News Briefs

Sandwiched between the U.S. National Championships and the World Championships in Munich, were the World University Games in Sapporo, Japan, March 2-10.

The USA team had one of its most successful Winter World University Games performances in history. Leading the way for the U.S. contingent were the figure skaters, who won four medals (two golds, one silver, and one bronze). The gold medals, won by Tonia Kwiatkowski and Michael Chack, were the only two medals won by the U.S. athletes during the sevenday competition.

Chack won the men's singles title, capturing the first U.S. gold medal in the Winter World University Games since 1985. He skated a dynamic free skating program that included seven triple jumps.

The following night, Americans Kwiatkowski and Kyoko Ina finished one-two in ladies' singles.

The fourth U.S. figure skating medal came from the brother-sister combination of Troy and Dawn Goldstein who won a bronze medal in pairs competition.



The 1991 United States National Figure Skating Championships held at the Target Center in Minneapolis were a resounding success. Thank you to the Twin City Figure Skating Association, Courage Center, and the Local Organizing Committee for their leadership in planning this event.

ABC Television ratings for Nationals coverage reached a five-year high — overnight ratings for Sunday, February 17, drew 7.6; the highest Sunday rating for Nationals since 1986. In a recent sports marketing survey figure skating was ranked in the top 10 in a listing of Americans' favorite sports. This reinforces to us the still-growing popularity of figure skating in the U.S.

In an effort to continue this popularity we are constantly striving for means to improve our internal policies and structure. The USFSA is the National Governing Body (NGB) for the sport of figure skating in the United States. The NGB for the American sport is responsible for selecting a team to participate in the World Championships and the Olympic Games. The International Skating Union sets the standards for *all* of figure skating. Our priority is to set a structure to select that Team, starting at the regional level.

The organization of qualifying competitions is the backbone of the Association. The responsibility of the member club volunteers — their time and expertise — is the base for this structure. In order to continue to help and monitor these competitions, updating, communicating, and changing is crucial. The

Rosalynn Sumners A Champion Revisited

osalynn Sumners is a journalist's Kdream. No need for the usual carefully compiled list of interview questions: When she comes on the phone from Cleveland, on a day off from her "Discover Card Stars on Ice" tour, she says a bubbly hello and immediately launches into a recital, in chronological order, of her experiences since turning pro in 1984. She talks freely-and eloquently -about the frustrations of her initially difficult adjustment to professional life. her broken engagement, and pro competition woes. And she relates the joys of her life as it is today, at 27, having finally discovered who Rosalvnn the skater is and, more importantly, who Rosalynn the person is.

"The touring I did my first two years as a pro, from 1984 to 1986, was the hardest thing I ever did and will ever do," she begins, speaking of her stint as the star of "Walt Disney's World on Ice."

"Kenneth Feld puts on a wonderful show, and Mickey Mouse and Donald Duck are classic characters, but I was a little down, a little messed up, in a gray area. At that time, skating with those characters"—after an amateur career which included the 1982-1984 U.S. national ladies' titles, the 1983 World Championships title, and the 1984 Olympic silver medal—"wasn't good for my ego. And if you're doing 13, 14, 15 shows a week, you can't give it your best. You have to give it your middle."

Beyond that, Sumners recalls, she was going through the normal growth of any young woman—in front of 10,000 people a night. "(As an amateur) I'd been surrounded by quite a group of people at home, and I was kicked out the door and told, 'Go for it, do it on your own, grow up.' Now, looking back, it was the best thing that could have happened, because on the road I couldn't cling or depend on anyone else."

After two years, Sumners says she was so burnt out emotionally and physically that she actually welcomed the diagnosis that she had contracted mononucleosis, which meant that she did not have to fulfill a summer commitment to skate with the Disney show in Japan and instead could return home to Edmonds, Wash.



"That was my summer to grow up," she says. "I broke up with my boyfriend, got fat, had friends, bought a horse, and did everything I'd never had the chance to do, because I'd never had a summer vacation. Then after four months, I said, 'Okay, that's enough.'"

When Scott Hamilton called with an invitation to skate with his inaugural "America" tour, she accepted, and continued to perform after the show became "Stars on Ice." She also went to England to co-star with Robin Cousins in a 1987 PBS television production of *Sleeping Beauty on Ice*, where she met and began what would be a three-year relationship with ice dancer John Thomas.

Sumners endured a forced six-month vacation during the first half of 1988, when the skating world's attention was devoted to the Olympics. "I was still struggling then regarding performing; I wasn't the competent, secure woman I'd hoped to be," she admits. But a pivotal three-week guest-star engagement at the San Diego Sea World's summer ice show changed all that.

"Something clicked there, something inside me just turned around," she says. "It was so much fun. I was all by myself. Had my own apartment. I thrived on it. San Diego was the beginning of a new phase—I became a very competent, independent, secure person."

Since then, Sumners has been going almost non-stop, with tours of "Stars on Ice," "Benson and Hedges Symphony on Ice," the "Symphony of Sports" shows combining skating and gymnastics, Brian Boitano and Katarina Witt's "Skating I," and professional competitions.

"I've hardly paused for breath, but I love it! It's a different kind of exhaustion," she notes. "1988 through 1990 have been the best years of my life, really becoming myself, becoming confident, coming to terms with what the (1984) Olympics was and where I stand with Katarina Witt (to whom she lost the gold medal by .10 of a point)."

Indeed, she says, she loved doing the "Skating I" show. "Katarina and I were actually buddies on the tour. There was no jealousy or animosity. I became like a big sister, which was a riot because I was messed up and confused all those years and now they were coming to me! Not that I've figured it all out, but I could say: 'This is where I've been, this is my advice.'"

One thing she has not yet quite figured out, Sumners acknowledges, is her placement at Dick Button's annual professional competitions. She did win once, defeating Dorothy Hamill in Paris in 1987, but has finished a disappointing second a number of other times.

"To be honest and candid, I'd have to say that my patience and confidence have been put to the test. I'm finding myself struggling a little now with skating," she says. "I've worked my butt off to get that Dorothy Hamill-Sandra Bezic look of the long line, maturity, interpretation. I'm not going to compromise my art-I refuse to do a triple jump, because I don't feel one more rotation in the air makes a better skater. I'm trying to preserve that classical look, the class and grace and beauty. I'd never take credit away from anyone who can jump, but professional skating is about being emotional (on the ice), not just jump-jump-jump.

"I've cried more than once, but I love to skate," she adds. "And who am I, to walk away from being asked by Dick Button, to be one of the top 20 skaters he asks? I'll go back every year. And the training I do for those competitions is what carries me through the whole year."

Sumners has learned as well not to compromise her life away from the spotlight. When she goes home to Washing-

Now is the best time to look for a new dance partner. Nationals are over and the new season is just starting.

An alarming fact that most of us already know is that there are only "so many" male dancers around. So girls, if you have a partner or are looking for one, be in your best shape because there are a lot of girls from which boys can choose. (This is not to say that the boys should not be in shape also.)

Couples get together this time of year so that they are ready for summer competitions and have time to work on new choreography and compulsory dances beforehand. The more time you have, the more time you can train of course.

After Nationals is the time for existing couples to decide whether to continue skating together or to look for new partners. Find out who is available and start your work to promote yourself. The partner tryouts at Nationals are a good place to be seen, not only by prospective partners, but also by coaches who are looking for partners for their students.

Let the skating world know you are available. Start by telling coaches you are looking and get the word out. Let them know your qualifications, test level, and if you are willing to relocate. Unfortunately the female usually has to move for the male—I guess it is the the law of supply and demand.

Try out as often as you can with people so they can see your talent, and if it does not work out, maybe there is someone else the coach or skater might know who would match.

Always have your tryouts videotaped so that people can look at how you look and also the prospective partner can see what both of you look like together. Again this will help get the word out and have you seen by people who might not be able to travel at that moment.

Discuss your goals and strategies at the tryout and get a feeling for who would be your coach, choreographer, etc. One method I always found helpful was to go through my coach to make the contacts for new partners. They are experienced and know the other coaches who should be contacted. The skating

world is not all that large and news travels fast. It might sound like you are trying to sell yourself, and that is just what you should be doing. It is like putting a resumé together, and the person with the right qualifications and experience will get the job.

You should consider a few different points when choosing a partner. Height is important for a well-matched team. This might seem obvious but if the partners are young, they have a chance to grow - one maybe too tall for the other. The style and leg line are also important when matching people tegether. Some of the techniques can be learned-like knee bend and style-but height and the length of one's leg cannot be changed. The dreaded question of weight can arise. My feeling is that if a person really wants a partner, they will be in good shape and thin for their tryouts and competitions. Look for maturity and experience in a skater. Have they been well coached? Are they hard workers?

Always remember that all different couple combinations can work. Different personalities, sizes, and shapes give teams their unique qualities.

I hope this year many new teams will get together, compete, and have fun. Remember the number one question when looking for a partner—is there potential for success? Good luck.

MEDICINE

The Psychological Aspects of Sports Injuries

The advancing technology of sports medicine has provided athletes with more effective and efficient treatment of athletic injuries. Knowledgeable parents and coaches are able to respond quickly to injuries, to seek appropriate treatment, and thus, often reduce recovery or rehabilitation time for the athlete.

Just as athletes, coaches, and parents realize that athletic performance is influenced by mental factors and not just physical factors, so do they realize that injury and recovery is not just a physical process, but also a mental and emotional experience. While the healing of bone, muscles or tissue can be described as an "uneventful recovery," the athlete who has gone through recovery and rehabilitation knows better; rather than being uneventful, the healing is a series of events each one more important than the other. Having a greater understanding of the psychological components of being injured may help the athlete to cope better with frustrations and suffering of injury and recovery.

Every athlete deals with injury and recovery in different ways. Their reactions can vary depending on the type of injury, prognosis for recovery, when in the season/training the injury occurred, general personality traits and attitudes, responses of others (such as the coach or parents), prior injury experiences, or the context of the injury (was it during practice, competition, or non-skating related). The athlete can also imagine how his perceived sense of responsibility for his injury could impact his reaction—he might feel differently if the injury was thought to be caused by poor concentration or technique as opposed to equipment, physical factors, or an aggravation of a prior injury. Sometimes the amount and type of training/practice can result in injuries—commonly called "overuse or over-training injuries." There is also research that shows the stressors in athletes' lives are related to the occurrence of injuries.

For many athletes the most common response to being injured is an increase in anxiety and apprehension; in some athletes this anxiety can reach panic proportions. These feelings emerge out of the strong sense of uncontrollability usually associated with injury and the recovery course. Some athletes experience injury in stages such as shock, denial, anger, acceptance, and adaptation. Shock or numbness about the injury can be especially prominent for first injuries; that can involve denying the injury, or minimizing the severity or impact of it. As the shock or denial wears off, athletes often feel increased emotion in the form of depression, sadness, or anxiety. It is usually at this point that preoccupation with the injury is experienced and frustration reactions are common. Some athletes experience difficulty sleeping, increased fatigue, and even guilt about not training or competing, or of letting a coach or parent(s) down.

Typically, athletes gain some gradual acceptance of the physical limitations as they recover and partial adaptation is achieved. Over time, and often in conjunction with physical therapy, there is acceptance of the recovery curve and time frame for returning the pre-injury levels of training. It also appears that motivation increases and athletes return to training with renewed interest.

The sadness and frustration associated with an injury can come about for many reasons: the injury serves as a reminder of the athlete's *Continued on page 114*

TEAM SURPRISE-TEAM FRIENDSHIP

May 1990. Hayden Rink in Lexington, Mass. I was lacing up my skates for the final time as a member of the Havdenettes Senior precision team. I would be entering college in four months. And after 12 years of figure skating-singles, pairs, precision, and dance—I looked forward to the "normal" life of a normal student. No more worrying about driving 80 miles of snowy highways to get to and from practice. No more team buses to catch or planes to make. No more worrying about judges' decisions. It was time, I thought, to start to worry about who I would have as a dorm roommate; where you could get the best pizza in Boston; or even about what kind of clothes college freshmen wore. And, about French 101, Calculus, English Composition, and International Relations.

September arrived and I was no longer a skater. I had made the agonizing decision that each skater must eventually make. I was a student-for all of two weeks-until I realized that being "just a student" was not enough for me. And suddenly I was back on the ice again, stretching out of shape muscles, wondering if coming back was really the right decision. It was not until semester break last winter that I knew I had made the right decision. It was during that break that I realized that the international scope of precision skating offered far more than pinwheels, eggbeaters, and medals. It also offered the opportunity to meet new people and to make new friendships worldwide.

After the Snowflake International Invitational Competition at Boston University in December, several Hayden families housed members of the Swedish team, Team Surprise, before they left for the following weekend's Laval International Precision Competition in Laval, Quebec. Two Swedish girls— Maria, from Göteborg, and Ulrika from Landvetter—stayed with me and helped make those four days, days I will never forget.

Perhaps you were among the 300,000 people in Boston for First Night on New Year's



Eve. If so, do you remember seeing a group of 20 people bundled up in bulky, white, Team Surprise parkas? They were constantly blowing long New Year's horns, trying new and exciting "American food," singing both American and Swedish folk songs, and winning the hearts of all who saw them. As one of them led the others in a cheer, people on the street stopped to watch, took their pictures, and threw them money. Thinking they were street performers, one person even asked me if he could hire them for a party he was having the following week. Finally the countdown began, and as the laser-lighted Custom House Tower clock struck midnight I found myself embraced in a giant team hug. For that one moment I forgot they were from another part of the world; for that one moment I felt as though I'd known them all of my life; for that one moment I was not longer a Haydenette, but a member of Team Surprise.

Five days later the Haydenettes sat in the bleachers in the Centre Sportif Laval ice rink to cheer on Team Surprise, just as they would cheer us in competition later that day. As I sat on the edge of my seat and watched them skate, I realized that this team had touched our hearts in a way no one else ever had. Although they lived a quarter of the way around the world, precision skating had brought us close together. I cheered with my Haydenette team-mates, I clapped, I blew my New Year's horn, I bit my nails, and I yelled louder than I ever thought I could for a group of people I had met less than a week ago, yet loved so dearly.

With the end of the competition, the time to say good-bye arrived. I can still hear the parting words of one of the girls who had *Continued on page 24*

With that I hugged her a final time as she rushed out of the room and on to the ice to receive her gold medal beneath the blue and gold flag of Sweden. As I turned away I knew she was right. And I knew I was right, too, in my decision last September to stay on the Hayden team for another year. If I had not continued in precision skating I might never have had the opportunity to meet these "new and wonderful" friends. Yet the tears still welled up in my eyes. I sat down and began to cry. Only now have I come to realize that mixed in with those tears of sorrow were tears of happiness. And the knowledge that the international aspect of precision skating can forge friendships that neither continents nor oceans can ever diminish.



ton, where she usually spends summers, she becomes a "very private person," she says. "I've created a wonderful balance there—I teach a little, run, do errands. I've kept the same circle of people around me, never turned my back on the people who supported me before and helped get me where I am today. (Longtime coach) Lorraine (Borman) and I went through a little separation after the Olympics, which was good, because it changed our relationship from student and coach to best friends. She does my choreography. And the rink there is the first place I go."

Having become engaged to John Thomas on Christmas Day, 1987, Sumners decided to return his ring on New Year's Day, 1990, because, she realized, "I needed to be me. I wasn't ready to be married. I wanted to flirt, to date, to see one guy in New York, one in Denver, to not be serious. I needed that independence, to prove that I could do it on my own and not cling to someone. John's with Ice Capades now and is re-engaged. I want to be footloose and fancy free.

"Plus," she points out, "this is a limited career, and I don't want to regret that I didn't do it, or feel guilty about being on the road. I've started seeing someone else"—whom, for all her candor, she prefers not to name just yet—"and it's both serious and light at the same time. I can mix friendship and traveling. I like missing someone now."

On her time off, Sumners enjoys skiing with her boyfriend, power walking, and a variety of other athletic activities such as horseback riding, water skiing, tennis, and bowling. She also loves interior decorating, and has decorated three homes in different styles.

As for the future, Sumners says she cannot see past the next four or five years, though some day she would like to settle down and have a family—"But one child is all I'd have patience for!"—and perhaps raise horses. She feels sure she will always be involved in skating and may eventually try her hand at television commentary.

Now, though, the skater is well aware that she is living what many would consider a dream life. "I do love the fantasy of it," she admits. "I've gone through a lot in the real world—gaining weight, hating skating—and I appreciate this so much more.

"My ballet teacher since 1980, Barbara Flowers (who choreographed Tonya Harding's National Championshipswinning program this year), is fighting bone cancer now. She calls this Dreamland. She'll say, 'I want to go spend the night in Dreamland,' so I bring her on tour. A lot of the spark and spirit I have is from her."

Part of Sumners' current happiness also derives from resolving her feelings about what she once considered her greatest failure—finishing second-best at the 1984 Olympics. "I don't think about it a lot," she says. "That one-time shot of four minutes can drive you crazy. Look at what I've done since, what I've overcome and what I'm doing now. That Olympic medal is what's given me the professional career I have now.

"You do it at such a young age, you're in such a fishbowl of publicity," she adds. "Back then, my mother told me, 'Someday, you will understand. You'll be happier with the silver medal.' And she was right. I enjoy some attention, but I love my privacy. I love the balance I've created."

OJOP Helps Ice Dancers Reach the Top

Elizabeth Punsalan and Jerod Swallow made history at the 1991 U.S. Figure Skating Championships by dancing their way up from third place after the compulsory dances to first place after the free dance, and capturing the U.S. ice dancing title. There is another interesting aspect to this unique pair. They are two of only a handful of skaters to ever be employed through OJOP.

What is OJOP?

In 1977, the United States Olympic Committee (USOC) and Howard Miller, USOC treasurer from 1985-1988, established the Olympic Job Opportunities Program (OJOP). The program was designed to help athletes continue their pursuit of athletic excellence, while at the same time gaining a head start in productive and meaningful employment. Through OJOP, businesses employ athletes, allow them a flexible work schedule, and give them paid time off for training and competitions.

Punsalan and Swallow are both employed by non-profit organizations; taking advantage of a major OJOP improvement that began in 1989. "After the '88 games in Calgary it was noted that the U.S. just didn't bring back very many medals," explained Mary Klever, manager of OJOP. "So, USOC President Robert Helmick spoke to the athletes and asked them what we could do to better support them. They said they needed more athlete support, more financial support, and more support through a jobs program."

Through the sale of commemorative coins, money was raised to start the



OJOP grant program, allowing taxexempt organizations to also participate in OJOP. "It has made an enormous difference in our program," said Klever.

OJOP grants help fund the salaries of athletes working for tax-exempt organizations such as governmental agencies and non-profit companies. "What the grant program does is give the athletes a higher salary or gives them paid time away for training and competition," said Musette Grage, OJOP career administrator. "For Jerod's job, we were able to match the \$5,000 salary the USOC is paying him, and create a \$10,000a-year job."

Swallow first heard about the program through Carolyn Kruse, midwestern vice president of the U.S. Figure Skating Association (USFSA). "I was working on trying to get a room at the Olympic Training Center," said Swallow, "and through the process of qualifying for living there, information came to me little by little about OJOP." After approximately two years, Swallow received word that there was a job opening at the USOC Information Resource Service Center. "We set up an interview, and three weeks later I found out I got the job."

Punsalan, who signed up for the program last September, waited only four months before landing a job at the World Figure Skating Hall of Fame and Museum. "The fact that she had the skills, knowledge, and background in the sport made her the ideal candidate for the job," said Dale Mitch, director of the museum.

Unfortunately, not every athlete can be accepted into OJOP. The program targets those athletes who are certified by their National Governing Body (NGB) as "potential" Olympic or Pan American Games team members, based on national and international results. For example, the USFSA approves skaters who have placed in the top 10 at the U.S. Figure Skating Championships.

Once accepted into the program, "the athletes have to put in a lot of elbow work themselves, first determining where they want to go with their careers, second preparing resumes, setting out realistic goals and expectations, and then going after those goals," said Klever. "Then we approach the employers. We have a 30-page job posting that goes out to the athletes once a month with expressed interest from companies."

Some sports have taken advantage of OJOP more than others. Track and field has some 40 athletes working with OJOP, while sports such as figure skating and bobsled don't have many. There are a couple of reasons for this.

One reason has to do with age. The average age of elite track and field ath-

letes is in the mid-20's; for figure skaters it is in the high teens. "That's why we don't work much with gymnastics," said Klever. "Most of those athletes are still focused on completing their education."

Training time is another factor which limits some sports from OJOP. "The long training hours makes it difficult," said Punsalan. "Realistically, I would say we spend six full hours a day training. If not skating, then doing a skating-related activity."

The recent addition of Adia Temporary Services to the OJOP employer pool should benefit athletes in sports such as figure skating. "Up until November of '90 we were really just a career oriented program, and now we are also temporary services," said Klever. "We are hoping that by having that element we can expand our capacity."

Once hired, each athlete works with his or her employer to arrange a feasible schedule. Punsalan's job as registrar at the museum requires her to work 15 hours per week. "Whether I work a five hour block one day and then nothing the next, or if I come in for two and a half hours in the morning or in the evening, it is really flexible," said Punsalan. "Basically, I just have to get in my 15 hours per week." Then when her check arrives, with the money from the grant fund included, she is actually paid for 30 hours of work.

Swallow's job as Information Resource Aid at the USOC library requires him to work 20 hours per week. "The grant money is put into a fund and is used when I'm away," said Swallow. "Also, let's say that due to training I can only work 15 hours one week. To get to 20 hours, I write down five hours of training time, and those five hours are paid for out of the grant money."

Kerrie Clifton, Swallow's supervisor at the library, said "It's really exciting to follow his skating career, and he's doing a

Stunning performances, Surprising results

The 1991 U.S. Figure Skating Championships in Minneapolis this year were filled with surprises.

Who would figure that last year's ladies' U.S. and World titleholder, Jill Trenary, would suffer from an old injury just one month prior to the Nationals? Who would figure that Portland's Tonya Harding would land the first triple Axel ever by an American woman in competition? Who would figure that a relatively new dance couple would move from third place after the compulsory dances to first place after the free dance, on the oftentouted "immobile" roster of dance competitors, to win the event?

Perhaps it was the unseasonably warm Minneapolis weather (the first few days of competition anyway), combined with a well-organized local volunteer force of 1,200, and of course, the bevy of all-star performances, that brought record crowds to the new Target Center and to ABC television. ABC's overnight ratings of 7.6 reinforce figure skating's evergrowing popularity with the weekend viewer — even over the NCAA basketball matchup that weekend.


This year's Championships also marked the first time that figures were held as a separate championship event and the first time that Novice pairs and dance competition was added. All told, between the three arenas — figures were skated at Augsburg College Arena, some Novice events at Parade Ice Garden, all other championship events at Target Center Arena, and practice sessions scattered among all three — there was skating to be seen nearly 24 hours a day.

SENIOR MEN

The men's original program and free skate provided one of the most impressive line-ups of men's championship figure skating in years.

"Team Bowman" arrived mid-week preceding competition with press anxiously awaiting Christopher Bowman's first press conference in months. Bowman was forced to withdraw from Nationals last year because of injury but was named to the World Team anyway. After a much publicized spat with coach Frank Carroll at the 1990 World Championships, and a less than impressive performance at last year's Goodwill Games, Bowman moved to Toronto to train with coaches Toller Cranston and Ellen Burka. Since the move, the media has seen little of him. They were not to be disappointed as Bowman gave a very emotional press conference - releasing pent-up feelings about his 18-year relationship-gone-sour with former coach Carroll.

Flanked on either side by Burka and Cranston, Bowman spoke of the positives in his new coaching relationship, "Skating for me is my life and my love,




Todd Eldredge Senior Men Free Skating Gold

and that is very, very serious to me. Right now, I feel that it's just that my personal attitude toward skating has changed but really nothing of the skating has changed — except for the quality and the harder work that I have put toward making myself a better athlete."


In order to improve upon his image with the judges, Cranston said, "We've dipped him in black." Dipped in black in order that he might be taken more seriously. And, Bowman was seen in black, literally head to toe (he also dyed his hair black), the rest of the week.

Bowman's original program — skated to "Concerto No. 3" by Rachmaninoff — was impressive. He was conservative and skated a clean and elegant program, and easily captured the lead after the OP.

In his own modest way, Eldredge was out to prove that he was not named the 1990 U.S. men's champion by default. He

was a man with a mission but that would not be evident until the free skate program. Admittedly, he was a bit shaken going into the original program.

"I think the difference (at the '91 Nationals) as opposed to last year is that I won it last year. There is a little bit more pressure going in to it this year."

Eldredge skated to "Semiramide" and "Barber of Seville," both by Rossini; saving his new program for the free skate. He did a triple Axel/double toe combination and worked hard to hang on to his triple loop. He finished the OP behind Bowman.

Enter Mark Mitchell, Peter Oppegard look-alike and could-be spoiler to some preliminary guesses of a Bowman-Eldredge one-two finish. Mitchell skated a flawless performance to "When a Man Loves a Woman" — a song frequently heard throughout this year's competition, however, never winning over the distaff side of the audience more than when skated by Mitchell. He looked elegant, moved smoothly and with confidence, and finished his seductive program to resounding audience approval. He was sitting in third place going into the free skate portion of the competition. Finishing the OP right behind Mitchell was Wylie. Dressed in a military costume, he skated to "The Right Stuff" by Bill Conti, a military theme that he was quick to note was not influenced by the war in the Persian Gulf. He performed his elements well and ended his program with a salute received by a roaring audience response.

Relative newcomers to the Senior men's events, Shepherd Clark and Michael Chack, may prove to be the 1990's jumping phenoms. Clark was the fourth man to skate the original program and was the first to really get the audience pumped up and excited about the competition ahead. He executed perhaps his best performance to date, skating fast to the "Russian Sailors Dance," and showing strong lines and good height on his jumps. Perhaps the military theme won the audience's emotions, regardless, he brought down the house with a standing ovation.

Chack performed an impressive triple flip/triple toe combination and a triple loop, amidst week-long rumblings of his quad attempt, but, just as many "up-andcomers," he needed to add more choreography and style to his program. He would save his quad attempt for later in the week.



Tonya Harding Senior Ladies Free Skating Gold


Bowman was first to skate in the final free skate group. He appeared again "dipped in black" and skated with confidence. He did seven triple jumps, two in combination. He stepped out of one combination and singled a double Axel, otherwise skating a beautiful program. He seemed in the best physical condition that he has been in, in a while as he was still executing his jumps and spins with nice form and height at the end of his program. His marks ranged from 5.7 to 5.8 for technical merit, and 5.8 to 5.9 for composition and style; leaving room for the five talented men that followed.

Next to skate was Eldredge; the draw didn't bother him a bit. He skated with much more confidence than he did earlier in the week and proved that he was not a champion by default. He skated his new program to music from *Les Miserables*, and "Master of the House" and "I

Dreamed a Dream," both by Boston Pops. The deletion of figures has actually proved to be an asset to Eldredge because now he has more time to devote to the artistic side of his skating. "I think my ballet (classes) really helped with the second mark and the artistic part of my skating, and it connects the jumps together better throughout the program."


He stumbled on a triple flip and popped one combination, but like a true champion, he held on to the landings and on to the 1991 men's title.

This was not to be Shepherd Clark's night. He had the difficulty in his program — triple loops and triple Axels — but kept missing and clearly tired toward the end of his performance. Regardless, he was met with the audience's approval. His selection of fast, powerful music captured the attention of the audience along with his strong lines.

Mitchell again skated a very clean program that included six triples. He is one of the most consistent championship skaters and again skated to a well-choreographed and balanced program. The audience gave him a standing ovation and expressed their disapproval of his marks. He was happy with his program and was very gracious about his final placement despite chiding comments from the media that he was wronged by the judges and should have placed among the top three. He would have to settle for being an alternate to the World Team his second year in a row.

The U.S. men's skater with the biggest and most loyal following is Paul Wylie. Pulled in many different directions studies at Harvard, Olympic Committee and USFSA volunteer commitments -Wylie has been plagued throughout his recent career with inconsistencies. Not so this night. He skated the same free skate program he has had for three years and performed with beautiful lines and dramatic style; he is truly a mature and complete skater. He never tired throughout his program and received a standing ovation at the end. His marks of 5.5 to 5.9, and 5.8 to 5.9, were enough to boost Wylie into the third place national slot and onto the World Team.

J. Robert Morris, Jr. took the lead after the first figure, a LFO Rocker, followed closely by Craig Heath, Michael Weiss, and Brian Schmidt. Gig Siruno was sitting in sixth place. After Figure 2, a RFO Paragraph Double Three, Heath had


moved up to first place ahead of Morris, Weiss, and Schmidt. Siruno was still sitting sixth. After the final figure, a LBO Paragraph Loop, the final standings kept Heath as figures champion, Weiss the silver medalist, and Siruno the bronze medalist. Morris dropped to fifth overall just behind Schmidt. Heath was the only men's finalist to compete in both championship events.

SENIOR LADIES


Enduring a streak of lousy luck, 1990 U.S. and World Champion Jill Trenary graciously attended Nationals, cheered on her teammates and handed out awards, even though her heart was truly set on making this her best Nationals yet.

Trenary underwent emergency surgery mid-January to relieve an infection in her right ankle. This injury did not heal as


Favored to win this year's ladies' title, Kristi Yamaguchi was right on target after the original program. Her coach, Christy Kjarsgaard-Ness, attributed Yamaguchi's success to maturity and hard work over the fact that she's no longer training for two disciplines at the same time. "I have said this before and I really truly believe this, because Kristi is stronger this year physically, and because she has matured, you are seeing a different performer out there," said Ness. She has developed tremendous consistency throughout this past competition season and is a tough competitor.

Just as Eldredge had his point to prove, Tonya Harding was here to redeem her-

self. She finished a disappointing seventh place last year at the Nationals; suffering from a severe case of the flu. She competed against her physician's advice and her lackluster performance revealed it. She was certainly not ailing this year, however. Harding was strong and confident. She skated a solid original program finishing behind Yamaguchi and saving her "showtime" for the free skate.

Evy and Mary Scotvold's protegé, Nancy Kerrigan, was truly elegant. She seems to be on top of pressure situations now, which earlier in the season were her worst enemy. Kerrigan skated her short program to "Sun" by Mark Militano and "Space Camp" by John Williams. She was a beautiful skater to watch as she skated a dramatic and well-choreographed program. She was third after the OP and easily held that spot after the free skate. Her free skate performance opened with a fall on a double Axel and a couple of stumbles, but, utilizing her recent training in stress management, she finished with four triples and an interesting long, spiral ending.

A very strong-willed Tonia Kwiatkowski also emerged this week. She injured herself during a practice session two days before she was to compete. She came down from a jump and caught the front of her bottom foot with the heel of the top skate. She received stitches for her injury but was out on the ice practicing the next day. In spite of it all, she was sixth after the original program and pulled up in the free skate to finish in an impressive fourth place.


Skating for her first time in the final group, Tisha Walker placed fourth after the OP and fifth after the free skate. She's a very strong and beautiful skater to follow and at barely 17, she shows great promise.

This was not to be Holly Cook's week. Last year's U.S. and World bronze medalist toughed out the short program and held fourth position but simply had an off night for the free skate and dropped to sixth overall. Cook recently left Salt Lake City to train with Broadmoor coach Kathy Casey in Colorado Springs.

Yamaguchi drew first to skate in the last group of the free skate. She skated nearly flawlessly; she fell only once on the triple Salchow and successfully completed six more triple jumps. Her marks

for technical merit were 5.7's and 5.8's, and 5.8's and 5.9's for composition and style. Marks normally high enough to plan on a first place finish but with the four contenders that followed, there was still room.

Saturday night belonged to Tonya Harding. She skated to the theme from *Batman*, "Send in the Clowns" by Black and White, and "Wild Thing" by Tone Loc; music befitting of her powerful style. Harding started off with the first of her seven triples, a triple Lutz and then did the history-making triple Axel that everyone had been waiting for — and she couldn't have done it much better. In fact, in the end, her string of 5.9's for technical merit included one 6.0. The gold medal and the 1991 National title belonged to her.

The ladies' figures were a RFO Rocker, LFO Paragraph Double Three, and RBO Paragraph Loop. Kelly Ann Szmurlo, Broadmoor SC, was clearly the winner of the ladies' figures event. Szmurlo retired after the 1989 season, but returned when figures were made a separate championship event. She was followed by Jennifer Leng, SC of Boston, and Karen Ann Gooley, SC of Wilmington. Gooley bumped Leigh Keiser, Skokie Valley SC, and Jennifer Downing, Utah FSC, to pull herself up two notches after the third figure. Kaiser finished fourth and Downing fifth overall.

SENIOR PAIRS

Standings after the pairs original program included a cluster of new pairings in the top five groups. Natasha Kuchiki and Todd Sand led the group, as expected, and they've been together just over a year.

Kuchiki and Sand looked strong and well-matched for their original program

- looking now like a pair team that has been training together for some time. They led the event after the original program just as most expected. Karen Courtland, University of Delaware FSC, and Jason Dungjen, Detroit SC, gave a very strong performance and showed tremendous height on their side by side double Axels. Jenni Meno, Winterhurst FSC, and Scott Wendland, All Year FSC, together just since October, skated to a third place finish with Calla Urbanski, University of Delaware FSC, and her new partner Rocky Marval, SC of New York, just behind them in fourth.

Meno and Wendland were first to skate the free skate. They were strong and confident with one another and showed no signs of being such newcomers. "All we had to do was go out and skate well, no one was expecting us to do anything," said Meno. They easily held on to their third place position performing wonderful tricks including side by side triple toe loops, and would advance to Worlds the following month in Munich, to gain their first taste of international experience there.

Courtland and Dungjen followed them but didn't show the same unison that they had during the original program. She singled an intended double Axel and they held onto a shaky star lift. They dropped to fifth place overall; Sharon Carz, Los Angeles FSC, and Doug Williams, All Year FSC, edged them out for fourth.

Experience finally paid off for Urbanski and Marval. "It feels great. It was fantastic to do what I was supposed to do. I wish we had done it Wednesday night," piped Urbanski. They didn't miss a note. They showed great height on their throws and good speed and energy throughout the program. They won the free skate portion of the pairs event and were awarded the second place slot overall.



They skated to "The Race" by Yello, "Close to the Edit" by The Art of Noise, "Moments in Love" by The Art of Noise, and "Sound Effects" by Yannick Chevalier, and looked as though they were having fun acting as two racing cars. The choreography matched the music perfectly as did their costumes. They wore black with bright green, yellow, red, and checkered black and white flags stripped up their sides and skirted around her waist.

After the compulsory dances, Punsalan and Swallow were sitting in a very respectable third place — respectable especially for a couple who has been skating together less than two years. After the original dance they squeezed ahead of Jeanne Miley and Michael Verlich, Los Angeles FSC, by .2 factored points. After their one-of-a-kind free skate program Punsalan and Swallow took home the gold. Punsalan summed up their performance and their title best by saying, "We are trying to do our own thing and that's the standard for the future." Longtime dancers April Sargent and Russ Witherby, University of Delaware FSC, held first place after the compulsory dances and the original dance but lost the overall title to Punsalan and Swallow. "I am quite disappointed in our placement," said Sargent. "One thing we have learned in our years of skating is that you have to be happy in your performance, it is the only thing you have control of."

It is obvious that they are comfortable skating with one another as they showed a very fluid and graceful style.

Witherby was quick to look ahead with positive thoughts. "Tonight we felt confident and ready. We had a really relaxed feeling before we performed. We have already competed (in Munich) this year with this program and it went over well, so we feel confident. We have three weeks to improve it."

Not to be excluded, Miley and Verlich finished second in the free dance and third overall. They're a very attractive couple and always seem to win the audience over with their sultry style and slinky costumes. They are fast and animated and continually come up with new and innovative pull-through moves. They





received perhaps the biggest round of applause and a standing ovation for their free dance. "The crowd loved it," said Miley. "We have 12,000 first place votes, we just needed 12,006."

Making an impressive appearance in the dance competition were Elizabeth McLean, University of Delaware FSC, and Ron Kravette, Los Angeles FSC. After only three months together they skated very polished and synchronized programs. They are a well-matched and animated couple. They finished fourth overall, just ahead of Amy Webster, Boston SC, and Leif Erickson, SC of Wilmington.

FOURS

It was appropriate that Fours competition be brought back to Nationals this year when held in Minneapolis. The once

popular competition was held for the first time since 1950 when it was won by the St. Paul Four: Janet Gerhauser, Marilyn and Marlyn Thomsen, and John Nightingale.

Two teams of four competed this year both very entertaining and greeted with huge audience approval. Calla Urbanski and Rocky Marval teamed with Elaine Asanakis, University of Delaware FSC, and Joel McKeever, Dallas FSC, and won the event with a high energy military number. Right behind them were Janie Bosch, University of Delaware FSC, and Sean Gales, FSC of Omaha, and Laura Lynn LaBarca, SC of Westchester, and Kenneth Benson, University of Delaware FSC.

JUNIOR MEN

Eighteen-year-old Damon Allen, FSC of Rockford, and 17-year-old John Baldwin, Jr., Los Angeles FSC, maintained their first and second places respectively from the Junior men's original program to the free skate. Steven Smith, Peninsula FSC, Paul Dulebohn, University of Delaware FSC, and Ryan Hunka, Winterhurst FSC, were placed third, fourth, and fifth after the Junior men's OP. This was Allen's first time to compete at the Junior national level. In 1987, he was Novice silver medalist but has not competed at a National Championships since then. He made an impressive jump this year from placing fourth at Midwestern Juniors, to winning Junior Nationals.

He skated his free skate program to music from *The Natural* and themes from the '84 Olympic Games music. He was strong, giving a high energy performance for the audience.

Baldwin comes from elite skating bloodlines. His father, John Sr., was a national Novice and national Junior men's champion and he, along with his wife Donna, coach John Jr. Baldwin easily held on to the second place slot. He was the 1987 Novice gold medalist, 1989 and 1990 Junior bronze medalist, and now, 1991 Junior men's silver medalist. He showed marked improvement in his free skate over his performance in the OP two days earlier.

None of the Junior men that skated figures also competed in the free skate portion of the competition. The Junior men skated three figures, first, LFO Counter, second, RFO Paragraph Three, and third, LBOI Change Loop. Laurent Masse from




JUNIOR LADIES





Michelle Maler & Tony Darnell Junior Dance Bronze







Michael skated a well-choreographed program. He skated well, making only small errors. He had a lot of confidence and won the approval of the audience with his charismatic program.






Tilley is an obviously strong skater also with potential but needs a bit of polish and control. He fell out of his first double Axel but regrouped enough after that to keep the program together.




NOVICE DANCE

NutraSweet Honors Skaters

Elaine Asanakis, Scott Davis, Troy and Dawn Goldstein, and Kelly Szmurlo were awarded the NutraSweet "Giving It 100%" award at the 1991 U.S. Figure Skating Championships in Minneapolis.

In its fifth year of presentation, this prestigious award is given to skaters competing in the U.S. Nationals who have been recognized for their discipline, dedication, spirit, and perseverance, by a committee comprised of USFSA judges, officials, and coaches. The award is given in recognition, not of the triumph of one individual over another, but of the quality of being one's own best competitor.

Among the criteria for selection of the NutraSweet "Giving It 100%" award are: an exceptional level of accomplishment relative to length of participation and available resources; stamina under pressure; grace and good sportsmanship; generosity of spirit; the ability to achieve a balance between individual accomplishment and team/colleague/family relationships; and an unusual or inspirational personal story.

Elaine Asanakis, 23, suffered a serious injury that kept her from competing in the championship pairs competition at Nationals. However, she overcame several obstacles to compete in and capture first place in the championship fours competition. She is a student at Delaware Technical Community College and a native of Brooklyn. Asanakis trains at the University of Delaware Figure Skating Club.

Scott Davis, 19, was the 1990 National Junior champion. At this year's competition, he finished eighth in the men's championship finals. He is a straight "A" student at the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs and is study-

tionals, she competed in both pairs and figures where she placed 10th and sixth respectively. Both are members of the Los Angeles Figure Skating Club.

Kelly Szmurlo, 22, is the 1991 U.S. ladies' figures champion. Szmurlo is a full-time student at the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs where she studies sociology and maintains a 3.5 GPA.

A native of Franklin, Wisc., Szmurlo retired from skating in November 1989, only to begin training again for figures the following year because of rule

changes that made it a separate competition. She is a member of the Broadmoor Skating Club.

These winners are added to an impressive list of former winners including most recently, 1990 World Champion Jill Trenary, 1991 World Champion Kristi Yamaguchi, and 1991 U.S. Nationals bronze medalist Paul Wylie.

In addition to the award itself, a financial contribution is made in the name of each recipient to the USFSA Skater Development Fund for their use toward continued training.



Dance Champions Win diet Sprite Award

Elizabeth Punsalan and Jerod Swallow, the 1991 U.S. national dance champions, won more than the national title at this year's Championships. They were the first recipients of the diet Sprite "Unexpected Twist" award.

Designed to foster an appreciation for figure skating as an art form, the award recognizes and applauds figure skaters who successfully combine the worlds of athletics and artisty.



Working Together

Four years ago the USFSA Rink Operations Committee was formed so that rink management and figure skating clubs could work together to better understand the other's position and to better service the skating public.

Whether you are a rink manager, club official or coach, you probably chose your profession, or are volunteering your time, because of your true love of the sport. Since we all love it so much, and want to see the sport continue to grow in popularity, then there should not be any problems, right?

Wrong. Often managers, club members, and coaches have different, conflicting priorities.

Rink managers are required to watch the bottom line—their budget—which, in turn, affects ice-time costs and availability. They may be accused of being more interested in the "almighty dollar" than in the "human" aspect of the industry. Club officials can become more concerned with protecting their personal interests, and lose sight of the business as a whole. Coaches may tend to let their egos get in the way, and become narrow minded in the process.

Most would agree that working together is the ideal solution. How and where do we begin? First of all, we have to understand the puzzle and where each piece fits in. As I stated earlier, it is the rink manager's responsibility to watch the bottom line. With it becoming more and more costly to run and operate an ice arena, ice-time fees are also increasing. This means that clubs have to increase their membership and membership fees to cover costs. It is the students who pay ice-time fees to the ice arenas and become members of the figure skating clubs.

The sport of figure skating is rapidly changing. It has become quite obvious with some of these changes that it is big business, and we have to run the rinks as such. One suggestion is for rink managers to attend their club's Board meetings. Even though there may be other business people on the Board, oftentimes they do not understand the ice rink business as well as rink managers do. Also, the club is one of your customers and if you service the members well, it will increase your revenue in the end.

Clubs need to use their non-profit status to help in getting publicity for the rink. The media is apt to respond to a request to do a human interest story on skaters, exhibitions, or shows rather than the rink itself.

Coaches should understand the responsibilities of rink managers and acknowledge the dedication of volunteers. The opportunities are endless when people realize that all involved are working toward a common goal.

With the uncertainty of the economy, and the competition for the recreational dollar being at an all time high, this gives even more reason to understand that we are in the business of selling ice skating, fun, and a sense of belonging. We are all very important entities that have to work together to ensure the customer — whether recreational or competitive — the most positive experience and professional service. This will encourage them to keep coming through the doors, continue to take lessons, and to renew their memberships with the figure skating clubs.

Competitions Committee chairman organized a group of "experts" from various committees for an April meeting to discuss these issues. I look forward to their review of the competition structure at the May meeting.

The changes in athlete eligibility rules also continue to be debated. Particularly the effect the change in status has on athletes and their participation in professional competitions. According to the rules in place at this time, an athlete who skates in a non-sanctioned competition is ineligible to compete again at the World Championships and the Olympics. Therefore, the Executive Committee has voted to investigate sanctioning and organizing a USFSA professional competition.

There is a lot of discussion on these issues and we will pass more information along to you as the year progresses. I look forward to your input at the Governing Council meeting this month.

great job. We're very happy with him."

Punsalan and Swallow, who estimate their annual training expenses to be about \$23,000, also feel that OJOP has benefited them.

"We're both ecstatic that we have jobs," said Swallow. "It's a gratifying feeling to be able to help out. The bills add up quickly."

"Years before this were a lot harder for us, not being able to get jobs because of our training schedule," said Punsalan. "It has been a lot easier this year. It's sort of a getaway from everything else, and the extra money is very helpful especially for our parents."

Having that extra income has also allowed them to train more efficiently. "Now we can get the massage therapy and the ballet classes when we need them, not just when we have the money," said Swallow. As the 1992 Olympic Games draw nearer, OJOP's goal of employing 400 athletes during this quadrennium becomes more of a reality. Through the support of their program sponsor, Ernst and Young, Klever feels this goal is realistic. More importantly, OJOP is helping to keep the Olympic dreams of athletes like Elizabeth Punsalan and Jerod Swallow alive.

vulnerability; the athlete perceives that he has lost his image as an athlete, and in some cases, his worth as a person; depending on the severity and/or timing of an injury, it can mean the loss of dreams or purpose, and the inability to pursue goals; athletes can lose the support and benefits of the social contact that training provided—they may lose a sense of belonging; and depending on how long athletes are unable to train, they may perceive (or fear) the loss of conditioning and skills.


Anxiety and fear also emerge as responses to injury. Questions as to how the injury will impact the future, how others will view them, and the concern over re-injury, all contribute to anxiety. Dealing with the fears of re-injury and other possible or imagined concerns appears to facilitate recovery. Applying the same positive self-talk techniques used in performing, to deal with injury and recovery frustrations, is also helpful. Some athletes use the off-ice time (while in recovery) to practice imagery and visualization skills so that they return to training at a strong level mentally.

When athletes get injured it is not just a physical event, it can also have psychological consequences. While for some a significant injury could provide relief or a time out from the pressures of training or competition, for most it is a frustrating and upsetting experience. Being aware of the mental and psychological processes that can accompany both the experience of being injured and the experience of recovery can often facilitate adjustment and the return to training and competition.
