The 1987 World Championships in Cincinnati

looks to be one of the largest in recent years. Official entries have been received from 24 countries, with 27 ladies' singles, 29 men's singles, 14 pairs and 23 dance couples entered, for a total of 110 competitors. A total sell out is expected at the Riverfront Coliseum and many hotels and popular downtown restaurants are already completely booked for the week.

People watching will also be a popular part of the week with Scott Hamilton and Judy Blumberg on hand to do commentary for CBS and Toller Cranston and Brian Pockar commentating for the Canadian networks. Numerous other dignitaries and past champions are also expected. (Unfortunately, Les Nessman will not be broadcasting for WKRP as previously expected.)

A special highlight of the Cincinnati festivities will be the presentation of the Jacques Favart Trophy by the ISU to Jayne Torvill and Christopher Dean at the Sunday Exhibition of Champions. The trophy is in memory of the former ISU President from 1967-1980 and an ISU officer for 25 years. Under his leadership, many changes were instituted in figure skating competitions, such as the change in the number of figures and the increase in the percentage weight of the free skating. The introduction of ice dancing and the 1,000 meters event in speed skating for men were also introduced into the Olympic program due to his efforts, as well as the addition of the World Junior Figure Skating Championships as an ISU program.

The prestigious trophy has only been presented twice previously for outstanding achievement and contribution to skating sports, in 1981 to Irina Rodnina and in 1983 to Eric Heiden.

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Coaches know that warming up is beneficial, yet the way ice time is arranged, there are only a few minutes between patch and freestyle. They are anxious for their skaters to get on the ice to take full advantage of the ice time. Besides, they want to be sure they get all of their scheduled lessons fitted into the allotted time.


Parents get upset when their children do not get on the ice right away as they are paying for that time. Many feel that it is "wasted" when a skater spends time on the floor. But, if you are seriously interested in increasing your speed and getting more efficiency from your muscles by doing a warm-up before freestyle, here are some suggestions on how to do it:

- 1. Leave the patch two minutes before it is over. I suggest discussing this with your coach so that he/she will have an understanding of what you are trying to accomplish. The benefits derived will far outweigh the loss of the two minutes of patch.
- 2. Take the two minutes out of the beginning of your freestyle period instead of patch. You will find that you will make up these two minutes by being better prepared for the ice and, as a result, you will accomplish more work with greater efficiency.
- 3. Do not socialize with anyone. Quickly remove your figure boots, and put on tennis shoes or something equally suitable, and you are ready for a two-minute warm-up.

#### The Two-Minute Warm-Up

The following warm-up suggestions are for skaters who have no special physical problems, and who need guidelines on how to improve their skating capacity through floor warm-ups.

- 1. Running in Place. 25 seconds. This accelerates your heart rate. Run as fast as you can in place, lifting your knees high each time you step. Relax and breathe for 5 seconds, inhaling through your nose and exhaling through your mouth. At the same time, shake your hands and feet.
- 2. Full Knee Bends. 10 seconds. This is for the legs and buttocks. Stand with feet in a parallel position about 5 inches apart. Keeping your heels on the floor, and with arms straight ahead, bend as far down as you can and then back up again. Do this 8 times. Relax and breathe as above for 5 seconds.



- 3. Bend-Overs. 15 seconds. This is for the back. Stand with feet parallel. Extend your arms straight above your head. Bend the whole torso forward in one piece from the hips to a position parallel to the floor. The back does not bend. Still maintaining the straight spine, bring your whole torso back to the starting position. Keep your stomach pulled in through this exercise. Do this 8 times. Relax and breathe 5 seconds.
- 4. Push-Aways. 10 seconds. This is for shoulders and arms. Stand an arm's distance away from a wall. Place hands on the wall directly in front of you, bending the elbows. Push away 8 times. Relax and breathe 5 seconds.
- 5. Leg and Torso Raise. 10 seconds. This is for the stomach. Balance your tailbone on a chair or bench, supporting yourself with your hands on the chair. Raise your torso and legs together and return 6 times. Relax and breathe for 5 seconds.
- 6. Torso Twists. 10 seconds. This is for the lower back. Stand with feet parallel, arms straight out to the sides. Swinging the body from above the hips, twist as far as possible side to side, 8 times. Do not do the breathing and relaxing; go on to #7.
- 7. Slow Jogging. 10 seconds. Warming down. Relax and breathe on the way back to put on your skates.

Do not confuse this type of warm-up with exercises for style, strength, endurance, and flexibility. The warm-up will make your hands and fingers move faster and you will get your skates on quicker.

Start your ice practice with some stroking. By stroking, you are warming up your equilibrium equipment and the coordination mechanism of your muscles to adjust to the conditions of the ice, and the size of the rink. After stroking, go over to the rail and stretch. There is less possibility now of overstretching and hurting your muscles.

# THE HALL OF FAME



Courtney J.L. Jones, MBE Great Britain

This feature continues the accounts of the lives and distinguished careers of the most recent members elected to the World Figure Skating Hall of Fame.

Courtney Jones of Great Britain occupies a truly unique position in the world of figure skating. A World and European Champion in ice dancing with two different partners, a World Championship Judge since 1972, and a Referee in his discipline since 1982, he became in 1985 the eleventh President of the National Skating Association of Great Britain, the oldest federation in skating, founded in 1879.

Rarely, if ever, has a former World Champion become President of his national governing body and, of course, Courtney is the first ice dancer to achieve that distinction. He has also been honored by the Queen for his services to skating with the Order of the British Empire, so that his election to the World Figure Skating Hall of Fame is a fitting recognition of a distinguished career.

Courtney Jones is remembered as the dominant male ice dancer of his era, during a period when the dance couples from Great

Britain were the best in the world. Actually, from the first World Championship in ice dancing in 1952 through 1960, British couples won nine gold, five silver, and two bronze medals in nine Championships, a record never equaled.

Early in his career, Courtney displayed the versatility which would be such a major aspect of his years on the top. From 1947 to 1955, he won or placed in various local dance competitions with no less than five different partners! He also competed in pairs with Faith Sylvester and Heather Birtwhistle and subsequently passed his First Class (Gold) Pair Test.

With Faith (known as "Paddy"), he was fourth in the first British Junior Pair Championship in 1951, while with Heather he won the Southern Counties Pair title in 1954 and was third in the British Senior Pair Championship the same year. Courtney also placed fifth (third in free dance) with Faith in the British Dance Championship in 1951, but soon lost her to marriage and the United States later that year. It is remarkable to note that he did not appear again in the championship until 1956 with June Markham.

He was also active in free skating, winning the Scholes Cup of his club three times and the Waterhouse Cup at least twice. He was third in the Southern Counties Men's event of 1952. He is also well remembered for his Samba number, perhaps a forerunner of the Silver Samba in ice dancing, which he invented in 1963 with Peri Horne. He holds the Intermediate Second Class Ice Figure and Second Class Free Skating Tests.

Having traveled to Queens rink in London primarily for training in pair skating, he was instead partnered by his teacher Miss Gladys Hogg, with June Markham, herself a strong singles and pair skater. After but a few weeks together, Courtney and June won their first competition as partners early in November 1955 in the Open Blues Competition at Richmond for the Tomlinson Trophy. Just a month after that, Courtney and June placed second in the British Dance Championship.

Despite having to enter the Royal Air Force to carry out his military service obligation, Courtney and June were still able (using his leave time) to enter both the European Championships in Paris and the World Championships of 1956 in Garmisch-Partenkirchen, placing second in both. Actually, British dance couples took all the medals in both events. It is interesting to note that the Referee at Garmisch was Reg Wilkie, the first British Dance Champion (and also a Hall of Fame member), while his former partner Daphne Ward was the British judge. There were seventeen couples entered at Garmisch, the largest entry up to that time.

The British Dance Championships are traditionally held in Nottingham in early December and such was the case in 1956 when Courtney and June won their first title. Despite a mishap in the free dance, their win was a decisive one. In the European Championships in Vienna two months later, the same three couples were the medal winners in the same order, thereby continuing the British domination of the championships, with the representatives of the NSA winning all three medals for the fourth straight year.

It is indeed appropriate that Courtney Jones is now a member of the World Figure Skating Hall of Fame, with its adjoining Museum, located in Colorado Springs, since it was there that he won his first World title. The 1957 Championships were only the second held in the United States and that was twenty-seven years after the first in 1930.

While the first place result could have been predicted, the second and third places could not, with the Canadians Geraldine Fenton and William McLachlan and the Americans Sharon McKenzie and Bert Wright gaining them. This time, the performance of the winners was without any major errors and the dominance of Jones and Markham was demonstrated from the first compulsory dance, so that they achieved a unanimous win, being placed first by all the judges.

Actually, in the four World Championships Courtney won with his two partners, they were placed first by all the judges in all of them, with the sole exception of one second place they received in 1959. In his five European Championship wins from 1957 to 1961, Courtney and his partners were placed first by all the judges in all of them, including each part of the competition.

The 1957-58 season was virtually a "carbon copy" of the prior year. However, prior

to the start of the season, Courtney and June took and passed their NSA First Class (Gold) Pair Test, adding a special distinction to their record, since both of them had been active pair skaters with other partners prior to joining together in ice dancing. They put their new medals to good use by entering the British Senior Championship in Pairs at Streatham, placing a very creditable third in a split decision.

Courtney and June easily retained their British dance title in November, earning a 6.0 from one judge in free dancing. This time, Catherine Morris (an International Judge) and Michael Robinson were second, with Barbara Thompson and Gerard Rigby third.

It is an interesting historical coincidence that in the following European Championships at Davos, the same three couples again (for the fifth year in a row) won the medals in the same order of placement as in the British.

The pattern of the prior year was also repeated in the 1958 World Championships at Paris, with Geraldine Fenton and William McLachlan of Canada again being second, with Andrée Anderson and Donald Jacoby of the United States third, the same countries as the prior year, if not quite the same couples, winning the medals. Courtney and

June again received marks of 6.0 for their free dance from some of the judges. Notable in their free dance was the introduction of very fast time and equally fast footwork, raising substantially the difficulty of the performance.

After totally dominating their discipline for two years and with no new goals in sight (ice dancing having not yet attained Olympic status, which was not to come until 1976), June Markham elected to retire to undertake a teaching career at her home rink of Queens. As a culmination of their career together, Courtney and June received from the NSA the award of the Vandervell Trophy, for the best performance by a British skater during the prior season.

At the time, many thought that the loss of his partner would mean the end of Courtney's competitive career, much less the likelihood of a successful defense of his championship titles. However, he quickly found a new partner in Doreen Denny, who was an active singles skater. Doreen had actually competed in the British Senior and Junior Ladies' events and in 1958 had been runner-up in the ladies' event of the first Commonwealth Winter Games at St. Moritz.

By hard work under the able tutelage of Gladys Hogg, and despite Courtney's growing commitments to his chosen career as a designer in the field of ladies' fashions, they were well prepared for their first major challenge of the British Dance Championship at Nottingham, against chief rivals. In the final result, Courtney and Doreen were the winners by five judges to two. At the 1959 European Championships at Davos, Courtney and Doreen gained the title by a unanimous decision.

The 1959 World Championships were again held in Colorado Springs, where Courtney and Doreen won their first title together and his third. (Actually, the Springs is the permanent home of Doreen today, where she has pursued a distinguished career as a teacher of ice dancing.) As a footnote to their success, Doreen did not take and pass her First Class (Gold) Dance Test until after the season was over. She and Courtney received the award of the Vandervell Trophy by the NSA for their outstanding achievements.

The 1959-60 season could almost again be considered as a copy of those that had

preceded it. Courtney and Doreen easily defended their British title. At the European Championships at Garmisch-Partenkirchen, they retained their title without difficulty. The World Championships of 1960 were held in Vancouver, British Columbia. Courtney and Doreen easily won their second title.

Following the 1960 season, there were many rumors of their retirement, but Courtney and Doreen ultimately decided to carry on for one more year. Little could anyone realize at the time that the 1960-61 season would be quite different than any that had preceded it!

The British Dance Championship was held at Nottingham in early December 1960 as usual and Courtney and Doreen won their third title together and fifth for Courtney (a national record for him up to that time), without difficulty, defeating Mary Parry and Roy Mason of Birmingham. Third were Linda Shearman and Michael Phillips, later to become British and European Champions.

The 1961 European Championships were held at (West) Berlin at the end of January, returning to that venue for the first time since 1936. In what turned out to be their last competition, Courtney and Doreen won their third European title (and fifth for him, also

This completes the fourth and last of a series on judging. If you think back, the ideas so far expressed could easily be about judging anything. In fact, one of the most extraordinary things about life itself is the diversity of what people feel, hear, and see, and how strongly they react to various occurrences.

This phenomena is an endless subject. So remarkable is it, that we probably will never know for sure whether any two people in the world have ever seen, heard, or felt exactly the same thing about anything. Examples range widely, from the differing views of witnesses to a crime, to a child saying "Ugh" when watching an adult cook liver or down an oyster.

Take a sunset, for instance. A painter would probably admire the colors; an architect would no doubt want to reconstruct the clouds; a mother would say, "Where's Matt, he should have been home by now"; a golfer would cuss because he's breaking eighty for the first time and it will be dark by the seventeenth tee; a child (or a fireman) would probably ask "What's burning?" Naturally, an ice skater would say, "Getting late, better get to bed, gotta get up for the 6:00 A.M. patch." And remember Linus and Charlie Brown looking at cloud patterns, Linus saying something like, "That one looks like a Picasso, and over there is a Renoir, but see, that big one is more like a Rembrandt. What do you see, Charlie?" And Charlie says, shamefacedly, "I thought they all looked like bunny rabbits?"

When you march any human being onto a stage you set the scene for a rainbow of variables. One example may suffice: the instructor approaches the pupil's layout ice, peruses the figure-eight circles, mutters a bit, then greets the kid with, "Why so big?"

The pupil looks puzzled. "I measured." The instructor bristles. "Too big! Measure again."

The child pouts but obeys. "See?"

Now the instructor pouts. He's been had again, the second time in a week. The other time was loops. *They* had looked too *small*. Were his eyes going bad? No, just his composure. He has only to remember this same pupil complained that her routine music was

fast on Tuesday and slow on Thursday . . . and tape recorder speeds never vary.

Maybe you see why we need three "proof-readers" judging skating? Sometimes seven are needed, sometimes more. Remember, the Supreme Court seats nine justices. (The last time they were unanimous may have been on a decision over the Nixon tapes during the Watergate days.)

Try it, just once. Try it with a friend or two (perhaps ones you might not mind losing for a week or so). Grab pencils with erasers—don't forget the erasers—and pads, then climb into the stands during the next competitions. Start with an easy event first, one with short routines and little kids (so cute they bollix your emotions, so watch it!). First, get the starting order from the schedule board. Then just trust your instincts. Do not be surprised if your marks agree with the judges. You know far more than you think you do.

However, realize, too, thay you will be "sitting forward" to evaluate, not "sitting back" to observe. Note the difference in your attitude, note the concentration, the attentiveness to detail. Feel your annoyance at distractions. Shut out everything except the skaters' performances. Be so absorbed that you "become" one of the judges.

Then, and only then, will you begin to sense what it is to be a decider. The result can be startling, sometimes shocking. It may alert you to the *other* side of things. After all, we tend to resent authority in some form, at some time. Let's not take out that resentment on sports officials.

# 1987 INTERNATIONAL PRECISION SKATING COMPETITION

The 1987 International Precision Skating Competition took place in Lake Placid, January 17 to 18. More than 2,200 skaters, representing ninety-two teams, plus coaches, chaperons, and family arrived in buses, jamming the Olympic Center, streets, and motels of the tiny upstate New York village. Alternating yearly with Buffalo, it was Lake Placid's third championship.

The competition was held in the 1980-Rink. Railings were lined with colorful team banners, flags of the competing nations hung in front of the huge, silver Olympic rings, and the stands rang with cheers and clapping. The best teams in the world, including one from Japan, were competing against each other.

There were two medal divisions. Gold for the final round winners of each class, and Silver, for fourth to sixth place teams in any class requiring a skate-off.

In the Senior category, the Pirouettes, Laval, Quebec, won the gold. Dressed in red, ribboned ponytails flying, they skated with great speed, good edges, and rapid pattern transitions, blending unnoticeably. Their program, to Big Band music, had difficult moves, superbly done. The Haydenettes, Lexington, Massachusetts, were second with another polished program that included spectacular line spirals, Ina Bauers, and reverse double circles. Canada's K-W Queens were third. The Hamden Figurettes, 1986 U.S. National Junior Champions, were in this group, skating now as Seniors. Placing fifth, they served notice that they will rise rapidly.

Delhi, Ontario's Second Edition, won the Silver division. Boosted by their card-holding cheering section, they skated with terrific speed and unison, excellent transitions into straight lines, covering the entire ice surface. The U.S. National Senior Champions, Hot Fudge Sundaes, were second and the Minneapplettes of Minnesota were third.

Of the twenty-six Junior teams, Ice Images, from Burlington, Ontario, took top honors

with a snappy routine of reverse circles, difficult footwork, and smooth transitions, done in super unison. Another excellent Canadian team Whitby Ice Crystals, were second and Delhi's Karen's Kolleens were third. Except for Rhode Island's Superettes, outstanding winners of the Silver category, Canadian teams dominated both Junior events.

The Novice Gold was won by Buffalo's Hot Fudge Sundaes, three-times U.S. National Novice Champions. The largest group (thirty-three members) competing, they were peppy, with great speed, original moves, excellent choreography, and their pinwheel reached from board to board. Behind them were Canada's Whitby Angels and Rose City Rhythms.

Canadians also dominated the Intermediates. Les Altesses, with their expert pass-throughs, were the winners. Warwick Munchkins were second and Les Riveraines took the bronze. All were well coached, had speed and good unison.

The youngest skaters, the "stars" of tomorrow, were in the Juveniles. Top winner of the gold were the Stepping Stones from Ontario. Cybelles of Quebec were the Silver winners.

The over-25 Adult teams seemed to have the most fun, dedicated enthusiasm, and the least member-turnover. Massachusetts teams took the top two medals, with our National

Champions, Acton Ups, winning this category. Esprit De Corps were second and Rita's Roses, Ontario, placed third.

An Eastern Precision Judges School, sanctioned by JETS, was held in conjunction with the competition. Margaret Faulkner, Ann Fauver, professionals Sherrie Siclari and Terry Sweeney were the faculty. Seventy judges and prospective judges attended. They were instructed by live and video performances, and on-ice experience at holds, transitions, line skating, and other details to get the "feeling" of difficulty experienced by the teams.


Precision can be the savior of club membership and discouraged solo skaters if the present stumbling block . . . expense . . . can be solved. During the 1988 Olympic Games in Calgary, the Canadian National Precision team will give an exhibition. Hopefully, through this visual treat, precision one day soon will become an Olympic winter event.

Many teams, including two from the Iroquois Indian Reservation Six Nations FSC, contributed much to the competition and camaraderie between the skaters. The highlight, however, was the 28-member Tokyo Women's College of Physical Education team from Japan. Ranging in age from eighteen to twenty-two, none spoke English, yet good communication was quickly established with the other skaters. Without a rooting section


of their own, those in the stands developed cheers for them, and the popular Japanese were loudly supported every time they took the ice. Their program, though less difficult, was charmingly different, artistic, and polished. They earned standing ovations from everyone.

After the final awards were given and all medal teams were grouped around the ice, an announcement was made of a "special award" . . . for the team traveling the farthest A scream went up from the skaters, and as the lavender-clad Tokyo group skated onto the ice, every team moved in to surround them, creating a riot of color, hugging, and tears of joy. Mrs. Nona Bafo, five-time chairman of the competition, and Mr. Virgil L. Widler, Chief Referee in charge of the complicated minute-to-minute scheduling of events, presented the medals. The rink hadn't seen such emotion since the USA hockey team won the Olympic gold medal there, seven years ago.

As the competition's official song, "We are the Champions" was played, the skaters joined hands and skated single file around the ice. When, "We are the World" followed, they formed a gigantic circle, with one skater spinning in the middle. With this, Lake Placid's most successful International Precision Competition came to an end.





# The Japanese Experience


When I think back to to my trip to Tokyo for the NHK Trophy I can't help but reminisce fondly about all the incredible things I experienced and learned. Tokyo is just about the furthest place away from home I have ever been, but probably one of the most favorite cities I have been able to visit.

Everyone's major concern about traveling to Japan is usually the length of the flight and the sixteen or seventeen hours time change. Planning ahead for this, I split up the long trek by staying over night in Seattle before meeting up with the rest of the team. For me, this really made a big difference on fatigue and I would suggest this to anyone traveling from the Midwest or East.

After landing at Narita International Airport in Japan we were quickly whisked through customs and met by a representative from the competition to take us to our hotel. We were soon on a bus heading for Tokyo. Unfortunately the ride to our hotel took about an hour and a half which did not sound very promising being jet lagged, but the bus was comfortable, and everyone was excited to be in Japan at last. It was interesting to learn that the Japanese drive the English way—on the left side of the road. We were also able to see, from the bus, Japanese Disneyland complete with Cinderella's Castle and everything else. I had no idea it even existed.

As we made our way closer into the city, things became more crowded and it took on the look of a very big city. I had not anticipated the modern chrome and glass buildings, and I couldn't get over the amount of neon lighting used. Every building had signs flashing their products in neon. Some were as tall as twenty feet high and thirty feet wide. It was like Times Square only quadruple in size. I concluded that if you were in the neon business in Tokyo you were probably very successful and wealthy.

The official hotel in which we were housed was first rate. With just a turn off the main road we were suddenly in a complex with two huge hotels separated by beautifully tailored Japanese

gardens. It was like a sanctuary in the midst of the business of downtown Tokyo. The land on which the hotels were built was once the grounds of the residence of the Prince of Japan, thus giving the hotels their names, the Prince Takanawa and the New Prince Takanawa. It was especially nice to have such beautiful and comfortable accommodations during the competition.

We were in Tokyo two days before being able to skate in the arena in which we were to compete. I had seen many pictures of Yoyogi National Stadium and was very anxious to see it in person. Our first practice session was Thursday morning. We boarded a bus and were taken across town to the arena. Yoyogi National Stadium is an incredible facility. It's a very modern structure resembling something you would expect to see in a futuristic city, made completely of gray concrete with very sharp angular lines. Entering the arena you can not help but be overwhelmed by the size and beauty of its interior. The stadium was originally constructed for the swimming events for the 1964 Tokyo Olympic

Games. The pools are drained, floors and refrigeration are put down and the ice is made over that. The high diving boards are still visible at the end of the ice during the skating events.

The Draw Ceremony at this competition was very important. The Dancers and Single skaters of course have no compulsory dances or figures to determine their skating orders. I was really sweating it out hoping for a good draw. I now know what the pair skaters go through before they draw. Fortunately all the Americans got good draws and no one had to skate first. Phew! We had a fabulous reception afterwards with an impressive spread of food including Sushi that made many eyes roll. Even though there were a few brave ones who tried it, and some who really liked it, Sushi was not for me.

Time finally arrived for the competition to begin. All the different events competed in their first phase of competition on the same day. By the evening we were already half way through the competition. I was impressed with the efficiency and organization of the people

and the way they ran their competition. It seemed as though every detail had been taken care of. If you thought of something that should be done, the Japanese had probably already done it. The sound system was phenomenal, as to be expected, and the ice conditions were excellent by the start of the competition. What more could you ask for?

I was fortunate to have a day off between the short program and long program and was able to do some sightseeing and shopping in Tokyo. We were brave and took the trains and subways to "Ginza" the major area for shopping and to "Akihabara" the electronics district. It was very easy to take the public transportation system until we got to one particular station that had signs and maps written only in Japanese characters. We found there were quite a lot of people who spoke English and were very glad to help us. It seemed as though the people who did know how to speak English were very anxious to use it. I felt the Japanese really like Americans. It is not always that way when traveling in foreign countries.

Sunday, the last day of competition was a very hectic day from morning till night. The other events had finished their competition the evening before but the men had yet to skate their long program. Then, immediately following the Men's finals was the Exhibition. So there was a quick switch from competition mode to exhibition mode. After the Exhibition was over, it was time for the Closing Ceremonies Party and Dinner Banquet.

It was nice to see everyone finally relaxed and really enjoying themselves. The food and festivities were really spectacular and, yes, it was time for Sushi again. After dinner the organizing committee had planned for us to play Bingo. Most everyone groaned and made jokes about playing Bingo until we saw what the prizes were. Everything from cameras to portable stereos to Walkmans to pearl

necklaces. Suddenly the mood changed as we became very serious and very quiet about playing "Bingo." It really was a great celebration and probably one of the best after competition parties I have attended.

So now, the competition had come to an end. Ahead was our flight Monday night to take us home and, for me, back to reality. The long flights gave me the chance to reflect on the time we spent in Japan. I felt the American team did exceptionally well bringing home four medals total, more than any other country: one bronze, two silver, and one gold.

I also had the chance to really think about the Japanese people. Aside from the warmth and politeness of the people, it was their efficiency that impressed me the most. Everything ran like clockwork. Organization is a way of life for them. Perhaps the reason why they are so efficient and so organized is that there is no room in their lives for disarray. Tokyo is the most crowded city I have ever seen, and the traffic was unbelievable. Japan has a population of 120 million people of which ten percent or 12 million, live right in Tokyo proper. By any standard, that is a lot of people in a relatively small area. Lack of space causes them to really make sure everything is and happens for a reason. Without this I could only imagine chaos.

I made lots of friends to whom I write and from whom I receive letters. This will really help me remember my stay in Japan. The 1987 North Atlantic competition, hosted by the Skating Club of Morris at Mennen Arena, Morristown, New Jersey, concluded on November 15 with dynamic presentations in the Senior Men's, Senior Ladies', Junior Ladies' and Men's, and Junior Dance competitions.

Allison Oki, 1984 National Junior Ladies' Champion from the SC of New York, returned to Senior Ladies and captured the gold medal, winning first in the short and giving a lively, well-executed long program. The competitors, grateful to the SC of Morris for a well-run competition, and to the judges who traveled from as far as Atlanta





Several unfortunate falls troubled Lori Blasko, Conejo Valley FSC, and Todd Sand, Los Angeles FSC, in both initial and final rounds to put them in a disappointing third.

The Senior Men's championship was decided when Erik Larson, San Diego FSC, won the long program, breaking a tie with William Lawe, Los Angeles FSC. Troy Goldstein, also from the Los Angeles FSC, took the bronze medal.

All of the thirteen Senior Ladies had difficulties as both short and long programs were plagued with falls and errors. All of their lifts were well done and their perfectly timed side-by-side Russian splits had the audience buzzing. Sarah Walsh, Warwick Figure Skaters, and Brad Walsh, SC of Lake Placid, finished in fourth place.

Aimee Offner and Brian Helgenberg, both representing the University of Delaware SC, won the Novice Pairs' event with ease. They

skated with excellent speed and unison, and showed remarkable maturity in presentation of their program for such a young pair team. 



### JAYNE TORVILL AND CHRISTOPHER DEAN

### THE WORLD TOUR

ell over a million spectators have now filled arenas for the world tour of Jayne Torvill and Christopher Dean, and many have expressed an interest beyond the performances and reviews. I was fortunate enough to have been invited to Sydney, Australia, in January of 1985, as one of the nine original company members, and to have spent two rewarding years as principal soloist on the world tour.

The Torvill and Dean World Tour was a unique creature. Never before has a skating show combined such a talented cast, such a worldwide itinerary, and such consistent box office success. The tremendous economic potential that Jayne and Chris generated for themselves by their historic win in the Sarajevo Olympics was a powerful life force, but the same kind of *savoir-faire* that led them to acclaim as amateurs was indispensable to propel this delicate professional venture.

Indeed, aspects that were great assets in the project also had to be guarded against as potential hazards to its health.

A company of such talented and expe-

rienced international skaters allowed great choreographic freedom. It was also a personal inspiration to find ourselves among peers, each of whose philosophies became quite apparent and confidently manifested. What goes hand in hand with this concentration of skill, though, are prominent egos, and it was certainly no simple task to accommodate all our needs and self-fulfillment in a showcase for Javne Torvill and Christopher Dean where, let's face it, our names were not even required in the advertising. A lot of thought did go into assuring that everyone had a special role, both on and off the ice, and that group spirit was alive.

Many of us had five, six, or seven strenuous numbers to rehearse and perform in, including some quick costume changes, so there was not a whole lot of thumb-twiddling going on. Fatigue did eventuate, though, especially during our three-month English season with eight shows a week and up to six hours on the ice during performance days choreographing a new work to *An American in Paris*, which incidentally never was


performed. It was in the course of such stretches that injuries cropped up, nerves became frazzled, and the focus tended to shift to the future. Unfortunately, venue availability and economics sometimes took precedence over our physical limitations.

The travel schedule, including rehearsal periods in Sydney, surfers' paradise on Australia's Gold Coast, and Oberstdorf, Germany, and performances throughout most of the English speaking countries was also an undeniable plus. Flying, except when distances would involve less than a four-hour bus ride, and having our own rooms in truly fine hotels helped to minimize strain.

Though days off were sometimes few and far between, it wasn't often that we could complain about seeing only airports, hotels, and ice rinks. We couldn't physically afford to overdo the extracurricular activities, but we all had some fabulous outings, occasionally en masse. but more often than not in small groups. I won't soon forget white water rafting in Tasmania, skiing at Whistler in British Columbia, sailboarding on the Sunshine Coast north of Brisbane, spending the night on a cliff in the Bavarian Alps, jet skiing in Auckland, New Zealand, all the theatre and live shows in London and elsewhere, meeting high profile individuals, such as Princess Diana.

Princess Margaret, and Nancy Reagan, and oodles of other experiences.

All of this excitement and luxury might have been distracting to good work habits, but traveling was not new to any of us, even if having money in our pockets was. Though Chris, in particular, enjoyed social occasions more than anyone, he and Jayne understood the value of discipline. With the help of our dance master, Australian Andris Toppe, they exercised strong leadership.

The huge public interest in the show and in Javne and Chris as people was a key to its success, yet it nonetheless placed a lot of pressure, not as directly on the rest of us, but on the stars themselves. Audiences are demanding. The more they are given, the more they expect, and that is to say nothing of the press who are always there and are always very curious. Jayne and Chris handled the fame and attention very professionally. Indeed, they had reason to be proud of their achievement, and they were doing what they liked to do. They showed remarkable stamina in meeting exacting demands.

Amidst a life of hotel suites, private jets, limousines, and showers of gifts and flowers, they maintained the concentration to perpetuate their art. *Bolero* was obviously their most momentous accomplishment. The humorous *Tango* and the subtle *Encounter* carried on that high standard. It is an open question whether later works such as *Venus, Shepherd's Song*, and the *Fire and Ice* television special (filmed in Stuttgart, Germany in July and yet to be broadcast in North America) demonstrated the same degree of high excellence.

Criticism of Jayne and Chris's performances or of any of the members in the show, for that matter, could hardly dian Internation be unfavorable with respect to unison, the Torvill and flow, polish, or any other aspect of the pany in 1985. actual technical execution of moves, for

if anything, we were overpracticed to the point of boredom. Rehearsal or choreography periods typically included a one-hour ballet class, and six or seven hours on the ice six days a week, while an average performance day might include two hours on the ice after a ballet class and then always a half-hour warmup before the show. If the travel or performance schedule was overly hectic, we would do only one class and a warm-up. Ballet class became like a ritual, without which a day wasn't complete. Flexibility, general body awareness, and company unity are certain benefits, but I always felt the energy could be more efficiently expended on the ice, since most ballet positions are either two-footed or unattainable in skates, not that the numbers could be classified as skating. in the purest sense anway.

The choreographer of all the production pieces was Graeme Murphy, artistic director of the (modern) Sydney Dance Company, who, despite his lack of skating experience, designed works with clever group interactions and high entertainment value.

The entire project was rather abruptly abandoned at the end of November after Chris sustained a severe fracture in his right wrist. We were in Portland, Maine, about a third of the way through our second and more extensive tour of the United States. The management consoled us all with a word of plans to build anew in six months. In the meantime, all we can do is patiently await the reincarnation of Jayne Torvill and Christopher Dean: The World Tour.

# FRENCH NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS EPINAL, FRANCE DECEMBER 20-21, 1987

French skaters have been hoping for years to see a renewal of their previous successes. National champions have succeeded one another with promise and talent, with none of them, however, totally fulfilling the hopes of their public at the international level. The question in the Vosgian city of Epinal was whether the 1987 French Championships would show the start of a long awaited new era. This question will only be answered in the years to come. Yet new names arose in the national hierarchy, making sure that at least hope can still be found in the French team for the near future.

The men's competition was won by Philippe Roncoli. For two years Roncoli had been a close second, and this time he was a true favorite. Coached by former World champion, Alain Giletti, and now by former European vice-champion, Jean-Christophe Simond, Roncoli showed strong progress in the figures, where he placed third. Fernand Fedronic, who has been a European champion in figures, unsurprisingly took the lead in this section. Frederick Harpages, from Paris, came a close second.

Both the short and the free were won by Roncoli though not quite as impressive in the free as many hoped he would be. His high technical level and mastery still secured his first place. Harpages and Fedronic fought sharply for the silver medal, the former edging the latter in the free.

Still apart from the podium, due to poor figures, young Eric Millot confirmed his 1986 performances by finishing second in both the short and the free programs. Quite artistic on the ice, and mastering all triple jumps, Millot displayed promising talent.

Agnes Gosselin won her fifth national ladies' championship in a row at Epinal. Fifteen years old Florence Albert made a sensational senior debut by edging her in figures. Gosselin won both the short and the free, showing mastery of her favorite triple Lutz. Florence Copp showed strong progress throughout the competition, but her second place in both the short and free was not enough to compensate for weak figures. Albert finished third in the free, edging Copp in the final standings.

A new pair ended the four-year reign of Didier Manaud and Sylvie Vaquero. In the free program, Charline Mauger and Benoit Vandenberghe successfully completed triple Salchows and double Axels, and won their first national title.

Two weeks earlier, in Dijon, Paul and Isabelle Duchesnay won their second ice dancing national championship. Their new choreography and their mastery of style, which has already allowed them to win this year's Skate America, delighted the audience, which gave them a well deserved ovation. For the ready-to-support French audience, it is no surprise, and no doubt, that hope for the international championships to come, starts with the Duchesnays!

### 1987 WEST GERMAN CHAMPIONSHIPS WEST BERLIN, FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF GERMANY JANUARY 8-10, 1987

The West German championships were held, January 8 thru 10, in West Berlin, at the Ice Stadium in the suburb of Wedding. All the title-holders defended, but not all were successful. In the men's, Heiko Fischer sought to win his fifth title, but he injured himself on the very first compulsory figure and had to withdraw. This cleared the way for the German-American Richard Zander, born in Oregon but for the last seven years living in his parents' home country of the Federal Republic of Germany. Eleventh in the 1986 World championships and third in this season's St. Ivel International, the twentytwo-year-old Zander was first in all three sections of the West German Nationals, and could soon be in Europe's top half-dozen.

Runner-up was Thomas Wieser of Munich, who was fourth in the recent Budapest International won by Brian Orser. At Wedding, Wieser tied on points with Oliver Dechert (Stuttgart), but took second place because of his better free skating.

Claudia Leistner won her third successive German title. This attractive twenty-one-yearold from Mannheim is already a youthful veteran of top-class competition. In 1983 she was second in World's to Rosalynn Sumners. She, too, won all three categories, with her club-mate Susanne Becher second. Kerstin Kimminus and Stefan Pfrengle lost the pairs title they took in 1986. They were beaten by the 1985 champion Daniel Caprano with his new partner Sonja Adalbert. Antonia and Ferdinand Becherer fared better, and retained the ice dance crown.

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

a record then), quite decisively, despite an injury to Doreen's hand suffered prior to the free dancing.

Just two weeks later, Courtney and Doreen's hopes for another World title came to an abrupt end with the loss of the American World Team in an air accident at Brussels, Belgium, and the subsequent cancellation by the ISU of the 1961 World Championships in Prague.

When Courtney's record of four World, five European, and five British dance titles with two different partners is considered, it is both outstanding and unique, but it really is his total dominance of his discipline over a period of years that is remarkable. The competitions were never really close. Courtney and his partners were always well ahead of the opposition, which was at the same time improving rapidly during a period when ice dancing was achieving maturity as a sport. Much of that growth can be attributed to the lead of the British couples, and especially by their champions during that time.

Already well into his career as a fashion designer by the time of his retirement from competition, Courtney has continued in that profession with significant success, culminating in recent years in his designs of costumes for Jayne Torvill and Christopher Dean, his worthy successors as World, European, and British Champions.

Not so well known perhaps in the skating orld has been Courtney's involvement and achievements in ballroom dancing, the influence of which could be seen in his free dance programs as well as in his subsequent work as a costume designer. Reflecting that training, if any one word could be used to describe his skating it was "elegance," coupled with faultless timing and accuracy.

Courtney has chosen to remain an amateur and has continued to pursue an active career as a judge and referee of ice dancing, earning his first appointment as an International Judge in 1962 and as a Referee in 1967. He has served as a judge at several Worlds and at the Olympic Winter Games.

Yet another contribution of special note is that he and Peri Horne invented and presented two new compulsory dances, the "Silver Samba" and "Starlight Waltz," which were accepted by the International Skating Union in 1964 for inclusion in the standard schedule of International Dances. While the "Samba" did not remain permanently in the schedule (as many think it should have), the "Starlight Waltz" has and is recognized today as an important dance for World-level competition.

Courtney has served faithfully the National Skating Association of Great Britain for many years, becoming Chairman of the Ice Dance Committee in 1976, Chairman of the Council in 1977, and President in 1985.

Courtney Jones was elected to the Hall of Fame in 1986.


