveled more than 15,000 miles, and wore out three pairs of skates. What does she have to show for all of this? Recognition among skaters, a fan club, and a very good chance of becoming America's next Skating Queen.

Looking back, the fourteen-year-old from Paramus, New Jersey, says, "It's been a great year. All my dreams have come true except for one: I didn't go to the Olympics. But that was an unrealistic dream and maybe I'll make it next time." Her coach, Peter Burrows, adds, "In the last 2½ years, Elaine has gone from Novice to Senior Ladies. This is a phenomenal rise in skating. She competed for the first time in Senior Ladies this year against skaters who've been in the category for three or four years. In view of this, she has done extraordinarily well."

In the last 1½ years, Elaine has grown and developed both as a skater and as a person. The *Jubilant Junior* of 1979 became the *Serious Senior* of 1980. The transition was a smooth one that happened over many months. It began in the summer of 1979 when Elaine acquired a new look. Elaine explains, "Total

Image, they are beauty consultants in Atlanta, decided to use me as a guinea pig and to create a new look for me." As a result, Elaine lost her pony-tailed pixie look, got a short curly hairdo, make-up, and a more grown up image. Elaine adds, "If you are going to compete with Senior Ladies, you have to look like one."

Last fall, Elaine began intense training for the competitions. She got her triple loop jump, double Axel, triple toe and triple Salchow jumps. In November 1979, Elaine represented the United States in the Skate Prague Free Style Competition where she came in First Place. A week later, she competed in the Ennia Challenge Cup in Holland and finished in Second Place. These European Competitions were smooth skating for Elaine. They helped her work out the kinks in her programs and were fair training ground for the upcoming competitions in the United States.

Back home, Elaine made her debut in the Senior Ladies category at Easterns, held last December in Danvers, Massachusetts. After a year of competing in the relatively relaxed Junior category, she moved into the stress-filled Senior category with ease, assurance and flare. Burrows says, "Elaine thrives on competition. The tougher it is, the more she likes it. This showed up at Easterns." In the finals of this competition, she skated a spectacular four minute program to the music of Don Quixote and Mantovani which included six triple jumps, several of them in difficult combinations. This represented four more triples than any other skater performed at this competition. She swept Easterns like a new broom and finished in First Place.

Elaine left Easterns on a high note and entered Nationals, held last February in Atlanta, with hopes and expectations of finishing among the three top skaters. Although she skated the same spectacular

program she did at Easterns, and continued to pull triples like so many rabbits out of a hat, she finished Fourth. Elaine barely missed out on going to the Olympics and was dejected; but she says: "I found out at Nationals that in Senior Ladies to skate well is not enough. To jump well and do lots of triples is not enough. I did all that and didn't beat Sandy or Lisa-Marie or Linda. To win in Senior Ladies, you have to have style, you have to look mature and put together. Good presentation is very important. I didn't have it then; but I'm working on it." Burrows adds: "Elaine showed lack of maturity in her skating at Nationals. But she was only fourteen and competing against girls who were eighteen and nineteen. Her skating will mature, but it will take time. In a year or two it won't be a problem."

In spite of the fact that Elaine did not place among the three top skaters at Nationals, U.S. skating officials were so impressed by her performance that they decided to let her compete with the U.S. Team at Worlds. Elaine was thrilled and before going to Worlds she concentrated on improving the style and presentation of her programs. She worked with Burrows and other coaches, both on and off the ice, on such things as line, carriage, posture, positioning, extensions and arm movements. By the time Worlds came around, there was a marked improvement.

Worlds were held in Dortmund, West Germany, last March. Dick Button, commenting on Elaine's performance on National TV, said she is a very consistent skater who always comes through when it matters, described her triple jumps as magnificently performed and foresaw a wonderful career in skating ahead for her. As to the results of Worlds, Burrows says: "There were thirty-four contestants in Senior Ladies. The judges didn't know what to do with Elaine. They put her in twenty-second place after figures, in tenth after the short program, and in fourth after the long program. She finished eleventh overall."

For a fourteen-year-old in her first year of competition with Senior Ladies, Elaine had a sensational year. As a result, she has been the focus of increased media attention and coverage. Numerous articles have been written about her and she has appeared on National TV on several occasions. However, the sudden fame has not gone to Elaine's head and her family says she is still O.K.

But if worldwide press coverage hasn't spoiled Elaine, The Elaine Zayak Fan Club might. Elaine is clearly delighted to have her own fan club and says: "The club began after Worlds. My friend Joan Palladino, from Paramus, is the President. There are eleven or twelve members. They write to me and I write back. The club button says: 'E.Z. She'll make it EASY!'"

Like athletes competing seriously in most sports, Elaine's life can be accurately described as almost all work and no play. She skates six hours a day, six days a week, and lest she fall behind, four hours on Sundays. "I'm trying to get a consistent triple axel," she says. Burrows adds: "When she gets it, she'll be the first female to do a triple Axel. We're also working to improve figures and to get a consistent triple lutz."

Elaine is enrolled in the Ninth Grade at Paramus High, attends classes whenever she can and makes up for lost time with private tutoring. She has no time for hobbies or interests outside skating, she has few friends and virtually no social life.

But, not all is gloom. In last year's Jubilant Junior story in this magazine, Elaine said the only thing she wanted to do in addition to becoming a great skater, was to learn to drive the car. This year's Serious Senior giggles and says: "Guess what? I can drive! Next year I'm getting a learner's permit." Next year, some experts on skating predict, Elaine may also be getting National and World Skating Titles.

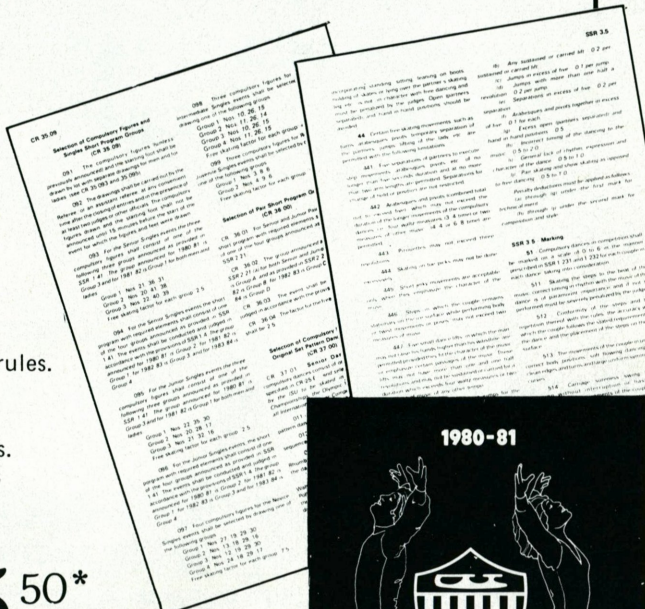

*San Diego's
Good Luck
on the Ice*

Seems like the nicest thing that could happen to a city, about to host the U.S. Figure Skating Championships for the first time, is to have the most extraordinary skater in its history emerge simultaneously.

That, you might say, is the good luck San Diego found in its fortune cookie!

When San Diego realizes a forty-year dream by hosting Nationals in February, a tiny Chinese-American bundle of talent named Tiffany Chin is likely to be a "local favorite" competitor. Not only is she the most extraordinary skater in her home town's history, she scored on the National scene as well last season.

And this month, at the Junior World Championships in London, Ontario, international skating will get its first look at this promising youngster who took the 1980 U.S. Nationals by surprise.

At barely twelve years of age and with only 4½ years on the ice, Tiffany qualified for Nationals for the first time last season as the youngest junior competitor since Linda Fratianne in 1973.

Then, in Atlanta, she matched Linda's 1973 accomplishment by placing second in the class against skaters all two to four years her senior.

To do it, Tiffany had to overcome a shaky seventh-place start, after a mild case of first-Nationals nerves caused her to put her foot down on one figure. She fought back with two stunning freestyle performances that had her name bouncing off the Omni walls. The fact that her short program held up for first place from first skating order pretty well tells the tale!

Knowledgeable observers tossed verbal bouquets ranging from "technically excellent" to "superb flow" and "marvelous musicality." While Tiffany may have been a surprise to the 1980 Nationals crowd, her exceptional talent had long been recognized in her home area.

The icy odyssey of this tiny China doll started out just for fun, as most skating stories do. The Chin family bought a couple pairs of skates for one dollar each at a garage sale, and Tiffany and her younger sister, Tammy, tried them out at a neighborhood rink. It didn't do a thing for Tammy, but Tiffany took up residence!

Within a few weeks her mother barely recognized her as the skater doing the expert back crossovers down the ice, and decided some lessons were in order. Needless to say, the one dollar skates didn't last very long.

Since she immediately displayed such precocious natural talent for the sport, the decision was made early on to let Tiffany go through tests as fast as she could, without worrying about winning titles on the way to the top. She soon emerged as an exceptionally well-balanced skater, about equally adept at both figures and freestyle—and there have been no plateaus in her progress. At one point, she passed the fourth through the seventh tests, both figures and freestyle, in a single year.

In 1979, Tiffany just missed advancing to the Pacific Coast sectionals as an eleven-year-old novice. Then, last season, the hurry-up strategy paid off with her surprise National debut in Atlanta.

The Oriental achievement ethic is unquestionably an integral factor in Tiffany's success. Outstanding accomplishment is the norm in her family. Her mother, Marjorie, who was raised in China, has a master's degree in library science from the University of Southern California and was once the youngest branch library manager in Los Angeles County. Edward Chin, Tiffany's father, has a PH D in mechanical engineering from the University of California at Berkeley, and is currently a staff engineer with General Atomic Company in San Diego.

Eleven-year-old sister, Tammy, found her medium not long after Tiffany discovered blade edges, and she is now as much of a prodigy on piano keys as her older sister is on ice. Completing the family is five-year-old Michael—and everyone can hardly wait to see what he gets into!

Tiffany returned from the 1980 Nationals to great acclaim in her home town. She appeared with the Olympic Tour in San Diego, Los Angeles and Oakland, the first San Diego skater ever honored with such an invitation. The night of the San Diego performance, she received a tremendous ovation from the audience and was honored by the Mayor's office for win-

ning the highest National figure skating medal in San Diego's history.

Since then Tiffany has passed both parts of the USFSA Gold Test and collected her first senior titles in two summer competitions. One was the annual Southern California Interclub meet and the other was the all-freestyle Arctic Blades Invitational, in which she topped reigning Junior World Champion, Rosalynn Summers.

For the last 2½ years, Tiffany has been training with Linda Fratianne's coach, Frank Carroll, in Los Angeles. The arrangement involves considerable travel, but mother Marjorie sees to it that Tiffany makes good use of the travel time to keep up with her studies—a family "must."

Long-range goals for Tiffany are, of course, senior World and Olympic honors. But for the present, she is concentrating on collecting the ladies title at the Junior World Championships, where she will be the youngest member of the U.S. team and very possibly the youngest entry in the entire meet. She turned thirteen in October.

Then, next month, she will make her bid at the Pacific Coast sectionals to qualify as the youngest senior for Nationals in San Diego come February. Her fans will be watching anxiously.

Comparisons with Linda Fratianne have become routine for Tiffany, and many southern Californians remember that the year after Linda's National splash as a twelve-year-old junior she didn't make it to Nationals as a senior.

Tiffany feels sure the extra incentive of having Nationals in her home town will see her through!

A Skating Collector's Dream

the Vilchek Collection

Many people seriously involved with figure skating find themselves sooner or later with a collection of skating memorabilia. Some of them turn into avid antique figure skating collectors roaming the world looking for treasures of the past. Like all collectors, those hunting have different interests in what they collect. Some specialize only in one area such as books, old skates, paintings, pins and the like . . . others hunt for anything and everything to do with the sport.

High atop a hill overlooking the Pacific Ocean a stone's throw from San Diego, stands a charming home full of every conceivable object having to do with figure skating. It's occupants are Irene and Victor Vilchek of Del Mar, California. Destiny played a large part in their lives, beginning

in Europe before they were born. Their parents were childhood friends and Victor's father was a member of her parents' wedding party. Both families eventually moved to the United States where Victor and Irene met as children through skating.

Both Vilcheks are totally involved with the sport. They have given many years of dedicated service by serving on a variety of committees. They are figure skating judges who travel to judge competitions and test sessions whenever asked. Over his long years in skating, Victor has been a club president, officer and several times a board member. Together they competed in many dance competitions.

For anyone interested in skating, a visit to this home is a wonderful experience into figure skating history. Upon arrival,

you first see the handmade old-fashioned wooden skate on top of the mailbox. An antique sled over the doorway displays the house number. Inside, the priceless collection is not confined to corner shelves as most others are. It is beautifully displayed throughout the house . . . even in the laundry room. The house itself is full of all kinds of antiques. Irene also collects figurines, cherubs and foxes. He also collects china dogs and cars. The handsome antiques cabinets and tables they have acquired display their figure skating collection perfectly.

The collection contains many pictures, decorated eggs, old skates including a replica of bone blades first used in A.D. 156, a hat covered with valuable pins dating back to the 1936 Olympics, antique porcelain figurines of all kinds, a stamp collection made entirely of skating issues, metal and china plates, an extensive collection of books and magazines including a 1903 "Woman's Home Companion" with a skating cover, the first edition of "Skating" magazine printed in 1923 and much more.

The fine art works include an original Winslow Homer pen-and-ink drawing done in 1820, a wood lithograph by Brandenhoff, several Currier & Ives and one of their most prized possessions, a beautiful 300-year-old Flemish painting of an outdoor skating scene that still contains some of the original wood frame. Mr. Vilchek, an accomplished painter, has also done excellent oil paintings of Peggy Fleming and Janet Lynn. It takes more than one visit to properly see everything.

Prominently displayed, but firmly tied to the wall in case of an earthquake, are a pair of cobalt blue French Royal matching vases. One has a four-inch likeness of Madame Pompadour on it. The other has Louis XVI skating. These date back to 1752 and are the only ones in existence.

Victor Vilchek has over sixty pairs of antique skates that he has restored himself to perfect condition. There also are many small skating lanterns first used in 1873 for night skating. His "junk" drawer alone would be the envy of most collectors.

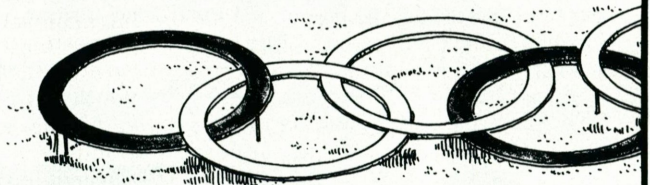
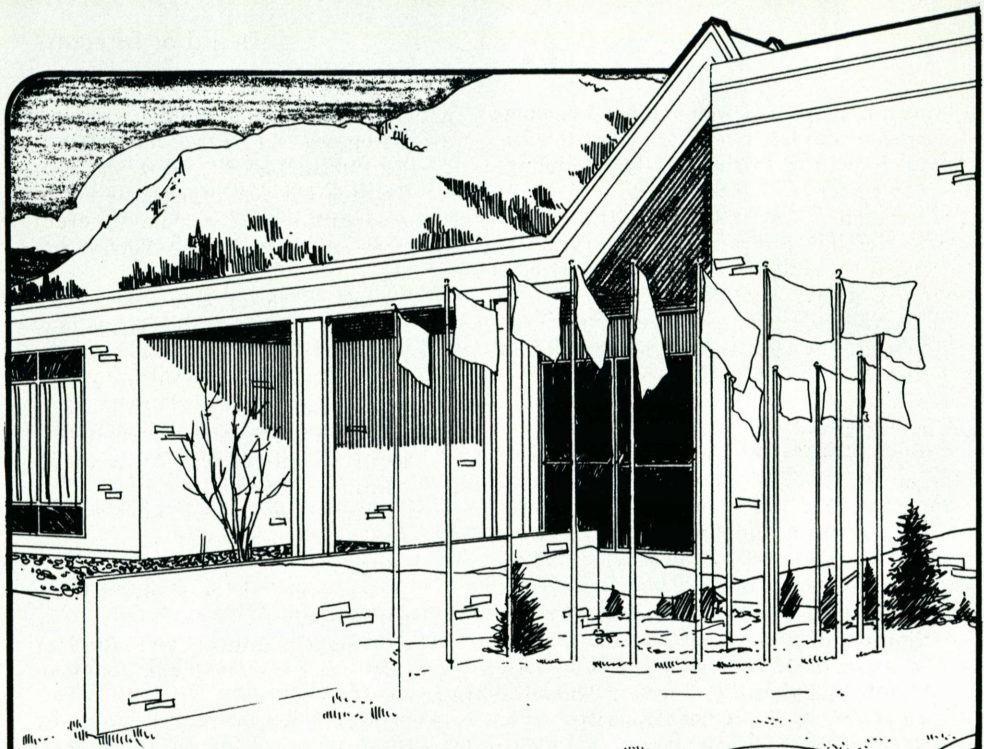
The Vilcheks have been collecting for almost thirty years and every year find valuable items to add to it. A recent addition is a painting from the Sonja Henie collection.

The Vilchek collection is a major part of their lives and their house a museum in itself. Victor says it's not impossible that it will one day become a part of the USFSA Hall of Fame and Museum in Colorado Springs. There generations of figure skating enthusiasts will be able to see the beautiful skating treasures one family has searched for and carefully preserved.

Some of the collection was entered in the hobby division of the 1979 Southern California Exposition and Fair. It not only won the blue ribbon but a plaque for outstanding exhibit. During the period that San Diego will be hosting the 1981 United States National Championships, another portion of it will be on display in the Broadway department store in San Diego's Fashion Valley in honor of the Nationals.

the 1980 Board of Directors Meeting - Report

When the members of the USFSA Board of Directors met at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs on October 3-5, 1980, for the first time since the new Board was created by the revision in the USFSA By-Laws in May, 1980, they found a much improved facility. The dormitories had been renovated with new paint and colorful draperies and bedspreads in the rooms and the

meeting room was well-equipped as compared to the last two years when the former Executive Committee held meetings there under austere conditions.

President Oscar T. Iobst, Jr., opened the meeting by introducing new members who were not part of the former Executive Committee—Harold Hiltzik, George B. Ludlow, Jr., John R. Phelps, James E. Browning, Roger A. Glenn, Mrs. Janet Griffiths, Mrs. Carolyn Kruse, Mrs. Sherie Grimson and Stanley T. Urban, all elected members, Peter Carruthers, athlete-member and John A. W. Nicks, coach-member. Also introduced were Ronald T. Pfenning and Mrs. Eleanor Shultz who had served earlier on the former Executive Committee and had returned to the Board of Directors after an absence.

The first order of business was the adoption of a Memorial Resolution for Dr. Kenneth O. Turner, presented by Mrs. Betty Sonnhalter. Dr. Turner, a member of the USFSA Executive Committee from 1965 through 1971, died on July 17, 1980.

Subsequent to reports of the Sectional Vice Presidents, USFSA Auditors, John Bosse, Bob Snyder, and Roger Miller gave a presentation of the overall financial condition of the USFSA. They explained with a detailed use of graphics that the USFSA had a number of one-time expenditures accompanying the move of National Headquarters from Boston to Colorado Springs which had strained resources to some degree, but they anticipated projects which would bode well for the future.

Reinstated as amateurs in figure skating were George W. Bernard, Yarmouth, ME; Arlayne R. Donnan, Kentfield, CA; Joanne Fleming, Marquette, MI; Heidi A. Gulbranson, Prairie View, IL; Simone Marcotte, Plattsburgh, NY; Beth L. McAdams, San Diego, CA; and Helen K. Robinson, East Peoria, IL.

A proposed new scoring system adopted by the International Skating Union, which would provide for each part of a competition to be judged separately, factored and totaled for placement, was not adopted, but five recommendations of the Dance Committee were approved for submission to the Governing Council in May, 1981.

These rules would, if adopted:

—Remove the Silver Free Dance Test from CR 35.064 in order to upgrade the Senior Dance event in competition and to make the event correspond to Senior Singles and Pairs.

—Add the Silver Free Dance Test to CR 35.087 to upgrade the Junior Dance event in competition and correspond to Junior Singles and Pairs.

—Waive the solo requirement for the legally blind or deaf dance candidates for all dance tests.

—Change the name of Veterans Dance to Adult Dance.

—Provide for Adult Dance Tests, at all levels, to be skated with a partner only.

The Tests Committee will consider appropriate fees and emblems for these tests.

Following a report of the results of International Competitions held to date, International Committee Chairman, Howard G. Taylor exhibited samples of the ski parka, skating bag and wool sweater that were under consideration for the World Team. A London Fog coat with zippered liner and chevrons with the date will be provided for the World Team at the Worlds. A Polar Sports outfit, sweater, navy blazers, grey slacks and grey skirts are also under consideration for International Competitors.

The Team Trophy which the USFSA skaters won at the Coupe de Alpes Competition, held in Saint Gervais and Oberstdorf in August, was exhibited. Team Leader, William J. Brennan reported that the team of Vikki de Vries, Tom Dickson, Pairs Dana Graham and Paul Wylie and Dance Couple Susan Dymecki and Anthony Bardin, who were participating in their first International Competition, acquitted themselves well.

The Board of Directors were pleased to hear from Larry McCollum of Olympic House who noted that the boycott of the Olympic Games in Moscow had hurt fund-raising efforts, but the Olympic Committee was putting all that behind

them and looking forward to the future. A fifty to fifty-five million dollar budget with development grants for National Governing Bodies over the next four years of fifteen million dollars is set as a goal. The USFSA planning allocation is estimated at \$96,000. Trials, team training, Olympic uniforms and expenses for two representatives to International Federation meetings, the Olympic Job Opportunities Program in cooperation with the Canteen Organization—all are anticipated to share in the Olympic funds, according to Dr. McCollum.

Noting that Colorado Springs is now the only training center left, Mr. McCollum said that some of the equipment originally at the closed Squaw Valley Center was now in Colorado Springs. He cited, in particular, a mobile Sports Medicine Van which could bring medical services to the athletes in the field.

In closing, Mr. McCollum made a plea for news items and photographs for "The Olympian" from which articles on "Olympian of the Year" will be chosen.

Although USFSA rules are reasonably in accord with Public Law 95-606 regarding National Governing Bodies, one other in regard to notice to a judge involved in removal, suspension, or demotion was deemed necessary. Consideration of the judge's explanation of the charges was approved in intent and such a rule will be under consideration in May, 1981.

The Board of Directors approved several judges' names to be recommended to the ISU for appointment and permission to take ISU exams: Mrs. Ardelle Sanderson for appointment as Honorary ISU Judge for Singles and Pairs; Mrs. Ida Tateoka, Mrs. Margaret Freepartner for appointment as World Dance Judge; Mrs. Ramona McIntyre to take the World Dance Test Judge's Exam in the spring; Mrs. Anne Gerli, Ray Alperth, Dr. Franklin Nelson and Mrs. Joan Gruber to take the International Judge's Exam; and Barlow Nelson, and Mrs. Eleanor Curtis and Mrs. Jean Robinson for appointment as International Judges.

A new category of membership was approved in principle for skaters taking Basic Tests. Details will be worked out by the Membership Committee and a recommendation may be submitted to the 1982 Governing Council for action.

The matter of "Showcase Competitions" was referred back to the Competitions Committee, from whence it came, for study. The ISU Rule which states that "Amateurs must not appear in any kind of exhibition, commercial motion pictures and television shows made either for direct theater distribution or production on television, in which non-amateurs, playing significant roles, constitute more than 20 percent of the total skating cast" was referred to the Sanctions Committee for study and recommendation. Also directed to the Sanctions Committee was the matter of investigation of ways in which funds can be diverted to the Memorial Fund from sanctioned events for non-skating related organizations.

The definitions for a half-revolution jump as "any jump of one half (180 degrees) revolution in the air", a single jump as "any jump of one or more, but less than

two revolutions", a double jump as "any jump of two or more, but less than three revolutions" and a triple jump as "any jump of three or more, but less than four revolutions" were approved. Also approved were Novice Figure Groups and inclusion of half-revolution jumps (split, half loop, mazurka, etc.) in the Juvenile Free Skating Test. These recommendations will be submitted to the May, 1981 Governing Council for action. A subcommittee of the Tests Committee has been appointed to study the whole structure of tests—records, forms, trial judges, etc.—and report in May, 1981.

Although domestic qualifying competitions in 1980-81 will not be affected, late changes in ISU regulations will apply to all International Competitions, effective December 1, 1980, according to Benjamin T. Wright, ISU Representative. In SSR 1.41, in all groups of the Senior Short Program "(f) spin combination with one change of foot and at least two changes of position (sit, camel, upright, or any variation thereof); in the Junior Short Program" (f) spin combination with one change of foot and at least one change of position (sit, camel, upright or any variation thereof) will be new. In 1, 2, 3, 4, (d), (e) - Spins (Senior and Junior): The next to last sentence will be revised to delete the following wording: "and a layback spin is not an upright spin." In 1, 2, 3, 4, (f), - spin combinations (Senior and Junior): will be revised to read: "must consist of one change of foot and at least two changes of position (Senior) one change of position (Junior) (sit, camel, upright or any variation thereof) with not less than five revolutions on each foot (a total of not less than ten). Any spin combination must include all three basic positions in the Senior Short Program and at least two in the Junior Short Program."

Announcement was made that Mr. John Shoemaker was named Honorary Vice President of the ISU. Mr. Shoemaker presented a resolution in honor of Jaques Favart, President of the ISU, who passed away on September 27, 1980, which resolution was approved by the Board of Directors.

William J. Brennan, Jr., Chairman of the Television and Commercial Sponsorship Committee, announced that the Association and ABC Sports, Inc., had reached an agreement covering the televising of National and Sectional Championships for the years 1981-1985 at a considerably larger payment to the USFSA than in the provisions of the previous contract. Under consideration is a first class International Competition, similar to Norton Skate, for 1981, with television coverage. Agreements with certain advertising agencies involving the brief appearance of amateur skaters on television commercials will produce income for the Memorial Fund.

The USFSA will participate in the National Sports Festival, July 23-29, 1981, at Syracuse, NY, by sending a team of twelve Ladies Singles, twelve Mens Singles, eight Pairs and eight Dance Couples. This will be a Junior Competition. Plans are also being laid to hold an International Competition the last two weeks in September, 1981, at Lake Placid, if sufficient local support is forthcoming.

In concluding remarks, President Iobst announced that F. Don Stoddard has resigned his position as USFSA Executive Director, effective October 30, 1980.

Members of the Board of Directors took a brief recess on Saturday afternoon to visit the beautiful Headquarters, Museum and Hall of Fame Building. They viewed the numerous acquisitions to the Museum, shopped for books, art works, jewelry, and skating gifts and visited with Staff Members to discuss ways to mutually serve the USFSA membership. They all purchased new USFSA Rulebooks recently off the press and then returned to the Olympic Training Center by bus for several more hours of deliberations.

Beautiful mountain views, clear sunny skies and the mountain air created an ideal setting for the well-conducted meeting where members expressed themselves freely in all discussions, but kept uppermost in their minds at all times the welfare of the skaters, the Clubs, and the Association. The outcome of the proceedings reflected that concern.
