



## 1999 Chevrolet Lumina/USFSA Scholastic Honors Team Announced

The United States Figure Skating Association (USFSA) and Chevrolet Motor Division announced the 1999 Chevrolet Lumina/USFSA Scholastic Honors Team recognizing top student-athletes in figure skating. The 12 team members were recognized during a special ceremony on Feb. 11 at the 1999 State Farm U.S. Figure Skating Championships at the Delta Center in Salt Lake City, Utah.

The student-athletes honored include Katie Barnhart of Madison, Ala.; Whitney Gaynor of San Francisco, Calif.; Abbi Gleeson of Wayne, Pa.; Christopher Hayes of East Lansing, Mich.; Wendi Rae Mangiagli of Montclair, Calif.; Christie Moxley of Newark, Del.; Laura Nyre of Minot, N.D.; William Rasmussen of Washington, D.C.; Morgan Rowe of Harwich, Mass.; Courtney Sayther of Burnsville, Minn.; Jenni Tew of Westlake, Ohio; Lisa Weitzman of Lake Placid, N.Y.

This year's team boasts four members with a 4.0 or above grade point average. Ten of the student-athletes have competed at the U.S. Championships while six have been members of U.S. Figure Skating Teams that have competed internationally. Rowe also was a member of the 1998 Scholastic Honors Team.

The USFSA developed the Chevrolet Lumina/USFSA Scholastic Honors Team program to recognize high school student-athletes who have excelled in both academics and the sport of figure skating. The Honors Team program is open to all full-time high school juniors and seniors who have competed at either the junior or championship levels

at USFSA events. Athletes from all disciplines — figures, men's and ladies' singles, pairs, ice dancing and precision team skating — are eligible for the program.

This year marks the third year of Chevrolet's involvement in the program. Chevrolet, in conjunction with the USFSA, will be providing scholarships to all team members and a 1999 Chevrolet Lumina/USFSA Scholastic Honors Team letter jacket.

Applicants were required to have at least a 3.2 grade point average (based on a 4.0 scale). In addition to the application, the candidates submitted a written essay and two letters of recommendation, one from a school official and one from an individual involved in the sport of figure skating.

Tom Collins, a 1996 U.S. Figure Skating Hall of Fame inductee, was also honored during the on-ice presentation and was formally inducted into the World Figure Skating Hall of Fame.

The brother-sister pairs team Kitty and Peter Carruthers of Burlington, Mass., were the dominant U.S. pairs team in the early 1980's. The Carruthers claimed the Olympic silver medal at the 1984 Olympic Winter Games in Sarajevo, Yugoslavia, and captured four U.S. titles from 1981-

84. They represented the U.S. at four World Championships from 1980-83, winning a bronze medal at the 1982 World Championships in Copenhagen, Denmark. Peter, who now resides in Thousand Oaks, Calif., serves as a television commentator on a variety of skating events. Kitty, who resides in Katy, Texas, is a figure skating coach at the Aerodrome in Houston. She has three children.

John Misha Petkevich of Great Falls, Mont., was a two-time U.S. Olympic Team member, placing sixth in the 1968 Olympics in Grenoble, France and fifth in the 1972 Olympics in Sapporo, Japan. Petkevich, the 1971 U.S. men's singles champion, claimed a total of five U.S. Championship medals in his career, including three silver medals and one bronze. He also won the U.S. Junior men's title in 1966.

Collins, the owner and producer of "Champions on Ice", is a longtime benefactor to the sport of figure skating throughout the U.S. and the world. His level of involvement with figure skating is unsurpassed, having provided skating fans the "Champions on Ice" tour for the past 21 years. In honor of his many contributions on and off the ice, the USFSA will rename its national headquarters in Colorado Springs, Colo., the "Tom Collins Building." Originally from Canada, Collins has resided in the Minneapolis/St. Paul,

Minn., area for the past 30 years with his wife, Jane and their three sons, Michael, Marty and Mark.

1992 Olympic champion Kristi Yamaguchi was inducted into the World Figure Skating Hall of Fame during a special presentation at the Target Center in Minneapolis, Minn., Feb. 3.

Yamaguchi, who was elected to the World Hall of Fame in May 1998, was presented with a World Hall of Fame plaque and medal by USFSA President Jimmy Disbrow during her appearance with "Discover Stars on Ice".

Yamaguchi, who resides in Fremont, Calif., reached the pinnacle of ladies' figure skating in 1992, claiming U.S. and World titles and winning the Olympic gold.



## Stellar Field Fills Hershey's Kisses Figure Skating Challenge

Two-time World champion Michelle Kwan, 1992 Olympic champion Kristi Yamaguchi, U.S. and World champion Todd Eldredge and three-time World champion Elvis Stojko are among the many current and former World and Olympic medalists that will compete in the Hershey's Kisses Figure Skating Challenge at the Broome County Veterans Memorial Arena in Binghamton, N.Y., April 13 at 7:30 p.m.

Kwan, who claimed her third U.S. ladies title in Salt Lake City, Feb. 13, has won 10-straight individual titles since her silver medal performance at the 1998 Olympic Winter Games. Yamaguchi will be competing in an ISU judged event for the first time since 1996. Joining Kwan and Yamaguchi in the ladies' competition is two-time Olympic champion Katarina Witt of Germany along with 1998 World bronze medalist Maria Butyrskaya of Russia and three-time World silver medalist Surya Bonaly of France.

Joining Eldredge and Stojko in the men's competition are 1999 U.S. champion Michael Weiss of Fairfax, Va., 1998 World and reigning European champion Alexei Yagudin of Russia, 1992 Olympic champion Viktor Petrenko of the Ukraine and 1996 U.S. champion and World bronze medalist Rudy Galindo of San Jose, Calif.



In the pairs competition, 1998 World champions Elena Berezhnaya & Anton Sikharulidze of Russia along with 1998 Olympic gold medalists Oksana Kazakova & Artur Dmitriev of Russia will lead the way. Challenging the Russians for top spot will be 1999 U.S. champions Danielle Hartsell & Steve Hartsell of Westland, Mich., and 1999 U.S. silver medalists Kyoko Ina of Guttenberg, N.J., & John Zimmerman of Birmingham, Ala.


In the ice dancing competition, 1998 World champions Anjelika Krylova & Oleg Ovsiannikov of Russia and five-time U.S. champions Elizabeth Punsalan & Jerod Swallow of Birmingham, Mich., will compete.

The event will also feature an exhibition by 1999 U.S. silver medalist Naomi Nari Nam of Costa Mesa, Calif.

# See Youin 3 Years, Salt Lake

Lake City – saw in Nam both a little of the sport's future and a remindful hint of Kwan's past spin and twirl right before her eyes.

Nam pulled off the impossible in Salt Lake City. No, she didn't dethrone Kwan, who

> charmed with her usual elegant style to become the

first three-time U.S.

ladies' winner since Jill Trenary in 1990. Instead, the 4-foot-9, 13-year-old tiny bundle of potential managed to sneak a peak outside of Kwan's shadow, evoking comparisons to both Tara Lipinski and Kwan herself, with her stirring free skate.

"You can see it in their eyes if they have it in them," Kwan would say later of Nam. "She has the fire to work hard, and she wants to win."

It was that kind of week during these U.S. Championships. Veteran favorites Kwan and Michael Weiss, a first-time winner after finishing second to Todd Eldredge the past two years, delivered winning performances. But Nam and men's silver medal winner Trifun Zivanovic supplied arguably the most compelling storylines.

As is the case with most post-Olympic years, 1999 has been a transition year for U.S. Figure Skating. Shortly after edging Kwan for gold in Nagano in February, Lipinski surrendered her eligibility for the spotlight of professional touring, making Nam's rise as a worthy foe for Kwan even more timely. Also absent were 1998 winners and five-time U.S. champions Eldredge – who attended as a fan, not a participant, as his year's hiatus from the eligible ranks continues - and dance pair Elizabeth Punsalan and Jerod Swallow, whose departure opened a free-for-all void in the ice dancing division.

## Championship Ladies

Make no mistake. Kwan of Torrance, Calif., did nothing to tarnish her image as figure skating's undisputed artist and unrivaled champion. But with the sport's closest followers -even some in the Kwan camp -squinting hard to locate her next challenger on the horizon, Nam's stunning emergence was eagerly welcomed.


Skating for the first time on the senior level out of the All Year FSC in Los Angeles after finishing fourth in the 1998 Juniors, Nam crashed the back of her head to the ice coming out of a triple flip attempt late in her short program. Clearly stunned, Nam looked for a moment like she wouldn't continue, holding her hand to her head, before rushing back into her program which ended in a blur of spins to roaring applause from the audience.

"I wanted to show the judges I was tough, and I could go on," said Nam, who was treated for a strained neck."

Her courage and composure was rewarded with artistic presentation marks ranging from 5.4 to 5.7, good for fourth place after the short behind Kwan, fellow 13-year-old phenom Sarah Hughes of Great Neck, N.Y., and a rejuvenated and refocused Amber Corwin of Hermosa Beach, Calif.

Crediting her work with a performance specialist for an improved mental approach, Corwin reeled off one of the best performances of her career in the ladies short program, which featured several strong performances throughout the field.

Jumping jack Hughes managed to edge Corwin for second with her clean short program, showing her victory at last year's U.S. Juniors and a silver





medal at this year's World Junior Championships were deserved. More importantly, Hughes had the pleasure and extra motivation of skating in front of her mother, Amy, who was unable to see in person her daughter's junior title victory in Philadelphia because she was in the midst of an intense series of treatments to battle breast cancer, which doctors now believe to be in remission.

All had to make room at the top for Kwan, who recorded the only perfect

6.0 of the week with her mesmerizing "Fate of Carmen" short program performance. It was clear that Kwan was "not here for casual play," as promised by coach Frank Carroll.

The bright national television lights of ABC coupled with the daunting task of chasing Kwan pressurized the free skate. Corwin slipped to sixth overall, seventh in the free skate. Hughes fell on her opening jump, recovered quickly to land her triple loop-triple loop, but still slid to pewter position in





fourth overall with her fifth-place free skate.

Meanwhile, Angela Nikodinov of San Pedro, Calif., secured a place on the U.S. World Championships team by rebounding from a sixthplace standing after the short program to finish third. Nikodinov received a pep talk phone call from friend Lipinski before the free skate.

"It was along the lines of, 'Come on, you've got to go out there and fight!'," Nikodinov said.
"That's the way Tara skated and she told me that's the way I needed to approach it. I guess it worked."


While Lipinski was giving pep talks, Nam was giving the judges a near flawless performance, but it was the subtle lack of difficulty in her program, at least compared to Kwan's, which restricted


her from the highest marks. Nam did not attempt a triple Lutz or any tripletriple combination.

Still, Nam's energy, precise footwork and especially her trademark spins, including one which ends in the Biellmann position, with one leg stretched behind and above her head, earned her a well-deserved silver medal and a standing ovation. Nam completed four clean triples, including the triple flip she fell on in the short.

"I wanted to stay out there and enjoy the moment," Nam said. "I wished I could stop time and freeze."

Continually improving her long program to "Ariane," Kwan added a






Weiss: "It feels great to be the champion of the United States."

triple-triple combination, which she landed, and the "Charlotte Spiral," a move invented by German Charlotte Oelschlagel nearly 80 years ago and performed by legend Sonja Henie in the 1930s.

A quick slip and fall on her triple Lutz late in her program erased any possibilities of Kwan repeating her 6.0-fest from Philadelphia a year ago, but hardly diminished the overall impression of the program, which included six triples and was rewarded with judges marks of 5.8s and 5.9s.

"It was one of those performances where I just let it go," Kwan, 18, said. "At the end, one thought did come to me. I said, 'Oh my goodness, in a cou-



ple of years, this will be the 2002 Olympics.'


And now many have reason to believe it will be Nam who will be step-for-step chasing Kwan on the long road back to Salt Lake City. While Nam has made a quantum leap already to join Kwan on the podium, she and her coach, John Nicks, know the youngster has a ways to go.

"There's an enormous gap (between Kwan and Nam)," Nicks said. "To start, there's a five-year gap. Secondly, Michelle is unassailable in the area of elegance and interpretive skating. Hopefully in the next few years, Naomi will be able to challenge her."

Kwan left Salt Lake City with her third U.S. Championship and looking as strong as ever as the favorite to return in three years. But she also left with a little more reason to look over her shoulder.

### Championship Men

To say this has been a memorable season for Weiss is obviously a monumental understatement. Besides welcoming the birth of a baby daughter, the 22-year-old Fairfax, Va., native has been waiting -- not always patiently --



for his chance to shine on the national and world scene. That time has come and Weiss has seized the moment in typical fashion.

He arrived in Salt Lake City clearly eager to play the favorite's role. Two years of nipping at Eldredge's heels, but always landing a podium step below him, will do that to a guy.

"I've been sitting behind Todd for the last couple of years, kind of watching and learning," Weiss said. "So hopefully, I'm ready to step in and fill his place."

Weiss' short program will never be confused with an Eldredge number. Skating in leather pants to a medley of Van Halen, Weiss rocked and rolled through his program. His opening triple Axel was a bit tilted in the air, but he muscled through the landing. He added a triple flip-triple toe loop combination and only a slip during his footwork sequence tarnished the program.

He was rewarded with first-place marks (5.6-5.8 required elements, 5.7-5.8 presentation), from all nine judges. Weiss had confirmed himself as the man to beat to the beat of a very different drummer.

"I think the judges are more receptive to skaters who really enjoy the music of their performance," Weiss said. "If it's Van Halen, great. If it's Madame Butterfly, great. I've gone from Van Halen to Beethoven to Santana. I like to mix it up."

After Weiss, the men's competition was billed as a free-for-all and it played out that way. Emerging from the pack with strong short programs were Timothy Goebel of Rolling Meadows, Ill., and Trifun Zivanovic of Los Angeles.

Zivanovic, whose highest previous finish at Nationals was seventh in 1997 (he withdrew in 1998), said his focus was on improving his presentation mark, thanks to some "constructive criticism" relayed to Zivanovic from former Olympic champion and ABC commentator Dick Button.

"I took it to heart," Zivanovic said. "I really respect what Dick Button says. He obviously knows what he's talking about. That's what I

Skating to "The Rocketeer," Zivanovic reached fans in every corner of the Delta Center while opening with triple flip-double toe loop and landing his triple Axel. While a bit erratic. Zivanovic's second mark generally matched or bettered his required elements marks (5.3 to 5.7) and a memorable week was launched. "I feel like I have more experience this year, and much more to offer in this competition," Zivanovic said. "This is my best chance yet to succeed." Skating immediately after Zivanovic, Goebel hardly let the excitement die down before launching into his program, which was a touch cleaner and more difficult. Goebel, the first and only U.S. skater to land a clean quadruple jump in competition, earned 5.5 to 5.7 marks, good enough for second behind Weiss

Predictably, the free skate, with the added pressure and more technical difficulty crammed into everyone's program, featured a few too many slips. Of the leaders, only Zivanovic made it through his program relatively

and narrowly ahead of Zivanovic.

unscathed.

Skating to a more conventional musical choice from the "Mulan" soundtrack, Weiss seemed to leave just the slightest opportunity for those trailing him when he fell on his quad attempt. But the champion-to-be recovered quickly to land seven triples, although he did have a slight slip during his final camel spin.




as perfection eluded the rest of

the field.

Performing to "West Side Story" which seemed to suit the edgy, serious style of the ex-hockey player, Zivanovic ripped through eight triples (but no quad attempt) in his program.

Elated, Zivanovic responded to the standing ovation with first pumps and blowing kisses to the crowd, which included Zivanovic's mother, Glenda.





The cheers turned sour when Zivanovic's scores of 5.5s to 5.7s for technical merit were flashed. He did earn one 5.9, but mostly 5.7s for presentation. "When I got off the ice, I didn't care what place I got, it felt so good to skate that way," Zivanovic said. "It's a dream come true."

That left Goebel, second after the short program, in the unenviable position of trying to chase down a leader who seemed out of reach while attempting to hold off Zivanovic, who had just brought the house down. Goebel decided to hold nothing back.

Unfortunately, Goebel fell on his opening triple Axel and missed the quadruple Salchow. First place was gone (and probably second) and suddenly Goebel had to be concerned about holding onto third, considering Matthew Savoie, fourth after the short, had opened the final free skate group with a clean and secure program which included two triple Axels, one in combination.

Goebel rebounded to land his next triple Axel and final three triples to nip Savoie by a 5-4 decision by the judges. By that narrow margin, Goebel held onto third and won a berth on the U.S. World Team.

"I just squeaked into the third spot this year," Goebel acknowledged. "I wasn't pleased with my long program. I'm not used to falling twice in a competitive program."

Weiss could finally enjoy his long awaited first national title and in the process became what is believed to be the first parent to win a U.S. title since the 1940s. With baby Annie Mae hugged to his chest, nestled under his new gold medal, Weiss led the parade of men's medalists around the ice.

"Winning feels good, it definitely

does," Weiss said. "It's an incredibly prestigious title to hold, and being close to it the last couple of years, it feels great to be the champion of the United States."

### Championship Pairs

With pairs skating in the U.S. in a state of transition, the hope was the 1999 U.S. Championships would provide some order. Instead an upset victory by Danielle and Steve Hartsell of Westland, Mich., created only more surprises for the division.

Kyoko Ina of Guttenberg, N.J., and John Zimmerman of Birmingham, Ala., a new team this year, arrived as favorites based on a successful international debut season which landed the pair in the ISU Grand Prix Final.

But instead of capitalizing on their role as favorites, Ina and Zimmerman struggled through their "Don Quixote" short program and found themselves chasing the Hartsells right from the start. Ina, who won the last two U.S. Championships with Jason Dungjen as her partner, blamed the duo's bobbles on "first nationals jitters."

"Our spins were really off," Ina said.
"A new team like us, we have to keep going. ... There can't be any second guessing."

"We're still growing as a team," said Zimmerman, who won a U.S. bronze medal in 1997 while skating with Stephanie Stiegler. "From my perspective, I'm in a different area now than I was two years ago. I wasn't geared to win then and now we're in position to do things like that. I'm just trying to

keep calm, cool and collected."

Meanwhile, the more experienced team (at least together) of Hartsell and Hartsell seized the opening left them by Ina and Zimmerman with one of their strongest and most complete short programs ever. They earned first-place marks from six of the nine judges; three favored Ina and Zimmerman.

Laura Handy and Paul Binnebose of Newark, Del., the 1998 World Junior silver medalists, edged Tiffany and Johnnie Stiegler of Manhattan Beach, Calif., for third place after the short.


"This is a big shock (to be winning)," Danielle Hartsell said. "We're just looking to be on the world team." Added Steve: "If we end up winning the long program, that will only make it sweeter."

It has been a steady rise for the Hartsells since they won the 1995 U.S. Juniors title: eighth in 1996, fifth in 1997 and third in 1998. Now in 1999, they found themselves in position to win their first national title on the senior level, helped in part by the addition of Dungjen to their coaching team.

Following a smooth and mostly clean, but not overly difficult, free skate from Handy and Binnebose which would earn that pair a bronze medal and a berth on the U.S. World Team, Ina and Zimmerman skated before the Hartsells but failed to properly pressure the frontrunners.

After hitting their side-by-side triple toes, the two became tangled coming out of their split triple twist and both fell, leaving their chance at winning there on the ice. "We never, ever miss the twist," Ina said. "I think that threw us off. We didn't know what to do. We just looked at each other and ..."

And the door was open for the Hartsells, who didn't even need to skate their best to win. They were the only pair to perform a flawless split triple twist, which they followed with triple toe loops and their trademark "heart attack lift" where Steve hoists his sister upside down behind his back while she reaches behind her back to hold onto his legs.

The marks confirmed what the audience saw: the Hartsells were the best pair during these nationals. This time, all nine judges agreed.

"It wasn't our best skate ever," Steve said, "but we hung in there and fought and ended up on top. I'm happy with the way we performed."

## Championship Dance

If the pairs division was in transition, then ice dancing was definitely in a state of rebuilding. Gone were fivetime U.S. champions Elizabeth Punsalan and Jerod Swallow to retire ment and 1998 silver medalists Charles Butler and Jessica Joseph, who split as a team prior to the 1998-99 season

Naomi Lang and Peter Tchernyshev of the Detroit FSC, the 1998 U.S. bronze medalists, did return as the 1999 favorites. Also returning from a year ago were Eve Chalom and Mathew Gates, although the couple made an offseason move from Detroit to the Lone Star FSC in Plano, Texas.

They didn't have a lot of company. The field included only eight teams, the smallest at the national level since 1971 and six fewer than last year's pre-Olympic 14 entrants.

"After the Olympics, that happens a lot," Lang said. "Couples drop out. They don't want to make the commitment for another four years."

Lang and Tchernyshev look to only be picking up speed in this their third season together as they work towards the next quadrennium and a return (*Continued on page 70*)




he future looks very bright for the junior skating stars that medaled at the 1999 State Farm U.S. Figure Skating Championships at the Delta Center in Salt Lake City. Look for some of these skaters to return to Salt Lake City for the 2002 Olympic Winter Games.

## Junior Ladies

All of the top junior ladies moved up this year as Novice medalists and are considering jumping to the senior level next season. Sarah Wheat of the University of Delaware FSC adjusted to the new level best, winning the 1999 Junior ladies championship.

She previously placed fourth at the 1998 Novice and is coached by Jeff DiGregorio, who describes her as a very hard worker and someone who loves to skate. She landed a triple flip-double toe combination in her classical short program and this was the first season she worked with a choreographer. Her freeskating program included a triple flip-double toe combination, and a triple toe-double toe-double loop combination, but she won on her artistic presentation scores.










"I knew I had a chance to win. I just had to keep my head on straight. Jeff told me my artistry was better this year," she said. They removed her triple Lutz from her freeskating program, but she did not need it to win.

Sasha Cohen of the Orange County FSC moved up from 1998 Novice sixth place to Junior ladies silver medalist. Coached by John Nicks, she led after the short program but finished second overall.

This former gymnast's program included the Charlotte spiral (created by and named for Charlotte Oelschlage), and a triple flip-double toe combination. In her freeskating program, she fell out of her triple Salchow. According to Nicks, she already does much of her own choreography at the young age of 14.

"I love to skate," Cohen said. "It is so rewarding to get a new jump or land a difficult one."


Jennifer Kirk of the SC of Boston trains with Evy and Mary Scotvold. She finished in third place with the highest technical marks and was the 1998 Novice ladies bronze medalist. She popped her triple Lutz into a single in the free skate but landed seven triples. Her artistic marks held her back but as she increases her ice coverage, choreography and spin development, those marks should go up, too.

"I thought I skated well but you cannot control what the judges do (for marks.). I am just happy that I skated well," said Kirk.

Elizabeth Kwon of the SC of Northern Virginia and the 1998 Novice ladies champion earned the pewter medal. She trains in Fairfax, Va., with Audrey Weisiger and Nick Purma. Brian Wright choreographed her programs.

## Junior Men

Three of the top junior medal winners emerged after being 1998 Novice men medalists. Ryan Bradley of the Broadmoor SC won both programs that were choreographed by Nathan Birch. He landed a strong triple Lutztriple toe in his short but fell on his triple loop. He landed seven triples in his George Cohen freeskating medley



but stepped out of the triple Lutz.

"Next year I hope to improve and come back with more ammunition like the triple Axel," said Bradley, who won the 1998 Novice men's silver medal and trains with Tom Zakrajsek.

Don Baldwin of the Los Angeles FSC won the silver. He is coached by his parents, John and Donna Baldwin, and has skated at the junior level since 1995 with his previous best finish as fifth. He was fourth after the short when he put his hand down on the triple loop, but landed his triple flipdouble toe combination.

Baldwin pulled up to second place with his Russ Witherby choreographed

program "Zampa," which was music Baldwin's father had used for the 1972 season. "I do plan to move on next year," he said.

Parker Pennington of the Winterhurst FSC won bronze and was only one of two skaters to attempt a triple Axel in junior men's freeskating. He is the 1998 Novice men's champion and trains under the tutelage of Carol Heiss Jenkins. Pennington stepped out of his triple Lutz in the short program and landed five triples in his freeskating program to "Connecticut Yankee in King Arthur's Court."

Johnny Weir of the University of Delaware FSC earned the 1999 pewter medal and was the 1998 Novice men's bronze medalist. Weir fell on the triple Lutz in his short program for seventh but pulled up in his freeskating program to third and fourth overall. He trains in Newark, Dela., with Priscilla Hill. Braden Overett of the Denver FSC was third in the short program but dropped out of medal contention after skating his freeskating program with strep throat and the flu.

## Junior Pairs

Brother-sister team Sima and Amir Ganaba of the Los Angeles FSC dominated the pair's competition, winning both programs. This team made a quantum leap from their fifth place 1998 Novice pairs finish, skating with maturity and impressive lifts.

"I trust my brother. He's never dropped me and I have the most fun being upside down out there," said Sima. "It is my job out there to look after her," added Amir.

They currently train at Lake Arrowhead with Peter Oppegard. Their clean short program to "Two Guitars" had good speed and presentation. This event final turned into the battle of the "Mask of Zorro" programs with the Ganabas skating right before Jaisa MacAdam and Garret

Lucash, but the Ganabas won all nine judges for the free skate.

Last year's Junior silver medalists, MacAdam of the SC of Boston and Lucash of the Charter Oak FSC, were third for their jazzy short program after a slip during their side by side spins. They pulled up to second for the free skate to finish second overall with a nice throw triple Salchow. MacAdam is recovering from a leg injury and Lucash competed with the flu.

"We met our goal to medal again and we did feel more pressure this year. We will decide about moving up in April," said Lucash.

Another brother-sister team of Megan and Dustin Sierk of the Huntsville FSC earned the bronze. They were impressive with their pair element unison and speed. This team was second in the short program ("Rockin' Gypsies") after she put a hand down on the double loop. They finished third overall when she popped her double Lutz and the team had an awkward catch on their triple twist. They train in Huntsville, Ala., with Editha and Jim Bowser.

"Our goal is to increase our technical difficulty on the side by side triples and throws and use this as a stepping stone for next year," Dustin Sierk said.

The fourth place pewter medal was earned by Katie Gadkowski and Derek Trent of the Broadmoor SC after problems on both throw jumps in the free skate. They previously placed fourth for the 1998 Novice pairs and train with Kathy Casey.

## Junior ance

Jamie Silverstein and Justin Pekarek of the Detroit SC are the current 1999 World Junior champions and added the National Junior dance crown to their collection. They were the 1998 Junior silver medalists.

It was unusual to see scores of 5.9 at

the junior level but this team earned two for their free dance and one for their original dance.

"We are trying to express more mature deeper emotions in our skating this year," said Silverstein. The judges agreed that they succeeded by giving them first place ordinals from all nine judges in all 4 aspects of the dance

event including this year's compulsories of the Quick Step and the Viennese Waltz.

"They surpassed my expectations for them this year. I am not sure yet if they will move up next year," said their coach, Igor Shpilband. Their free dance was to music from "Secret Garden" and "Rondo Veniciano" while their original dance to music from a Russian film, "Drama on the Hunting.' "We are looking more toward the future in skating -- not just as juniors. Junior Worlds was a stepping stone for us," Pekarek said. Emilie Nussear and Brandon Forsyth of the Charter Oaks SC are a new team which trains



# Stellato, Lysacek Skate to U.S. Forefront

Newcomers Deanna Stellato and Evan Lysacek burst onto the national scene with polished performances to win 1999 U.S. Novice titles

ften in the past, Novice events have been held in dingy, out-of-the-way rinks but this year they were in Salt Lake City's beautiful, 10,000-seat E-Center, which is tentatively scheduled as the site for the 2002 Olympic Winter Games ice hockey events.

## Novice Ladies

The talk of these championships was Deanna Stellato, a 15-year-old from Glenview, Ill., who trains with Cindy Caprel at the Wagon Wheel FSC. Stellato dazzled the judges with a triple Lutz to double toe loop in her short program. This is such a difficult combination of jumps the top level seniors choose it to demonstrate their ability, and none of the other 11 novice entries attempted it.

To show it was not a fluke, Stellato repeated the combination successfully when she presented her short program at the event-closing Chevrolet Skating Spectacular exhibition.

In the free skate, Stellato accomplished the triple Lutz but without the double toe. Stellato mastered the triple Lutz two years ago. It ensured her technical content was on a level well beyond her rivals. Her presentation was also superior. The routine was gracefully choreographed to a piano





concerto and the classic "Ave Maria."

Eight out of the nine judges awarded Stellato first place for her short. The decision in the long was unanimous. It was all three medal winners' first trip to Nationals. Caprel said Stellato had been kept back because of injuries and their goal is "to skate smart and stay injury free."

Second in both sections was Andrey Rose Chua, a 12-year-old who represents the North Hills FSC which is located in that California town. She is taught by Bobby Beauchamp, a 1986 senior level competitor, who was delighted to be making his first trip to Nationals as a coach.

The decision between Chua and Beatrisa Liang, both of whom accomplished the triple Salchow to double toe loop for their combination in the short, was very close. The gap was more pronounced in the long but Liang's bronze medal, seven weeks before her 11th birthday, is extremely impresLiang is trained by past U.S. champion Tiffany Chin, who has fond memories of Salt Lake City since it was where she won a place on the Olympic team when Nationals were held there in 1984. Chin says she pushes the 4-foot-2 Liang, who represents the Tri Valley FSC in Simi Valley, constantly to produce greater speed over the ice. "She would get judged down because she's still too small if she didn't have the power and flow. That's what we're always working on

to compensate for her size,"

Chin explained.

## Novice Men

Six competitors who competed in the 1998 Novice Men's championship returned this year, but their thunder was stolen by Evan Lysacek who advanced from second after the short to win the long and the gold medal.

All three medal winners were plagued by injuries prior to the event. Lysacek, a 13-year-old from Naperville, Ill., who represents the DuPage FSC and is trained by Debbie Stoery, incurred a concussion in practice three weeks before Nationals. He lost training time but a MRI and CAT scan cleared the way for his return to the ice.

Performing his free skate to Tchaikovsky's Romeo and Juliet overture, Lysacek executed an excellent variety of moves including a triple Salchow, a very nice combination of walleys both ways into a triple toe loop, a triple toe-half loop-double Salchow, and a closing hydroblading move.

"I just wanted to show I belonged here," said Lysacek. "Last year, I was only fifth at sectionals. I wanted a lot more than that this year."

Nicholas LaRoche, who was given a bye into this event because of a sprained ankle and struggled with back spasms after an accident the week before Nationals, won the short by a unanimous decision. However, the 15-year-old from Gardner, Mass., who represents the Colonial FSC, was ranked only fourth in the free skate and dropped to second overall. LaRoche had been fourth last year.

Because he had tendonitis in both legs, Bradford Griffies, a 16-year-who represents the Atlanta FSC, also received a bye to Nationals. Griffies soared up from seventh after the short to take second place in the long, and third overall.

Griffies said that competing can be very stressful: "(After the short) I was just terrified. Last year after the short I was also seventh and dropped to 10th overall. My coach, Don Laws, tells me to be agressive, but this isn't a life or death matter."

## Novice Pairs

The result of the pairs competition could not have been closer. Terese Anselmi, 13, and Michael Adler, 17, from the Detroit SC won the short pro-

sive.

gram section in a very tight decision over Colette Appel, who represents the Charter Oak FSC, and Adam Kaplan of the Warwick FSC. Both pairs were tied in the free skate so the standings for the short determined the overall result.

In the short, four of the nine judges gave their first place vote to Appel and Kaplan, who are trained by Bob Young in Simsbury, and only two thought Anselmi and Adler best. The other two judges gave their first places to the pairs who took third and fourth in this section.

Since four is not a majority when the field has nine judges, the accountants took into consideration votes for second place. The decision went to Anselmi and Adler because four judges thought they were second best, giving them six votes of second or better. Only one judge thought Appel and Kaplan second best, so their total was only five votes of second or better.


Anselmi, whose parents were roller skating national champions, and Adler did not get out of Sectionals last year and said there had been under considerable pressure. Adler, brimming over with joy, said, "We worked hard the whole year for this. I don't think I could have asked for anything more."


Amanda Ross and Michael McPherson of the Detroit SC overtook Anna Campos of the Columbia FSC and Ronnie Biancosino of the University of Delaware FSC to gain the bronze medals.

## Novice Dance

After the two compulsories, two couples were tied for the lead, and two couples were tied for third place, ensuring a very exciting climax for this championship.

Brother and sister Kakani and Ikaika Young, representing the Seattle SC, won the first compulsory, the Tango, with Lydia Manon and Chris Obzansky, skating for the University of Delaware FSC second of the 12 couples. In the second compulsory, the Blues, that standing was reversed, producing a tie going into the free dance.





A similar situation occurred with Lia Nitake of the All Year FSC and Ryan O'Meara of the Coyotes SC of Arizona taking third place in the Tango with Allison Seitchik of the University of Delaware FSC and Ross Brown of the Hickory Hill FSC fourth, and the judges reversing that decision in the Blues.

However the results of the free were clear cut with the Youngs winning gold, Manon and Obzansky silver and Nitake and O'Meara, who gave a dramatic tango free, won the bronze.

The Youngs, who presented a Siamese-themed free dance, were born in Honolulu but now live in Oregon City, Oregon. Their names are Hawaian. Ikaika means "strong and powerful - totally awesome dude," joked the 16-year-old young man. He said his 15-year-old sister's name means "melodious sound, but it can also mean a loud one."

Manon and Obzansky chose a gypsy theme. Obzansky explained, "Lydia's a poor gypsy and I take her away to the circus. It took a long time to get the character but we wanted to do something that is just ourselves."



## Farewell, Figures Traditional figures are hold for the final time at the

Traditional figures are held for the final time at the 1999 State Farm U.S. Figure Skating Championships

he image of judges hunched over the ice examining edge tracings will never be seen again at the U.S. Championships. No longer will you see athletes carrying around their scribes in cases resembling musical instruments. And the beautiful artistry of an athlete tracing a "Figure Eight" is history.

The reason? Figures, once a vital component in a figure skating competition, became nothing more than a memory on Feb. 10, 1999, at the 1999 U.S. Championships in Salt Lake City, Utah.

The final figures competition was completed in its typical understated fashion, with skaters placing roses amid the ice tracings as the discipline took its place in the history of figure skating. As a matter of record, the final competi-



#### World Championships Kwan and Company Take on the World

Two-time World Champion Michelle Kwan leads the 1999 U.S. World Figure Skating Team Text by Bob Dunlop

Two-time world figure skating champion Michelle Kwan of Torrance, Calif., fresh off winning her third U.S. ladies figure skating title, will lead the U.S. World Team at the 1999 World Figure Skating Championships in Helsinki, Finland, March 21-28. The U.S. team will consist of three entries in the ladies, men's and pairs competition and two entries in ice dancing.

The USFSA International Committee selected the U.S. World Team following the completion of the 1999 State Farm U.S. Figure Skating Championships in Salt Lake City, Feb. 7-14. The announcement was made by USFSA International Committee Chairperson Carolyn Kruse of Colorado Springs, Colo.

Joining Kwan in the ladies' competition will be 1999 U.S. bronze medalist Angela Nikodinov of San Pedro, Calif., and 1999 World Junior silver medalist Sarah Hughes of Great Neck, N.Y. Both Nikodinov and Hughes will be making their debut at the World Championships. Hughes placed fourth in the 1999 U.S. Championships.

1999 U.S. silver medalist Naomi Nari Nam of Irvine, Calif., is ineligible to represent the U.S. at the World Championships due to an age restriction at ISU Championships. Competitors must have reached the age of 15 by July 1 of the preceding year or be a current World Junior medalist to be eligible for World Championship competition.

Michael Weiss of Fairfax, Va., captured his first U.S. title this season and will lead the U.S. men in Helsinki. Weiss, who placed sixth in the 1998 World Championships, is having a strong season with silver medal performances at Skate America and Trophee Lalique to qualify for the ISU Grand Prix Final in St. Petersburg, Russia, March 4-7.

Joining Weiss in the men's competition is 1999 U.S. silver medalist Trifun Zivanovic of Los Angeles, Calif., and

bronze medalist Timothy Goebel of Rolling Meadows, Ill. Zivanovic and Goebel will be competing in the World Championships for the first time. Goebel, the 1997 World Junior silver medalist, is the first U.S. skater ever to land a quadruple jump in competition.

Danielle and Steve Hartsell of Westland, Mich., captured their first U.S. pairs title at the 1999 U.S. Championships to earn their first spot on the U.S. World Team.

Joining the Hartsells are 1999 U.S. silver medalists Kyoko Ina of Guttenberg, N.J., and John Zimmerman of Birmingham, Ala., and bronze medalists medalists Laura Handy and Paul Binnebose of Newark,

Ina and Zimmerman are competing in their first World Championships together after training together for only seven months. Ina has previously competed at the World-level with Jason Dungjen, having placed fourth in the 1997 World Championships. Zimmerman previously skated with Stephanie Stiegler, placing 15th in the 1997 World Championships.

Handy and Binnebose, the reigning World Junior silver medalists, are making their first appearance in the World Championships.

In ice dancing, 1999 U.S. champions Naomi Lang of Allegan, Mich., and Peter Tchernyshev of Waterford, Mich., along with silver medalists Eve Chalom and Mathew Gates, of the Lone Star Figure Skating Club, will represent the U.S. at the World Championships.

Lang and Tchernyshev, who represent the Detroit Skating Club, will be competing in their first World Championships. Chalom and Gates, who train in Plano, Texas, will be competing in their second World Championships after placing 17th in 1997.

# Luropean Championships

Russians rule again as they take their domestic skating battles to the international stage at the 1999 European Championships

t some moments, the 1999 European Championships in Prague, Czech Republic, could have passed for just another Russian Nationals.

Russia's established stars and various newcomers won nine out of 12 medals. Their overwhelming success included a first-ever medal sweep in the ladies' event and also another sweep in the men's event.

#### Ladies

For years, Russian ladies skating wasn't exactly a highlight. No Russian woman won an European title before 1996, when Irina Slutskaya broke through. Since, non-Russians haven't had a chance.

Slutskaya won again in 1997 before Maria Butyrskaya took the crown from her in 1998. The 26-year-old from Moscow set a personal record for herself



in Prague -- she won every single vote from every judge in both the short and free skate programs.

Butyrskaya is skating better than ever and clearly outclassed the next generation of teenagers. Her short, featuring a triple Lutz, was impressive. She did seven triples and only two footed the second loop in the free skate. Her style and expression remain unmatched.

Yulia Soldatova, 17, won her qualfying round and had a strong short program with a triple Lutz and triple flip. She was third in the short before pulling up to win the silver overall. Soldatova,

who, like Butyrskaya, is trained by Elena Tchaikovskaya, fell on the toe in her opening triple Salchowtriple toe combination but recovered quickly to reel off five clean triples.

Viktoria Voltchkova, weakened by a flu she suffered from earlier in the week, delivered a clean and difficult short. The first two minutes of her free, set to "Gone with the Wind," were very strong with

triple loop, triple Lutz-double toe, triple flip and triple toe.

The jumps of the 16-year-old student of Viktor Kudriavtsev are unusual in that they are incredibly high. However, eventually Voltchkova's legs gave way, and she stumbled on some triples, fell on a single Axel and lost all her speed. She believed that the flu affected her performance.


Tanja Szewczenko from Germany withdrew due to a hip injury prior to the short program.

#### Men

The question was not who would win Europeans, but which *Russian* man would win. Although Alexei Yagudin and Alexei Urmanov struggled in the qualifying, there still was a gap between them and the other competitors. Only Andreis Vlascenko seemed to have a real chance to jump on the podium, but he failed to because of his lack of consistency.

Yagudin defended his European title, but it was not easy. He was only

third in his qualifying round (behind Frenchman Laurent Tobel and Vlascenko from Germany) with a weak performance. "I don't know what happened", Yagudin said, shaking his head. He recovered in the short, and although his combination

Skating to "Lawrence of Arabia," Yagudin not only landed a quad toe, but also seven triples. Still, the choreography of this program is weaker compared to the short. But no one was able to beat him on this day in Prague.

Yevgeni Plushenko skated outstanding in the qualifying (including a quad toe), did well in the short but had trouble in the free skate. He started with a quad-triple toe and a triple Axel, but then he suddenly slipped going into the triple loop. "I hurt my back on the fall and not everything went as planned," he said later.

Actually it looked as if he was falling apart. He fell on the second triple Axel, doubled the lutz and seemed to have forgotten his choreography. But he pulled himself together to do triple lutz-triple toe, triple Salchow-step-triple loop

and a triple flip which saved him the silver medal.

Alexei Urmanov was last to skate of the top three. He opted for a triple flip instead of a quad toe which wasn't consistent in practice. His triple Axel-triple toe was shaky already, and then the 1994 Olympic Champion succumbed to his nerves and fell on the second axel, a jump he never seems to fall on in practice. Although he did a clean triple lutz and triple loop, he ran out of energy in the end and doubled the Salchow and the toe in his closing sequence. He dropped to third.

Crowd favorite Tobel returned to his 1997 free program "Pink Panther." The surprise winner of qualifying round A missed the triple Axel in the short

which knocked him out of competition for the medals.

He did better in the free, cheered on by the audience that enjoyed his performance uch, and finished

very much, and finished fifth overall.




Elena Berezhnaya and Anton Sikhuralidze delivered a clean short, although Sikhuralidze's triple toe was a bit shaky. Still, the couple from St. Petersburg took the lead

Petersburg took the lead with marks as high as 5.9.
"We enjoyed ourselves in

the short program. Many couples skated well," Sikhuralidze said. However, the next day he showed up at practice alone because Berezhnaya had caught the flu that was going around in Prague. When she had high temperature the morning of the free skating and wasn't able to practice again, the Russian team leader withdrew the Russian World Champions in the late afternoon. The door was wide open now for any of the other top teams, but the sudden oppor-

tunity proved to be nerve wracking for some of them.

Two-time European Bronze medalists Sarah Abitbol and Stephane



Krylova and Ovsiannikov Bernadis from France, second after the short, were gold medal contenders. In the free (to "Acropolis" by Yanni) the French looked tight, and Bernadis fell on the double Axel. It was enough to drop to third place. "I was tired, but this is no excuse," Bernadis said. He also was affected by the flu.

The Polish skaters Dorota Zagorska and Mariusz Siudek have been around for a long time, but a real breakthrough has escaped them so far. They had a good short, except for Zagorska's awkward toe, and they sat in fourth before the free. To Antonin Dvorzak's "New World Symphony," they pulled off one of their best performances seen in competition. Their program was full of energy and featured a clean triple toe, good throws (double Axel and triple Salchow) as well as excellent lifts. which are one of their strong points anyway. But they only risked a single Axel. They finished second in the long program and captured the silver medal. Both couldn't believe it at first. "I have waited so long for this moment," Siudek said with tears in his eyes.

Maria Petrova and Alexei Tikhonov from St. Petersburg teamed up only last summer. But success has come quickly to them - they qualified for the Grand Prix Final and were second at Russian Nationals. However, in the short program ("Dr. Zhivago"), Petrova fell on the triple throw Salchow, usually a solid element.

The Russians finished fifth in the short, skated in the final group, and seemed far away from the podium. But

they delivered a near perfect program to Vivaldi's "Four Seasons" with good side by side jumps, great throws (triple twist, Salchow and toe) as well as innovative lifts. They only had a problem going into the pair spin at the end, but did the element on the second try. They earned marks up to 5.8, won the long and won the gold. "It is a big surprise," Maria Petrova said. "We didn't think we could win," Tikhonov added. "Fortune smiled at us tonight."

#### Ice Dance

The ISU has applied a lot of changes to ice dancing: the judges are drawn shortly before the competition, there are new mandatory elements like spins, etc. At first sight, nothing seemed to change in ice dancing, but that wasn't the case here. Anzhelika Krylova and Oleg Ovsiannikov from Russia won, but in a split decision. They led clearly throughout the compulsories (Ravensburg Waltz and Argentine Tango) and the OD (Waltz from the Opera "La Traviata"), but their controversial drum rhythm free dance nearly cost them the gold medal (their first one at Europeans).

The Russians pointed out several times that they have gone in a completely new direction and that they have changed their style radically. However, this style just doesn't seem to suit them so well. Marina Anissina and Gwendal Peizerat, on the other hand, developed their emotional style and won over the audience. Their compulsories were solid, but their new waltz looked unpolished (but it has great potential).

However, nearly everyone thought the French deserved the gold medal. Their "Man in the Iron Mask" free dance was fantastic and brought the crowd in the nearly soldout arena to its feet. There was everything in it - flow and speed, difficult footwork and innovative lifts. Marina lifts her partner again in a new move. The French lost four to five with the judges, but they won in the eyes of the spectators. "To us and to the audience, we are the European Champions," Peizerat said.

Russia's Irina Lobatcheva and Ilia Averbukh deserved their bronze medal.





# Where do we start

That's the first of many questions facing a local organizing committee as it prepares to host a national campetition. Linda Aldrich (writer and committee member)

examines the Ann Arbor
Figure Skating Club's
preparation for staging
the 1999 Adult National
Figure Skating Championships.

The prospect of hosting a national competition for the first time can be both daunting and exciting for a club — even if the club has successfully hosted large events before.

For the Ann Arbor Figure
Skating Club, host of the 1999
Adult National Figure Skating
Championships (April 8-11,
1999), the first step was deciding —
almost a year in advance of the event
— to bid for the competition.

There was some initial trepidation among members of the club board of directors: who would be on the local organizing committee? Would the competition conflict with the club's own annual competition? Would there be sufficient volunteers in the club, or would people committed to the club competition and ice show be unwilling to volunteer again? Could Adult Nationals be sold as a "real" competition to club families who did

not have adult skaters?
With some of these questions still unanswered, the bid was submitted to and accepted by the USFSA. Club President Ann Dougherty predicted the competition "will put Ann Arbor on the map as a premiere venue for national competition."

The adult skaters in the club were delighted at the prospect of having "their" national competition at home. Debbie Farrick, two time bronze dance national champion (with partner Dave Gaultier) proclaimed "We love the support of the home club and the home crowd!"

The board of directors looked forward to the club recognition which would result from a successfully run event. The local organizing committee (LOC) coalesced around the adult skaters and board members who had

shown the most interest in hosting Adult Nationals.

Responsibilities were divided according to interest, expertise and connections: sponsorship, registration, lodging, officials, publicity, transportation and vendors. The completely new twist to this competition for local organizers was working directly with the USFSA, which supplied officials, announcers and music.

For example, the LOC had to decide who would handle entry applications, the club or the USFSA. The LOC decided to have entries sent to the USFSA and have them forward the entries to the club, as the USFSA could check skater eligibility more easily than could the club. The LOC also had to "personalize" a USFSA standardized entry form with dates, local accomodations and fees. As she considered the number of processed entries that would be coming her way, computer

systems engineer and registrar Deborah Burgoyne optimistically observed that "every adult skater can be reduced to fields and records and thus can be easily managed."

Soliciting potential competition logos for consideration was another task which had to be addressed early on. A logo would appear on sponsorship solicitations, the entry form and other official correspondance concerning the competition. From among the logos submitted by acquaintances of LOC members, two "keepers" emerged. The official logo was approved by the board members, who liked it so much that they asked to adopt it (in different colors) as the new club logo after Adult Nationals. The other logo was adopted as the competition mascot and was named "Cool Guy".

Some members of the LOC had attended previous Adult Nationals and shared their experiences. Their impressions were important in determining which facets of those competitions should be kept, modified or not included.

The fact that all competitors would be adults meant special consideration for the competitors' party and for the vendors at the event. A party theme and venue, as well as food and entertainment needed to be secured.

The LOC also wanted to include informational seminars, which are not commonly a feature of local and regional competitions. The LOC had to generate a list of potential seminar topics, then discuss the feasibility of presenting individual topics, including finding presentors and space for the seminars.

Committee members decided what, if any, travel expenses would be covered for individuals presenting seminars, including those presentors with additional products or services for sale. The value of knowledgable and well-travelled committee members became evident here, as some were able to report the procedures used at U.S. Nationals regarding travel expenses for persons turning a profit at the competition.

Budget and rink logistics also had to be considered early. Initial budget estimates were drawn from past competitions hosted by the club and additional expenses were estimated. The LOC determined which expenses would need to be covered before money from entry fees and vendor percentages became available. The club applied for, and received, a grant from the USFSA to cover some of the up-front expenses

After discussing local ordinances regarding fundraising through raffles or prize drawings, the LOC held a prize drawing for big-ticket donated items, including autographed skating books and Champions on Ice tickets. Since tickets for the prize drawing were available at a local competition, the LOC had to consider whether or not they would be able to ship items to any out-of-town winners. Unfortunately, publicity for and response to the drawing were inadequate to sell all the tickets, so the money raised fell short of expectations.

Further donated items, including tickets for the 2000 Nationals and Michelle Kwan autographed items, were held in reserve for a prize drawing to be held at Adult Nationals.

Ice availability and fees needed to be negotiated with the rink and permission obtained to run additional computer cable through the building, in order to accommodate registration and accounting computers.

The LOC considered how to make

competitors feel welcome at the rink. It was decided that the Cool Guy mascot could be enlarged and turned into signs pointing to dressing rooms, rinks and restrooms. The fitness center located in the rink offered to make inexpensive daily or competition-long passes available to competitors.

Competitors checking in at the rink would receive a goodie bag — an item of great interest to competitors. With a budget of just a few dollars for each bag, donated items, items bought in bulk and coupons all were given serious consideration. Skating members of the LOC gave their impressions of goodie bags past; with an eye on the bottom line. As Bill Papineau, database coordinator, observed, "Our main functions are to make sure that the expenses are covered and that everyone has a positive impression of the competition."

Vendors who provided items or services which would be of interest to adult skaters were contacted and their fees arranged. Judith Starks, vendor chairperson, used her contacts from prior competitions as a starting point. Well aware of the importance of her role in creating positive ambience, she hoped that all attending would "have a great time." The LOC attempted to strike a balance between vendors of national products and those local vendors who supported club competitions in the past.

Creating credentials, for whom, how much they should cost and additional uses (specifically, for admission to the competitors' party) arose from discussion of admission prices and the competitors' party. The LOC decided to create credentials for officials, competitors, coaches, full-time volunteers and one-day or one-shift volunteers. Chaperone credentials were voted down in favor of a nominal one day or all event spectator fee. Credentials would be used as admission to the competitors' party, for all but the one-day or one-shift volunteers.

The process of organizing a national competition was, and continues to be an exercise in cooperation, responsibility and flexibility.

Gerry Griggs, transportation chairperson noted, tongue firmly in cheek, that "considering the majority of the LOC are adult skaters, the process is running remarkably well." In order to provide a balanced point of view, Gordan Jurasek, music and announcer chairperson, also served as the committee's token non-skater.

The core committee did not grow beyond the chairpersons, (who, nonetheless, did not abandon their grand titles) despite the original plan that LOC members would head committees of volunteers. Although it made more work for everyone, it was relatively easy to keep lines of communication clear. Each facet of the competition had to be visited, then revisited several times, as new information became available.

By reviewing past Adult National competitions, the LOC was able to learn from history and to tailor their efforts accordingly. Starting a year ahead of time was important. As for any major event, tiny but important issues arose at every turn and sometimes out of nowhere!

Seven weeks before the event, LOC meetings were stepped up from twice a month, to once a week. Although ten-

sions rose predictably, officials' liaison Karen Hall found the process "a laugh a minute at the beginning, but even more so closer to the event!" This observation prompted Laura Maki, officials' liaison and head troubleshooter to ask "Are we having fun yet?!" and Paul Harvath, sponsorship coordinator, added "I tried to warn them, I really did!"

The committee has not seen the final results of their efforts, but are looking forward to giving competitors and spectators a good experience and, armed with new knowledge, to hosting future large events. Seminar coordinator, adult committee liaison and club veterinarian Michelle Harvath summed up her involvement in the LOC: "Being on the other side of the registration desk has been an eye-opening experience, and I highly recommend it to other competitors. I have a whole new appreciation for the people running the competitions."



## Snowflake Internationa

With no two teams exactly alike, the 1999 Snowflake International features senior champions "black ice" of Canada.

It may have been a U.S. sweep at the opening novice level bout of the 1999 Citizens Bank Snowflake International Synchronized Skating Competition, but it was a solid gold Canadian and Finnish finish for the junior and senior title.

In the senior division, Canada's black ice and Les Pirouettes and Finland's Rockettes gave show-stopping performances. Black ice seized the gold; Les Pirouettes skated to second overall, and third place went to the Rockettes. America's own ninetime senior champs, the Haydenettes, captured fifth place despite a nearflawless program.

The junior division was commanding, too, with Canada's Stamford and Company taking first; Finland's Musketeers snagging second and their compatriots, Filiae Aboenses winning third. Warwick's Superettes skated a clean and fast fifth place.

A spirited capacity crowd watched the first night's contest at Warwick's Thayer Memorial Arena.

Nine novice teams, including the Ice

Mates, Team Braemar, Munchkins, Ice Liners, Team Esprit, Ice Images, Team Millenium, and Wallace Snowbirds represented the United States, while only one international team- Les Coccinelles, of Canada - competed.

Skating to the music of a 70s-era Broadway hit, "Mac and Mable," the Ice Mates of Lexington, Mass., captured a solid first-place finish. Coach Lynn Benson and assistant coach Deirdre Wilson were especially delighted with the team's performance so early in the season.

Team Braemar, one of two USFSA international teams competing, took home a souvenir with a second place finish. Coached by Toni Swiggum and Pam May, the team skated to a crowdpleasing "Lord of the Dance." The audience was thrilled with the performance of hometown favorites, the Munchkins, who took third after skating to their Team Cheerios "Team of the Year" and international-gold program. Nancy Rossi coaches that team, with assistant coaches Susan McGuirl and Kristine McKenzie.

trip to Salt Lake City.

Tchernyshev immigrated from Russia in 1993 and was ineligible to skate for the U.S. at the 1998 Olympic Winter Games had the couple finished above third last year. Tchernyshev, along with Gates, who is from Britain and bronze medalist Oleg Fediukov (Russia) all are in the process of gaining their U.S. citizenship and will be eligible to skate well before the next Olympic deadline of 2002.

Which begs the question, where have all the U.S. male ice dancers gone?

"In ice dancing, and in pairs, it's very difficult to find a good partner," Lang said. "It's not like we rushed overseas to find partners. We had tryouts and the best men were not Americans."

Tchernyshev added, "It will take time. You know, over there they have been together for many, many years."

Lang and Tchernyshev won their first U.S. title fairly easily, leading from the first compulsory dance through their free dance to "Adios Nonini." The couple was awarded first-place marks by every judge for every dance except for one single mark in the original dance which went to silver medalists Chalom and Gates.

Their dominance made them feel like worthy champions following Punsalan and Swallow.

"Those are some big shoes to fill," said Lang. "Hopefully, we can do something like they did. They had some very good accomplishments. Hopefully we will, too."

Gates battled a bout with pneumonia late in the week, but he and Chalom were still able to fend off bronze medalists Fediukov and partner Deborah Koegel to earn a U.S. World Team berth.

novice pair competitor. Forsyth made his fifth trip to Nationals but did not compete last year. He was 1997 U.S. Junior silver medalist with previous partner Kerrie O'Donnell.

Crystal Beckerdite and Matthew Healy of the Broadmoor SC are another new team, skating together since May 1998. They are coached by Patti Gottwein and Tom Dixon. They pulled up for the bronze medal from fourth place with their free dance, which includes three music selections:

"Temptations," "Besame Mucho" and "Brazil." Beckerdite was third at 1998 Nationals with previous partner Raphael Kelling.

"It was pretty incredible working with Christopher Dean on our compulsories," said Healy. "We will be moving up to senior next year. I miss the junior age deadline by two weeks," added Beckerdite.

Alison Newman and Michel Klus of the New England FSC advanced to the pewter medal after a fifth-place 1998 finish in juniors. They were in third place for compulsories and original dance ("Dance Macabre"), but dropped to fourth overall.
