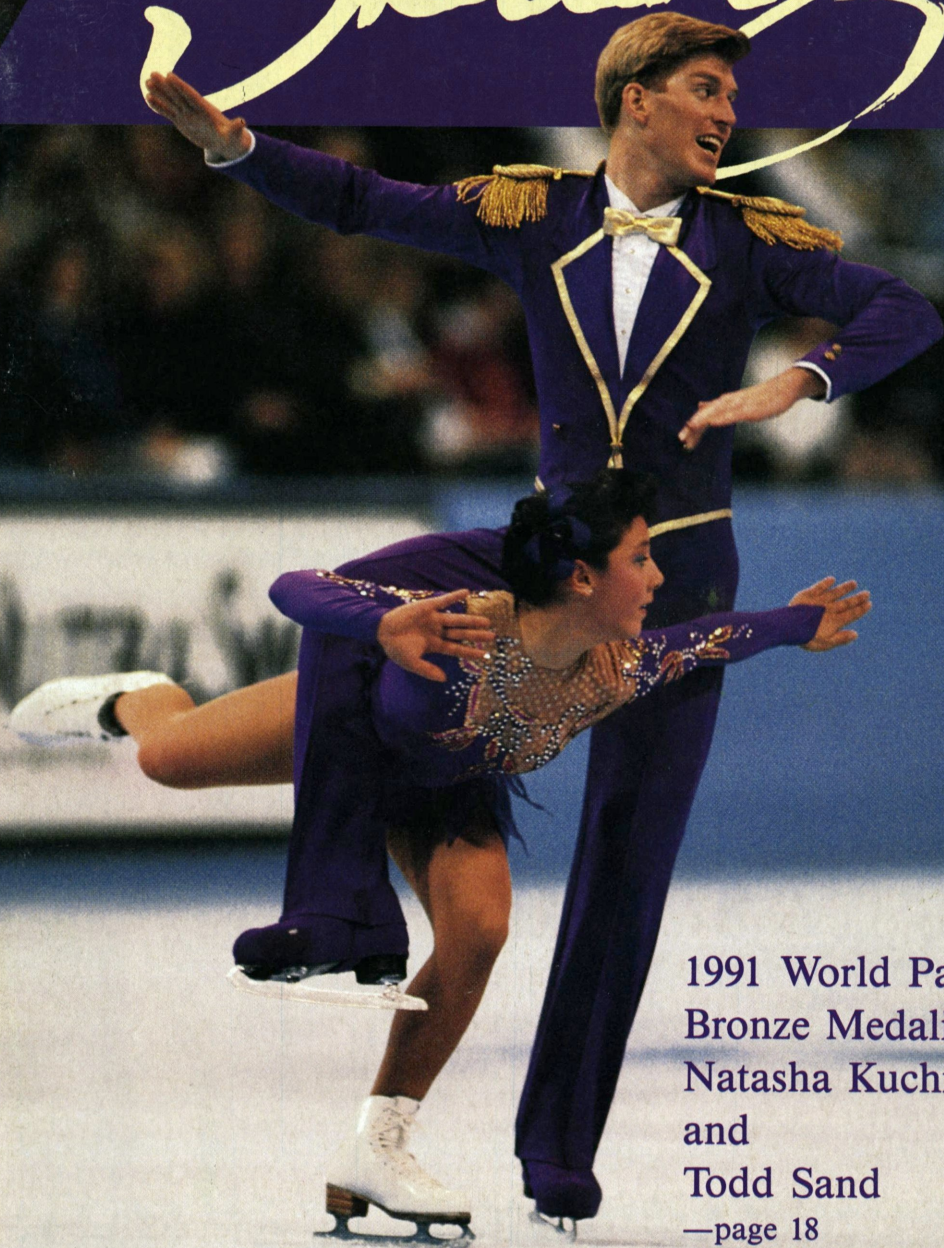

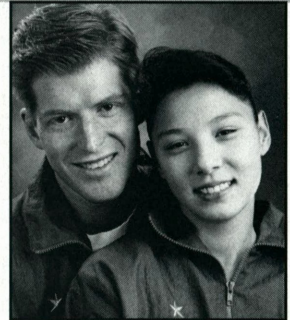

1990 World Champion Jill Trenary was named Colorado's Sportswoman of the Year and was also inducted into the Colorado Sportswomen Hall of Fame March 10. She was honored for her victories at the 1990 U.S. Nationals and the 1990 World Championships.

Trenary will leave her longtime-home Broadmoor Skating Club to begin training under the auspices of Carol Heiss Jenkins this month in Cleveland.

The 15-member U.S. contingent to the 1991

World Junior Championships last December in Budapest, Hungary, made an impressive appearance especially for such a young group.

Lisa Ervin finished second in the ladies' event, only to Surya Bonaly of France; and Nicole Bobek a respectable fourth. Scott Davis, Ryan Hunka, and John Baldwin represented the U.S. men and placed fourth, ninth, and 10th respectively.

U.S. pair Jennifer Heurlin and John Frederiksen were bronze medalists behind two Soviet pairs; Aimee Offner and Brian Helgenberg finished fifth and, the youngest U.S. pair team ever sent to World Juniors, siblings Nicole and Gregory Sciarrotta, finished in an impressive sixth place spot.

Dancers Kimberly Callahan and Robert Peal and Laurie Baker and David Kastan placed ninth and 14, respectively.

The team was escorted by Jessica Gaynor and Edwin Cossitt, team leaders, and Dr. Angela Smith, team physician.

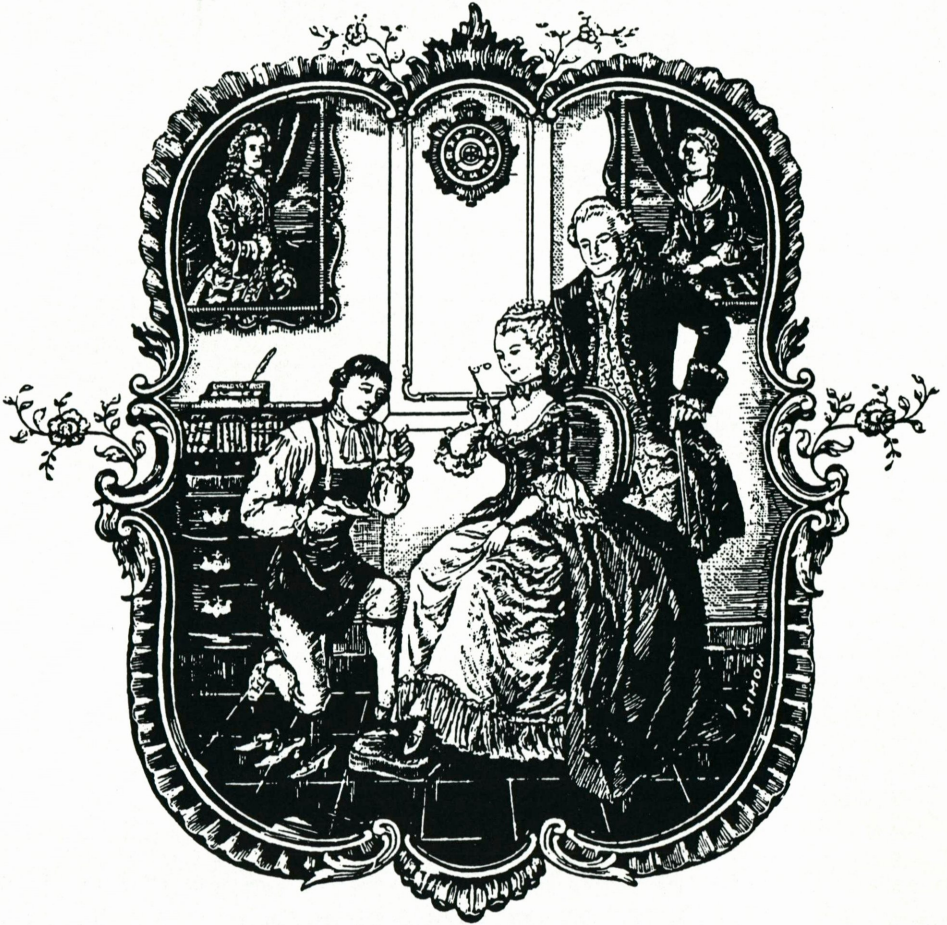

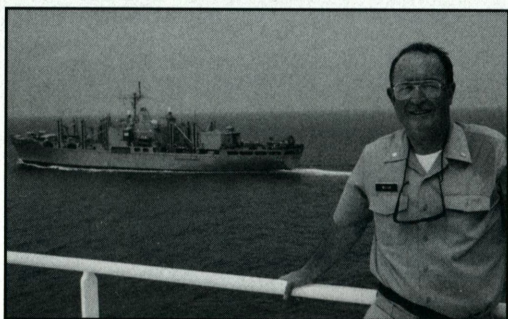

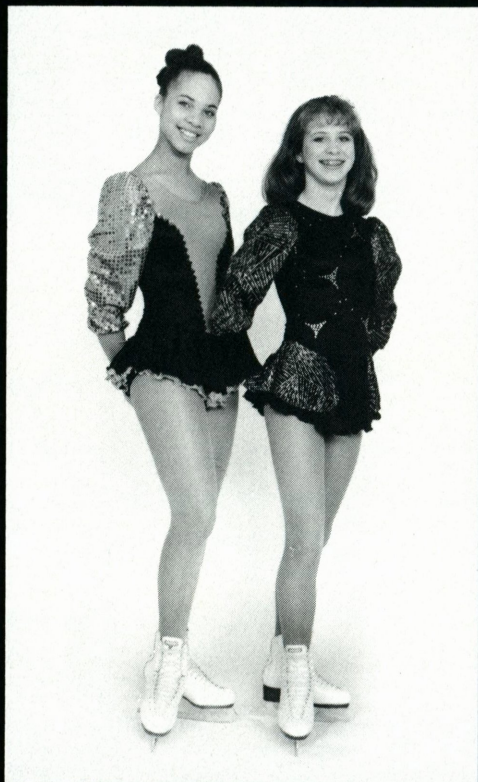

Soldiers on Ice



As far as is known, only one military battle is chronicled as having been fought on skates.

The year was 1592 and the place was Amsterdam, Holland. The Dutch fleet was frozen in the harbor. At this time, the Dutch were in the middle of a conflict with Spain. The son of the Duke of Alva, Don Frederick, ordered his soldiers to go over the ice and capture the Dutch ships.

The Dutch musketeers, however, were skilled skaters who had been gliding along the canals of Holland for years. They strapped on their wooden platform skates with iron blades and went out to meet the forces of Don Frederick.

The poor Spaniards were no match. They were soon routed by the Dutch, fled back to their ships, and sailed away. The battle at IJsselmeer was a triumph for the Dutch soldiers and their skill on skates.

The 17th century silver figurine of a soldier on skates in the World Figure Skating Museum commemorates this unusual military battle. The piece is from the Gillis Gräfstrom collection of "Skating in Art" which traces the history of skating as a sport, as a social pastime, and, yes, even as a military tool in European and American life.

The maker of the figurine is unknown, but it is an outstanding work of art with great attention to detail in the dress of the 16th century warrior, including his breastplate and helmet, down to the finest detail of his facial features. He is as elegant as he is bold and is a lasting tribute to history's only military battle fought on skates.

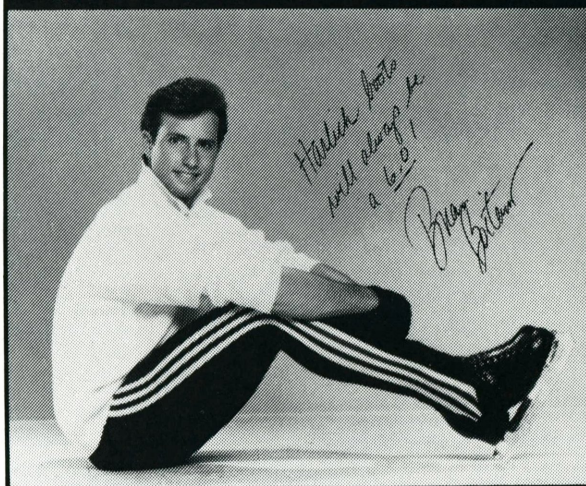

AND THEN THERE WERE NONE

A Fond Remembrance of Compulsory Figures at the World Championships

Part II

THEN THERE WERE SIX . . . 1948-1972

From 1948 through 1968, compulsory figures still comprised 60 percent of each competitor's total score. However, with all evidence pointing to burgeoning entries in future World Championships, the ISU Congress of 1947 voted to cut the number of compulsory figures in half, drawing six but alternating right and left foot starts.

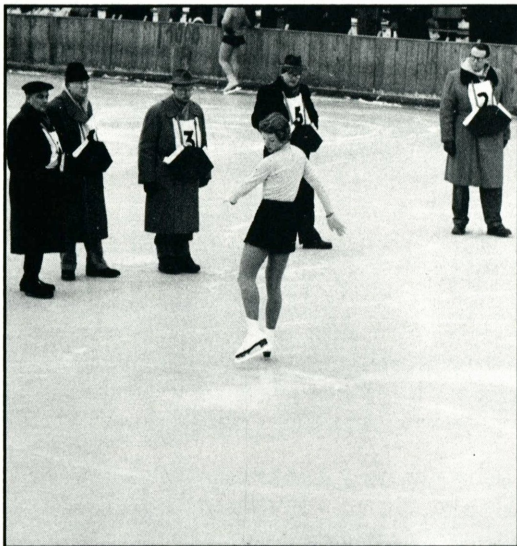
Reaction at the time was mixed. *Skating's* editor, Theresa Weld Blanchard, wrote after the 1948 Olympics, ". . . I think that most agreed with me that it was not a real test, but probably more practical from a judge's and schedule angle. If you have only one bad figure you are out of the running; in the old days all entrants could have a bad figure and still have time to recover."

The effects of winter weather on outdoor ice continued to present problems, beginning at the World Championships in Davos in 1948. Again Blanchard wrote in *Skating*: "The girls skated two figures in the afternoon and conditions were terrible. None of them could see their tracings and many had bad figures. I learned that day (Friday) that six feet of snow had fallen since the previous Sunday, and that it had been the worst snowfall in 50 years. . . . The girls did two more figures the next morning, but had

to stop because the ice was impossible. It seemed to be the general opinion that this was the worst ice that the World's had experienced for years. At nine that night the temperature was 34 degrees and no one believed the figures would continue the next day but they were resumed at 8 A.M. The judges had to judge almost entirely by what they saw as the figure was skated, because the tracings hardly showed after the figure was completed. . . . One poor girl got completely lost and put her counters all over the ice, and it was a wonder that more didn't. The ice was not so much frozen water as frozen snow. . . ." One newspaper report described the ice as "gooey as chocolate pie."

In 1949 in Paris, Dick Button became the first USA skater to win a compulsory figure event at the World Championships. (Button had become the country's first World titlist the previous year, after narrowly losing the judges' decision in the figures.) A skating correspondent wrote of Button in *The Times of London*, "He has improved his style since last year, his double three figure being skated with great power and precision."

The same reporter wrote of the 1949 ladies' event, "It may be that some of the judges found difficulty in seeing the drawings on the ice and thus were unable to differentiate between ellipses and circles and that they were blind to alignment, but they should have been able to



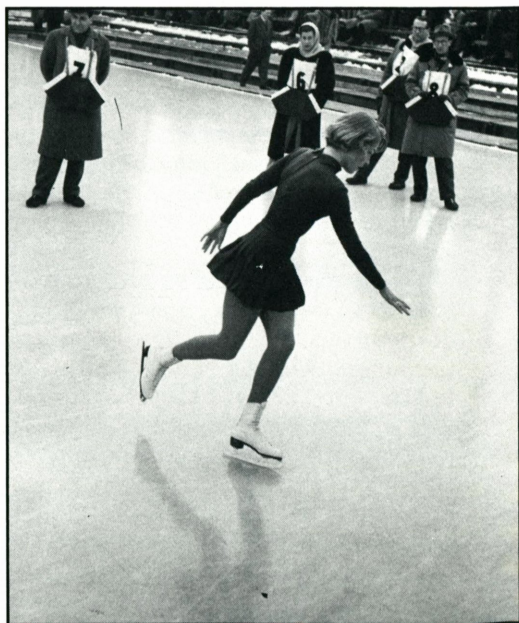

see bulging hips, with knees locked together, and ugly movements.” However, reports from throughout this postwar period give evidence that the standard of the ladies’ compulsory figures was significantly higher than that of the men. Former Champion Ulrich Salchow commented in 1947, “Of course men cannot sacrifice that much time which will be necessary to bring them to championship class.” Jeannette Altwegg of Great Britain, Lady Champion of the World in 1951, was reputedly an outstanding exponent of the discipline. Nigel Brown wrote in *Ice Skating: A History*, “This skater will go down in history as the finest school-figure skater of post-war times. She had a natural facility, ease and skill, that lent real beauty to this branch of the art.” Her unanimous first placement in figures swept her to the title with the vote of eight of the nine judges, despite her sixth-place finish in the free skating.

American skaters achieved almost total domination of World championship figure events during the 1950’s. In 1953 in

Davos, Tenley Albright became the first American woman to triumph in compulsory figures; after winning again in 1954 and 1955, she was succeeded by Carol Heiss, who did so from 1956 through 1960. U.S. men who were consecutive victors were Dick Button (1949-1952), Jimmy Grogan (1953), Hayes Jenkins (1954-1956), David Jenkins (1957), and Tim Brown (1958-1959).

Wind presented the greatest challenge to the men skating figures in Vienna in 1955. *Skating* reported, “The weather was quite cold and the figures were skated under extremely difficult wind conditions. The gusts were so strong that at times they seemed to throw a skater off balance, and in one instance brought a contestant almost to a standstill. Hayes Jenkins’ experience was valuable to him; he seemed to take his time and evaluate the wind before starting a figure. . . . David Jenkins . . . at one time stopped in the middle of a figure

to let a gust of wind go by. Hugh Graham seemed to draw more than his share of 'ill wind' as the gusts seemed to hamper him consistently . . ."

In Garmisch in 1956, the problem was bitter cold. *Skating* again reported, "Enough cannot be said about the terrific cold. Before and during the competitions temperatures ranged from 27 degrees below zero to a few degrees below. Even on the few sunny days it rarely was as high as 15 degrees. The skaters had to bundle up with so many layers of clothing it is amazing they could perform, and many suffered frostbite. Such extreme weather conditions made the ice so brittle that it would crack under the skates; this created a difficult situation during the figure competition, when the ice would chip during the first tracing and the competitor had to worry about getting caught in his own tracks."

Worlds returned to the United States in 1957 (for the first time since 1930), held then and again in 1959 in Colorado Springs. Ironically, it was now the Europeans who struggled with unfamiliar ice conditions during the figures. "The Europeans were hampered during this phase because their blades are hollow ground for skating on outdoor ice, which

is much harder than indoors. When on the softer indoor surface, it was extremely difficult for these competitors to prevent themselves from double tracking—and in most cases they didn't," reported *Skating*.

Dick Button turned reporter to cover the 1966 World Championships in Davos and provided some colorful commentary. Describing the men's figure competition, he wrote, ". . . Emmerich Danzer, for a reason unknown to this writer, was given first place by a substantial margin. Some of the figures were performed in snow. I stood two feet away from Mr. Danzer's rocker, in which his lack of push, or the snow, or something resulted in his skating a figure with no speed and therefore no edge. The wobbles at the end of the '8' were a sight to behold, and one beautiful wiggle was neatly and expertly traced in the second print. Because the snow on the ice made the print exceedingly clear, every spectator was able to see the figure plainly. When it was completed, one of the judges cleared the snow off the print with his feet. If this was an attempt to see the edge more clearly, couldn't the official snow removers have done a much better job with their brushes? Perhaps a new ISU ruling is needed."

In 1966 in Davos, Peggy Fleming became the first American since the tragic loss of the 1961 World Team to win the compulsory figures at World Championships. *Skating* described her as ". . . a surprise leader at the end of the figures with an almost unbeatable margin of 49 points." She was to become the unanimous winner of the figures and the World title in 1967 and 1968.

The skaters' final battle with inclement weather conditions was waged in Vienna in 1967. "Skating outside is much more invigorating than skating inside some stuffy arena. Skaters should be able to handle all kinds of conditions

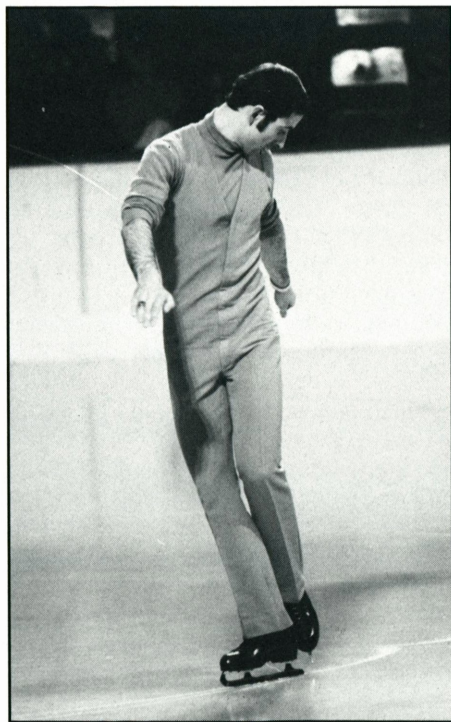
and elements since, after all, skating is an outdoor sport. But I guess it's depressing to work a whole year and then have your one chance hampered by a gust of wind or your enthusiasm dampened by a driving rain . . ." said Button.

In June of 1967, the ISU Congress made two momentous decisions. One was that beginning in 1968, ISU and Olympic championships were to be held in artificially refrigerated, covered rinks. The other was that after September 1, 1968, and thus at the 1969 World Championships, equal weight would be given to figures and to free skating, each counting for 50 percent in the final accounting.

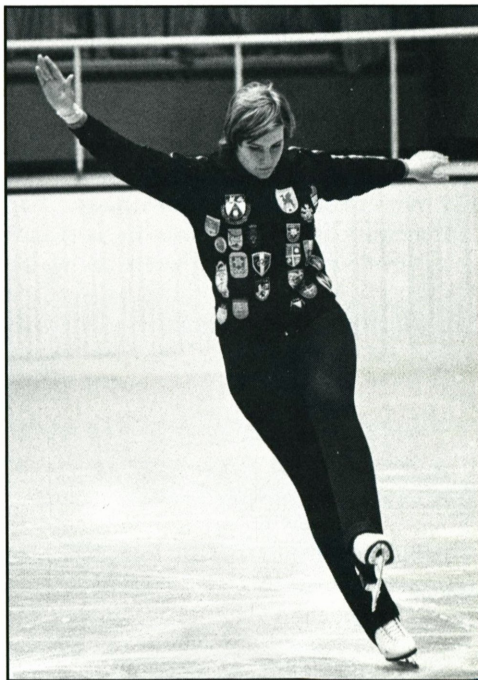
American Tim Wood won the figures in the first World Championships forced indoors in Geneva in 1968, and again the following year. Mrs. Gillis Grafström (widow of the champion of the 1920's)

was a spectator at the 1969 championship. According to *Skating*, "Tim Wood's figures delighted her. 'They exactly equaled my husband's,' she said."

Also in 1969 began the reign of Beatrix Schuba of Austria, widely acknowledged as one of the supreme artists of compulsory figure skating history. Although an indifferent free skater (during the years in which she won the figures, her free skating placements were sixth, seventh, and ninth), the excellence of her figures carried her to the title of Lady Champion of the World in 1971 and 1972. From *Skating's* report of the 1971 Championships in Lyon: "The ladies' competition brought out one very clear fact: compulsory figures are still the deciding factor when a specialist is at work, and this year the specialist was Beatrix Schuba of Austria. With hardly an error to be found, Miss Schuba was machine-like in her figures, and so far ahead of the

rest that it was impossible to catch her. Reaching the same heights of perfection that Jeannette Altwegg achieved in the 1952 Olympics, Beatrix is distinctly 'in a class by herself' in figures." Although Janet Lynn of the United States won the free skating that year, she could finish no higher than fourth.

Figures were once again de-emphasized by the ISU at its meeting in June of 1971. It was there decreed that beginning with the 1972-73 championship season, only three compulsory figures would be skated, to count for 40 percent; a short program would be introduced, with a weight of 20 percent; and the free skating would be 40 percent of each skater's score.

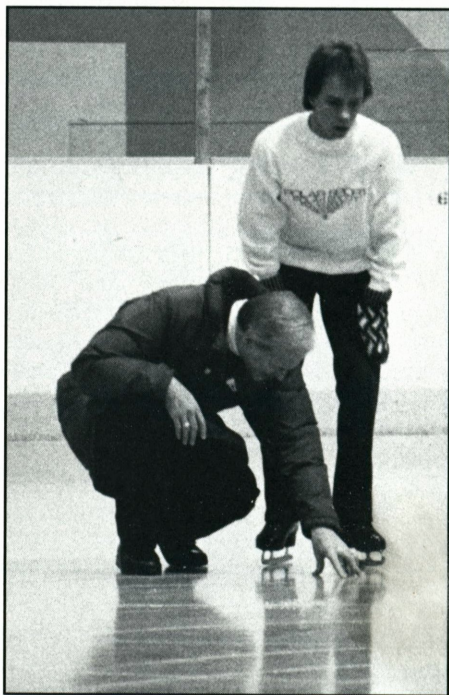
FOR A WHILE THERE WERE THREE . . . 1973-1988

Moving the Championships indoors did not necessarily mean the end of extreme cold. In 1973, *Skating* reported on the ladies' figures at Bratislava, "In a bitterly cold ice rink—the first of many events to be skated under frigid conditions. As usual, it was a lengthy event, even with only 3 instead of 6 figures, and generally opinions seemed to favor having just 3 figures."

At its meeting in 1975, the ISU Congress voted to change the figures/short program/free skating percentage weighting from 40/20/40, in effect for only three years, to 30/20/50. Perhaps as a result, Isabel de Navarre of the Federal Republic of Germany finished sixth in the Ladies' Championship in 1976, despite winning the compulsory figures. This was the lowest finish ever, up to then, for a figure victor. Only Richard Zander would eventually eclipse this record, by placing first in figures and finishing seventh in the 1990 Men's Championship.

In 1981 in Hartford the de-emphasis of figures continued, when the factored placement system of scoring was introduced. No longer would total points accrued in the figures (or any other event segment) carry through in the calculation of the final result. Nevertheless, Hartford attracted, ". . . surely the largest crowds ever to watch the compulsories . . ."

No American skater won the compulsory figure segment of the World Championships during the 1970's. The only U.S. representatives to triumph in figures in the 1980's were Rosalynn Summers, in Helsinki in 1983; and Scott Hamilton, in Ottawa in 1984. The Soviets Kira Ivanova and Alexandr Fadeev dominated the figures for much of the decade. In Cincinnati in 1987, an overflow crowd at the Sabin Convention Center watched in fascination what would be the last

VERY BRIEFLY THERE WERE TWO . . . 1989-1990

The death blow to figures at the World Championships was finally struck by the ISU Congress of 1988, when it approved a change to two figures, an original program, and free skating, weighted 20, 30 and 50 percent, respectively, for the 1988-89 and 1989-90 championship seasons; and the total deletion of figures from the ISU Senior and Junior championships beginning July 1, 1990. The United States, Canada, Great Britain, and New Zealand were the only countries to cast dissenting votes against this momentous change.

And so it was that the last figures were etched into World Championships ice in Halifax one year ago. The same figures were drawn by both men and ladies: ISU numbers 37b (LBO, RBI Paragraph Double Three) and 38a (RFO, LFI Paragraph Loop).

Monday, March 5, was an unforgettable day for all who were present at the men's figure competition. It would be particularly memorable for Richard Zander, a former Pacific Coast competitor now skating for the Federal Republic of Germany, who won the first-place ordinal of all nine judges; for David Liu, American-trained and skating for Chinese Taipei, who skated the last men's figure; and for U.S. Champion Todd Eldredge, who was congratulated by Referee Sonia Bianchetti for the excellence of his loop, and finished seventh among 31 men at his first World Championships.

On Wednesday, March 7, with American Referee Benjamin T. Wright presiding, Jill Trenary became the last skater ever to win figures at the World Championships. Her compatriot Holly Cook

scored the highest marks for the loop and finished fourth. Perhaps it was appropriate that Trenary's victory in the figures weighed heavily in making her the 1990 Lady Champion of the World. The nine-place edge which she gained over her chief rival, defending Champion Midori Ito of Japan, ultimately earned her the title.

Sizable crowds offered appreciative applause throughout both the men's and ladies' events in Halifax. When Zeljka Cizmesija of Yugoslavia, the final lady to skate, had completed her loop, spectators thronged onto the ice for one last look at the prints, while others threw roses to the ice. Cizmesija's loop, a fine one which left her in fifth place among the 29 ladies, was outlined with roses and photographed for posterity. More than a few tears were shed, by skaters, judges, and spectators alike. It was the end of a long and fascinating era in the history of the sport. World Championships *figure* skating would have no more figures.

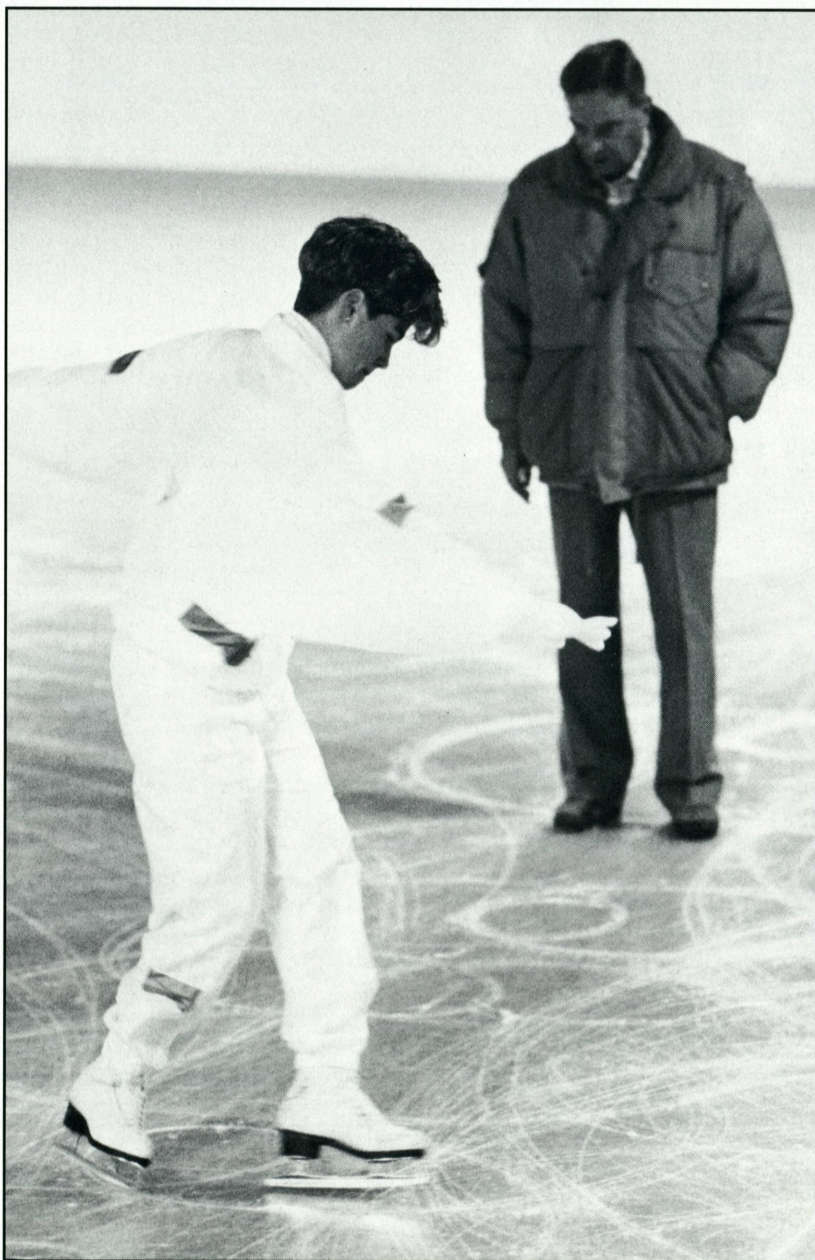
AND THEN THERE WERE NONE . . .

Perhaps the following observations make the strongest statement about the importance of figures in the history of the World Championships: In 80 years of Men's Championships, only six times (in 1978, 1981, 1982, 1983, 1989, and 1990) did a winner of the figures who completed the competition not become an overall medalist. And in the 70 years in which the Ladies' Championships were contested, only four times (in 1974, 1976, 1986, and 1987) did the winner of the figures fail to win a medal.

Natasha Kuchiki & Todd Sand: What Age Difference?

A funny thing almost happened to Natasha Kuchiki and Todd Sand on the way to the World Figure Skating Championships. Even though they were crowned the United States Senior Pair Champions in February, they were almost deemed ineligible to compete at Munich.

Last year, readers may recall, when the pair were the U.S. silver medalists behind Kristi Yamaguchi and Rudi Galindo, they could have been prevented from participating at Worlds because the then-13-year-old Kuchiki was too young by ISU competition standards. It was only after requesting and receiving a waiver from the ISU that the team was able to compete, placing 11th out of 16 pairs.

Under that ruling, which states that World entrants must be age 14 by June 30 of the year preceding the competition,

Kuchiki would also have been ineligible for Worlds 1991: she turned 14 in October 1990. But at its Governing Council meeting last June in New Zealand, the ISU changed the ruling to state that competitors must attain that age by the end of the preceding year.

"After all," as Kuchiki and Sand's veteran coach, John Nicks, pointed out, "to have a rule saying that the champions, the titleholders, can't skate at Worlds would be crazy."

Happily, then, the twosome were spared last year's cliffhanger situation. "Last year we came home the Tuesday after Nationals and found out on TV that we were going to Worlds," recalled Sand, whose own participation was never in question because he was then 26. "We got off the plane and a TV sports commentator told us. I was surprised,

though Mandy Wötzel and Axel Rauschenbach of East Germany had broken through that ruling before us.”

Added Kuchiki, “In a way I was confident that we were going to be able to go, but there was still a bug in me, saying ‘I don’t know.’”

What type of reception did they encounter when they finally did go to Halifax? “Ninety-nine percent of the people said, ‘We’re glad to see you here,’” Sand said. “But there was a little noise made by one of the countries, which shall remain nameless.”

Actually, while Kuchiki’s age is a prime focal point for everyone else, it is no big deal to the two themselves. “We don’t think about it, really,” she said. Added Sand, “We’re here because we have a common goal, and do it because we love it.”

On the ice, where it counts most, neither their 13-year age difference nor nine-inch height discrepancy (she’s 5’2” to his 5’11”) is readily apparent, a tribute to Kuchiki’s athletic maturity and the hard work they and Nicks have devoted to achieve a unified look. Off the ice, Kuchiki seems more the young teenager that she is, answering interview questions with shy, short answers, and look-

ing to Sand for more articulate responses. Comments Nicks, “Todd thinks of Natasha as a little sister. We were in Switzerland for an ISU seminar. It was a new country to her, and I was very pleased to see him taking care of her. I think there’s a genuine caring for her.”

Asked just what a 14-year-old girl can bring to a partnership with a 27-year-old man, Kuchiki giggled nervously and said only, “He acts younger than he is, when he’s around me!”

Sand provided a more elaborate answer. “I think she’s a very good skater, strong, powerful, dynamic. Right from the beginning, I was forced to raise my level of skating. She brings a lot of knowledge to the pair—she knows skating. If something’s wrong, or a little off, she has something to say, and I listen, because it means something. She knows her body, knows where she is when she’s in the air.”

And Sand’s contribution? “I guess experience would have to be at the top. We’re both pretty strong skaters. When we first started, I might have been a little more concerned with style. . .”

“You were more show-bizzy,” Kuchiki interjected.

“. . . and she was more concerned

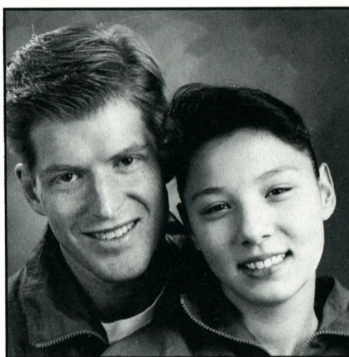
with being dynamic," he continued. "So we have the combination of those two things, and we're both trying to expand our artistic side."

The two teamed up in 1989, at the suggestion of coach Nicks, who had been working with Sand at the Ice Capades Chalet in Costa Mesa, Calif., now the pair's home base. Both members of the Los Angeles FSC, they had previously skated with other partners. Sand competed with Lori Blasko from 1985 to 1988, winning Southwest Pacifics and Pacific Coasts their first year together and finishing eighth at Nationals in 1988, before calling a halt to competition because of Blasko's various ongoing injuries. Kuchiki skated with Richard Anderson from 1985 to 1989, becoming the 1988 and 1989 Pacific Coast Junior Pair Champions and 1989 National silver medalists. They broke up after that latter competition, for reasons that Kuchiki said are personal.

Both have also had accomplished careers as singles skaters. Sand, who began skating at age 8 and later trained with Frank Carroll, was Danish National Champion in 1982 and 1983; his father is a native Dane. Kuchiki is the daughter of two former Ice Capades stars, Japanese-born father Sashi, who was noted for his dazzling routine with flaming torches, and Canadian-born Denise, who skated solo, comedy, and adagio. Not surprisingly, she began skating as a toddler, as did older sister Tamara, and was last year's Pacific Coast Junior Ladies' Champion, placing sixth nationally. Though now devoting all her time to the pair, she may eventually return to singles competition.

What, then, attracted each of them to pair skating?

"Everything," Kuchiki said. "Richard asked me if I wanted to do pairs. We did tryout lifts on the floor. I asked my

mother if I could do pairs, and she said no, it would ruin my singles skating. So I begged and begged for months, and finally she said yes. Two days later, I did a double Axel and broke my leg!"

Sand had always been interested in pairs. "I like the combination of athleticism and artistry, in combination with another person," he said. "I also felt my body type was more conducive to pair skating."

Pair competition at Worlds was far different from his previous ventures there representing Denmark, Sand discovered. "Skating in general has improved. My experience with the U.S. team was totally fulfilling. It's a bigger team; there are a lot more people to support and to support you."

Two months after Worlds, Yamaguchi and Galindo's retirement from pair skating in favor of their singles careers left Kuchiki and Sand in the number-one national spot. "We'd been hearing rumors for years, but when it happened, it didn't set in right away with us," Sand recalled. "I was kind of sad, in a way, about their splitting up," Kuchiki added.

In their new status, the twosome competed in three international events after Worlds, placing fourth at the Goodwill Games and at Skate America, and fifth at the NHK Trophy in Japan. They were forced to withdraw from the U.S. Olympic Festival, prior to the Goodwill Games, due to Sand's back injury.

Both say that the NHK Trophy was their favorite post-World competition. "It was exciting, like Worlds all over again," Kuchiki said. "We were ranked seventh, and ended up fifth." "And," Sand added, "We loved the country a lot."

Having learned and improved with each event, during this competition season the two have been working to improve every aspect of their skating: speed, power, artistry, and choreography. They train five days a week in Costa Mesa and sometimes on Saturday mornings in North Hollywood, taking the requisite ballet, stretch, and lift classes.

Looking ahead to Munich, Sand said, "I don't think there'll be a lot of pressure there per se, because we're not coming in with a high ranking. But we're looking forward to moving up substantially." Added Kuchiki, "We're hoping for a top five."

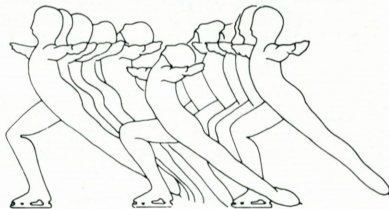
Looking further ahead, the two want to compete through 1994. Both say they will probably always be involved in some facet of the sport.

The two spend time together off the ice as well, but maintain their own separate activities and interests. Kuchiki, a ninth-grader taking correspondence courses, does homework, draws, and goes biking and roller blading. "And I want to ski," she added, "but no one will let me! If I weren't a skater, I'd be a skier, or a cyclist, maybe in the Tour de France." For his part, Sand, a junior at Cal State Fullerton, enjoys working out in the gym, and playing baseball and golf.

Obviously, these two have managed to disprove the many nay-sayers who predicted that their pairing would never work, that the challenges posed by their age and physical differences were just too great to overcome. Hardly surprising, though, when one considers that Kuchiki says that the most valuable lesson she learned from her parents had

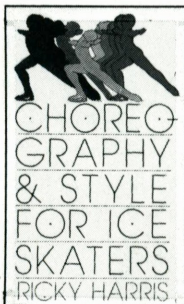

On The "Second Mark" Free Skating Program Part II

Style

Style is a manner of expression, a way of executing a task, or performing an action. It is the manner in which a skating program is executed. It is the manner of action of a particular performer. Skating programs can be classified as having athletic, balletic, dramatic, jazz, or ethnic style.

Ideally, one skater's style should not be judged against another skater's style, as all styles are valid. Style has to do with different body types, training, personality, and whether or not the skater is carrying out the intended style of music.

Utilization of Area

Design on the ice is very important to the overall look of the program. The skater needs to use the ice as a canvas, with all possible geometric shapes including circles, angles, triangles, curves, serpentine, squares, and straight lines, considered. Is the program going in large circles, round and round? There must be manipulation of the ice space and the body within the space, filling it with movement all over the ice, to de-emphasize the open feeling. The challenge of new inventiveness can be had by considering all these shapes.

All movements made by the body also have a design in space. In choreography, this can be referred to as a phrase pattern. The design in time, or phrase pattern, is the succession of several spatial designs following one another and forming a shape in time. The same can be said about the design of the program on the ice.

Easy Movement and Sureness to Music

The skater must skate on time to the music. Two vital elements in a program are the fast

and the slow. The fast should contain: dazzling speed, accelerated energy, incredible agility, and brilliant staccato.

This involves muscles which are tight and specially trained. Breathing is shorter and faster. Fast parts are favorites with most audiences. It is a very dramatic and exciting part of a program. It calls attention to itself. It asks for audience appreciation and applause.

A slow part should contain the opposite of the fast; there should be lyrical and romantic expression. The slow part affords the skater the opportunity to impart to the audience a floating quality, creating suspended forms of images that *are animated*. It should have a beautiful feeling of illusion.

This does not necessarily mean that it needs to be skated slower, but in a lyrical manner. The slow part of a program shows the quality of a skater's agility and form. It is like a ballet adagio. It shows that you have control, by performing the elements and skating that you do in the fast parts, with flow and control. This is where the true artist emerges in the field of expression and communication. Lyrical slow parts go deep into the psyche and make for a beautiful sharing experience with everyone.

Carriage

No movement is going to look good on a skater with bad posture (we already discussed that in the February issue of *Skating* when we talked of presentation). The physical motions that result in a straight spine and good carriage are: a lifted breastbone (chest open), relaxed shoulders, relaxed back, abdominals pulled in, knees aligned, joints slightly soft, and head held up.

Invention and Originality

Creativity, talent, and genius.

These are scary words! Is one born with these gifts, or can they be taught? If they cannot be taught, the *skills* can at least be taught, and stimulated with success. Skaters can be taught and directed to use their eyes and imagination. They can be encouraged to be adventuresome and bold. They can be urged out of their complacency. Above all, they can be inspired to be distinctive; to be themselves.

But it takes time and work.

Artistic genius cannot be taught, but the

(L to R) Dana MacDonald, Second; Allyson Fenlon, First; Amy Holmberg, Third; Tiffany Severa, Fourth.



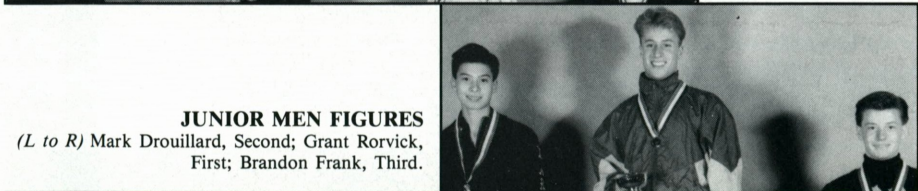

Hey Precision . . .

You've Come a Long Way, Baby!

Precision skaters, coaches, parents, and organizers have worked hard. To anyone who has been involved in precision for a number of years, the changes over the past decade may be obvious. But, for those of you just starting out who may be wondering: What is she talking about? Travel through time with me, and I'll show you.

The year was 1986. The event, the National Precision Championships. Having won the Eastern Sectional Championships, my team qualified as one of 56 teams gathered at Boston University's Walter Brown Arena to compete for the honor of being the best team in the country.

These days, the country's best still compete against one another, but above and beyond these rivalries, they skate on one team: the U.S. Team led by Team Leader Shirley Hage, the United States recently entered 15 teams in

the first International Precision Competition of its kind ever held in this country. Last weekend I returned—this time as a spectator—to the Walter Brown Arena for this prestigious event; the Snowflake International Invitational Precision Competition.

The event began Friday, December 28, 1990, when 36 of the best precision teams in the world comprised of some 900 skaters representing six different nations—Canada, Japan, Mexico, Norway, Sweden, and the United States—filled the arena to near capacity for the opening ceremonies. Clustered together by team, the skaters wore matching warm-ups. These brightly colored outfits made it easy to identify where each athlete was from as the teams sat cheering a plethora of different languages which were not easily identifiable.

On the ice, in their competition outfits, two members of each team carried their team banner between them, while local skaters circled carrying the official flags of each country represented. This incredible spectacle of color and sound concluded with a welcoming speech from various members of the organizing committee, and the United States Figure Skating Association.

Sitting there taking all of this in, I found myself thinking back to that day in 1986 when I was out there on the ice competing. *So much has changed since I first started doing precision in 1982.* But, it wasn't until I began searching for an interpreter who spoke Japanese that it really struck me just how far precision has come. As Lynn Benson, coach of the nationally ranked Haydenettes said, "I remember when we thought it was really neat to say 'We compete *not only* in the U.S., but in *Canada!*'"

Those days are gone, it seems, and the Snowflake International stands as testimony that all over the world, precision has taken off. Perhaps the greatest indication of the distance we've come is the fact that the skating community has taken notice of precision. Even more importantly, they've taken action.

"We look at it (precision) as something enormous," said Charles DeMore, councilman for the International Skating Union (ISU) and past president of the USFSA. "We feel that if you're going to have precision skating, it should be international in scope." As a result, five officials from as far apart as the

U.S., Canada, and Sweden, took on the task; they formed a committee. According to DeMore, the committee's function is to "develop rules and regulations to be submitted to the ISU Congress, when it meets in June of 1992, for their acceptance." As he explained, "We have to take the rules, as now formulated, and mold them to what we feel will be acceptable to the International Skating Union (the governing body of Figure Skating worldwide)."

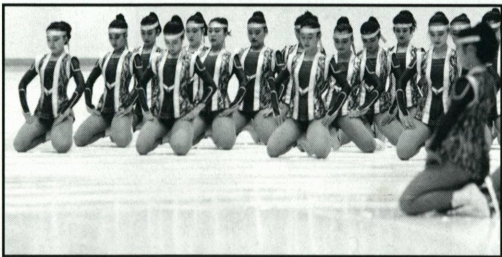
While the organizers do their part to ensure that the rules keep up with the rapid growth of the sport, skaters and coaches from around the world have been training for the upcoming season by preparing the most technically difficult and artistically creative programs in the history of the sport. In other words, in addition to the progress that has been made on the organizational level, precision teams *look* different today than they did five years ago.

As precision skaters of the past may remember, our programs were full of awkward transitions that filled the gaps between various formations as we marched to music that our coaches undoubtedly chose because of its definitive beat. But, as one skater said,

"Marching went out with the 1970's!" Today, precision skaters dance to the beat of a different drummer.

"In the senior level, the teams are getting more and more sophisticated," remarked Lyne Forget, coach of perennial power Les Pirouettes of Laval, Quebec. "It's getting more and more artistic *without forgetting the technical part*. You want to see good edges, speed, and flow, that's the main thing: some good figure skating. But, then it has to be innovative."

The creative part is what changes most from year to year, and apparently the trend these days in precision is to build a program around one central theme. At the Snowflake Invitational alone, there were two teams with Hawaiian themes, two teams doing *Carmen*, one doing *The Nutcracker*, one doing *The Sound of Music*, and even a team that skated to music from the James Bond movie, *Goldfinger*. Referring to the increased importance of themes, one skater from the Brampton Ice Angels of Brampton, Ontario added, "Precision is more *difficult* than it used to be. Before, you would go out, and the music was always really bouncy, and there were all those big, fake smiles. You did the steps, but there was really not much expression. Now it's themes, and it's edges, and expression, and that's what wins."

That may be what wins, but as far as some skaters and coaches are concerned, the judges may be accenting theme a little too much. Should the theme be as important as it is? The issue remains to be debated, but for now, people around the world seem to have accepted this turn, for better or for worse.

It is also interesting to note that different countries seem to have adopted different

styles of skating. "We skate to classical music, but you skate to pop," remarked one Swedish skater upon coming to this country and seeing U.S. precision teams for the first time. "You skate like Americans; we skate like Russians." In short, precision has evolved to the point where some countries actually have styles that can be associated with them, and that says something.

It says something not only about the country, but about the fact that countries are at different stages in the development of the sport. In Canada, for example, stop anyone on the street, ask if they know what precision is, and you'll get a full-fledged definition complete with team names and their placements at Canadian Nationals. Backed by nationwide support, precision thrives in Canada. In fact, it has progressed to the point where they have begun to test the plausibility of including an original (short) program with required elements. If successful, this experiment could revolutionize the sport, changing it forever.

However, for other countries such as Norway, Mexico, and Japan, the sport of precision is itself revolutionary. Precision is just beginning in these countries, and with only two or three teams in each, it will take time before they are able to rouse the nationwide awareness and support that is so prevalent in Canada.

In this country precision falls somewhere in between the two extremes. I call it the "precision paradox," by which I mean that as sport, precision has grown so much, and become so competitive, that there are actually less teams around today than there were five years ago. Fifty-six teams competed in the 1986 National Championships at Boston University. At the Snowflake International held there in 1990, there were only 36 teams present. One being national, the other being an invitational international, these are obviously two very different types of competitions.

What accounts for the decreased number of teams is the fact that precision has become competitive. As a result, many of the recreational teams have had to decide whether or not they are willing to dedicate themselves to the competitive nature of their sport. As one skater explained, "If you're going to get into it, get into it. If not, get out." As harsh as that

may sound, the truth of the matter is that precision simply isn't recreational anymore.

Accordingly, it appears that in the United States, the skating community's perception of the "precision skater" has changed. "It used to be that if you were a precision skater, you would be looked down upon by some of the more highly competitive singles skaters, explained Lynn Benson, coach of the Haydenettes. "Now, you'll see some of the higher ranked singles skaters look at a precision team and say 'Wow!'" Of all the changes in the sport, this is perhaps the most gratifying. As a precision skater, I can remember times when I felt somehow inferior. But, I also remember very clearly the first time that I noticed the change.

The year was 1988. In recognition of winning the gold medal in the senior division of the National Championships, and receiving the first 6.0 ever awarded in the sport of precision skating, the USFSA invited my team to exhibit in Baltimore at the National Championships (for singles skaters). Sitting among the competitors, I began to feel out of place. It wasn't until after we had given our performance and shown the world a little bit of what precision is, that I felt as if I had earned the right to sit with those competitors. The next time we entered the arena, Debi Thomas's coach, Alex McGowan greeted us: "Well, if it isn't the *Haydenettes!*" We were grateful just to have been there, so to us, that greeting felt as good as gold. In short, precision skaters are on the road to the recognition they deserve. As Lynn Benson observed, "The precision skater is already thought of highly, and in a few years, it's going to be even more so."

What else can precision skaters look forward to in the next few years? One skater from Sweden put it best when she said, "I think it will take a few years before it becomes an Olympic sport, but the *World Championship*, I think that will be held soon. That's what we hope." I got tired of hoping, so I decided to ask.

The officials, organizers, and coaches that I spoke with all agreed that a *World Championship* is inevitable. It seems it's just a question of when. According to Charles DeMore, "We look at a *World Championship* being held no sooner

than 1994, if then." Simply stated, the biggest obstacle is logistics. Much to my surprise, I learned that in figure skating, the host organization pays for the rooms for the skaters from the time training begins, through the last day of competition. Thus, if 100 people compete, the organization foots the bill. Subsidized through lucrative television contracts, and through signboard advertising, the organizations are capable of handling this.

In the case of precision, sheer numbers seem to be the problem. "I cannot see 800 people being subsidized for even three days," explained DeMore. "So, the expense to travel and to pay for housing is going to be difficult. That's why we're working so hard. We're also looking at (a *Worlds*) maybe every other year because of the burden. You've got to have one year to do it, and one year to fundraise."

DeMore explained that in Budapest, last month, at *Junior Worlds*, there were 140 skaters—which was a record number—from 29 countries. As he put it, "If you have 29 countries in precision, you could have conceivably, 100 teams. You could have 3,000 people! The logistics are mindboggling."

What boggled my mind at the *Snowflake International* was that there were competitors there who had never seen precision before. Except for their own team, many skaters from across the globe had never seen another team's version of precision, let alone another country's interpretation. As one Mexican skater put it, "This is the first time that we've come to Boston, and to team competition. It's an honor

for us to represent Mexico in an international games." Another member of Mexico '90 added, "this is the first time that we get to see the teams, and it's beautiful to come here because we get to know people and precision in other parts of the world."

It was exciting to see skaters who had worked so hard, and traveled so far, finally have the opportunity to showcase their talents. But, nothing was more moving than watching their faces as they saw precision for the first time, and they no-doubt realized that others consider precision as worthwhile an endeavor as they do.

Looking down the road, DeMore pointed out that despite the hurdles that need to be overcome between now and "whenever," precision has advantages as a possible Olympic sport. "It's a team sport, which is more appealing for the Olympics than individual sports. That, in itself, is an attraction," he explained.

If precision's track record is any indication of what the future holds in store, I, for one,

can't wait! To the skaters, coaches, parents, and organizers who have worked so hard, it shows. You've come a long way, baby!

As DeMore said, "Precision is no longer a recreational sport. It is a very sophisticated, competitive activity. When you see what's happening, and the routines, and the speed, and all of the details that people have done in figure skating—body positions, head movements, strokes—and put them all together, and have all those people do it at the same time, and at speeds approaching that of singles skaters, that's something exciting."

It certainly is.

Jennifer Chyet was a precision skater with the Haydenettes from Lexington, Mass. She skated on the 1988 gold medal winning team at Precision Nationals—the team that received the first 6.0 ever awarded in the sport of precision skating.



basic process and tools of the craft can be. If a skater/choreographer has not learned anything about choreographic principles, then he is bound to repeat himself. Compositional skill is acquired. The need to compose is usually compulsive, and the talent genetic. Being a good choreographer takes time. Being a "natural" means facing the danger of burn-out once the initial gift has been exploited.

So the key word is *experiment*. Use all the given tools and *experiment*. Expect to go through a little "garbage" at first, until you find what is right for you.

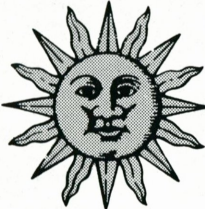
