Legendary Coach Carlo Fassi Passes Away

The skating world was saddened with the passing of long-time figure skating coach and former competitor Carlo Fassi. Fassi died from a massive heart attack at Conton Hospital University Vaud in Lausanne, Switzerland, on March 20, 1997. Fassi was attending the World Figure Skating Championships and was present to coach Nicole Bobek and Romania's Cornel Gheorghe. He was 67 years old.


Born Dec. 20, 1929, in Milan, Italy, Fassi had given much of his life's work to figure skating. He, with his coaching partner and wife Christa, taught the extremely talented and those with less talent with the same determination. His gift for coaching was bestowed upon Olympic champions like Peggy Fleming, Dorothy Hamill, Robin Cousins, Jill Trenary and John Curry.

One of the highlights of his coaching career came at the 1976 Olympic Games in Innsbruck, Austria, where Hamill and Curry captured the gold. He was the first coach to that point (or since) to coach both the men's and ladies' Olympic champions in the same year.

He coached at the Broadmoor World Arena in Colorado Springs, Colo., for many years. The Fassis joined the Ice Castle International Training Center in Lake Arrowhead, Calif., on a full-time basis in April 1994. Prior to joining Ice Castle as full-time coaches, the Fassis coached at Ice Castle for three summers while coaching the Italian International Figure Skating Team.

Fassi's influence extended far beyond coaching talented skaters. As the Chair of the I.S.U. Coaching Commission, he was very well respected and influential in the world of figure skating.

Fassi also served on the USFSA's Coaches and Skating Standards committees.

"What has happened is a tragedy and it's very hard," Bobek said. "I know he is here with all of us, but we just cannot see him. He was always here for me and he always cared. He took the place of being a father for me."

As a competitor, Fassi achieved success representing his native Italy in men's and pairs events. After placing fourth in 1949, third in 1950 and 1951 and second in 1952 at Europeans, Fassi claimed the European Men's Championship in 1953 and 1954. He also placed ninth with partner Grazia Barcelona in the European Championships.

He won a World Championship bronze medal in 1953. He represented Italy in the 1948 and 1952 Winter Olympic Games. He placed 15th in men's and 13th in pairs with Barcelona in 1948. In 1952, he placed sixth in men's.

Fassi was enshrined in the U.S. Figure Skating Hall of Fame in 1994.

He is survived by his wife Christa, daughter Monica, and sons Ricky and Lorenzo.

Fair Play pays off for two youths

Did your mom ever tell you to play fair when you were a kid? Some children don't need the added encouragement from a parent to go by the rules. That is why the USFSA and the United States Postal Service teamed up to award two special young skaters the inaugural USPS/USFSA Fair Play Award.

Nominations came in from across the nation and the two winners were selected at random from the entries. Winners received a trip the 1997 State Farm U.S. Championships in Nashville, Tenn.

The first winner, Camie Splan, was nominated by Barbara Algenstedt, president of the North Star Figure Skating Association, where Splan is a member.

Splan, a 10-year-old from Cheboygan, Mich., has been skating for five years and recently competed in her first competition, placing fifth in the Beginning Compulsory in the Miami Summer Open in Oxford, Ohio.

Algenstedt nominated Splan

because, "she helps with the little four- and five-year-olds, showing them the right way to skate, setting a good example. The little ones and the peers look up to her for help and guidance."

Splan was accompanied in Nashville by her mother, Shelly.

The second winner was Gardiner Hoyt von Trapp. Hoyt von Trapp skates at the Mad River Valley FSC in Waitsfield, Vt., and was nominated by his coach Katherine Caldwell.

Caldwell said she nominated the 14-year old for his love of skating and for his attitude toward others. "He is a gentleman — kind, courteous and well mannered. He is a pleasure to teach," she said.

Hoyt von Trapp was accompanied by his mother, Susan Hoyt, to Nashville. She expressed how important winning this award was to her son and to others like him.

"Both of us (the Splans and the Hoyt von Trapps) are from small towns and it shows these kids that if they do something right, no matter

With all eyes on the newly-opened Nashville Arena, the hosts and the competition didn't disappoint.

Just blocks away from the famed Ryman Auditorium, Nashville Arena served as the main stage for this year's championships. With the Municipal Auditorium and Centennial SportsPlex serving as stages for the opening acts of the 1997 U.S. Figure Skating Championships, the Nashville audience was properly treated to figure skating and warmed to the hearts and charm of the Novice and Figures competitors.

Indeed, Nashville added its own personality and style to these championships as country recording artists Diamond Rio kicked off what was to be a most memorable championship in Nashville's own, unique way.


For Nashville, a city filled with plenty of tourist attractions and activities, most took a backseat to what was happening on the ice inside the Nashville Arena.

New champions were being crowned; drama was being played out; and, most of all, the best figure skaters in the nation were staging one incredible contest.

Energetic crowds witnessed the passing of a baton of sorts as three-time silver medalists Kyoko Ina and Jason Dungjen claimed the title that has narrowly eluded them. They also saw Todd Eldredge reclaim his men's title for the fourth time, and many saw Elizabeth Punsalan and Jerod Swallow dance their way to a second-straight title.

The Nashville Local Organizing Committee should be praised and thanked for the wonderful job it did ensuring the event's success as Nashville left its stamp on the U.S. Championships.



Todd Eldredge joined the likes of U.S. skating legends Brian Boitano, Scott Hamilton and David and Hayes Alan Jenkins by winning a fourth national title, but it was Michael Weiss' fleeting flirtation with the record book that captured the most attention in the Championship Men's competition.

While Eldredge's accomplishments spoke of excellence over a period of many years, Weiss' bid to become the first skater to land a quadruple jump at the U.S. Championships screamed of raw energy compressed into a fraction of a second.

The 20-year-old, Fairfax, Va., native's leap for the limelight came in the form of a quadruple toe loop about 40 seconds into his free skating routine to Santana's "Abraxas." Four rotations later, Weiss not only landed back on the ice but seemingly into the pages of the USFSA record books. With the crowd of 9,392 roaring its approval, Weiss pumped his fists in the air and set his sights on the seven remaining triples in his program.

As Weiss, the last to skate in the men's long program, was finishing his remarkable free skate to a thunderous applause, Eldredge was preparing to make his way to the press conference to talk about winning his fourth U.S. title. Eldredge's place in history alongside Boitano and Co. was guaranteed by the 25-year-old Chatham, Mass., native's trademark consistency that earned him first-place standings in both the short pro-



gram and free skate in Nashville.

"It's a fantastic feeling. Not a lot of people have a chance to do that (win four U.S. titles)," Eldredge said. While Eldredge's accomplishments will certainly endure for years to come, Weiss' place in the record books as the first man to land quad at the Championships was almost as short-lived as the jump

"I've been hitting it in practice and the first thing I thought was 'Yeah!' But, I also realized I needed to keep my composure so I didn't blow the rest of my program," said Weiss, who finished second to Eldredge in the free skate by a narrow 5-4 margin.

As those who witnessed Weiss' jump began comparing notes, many began questioning whether the landing was truly clean. ABC Sports, the network televising the event, had called the landing two-footed in their broadcast. As the debate raged on for more than an hour after the competition, referee Nancy Bizzano and USFSA President Morry Stillwell reviewed

the jump on slow-motion replay and concurred that Weiss' free leg had indeed touched the ice. The jump would not be ruled a clean quad.

"He came down on his landing foot and, essentially pushed off with his second foot," said Stillwell, after reviewing the jump on videotape. "We cannot recognize that as a clean quadruple jump, as much as I would love to. It was a wonderful maneuver and I compliment Michael for attempting it. He kept his form, and it was close."

The one thing Weiss' jump did help accomplish was to catapult him over Damon Allen, Dan Hollander and Scott Davis in the free skate for second place overall. Allen, who stood in second after the short program, had a disappointing free skate and dropped to fifth overall. The 1996 U.S. bronze medalist Hollander, who stood in fourth place after the short, managed to earn a return trip to the World Championships with a determined effort in the free skate to finish third overall.

Hollander, who felt he had been misrepresented in a preevent article in *USA Today* that said he was "brashly predicting victory at the Championships" prior to Championships, said he felt much less pressure this year than last because he was no longer in the position of having to "break onto the scene."

Two-time U.S. champion Scott Davis of Great Falls, Mont., came close to realizing a monumental comeback. In third after the short program, Davis seemed poised to make a return to the U.S. World Team, but a disappointing free skate dropped him to fourth overall.

Championship Ladies

She may be years away from attending a high school prom, but 14-year-old Tara Lipinski exhibited grace and maturity well beyond her years to become the belle of the ball in Nashville.


It was a distinction that the diminutive dynamo with a dazzling smile earned by delivering two of the stronger performances of her young skating career. In so doing, Lipinski dethroned U.S. skating's sitting teen queen Michelle Kwan to become the youngest ladies champion in U.S. history — replacing Sonya Klopfer, who was 15 when she won her title in 1951.

While Lipinski's performances and rigorous training certainly put her in position to realize her pre-competition goal of securing a return trip to the World Championships, it was an unprecedented unraveling by Kwan that opened the way to the title.

Certainly, Kwan knew coming in that she faced some formidable challenges from the talented field of 21 that included Lipinski, 1996 U.S. silver medalist Tonia Kwiatkowski, newly crowned World Junior Champion Sydne Vogel and 1995 U.S. champion Nicole Bobek. Upon arriving in Nashville, Kwan half-jokingly commented that she felt as if there was a bull's eye painted on her. Everyone, she said, was "shooting at her."

The opening round of target practice came in the short program, when Kwan, skating second in the order, set the standard for the field with her portrayal of Desdemona, wife of Shakespeare's Othello. While not her best performance — with a shaky landing on her double Axel — the 5.6-5.8 range of marks for technical merit and 5.8s and 5.9s for presentation established Kwan in her familiar lead position.

Next up, Kwiatkowski delighted the Nashville Arena audience with her sophisticated, engaging routine to "There's No Business Like Show Business." Her marks of 5.4-5.7 for required elements



and 5.6-5.8 for presentation would hold her in second place through 14 skaters until Lipinski took the ice.

Skating appropriately to the soundtrack of "Little Women," the 4-8, 74-pound Lipinski set the stage for a battle of the teen stars

in the free skate with a technically solid performance that earned her six second-place ordinals and nudged Kwiatkowski to third.

The next day, with Kwan in position to become the first U.S. ladies' champion to repeat since Jill Trenary in 1990 and Lipinski and Kwiatkowski looking to rejoin her on the U.S. World Team, a sellout crowd of 16,052 jammed the Nashville Arena for the final session of these Championships — the Championship Ladies' Free Skate.

Overcoming a back injury that limited her

Overcoming a back injury that limited her movement earlier in the year, Nicole Bobek finished third and earned a trip to the World Championships.

With the energy of the

Music City crowd crescendoing throughout the night, Bobek was the first to tap into the charged atmosphere. Skating to "Giselle," Bobek demonstrated the passion and confidence in her skating that has seemingly eluded her since winning the U.S. gold and World bronze medals in 1995. What she lacked in technical difficulty (with only four triples), she overshadowed with her still immense artistic expression. She was justly rewarded with a rousing, standing ovation and six 5.8s for presentation that put her at the top of the free skate standings heading into the final group.

While the fact that Bobek's lead would hold up through the first three skaters in the final group of five was somewhat of a surprise, it paled in comparison to the shock that ensued.

Championship Ladies Medalists



Skating next to last, Kwan opened her technically demanding "Taj Mahal" free skate with a solid triple Lutz/double toe loop combination. It appeared as if Kwan was storming toward a second title, but disaster soon followed. A fall at the end of her ensuing triple toe/double toe combination launched a series of miscues that included a stumbled landing on a triple flip and a second fall on a triple loop. Kwan managed to land her final three jumps. Fighting back tears, Kwan watched as her marks of 5.3-5.7 for technical merit and 5.6-5.9 for presentation left her in second place in the free skate behind Bobek with Lipinski preparing to take the ice.

With the door to the title left wide open, Lipinski coolly skated through without a fear or flaw. She reeled off seven splendid triples — including the first triple loop/triple loop combination by any skater in U.S. Championships history. Her 5.8s and 5.9s for both marks earned her eight of the nine judges' first-place ordinals.

"I'm on a different wavelength right now — something high," the youngest-ever U.S. champion said. "Just being a champion, no matter what age you are, is great."

Kwan, who finished third in the free skate but second overall, also was trying to understand what had happened. "I guess I wasn't concentrating enough. I panicked in the middle of the performance after the (first) fall. Just mind games. ... I have to learn something from this. I have to get my head together and learn how to take defeat."

The surprise bronze medalist Bobek said she found what she sought in Nashville. "I just wanted to skate for myself and all of the people who have supported me," she said. "I had nothing to lose. I just got out there and did it."

Championship Pairs

With Jenni Meno and Todd Sand vying to join the legendary U.S. pairs teams of the Carruthers, Kauffmanns and Ludingtons as four-time U.S. titlists, the Championship Pairs competition seemed destined to become yet another chapter in the husband-and-wife team's storybook career.

But, like a good literary work, that predictable outcome quickly gave way to a surprising, more compelling finish as Kyoko Ina of Guttenberg, N.J., and Jason Dungjen of Goshen, N.Y., emerged from a three-year shadow of second-place finishes to win their first U.S. title. In addition to a study in perseverance, theirs was a story of triumph over tragedy as the win came just two weeks after the death of their dear friend, Judie Burrows, wife of the pair's coach Peter Burrows.

Early indications of an impending plot twist came in the short program, where the common became difficult and the unexpected became normal. On a night filled with bizarre miscues, perhaps none were more glaring than those of the defending champions.

Skating next to last in the field of 15, Meno and Sand had the opportunity to avenge last year's second-place finish to Ina and Dungjen in the short program, as the latter appeared off-synch



in their performance but still managed to hold a narrow lead. Through the first minute-and-30-seconds, the three-time champions appeared on their way to a clean routine before a bobbled dismount on a lift broke their timing. The more disruptive problem came in the program-ending death spiral when Sand failed to plant his toe, which sent Meno whirling untethered across the ice. The pair was visibly stunned as they left the ice.

"We were happy with the beginning, but we lost concentration on the lift, got off time with the music and had the problem with the death spiral," Sand said. "We just did something which

we shouldn't do at our level which was to take things for granted."

Certainly, the overall quality of the skating in the short program created some widely varying opinions among the judges, as the ordinals for each of the top four couples fluctuated greatly. While all four pairs were awarded ordinals for at least three different places, the pair most adversely affected by the disparity was clearly the third-place team of Lyons and Wells — who earned three first-place marks, one second, two thirds and three fourths.

While skaters and judges alike may have welcomed the opportunity to put the short program behind them, the free skate ended up yielding much

of the same as errors plagued three out of the top four pairs and the placements remained fairly static.

First to skate among the final group of four, Ina and Dungjen unveiled a retooled version of their "Grand Canyon Suite," a program that they've used all season, but one that went through a major makeover following their third-place finish at NHK Trophy in early December. They changed the costumes, the choreography and the program elements and kept only the original music.

The move seemingly paid huge dividends as Ina and Dungjen were near-flawless in their performance, packing two throw-triples, side-by-side triple toes and double Axels into their program. Not even a slight stumble by Ina as they prepared to end the program could mar this performance for the pair or the audience. After receiving marks of 5.7-5.9 for technical merit and 5.5-5.8 for presentation, Ina and Dungjen could only wait to see how the defending champions would respond.

Skating next to last, Meno and Sand clearly were not on top of their form from the outset of their program to Rachmaninoff's Concerto No. 2. Sand doubled his attempt on the opening side-by-side triple loops, a jump the pair just added to their repertoire this season, and Meno subsequently singled on a throw

double Axel. By program's end, Meno and Sand knew the result. "We did not deserve to win," Meno admitted. Despite the obvious miscues, many judges were still not convinced. Ina and Dungjen won the title by the narrowest of margins — on a 5-4 split.

"At the end, we had a lot of emotions ... both joyful and tearful," Ina said, referring to the loss of Peter's wife, Judie, who died after a yearlong bout with cancer. "It's been a rough year for us," Dungjen added. "She was the emotional support for us and Peter. We found out we won and we wanted Judie around to share it. ... This was for Judie, for Peter and for ourselves."

In the end, the only swapping of places among the top nine teams after the short program turned out to be a crucial one, however, as Lyons and Wells failed to earn a return trip to the World Championships by dropping from third to fourth. In contrast to their seemingly flawless short, Wells doubled a triple loop and later on the team's side-by-side triple Salchows. Stiegler and Zimmerman, on the other hand, held the audience spell-bound with their "Sorcerer's Apprentice" program to earn the bronze medal and their first trip to the World Championships.



Championship Dance

Defending U.S. dance champions Elizabeth Punsalan and Jerod Swallow posted their first-ever 6.0s in the Original Dance and withstood some testy moments in the free dance to capture their fourth U.S. title and pace a trio of Detroit SC-based dance teams to medals.

Punsalan and Swallow's Detroit stablemates Eve Chalom and Mathew Gates improved on their bronze-medal finish in 1996 by capturing the silver, while Kate Robinson and Peter Breen moved up to the bronze. All three Detroit teams are coached by Igor Shpilband and Elizabeth Coates.

Seeking to become only the third couple to win four U.S. dance titles, Punsalan and Swallow opened up an early lead with a first place-finish in the first compulsory dance — the Golden Waltz — and never looked back. The husband-and-wife team garnered all nine judges' first-place ordinals in all four dances performed. Despite the early, convincing lead, it was the two perfect 6.0 marks for presentation in their Tango Original Dance that solidified their position and stuck most favorably in their minds.

"I was told that if you ever earned 6.0s, you wouldn't remember it because it goes by so fast. We definitely had that experience today," Swallow said following the original dance. "You always dream of getting 6.0s...Liz and I both kind of stared and wondered, 'Is that a 5...a 5.0?' We're not in the habit of seeing 6.0s. It's a great feeling. It's an achievement that you work for your entire career."

The two perfect marks were the most ever recorded by a couple in the Original Dance since that portion was included in U.S. Championships ice dancing in 1976 (Judy Blumberg and Michael Siebert earned one 6.0 in the Original Set Pattern in 1984). Moreover, the 6.0s put Punsalan and Swallow in the running to win a brand-new Chevrolet Cavalier convertible as part of USFSA sponsor Chevrolet Motor Co.'s "Cavalier Perfect 6 Award," for the skater(s) who earned the most 6.0s during the week. Punsalan and Swallow's 6.0s eventually held up as the only ones awarded during the Championships, but the pressure created by the perfect marks almost proved to be their undoing in the free skate the next day.

First up among the top three heading into the free dance were Robinson and Breen, who delivered a spirited Irish stepdance to music from the soundtrack "Riverdance."

Chalom and Gates followed with an energetic dance to Latin rhythms that engaged the crowd and earned the second-year senior couple a return trip to the World Championships.

Last to skate among the top three were the leaders and defending champions Punsalan and Swallow. Striving to repeat the perfection of the night before, the couple found themselves in a precarious position in their Latin rhythm-based free dance as Punsalan misstepped, slipped and fell. Swallow managed to hold on to his wife, helped her to her feet and the couple managed to put the miscue behind them. The fall had no significant impact on the marks, as the couple earned eight 5.8s and one 5.9 for technical merit and eight 5.9s and one 5.8 for presentation.

Swallow said: "You just have to refocus and save the rest of the performance because it can be very detrimental in dance if you lose your expression. The whole dance can go to pieces. We kept it going the best we could."

Hall of Fame Inductees

Seven members enshrined in U.S. Hall of Fame

Andree Anderson of Caledonia, Ill., and Donald Jacoby of San Carlos, Calif., were U.S. dance champions in 1958-59. They were two-time world dance medalists.


Mabel Fairbanks, of Burbank, Calif., paved the way for minority skaters. By giving free lessons to those less fortunate, she was able to pass her gift along to others. Among her students were Debi Thomas, Scott Hamilton and Randy Gardner.



Power of Two

The Stiegler Family tradition continues as Tiffany and Johnnie Stiegler are crowned U.S. Junior Pairs Champions; Jessica Joseph and Charles Butler win their second U.S. Junior Dance title.

The U.S. Junior Figure Skating Championships showed the promising future of American skating in visions of the present. Brother-and-sister act Tiffany Stiegler and Johnnie Stiegler followed in the footsteps of older sister Stephanie in claiming a medal, theirs being gold. Dancers Jessica Joseph and Charles Butler won their second straight Junior Dance title. Butler and Joseph's coaches, Igor Shpilband and Elizabeth Coates, also teach the top-three finishers in Championship Dance.

The Championships were also for the new. Andrea Gardiner became the first African-American to win the Junior Ladies title and relative newcomer Matt Savoie, competing in his first year at the junior level, skated flawlessly to claim the men's crown.

Junior Men

Leading after the short program, Matt Savoie, from Peoria, Ill., was not surprised. He readily admits that his short program is superior to his free skate. What came as a shock to Savoie was that he was standing atop the medal platform following the free skate.

There was no reason for Savoie to think that his free skate was less sound than his short program, at least not during this competition. Performed to "Overture of the Common Man," Savoie landed four triple jumps and two triple/double combinations without flaw. The crowd's reaction was a good indicator to Savoie that he skated well.

"I wasn't the favorite coming in, I know. I didn't really expect to win," he said. "I kind of expected to be in the top three in the short. My short's my best program. I didn't expect that in the long I'd perform this well."

Admittedly tired following the short program, Savoie felt he had little energy heading into the free skate.

"The crowd was good and that may be one reason why I possibly had more endurance than I thought. The crowd was wonderful during the short and that just carried over in to the long," Savoie said.

Silver-medal winner Justin Dillon, of Puyallup, Wash., improved on his fourth-place short program to finish second. His free skate, performed to "Polonia," may not have had the difficulty as Savoie's, but was equally clean. The second-place finish was a surprise.

"I wasn't sure how I was going to do because a lot of these skaters have jumped from the Novice Division," Dillon said. "Only me and another skater had returned from the junior division from last year. I was just hoping to do two clean programs, and wherever the judges placed me from there was up to them."

Falling from second to third was Michael Edgren of Palm

Harbor, Fla. His free skate, performed to music from the motion picture soundtrack "The Rock" was filled with missed jumps. He fell on a triple Axel and a triple Salchow and he two-footed a double Axel and double toe loop. Despite the fall, he was the only Junior competitor to attempt the triple Axel.

"I tried the triple Axel, but I fell. If I landed it, it was a plus with the judges," Edgren said. "I first landed it a week before regionals. I fell on it at sectionals. I was hoping to step up and land it here. It hasn't been very consistent for me."

Junior Ladies

Seemingly oblivious to the judges, crowd and television cameras, Andrea Gardiner of Houston, did what she set out to accomplish. Her goals were simple: she wanted to skate

two strong programs, and she would be happy with whatever finish she earned. In second place following the short program, Gardiner skated a solid program that landed her on top of the medal podium.

"My goal here was to skate and be focused throughout the whole weekend. I wanted to skate a good program where I was happy with myself, not leaving feeling disappointed at all," the 16-year-old said.

Only one error diminished an otherwise impeccable free skate. She did not perfectly land her first double Axel/triple toe loop combination. Outside of


that simple mistake, she skated solidly.

Scoring 5.2-5.5 for technical merit and 5.0-5.4 for artistic impression in the free skate gave Gardiner the ordinals needed to pass Erin Pearl and secure first place.

Learning to skate at the Galleria Mall in Houston, Gardiner is not the stereotypical skater, also evidenced by her becoming the first African-American to win the Junior Ladies U.S Championship. But that was not what was important to her.

"I really don't think its a big deal to me (being the first African-American Junior Ladies Champion)," the Baytown (Texas) Lee sophomore said. "I feel just like a regular Junior national champion, as if that feels normal. I don't even know what it feels like yet."

Gardiner anticipates staying in school, keeping up with her Lee High School peers.

"My friends are really supportive of my skating," Gardiner said. "It's good to interact with other students. I feel like I should be in a classroom with everyone else and not be isolated."

First after the short program, Pearl of Scarborough, Maine, fell to second overall after the free skate. Pearl, suffering from a lower back strain, struggled through to capture the silver.

"My injury started on Dec. 14. I was working on a triple Lutz. I was learning a new jump, and I guess I worked on it a lot that day and I think I just strained it," she said.

But she kept it from bothering her too badly and it only affected one element, a double Axel/triple toe combination that was executed as a double Axel/double toe loop.

Harwich, Mass., native Morgan Rowe improved her 1996 fifth-place finish to a third-place finish in 1997. Mistakes forced Rowe to settle for the bronze.

"I was happy to make a couple of mistakes at the beginning and pull together at the end and do everything I needed to," she said.

Junior Pairs

Placing second after the short program, gold medalists Tiffany Stiegler and Johnnie Stiegler, both of Manhattan Beach, Calif., knew they were in position to win the gold.

"It's easier to fight back from second place," Johnnie said following their second-place short program. "The long is the best part of our competition. We always do it clean."

While not performing a clean free skate, Stiegler proved prophetic as he and his younger sister claimed first place in the free skate and ultimately the competition.

The Stieglers, 13 and 14 years old respectively, had their share of problems, though most of their faults were harmless. The largest error came on a side-by-side combination. Johnnie Stiegler did not land the first half of the combination, forcing him to not attempt the second element.

"On our combination double Lutz/double flip, I missed the Lutz and didn't do the flip," he said.

Tiffany two-footed a landing on a throw double Axel and Johnnie had a problem with a late combination spin, citing fatigue as a possible culprit of the errors.

"I got a little bit tired towards the end, and we missed a couple of times," he said. "We tried a couple of combinations and we were fortunate to hit one of them; I fell on the other. I think overall we skated well."

The judges agreed, awarding the Stiegler pair 5.0-5.3 for technical merit and 5.1-5.4 for presentation. But there was still room for the first-place group following the short, Katie Barnhart and Charles Bernhard IV, to steal the gold.

Skating immediately following the Stieglers, Barnhart, from Huntsville, Ala., and Bernhard, from Birmingham, Ala., needed a strong program to take first. Their free skate was very clean, but not as difficult as the Stieglers'.


The results for Barnhart and Bernhard, 5.0-5.3 in technical merit and 5.2-5.4 in artistic, were just shy of what they needed to be in first. They ranked first on three judges cards, but the other six judges awarded the free skate to the Stieglers.

"We skated off the ice, we thought we would be in first," Bernhard said. "But after I saw the artistic marks, I knew we had second. You can never predict what's going to happen. You just roll with the punches."

Third-place finishers Tiffany Scott and Philip Dulebohn, skating in their first U.S. Championships as a team, were admittedly shocked upon winning the bronze.

"I thought we skated really well. It's the best we have skated up to this point," Dulebohn said. "We made one mistake (on the throw double Axel). But all three of us, coach included, are very happy with our performance. We can't ask for anything more."

Hometown-skaters Christina Connally and Arnold Myint, both of the Nashville FSC, made a valiant effort to medal. A strong free skate with a rousing response from the audience helped, but an eight-place finish in the short program gave the local heroes too much ground to gain.



Junior Dance

Defending U.S. Junior Dance champions Jessica Joseph and Charles Butler returned to defend their title in 1997. Not feeling ready for Senior-level competition, Joseph and Butler attempted to become the first two-time U.S. Junior Dance Champions.

For Joseph and Butler, winning a second consecutive Junior Dance title was done with relative ease. The couple led from start to finish and received first-place ordinals

from each judge in each

"I felt more on edge last year. This year, I had a little more fun and I was more relaxed," Joseph said. "I was nervous the night before we skated, but I had a lot of fun once I was out on the ice."

Joseph and Butler receive instruction from Igor Shpilband and Elizabeth Coates at the dance-crazed Detroit SC. Training under Shpilband and Coates and training at the sides of the top three Championship Dance finishers, has given Joseph and Butler a distinct advantage.

"We have to give most of the credit to our coaches. They are geniuses," Butler said. "The faculty at (the Detroit SC) is supportive. We have a tremendous rink with well kept ice. We are fortunate to train there."

Joseph and Butler will compete in both Junior and Senior events for some time, but they eagerly await the challenges of skating on the Senior level.

"I think we showed the judges that we are ready to take on the Senior level," Butler said.

Placing second to Joseph and Butler was the tandem of Kerrie O'Donnell, of Westwood, Mass., and Brandon Forsyth of Lexington, Mass. O'Donnell and Forsyth held second place from wire-to-wire. Keeping up with Joseph and Butler was the goal of this Colonial FSC-based pair.

"Our goal is to continue to stay at the top. My coach, Maia (Usova), said to me, 'Go out and skate tomorrow like it's the last time you will skate.' So we put our hearts into it and gave it our all," O'Donnell said.

O'Donnell and Forsyth said they plan to compete as juniors for at least one more year.

Third-place finishers Jamie Silverstein, of Bloomfield Hills, Mich., and Justin Pekarek, of Birmingham, Mich., could be the Junior heir-apparents to Joseph and Butler. The 1996 Novice Champions also train with Shpilband and Coates at the Detroit SC.

Happy Birthday, HAL

Computer scoring system celebrates 25th year

Al Beard has made it to the U.S. Figure Skating Championships for the past 25 years without ever turning a toe loop, landing a double Axel, or even lacing his skates.

Beard became interested in figure skating through his daughter, who competed when she was younger. During this time he saw the need for results that were not only quick, but also correct. His solution was to bring computers into the skating world. In the age of high technology, sports fans are accustomed to receiving scores immediately after the event. This fact remains true in figure skating; within seconds after a skater's performance, fans see the judges' marks.

As many veteran skating fans know, this has not always been the case. Just as figure skating has evolved over the years, so has the way that skating scores are computed and displayed. Prior to the use of computers, results were calculated manually. Ordinarily, it would take two accountants anywhere from a half-hour to a few hours to calculate the official results.

Ordinarily, computerization would not have been possible because of the high costs involved. However, at the time, Beard worked as a computer designer for the Minneapolis-Honeywell Company. As a result of Beard's dedication to the cause and his business contacts, he was able to convince the Minneapolis-Honeywell officials in Phoenix to loan the United States Figure Skating Association a user-friendly computer for the 1972 Southwest Pacific Regional Championships.

During this time, Beard created the computer program used by the USFSA known as HAL. HAL was named after the computer in 2001 Space Odyssey, the science fiction thriller by Arthur C. Clarke.

Computers used in the '70s were much different than the standard personal computer that many are accustomed to today. These computers were much bigger; they were so big that time-sharing arrangements had to be made between the USFSA and Honeywell.

There were two mainframes, located in Minneapolis and Phoenix, that held all of the files for the USFSA. These mainframes had advantages and disadvantages. An advantage of these central computers was that people could "snoop" into results from competitions that may have just happened. However, because these mainframes were accessed through telephone lines, they were especially vulnerable.


Beard recalls one particularly nerve-wracking incident. "We always had to contend with the lightning factor. During one of the Nationals, we had a mainframe down because lightning had struck. It was a very tense moment for us because we only had one working machine, and ABC was counting on us to give them the scores from the competition. Luckily, nothing

CSAP Applications Available

The USFSA Memorial Fund has announced that applications for the 1997-98 Competitive Skaters Assistance Program (CSAP) and Academic Scholarship programs are now available through USFSA Headquarters.

Applications for CSAP, which is intended to subsidize the training expenses incurred by competitive figure skaters, were mailed to those who met the established criteria. Applications for Academic Scholarships, which are intended to assist skaters pursuing a college degree, are available upon request. All CSAP and Academic Scholarship applications must

be returned to the USFSA Memorial Fund post marked no later than June 15, 1997.

In 1996-97, the USFSA Memorial Fund awarded more than \$300,000 to deserving, qualified skaters through these two programs.

To be eligible for CSAP funding, a skater must: be a current USFSA member; have competed in the 1997 Sectional Championships and placed sixth or higher in the senior, junior or novice levels or received a competition bye to the 1997 State Farm U.S. Championships or competed at the 1997 Junior Olympics, placing third or higher in the intermediate level or second

or higher at the juvenile level. Competitive history will be verified from protocols on file at USFSA Headquarters.

To be eligible for the Academic Scholarship program, a skater must be a current USFSA member and must have passed either the fourth figure, Novice Free Skating, Novice Pair or one Silver Dance and the Bronze Free Dance tests. If the applicant is no longer competing in USFSA qualifying competition, he/she must state the year/competition, event and placement of the most recent competition and/or list current involvement in USFSA activities (i.e. judging, trial judging, officiating, committee member, precision team member, etc.)

Additionally, all Academic Scholarship program applicants must be enrolled and pursuing a degree at either an accredited four-year college, accredited junior college or community college or accredited graduate school.

Applicants must be enrolled in no less than six credit hours per semester (undergraduate) or three credit hours (graduate) and must possess a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or higher (on a 4.0 scale) or 3.75 or higher (based on a 5.0 scale.) High school seniors entering college must submit a high school transcript from the college and career office that includes the official school seal, including GPA, or class standing, or both. College or graduate students must submit official college or graduate school transcripts from the school registrar's office with the official school seal.





happened to the other mainframe, and we were able to get the scores to ABC without any problem," said Beard.

Although the computers were easy to use, they were not necessarily trusted by accountants and officials. Nor were they easily accessible to the fans. In the beginning, computers were only used at small competitions. And while the judge's marks were being entered into the computer, there was someone who was calculating the scores with a hand-held calculator.

"The results were immediate, but the problem was with the distribution of the results. The public may not have known the official results until right before the awards ceremony or even the next day," Beard said.

When computers were first being used to assist with scoring, there had been several instances where the wrong results had been calculated. Skating officials were reluctant to trust the computers.

As time passed, officials became more trusting of the results. Most of the bugs that had plagued the earlier computers were obsolete. As the '70s progressed, there was a gradual diminishing of the hand-held calculator that was once used to double-check figure skating scores.

In 1985, personal computers replaced the time-sharing system. Instead of having to log on to a mainframe, accountants could tabulate the results at their own computers. Officials no longer had to contend with natural disasters that may prevent the scores from being transmitted. Furthermore, the officials had the marks at hand, which decreased the time that the pub-

lic had to wait for the official results. On the other hand, people could no longer "snoop" into their competition's results.

Seven years later, skating fans were able to get their first glance at the convenience of having a computer on hand to tally the scores. At the 1992 U.S. Championships in Orlando, results were posted on the scoreboard in the arena.

This officially ended the days of eagerly waiting for the official scores, as the results could be seen by everyone in the arena.

Beard still sees growth potential. He would like to directly link the HAL program to the Internet. While skating results can be found on America Online and the USFSA's web page, Beard said that the results can be more timely.

"For example, Worlds or Nationals scores are available much quicker than the results from a sectional," said Beard.

Beard would also like to make HAL more user-friendly. He says that the keyboard is outdated by 20 years. Moreover, Beard adds that the command prompt used by USFSA accountants is also behind the times. "This part of HAL has not evolved at all; even though it went out in the '70s or '80s on most other programs," said Beard.

So, as Beard works to make HAL more user-friendly for generations to come, he and HAL can take pride in knowing that for the past quarter of a century they have teamed up to make figure skating much more spectator-friendly.

The Chevy Malibu Team 2002 National Novice Seminar added a new dimension to the Novice events this year. This seminar was organized for the first time exclusively for those competitors who had reached the U.S. Championships at the Novice level. It was held over the

two days following their events — Feb. 10-11.

Approximately 85 percent of those eligible took part in the seminar. Among the more popular activities in the packed schedule were a crash-course on psychology in which the athletes were shown how mental preparedness can positively impact their skating, and a trial judging session in which participants were able to practice judge during the Junior Pairs short program and then compare their marks with actual judges in a post-session critique.

Novice Men

Daniel Lee has competed for four years at the Novice level but this was the first time the 14-year-old had advanced to Nationals. He certainly made a striking impression in Nashville, winning the long program unanimously and the short by an eight-judges-to-one decision.

Lee, who is from Pueblo, Colo., was disappointed when he drew to skate first in the short, fearing this was a disadvantage. His coach, Kathy Casey, explained how that position had been good for some of her other pupils and settled Lee's fears.

In his free skate, Lee began with two double Axels in a

snappy routine to "When the Saints Go Marching In."

"I've always liked jazzy music," Lee said. "The last two programs I have skated have been to jazz."

His content included two triple toes, but he touched a hand down on the second triple Salchow. He left both judges and spectators with a good impression closing with a scratch spin which accelerated to a blur.

"This is a turning point for Daniel, a big milestone, not only in skating but as a person," coach Casey said. "The difference between this year and last, is that in the past Daniel has had problems with his technique on jumps. He had problems performing as well in competition as in practice. But he has worked to secure the jumps. If the landings aren't completely secure then you're going to lose them in competition."

Lee's training schedule is quite daunting. He skates for an hour each morning in Pueblo, then pursues a full school curriculum. Following school, he goes to Colorado Springs, a 40-minute drive north, for at least two more hours of training,

finishing the day lifting weights and doing other strengthening exercises followed by a half hour of power skating.

Lee knows that moving up to Juniors will be difficult but Casey thinks he'll make the transition without problems.

"He's close to getting two more triple (jumps)," she said.
"The hardest part is looking more mature, having style, and he is on the road to that."

Simeon Hanks, a 16-year- old from Irving, Texas, presented a martial arts long program to hold onto second place, while William Rasmussen, a 16-year-old from Reston, Va., advanced from sixth after the short to claim the bronze medal.

Amir Ganaba, a 14-year-old who now lives in Lake Arrowhead, Calif., maintained fourth place. Ganaba had the busiest schedule of all the competitions since he also took part with his sister in Novice Pairs in which they finished 12th.

Novice Ladies

Novice Ladies winner Naomi Nari Nam was unable to participate in the Team 2002 seminar. The 11-year-old had to fly back to Irvine, Calif., for school final exams. She

returned to participate in the Champions exhibition complete with her bubbly personality that earned her the nickname "Miss Dy-Nam-ic".


In the competition, Nam demonstrated some awe-inspiring blur spins, including a skate-touching-head layback and a "Biellman" beautifully choreographed in effervescent routines. Despite only attempting one triple jump — a toe loop — — she ran away with the competition. An infectious smile certainly added to the spectator appeal of her presentations.

Her parents are from Korea but she was born in Anaheim, Calif. At 2, Nam started roller skating. She Paul Harvath

loved the sensation of gliding and two years later her grandfather took her to the ice rink. Once on the ice, he had difficulty getting her to leave the ice.

By 5, she entered — and won — her first competition. Nam began with group classes at the Costa Mesa Rink headed by John Nicks. In time, she felt she was ready to progress to the big-time with individual lessons from this

top-notch coach, but she hit a brick wall.

"When I first saw Mr. Nicks he wouldn't take me because my Axel was up and down," said the 4-foot-3, 65-pound Nam. "I was so disappointed."

Nicks said in the four years he has trained Nam, she has been one of his hardest-working pupils.

"In all that time, I can count on one hand the times when she hasn't given 100 percent and that's extremely rare in this sport," Nicks said. "Her first instructor came to me and said she had something special. That's what I look for in a skater. They don't have to be the best in technique of jumps, but personality means a great deal, and Naomi has that."

Nam won the short program section in Nashville with five votes of first, despite two-footing her triple toe landing in the combination. (This was the first year the Novice Ladies were permitted to do a triple in their required combination of jumps.)

In the free skate, Nam won with six first-place ordinals. The other four firsts in the short, and other three firsts in the long were awarded to Lisa Nesuda, who advanced from fourth after the initial round to second overall.

In the short program, Nesuda landed a triple loop/double toe loop combination and completed all the other elements. In the long, she landed one triple loop but fell on a second attempt and struggled on the landing of the Salchow.

Lisa's a perfectionist," her father said. "She wasn't pleased with her showing. She wasn't disappointed at not winning, just at not showing her best."

The 13-year-old Nesuda is from Little Rock, Ark., but she and her mother moved to Irving, Texas, to train with coach Staci McMullen.

Finishing third was another tiny 11-year-old, Ann Patrice McDonough. McDonough, from Colorado Springs, Colo., landed a triple Lutz/double toe combination in the short but missed her double Axel.

In the free skate, McDonough showed great promise accomplishing a triple flip and loop but collided with the dasher boards while attempting a Lutz, fell on one double Axel and aborted another attempt.

Novice Pairs

Dressed in tasteful black outfits with a simple white stripe down the center, similar to those worn by Russian pair Ekaterina Gordeeva and the late Sergei Grinkov, Stephanie Kalesavich and Amaan Archer drew to skate first in the short program in Novice Pairs and set a standard their rivals could not match.

Their long, choreographed to music from "A Walk in the Clouds," included a double twist, a throw double loop and double Salchow, and an East German press lift into a star with a flip descent. Their coach, Craig Maurizi, said their best quality is "how they look - their matched lines, poise and the way they flow over the ice."


Maurizi taught Archer, who is 18, in Omaha, Neb., and Archer followed him when the coach moved to Detroit. Archer placed 11th in National Novice with his previous partner, and Maurizi thought Kalesavich, who is now 12, would be perfect for him.

"I didn't think she'd agree to do pairs because she was a very promising singles skater at the Juvenile level," Maurizi said. "But when I asked her, her eyes just lit up."

In the Midwestern Regional, they had been beaten by Carey Floyd and David Tankersley. Floyd and Tankersley threatened Kalesavich and Archer with a second-place short program, but fell to fourth following the free.

Jaisa-Summer MacAdam and Garrett Lucash from the SC of Boston gave a clean performance in the short, in which they were fourth, and were able to advance to take the silver medals.

Megan Sierk and Dustin Sierk, 13- and 15-year-olds from the Huntsville FSC who were fourth last year, won the bronze medals.

National Novice Team prepares for future

The road to the Olympic Games for any athlete can be a long and arduous journey. At this year's U.S. Championships in Nashville, the USFSA presented approximately 50 Novice skaters, their coaches and parents a "road map" to help them along the path to the 2002 Olympic Winter Games.

The Chevy Malibu Team 2002 National Novice seminar, developed by the USFSA and sponsored by the association's

newest national sponsor Chevrolet Motor Co., was designed to expose young skaters to as much information as possible in a number of diverse areas related to elite-level skating. Instructors for the twoday seminar included USFSA and U.S. Olympic Committee staffers, as well as many of the top professionals in such areas as sports medicine, sports psychology and training and conditioning.

"We want them to

understand that skating is a process and how to survive that process," said USFSA National Programs Director Christy Krall. "We did it here because we could service them best, reach every single novice athlete at the national level who chooses to take part. It's a chance to get as much information out to as many people as we can."

The seminar kicked off with a breakfast for all participants featuring a keynote address by four-time U.S. pairs champions and 1984 Olympic silver medalists Kitty and Peter Carruthers.

Team 2002ers were then divided into smaller groups for instructional sessions on such topics as sports psychology, media training, strength and conditioning and judging. The judging session proved to be one of the highlights of the seminar, as participants were required to score the junior pairs short program and then defend their marks in discussions with real judges after the event. "It gave them an appreciation for the accountability and expertise of judges," Krall said.

With Chevrolet's backing, the USFSA plans to continue the program through the decade. "We want to build a relationship with them through the 2002 Olympics, said Lew Eads, Chevrolet advertising manager. "Not everyone will be in the Olympics, but we want to encourage these young kids through the 2002 Olympics, let them know someone is out there saying, 'Keep it up."

Novice Dance

The Novice Ice Dance winners Jesica Valentine and Matthew Kossack have only skated together for a short time. Valentine, who is 14, tried out with Kossack, 17, last June. He decided it was a go, but she kept him in suspense while trying out with another skater.

"She kept me waiting a whole two weeks before she agreed," Kossack said.

Both had previous partners. She had made it to fifth at Midwest Novice; he placed ninth in National Novice last year.

Since Valentine is from Lewiston, Maine, and Kossack is from Amherst, N.Y., they had decided to train in Boston with coach Barrett Brown.

They came to an arrangement to live with Valentine's grandmother, who acts as both their guardians. Grandmother Peggy Valentine makes sure they are looked after during the week and then shuttles them home for the weekends.

Brown had not taught either skater and their styles were not similar, so a lot of work had to be done in a short time. Michelle Harvath

Competing in their first U.S. Championships together, Jesica Valentine and Matthew Kossack won the U.S. Novice Dance crown.

Although they won all three compulsories, the Tango, the European Waltz, and the Rocker Foxtrot, they had not expected to win overall because they had been overtaken in Sectionals.


Since sectionals they had completely revamped their free and that gave them gold.

Valentine and Kossack not only gave credit to Brown for their turnaround, but also thanked fellow Boston SC dancers Amy Webster and Ron Kravette for helping them turn their free dance into a gold-medal winning performance.

five new Figures champions crowned in other divisions.

Championship Men's Figures
Everett Weiss of Albuquerque, N.M. had little trouble reclaim-

ing the Men's Figures title in a field of only two competitors. His only opposition came from silver-medalist Robert Shmalo of Cincinnati, Ohio, last year's Junior Men's Figures bronze medalist.

Weiss' scores consistently topped Shmalo's by two-tenths of a point or more, with his highest score, a 4.2, coming in the third figure, a RFO, LFI Paragraph Loop.

Championship Ladies' Figures

Melanie Dupon of Tempe, Ariz., added to her collection of U.S. Championships by adding the 1997 Ladies' Figures title to her 1994 gold medal. Dupon faced a much deeper field than did Weiss in the Men's Figures Championship.

Dupon easily won all three figures — RFO, LBO Counter; LBO, RBI Paragraph Double Three; and RFO, LFI Paragraph Loop — despite struggling in the first figure. Her scores for the RFO, LBO Counter dropped as low as 2.9, while her other eight marks reached into the fours, peaking at 4.7.

McKenzie Savidge of Newark, Del., took advantage of three different skaters claiming the second spot in each of the figures. Taking third in each figure gave her the factored places needed for the silver. Sarah Devereaux of Anchorage, Alaska, claimed the bronze.

Junior Men's Figures
Winning the Junior Men's Figures Championship is a Sarbacker family tradition as Scott Sarbacker followed up the win of 1996 Junior Men's Figures Champion and brother Lloyd Sarbacker with a win in 1997. Sarbacker was the only Nashville FSC member to medal at Nashville.

Christopher Mattern of Brooklyn, Ohio, won the silver medal in the field of four. Colin Bennett of Potomac, Md., fell to the bronze after winning the silver medal in 1995 and 1996.



Junior Ladies' Figures
A come-from-behind effort won Cammi Bruns of Colorado

Springs, Colo., the gold medal. A second-place first figure was easily overcome by taking first in the last two figures. The leader after the first figure, Heather Lee, dropped to fourth overall after a 12th-place finish in the third figure.

Emily Best of Matthews, N.C., used a strong third figure to claim second. Jessica Vieth of Williamsville, N.Y., was very consistent (three fourth-place figures) and won the Bronze.

Special Special Special Olympic skaters

When Shannon Lamb stepped on to the ice 11 years ago to skate a dance exhibition with Scott Gregory, she became the first Special Olympics athlete to perform during the U.S. Figure Skating Championships.

"The excitement had been building for the whole week," said Gregory who with his partner Suzanne Semanick went on to become the senior dance national champions in 1987 and 1988. Gregory is now a skating coach at the University of Delaware. "Shannon was excited about the exhibition, but I think she was even more excited about us skating in the nationals."

Lamb's performance in 1986 was especially memorable because she amply demonstrated the capabilities of the Special Olympics athlete to an appreciative audience of skaters, coaches, officials and enthusiasts and inspired many upon their return home to incorporate Special Olympics skaters into their clubs, programs and activities.

And, 11 years later, the 26-year-old

Lamb is still widening horizons for herself and other skaters with mental retardation. In February, she became the first "Special Olympics athlete/official" to assist in judging during the International Winter Special Olympics Games in Toronto. Seated beside Carole Ludlow, she kept track of the required deductions from the figure skating programs.

"Shannon began skating when she was just 3 years old," said her mother, Sandy Lamb who seems to be in perpetual motion, giving lessons and attending to figure skating activities in and around her home in Indianapolis.

"Shannon went right along with me to the ice rink whenever I went to give skating lessons," she explained. "She skated for the first time in the International Winter Special Olympics Games in 1981 in Stowe, Vt., and she was a World Team member in 1985, 1989 and 1993.

"She has already passed her bronze dance test. She was planning on taking her preliminary free dance test last fall, but I was in the hospital with back surgery, and she wanted to wait until I could be there to see her skate," she said.

This winter has not only been very significant for the Lamb household but for figure skaters in Special Olympics everywhere. They have competed by the hundreds in their state-wide Winter Special Olympics Games across the nation in addition to those skillful few who skated in Toronto, February.

Two other developments arose over the past winter which will certainly heighten the awareness of Special Olympics figure skaters and facilitate their inclusion in a wider range of activities in future years.

These positive developments can be traced back to the USFSA's Special Olympics Committee, chaired by Sandy Lamb who also serves as the current Figure Skating Director for Special Olympics International.

The rules for Special Olympics skaters are being adapted by the USFSA and will better fit the needs of Special Olympics skaters. The adaptations will also hopefully lead to more opportunities for testing, resulting in a sense of accomplishment for the skaters. The rules for ice dancing already have been adapted for Special Olympics skaters and the

USFSA's Special Olympics Committee will soon be addressing the adaptation of the rules for special Moves in the Field and freestyle.

"We aren't looking for a numerical score for the Special Olympics skater in the adapted rules, but rather we are looking for a pass/fail mark," Mrs. Lamb said.

Perhaps of much more significance is the increased awareness of Unified Sports, a concept developed by Special Olympics International, in an effort to place figure skaters with mental retardation with their peers without mental retardation for training and competition. The most important aspect of this program is careful pairing of skaters who are similar in age and ability.

"This would be an opportunity for a skater of comparable age and skill level to skate at the side of a Special Olympics skater," Mrs. Lamb said. "It would be an opportunity for them to train together and compete together."

Not the least of the benefits of Unified Sports would be meaningful inclusion in skating activities ranging from training to testing to competition as well as fostering community-based participation. Furthermore, Unified Sports offers the opportunity for positive social interaction between skaters which often leads to long-lasting friendships.

"We are also hoping that the USFSA's member clubs will not forget the Special Olympics skaters when it comes to their Basic Skills classes, competitions, testing and ice shows," Mrs. Lamb added.

That Special Olympics skaters can be incorporated right along with a host of activities at their local ice rink and USFSA member clubs comes as no surprise to Bonnie Jean Carr of Richmond, Va., who claims to have given skating lessons "27 hours a day," but now solely works with Special Olympics skaters.

Carr does not believe that there is a great deal of difference between coaching a Special Olympics athlete and any other skater. Quite to the contrary, when it comes to the finer points of figure skating, she believes coaching Special Olympics athletes may be easier.

"The Special Olympics skaters need more of a visual image," Carr said. "For instance, if you are teaching them to lean into a turn, then you have to create an image. An image of turning the steering wheel of an automobile. They can relate to that. It's amazing what you can teach them about using their inside and outside edges. Unbelievable!"

There are other differences and perhaps more rewarding ones, like the spirit of sportsmanship that pervades among Special Olympics coaches, skaters, officials, and parents.

"During the practice session or even during a competition, if a skater falls, the Special Olympics skater's first reaction is to stop whatever they are doing and help the other skater get up," Carr said.

There are no empty words within the Special Olympics oath which states: "Let me win, but if I cannot win, let me be

brave in the attempt."

Competition is very important to Special Olympics athletes because for Darlene Laurent, and hundreds like her across the nation, the training, hard work and courage culminates every winter in the compulsory figures and freestyle skating in their state games.

Laurent competed with 18 other figure skaters in January's Virginia Special Olympics Championships. She got her introduction to the sport initially as a speed skater 12 years ago, but for the past 10 years, she has focused entirely on figure skating. During this time, she has made a steady rise up through the ranks of badges and levels, with her goal reaching Level 5, the top achievement for a Special Olympics skater.


"Most skaters start out on speed skating because of the extra agility and coordination required for figure skating," said her father Kurt Krumriech. "When a skater reaches Level 5, you can hardly tell the difference between the Special Olympics skater and any other competitive skater."


Coached by her mother, Angie Krumriech, Laurent skates three times a week, 45 minutes each session.


"The skaters always try to do their best," Mrs. Krumriech said, "and they are just as happy when one of the other skaters wins as when they win a medal."

Laurent added, "But Mom, that's part of the Special Olympics oath."



Cardiovascular Fitness and Conditioning

There is only a limited amount of information about what it takes to be an elite skater. Therefore, perhaps, the best description of what it requires to be a good skater is a quote by Johnny Heater made at the U.S.

Championships several years ago. He stated that to be a good skater it requires that you must have "balance of a tightrope walker, the endurance of a marathon runner, the aggressiveness of a football player, the agility of a wrestler, the nerves of a golfer, the flexibility of a gymnast and the grace of a ballet dancer."

This statement is more so true today given the increased emphasis on jumps and lifts that require the athlete to be in optimal shape.

However, the question still remains what does it take to be a champion skater? To be a champion skater requires that the skater have a unique combination of skill, attitude, grace and fitness.

Skaters must have the skills required to perform jumps, lifts and footwork, a winning attitude, and the grace and line required to perform an outstanding program.

All of these elements, however, are built upon the fact that the skater must possess a high level of physical fitness. Therefore, it is extremely important to know what fitness components are required for the sport of skating and how to train the body to be in the best possible shape. Figure 1 displays the fitness components and training programs that are necessary for skating. To perform difficult jumps and lifts, a skater must possess adequate muscular strength and power and these fitness components are achieved by a program of strength training and plyometrics or jump training.

The long and short programs both require cardiovascular endurance and anaerobic capacity which can be attained through a combination of con-



tinuous cardiovascular training and high-intensity interval training. Flexibility, although not depicted in Figure 1, is also a requirement of skating and is acquired through a daily stretching program. The remainder of this article will concentrate on the cardiovascular aspects of training.

Cardiovascular Requirements

To get the best results from an off-ice or on-ice training program, the training must be as similar to the competitive event as possible (specificity of training) and the conditioning program must place an increased stress on the system being trained (overload principle).

To determine what is the best cardiovascular training program for skaters it is best to examine the competitive event. Figure 2 displays the average heart rate response to the long program followed by maximal stroking in a group of junior-level skaters.

It is clear that within the first two minutes skaters are at their maximal heart rate and that they maintain the maximal heart rate for the last two minutes. Competitive events that are four minutes in duration (long program) utilize both the aerobic and anaerobic energy systems. For approximately the first two minutes of the program the energy used to skate comes

from energy stored in the muscle. This is called the anaerobic energy system. During the last two minutes, the energy used in skating comes from the oxygen in the air. This is called the aerobic energy system. Therefore, it is important that skaters train aerobically to increase their endurance and anaerobically to decrease the rate at which lactic acid accumulates in the bloodstream and causes the skater to become fatigued.

Past research has shown that while a highly trained junior level skaters have

Junior Elite Skaters' Heart Rate Response to Long Program



a good peak VO2, the best measure of cardiovascular endurance, it is much lower than world-class skaters. With the proper cardiovascular conditioning program, skaters could increase their cardiovascular endurance (aerobic energy system) by as much as 20-30 percent. In addition, these same skaters could delay the point at which lactic acid builds up in the bloodstream (anaerobic energy system) by approximately 20 percent. These factors would have a significant impact on the ability of the skater to land jumps and perform lifts late in the program. Heart rate monitoring of a typical on-ice patch session and of an on-ice session where jumps were practiced showed that the average heart rate response is not high enough or sustained for long enough to produce a cardiovascular training response. However, on-ice power stroking is of a sufficient intensity and duration to produce a cardiovascular training response.

The Periodization of Off-Ice Training Prioritizing the goals of off-ice training requires that the skater, coach and conditioning specialist manipulate the fitness and training components so the skater is peaking at the appropriate time. This systematic approach to training is called periodization of training.

The purpose of an off-ice periodization schedule for skating is to provide the coach and skater with a realistic overview of the off-ice training year, prevent injury and overtraining and to encourage coaches and skaters to prioritize competitions so the skater is peaking at the appropriate time. For many skaters in the United States, peaking for the U.S. Championships is the goal. If peaking for the U.S. Championships was the goal, the year should be divided in the following manner: Early Off-Season (After U.S. Championships -February), Late Off Season (March-April), Pre-Season (May-September), In-Season (mid October - mid February).

Early Off-Season Program

 Skaters should have complete rest after the U.S. Championships so the body can recover from a long season. How long a skater should rest is dependent on the skater's individual

- physical and psychological condition. It may range from several days to weeks.
- Following the rest component, it is recommended that skaters engage in fun, cross-training, recreational activities to maintain fitness levels.

Late Off-Season Program

- Should be preceded by a sport-specific fitness evaluation to provide guidelines for off-season and pre-season training.
- The training program should emphasize building a good aerobic base and developing muscular strength and flexibility.

Pre-Season Program

- Starts two-three months before the first major competition.
- Training focuses on sport-specific activities that develop anaerobic capacity (high intensity interval training), and muscular power (plyometric training) while maintaining the aerobic, strength and flexibility achieved in the off-season.

In-Season

- Training emphasis is on maintaining the sport-specific fitness developed in the pre-season.
- For approximately two weeks prior to a competitive event, the off-ice training should be scaled back while the skater concentrates on on-ice training.
- The more intense off-ice training should occur after the competitive event.

Aerobic training in the late off-season would consist of exercising continuously on a slideboard, bicycle, rope skipping, treadmill or other aerobic training equipment for approximately 30 minutes, three times per week at 75-85 percent of their predicted maximal heart rate three times per week.

Anaerobic training in the pre-season consists of high-intensity interval training at a heart rate that is equal to 85-95 percent. It is recommended that a sport-specific training devise like the slideboard be used for anaerobic training, but other cardiovascular conditioning equipment like the bicycle, rope skipping or treadmill may also be appropriate for anaerobic training. Establishing a periodization program

for your skaters will be facilitated by consulting a conditioning specialist.

How Do I Find a Certified Specialist? To contact a certified conditioning specialist in your area you may want to contact a certifying agency such as: American College of Sports Medicine at 1-800-486-5643 or the American Council on Exercise at 1-800-825-3636. Be sure that the specialist that you choose is knowledgeable about working with young athletes and has an understanding of the requirements of skating.
