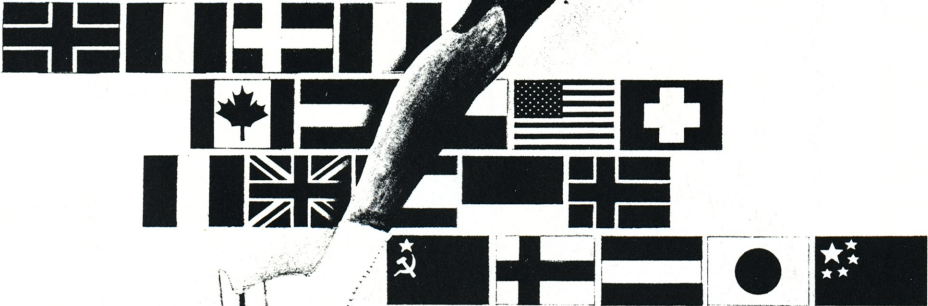

For the last two months the subject here has been judging and judgments—decision making, we'll call it. In many sports, decision making needs to be rapid-fire, instinctive, reflexive. Officials must make snap judgments in baseball, basketball, football, ice hockey, and diving, to name a few. Since most decisions are irreversible, most coaches go crazy when the judgment goes against them. When today's all-seeing TV eye shows up judging blunders, the viewing world goes crazy, and the cries of "incompetence" and "criminal" are mild compared with what the viewer is thinking.

If a Montana or a Marino throws an interception and says, "I never saw the guy," not much happens. Never saw the guy? The interceptor is 6'5", weighs 240 pounds, and in uniform looks like King Kong. Didn't see him? No, of course not, he really didn't, and these quarterbacks are superstars! They misread blitzes, call wrong plays, fumble, the coach says, "Shucks (or something like that), tough luck, Napoleon, it's just a game. We'll get 'em next week." However, let a referee blow a call, particularly one that decides a game, and suddenly he is wanted for manslaughter, murder, or worse.

Look at it this way:

Once in a while, we professionals judge in ISIA (Ice Skating Institute of America) competitions. The judging format is somewhat different from USFSA events. Compulsory moves within the routine are judged separately. Each judge is responsible for two or three, in addition to grading the entire routine. This makes for interesting and often entertaining judging. It also sets up a certain individual for some remarkable goofing.

Let's set the scene: You are one of three judges, with a referee overseeing all. Your score sheet shows you are to grade ten skaters on their Salchow jump and back spiral and also evaluate the complete routine. Things have been, well to now, easy judging, no problems. You relax a bit as the fifth skater performs. She finishes, and you have not seen a Salchow.

Puzzled, you turn to the referee and ask, "Did you see a Salchow?"

He answers, "Yes, near the beginning?"

A cold shiver hits your spine. The other two judges smile sympathetically and say, "It was a good one."



They weren't even looking for it! You have taught skating for a hundred years, seen a thousand skaters and a million routines, you've been staring at a youngster for just one and one-half minutes, watching, *waiting* for a Salchow, and you miss it? Unbelievable! Yet it happened, does happen, and will continue to happen. I will *not* try to explain it.

Speaking of marks, what about those high and low marks we see tossed around constantly? What about those second and eleventh places to the same skater that we accept with such bewilderment? And those "prejudiced judges." What about them?

If two people are watching something, aren't they seeing the same thing? Possibly not. "Wwwelll, they *should!*" Not necessarily. If they all saw the same thing, then only one pair of eyes is all that would be needed.

In fact, there is so much to see and analyze, so much to weigh, that the possible combinations of qualities and errors is gigantic. "But experts should know. If they don't, they shouldn't judge!" True, so true. Oh, how I wish judging could be like the alphabet or the multiplication table. It wouldn't be half as exciting as it is now, but it would quell many uprisings in ice rinks.

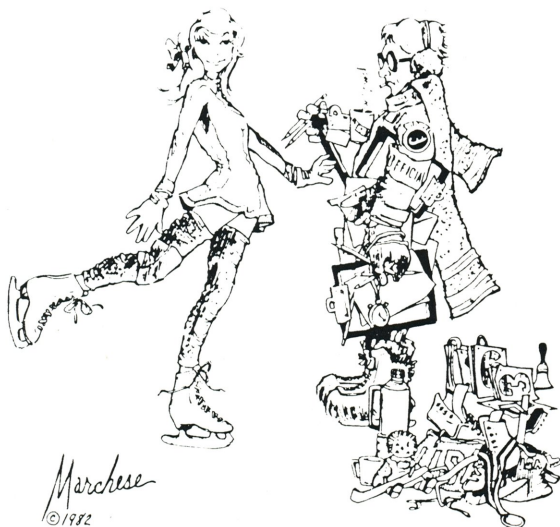

Lately I have received several letters from skaters asking me to write a column on Warming Up. I talk so much about this subject and presented "Warm-Up Exercises" at the Sports Medicine Clinic at 1985 Nationals, as well as making a video cassette with Dr. Douglas Bradley for the USFSA on warm-ups and stretches, that I was sure I had written a column about it.

I was surprised, however, after checking through all the articles I have written for *Skating* magazine, to find that indeed, I did not write one on that subject. So skaters, here it is.

All training and exercise periods should begin with warm-ups. Warming up means raising the body temperature through heating the blood and muscles. The heart starts beating faster and the blood vessels open wider to increase blood flow to the muscles and nerve cells so they may receive the oxygen and sugar picked up from the liver and stomach which is needed to function, and release carbon dioxide and waste products that hinder these functions, by carrying them out through the kidneys and lungs.

All of this allows the muscles to work harder, thus increasing skating capacity. When the blood pumps faster, the heart rate rises and all reactions are faster and more efficient, because nerve messages travel faster at higher temperatures. The increased blood flow also improves lung circulation.

In most every sport there are periods set aside for warm-ups and stretches before hard physical activity begins. All dance classes begin with warm-ups as well as technique exercises, followed by stretching before the floor work and dancing begins. These periods are usually thirty to forty-five minutes in length.

Warming up also helps equilibrium, which is the state of balance between two opposite forces, resulting in no change in the state of the body. A sense of balance comes from the position of the equilibrium equipment, which affects the muscles automatically. If muscles do not respond fast enough, there will be an impression of insecurity. The main idea is to feel a vertical line through ninety-five percent of a skating program, except for the times when a skater is doing camel spins, but-

terflies, and spirals, but even then you have to have a center of balance.

Muscles are stiff and slow when they are not warmed up. This disturbs equilibrium. Warmed muscles will respond automatically to equilibrium without having to think about it. It is more reasonable then, to warm up your body, and subsequently your equilibrium, on the floor, before you start to disturb your equilibrium equipment with complicated spins and multiple revolution jumps on the ice.

So then, the basic steps of a warm-up are first to accelerate the blood circulation and increase your heart rate. This also accelerates your metabolism, which is the process by which nourishment and waste products are handled in the body, resulting in the use and release of energy. Muscles should be warmed up according to size: legs and buttocks, back, arms, and shoulders, stomach, and the twisting muscles of the torso.

Because skaters have the unique problem of a tight patch and freestyle schedule, I have arranged a two-minute warm-up that could be done between patch and freestyle, that will accelerate the heart rate and blood flow to the muscles, making them more stable and elastic. Warming up helps prevent injury when circulation increases and lubrication occurs around the main joints that work in skating.

Many skaters think they are warming up when they go to the rail and perform a series of stretching exercises before they skate, but *stretching is not warming up*. Stretching is increasing flexibility, making the muscles longer and more elastic. It is best to stretch *after* the body is warmed up and the muscles are more elastic.

Next month, I will present the exercises in the two-minute warm-up.

SKATERS' SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

The newly established Skaters' Sponsorship Program (SSP) opens the way for an amateur skater to receive sponsorship by using his or her skill or reputation in skating. Starting this year, money received by the USFSA on the skaters' behalf is placed in a trust fund in his or her name. It may be withdrawn to cover any skating related expenses which are able to be substantiated by paid receipts.

The International Skating Union (ISU) rules state: "A person is not an eligible participant in skating if he or she has permitted their name, picture, personal appearance, or performance to be used to advertise any commercial product, service, or enterprise, except in accordance with contracts entered into either by the ISU or the Member (USFSA) concerned. All payments to be made under such contracts shall be to the ISU or to the Member and not directly to the athlete concerned." This is reiterated in the USFSA rule ASR 3.013. Restated in a positive way, this means that all of these things are allowed, but only if a contract exists between the commercial sponsor *and* the USFSA.

In addition to sponsorship, in return for some activity, skaters may have opportunities for donated funds. Many questions center about the subject of donations, so perhaps we can clear up some of the evident confusion by a brief explanation of the alternatives from which donors may choose.

First, it should be understood that if a skater engages in any activity stated in the ISU rule quoted above in return for a sum of money, that money cannot be considered a donation: *it is a payment.*

There is one circumstance in which a gift of appreciation, be it merchandise, gift bond, or check, may be received in return for a guest appearance in an amateur carnival. This is spelled out in SR 13.00 and is strictly limited by the ISU. Any request for a donation exceeding \$200 in return for a performance could cause a skater to lose his or her eligibility to compete. This is not to say that performing in return for larger amounts will not be allowed, but to do so would require

a contract between the sponsoring entity and the USFSA as stated in the rules.

When we think of donations we think first of the Memorial Fund. That is the normal course through which donations flow. All gifts to the Memorial Fund provide a tax deduction to the donor. Through the Restricted Fund of the Memorial Fund the giver may specify a particular club to which the money is to be sent. The money is then passed along to individual members by the club's directors. The only restriction is that the donor cannot be a close relative of a skater who receives the money. Ten percent of the total is placed in the General Fund of the Memorial Fund to pay for administration costs and for the benefit of other skaters who may apply for assistance.

Donations may be made directly to a skater's trust fund through the Skaters' Sponsorship Program. If a skater doesn't have a trust account, one may be opened with a minimum of \$100. There is no tax deduction, and therefore it is anticipated that most donors will choose the Memorial Fund. Five percent of all money which is directed to a trust, whether earned or donated, is placed in the Memorial Fund budget to help defray postage, telephone, clerical, and other expenses.

A third, rather obvious, alternative for someone wishing to aid a skater is simply to make a direct gift. One person may give another \$10,000 a year without paying a gift tax. If a skater does absolutely nothing contrary to the rules to earn the money, his or her amateur status should not be jeopardized. Of course, there is no tax deduction or material benefit to the giver.

Another area of confusion concerns the use of agents. Any skater is free to hire an agent or sign up with an advertising agency. However, although the USFSA will make every effort to answer questions and be helpful, it does not arrange agents or agencies. However, the contract must be between the commercial sponsor and the USFSA. An agent may find a skater many opportunities. Each one will require a separate contract.

ABROAD

THE 1987 BRITISH CHAMPIONSHIPS

Three of the four titles were successfully defended at the British Championships, held in November. As usual, the Dance event took place separately at Nottingham, the other three in Solihull, near Birmingham.

Joanne Conway, who the previous season had become the nation's youngest queen of the ice in thirty-two years, comfortably retained her crown. Subsequent maturity, despite her youth, showed through when, with the calm assurance of a veteran, the athletically powerful north-easterner timed every jump take-off and landing with well-judged aplomb, including triple toe loop and triple Salchow jumps. Her spins, with minimum travel, and well-planned linking steps were technically efficient and artistically presented.

The manner of her victory should bolster the confidence of Conway, following her disappointing form at the last European Championships, widely attributed to understandable tension and lack of experience in her first Senior season.

The silver medal was a notable achievement for Fiona Hamilton, twenty, after missing out the year before because of an injured ankle. It was a fine comeback for the London-based Scot who finished third in 1984.

Third was Gina Fulton, who, like the champion, will not be sixteen until March. She did well enough to endorse previously held convictions of a rewarding international career in prospect. Fulton, from Durham, narrowly failed to overhaul Hamilton. She included more jump combinations than the champion, but faultily landed a triple Salchow and a triple loop, the only one attempted in the contest.

The growing influence of Kerry Leitch, the Canadian coach at Kitchener, Ontario,

became more apparent this time. The retention of the Pairs' title by Nottingham's Cheryl Peake and Andrew Naylor was almost assured by their close season training under his guidance. There is little doubt that they are fast becoming the best pair Britain has produced since John and Jennifer Nicks took the World title in 1953. Their fast-developing talents in overhead lifts, jump throws, and matching solo spins were enhanced by their ideal difference in height—Naylor fractionally under six feet and his partner ten inches shorter. For the second time, they defeated Lisa and Neil Cushley, the brother and sister who were runners-up for a second time after having won in 1984.

Leitch is also the man behind the heartening advancement of Blackpool's Paul Robinson, who has spent the last five summers with him in Kitchener. After winning all three figures with ease, Robinson endorsed his superiority in the short, despite falling from a double Axel. He captured the vacant title after being runner-up for four consecutive years, landing four different triples in the long and failing a fifth in his best-ever performance. Spencer Durrant was second on his home ice and Sunderland's Ashley Moore third. Moore, who at twenty-three transferred to ice after being national champion on roller skates for three years, skated with a fractured bone in the side of his foot.

Sharon Jones and Paul Askham predictably held on to the ice dance title at Nottingham, marked by all nine judges at every stage. Much the most experienced in the field, the graceful duo amply consolidated their lead in the compulsories with a convincing set pattern Viennese Waltz in traditional style. Their innovative free dance put victory beyond doubt, repeating the performance which had earned them second place in the

St. Ivel International at Richmond in September—a stirring crowd-pleaser to Glenn Miller-type music of the forties.

Second place was secured with equal conviction by Elizabeth Coates and Alan Abretti from Streatham. Danielle Biss and David Crofts of Lee Valley completed the same top three order as in the previous season.

Noticeable was a general return to more authentic free dance routines with less gimmicky showmanship which, since the departure of Torvill and Dean, have been largely discouraged by the powers that be.

NEW ENGLANDS

Tracey Damigella, SC of Boston, was in second place in Senior Ladies going into the final round, just as she had been a year ago at New Englands, and, as she had then, skated her way to the gold medal. Tracey looked to be in good form after competing in both Skate America and Skate Canada within the previous three weeks, and appeared relaxed as she took the ice for the long.

Her long free program was fluid, if conservative, since she had no reason to fear an upset. She attempted two triples, making the Salchow and stepping out on the toe loop, three double Axels (fell on one) and a series of outstanding spins, all of the skating done with considerable maturity and style.

The figures had been won by Tracey Seliga, Colonial FSC, and she had continued to lead after placing second behind Damigella in the short, but her free skating was not competitive. She narrowly eked out third in that section, retaining the silver medal.

Tracie Brown, SC of Boston, skated an inspired long program. After landing her triple-double and her double Axel, Tracie seemed totally in charge and placed second in the free, winning the bronze. Cristen Wisner, New Haven SC, landed most of her jumps cleanly as she earned her way to Easterns with a fourth-place finish.

Junior Ladies attracted the most attention as it generally does at a regional. Last year's first and second Novice finishers battled it out for the top again, this time as Juniors. Dawn Duhamel, SC of Boston, won the figures with Liane Moscato, SC of Boston, who challenged Dawn at last year's New Englands and who would do so again, in fifth place.

Nancy Kerrigan, SC of Boston, ninth in figures, won the short easily. Her combination had double toe loop and then triple toe loop, and she jumped a splendid delayed Axel, tying it all together with difficult footwork. Moscato placed next in the short. Her combination was double Axel to double toe and her flying sit spin was the best of the event. Liane also had excellent footwork and

a fine combination spin. Dawn Duhamel had some trouble with her double Axel combination, but her fine spins and fast footwork elevated her to fifth in short and kept her in first place.

Nancy Kerrigan was again the winner in the long, but her rise to the top stopped at the third step of the podium. She alerted everyone that fireworks lie ahead with her triple toe-triple toe, then did a marvelous layover camel and beautiful double Lutz, tried triple flip but got her hand down, and failed to hold another triple toe. However, she did a double Axel near the end and showed a new mastery for style with a fine section of attitudes and footwork.

Liane Moscato edged into second on the free and overall with a peppery program that had double Axel-double loop and some excellent spins and footwork, though some of her jumps were not clean. Dawn Duhamel was narrowly behind Liane in the free, but her consistency in the three sections enabled her to win the gold. She had a magnificent flying camel, and a layover-sit in a fast-paced program that had clever footwork. Pepi Pierce, Yarmouth IC, got the fourth spot to Easterns with a fifth in free, the best parts of which were her high double Axel and her double Lutz-double loop.

The Junior Pairs event set two evenly-matched couples in competition with one another, Wendy Weston and David Goodman, Yarmouth IC, eventually winning out over Sara and Robert Powell, SC of Boston. The short program resulted in a split decision, but in the free, both pairs skated poorly. Wendy and David fell less often, though many of their items were flawed, however, they had moments when they looked quite good in winning their first Junior Pairs' title.

Two Junior Men skated. John DePaz, SC of Boston, won the figures on a four-to-three split, but could not keep pace with Richard Sears, Colonial FSC, in the triple department. Richard won both free skating sections.

For the first time in five years there was a Senior Dance event. Ann Hensel, St. Moritz

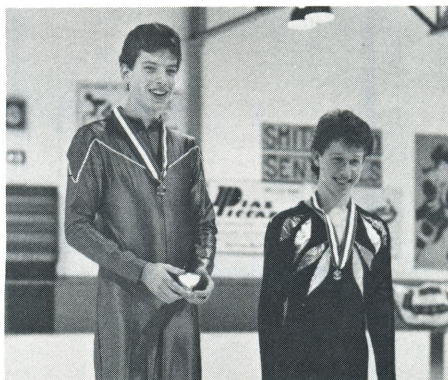

Their fine Viennese OSP added to their lead over Beth McLean, SC of Boston, and Ari Lieb, Babson SC. Beth and Ari's Blues was quite expressive and that dance was close.

Ari was skating with a broken hand and, finding himself unable to do the free dance lifts, was forced to withdraw. Because of the timing of the withdrawal, Ann and Jim skated their free dance and marks were raised. Their free dance, composed of east-European folk dances, was lively and very enjoyable.

Junior Dance was not the easy win that seemed likely for Amy Webster, SC of Boston, and John Millier, Kennebec SC. Though they did prevail in each section, they were not sharp. They had problems with balance in their Kilian, and had a fall and missed elements in their free dance. However, their edge and maturity as well as the difficulty of their programs served them well. Second place went to Chrissie Clark, Yale FSC, and Peter Breen, SC of Boston. Each is an accomplished skater, and they seemed to be enjoying their lively and free-wheeling free dance whose energy carried them to second place despite some mistakes.

Elizabeth Davidson, Kennebec SC, and Collin Sullivan, Babson SC, took second on the OSP after problems with their Kilian. Their OSP was clearly a Viennese Waltz, and it was beautifully-conceived with beneficial ballroom borrowings. Their free was judged third-best by a three to two margin that settled them into third place.

Tarah Donelan, Colonial FSC, found clear sailing in both her runoff and the final round of Novice Ladies, winning figures and free in each. Tarah showed control and diversity, combining her jumps and spins nicely into her program and skating with assurance. Jennifer DeRoche, North Shore SC, took second with a third in each section after she, too, had won her runoff. Melinda Swezey, SC of Boston, second in figures and fourth in free, was bronze medalist, while Zoe Gooding, SC of Boston, fifth in figures, placed second in freestyle with high jumps and numerous combinations.

Two Novice Men competed, Garrett Swasey, SC of Boston, winning the figures

and Robert Love, Commonwealth FSC, the free (and the gold medal) on the strength of a cleaner program.

There were four Intermediate Men. E. Stuart Golden, SC of Boston, third in figures, did a magnificent free skating program with many combination jumps, including an early one with three double toe loops and a double loop. Stuart took the gold, Jay Warner, SC of Amherst, the silver, and Paul Frey, SC of Boston, the bronze. Fourth was Andrew Starr, SC of Amherst.

Marion Hogan and Leonard Colarusso, SC of Boston, won their third straight New England Adult Dance title. They demonstrated strong compulsories and a crisp Tango variation. They became the first recipients of the Frank Tieuli Memorial Trophy, donated this year from contributions collected by the New England Inter-Club Council in honor of the four-time New England and 1981 Eastern Adult Dance Champion. Frank's partner, Elaine Savoy presented the trophies to the winners. Rita and Joe Riess, SC of Boston, were second, Wendy Mlinar, Hickory Hill FSC, and Theodore Graves, Bridgeport SC, third, and Gail Connolly, Colonial FSC, and Lawrence Knox, Silver Blades SC, fourth in a competitive six-team event.

Intermediate Ladies was a scramble that went to Amanda Farkas, SC of Boston, who won her runoff as well. Amanda, third in figures in the final round, skated a balanced program of jumps and spins with a great blur spin at the end. Jennifer Frank, SC of Boston, second in figures and fourth in free, was second. Amanda Petersen, Winchester FSC, won the bronze, and the figures winner, Kate-Lyn O'Keefe, North Shore FSC, took fourth. Heather Callaghan, Flagg Pond SC, second in the free, but seventh in figures, narrowly missed Easterns, finishing fifth.

Three couples contested Intermediate Dance. First place went to Rachel Mayer and Garrett Swasey, SC of Boston, who had fine compulsories and out-skated their competitors on the variation. Julie-Anne Robinson and Andrew Schmitt, Warwick FSC, took second, and the third couple, Dawn Ponte and Dean Yeater, Smithfield FSC, were not far behind.

Pre-Intermediate Dance was skated for the first time this year, two teams entering. Each couple won one round, with Kristen Pedroso, Warwick Figure Skaters, and Daniel Zaluski,

Stone Mountain FSC, over second-place Keith Tindall, SC of Wilmington.

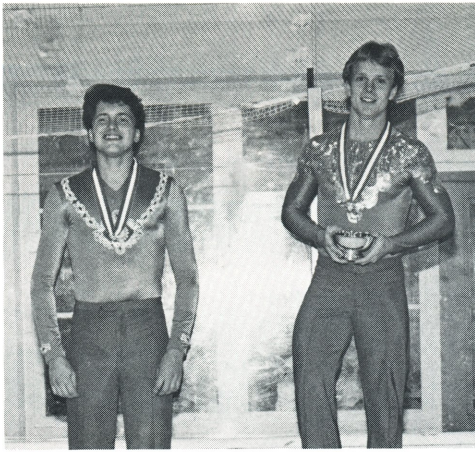

Colin VanderVeen, Atlanta FSC, who won the figures and short program, placed second. Pete Roberson, Atlanta FSC, was third, and David Warnke, Wissahickon SC, was fourth.

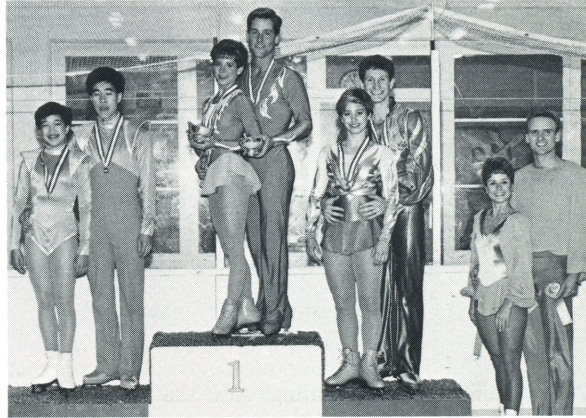

Senior Men was only a two-man contest, with Tom Cierniak, Chicago FSC, winning all three events. His long program began with a spectacular triple Lutz, but after that his program was lacking in many areas. Larry Holliday, also representing the Chicago FSC, was definitely the crowd favorite with his interpretation of "Ghostbusters." Technically, his program was outstanding with many exciting double and triple jumps. The audience's displeasure with the outcome was clearly heard as the free skating marks were displayed.

The Senior Ladies' figure event was soundly won by Melissa Motyka, of DuPage FSC. However, after her seventh-place finish in the short program, she was destined to be caught by the stronger free skaters. Nora Heitmeier, Creve Coeur FSC, won the short program with the most consistently executed elements. Her long program included two triple Salchows, one combined with a double toe loop, and a nice variety of other jumps and spins. However, it couldn't hold up to the dynamic performance of first-year Senior lady, Dawn Victorson, FSC of Bloomington. Her exciting long program included two triples and terrific double Axels. It was a performance deserving of her placement as Senior Ladies' Champion. Heitmeier finished second. Third and fourth places were up for grabs from the beginning of the competition. Theresa Pilarski, Lake Minnetonka FSC,

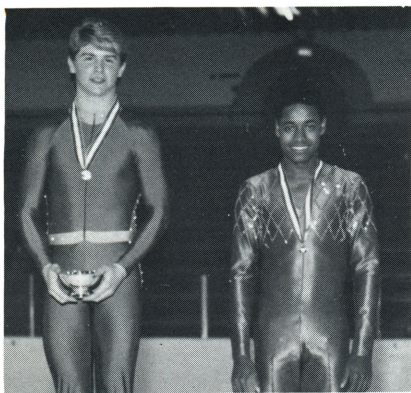
came home with the bronze, while Jennifer Johnson of the Braemar-City of Lakes FSC was fourth overall.

Gig Siruno, Lake Minnetonka FSC, was the Junior Men's Champion winning figures and long program. Short program was won by Tommy Jasper, Skokie Valley SC, although neither one of them completed all of the required elements. This division was marred by many popped and two-footed jumps.

Junior Ladies proved to be an elusive event to predict a winner. Kathryn Curielli won it with strength, speed, and well-executed triples. Shenon Badre, Skokie Valley FSC, placed fourth overall.

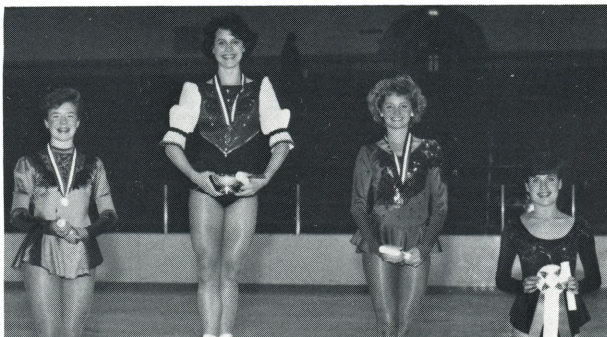

1987 WORLD JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 1987 World Junior Figure Skating Championships were hosted by our Canadian neighbors at Kitchener-Waterloo, located in the picturesque rolling farmland, one and one-half hours from Toronto. While other contestants were present and practicing on our Thanksgiving Day, the American team, parents, and coaches enjoyed a day of turkey, stuffing, and pumpkin pie at home. The following day, the talent-laden American team assembled and traveled to Kitchener to begin a most successful competition.

The only sad note in the preparations occurred on Tuesday before Thanksgiving, when Tonya Harding injured her foot. On a day-to-day basis Tonya, coach Diane Shatz-Rawlinson, and the team leaders hoped she would be able to compete. By Monday noon it was determined that her brilliant free skating ability would not be seen in Kitchener, due to the injury.

The decision was made to enter the named alternate, Holly Cook, who at that time was on her way back to Utah from a very good fourth-place finish at the NHK in Japan. Team leader, Har-

land Burge drew skating order number ten for her while she was still in flight to Utah. By midnight, Holly "have skates, will travel;" and Mom, Marge, were booked and ready, while coach, Chris Shirard redid the music. At 5:00 A.M., Tuesday, Holly practiced the "old" Junior figures for the first time in two years, boarded a plane and arrived in Kitchener, nine hours before the Ladies' competition was to begin.

In the meantime, the Men's division began on Tuesday, with a total of twenty-four entries. The quality of this championship was apparent, beginning with the Men's figures. Yuri Tsimbaliuk, USSR, grabbed the figure lead, followed by Todd Eldredge in second place, Rudy Galindo in third, and Cameron Birky in a strong fifth position. (Todd had taken a tremendous fall on a triple Lutz in practice the day before, painfully injuring his tail bone. A decision was made to keep him off practice ice for two days to facilitate recovery.)

Wednesday morning, twenty-four ladies began the compulsory figures. Again, the quality of the competition was exhibited in the excellent figure

skating by the top ladies. Susanne Becher, Federal Republic of Germany, showed her experience in international competitions and seized the lead. However, all eyes in the arena were on Holly Cook, even as she began her warm-ups. Holly displayed great confidence and command of the ice, even placing her loop in the opposite direction to her competitors and right in front of all the spectators to see, to finish a strong second. Not to be awed by the performance of her competitors was Cindy Bortz, with equally good figures for a third place.

Compulsory dances were also performed on Wednesday, including our young dance teams, Elizabeth Punsalan and David Shirk, Jennifer Goolsbee and Peter Chupa, in a field of fifteen. The group was dominated by the experienced Soviet teams, Ilona Melnichenko and Gennadii Kaskov, and Oksana Gritschuk and Aleksandr Chichkov, with Canadians Catherine Pal and Donald Godfrey in the middle of these two teams, followed closely by the French team, Sophie Moniotte and Pascal Lavanchy.

In the Wednesday evening Pair short program, Kristi Yamaguchi and Rudy Galindo, and sister-brother team Ginger and Archie Tse competed in a field of ten couples. Again, the USSR and the German Democratic Republic had quite strong entries as they traditionally do in international competition. However, in a nearly flawless performance, Kristi and Rudy finished fourth behind Elena Leonova and Gennadi Krasnitski, USSR, and Mandy Hannebauer and Marno Kreft, GDR, and Ekaterina Muragova and Artem Torgashev, USSR.

The three Americans made the Men's short program particularly exciting. No one was sure if Todd would be able to skate until the warm-up, when he reported he was ready, although still in some pain, but his drawing last to skate certainly helped. As the last group, in-

cluding the three Americans, came on the ice, it was apparent that all three were in their best competitive spirit. Rudy was absolutely in charge of the ice and set the standard with an error-free short program. Tsimbaliuk was clearly shaken by this performance and ended second. Cameron performed athletically and with a high level of attack, performing his triple Salchow-double toe loop combination with great speed and control to take fourth in the short program. Todd finished the evening with a courageous performance to place third in the short program overcoming the painful injury.

Thursday evening began with the Ladies' short program. The top eight ladies were the equal of any Senior lady field with all of them performing triple jumps in the jump combination, and each of them showing great athletic ability, yet with high artistry, indicating that many of these ladies can be expected to be seen in the Senior world championships. Cindy Bortz aggressively and confidently went after the short program and edged Susanne Becher for the top spot. A very close competition of the next four had Holly in fourth

place with the exciting Shannon Allison of Canada, third.

The Thursday finals of the Pair event were notable for the quality of the top teams and, most significantly for Kristi and Rudy brilliantly executing and performing with a sophistication beyond their years, finishing with the bronze medal firmly in their grasp, behind the first- and second-place Russian teams and ahead of the team from the German Democratic Republic and the third Russian team. Ginger and Archie placed a strong sixth with great unison on the ice. When one looks at the Eastern bloc pair quality over the years and recognizes that present world champions are a product of the World Juniors only a short time ago, the accomplishment of Kristi and Rudy has an added significance.

The Friday night Men's final event had its ups and downs for many, but again the American men dominated the free skating. This time Rudy followed Tsimbaliuk, and again the pressure of Rudy's consistency showed. Rudy, last year's silver medalist in these championships, confidently executed his triple Salchow, toe loop, and loop and moved to take the gold medal with an overall performance that gives one the feeling of a silky smoothness, similar to Tim Wood in the 1960's. He then, deservedly, sagged from all the singles and pair practices he had been through.

Todd, having held off from his triple Lutz for some three days, missed the jump at the beginning of his program, but, without hesitation, put it back in late in his program, along with all the other triples and walked away with the silver medal. Cameron challenged Tsimbaliuk for the bronze, but couldn't quite overtake him.

On Saturday the excitement of the Ladies and Free Dance finals peaked. A tired but aggressive Holly Cook chased Shannon Allison but could not quite catch her for the bronze medal. Susanne

Becher, last year's silver medalist, skated before Cindy and did not miss anything, executing her triple Salchow and toe loops quite well and demonstrated excellent composition, style, and a variety of spins. If Cindy was to win, she could not hold back . . . and she didn't. She attacked every jump and wound every spin up like a top. Late in the program, she set up her triple Lutz and jumped half her height with a clean landing, and the gold medal was hers.

The dance finals were all USSR, with the top two teams in first and second, but Canadians Pal and Godfrey stayed close for the bronze.

The accomplishments of our 1987 World Junior Team was outstanding, winning four medals, and also marked the first time ever in these championships that one individual (Rudy) has won medals in two different events.

These Junior championships also possessed a sportsmanship and comradery not normally seen in the World Championships. There was Archie, speaking in Chinese to the Chinese pair team telling them about a forbidden pair lift and helping them to get it right. There was Cameron, exciting a school crowd, and being encouraged to continue, by his competitors. There were the Eastern bloc athletes freely intermixing and cheering the other competitors. There was Bo Zhang and Liu Wei of China, timid but enjoying participating and taking advice from the others. The good sportsmanship and friendliness of these young people was most refreshing.

Too bad it all had to end . . . but those who get to go to the 1988 Championships in Brisbane, Australia, can look forward to the same youthful exuberance. We as the team leaders and team physician were most pleased to be a part of this delightful group of American skaters, coaches, and parents. Our only regret was having to give these youngsters back after a brief ten days.

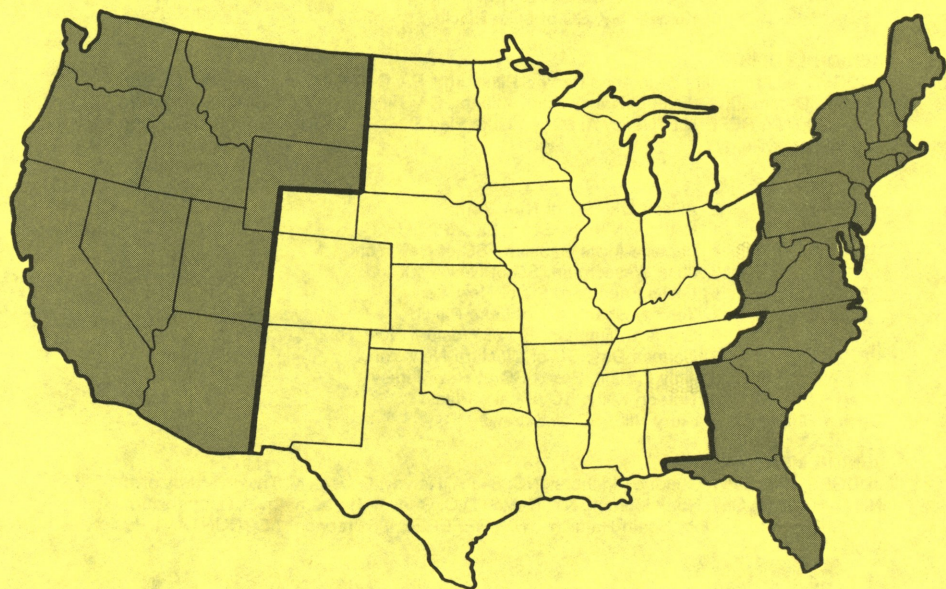

FINDING YOUR WAY AROUND AT WORLDS

The Riverfront Coliseum will be the site for the main events of the 1987 World Championships in Cincinnati.

Cincinnati, Ohio will be hosting the 1987 World Figure Skating Championships from March 9-15. For those visiting Cincinnati for the first time the following information should be helpful.

Housing

The designated hotels for the World Figure Skating Championships are: the Clarion Hotel, Hyatt Regency Cincinnati, Omni Netherland Plaza, Terrace Hilton Hotel (media only), Westin Hotel Cincinnati, Holiday Inn Downtown, Holiday Inn Riverfront, Quality Inn Riverview, and Vernon Manor Hotel. Additional hotels are being secured as the need arises. For further information contact the Greater Cincinnati Convention & Visitors Bureau, World Figure Skating Housing, 501 Vine Street, Cincinnati, Ohio 45202, or phone (513) 621-2119 for hotel availability. All reservations are made on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Transportation

Shuttle service from the Greater Cincinnati International Airport to the downtown hotels runs every half hour. The trip takes approximately fifteen minutes and costs \$7 one way or \$11 round trip.

Spectator Bus Passes: Spectators will be able to purchase bus passes good for the duration of the competition for \$20 (\$15 if purchased in advance). The shuttle stops at the downtown hotels and at the Riverfront Coliseum and Convention Center where the compulsory figures and practices will be held.

Food

Cincinnati is known for its excellent restaurants and many of the best are located downtown. Heading the list is the incomparable Maisonette which has earned its five-star rating for twenty-two consecutive years. Like the Maisonette, Pigall's serves impeccable French cuisine. The Gourmet Room, another four-star restaurant, specializes in Continental haute cuisine. Delmonico's overlooking Fountain Square, is noteworthy for its imaginative menu. Orchid's, located in the Omni Netherland Plaza, has an exquisite art deco decor. Top of the Crown, a revolving restaurant atop the Clarion Hotel, provides a panoramic view of the Cincinnati skyline. La Normandie and Champs are among Cincinnati's best steakhouses. If you like Italian food, Edwards is highly recommended. Cincinnati has a rich German

heritage and Grammer's the city's oldest restaurant, offers authentic German cuisine.

If you need to grab a quick bite between events, there are dozens of fast food establishments downtown. Visitors can sample Cincinnati's famous chili at Skyline or Gold Star. Pig In The Pocket offers barbecue rib sandwiches while Izzy's and the Red Squirrel feature double deckers. If you're in the mood for pizza you might want to try LaRosa's. Of course, the national chains such as McDonald's, Hardee's, Roy Rogers, Wendy's, Arby's, Frisch's Big Boy, and Kentucky Fried Chicken have downtown locations.

Nightlife is varied and plentiful not only downtown but in Mt. Adams, along West Pete Rose Way, and on the river. The Kentucky shore is lined with floating restaurants featuring fresh seafood. The Mike Fink is a

converted paddlewheeler famous for its delicious raw seafood bar. Other floating restaurants in the immediate area include the Islands, Barleycorn's Yacht Club, the Crystal Parrot, Crockett's River Cafe, and the Waterfront. River taxis are available to transport you across the river or bus service is available at the Dixie Terminal on Fourth Street. BB Riverboats offers river cruises when the weather permits. On the Ohio side of the river there's the Showboat Majestic, the last of the floating theaters. The famed *Delta Queen* frequently stops in Cincinnati, as does her larger sister ship, the *Mississippi Queen*.

The 1987 Southwestern Figure Skating Championships were held in Littleton, Colorado, October 26 thru November 1 at the South Suburban Ice Arena, hosted by the Mile High Figure Skating Association.

Her long program included a double Axel/double toe combination and showed a strong performance overall. Diane Sexton, Rocky Mountain FSC, overcame a fifth placement in figures to pull to a final second-place finish with an exciting short and a strong long program. Elizabeth Wright, Colorado SC, placed third after a slight controversy developed as to whether Elizabeth put her foot down after her triple

Salchow before the double toe in the short program. Lauren Barcza, Broadmoor SC, won a trip to Midwesterns with a fourth-place finish.

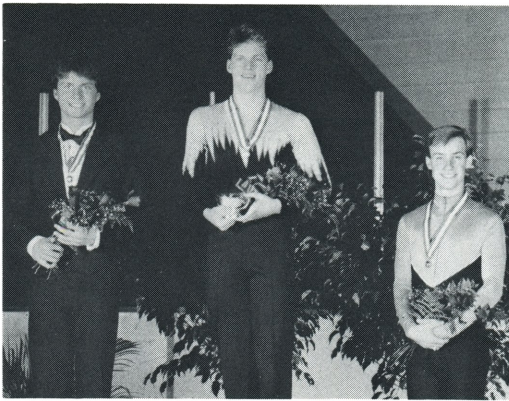

That way the USFSA can protect the skater by screening the quality and propriety of each commercial, endorsement, or venture.

As in all professions, there are good and bad agents and agencies. A skater would be well advised to check on their reputations and be *very cautious before signing any agreement*. In case of doubt a lawyer may be consulted. The matter of the percentage paid to an agent and the time and method of payment is strictly between the agent and client. The USFSA does not enter in such negotiations.

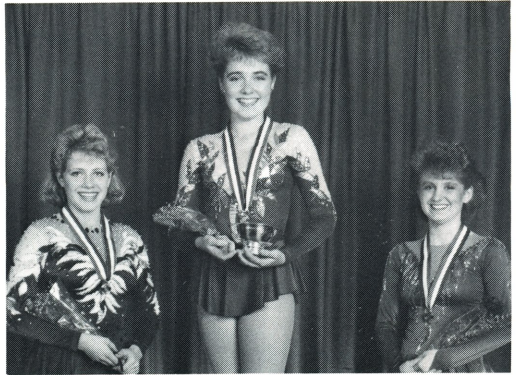
Clay Sniteman, Utah FSC, won the Intermediate Men's division with a nice routine. Jason Rowley, Utah FSC, was second.

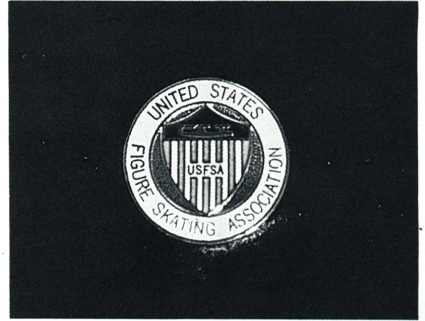

SKATING INJURIES: HOW TO AVOID THE COMMON ONES

Figure skating is usually not considered a "dangerous" sport. Unlike football or boxing, skating rarely produces injuries that result in any significant, life-long disability. Nonetheless, the presence of injuries among figure skaters represents perhaps the single, biggest threat to a successful, competitive career. For example, it is difficult to remember a national or international competition during which the efforts of at least one prominent skater were not hampered by the presence of an injury.

Injuries among figure skaters can be divided into two categories: (1) Acute injuries—those that occur suddenly as the result of an accident, such as a blade cut or a sprained ankle; and (2) Overuse injuries—those that come on gradually such as a stress fracture or tendinitis. In a study of seventy national competitors, acute and overuse injuries occurred with almost equal frequency. Overuse injuries, however, resulted in more time missed from skating.

Although acute injuries are the more difficult of the two to avoid, some of them can be prevented. Among those injuries that could be avoided, failure to stretch and warm-up are the most common causes. Ricky Harris has devised an excellent combined stretch/warm-up program that takes but a few minutes. Even stroking for two to three minutes before attempting any jumps can serve as an acceptable warm-up. Stretching should be done before getting on the ice and should include at least the quadriceps (front of the thigh), hamstrings (back of the thigh), and groin (inside of the thigh) muscles.

Overuse injuries are nearly all preventable. Overuse injuries are the result of change. The painful pressure points that develop while

breaking in new boots are examples of this type of injury, the change being that from old to new boots. Another common example is the stress fracture of the leg that develops as a result of learning a new jump; the change here is attempting the new jump thirty to forty times a day both on and off the ice. (Some of you are undoubtedly saying, "But I can't avoid these things. I periodically need new boots, and I have to learn new jumps to be a better skater.")

Obviously some changes are necessary, otherwise no one would have progressed beyond a waltz jump and everyone would be wearing too small, broken down boots. There are means of making the changes safer. The following list is based on an analysis of over four-hundred skating injuries. While all injuries might not be prevented, at least fifty percent of the overuse problems can be lessened or avoided by following these "rules."

1. *Don't make abrupt changes.* New jumps or lifts should be practiced with gradually increasing frequency. For example, trying the new maneuver ten times the first two days, fifteen the next two days, twenty the next two, etc. Repetition surely builds skill but it also creates fatigue in muscles unaccustomed to those particular demands. Fatigue results in injuries to say nothing of the inability of a tired muscle to do what you want it to do.

2. *Be careful with "off the ice" jumping.* Landing a jump on a hard floor—even a "good" wooden dance floor—is more stressful than landing on the ice where you are moving at the same time you are landing. A good rule to follow is that ten jumps off the ice are equal to twenty on the ice.

3. *Conditioning (being "in shape") is lost faster than it is gained.* If, for example, you've

been on vacation or hurt and not skating for five days, it will usually take you six or seven days to regain the skills and form you had when you left the ice. Being off the ice because of sickness (with the flu, for example) is even worse and will require two or more days of retraining for every day missed. As you become a better skater and spend more time on the ice, the more true this rule becomes.

4. *Work around injuries.* There are very few injuries that necessitate stopping all activities. If the injury is such that you simply can not skate, then cycling or swimming will help maintain some of your conditioning. More often injuries hurt only with certain activities. For example, knee pain may only occur when landing a certain jump or doing a sit spin. These (painful) maneuvers can be avoided while treating the injury and that extra time can be spent working on figures or stroking—everybody needs more time stroking and working on figures.

5. *Do specific exercises before a problem occurs.* Nearly one-fifth of all skating injuries involves the knee or lower back. Adopting a daily program of quadriceps (front of the thigh) and abdominal muscle strengthening now will prevent some of these injuries and improve your jumping technique and form.

6. *Do more stretching when you are rapidly growing.* Growth in youngsters occurs in spurts. On the first day of each month, measure your height on the wall. When the marks indicate you are getting taller, start a stretching program every night before going to bed. These stretches should include muscles of the thigh (quadriceps, hamstrings, and groin), the calf, and the back.

7. *Pay more attention to your boots.* One out of every seven skating injuries is related to problems with boots.

Deal with painful pressure points *now*. During break-in, pressure points should be protected by small sponge donuts or Spenco "Second Skin." If these methods are not successful in two or three days, the boot should be stretched or "punched out."

Do not attempt to break in new boots during the two months just before major competitions. Most skaters know how long their boots are going to last, and all know when they are going to have to compete. Plan boot purchases so that you are not trying to break

in boots at the same time you're trying to perfect your program. This also allows time to return to the maker for modifications if necessary.

Keep the tongue in the center of the boot. Nearly all of the bursae problems ("lumps" around the ankle) are the result of the tongue gradually sliding to the outside. For at least the first three weeks in new boots make sure that every time you lace up, that the tongue is directly in the center. Once the tongue moves to the outside and becomes "grooved" or creased in this position, it is almost impossible to change it, and a new tongue may be necessary.

Do not fix things that are not broken. If your old boots were comfortable and you were not having any particular problems with edging, do not get new boots that are different. For example, do not add arch supports just because you think (or you were told) your feet are "flat."

Skaters, like all good athletes, do not like to think about injuries. If something hurts, they want to believe that if they ignore it, it will disappear—and in many cases it will. If it has not disappeared in two or three days, or worse yet if it is getting more painful, it should not be ignored. Often overuse injuries, if caught early, can be dealt with by minor, temporary changes in workouts or merely applying ice after skating. Better yet, paying attention to the small details mentioned above might prevent them in the first place.

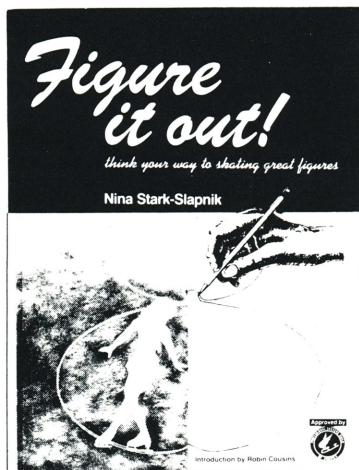
