Richard S. Callaghan has recently moved his coaching center from the Philadelphia SC & HS in Ardmore, Pennsylvania, to the Broadmoor SC at the World Arena in Colorado Springs, Colorado. Callaghan is well known for his work in singles, pairs, and dance, having coached Junior Dance Champions Scott Gregory and Judy Ferris and National Novice Men's Champion Todd Eldredge, along with national and international competitors Susan Wynne and Joseph Druar, David Fedor, Leslie Sikes, and Maradith Feinberg and Craig Maurizi and others.

Callaghan himself was North Atlantic Novice, Junior, and Senior Men's Champion; Eastern Novice and Senior Men's Champion; South Atlantic Senior Men's Champion; North Atlantic and Eastern Senior Pairs Champion; a national competitor, with one silver and two bronze medals, and enjoyed a professional career as principal soloist with "Ice Capades" and "Holiday on Ice." A funny thing happened to Robin Lewis on his way to class at the University of Alabama. A roving TV reporter spotted his bumper sticker saying "I'd Rather Be Ice Skating," and stopped to talk with him in the summer heat of Birmingham. The conversation lead to a story on the evening news concerning Rob, a member of the Atlanta FSC, and the closing of the rink in Birmingham, and his frustration in wanting to train and compete and his determination to also continue his education. The story showed Rob in the school's Sports Medicine Clinic working out and going to class. His frustrations may soon be eased with the planned new rink in Atlanta, but in the meantime, his bumper sticker says it all.

To a great extent, age determines how much you can change your body through training and what kind of care your body needs for skating. The greatest results through training occur during certain periods of growth.

For example, during puberty, the most drastic changes occur in flexibility and muscle stretch. Turnout of the leg in the hip joint is most easily attained much earlier between the ages of eight and ten years, while the pelvic bones are going through a fast growing period. Changes can be made after these periods, but mostly because people work to develop their physical equipment.

I see cases of skaters past mid-teens, who have made dramatic changes in their bodies. This occurs because these skaters have worked very hard to develop muscle strength, control, and coordination, which can peak after the growth period stops. As a matter of fact, if skaters continue training, they can reach their prime between the ages of twentyfive and thirty. After that there is a very gradual decline of muscle tissue and joint suppleness, the rate of which depends on heredity, care of the body, body type, and how long people have been skating or exercising. However, this is also the time when skaters can feel better and perform better than ever, for by this time they have learned how to use their bodies in the most efficient way and with greater depth.

As one gets older, more care must be taken of the body, as the muscles will have a tendency to stiffen up and joints to lose their flexibility with less activity. At this stage one feels fatigue more easily and recovery from injuries is not as swift. That is why it is extremely important to take greater care about warming up and conditioning as one gets older. One thing that does not change is the development of muscle bulk and bone mass that occurs with exercise at any age. At the same time however, muscles will atrophy and

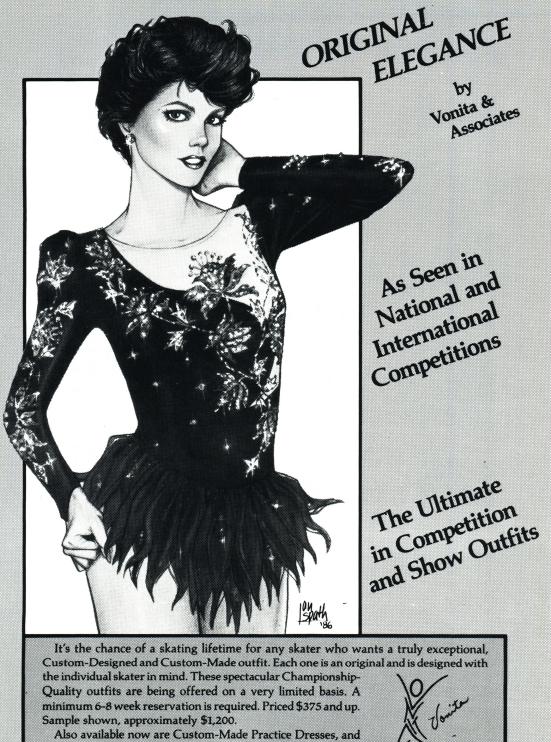

Designs For The Discriminating Skater

State Games Mean Grass Root Participation

—Robert H. Helmick President United States Olympic Committee

A challenge we face as the leader of amateur sport in the United States is to increase opportunities for all people to participate in sports and also to share the Olympic experience and ideal.

With greater participation, not only are we providing the benefits of competitive sports to more individuals in this nation, we are also producing a greater pool of talent from which to select our teams and a greater grass roots support for our programs, financially and otherwise.

One way the U.S. Olympic Committee is broadening opportunities to participate is through the support of State Games: Olympic-style competition and festivals now being held or planned in nearly twenty-five states. Styled after the U.S. Olympic Festivals, these competitions bring together thousands of local athletes in a variety of sports and events. For most of the participants it is the first opportunity to experience an Olympic-style competition with an opening and closing ceremony and a chance to mingle with athletes from different sports in a spirit of Olympic competition.

These state festivals provide for participation not only by Olympic hopefuls, but by almost anyone who has the desire to share in the Olympic experience. Categories of competition have been established for juniors as well as for those in seniors' and masters' rank who wish to continue competition. Categories for handicappped individuals are urged to be included. The common bond throughout is participation, bringing together people from all walks of life in a spirit of friendship and competition.

Recognized and encouraged by the USOC, State Games most often are organized and run under the jurisdiction of a non-profit fitness and sports council or commission frequently initiated by the office of the governor. Funding comes from both the public and private sectors. The State Games also are supported by The President's Council of Physical Fitness Sports and the USOC has established criteria by which it will recognize a State Game.

The concept of State Games was begun in New York in 1978, the same year the first sports festival of the USOC was held in Colorado Springs. Last summer more than 80,000 athletes competed in six regions to select 6,000 finalists for the summer and winter Olympic sports and the competition is held annually.

In 1980 Florida started the Sunshine State Games and in its sixth year had 13,000 participants. Pennsylvannia, in 1982, became the third state to start statewide Olympic-type sports festivals and in 1985 had 10,000 people competing.

The State Games provide an "Olympic style" atmosphere for amateur athletes to display their varied talents in addition to serving as a first step in competition for the more gifted and talented athletes on the long, demanding road to the Olympic Games. In the spirit of Olympism, the State Games also provide an opportunity for the amateur athlete who may not have the ability to go further a chance to participate in an event with a future Olympic great. Many of our 1984 Olympic team and a number of our medal winners began successful athletic careers in State Games.

By providing an opportunity for grass roots level community involvement, millions of people will be able to personally share in the Olympic experience not just as competitors, but as volunteer participants, coaches, managers, officials, and of course, spectators.

The State Games are a concept that will bring the spirit, excitement and tradition of the Olympic Games to every corner of our nation every year, not just once every four years.

Most Active Judge of the Year

Mrs. Lynne Rae Robertson, Detroit SC, judged a total of 998 tests in 1985!

In these days of active sports and physical fitness, it may seem unnecessary to pour more fuel on the fire. Who needs it? Well, for one thing, ice skaters, and for a series of peculiar reasons, the first and foremost being the element in which they move. Where some lucky skaters perform in rinks warmed to Florida temperatures and so cope with nothing more serious than losses of balance and cantankerous coffee machines, others must suffer the consequences of a clammy cold that threatens to reduce them to the appearance of arctic explorers.

Super-active skaters can fight Jack Frost, provided they keep moving. Beginner or slow skaters are caught in a bind: stuck to gliding slowly, bereft of the ability to push hard. They are threatened with becoming snowmen (snowwomen?) and often without knowing it until too late. Even patch skaters, regardless of their ability can be caught in this same trap. During that slow methodical trip through the figure-eight dream world, they may often find themselves curiously inept after about thirty minutes.

Oddly, the skater's most important tool, the ice skate, does the most harm. Boot pressure, particularly on the toes, inhibits circulation. Once the toes start going there's little hope. As the toes go, so go the fingers. Unless caught in time, the body itself is eventually reduced to a state of shivers, and nothing in life matters anymore except an electric blanket, a fireplace, or a warm embrace (not necessarily in that order.)

Discomfort alone is not the real issue, nor is physical health. What is at stake is the sheer loss of muscular control, which is unfortunate in a sport so dependent on subtle foot pressures, and so outright dangerous where super-athletic movements are involved. Yet neither discomfort nor loss of muscle tone is necessary when we have a fantastic tool inside us to forestall the problems.

I call it a "heat-pump" because it reminds me of a central heating system in a house. Add one more letter and you have "hea-r-t pump"—the greatest little engine ever made, your own heating generator! This one is turned on by simple physical action. Prolong the effort and the body is flooded with heat that lasts and lasts. Dr. Ethan Nadel says, "Metabolism's cellular furnaces generate enough heat to raise the body temperature



a full degree in only five minutes. When we run (for instance), the furnaces roar with infinite metabolic fires . . . "

Along with that, the body has an automatic thermostat to monitor both skin and internal temperatures, largely the latter. As soon as it senses the body temperature rising inside, signals are sent to the hypothalamus (regulator of water balances, sleep, body temperatures, etc.) deep within the brain. On orders from the hypothalamus, the blood vessels in the skin enlarge in order to dissipate heat. Correct clothing then holds in the heat, like good insulation in a house. On the other hand, if internal temperatures *drop* the hypothalamus orders *less* blood sent to the skin—and the shivers start.

However, our heat pump is not through yet. It does something else special on those cold early mornings. Your muscles are stiff and cold, right? So the heart gets to pumping, the blood gets to flowing, and within seconds that all-important element known as oxygen is carried by the blood stream to the muscles. For top use, the muscles need more oxygen than usual.

But where does it come in the first place? It comes from the lungs where it passes through the cellular walls into the blood-stream. As we exercise, the blood vessels in the lungs dilate, expanding the area through which oxygen passes into the bloodstream, thus sending more oxygen to the muscles.

Next, we examine the muscles and find a fluid leaving the bloodstream, then seeping like a vast tide into the spaces between the muscle walls, virtually oiling the muscles.

ICE CLASSICS 1986

The concept of "Ice Classics" began in the mind of Jane Logan to serve a two-fold goal: (1) to make the community at large more aware of figure skating in general and the high quality of skating in central California, and (2) to present a memorable evening of entertainment along with a fund raiser for the Oakland Symphony. When the planning began, it was not known that two World and U.S. Champions—Brian Boitano and Debi Thomas—would represent this area.

George T. Yonekura, as President of the USFSA, helped to develop the plans for the performance. Don Laws agreed to act as Director for the event which would bring together the Oakland Symphony Orchestra and top names in skating for a grand evening to include a formal dinner, a full symphonic ice show, and a society jazz cast party.

When the final evening arrived, April 26, there was not an empty seat in the entire coliseum. The dinner party had been highly successful. Symphony lovers and skating enthusiasts mingled from boxes to gallery. The modulated buzz of fans created an excitement only heightened by tuxedos, silk, sequins, and furs on those who would see and be seen. The glamour was not all backstage that night.

The spotlights were ready, the 86 members of the orchestra warmed up, as did the skaters, and after delaying because of the logistics of seating 13,000 people, conductor, Richard Buckley, bounded onto his podium. After the playing of the national anthem, Peggy Fleming appeared, resplendent in a dazzling white evening gown, and sketched a history of the orchestra, and then introduced the skaters. From then on, it was a non-stop display of brilliant skating and live music accompaniment.

The evening of fluid, innovative quality was heightened by special lighting effects accenting the theme of each performance. Music masters such as Strauss, Copeland, and Stravinsky plus contemporaries Vangelis, Anka, and Bernstein were among the bill of fare. The ballet "Graduation Ball" the Olym-

pic opening, and the final American flag salute, were all beautifully choreographed by Wanda Guntert and Karen Kresge. Precision and line numbers were graceful, not stiff, as performed by a chorus of Bay Area skaters who devoted months of Sunday mornings to this endeavor. The task presented to Sandy Erle and Roy H. Cofer of the St. Moritz Ice Skating Club was artfully handled.

Highlights of the evening included Peggy Fleming's initimitable skating grace, Charles Tickner's charismatic "My Way" grin, Jill Watson and Peter Oppegard's exciting rendition of "The Firebird," Renee Roca and Donald Adair's classic pas de deux which covered the ice in three-quarter time, and the newly crowned World Champions Debi Thomas and Brian Boitano, each with a unique gift to the musical world on ice.

"Die Fledermaus" was exciting in itself but richly complimented by Kathryn Adams. The personable talents of Daniel Doran and Yvonne Gomez skated as complimentary blue-and-white jewels in motion. Rudy Galindo and Kristi Yamaguchi garnered a permanent spot in the hearts of the audience, as drummer and school girl they performed a delicate but strong pas de deux from "The Graduation Ball"

PHYSICAL FITNESS IN FIFTEEN MINUTES PER DAY

(or, How to Complete Six Sequences of the Kilian without Needing Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation)

How does one establish an effective personal exercise program? That is a common question I am asked by my patients, adult skating friends, and medical colleagues who know of my interest in physical conditioning through skating, cycling, and weight training. There is a simple approach to physical fitness which centers on monitoring one's pulse rate and adjusting the intensity of the exercise to maintain a predetermined "target heart rate."

This method is effective for any type of exercise. I personally have applied it primarily to skating laps for on-ice conditioning and bicycling/exercycling for off-ice conditioning. When exercise intensity is limited to match the natural physiological response of one's heart rate, breathless side pains and sore muscles can be avoided which generally tend to limit enthusiasm for further exercise. Although this concept is primarily for adults, the basic principle may be applied to any age group. (It is significant that the Olympic Bicycling team was able to reach peak conditioning more quickly by starting each training day with thirty minutes on exercycles.)

What is a reasonable heart rate and how can it be calculated for different people. Cardiologists have determined that the most efficient means of reconditioning an out-of-condition heart is to exercise it at 80 percent of its theoretical maximal rate. This rate varies with age. Newborns and children are capable of the highest heart rates and the rest of us are capable of lower rates.

There are several means for calculating target heart rates. I prefer the simplicity of the following equation:

(220 - your age) x .80 = Target Heart Rate. For example, a 40-year-old former competitor would subtract 40 from 220 for a maximum predicted heart rate of 180 beats per minute. Eighty percent of 180 is 144, which is his exercise target heart rate. The highest it should be allowed to go before decreasing the intensity of the exercise is 85 percent of maximum, or, in this example, 180 x .85, which equals 153 beats per minute.

The next step is exceedingly difficult for those basically competitive in nature. Whether skating laps, cycling, running, swimming, or whatever, do *not* be concerned with speed or distance covered, ("Wow, I did thirty-two laps in ten minutes." This sounds good in the locker room but is meaningless.). Two laps in thirty minutes while maintaining one's target heart rate is *much better* than fifty laps in thirty minutes, if the exerciser's heart rate never exceeds 60 percent of predicted maximum.

The next question is: How much exercise intensity do I need to attain my target heart rate? At this point we must consider the three parts of the training session: warm-up, aerobic conditioning, and cool-down. Whether skating laps, exercycling, running, or whatever exercise, start at a slow pace, and in the case of exercycling at low enough resistance, to increase the pulse only slightly. The resistance and/or pace should be gradually increased, so that at the end of five minutes the target heart rate has been attained. The pulse rate should be counted every minute or two until the target rate is attained. Since there is a considerable drop in the pulse rate during the first minute after exercise is stopped, it is best to count for fifteen seconds and multiply by four.

When skating laps or riding my stationary exercycle, I use a pulse counter which attaches to my earlobe. This gives me an accurate, continuous digital display of my pulse rate, which I can then alter appropriately by changing my pace while skating laps or the degree of resistance on the exercycle. In spite of trying several types and brands, I haven't yet found a pulse counter which will remain accurate while running or bicycling on the road. (I will admit, however, I have not gone to the expense of trying the pulse counters which strap to the chest and respond to the electrical activity of the heart.)

Now that we have warmed up slowly and attained our target heart rate, how long should we maintain it? The minimum time needed to obtain significant physiological benefit is ten minutes at the target heart rate. This would then be followed by two to three minutes minimal resistance or slow pace, to cool down. The total workout would then last seventeen to twenty minutes and should be repeated at least four times per week. As noted above, this represents the minimum training need for minimum, but nevertheless noticeable, improvement in one's physical

conditioning. Optimum results would be achieved by a daily workout which maintains the target heart rate for thirty minutes. Most will end up with an exercise schedule somewhere between those two extremes.

Generally, somewhere between ten minutes and thirty minutes time, the pulse rate will begin to increase even though the pace and/or resistance has not been increased. This is the end of one's basic conditioning. At this point, the pace should be slowed, the resistance decreased so that the predetermined target heart rate is not exceeded. As conditioning improves, a faster pace and/or higher resistance will be needed to maintain the target heart rate. It will also take longer before the workload has to be reduced in order to prevent "over-revving" the heart. Depending upon an individual's beginning state of conditioning, or lack thereof, the goal of attaining the target heart rate and maintaining it for thirty minutes without a reduction in pace/resistance will be achieved in several weeks to several months. A skater can then do three full laps of the Kilian and still carry on a conversation with his/her partner (provided both are still standing and on speaking terms after six consecutive Kilian Choctaws!)

There are a few things to remember when exercycling: Be certain the seat is set high enough that the knee is almost, but not quite, fully extended when the pedal is in its lowest position. If the seat is lower than this, too much internal stress is applied to the overly-flexed knee and can result in premature osteoarthritis. The easiest way to make this adjustment is to have the knee straight with the heel on the pedal while in the full down position. This will leave a slight bend in the knee while pedaling with the ball of the foot.

The best approach to exercycling is to first establish a constant pedal rpm, or cadence. If one intends to switch from the exercycle to bicycling during the warm months, than a cadence of 70 to 90 rpm is preferable. The individual then controls the heart rate by altering the resistance on the wheel while maintaining a constant pedal cadence.

In summary, anyone can attain and maintain adequate aerobic condition with three or four workouts, lasting seventeen to thirty minutes each, per week. There is no need to be concerned with "how fast," "how far," or

MAINTAINING TEAM MORALE

Skating on a precision team demands commitments and sacrafice. Skaters may have to give up some social activities, school functions, etc. to practice. Full attendance is essential if a practice is to be productive. Skaters *must* accept responsibility if they are to be a vaulable member of the group.

The following is an example of a team contract. It is mailed to the skater in the beginning of the season and is to be returned within two weeks to the coach, or team manager, signed by the skater and parent.

To Skaters and Parents:

Welcome to (Name of Team). We are looking forward to a busy and exciting year. As a member, you are resposible for attending all practices. Three excused absences are permitted throughout the year. The coach, team captain, and/or manager must be notified if you will not be present. Attendance will be taken each week by team manager or captain. A \$1.00 fine will be imposed for any additional absences. If absences exceed seven, an alternate will be substituted in your place for the next competition.

You are responsible for your behavior on and off the ice. Sportsmanlike conduct is a must. Courtesy is always expected. You represent (Name of Club) and (Name of Team). Your actions and attitude will be a reflection on the club and team. Failure to comply with conduct code will result in suspension or dismissal from the team).

All team members shall support fund raising activities. Working together is the only way we will achieve our goal. If you have any questions regarding this contract, please contact your team managers!

I have read the team contract. I understand my duties and responsibilities. As a member of (Name of Team).

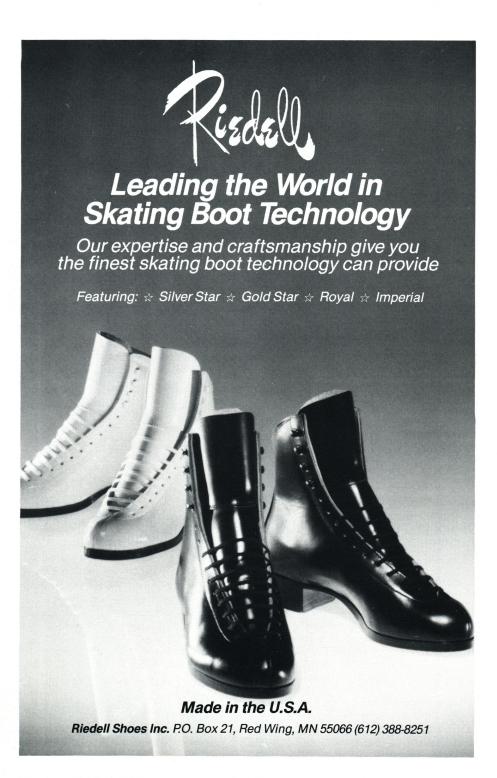

SHOULD YOUR CLUB MERGE?

As rinks close and skating costs increase, merging is one way for figure skating clubs to survive. In fact, many currently successful clubs, such as the Peninsula Figure Skating Club, are the results of mergers. Should you be thinking about merger?

One basic consideration usually does not need any additional analysis. If yours is a small club operating in a privately owned rink, doubling or tripling club size will make a significant difference to rink management valuable to the club. A fifty member USFSA club on the average provides a rink with only about five to ten percent of its total revenue. Figure skating club revenue is about the smallest item in the rink's list of income sources from ice surface rental or utilization. You can expect to be given higher priority treatment if your club doubles or triples its ice time requirements, because a merger has doubled or tripled its membership.

There are three conditions to be met, to determine if a merger is definitely worth investigating. Are there clubs nearby? Is a larger club going to help your members meet their survival related goals better? Is there a body of members and leaders in your club ready to work towards merger? If the answer to all three of these questions is "yes," you may be almost ready to begin conversations with neighbors. If "no" is the answer to any of these three questions, then the issue is whether things can or may change.

Obviously, your club is unlikely to start up new clubs just to merge with later; the effort required to do so probably means that no one club is likely to try to change the answer to the first question from "no" to "yes." But, answers to the other two questions can change with time, and will change if the right kind of effort is put into changing them. In a later article, we will discuss what to do to develop merger discussions. In this article, however, we are concerned with how to answer the three merger questions.

Let's consider the first question. In large metropolitan areas, any or all neighboring clubs may be merger candidates. It is worth considering them all, even though previous relationships between some of them may not be all warm and fuzzy. Thinking about the strengths that each could bring to a merger will help to clarify everybody's purpose. Furthermore, it makes for better politics to consider all possibilities from the time you begin. The more options you consider, the better.

Think also about the advantages as well as the disadvantages of letting all the clubs in the area know that you are considering merger, before getting locked into serious discussion with just one club. It takes two to tango, and the dancing is better when both partners really want to be on the floor. But the other clubs cannot know you are interested unless you tell them.

The second question—about survival goals—is a tough one to answer. If a club has been active for a number of years, it undoubtedly has developed a character of its own. Whatever its traditions may be, some members will believe more strongly in some parts of the tradition than in club survival. That is what we mean by a survival goal. For example, take the member who says, "I don't want to have any part of a club unless it gives number one priority to ice dancing." If enough members agree, then one survival goal of that club is to provide a setting for ice dancing. Close judgement is needed to decide if a club has too many survival goals, or too few. The question is a tough one to answer when the judgement calls are too close. Two or three strong, clear survival goals probably indicate optimum conditions for a

"how much resistance." Simply calculate your target heart rate (220 minus your age) x .80, and adjust your pace (skating, jogging, bicycling) or the pedal resistance (exercycling) to maintain the predetermined target rate.

Begin slowly, so as to include a short (three to five minutes) cool-down period. Adequate weight control, a subject for another time, should be included in the training plan. If you have been sedentary for a significant period of time and/or have been ill, a medical examination should be obtained before undertaking significant exercise. By using the ageadjusted target heart rate, anyone who is otherwise physically capable, can use this simple approach to physical conditioning.

bones thin out very quickly with lack of suitable movement.

It is important to remember that experience, body knowledge and sense of self come only with age, while actual physical equipment is limited by time. Skaters sometimes hit their physical prime before their personality and skill have matured, but good training can extend physical powers so they continue to serve while the other sides of skating are developing.

Campbell Kids

on and off the ice

Performing intricate dance steps, exciting spins, and jumps, the Campbell Kids have skated to ice dancing fame, proving that at the age of eighty-two they have yet to reach their peak.

The Campbell Kids, a universal identity for Campbell's Soups, started out as simple childhood doodles and went on to portray characters from almost every walk of life before they ventured on to the ice. The Kids were "born" in 1904 when Grace Drayton added some sket-

ches to her husband's advertising layout for Campbell's streetcar advertising cards. She had been doing this type of drawing since childhood when she discovered that her "self-portraits" delighted her playmates. Mrs. Dayton continued to draw the chubby tots throughout the years, consulting the mirror from time to time.

When Campbell's advertising agency recommended that some "character" be added to the streetcar posters, Grace's cherubic kids were made public. By 1905, the Campbell Kids were starring in streetcar, magazine, and newspaper advertisements nationwide. From 1905 through 1912, the Campbell Kids popularity grew and were in the consumer spotlight. People sent Campbell Kid postcards and kept score on Campbell Kid bridge tallies. The Kids smiled out from grocery store windows, and Campbell's mailing envelopes proclaimed, "From the home of the Campbell Kids." All newspaper and car card advertising was dropped in 1917 when the United States went to war and the Kids were used to promote better nutrition on the home front in magazine ads.

For the next twenty years, the Kids were in and out of advertising but in the 50's they became media stars again, appearing in commercials for the Campbell-sponsored *Lassie* television show. During that time, Campbell undertook a revision to update and standardize the Kids' artwork with "correct" eyelashes, eye position, noses, necks, and kneecaps.

In 1983, the Kids slimmed down and started practicing sports to show support for the athletes competing in the 1984 Winter Olympics at Sarajevo, Yugoslavia, where Campbell's was the "official soup." The Kids were depicted skiing, bobsledding, speed and figure skating, and playing ice hockey on the labels of five Campbell's Soup varieties. After Campbell's became the first national sponsor of the U.S. Figure Skating Team, the Kids celebrated by taking to the ice at a debut performance at 1983 Skate America in Rochester, New York.

Filling the skates of the Campbell Kids is a well-known and admired duo—the most honored American ice dance team in history—Jim and Judy

Sladky. Five-time U.S. Ice Dancing Champions, the Sladkys also made their mark as 1969, 1971, and 1972 World Bronze Medalists and 1970 World Silver Medalists. The Sladkys also set a special place for themselves in ice dancing history in 1968 when they demonstrated their sport to an Olympic panel formed to consider including ice dancing in the Olympics. When the speciality was sanctioned as an Olympic sport, the Sladkys were invited to choreograph a compulsory dance for the competition. Their creation, "The Yankee Polka," is the only compulsory dance ever choreographed by a U.S. team and became an authorized pattern in 1971.

The Sladkys are also well-known for their colorful careers as professional skaters. They have skated with "Ice Follies," "Holiday on Ice," "Disney's World on Ice," and Charles Schulz's "Snoopy on Ice." As the Campbell Kids, Jim and Judy appear at major skating





events each year, including Superskates and the U.S. Figure Skating Championships' "Exhibition of Champions." At the '86 Nationals in Uniondale, New York, the Kids performed a new routine created to celebrate Campbell's renewal of its U.S. Figure Skating Team sponsorship through 1988.

The original Kid routine, created to bell's modern-age mascots. portray two children just learning to skate, used expressions, tricks, and struggling movements that beginners would use. The new routine, however, is more sophisticated and shows how the skating Kids have improved. Opening with a large segment from the "Yankee Polka," the routine features an effortless sliding split, knee drape and a lift from a spiral followed by a single turn-around. The Kids also execute a throw Axel, individual shoot-the-ducks in unison, and a death spiral with a twist.

An impressive act: but why would anyone want to perform this routine wearing hot, oversized clothing, shoulder pads, and an eight-pound head? Part of

the reason, the Sladkys agree, is that it gives them the opportunity to acknowledge Campbell's support of the U.S. Figure Skating Team. "When we were competing, the sport had no corporate sponsorship, and that made it very difficult for many skaters," says Jim. "We know first-hand how important corporate involvement is, especially during non-Olympic years when skaters really need support to finance training."

"Besides that," Judy continues, "skating as the Kids is fun and challenging, and it allows the Sladkys to do what they love most. A few years ago, we thought it would be interesting to pursue individual careers," Judy recalls, "but we found it was to hard to go from working while holding hands for most of our lives to being apart."

Now that the Kids have firmly established their fame on the ice, skaters and skating fans can look forward to many more dazzling performances by Camp-

merger. If two or three survival goals are present, there are clearly a number of people who want their interests protected; but their aspirations are not so varied, numerous, or conflicting as to become immobilizing. The best mergers seem to combine clubs with somewhat different patterns of survival goals but with enough overlapping interests that the major survival goals of all the clubs involved can be reached more easily after merger than before.

Now, the third question: Is there a large enough body of members and leaders in your club ready to work towards merger? This question actually isn't so tough. If you get favorable responses from the majority of those you talk to, and you talk to ten to fifteen percent of the members, that's enough to start with, especially if it includes several of the permanent leaders of the club—people who have been officers, are officers, or will soon be officers, and who are usually among those consulted about major issues. To succeed, you have to have enough of a nucleus of interested people that you can stir up a lot of enthusiasm quickly, pass the word quickly when necessary, and be reasonably sure of being in touch with any major bodies of opinion in the club that are different from one another.

Once the preconditions have been met, you will need to argue your case, at least with the officers and the board, and maybe the membership more broadly. It is rarely wise for a rump group to initiate merger discussions with another club's representatives. All you need, after all, is official consent to go and find out if somebody else is interested and to develop possible terms of merger if anybody responds. If you cannot get authorization for an ad hoc committee to at least explore merger possibilities, obviously, you aren't ready yet.

However, once you have demonstrated that you have met the preconditions, and have the charter you need to talk with other clubs, then it is time to find out if anybody really wants to talk with you. Some advice on merger discussions will be covered next month.

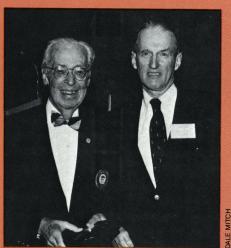

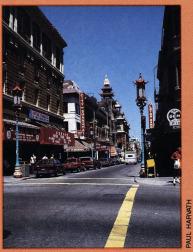

One more thing the blood's hemoglobin concentration rises, which allows a given volume of blood to carry more oxygen than usual.

So if those skates start giving you icicle toes, get them off fast. Then walk, run, jump, hop, skip, do anything to get the heart pumping and the circulation going. Do it for about ten minutes, but leave the boots off until the toes feel normal again. If you're away from the ice rink and experience chills, get moving if you can and keep moving. Sure, it may seem silly at first, even idiotic, but it works. Don't raise the thermostat; raise your body onto your feet. No telling how much money you can save on heating bills, not to speak of doctor bills with your "heat pump" doing its job.

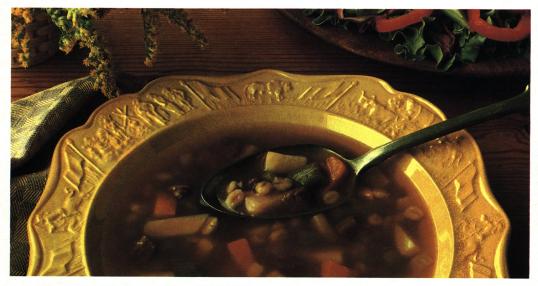
