



As far as we know at this time: Jill Watson and Peter Oppegard will be starring with "Ice Capades" this season, as will be Elizabeth Manley. Liz will also be doing a CTV skating special in December, to go along with the new Elizabeth Manley skates, boots, and doll that are due out in time for the holidays.

Debi Thomas, Brian Orser, Tracy Wilson and Rob McCall will be join-

ing the cast of "Stars On Ice" with Scott Hamilton. opening in Denver this month. Debi will be attending Stanford University and will make special appearances with the show. Meanwhile, two new books have been published in Canada about Orser. One is a children's book and the other is a biography (which will be reviewed in Skating soon). A highlight of the summer was the Sun Valley Show in September when Brian and Brian—Boitano and Orser—appeared on the ice together, skating to "King of the Road." The explosive performance was seen nationally on ABC Sports.

Scott Gregory has retired as an amateur and teamed with former partner Eliza Spitz for professional engagements. Suzanne Semanick will continue to compete with new partner Ron Kravette. Gillian Wachsman and Todd Waggoner have decided it's time to focus on school. Gillian will be attending the University of Massachusetts, while Todd will be in Florida at Embry-Riddle University majoring in aeronautics.


Tiffany Chin has enrolled at UCLA and will also be combining studies with selected personal appearances. Caryn Kadavy has moved down the road from Colorado Springs to Denver as a student of Don Laws. Eric Larson has joined the extensive group of elite skaters at the Broadmoor.

Sandy Hess can now be found in Colorado Springs as Director of the Dance program at the Broadmoor, coaching a sizeable group, assisted by Donald Adair. Susan Wynne, Joseph Druar, Jerod Swallow, Jodie Balogh, Renee Roca, James Yorke, and others are training at the U.S. Air Force Academy's outstanding facility.

Todd Eldredge and coach Richard Callaghan have relocated to the sunny climes of San Diego. Doug Mattis is now training in Lake Placid where he spent the summer.

Reliable sources feel that press reports this summer on Katarina Witt receiving \$4 million for appearing in five cities with "Holiday On Ice" Europe were grossly exaggerated. Brian will be honored as the Young Italian American of the Year on October 22, his birthday. (It is customary for both presidential candidates to attend this prestigious event.) In November, he will serve as announcer for the Jimmy Fund Show in Boston and then appear as a guest at the NHK Championship Exhibition in Japan, where he will also act as commentator for the men's competition for NHK TV. Brian will also be seen along with other major athletes in a cameo appearance on a Disney special on the animation of sports. Plans are also underway for his San Francisco restaurant. which he says will have a turn-of-the-century Italian decor and a romantic vet informal atmosphere.

There are conflicting reports on Alexandr

Fadeev, as to whether he will continue in competition or turn professional. To date, there has been no announcement of his retirement, as there has been for Bestemianova and Bukin and Valova and Vasiliev.


"The NutraSweet World Professional Figure Skating Championships" will once again be held in Landover, Maryland, December 9, followed by the "World Challenge of Champions" in Paris on December 16. Both will have a delayed telecast.

"The U.S. Open Professional Figure Skating Championships," sponsored by the PSGA, will be held in Orlando, Florida, December 17-19.

A new professional "World Cup of Figure Skating" has been set for December 21, in Ottawa, Canada. Details will follow on these events as they become known.

The sixth Skate America returns this month to Portland, Maine, offering one of the first confrontations of potential 1989 World Championship contenders. Sixty-six competitors from seventeen countries are expected to attend the United States' only international competition of the season.

Official training is scheduled for Monday and Tuesday, October 17-18, with the actual competition (under the new ISU structure) starting Wednesday noon with ladies compulsory figures. Thursday's schedule includes the men's figures in the morning, compulsory dance in the afternoon, and the ladies and pair's original programs in the evening. Friday offers the men's original program and the OSP dance in the afternoon, with the pair's and ladies' long programs in the evening. Competition will conclude on Saturday with the free dance in the afternoon and the men's long program in the evening, to be followed on Sunday afternoon by an Exhibition of Champions. All events are scheduled for the Cumberland County Civic Center, an ideal venue for figure skating without a bad seat in the house.

Following the success of Skate America in Portland in 1987, the city once again will welcome the international skating community. Sold-out houses are expected for the event, according to chairman Priscilla Millier. "Coming only eight months after the Olympics, there has been tremendous interest in the event and in seeing some of the Calgary Olympians as they begin the new season and their quest towards the World Championships in Paris," she said. "It's a marvelous

opportunity to see these top international skaters in the new ISU competition format, and October is a beautiful time of year to visit Maine."

Representing Canada will be Michael Slipchuk, Martin Marceau, Josee Chouinard, Karen Preston, Michelle Menzies and Kevin Wheeler, Christine Hough and Doug Ladret, Michelle McDonald and Mark Mitchell, Catherine Pal and Donald Godfrev.

Representing the USA will be Olympic and World Team members Christopher Bowman, Susan Wynne and Joseph Druar, Natalie and Wayne Seybold, along with Olympic and World Team alternates Jeri Campbell, Daniel Doran, Kristi Yamaguchi, and Renee Roca and James Yorke. Also included are current World Junior Champion, Todd Eldredge, Holly Cook, Kellie Creel and Bob Pellaton, Shelley Propson and Scott Wendland, and Jennifer and Jeffrey Benz.

The USSR will be represented by Vladimir Petrenko, Natalia Skrebnevskaya, Svetlana Lyapina and Georgi Sur, Natalia Mishkutenko and Arthur Dmitriev, and Elena Leonova and Gennadi Krasnitski.




indomitable Toller Cranston, Lea Ann Miller and William Fauver, and Kathleen Schmelz. Each of the cast members will appear in solo as well as in ensemble production numbers, choreographed by Karen Kresge.

The tour is sponsored by the Discover Card and presented by the Plymouth Division of Chrysler Motors. IN REPLY

Dear Dr. Nelson.

I read the new rule about costumes. I think it is too strict. You can't get the feeling of the music if the costumes are dull. Sequins glisten and are pretty from a distance and close up. The ice glistens, so the skaters' costumes should.

I am sending along a petition signed by people who agree with me. I hope it makes a difference!

Dear Karen,

Thank you for your letter about the new costume rule and the petition signed by 51 persons which favors allowing sequins, beads and other decorations on skating costumes.

The new rule, which will be found in the new *Rulebook* as Skating Standards Rule 4.8, does not prohibit sequins, beads and other decorations, but limits them so as not be excessive. I realize that this requires a certain amount of good judgement on the part of not only the skaters, coaches and parents, but also the judges, referees and officials. You can be sure all of us will be struggling with this at first!

What the International Skating Union and the USFSA are trying to accomplish with this rule is to keep costumes in good taste and get away from some of the spectacular ones we have seen lately, especially in international competitions. Some of these were felt to be more appropriate for Las Vegas or the circus than for competitive figure skating.

We should be judging and comparing the athletic and artistic ability of the skaters, not the costumes. It is expected that this rule will allow costumes to compliment the theme, music and artistry of the program and skater, but not dominate them.

Again, sequins, beads and other decorations in good taste are *not* prohibited by this rule.

I appreciate very much your interest in this controversial rule, and for taking the time to let me know how you and your friends feel about it.





BUYER BEWARE

What is Really in Those Herbal Concoctions?

Recently an unfortunate case of inadvertent drug use resulted in poignant discomfort for one of our aspiring Olympians. The unfortunate athlete, who was competing in the Olympic Trials, was found positive for a banned drug.

Did this athlete take the drug knowingly and for the purpose of enhancing performance? Probably not, but that fact does not change the test results.

The substance taken was purported to enhance performance, but claims were that it specifically did not contain any banned substances. It was an herbal concoction, containing a number of herbs, from sassafras to dandelion. The ingredients listed on the container did not include any banned substances. Nonetheless, the athlete tested positive for several stimulants banned by the IOC/USOC.

The athlete resolutely denied taking any stimulants knowingly and insisted that they must have come from the herbal concoction. A scientific analysis of the concoction, as well as several other herbal substances, was subsequently performed, and it was revealed that the stimulants were indeed contained therein.

How could this be? Nothing on the labels suggested that the substance contained the stimulants, yet they were without doubt present. Athletes need to be made aware of the potential danger of taking herbal and other concoctions in attempt to enhance performance. Generally, herbal concoctions and vitamin/mineral, protein, and amino acid preparations are considered food supplements and therefore are not regulated by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). Most probably contain what the label states, but there is no way of knowing which are excep-

tions. You cannot really know what you are getting when you purchase these products, since amounts, percentages, and sometimes even some ingredients are not listed.

The USOC Drug Education Hotline and Crew Chiefs will no longer vouch for these products when asked about them by athletes. There is no way to know which of these products are "safe," and athletes must be advised that these substances are taken at the individual's risk. Using them may result in positive drug tests.

Most of the natural herbs known to man have been around for many years and have been researched and researched. In most cases, those that do what they are purported to do (increase sexual appetite, grow hair, enhance performance, etc.) contain a natural chemical that does just that. It would be unlikely to find a new chemical in an old herb unless it has been put there by science. The entrepreneurial pharmaceutical industry has missed few truly useful substances. The herbal concoctions now on the market are in most cases harmless to use, but, again, those that do work probably work because they contain a chemically active substance.

Most herbal substances are probably not harmful; in many cases, they have a placebo effect. However, beware! You use them at your own risk! Drug tests do not determine intent, they simply determine if a banned drug is present. How the drug gets into the system is the athlete's own responsibility. Athletes must be advised to be careful—use of herbal concoctions may keep them off the Olympic Team. The chance is not worth taking.



DON'T SAY NO TO ...

First of all, let's squelch the rumor that ice dancing is only for when you are old! Unfortunately, this idea has been presented to our young skaters by some professionals for two reasons: one, they do not teach ice dancing, and two, they themselves do not dance.

Ice dancing plays a very important part in our skating lives, even when you are not actually dancing. With the emphasis now being placed on free skating, ice dancing is going to play an even more important part in the skating scene. Ice dancing teaches you about music—how to interpret your music, to emphasize the highlights and to be able to skate to the beat of the music. How many times have you seen a freestyle program where the music playing is nothing but background noise or where you could change the piece of music and the skater would not even realize it?

Ice dancing also teaches good flow and body flexibility. Too many times a freestyle program is ruined by the "scratch-scratchscratch" of the skater's blades. A smooth, even stroke, good body positions, and a good feel for the music will enhance a free skater's ability and will also increase the enjoyment of those watching, including the judges!

While ice dancing aids in the development of a good free skater, the alternative is also

true. In order to be a good ice dancer, you should have a background of free skating, especially when preparing difficult and intricate free dances. In a good free dance, and even in the compulsory dances, a "oneness" should be seen, a "unit," not two people pushing and shoving, going in opposite directions. Dancing is not as easy as it seems and to present the correct steps, in time to the music, with good style is very difficult. Dance partners have to know at all times what the other person is doing, feeling, and where they are. All this is in addition to the actual performance of the dance and/or free dance.

In the beginning of this article I mentioned skating professionals that do not dance themselves and do not teach ice dancing. I would like to direct a few comments to those skaters who are contemplating the teaching of ice skating as a career. First let us consider the job search. When a skating club or an ice rink is seeking a good professional, they are looking for the most qualified in all facets of ice skating. A gold medal in singles and dance would look very good on a resumé and will certainly bring a higher salary than just knowing how to free skate. (It goes without saying that a third gold medal in pairs, would be even more beneficial.)

Second, if you are going to college, or plan to go on to college, think of the benefits that one can reap from having a gold medal in ice dancing. You might be able to teach ice dancing in your free hours. Also, there is a great demand for qualified partners for dance tests, a gold medalist could find partnering dance tests beneficial.

In closing let me say that if the USA is ever going to break the hold that the Soviets (and English) have had in the field of ice dancing, we are going to have to start our dancers out young, keep them together so they learn to work as a team, and teach them to be the very best dancers that they can be. I think we can do it—how about you?


"Figure skating currently has high public interest and popularity, especially following the in-depth coverage of the


Christopher Mitchell is a study in contrasts. He has been called kooky, cocky, outspoken, off-beat, and conservative—a combination that doesn't necessarily seem to go together. What many people seem to miss in this scholar-athletehedonist is the sensitive and philosophical sides of him. Above all else, Mitchell is his own person. That in itself is a refreshing welcome in an all too often look-alike, do-alike sport and society.

Mitchell rose to national prominence last January in Denver when he won the 1988 U.S. Junior Men's Championship. In second place after figures and short, he outskated the leader Shepherd Clark in the long to win the title.

He took another important step forward in establishing himself this summer at the Coupe des Alpes competitions. He won the silver medal at the Grand Prix

of St. Gervais in France and followed with the bronze medal at the Nebelhorn Trophy in Oberstdorf, Germany in his first international competition. (He had competed in 1983 at the Grand Prix of SNP while still a novice.)

A California native, which he claims is "the only place to live," Chris was born in Torrence and now lives in Palos Verdes. He is the youngest in a family of three brothers and two sisters with what he calls "a mess of nieces and nephews." His sister Debby, a dance major at UCLA, is also his choreographer.

"It's a good two-way working relationship," he explains. "We set the basic foundation and explore from there. She never skated but knows what constitutes a total routine and how to present it.

"Emphasis on the artistic side of skating is coming on strong, and I fully agree, and want to explore it. I think skating should incorporate, to some degree, more acting to establish a character or personality".

Mitchell has done quite a bit of acting from musicals to the psychotic teenager in *Equus*. "There is a line in *Zorba* I like: 'To dance, to dance out the feelings.'

"When you act, you project. You're giving to the audience. If you only compete, it is nothing more than a fight. Look at Brian Boitano last season. He wasn't only Brian, he was 'Napoleon Brian.' It looked really good, and was an important step for him and the sport. I think there should be more of it.

"It is much easier to be someone else—if you focus on a character—to be a warrior, a lover, a king . . . you can get out there and do it. If you know how to act, you can perform and put it together with all the technical skills and tricks for a total image.

"The challenge is working without words, basically a type of mime," he continues. "But language limits the mind, anyway. Don't you think so? Words are so ambiguous. The can mean anything and mean nothing, ultimately."

As far as his early skating, "I don't remember anything before I was sixteen," he jokes. "I evidently had a lot of excess energy when I was a kid. My mom put me on skates when I was about three and a half and said, 'Go tire yourself out.' I started lessons when I was about four, in Torrence, with bouts of horseback riding, tennis, and swimming mixed in there too, trying to figure out which one I liked most."

He trained with Jenny Walsh for twelve years and has been with Robert Taylor for a little over a year, training at the same rink with Christopher Bowman and Patrick Brault. Chris now balances a day of skating, school at the University of California at Los Angeles, and off-ice training. He is usually up at 5:30 A.M. and goes directly to the rink for four to five hours, then to UCLA for three or four classes ("Which are really quite useless," he claims.) Then he uses the school facilities for off-ice workouts. Most of Saturday is spent on ice, and he gives himself Sunday to relax and catch up on school. In between, he tries to find time for some surfing, racketball, skiing, or volleyball.

"School can be frustrating," he admits. "Sometimes I think college gets in the way of education. The are large classes geared to the masses, with practically no one-on-one. I am studying communications, but most of it comes down to self-learning. That's one reason skating is such an important outlet for expression for me. I would like to skate like Gene Kelly danced—with freedom, dynamics, and personality."

Despite the eventual elimination of figures, he considers it to be one of his favorite and best events. However, he believes his strength and consistency will carry him through future competitions without figures.

"I have been criticized sometimes for being a conservative skater," he observes. "I don't know that that is all true. There is a difference between knowing your limitations and being conservative. I realize there are several things I need to improve, but one of my goals is to work more acting into my skating to expand the artistic side."

The majority of his goals are made on a short-term basis. "I don't like to make long-range goals. They're too out of hand to control and the slightest thing can throw them off. I want things tangible enough to grasp. One step at a time . . . sometimes even day by day.

"This is my first year as a senior, so I feel I have a little leeway to experiment and not get all stressed out. I am working on a triple Axel which I am finding to be easier that expected. But then I think my double Axel is my best jump, anyway. I prefer edge jumps over toe jumps," he states, admitting to a bunion problem that flairs up now and then.

Mitchell frowns when asked about people who may have influenced his skating or those that he admires. "There are a lot of people I admire as people, and there are a lot of people I admire as skaters . . . there aren't that many I admire as both. I suppose, Scott Hamilton, Chris Bowman, Robin Cousins, and Pat Brault. But that's quite a range of styles," he laughs, "to make any one influence."

As for the future, Chris is looking for diversity and options. "A professional career in a show might be fun, but I don't see a life career out of sports, not after you're thirty."

His brother owns a chain of restaurants and a business career is one consideration, as is dabbling in acting on the side, plus the communications field. Still undecided, he does know "I want the backup security of having more than one thing to devote myself to," which is against what he calls the "California easy way out."

Christopher Mitchell is coming on strong, and with the creativity and individuality he displays, there is little doubt that this many-faceted champion will continue to explore new areas. At the minute, however, the focus is on skating with great expectations to come.

1988 COLLEGIATE CHAMPIONSHIPS

A future business and marketing manager, an orthopedic surgeon, and a concert pianist shared the podium for top honors in men's freestyle at the 4th annual National Collegiate Figure Skating Championships. On the distaff side, a potential educator, FBI agent, and psychologist stood side by side in the medal ceremony. Forty student skaters with various backgrounds and interests from across the country, including nineteen '88 National Team members, gathered in Colorado Springs in late August for the Championships, hosted by the Centennial Skating Club. Competitors were housed at the U.S. Olympic Training Center near the Sertich Memorial Arena where all events and practices were held.

Following a draw party held at the World Figure Skating Hall of Fame and Museum, the competition began the following morning with ladies' figures. In the Collegiates, figures are skated as a separate medal event. Ladies awards were presented to Kelly Ann Szmurlo, Marquette University, gold; Kathaleen Kelly, Harvard University, silver; and Nancy Kerrigan, Emmanuel College, bronze. Men's medalists were led by Troy Goldstein, California State, Long Beach, gold; Steven Rice, Pierce College, silver;

and Kelby Riley, State University of New York, bronze.

The freestyle competitions offered a first view of the new Original Program, and as expected, brought a wide range of interpretations and execution of elements. Rice took the lead in the men's event, followed by Robin Lewis, University of Alabama, in second, and Goldstein in third.

In the long program, Goldstein, a premed student with an eye towards orthopedic surgery, was able to overtake Lewis in a jump-filled routine that allowed room for little else, including a double Lutz with hand overhead, consecutive double Axels, and a modified Biellmann spin with high leg extension. Rice, a business and marketing major, displayed strength, speed, and confidence in his skating to popular romantic themes, including "Rhapsody In Blue," incorporating a string of triples to retain first. Lewis used his long body line well with good extensions and solid double jumps to hold off Riley's challenge. Final results saw Rice receive his second consecutive Collegiate gold medal, with Goldstein taking the silver and Lewis the bronze.

Lewis's presence at the competition was no small feat. His rink in Birmingham had closed and he had been out of full-time training for over two years, maintaining his skills by driving two-hundred miles in each direction to Atlanta. With a combined major of marketing and music, he had just returned from a European tour with 42nd Street and West Side Story and had only two months to train for the competition. He was overjoyed to be there and to medal.


The ladies' freestyle began with Kerrigan in first, Szmurlo second, Kelly third, and Lynn Stafford, University of Vermont, in fourth after the Original Program. The new spiral step sequence brought out the greatest variety of inter-

pretations and executions among the ladies. In the long program Kerrigan, an education major, opened with a solid triple toe-triple toe and presented a richly interpreted performance. Szmurlo looked strong and secure in a well choreographed presentation but was unable to overtake the leader. Carla Schultz, a psychology major at Pikes Peak Community College, skating in her hometown, had been seventh after the original program. With a dynamic showing she moved ahead of the field to place third in the long and third overall for the bronze. Calgary Olympian, Jill Trenary assisted in the presentation of the ladies' medals. Jill herself entered college this fall in Colorado Springs.

Szmurlo who is majoring in criminology and law, has great interest in working with the FBI. But such thoughts were far from her mind as she performed a solid program combining her athletic and artistic prowess.

Only two senior pairs made the trip to Colorado but their action-packed programs were special audience pleasers. Calla Urbanski with new partner Mark Naylor, both students at the University of Delaware, took the lead in the original

program and did not relinquish it. Their hydrant lift, beautiful death spiral, and fast solo spins (in opposite directions) were well received. Julianne Thompson and Brian Geddeis, Pikes Peak Community College, were also hometown favorites, and despite minor flaws skated well with a good split twist lift and a fine throw Salchow. Brian is majoring in commercial art, design, and layout, and still finds time to train between classes and two part-time jobs.

"Being local, I am used to the altitude and it doesn't bother me like it does some of the skaters," he commented. "But this is an ideal setting for the competition and the whole week has been great."

In junior pairs, Jocelyn and Brad Cox, University of Delaware, led after the original program over Dawn and Troy Goldstein, with Dawn Piepenbrink and Tim Dever, Phoenix College, in third. In the long, the Coxes showed excellent pair spins, good height on throw jumps and an impressive change hands death spiral. Piepenbrink and Dever also skated strongly displaying good side-by-side jumps and a powerful change hands lift. The Goldsteins are both skilled jumpers and spinners but experienced minor difficulties that were enough to drop them to third in the long. The overall results gave the gold to the Coxes, the silver to Piepenbrink and Dever, and the bronze to the Goldsteins. (Troy Goldstein became the first triple medalist in the history of the event, placing in both men's figures and freestyle and in pairs.)

It is the year of *Phantom of the Opera* music, portions of which were used by several dance teams as well as single skaters. Five dance teams from one coast to the other began the Argentine Tango and the Paso Doble compulsories with Andrea Chow and Martin Chow, Hofstra University, finishing first. Martin is a business management major who is planning to attend law school following his undergraduate work.





The Origin of School Figures Where They Came From, Who Discovered Them

Ever since skating became an organized sport, the handbook of prescribed figures has been a way of life for competitors, coaches, and the officials who judge the events.

Over the years the vital importance given figures in the markings has caused many a headache and heartache, even upset important championships. A classic example might be the 1972 Olympics at Sapporo. Janet Lynn, doing well in compulsories until she fell apart with loop-change-loop, was dropped down to fourth place and lost her chance for the gold. There have been numerous other examples of more recent vintage.

It is little wonder then, that from time to time a contestant who bobbles a critical figure comes tearing off the ice crying in frustrated despair, "Where did school figures ever come from? Why do we have to do them?"

The Fascination of Figures

Two prominent skaters of the same era but with different viewpoints as to the value of figures were Maribel Vinson Owen, nine times U.S. Senior Ladies' Champion, and Evelyn Chandler Baer who turned professional after winning the 1929, national Junior Ladies' title. She went on to become one of the greatest exhibition skaters of her day, headlining with the Ice Follies for years.

Miss Chandler always felt that the ice artists who could lay down award-winning figures hardly ever became showstoppers in free skating, while the best free skaters rarely were addicted to figures.

On the other hand, Mrs. Owen's first love were the compulsories despite her

rating as a superb free skater. For amused relaxation she often would watch old-time exponents of the "American" style, spend their time on such things as Maltese Crosses, Anvils, Pig's Ears, Double-Circle-Eights, continuous Loop-Change-Loops, Grapevines, and "swamp" figures of a bygone day. She once remarked to the writer, "Take the school figures out of skating and you have an undisciplined sport. There can be no substitute technique—there are no short cuts."

The Dutch Roll—The First "Figure"

Delving into the genesis of skating's early figures would be an impossible task without aid from the printed works and past personal contacts of such marvelous historians as Irving Brokaw, James A. Cruikshank, Nigel Brown, and Maxwell Witham, among others. The birth of some ice moves always will remain tangled in the mists as some figures may have been skated for years before acquiring a name. Others seem to have been invented by dif-



ferent people in different countries almost at the same time.

Most researchers seem to agree, however, that the first "figure" in figure skating must been the "Dutch Roll," originating in Holland, probably sometime early in the sixteenth century. To execute an Outside Roll an iron runner with edges would be essential to grip the ice. Iron blades were in use in the Netherlands even before Columbus discovered America, and early paintings depict outside edge action even before the mid-1550's. Bone and wooden skates, used prior to iron runners, even when ground flat, permitted little more than straight forward movement assisted by poles or wind for propulsion.

The Dutch Roll was so well thought of in the early days of English skating that a contemporary *Book of Sports*, circa 1770, tells us, "Figure skating is an easy sport to learn. The forward roll is the first step. When the learner has perfected it, he can easily obtain the rest."

The First Compulsories

The earliest record of compulsory figures is associated with the first skating club. Organized in Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1642, although actual written history starts in 1774. Even before that latter date membership could be gained only by, "... skating a circle, first on one foot, then on the other foot and jumping over, first one, then two, then three hats. The prescribed costume for men (no women allowed) was, "white tie, swallow-tail coat, pantaloons."

In 1892, the Club revised the compulsory test results to "Forward and backward Cross Rolls, Forward Eights, Forward Three, and Once-Back (Waltz step) skated to center. No jumps and no costumes were specified.

Threes, Eights, and Eagles

The figure Three is introduced to us in the pages of A Treatise On Skating, published in London, 1772. Compiled and authored by Lieutenant Robert Jones, an officer in the English artillery service, this work is a real textbook on the subject. Information is contained on Outer Forward

Eights, Outer and Inner Eagles, Serpentines, and others. Jones calls his Three, the "heart figure." Many English officers in the early 1770's were stationed at Philadelphia and also in Canadian cities, so it seems likely that the author obtained much of his information from North America.

The noted Philadelphia painter, Benjamin West, visited London in 1763 and entertained spectators at London's skating centers with impromptu exhibitions. British cartoonist James Gillray sketched Mr. West doing the "Salutation" which became known throughout Europe as the "American Eagle." The young painter was twenty-five years old at the time.

The First Figure Skate

While hollow ground skates had been in existence since about the 1770's, it remained for Henry Boswell, an iron worker in Oxford, England, to design and produce the first "figure skate" in 1838. This model shortened the front of the blade and lengthened the back section so the blade ran the full length of the boot, ending with turned up heel.


The Four Edges, "Q's," and Paragraphs

France's contribution to early skating literature was a colorful book called *Vrait Pattineurs* produced in 1813. Written by a M. Garcin it describes the Backward and Forward Outside Edges in detail. Descriptions of more than thirty different figures are included along with Pirouettes and some jumps. Researcher Nigel Brown notes in his History that Garcin calls the turns, "hooks." Many different moves are tied together with the "hook." Even at that early stage the four edges were practiced by French skaters and were recognized as the basis of all skating.

George Anderson, then President of the Glasgow Skating Club, published a noteworthy book on figure skating in 1852 and expanded it in 1868. Entitled *The Art of Skating* and written under the pen name of Cyclos, this volume introduces the "Q" figures and the paragraphs.

Grapevines

The Grapevines, among the most complicated of figures to execute yet most in-



teresting to watch, were born in North America, then imported into England and the Continent about the mid-1850's. T. Maxwell Witham, noted author-skater in an 1885 edition of the Badminton Library's section on figure skating tells of his first encounter with that convoluted figure called the Grapevine.

He writes: "Many years ago I was skating at the Penn Pond in Richmond, England, where I saw a man skating a two-footed figure that was quite new to me and which seemed to be a juggle of the feet which was impossible to follow, and yet which had a rhythm and go in it that excited emulation." Witham went on to say that the skater was from Philadelphia and that it was called the Grapevine. In the figure skating article Witham includes numerous well-diagramed figures including a variety of Grapevines.

One-Foot Eights

One of the first demonstrations of the One-Foot Eight was given by W.H. Cheesman in 1862 at the New York Skating Club on the pond, now the site of the Plaza Hotel. The One-Foot Eight with Loop (Loop-Change-Loop) was introduced by Adam Beaudoine in 1864, also in New York City. The One-Foot Eights of that day were skated with two circles superimposed before changing edge for the second circle.

An important skating convention, The American Skating Congress, took place in 1868 and included the associations from both the U.S. and Canada and made possible serious competition between the two countries. At this Congress a program of school figures, presented by E.B. Cook, was adopted. There was no free skating. School figures were the whole thing.

These figures included Plain Edges, Lap-Foots, (Grind-The-Bar), Outer and Inner Rolls in circles (Dutch Rolls), Change of Edge (both forward and backward), On-To-Richmond locomotives, Eagles, Threes, Single and Double Grapevines, Toe and Heel Movements, Double-Foot Whirls (Spins), Forward and Backward Ringlets, and Serpentines. No Rockers or Counters were included because they were not well enough known at the time to be in the program.

Counters, Rockers, Brackets

Counters, Rockers, and Brackets, too, quite evidently were the brain children of two skaters who had spent their time over a period of many years analyzing the sport. H.E. Vandervell and T. Maxwell Witham published a book in 1869 outlining how they had invented these allimportant figures. This fine work is a combination textbook and history of the sport. Some of the figures which they invented were tried out on roller skates before going to the ice.

It was Max Witham, also, who may have skated the first bracket ever seen in London skating centers. He reported this figure in detail in the *London Field* newspaper. It was analyzed and classified by leading skaters of the day just as one might catalog a new species of bug or flower.

First Official World Championship 1896

Sanctioned by the newly formed International Skating Union (then called the Internationale Eislauf-Vereinigung), the first Championship of the World was held in St. Petersburg (Leningrad), Russia in 1896. When the United States Figure Skating Association was formed in 1923, it adopted the rules, regulations, and prescribed figures of the world governing body.

A Prophet Before His Time?

Occasionally, over the years voices have been raised suggesting reforms of the rules governing competitions. One knowledgeable, articulate voice, was that of the late Robert Dench.


Dench, British Gold Medalist, and a coach of American skaters in the United States for more than twenty years, pleaded with the amateur skating officials to separate the two divisions of skating—the School Figures and Free Skating—into two completely different contests.

In one of his last articles on the subject, he wrote: "We can modernize skating, take it out of the exclusive class, introduce it to many thousands of new competitors if we frankly acknowledge that school figures are a different scientific study, while free skating is an artistic, athletic sport.


"The two phases of skating should be separated from each other completely. The figures should be judged as one sport, free skating as another. Outside of the four edges and turns the two have little in common."

Well, there you have it. Now that the ISU actually has decided on the excision of figures from competition, perhaps they may also decide at some future time to set up compulsory figures as a new sport, all by its lonesome, bringing back all the old favorites from Mohawks to Maltese Crosses, and spark off a resurgence of interest in artistic designs on ice.

If so, skating will have come full circle, and once again, as in days of old, School Figures will be the "whole thing."

UOD AND THE 3/3 RULE

by Ann Fauver

Almost everyone enjoys watching the Rockettes at Radio City Music Hall perform their famous kickline, or the June Taylor Dancers as they surprise the audience with unexpected transitions. You may wonder what these dance groups have to do with precision skating. Interestingly enough, the same ingredients which are common to these performing groups are also present in precision. The common denominator is "oneness" of a group—unison and movement to music—the very core of precision skating!

When USFSA precision schools were conducted across the country several years ago, the word "UOD" was introduced. It did not come from a Dr. Seuss book, though some of you may think so. Rather, it is one of those alphabet words created to emphasize the important ingredients of precision skating. UOD stands for, unison, originality, and difficulty, all essential to precision whether you apply them as a

iudge or a coach.

"U" was placed first because, if this most important element of precision skating is missing, then it is not precision skating. Unison is the real challenge and the quality a team must strive for in every maneuver, transition, and piece of footwork which they include in their program. Unison is the ingredient which fascinates the spectator, and is rewarded by the judges. Therefore, the foremost challenge for each team, regardless of level, is for each team member to learn to subjugate individuality and to participate as one member of the whole. To achieve the look of total unison there must be unison of every movement: heads, arms, upper body, legs, and feet.

"O" for Originality was placed next. Through the use of creativity, teams can develop their own trademark or personality. How important this is! It makes a team unique. They have given the spectator and/or judge something by which to remember them. Without looking back at my notes from the '88 Nationals, I clearly



remember a young, inexperienced team from Salt Lake because they had a touch of originality in their routine. They made a positive impression, and I look forward to seeing them again.

Precision rules were designed to be non-conforming, therefore, the opportunity for originality is limitless. Teams can learn the basic wheels and blocks, then can go on to incorporate them into their program "their" way, with "their innovation." Because the USFSA rules require three different tempos and three different rhythms in each routine, this 3/3 music rule has served to guide our teams towards creativity and originality in their search for excellence.

When precision was in its infancy, we availed ourselves of every opportunity to learn from our Canadian neighbors, who were leaders in the development of this sport. They used fast, peppy, up-tempo music with clear, strong beats. They moved fast, and faster as they packed their programs with maneuvers and precise, difficult footwork. It was impressive. Because they did not have a 3/3 tempo rule, they developed routines that had little, if any, actual tempo changes. Their numbers covered the ice swiftly and became fast. faster with tremendous content. However, with a few exceptions teams began to look alike, which resulted in the judges counting the number of elements in each program in order to help them place the teams.

Meanwhile, U.S. coaches were trying to find a way to deal with the 3/3 music re-

quirement, and still follow the Canadian style. Eventually, in an effort to reach the top, they started to experiment with the latitude of the three rhythm/three tempo rule. At this point, U.S. teams started to develop strengths with innovative moves created in an effort to interpret their music. They were also developing distinct personalities, a uniqueness, a trend which is getting stronger.

For example, those familiar with precision have come to expect the Fraser teams to be well trained, have high energy with movement resembling the Canadian style. The Hayden teams incorporate free skating moves into their well choreographed programs, and the Fabulous Forties' numbers contain a distinct dance flavor. Not only do all of these teams have precision, but each one has its own personality: a result of creativity. It makes them more interesting to watch and sets them apart from other teams. I feel that the "O" in UOD has been enhanced by the magical 3/3.

"D" in UOD is for Difficulty and is the last letter of our alphabet word, and perhaps the most elusive and hardest factor to assess in a precision routine. It was placed last because difficulty is not impressive if the first quality, "unison" is absent. It takes an all encompassing eve to evaluate the difficulty factor of each move. for action is swift. Much is going on at the same time. As teams become more sophisticated, combining difficult holds, fast footwork, and quick, unique transitions, all must be noted and considered with the assessment of each maneuver. We've progressed far beyond the day of making a decision based on the generalized statement, "the team with the larger number of skaters gets more credit because it is more difficult to keep the line straight." Not necessarily so. Even that statement depends on many factors, which hold is used, the direction of movement, the flow, speed, and footwork.

Precision skating has made tremendous strides since the Hockettes of Ann Arbor first skated between halves of the hockey games. As I watched all the teams in Reno, I realized very visibly what tremendous strides precision has made in our country, not only from the inception of our Na-



Midori Ito is invisible. Dressed in a team uniform with "Japan" on the back of the jacket, she walks among the crowds unnoticed. When the competition begins, she sits in the stands among the spectators and observes every move on the ice as if mentally memorizing for some later time. When a member of her team comes to join her, she bows and speaks only a few words in very hushed tones before continuing to concentrate on the competition at hand.

The quiet, humble Ito is transformed into her ultra-ego once her skates touch the ice. Her tiny 4' 10" frame becomes energized, and her face shows the joy of skating. She springs effortlessly into the air in not one but two triples in combination. Her spins are centered as if anchored to the ice. She appears superhuman with her jumps, and screams for

joy as she lands them.

Once again off the ice, the humble Ito again reappears. When asked about the popularity of her sport in Japan, she says quietly, "Skating is popular in a way. Just so-so. Baseball is much more popular." But during the Olympic games, her pictures were everywhere in the Japanese newspapers. News of her accomplishments were reported at every opportunity. "The spectators were very happy with my skating. I was happy and crying at the end of my program in the Olympics because I could do all five triple jumps. I was so happy to do all the jumps without mistakes."

With a fifth-place Olympic finish and the retirement of Witt, Manley, and Thomas, the World title would seem to be realistically within Ito's grasp. Now eighteen years old, she lives and trains in the place she began skating—Nagoya, Japan. Her first and only coach, Machiko Yamada, spotted Ito in a children's class and has become her supporter, mentor, and surrogate mother as Ito now lives with her coach's family.


As Ito remembers her beginnings on the ice, "I only went to the ice rink for pleasure and joy. I didn't have an idol. Eventually as I was better, I went more and more often. Now it depends on the day but I probably train four to six hours each day."

The daily schedule is hectic and there is not much time for anything but skating and school and sleep. The day

begins at 5:00 A.M. like most skaters with skating until 7:30 at Nagoya Sports Center. Then off to school at Tokai Women's High School. At 3:00 P.M. she feeds the pigeons and stops at a Buddhist shrine for reflection and prayer. Then back to the sports center for another four-hour practice, home for homework, and six short hours of sleep before starting the whole routine again.

For Ito, it is the joy of jumping that makes skating not a routine but a thrill. Her jumping ability has been natural and easy from the beginning. With a big smile, she remembers, "I did my first triple jump when I was eight years old. I have always liked jumping. When I jump very good, I feel very happy."

Her triple jumping ability brought her sensational reviews right from the beginning. In her first World Juniors in 1981, Canadian Skater reported, "Midori Ito at 3' 11" and the smallest skater in the competition vaulted all the way from twentieth in figures to eighth overall with a free skating performance that belied her eleven years. Ito spun and jumped her way to first place in the free skating... The standing ovation she got was obviously for her superb technical display." She was eighth her first



year and sixth the following, not able to shake her nemesis, the compulsory figures. The next year she again won the free skating as reported, "She is an incredible free skater and one in a million."

Ito's success began in her third try at World Juniors in 1983. This time she was just thirteenth in figures but won the free skating for the third time in a row. The reporting of the performance again gave her glowing reviews. "Certainly the most publicized and highlighted event of this World Juniors was the ladies' singles. The Japanese believe they have the best lady free skater in the world . . . Her jumps are big, evenly skated . . . She had all firsts in the long and the short."

The best, however, was yet to come for Ito. Skating at the 1983 Ennia Challenge Cup in her first Senior international competition, she went head to head with Katarina Witt. Again the Canadian Skater reported, "The long free produced the closest and most exciting finish one could wish to see, the verdict going 5-4 in favor of Katarina over Ito. Ito, skating last, was a sensation. She opened with a double Axel-triple toe then landed five different triples . . . and was accorded a richly deserved standing ovation."

Not only did she nearly defeat Witt, but the following year she won the 1984 Skate Canada over Tiffany Chin and won the 1984 NHK with Debi Thomas in second and Elizabeth Manley only fifth. As Brian Pockar, former Canadian Men's Champion and TV commentator observed, "Her triple Lutz in the long was the best I have seen—male or female."

The latter competition has always been a favorite for the Japanese because of the home audience and because there are no compulsory figures. But Ito is unconcerned, "I have always been very good at the free but I haven't gotten higher in the compulsories. I want to

make the compulsories better." And what about the ISU's plan to eliminate figures in 1990? "I haven't been thinking about it, not yet. There are still two years to go. I just want to do my best in the future."

With Ito's jumping ability, is there a quad or triple Axel in the future. "I was doing triple Axels three years ago, but then I broke my leg. From that time, I have not done it. The injury doesn't bother me. I don't feel it. But since then I don't do triple Axels."

The broken leg happened in 1985 just before the start of the Worlds in Tokyo where Ito was Japan's brightest hope for a medal. Only one other lady, Emi Watanabe, bronze medalist in the 1979 World Championships, has ever won a medal for Japan. Ito hopes to change that by eventually becoming World Champion. According to her, she still has many years yet to do this. "I don't know how long I will continue. I don't see the end now. I just want to do the best I can do."

Her main concern, besides the figures, is to become an all around skater. "From now on I will strive or make efforts to do the artistic part. Japanese girls have trouble emulating American and European skaters because we are the wrong shape. But I will fight and do my best. I know now the Japanese people will expect more of me and I will have to work harder."

What makes Ito happiest is the feelings she gets from the audience. "I like to make the spectators happy. I am happiest when I feel the ovations. I know then I can fight even harder to do my jumps and to make the people happy." From the smile on her face and determination in her eye as she steps on the ice, that is exactly where she longs to be.

BLADES OF COURAGE

A Canadian film titled *Blades of Courage* is beginning to circulate in the States. Originally made by CBS for television in 1987 under the name of *Skate* and roughly based on biographical incidents of one prominent skater, the film should be on the nonexport list. It is doubtful it will satisfy any skating enthusiast, student, or competitor regardless of age.

Basically, a good, solid, accurate film about competitive amateur skating has never been made, and Blades of Courage does not change the pattern. It is the standard, tattered plot of a struggling young female skater fighting (not too strongly) against the odds of being national champion, complete with domineering coach, the overbearing mother, a series of failures, and the mandatory happy ending. Blades does have some uncharacteristic "mature" scenes not recommended for young viewers, including a rather pointless pot smoking, overnight romp in a motel with a previously odious classmate, and some strong language at times.

A hockey player in the stands sums up the overall reaction to this film when he says, "This is embarrassing . . . watching figure skating." It is a little embarrassing to watch competitions held in dark arenas with spotlights; it is embarrassing to watch sectionals without anyone in the audience at all; it is embarrassing for a skater and coach to confuse a double Axel with a triple Salchow; it is unrealistic to watch a skater throw a competition to get even with a coach.

Set during the 1987 competitive season, it unsuccessfully tries to mix fact and fiction. The film was made without the approval or advice of the Canadian Figure Skating Association (despite the use of characters representing CFSA officials). Someone, anyone knowledgeable in the sport, might have been able to help salvage parts, but the whole is past help. The skating, most of the time, is at a fair junior level, yet the heroine is supposedly on the World team and seeking the senior Canadian title, despite the fact that she can't land a triple Salchow. Yet when she does, she gets four 6.0's for one triple jump at the Canadian Nationals.

There are several interesting and well performed scenes. The actors do what they can with a Swiss cheese script. Some of the photography is commendable though uncreative in approach. It fails most in its skating sequences, which at times the frail story overshadows, for all of its attempts and pretensions. There is always a danger that fiction will be believed as fact by uninformed viewers, and the overall image of the sport in this film is not very positive or complimentary.

One of the more interesting lines of dialogue worth pondering observes, "They love the gift but not the gifted one." Had this been used as a story line rather than the banal, unoriginal one we see, there might have been a film worth making and seeing. As it is, the only courage in *Blades of Courage* comes from those who endure and sit through a viewing.

ISU NOTES

At the May ISU Congress in Davos, Switzerland, the Council decided unanimously to present the Jacques Favart Trophy to Olympic and World Champion Katarina Witt. Witt will be touring with "Holiday On Ice" in Europe this winter and also has been named Ambassador of UNICEF, succeeding West Germany's tennis star Boris Becker.


F. Ritter Shumway garnered another honor and will be presented the ISU Georg Häsler Medal, named in honor of the former ISU Honorary Secretary. The medal is presented in recognition of Shumway's years of service and contribution to the sport.

Benjamin T. Wright became the first American to be elected chairman of a major ISU committee. Wright is now Chairman of the ISU Technical Committee for Figure Skating. Other USFSA members also elected to special posts were Charles DeMore, substitute member of the ISU Council, and Dr. Franklin S. Nelson, Chairman of the ISU Medical Advisors. Elemer Tertak of Hungary resigned from the Council and was replaced by Sonia Bianchetti-Garbato, the first woman to hold such a post.

In a special presentation at the banquet following the meeting, Mr. Wright presented plaques to Alexandr Gorshkov for himself and the family of his late wife, Liudmilla Pakhomova, signifying their induction into the World Figure Skating Hall of Fame. Pakhomova and Gorshkov won six World and European titles, were the first Olympic ice dancing champions, and inventors of the Tango Romantica.





50 YEAR GALA

In August, the Broadmoor World Arena presented its 50th anniversary summer ice review, celebrating half a century of superior entertainment on ice. Another 1988 Olympian, ice dancer Joseph Druar assisted in the presentation of the medals. Joe knows well the demands on the skating scholar. having completed his studies and graduated from St. Joseph's University with a degree in marketing while training and competing.


