Get Ready for Electronic Regional Entries Through the USFSA Web Site

USFSA members will soon be able to do much of their work online! Registering through www.usfsa.org for such things as the regional competitions, and using the web site to report test results and membership will streamline and speed up the workflow.

A new system of electronic processing for qualifying competition entries, membership registrations, Basic Skills registrations, and test registrations will be unveiled at Governing Council 2001 in Las Vegas during the May 10 seminars.

This exciting technological development is intended to benefit the USFSA membership and streamline processes both at Headquarters and member clubs. This option will complement, *but not replace*, the existing paper system that is currently in place. You

must have an active e-mail address to take advantage of this new technology.

Qualifying Competition Entries

Competitions Committee chair Bill Fitzpatrick has announced that beginning with the 2001-2002 season, the USFSA will introduce a new method for entering the qualifying competitions. This electronic entry method will be available to all USFSA members wishing to enter Regionals.

Through this electronic system, you will be able to complete forms online and must still meet the deadline of Sept. 1, 2001. You can utilize your own personal computer and streamline the process of Regional entries.

The new process, which will be explained in greater detail in the future, is designed to be more convenient for you. It will also help the USFSA in processing entry information, thus allowing for quicker turnaround in terms of the vital number of entries that each Chief Referee and Local Organizing Committee needs.

Membership and Basic Skills Registrations

Membership Committee chair Shawn Rettstatt and Basic Skills Committee

chair Joyce Herron announce that with the 2001-2002 season, Club Membership Chairs and Basic Skills Skating Directors will be able to register their membership with the USFSA via electronic registration. This new system will allow for easy access to membership rosters for each club/skating school and will streamline the overall process.

At the Online Seminar in Las Vegas, you will have the opportunity to view the new system and ask questions.

Test Registrations

Tests Committee chair Honor Johnson has announced that test chairs will be able to establish their test sessions and report test results to USFSA Headquarters via electronic means. This is intended to streamline the organizational process by providing appropriate forms online and improving the ability to create the actual test forms. It will also provide such assistance with setting the panel of qualified judges.

Reporting of test results to USFSA Headquarters will be a part of the electronic process that should aid Headquarters in keeping the test information more current.

STAR Can Make Your Rink One of the Best

Do you skate in a STAR facility?

The rink business is changing and facilities around the country need to keep pace with the times. The U.S. Figure Skating Association and USA Hockey have joined forces to create Serving The American Rinks (STAR) to support the rink and arena industry. STAR offers education, training and resources to facilities around the United States.

In its first year of existence, STAR has offered three technical training programs and two management seminars to facility operators around the country. These programs increase the professionalism in the industry, while helping to ensure the

viability of arenas throughout the country. In only three months, STAR membership has grown to include over 70 facilities in more than 25 states.

STAR will bring rink professionals together to share their ideas and learn from each other's experiences. The rink industry is entering a new era of cooperation, and uniting the industry will benefit everyone, including figure skating and hockey programs. Skaters, players and parents can all help the industry by creating positive relationships with their local facilities.

Ask your rink managers if they manage a STAR facility. If not, let them know how to get involved.

USFSA Remembers the 1961 World Team

A memorial ceremony and dedication to mark the 40th anniversary of the loss of the 1961 U.S. World Figure Skating Team was held Sat., Feb. 10, in Berg-Kamphenhout, Belgium.

On Feb. 15, 1961, Sabena Flight 548, traveling from New York to Brussels, crashed in Berg-Kamphenhout, Belgium, claiming the lives of all 72 passengers on board. Included on the plane were the 18 members of the 1961 U.S. World Figure Skating Team and 16 of their friends, family and coaches en route to the 1961 World Figure Skating Championships in Prague, Czechoslovakia. In addition to the 72 victims on board, a young farmer was killed while working in the field of the crash site.

The ceremony featured the unveiling of a five-foot-high stone monument at the intersection of two narrow streets in Berg-Kamphenhout -- a small farming town located four miles northeast of

Brussels. Among those at the dedication were Jean Meeus, Mayor of Kampenhout; Jacques Waldeyer, Executive Vice President Flight Operations of Sabena; Susan Keogh, Chair, USFSA Memorial Fund; and Michael McKinley, Charge d'Affaires a.i., Embassy of the United States, Brussels, Belgium.

On Feb. 23, 1961, a memorial fund was established for the 18 U.S. athletes who lost their lives. The USFSA Executive Committee decided that the type of memorial fund that was needed was one that would be more than a monument, a sort of "living memorial" that would give something back to the skating community. Forty years later, the USFSA Memorial Fund continues to provide qualified USFSA skaters who are in need of financial aid with monetary assistance to pursue their goals both inside and outside the competitive arena.



Paul Binnebose's Holiday Show Appearance is an Inspiration

There was a surprise performer appearing in the December 17 holiday show at Ice Works in Aston, Pa. Making his first public skating appearance since his September 1999 near-fatal on-ice accident was former pair skater Paul Binnebose.

When announcer and coach Jimi Lewis introduced the young skater to the audience, he called Binnebose's appearance in the show "a second shot and a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity." After his performance, "there wasn't a dry eye in the stands," according to his friend and physical therapist, Deborah Kohn-Bono, who said she wouldn't have missed her young patient's debut. Binnebose's performance marked another phase in his remarkable recovery.

Also appearing in the show were

(among others) dancers Debbie Koegel and Oleg Fediukov, senior ladies competitor Tricia Mansfield, and 2001 U.S. silver medalists Tiffany Scott and Philip Dulebohn. Scott and Dulebohn replaced Binnebose and his former partner in the 1999-2000 Grand Prix Series.

In the audience enjoying Binnebose's performance was one of his role models, none other than Elvis Stojko. Stojko was unable to skate in the show because of injuries.

"It was great to be out there again," said the 22-year-old Binnebose. "When I heard the applause, I thought, 'yeah, that's for me.'"

Binnebose recently moved back to the East Coast from Texas to continue his training at Aston with Stojko's coach, Uschi Keszler. -- Michele Cooper

Godino Named To AAC Post

USFSA Board of Directors member and former Olympian Rachel Mayer Godino has been elected Chair of the USOC's Athletes' Advisory Council (AAC) for 2001-2004.

She succeeds Bill Stapleton, who was elected a United States Olympic Committee Vice Chair when the organization's Board of Directors met in December 2000.

Godino, who competed at the 1992 Olympic Winter Games in ice dancing, has been a member of the AAC since 1997 as figure skating's representative. She has served on the USOC Executive Committee and Board of Directors since 1999 and joined the Management Committee of the Salt Lake City Olympic Organizing Committee in 2000.

The AAC is composed of, and elected by, amateur athletes to ensure communication between the USOC and currently active athletes. The AAC also serves as a source of opinion and advice to the USOC Board of Directors with regard to both current and contemplated policies of the organization.

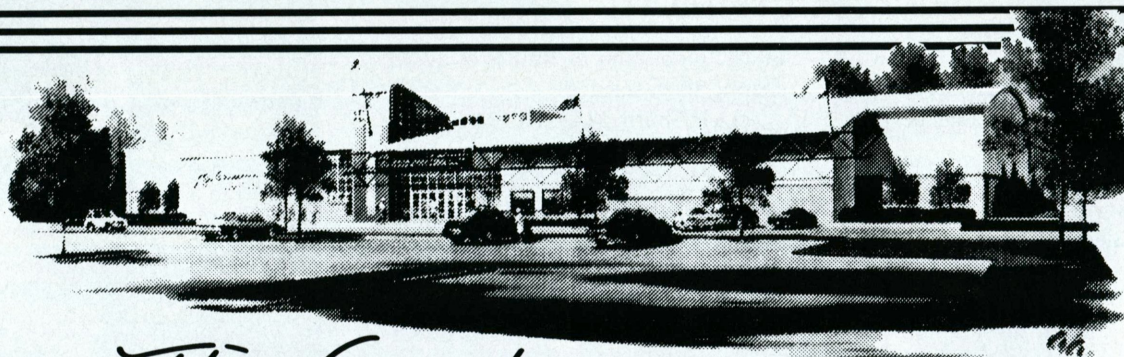

Figure Skating Will Be a Topic at Sports Medicine Seminar

Figure skating will be a hot topic at the American College of Sports Medicine's (ACSM) Annual Meeting, May 30-June 2, in Baltimore, Md.

Many knowledgeable sports medicine professionals will be involved in a presentation entitled "Figure Skating Science -- At the Dawn of the 21st Century." This is only the second time the ACSM has hosted a seminar on skating, which will be held on June 2.

The presentation will be led by Leisure Yu, MD, PhD, and Roger Kruse, MD, both highly visible medical professionals in the figure skating world. Topics will include biomechanics of figure skating jumps and landings; musculoskeletal performance indices and

injury trends; and the future of figure skating sport science.

Angela Smith, M.D., ACSM's president-elect and a masters' ladies competitor, and Lyle Micheli, M.D., USFSA international synchronized team physician, will also speak in a symposium on the Young Athlete's Knee, another topic of great interest to skaters and coaches. ACSM's annual meeting has many sessions on topics such as nutrition, sports psychology, injury prevention and treatment, and biomechanics.

On June 3, USFSA coaches and sports scientists will participate in the USOC/ACSM Human Performance Summit on "Competing at Altitude - Preparing for Salt Lake City 2002."

Valentine and Kossack represented the U.S. at eight international competitions, including a 12th-place finish in the 2000 World Junior Championships.

This season, the duo made its debut on the senior level, placing fifth at the 2001 U.S. Championships.

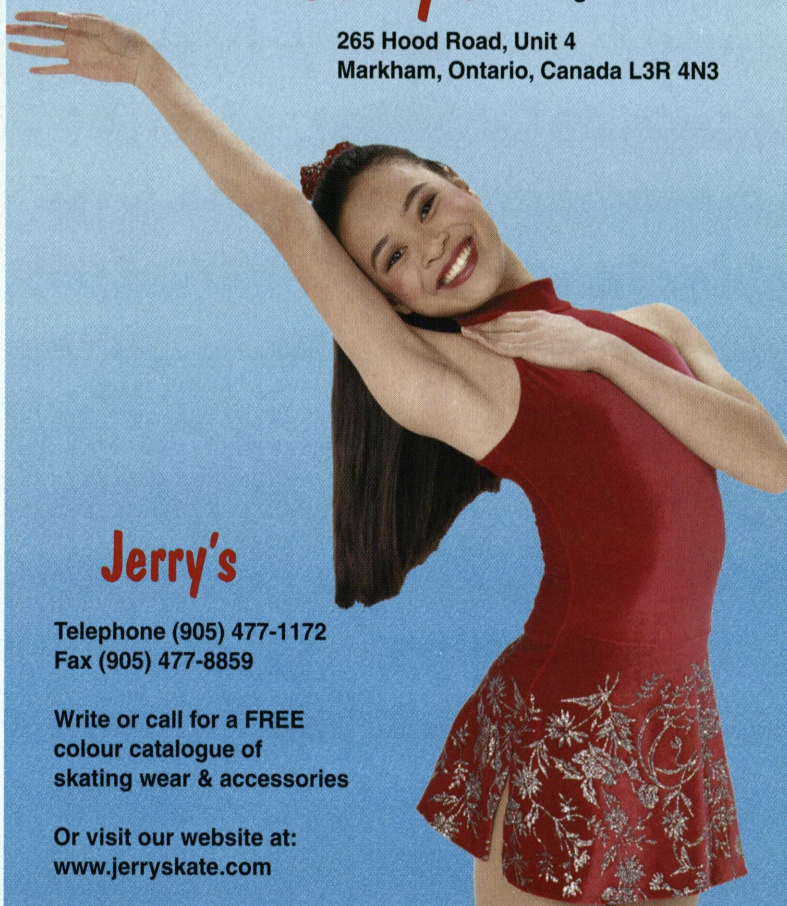

Clap for them.

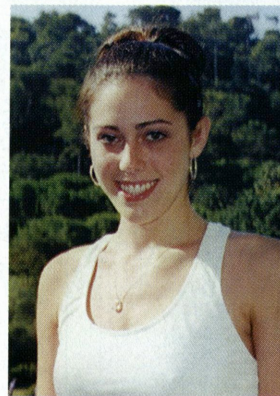
When they don't.

Celebrate with them.

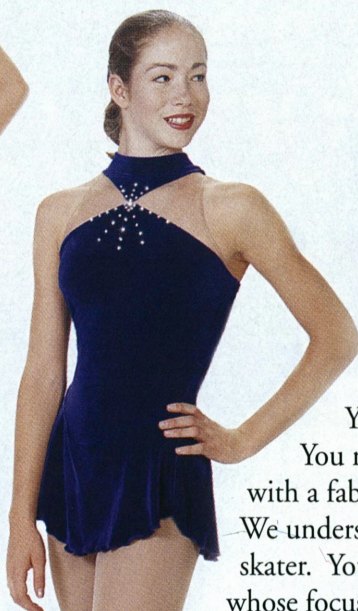

Governing Council Changes on the Horizon?

With the Governing Council quickly approaching, look for a possible change in the membership year to reflect July 1. If passed, this would take place for the 2002-2003 season, so there is one year to prepare. Clubs across the country have expressed a strong interest in this due to a number of factors.

A proposed bylaw change will make the membership year July 1-July 1. With the change in the competition calendar, it is now important for the renewal and registration process to be adjusted. The new registration calendar would reflect consistency with the USFSA fiscal year and the registration period for Governing Council delegates. This would allow clubs to renew their membership before the regional entry deadlines.

With the current calendar, this process occurs after the competition deadline. The resulting problems include questions regarding club affiliation and dues retrieval, increased workload by the club membership chair and inefficient processing. The earlier registration period would allow USFSA Headquarters staff to operate more effectively. Renewals,

registrations and competition entries currently engulf Headquarters at the same time, thus delaying the processing. The earlier registration period would streamline all of the above.

In addition, much of this process will be streamlined with online registrations (see page 7 of this issue). This will make many of the lengthy and time consuming volunteer tasks much more user-friendly. From online club membership renewal and registration, to competition and test registration, this new endeavor will benefit all of our membership.

Governing Council will also be an excellent opportunity to take part in club-related seminars. Some of the topics we intend to tackle include:

- ◆ Better club financial management
- ◆ Improved rink and coaching relations
- ◆ How to better utilize your Headquarters staff in Member Services
- ◆ Insurance and Non-Profit [501(c)(3)] issues
- ◆ How to better utilize the Membership Liaisons
- ◆ Many others

One of the program topics will include the introduction of the "Bridge Program." This new program is designed as a model for clubs to use to attract the beginning skater into club membership. The "Bridge" outlines programming session ideas, marketing tools and ways clubs can take advantage of increasing their membership.

If a club is unable to attend, all of the above topics that are discussed at Governing Council will be recapped in future Clubs Matter columns.

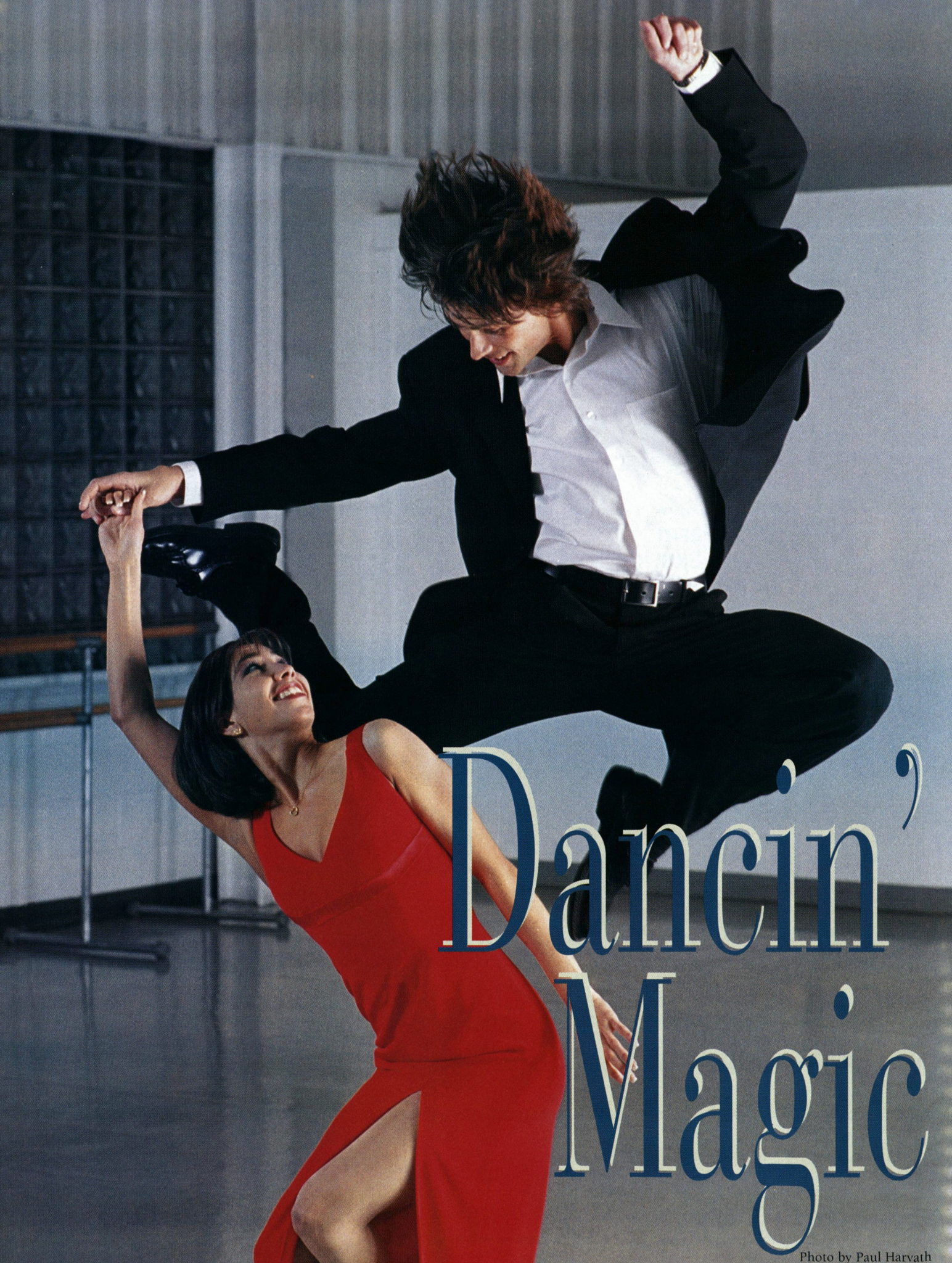

Dancin' Magic

The mystery of two diverse cultures. The techniques and styles of two marvelously different systems. The result is a wondrous spectacle of dancing on ice by two of the most stunning people in the sport. It is the magic of Naomi Lang and Peter Tchernyshev.

The strides are long, graceful, and each is meaningful.

Their performance is a poem. Sometimes, there is rhyme. Always, there is a reason. And it meshes from movement to movement. Other times it is a saga, with a crescendo and varying tempo, one that takes the audience for a ride, from start to finish.

"I guess the best award skaters can get," Peter Tchernyshev says, "is when the people who are watching are enjoying and getting pleasure from it."

Always, though, there is emotion when Naomi Lang and Tchernyshev are on the ice together.

Always there is passion, deep breaths for the more difficult maneuvers, intense focus for the set-ups where their collective coordination is more than expected; it is required.

"I really enjoy being out in front of people doing what I do best," Lang explains. "I want to make everyone enjoy the skating. For me, I can express myself when I'm out there. It's just a joy for me to perform. All the practice goes for that one moment, so you're happy when you're out there."

Always there is a smile, one that is so genuine it graces their faces not only long before they enter the ice together, but after they leave the ice as well.

"The smile is real," Tchernyshev says. "We never fake that. It is us, who we are."

Nationally, there is no one better. After placing fifth at their first U.S. Championships in 1997 and third in 1998, they've won the title the past

three years, including 2001.

The pair is making a steady climb through the ranks of ice dancing internationally as well. They were 10th at the 1999 World Championships and eighth in 2000. At Four Continents, they were third in 1999, first in 2000 and second in 2001.

"We talked to our coach, and he thinks that we are placing the best we can," Lang said. "Ice dance is such a slow-rising sport, and we've only been to two Worlds. To be as high as we are after just two Worlds is quite amazing, we are told."

They are from two different worlds, forming this melting pot pair of ice dancers. He is 30. She is just 22. But his experience and expertise rub off on Lang, and her exuberance and energy spills into Tchernyshev.

RUSSIAN INFLUENCE

His world is one most of her friends would never know of, except for the rhetoric of Cold War politics in American school history books and Hollywood films. His world, our version goes, was of emotional and physical coldness, an evil without heart, a cold stare without soul.

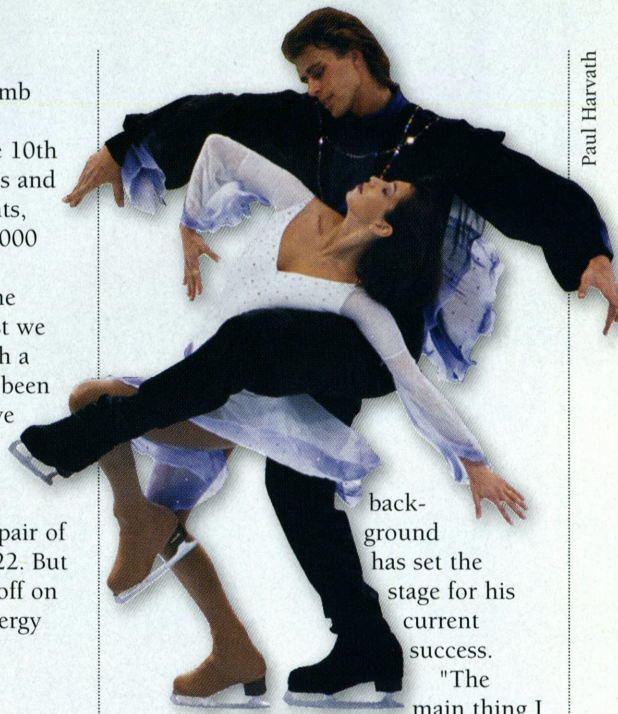
In 1992, when the Soviet Union was in fragments, Tchernyshev was living in Moscow.

"At the time the Soviet Union fell apart, state financing of skating was almost completely cut off," Tchernyshev says. "I decided to leave so I could further my skating career."

America is as far away from Russia culturally as it is logistically.

"Obviously the cultures are different, the people are different, the systems are different," Tchernyshev says. "Russia has more history, just because it is a much older country than the United States. But, at the same time, the United States culture comes from part of every country in the world, especially the European countries. So it's all of those different cultures that have made the United States so great. And I don't want to take anything away from the Native Americans in the United States either, because they were here from the beginning."

Besides, he notes, his hard-working

back-ground has set the stage for his current success.

"The main thing I brought with me from Russia is the work ethic, and that I never should set limits for myself," he says. "There is no work I cannot do."

Though Tchernyshev himself admits his upbringing was 180 degrees from what American kids expect, he is that much better for the experience. And on Jan. 29 of this year, he became an American citizen.

Lang sees both the differences and the parallels between the cultures.

"They're (Russians) definitely one of the warmest people, I think," Lang says. "They're all very kind and gentle. They just come from a system very different than ours. They might seem cool and harsh on the outside, but that's because of where they come from. When I was in Russia walking down the street, no one smiled or looked at you. Here, everyone looks at each other, and sometimes (they) smile. You say, 'Hi, how's it going' to the grocery store clerk here. They don't do that there. But inside, they're just like us."

Tchernyshev is not the first in his family to have success on the ice. His grandfather was the Russian national champion four consecutive years, 1936-39.

"Growing up in the Soviet Union, it was not my goal to become an American citizen," Tchernyshev said. "I only

moved here to skate. But once I got here, I started to live as an American. So I felt the only part of my life that was missing was American citizenship. I didn't want to become a U.S. citizen only to be able to work here or to represent the U.S. in international competition. What I wanted was to become a rightful member of this country."

Yet he is still very much of two cultures, and he knows his Russian roots run deep in his heart.

"That was my whole life, basically, until 1992," Tchernyshev said. "It is still my motherland. My parents, brother, other relatives and friends are still there. So I feel more like I am just a citizen of the planet Earth than I am a Russian or American."

QUIET ROOTS

She was born in California and raised in the Midwest, growing up in Michigan. There was never money in the bank, nor a lot of food on the table. Always, there was just enough, though, to get by. And there was plenty of love.

She was raised by a single mother, Leslie Dixon, who worked long hours to provide all she could for her daughter.

"My mother worked her heart out for me; that's where I learned about hard work, from the spirit in my mother," Lang says. "That spirit was passed along to me."

Lang went to Ice Capades with her family one night when she was eight.

"We went to see 'Smurfs on Ice,' and I was a big Smurfs fan," Lang says with a grin. "I thought the skating, though, was the coolest part of it."

That night, she told her mother that she wanted to become a

skater. She told her the same thing the next morning. And the next night. And the morning after that. So her mother listened.

"I started basically in public sessions," Lang said. "I would skate around the rink. At first I was really scared, because there were so many people there. Then I got faster and faster. Pretty soon I was lapping people and I thought, 'Wow, I could be good at this.' I went through the Basic Skills program with a private coach. I didn't start ice dancing until I was about 10."

Her mother scraped and scraped for those lessons, and that sacrifice is not lost on Lang. When it was time for competition and Lang needed an outfit, the two would sit in the kitchen and piece the costumes together, saving money any way they could.

"I still, to this day, glue my own rhinestones on at times," Lang says, "because it's just habit -- second nature -- now."

It is also a little known fact that Lang is three-quarters Native American -- from a West Coast tribe, the Karuk. Her Indian name is Maheepahan, which means "morning star," a name her father bestowed upon her before he and Naomi's mother split up when she was very young.

"I'm still a tribal member -- I have a tribal number and all of that," Lang says proudly. "It is a big part of me."

A Native American television program has plans to follow her around. She's a bit flattered by the attention, but takes the literal meaning seriously.

"I've been told I can be a role model for Native American children," Lang says. "That means a lot to me."

All of her training in ballet and dance provided a logical background to ice dancing. Lang is also a fan of the Detroit Red Wings, who, ironically, have made their Stanley Cup runs

with several key players from Tchernyshev's world, the former Soviet Union.

So, yes, their union is one borne of dichotomy, but linked unfailingly by parallels.

COMING TOGETHER

Lang was experiencing some success in juniors -- she and her first partner, John Lee, had won the 1995 U.S. novice

title and were second in juniors -- when they split. Tchernyshev saw her at the '96 U.S. Championships in juniors. He liked the way she skated and "how expressive" she was. A month later, he wrote her a letter asking if she'd like to team up.

She was just 17, and that meant moving to Lake Placid to train with him.

"I had to make this big change in my life," Lang said. "I had grown up in, and all my friends were in Michigan. It was really, really hard. I had only one girlfriend in Lake Placid. I was so lonely... and homesick. The whole time there, I wanted to leave."

They did leave, and headed back to Detroit to train. After a while, though, the pair realized they needed a change of pace, and wanted to experience another coaching philosophy. So they headed to New Jersey in 2000. Only this time, the move wasn't painful.

"It was good to be home for a while, but then I realized Detroit couldn't give me all I needed in my skating career," Lang says. "We needed a lot of lesson time that we couldn't get. So moving to the East Coast was a good thing. I am grown up now, of course, and I don't get homesick like I used to. Plus, being in New Jersey has really brought a spark back to our skating career, because we had really lost that for a while."

That spark came from their new coach in New Jersey, renowned coach/choreographer Sasha Zhulin. Zhulin and his former partner and wife Maia Usova were the Olympic silver medalists in 1994. The new coaching relationship has taken Lang and Tchernyshev to a new level.

"Sasha gave us a breath of fresh air in our skating, and that brought some motivation," Tchernyshev said. "Besides the fact he is a great choreographer, he is a great coach. What he brings to us is that Sasha knows what it takes to get to the top, and he knows what it takes to stay there. So he's a major force in our preparation."

Zhulin knew what he was taking on when he signed up to coach Lang and Tchernyshev: part of himself.

"I had been there," Zhulin said, "so I

knew what they were thinking. At this level, you have to know the skaters. Peter and Naomi needed a lot of attention, more than they were getting perhaps. And I could see that."

He could also see issues of temper borne out of the on-again, off-again passion that complicates their relationship.

"You know, I heard that they were very hard to work with, but that just isn't the case -- or I haven't seen it," Zhulin said. "I've been there, so I know every pair has their issues and squabbles at times. But theirs are no worse than the others I have seen. We have a very talented man and a very talented woman. There is going to be some disagreement because they are both strong-willed. They needed to be taught to work through their problems."

MAGIC

So night meets day, and they find a common ground when the hands of the clock unite on 12 twice each cycle. Though diverse in background, they are strikingly similar in thought and act on the ice.

And that is the on-ice union that is Lang and Tchernyshev.

"I guess part of the reason we've been able to mix these cultures and backgrounds is because figure skating is very much an art form," Tchernyshev said. "As with every art, there is a lot of room for mixtures and blends -- just like there is in painting, ballet, music and so on. Figure skating takes the best parts of each culture and develops it together into something that brings out the best of both of our worlds."

That they have been sewn together without the hint of a seam is impressive, until Tchernyshev points out that wasn't the way it used to be.

"At first we were both excited to find out that we had a partner for the long-term," he says. "We knew it would take

some time before we'd reach some level of success. And really, we're still developing that potential. It's not like it was a one-day thing. It developed over time. But as you spend so much time with someone like that, working out, practicing, searching for music, costumes and ideas, you get into your own little world with that person. And it speeds up the process of getting chemistry and learning about each other."

There is an eight-year age difference, yet that potential barrier was hurdled long ago, and never revisited.

"I don't really think we feel an age difference when it comes to the ice, because it doesn't matter how old you are once you get on the ice," Tchernyshev says. "Besides, Naomi has such a complete picture of skating and what needs to be done."

Off the ice, the pair was also a pair. Though they aren't a couple per se any longer, they say it is because the task at hand is on the ice, which means minimizing the strains off of it.

"We're trying to put our personal relationship on hold until the Olympics are done," Tchernyshev says. "It takes a lot of strength and effort to do what we're doing on the ice, just as it does to have a relationship off of the ice. It's really hard to keep the two things together, the personal life and professional life. So we've taken that out, and gotten back our focus."

For their first couple of years skating together, Tchernyshev was regarded as the more experienced and polished of the two. And it is Tchernyshev himself who claims that is no longer the case.

"I will let you in on a secret," Tchernyshev says. "Sometimes I feel she is doing things better than me. That pushes me. And I still push her. But there's no doubt she's improved a huge deal. She's uncovered a huge part of her potential. When we skate out there, there's no doubt we're even in our strengths and ability. Naomi is one of the most talented skaters out there."

Lang is proud that they have reached a common ground in terms of ability and talent.

"When we first started skating together, I came in as this little junior so I wasn't very strong," Lang said. "I have been working for five years to catch up to him. He's helped me a lot, with speed and support and everything. In fact, that's why I've become a matched skater to him. And this year, people are finally starting to notice. Of course, Sasha has a lot to do with that, too. I can't tell you how many times a week he says, 'Come on Naomi, you can do it!' I see how Sasha believes in me and all the energy he has, and I believe, too."

Zhulin saw the self-confidence issue right away in Lang.

"She didn't always believe in herself before (moving to New Jersey), for whatever reason," Zhulin said. "She felt she couldn't do this, couldn't do that. So I talked to her and said, 'You cannot only be the national champion that you are, but you can be a World champion. Always think of something bigger.' So we focus on the positive things."

He also saw in Tchernyshev a lot of himself, including a sharing of the culture. Though it's a welcome respite for Tchernyshev and Zhulin to be able to speak in their native Russian -- Zhulin is also from Moscow -- it can leave Lang feeling left out at times.

"There were times when Peter and I would quickly switch to just (speaking) Russian, and of course Naomi would be wondering what we were talking about," Zhulin said. "But it's good for me, as it is for Peter, to be able to talk in our native language. Naomi understands that. We simply have to be aware of her feelings."

There is room for improvement technically -- as is the case with any skater or skating team. They've already made great strides of late.

"This year, we really worked on our speed, so we're accomplishing more in that regard than ever," Lang said. "And of course we will keep working on that and the dramatic part of our skating."

The three-time defending U.S. champs need only to look internationally to find motivation.

"You can always be better," Lang said. "We want to catch those top teams, so we have to be better."

One of the discipline's most well-respected authorities, Susie Wynne, a former U.S. dance champion and current ABC commentator, sees an avalanche of potential in the pair.

"I think what makes them exceptional

is their impeccable skating technique," Wynne said. "They're both tremendous skaters. You can tell they've had extensive ballet and extensive dance; they bring a lot of truth to the term 'ice dancing.' They are trained skaters, of course. But, they are superbly trained in dance as well, more so than anyone else on the international scene; their technique is superb."

Wynne also sees room for improvement, strides that could well bring them in line with the best in the world.

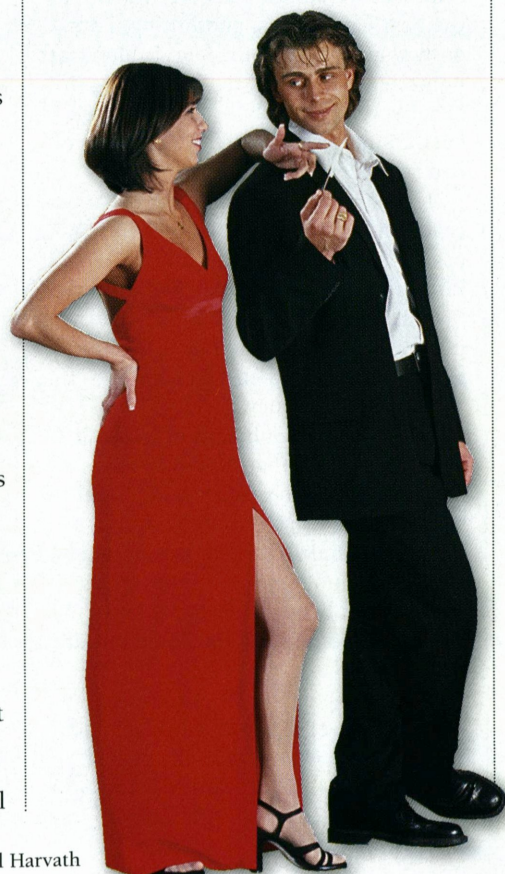
"Their performance element needs to catch up to the other aspects at which they excel," she said. "With their move (to Zhulin) they seem to have more confidence. On the ice, they seem more comfortable with their dance, and their bodies seem more free. They come across as happier. I really wish I had what they had when I was still skating. I had their spunk, but not their technique. They are Ken and Barbie."

The pair's international future is bright because of their presentation manner, according to 1984 Olympic champion Christopher Dean.

"I just like their purity and strength of skating," Dean said. "They're this nice, tall leggy couple. When they skate I see these clear pictures. A lot of ice dancers think of quantity instead of quality -- how many steps they can fit in."

Their goal is the Olympics. However, they won't look that far down the road

On the Lookout

for Devin Matthews

SKATING presents the third in an occasional series about the skaters climbing up the ranks toward their dreams. In "On the Lookout," you'll meet skaters just like yourself who are working their way up, training hard every day and fighting to succeed. This month, **SKATING** introduces you to Devin Matthews.

From a flooded backyard in Utah to the watchful eye of veteran skating coach Frank Carroll, Devin Matthews, 21, has learned to manage his time wisely and keep his priorities in order.

Much of his skating story is unique, but at the same time he has faced challenges common to young skaters everywhere. Always, he has found the bright spot in the most disappointing times -- keeping his eyes on his dreams.

Growing up amongst the Northern Ute Indians in Roosevelt, Utah, Matthews began skating in his backyard when he was five years old. His father, Dr. Bob Matthews, worked with Native Americans as an employee of the U.S. Surgeon General's office, so the family moved near the reservation. It was there that his passion for skating was discovered.

"Our neighbor flooded our backyards together and we had a little pond to skate on," said Matthews.

According to his father, the younger Matthews would skate on the pond everyday during the long winter months. His parents soon noticed his natural abil-

ity, and it didn't take long for the local population to take notice as well. The Native Americans living on the nearby reservation were immediately attracted to Matthews' skating. They would come to the makeshift rink to watch him skate and at one time gave him a blessing to continue on his journey.

Matthews' skating would eventually move well beyond the backyard pond, however.

In 1986, the Matthews family moved to Riverside, Calif., where Devin's skating career became more serious. It was not until he was 12, however, that he had his first skating lesson with Yuri Ovchinnikov -- over an hour's drive away in San Diego. Matthews and his mother, Vicki, would wake up at three o'clock every morning to drive the 60 miles to the rink in San Diego before school. They made the journey almost everyday for close to five years.

Through it all, the family, which included older brother, Colby, was determined to make sure its budding star remained a "regular teen." He attended public school on a full-time basis throughout his teenage years.

Dedication to figure skating and attending a public high school taught Matthews some valuable lessons.

"It has been harder to go to regular school and skate," he said. "You just have to learn how to manage your time, and I think it is better because I feel like I can handle anything once I am out in the real world."

He also kept himself busy with various other activities in high school -- turning himself into a multi-dimensional young man in the process.

"I would go play hockey, and then I would go figure skate and then I would come back and get on my roller blades," he said. "I would just do anything to get on skates."

In addition to skating, he also played the tuba for his high school band, something that he still enjoys today.

About four years ago, Matthews added training in Lake Arrowhead, Calif. -- former home of World champion Michelle Kwan -- to his busy schedule. He was doing a lot of traveling to ensure he was getting adequate training, and eventually decided he had to make a change. After high school



graduation, he moved away from his family to be closer to the training facilities in Lake Arrowhead. He eventually stopped making the journey to San Diego altogether and began working with Kwan's coach, Frank Carroll, at the mountain rink in Lake Arrowhead.

Matthews' devotion to his training shows in the sacrifices he has made. About a year ago, Carroll decided to move to El Segundo, Calif., and work out of the HealthSouth Training Center. Matthews, committed to his skating and to his coach, made the move as well. He now also skates in Culver City, Calif., and works with newly-inducted U.S. Figure Skating Hall of Fame member Gary Visconti.

Despite success as a singles skater, Matthews has decided to add one more activity to his already-busy plate -- ice dancing. Last fall, he began working with partner Alisa Allapach under coach Russ Witherby. He plans to continue competing in both singles and dance.

Matthews is like many hard-working skaters in the U.S. Although recent competitions have been disappointing, he has persevered. Nowhere was that more evident than at the 2001 Pacific Coast Sectionals, where he competed at the junior level. He was third after the short program and seemed well on his way to his first appearance at the U.S. Championships.

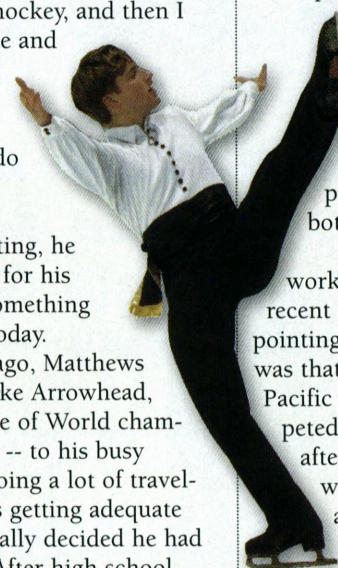

However, he finished eighth in the free skate, and dropped to fifth place overall -- just one-tenth of one point from the fourth and final qualifying spot. Although his second consecutive fifth-place finish prevented him from reaching his dream once again, being on the bubble does not discourage him -- it only makes him work harder.

"I've been an alternate every year," he said. "It's a little frustrating, feeling like I'm right on the edge there. It just makes me want to work harder."

Carroll agreed that Matthews has stood strong in the face of adversity.

"Devin is always an 'up' person," said Carroll. "I enjoy working with him because it is always a truly enjoyable experience. He has had his disappointments, especially missing nationals twice by only one place, but he has never displayed anger at me or those around him for the outcome. He has always displayed an eagerness to come back and try again."

As a junior skater, Matthews has his triple toe-triple toe combination and his triple Salchow-triple loop, but he knows he has more to accomplish in order to keep up with the ever-increasing level of competition.

"I was kind of down after Pacific Coasts because I didn't make it to nationals, so I just worked really hard," he said. "I kept training because I was an alternate. I have to get my flip and Lutz this season."

Although many hold the assumption that Matthews is getting "too old" to continue to skate at his level, he does not let his age interfere with his goals.

"I know that there are a lot of young, up and coming kids," he admitted, "but I just go about my business and keep on going. You can't think about other people and what they are doing. You just do what you can do."

Matthews would like to make it to the U.S. Championships next year and eventually compete at the senior level.

"I want to do the best I know I can do and accomplish everything that I put my mind to," he said.

The dedicated athlete has no immediate plans to end his skating career.

"I'd like to see how far I can take myself in this and then I want to go continue my schooling," he said.

From flying high on the ice to flying high in the sky, Matthews stated he would someday like to become a pilot.

"I've always wanted to do aviation," he said. "My grandfather flew WWII planes and I have always liked that."

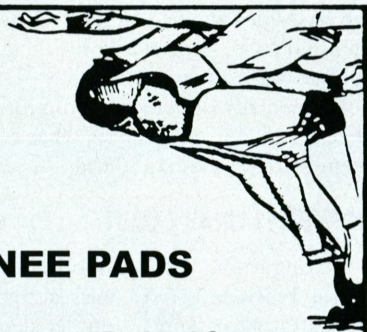
He is currently taking classes at Santa Monica College and is close to receiving his associate's degree in history. A member of the Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society, he hopes to transfer to UCLA in the near future for his four-year degree. As if all of this is not enough for Matthews, he also works at the HealthSouth Training Center teaching children skating skills, and volunteers with skaters competing in the Paralympics.

It's all that and more that makes Carroll pleased to have Matthews as a student.

"It is amazing to me that skaters who are really very talented and on the top, or highly regarded by the skating community, don't understand why a coach gets such a lift in their day by working with someone like Devin," said Carroll.

Although Matthews is not yet a World champion or Olympic athlete, he certainly has a gift that is truly appreciated by many.

Rendezvous in Rouen

In the charming town of Rouen, France, where Joan of Arc met her infamous fate, three U.S. synchronized teams met up with international teams for the seventh annual 2001 French Cup, Feb. 2-4. The U.S. fielded Team Elan (senior), the Hockettes (junior), and the Ice Mates (novice) for a triple medal showing, earning bronze, gold and gold, respectively. Across the Seine from the Rouen Cathedral that enchanted Claude Monet, U.S. skaters "rendezvous"-ed at the Rouen Patinoire Ile Lacroix, an ice rink located on a small island.

Gary Mitchell, a proud Ice Mates team parent, perched on the edge of his seat in Rouen, France, thousands of miles away from his home and career in Massachusetts. His neck strained to keep a close watch on his daughter's every move. He analyzed the Ice Mates' long program with an experienced eye, calculating that artistic merit alone would bring higher marks than the previous team. Mitchell, a restaurant and nightclub owner, marveled at the opportunities skating has brought his daughter, Laura, 12, a first-year Ice Mates skater.

"What better experience could you ask for?" said Mitchell. "These skaters are learning maturity and discipline beyond their years."

Ice Mates assistant coach Dede Wilson credited Laura's good attitude and versatility in helping her adapt to a new team. Mitchell downplayed any concerns he or his wife might have about missed school or fun.

"These are very good skills for life," he said. "I mean what would these girls be doing at home right now?"

Mitchell was accompanied by his younger daughter, Carly, 9, a synchronized skater with the Nor'easters team in Wilmington, Mass. Awed by Laura's new gold international medal, Carly also strives to compete abroad someday.

"I think it's awesome to see all these

different teams and where they come from," Carly said.

For many young U.S. synchronized skaters like Laura, international assignments such as the French Cup are their first entry into international competition, and for many, their first trip to Europe.

Team Elan captain Demerie Mirkin, 20, and co-captain Sara Jack, 24, are seasoned veterans in their sixth and seventh years of synchronized skating, respectively. Both agreed that introducing new team members to international competitions can be challenging.

"The new girls ask a lot of questions and had a hard time with the time change," Jack said.

Despite the dizzying array of challenges for teams abroad, such as the seven-hour time change, tourist distractions, and sudden changes in diet and training facilities, the three U.S. teams came through with solid performances and three medals.

A "CAN-CAN" ATTITUDE

Before the Ice Mates of Lexington, Mass., stepped on the ice, Wilson told her team, "Have fun skating a French Can-Can in France."

The team's performance reminded spectators that in the end, attitude and style could be the definitive factor. Not only did the Ice Mates convey their theme to the judges, as the crowd happily

participated, but the "can-can" took on a literal meaning, as the skaters remained positive despite several stumbles.

"They always tell us not to think about glitches, but also the audience was amazing. They were so loud," said captain Corey Merrill, 15.

Technical highlights of the program included individual spins, split jumps, and a pinwheel with outside spread eagles -- a trademark made famous by the Haydenettes. They completed heel stretches highlighted by the end skaters in a wheel, and a daring back lunge intersection.

"I thought they were very aggressive," Wilson said. "They enjoyed the moment and were pretty happy with it."

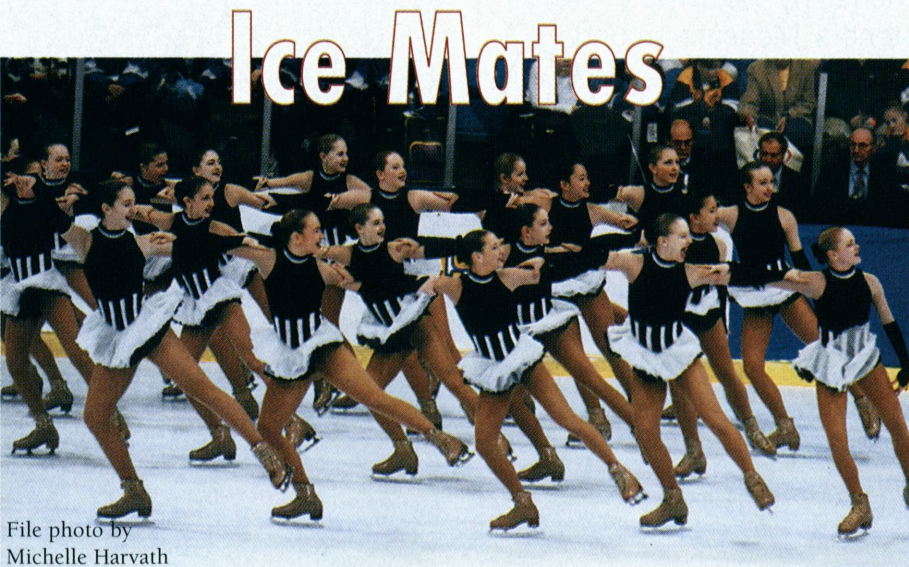
Despite close competition from two Finnish teams, Ice Smiles and Team Dynamique, the Ice Mates earned presentation marks ranging from 4.7 to 5.0 to win the gold medal.

Among the field of 15 novice teams, the Ice Mates showed superior artistic flair and style, particularly for their younger age division.

"They really did enjoy the performance," said Wilson. "That's what gets them through the hard parts."

HOCKETTES GRAB GOLD

Skating to Big Bad Voodoo Daddy and clad in black and silver dresses, the Hockettes successfully completed a

square intersection and near-perfect short program to earn technical marks from 4.5 to 4.7. Although there were several minor errors, the Hockettes out-skated Team Stella Polaris of Finland, who had a James Bond-themed program full of deep-edged mohawks and choctaws with good speed.

"It's amazing to be at an international competition and be the first-place team," said Hockettes assistant captain Katie Cherven, 17, after the short program.

Cousins and co-captains Katie and Shaine Newman, both 18, also provided inspiration to their dedicated team.

"I think the best moment was when we were waiting to skate the short and all the parents and everyone were shouting 'USA.' I wanted to skate so badly then," Shaine said.

"In this competition we're really focusing on trusting each other and nailing the programs," Katie said.

The Hockettes followed up with a clean performance of "Sleeping Beauty" in the long, securing the second gold medal for the USA. The competition was close with two Finnish teams, Team Mystique and Stella Polaris, finishing second and third behind the Hockettes overall.

The skaters were equally thrilled with their long program and started screaming before they even were off the ice.

"Watching the team on top of the podium as the U.S. flag was rising and hearing the Star Spangled Banner being played was definitely like nothing else I have experienced in my skating career," said coach Anne Marie Copp. "It was a very special moment for us all."

TEAM ELAN GETS SET FOR NATIONALS

2000 U.S. silver medalists Team Elan delivered two performances that both skaters and coach Jeannine Cullen described as "couldn't have been better."

Their short program to "Paint it Black" earned second-place marks.

"The feeling of that (second place)

will be my favorite memory from this competition," said Jack.

Although Team Elan skated another clean performance in their "Sea Maidens" long program, they slipped to third place overall out of 14 teams, as Finland's Energetics moved up from third to claim the silver.

Team Elan's long program included a smooth spiral sequence that earned tremendous applause, back shoot-the-ducks in a circle, loop jumps, and an unconnected block with choctaw sequences.

"I was looking for enjoyment, stretch, extension and power behind their skating," Cullen said. "I wanted them to reach out and fill the arena."

The two teams that surpassed Elan possessed more innovative moves, though not necessarily more difficult. Silver medal-

ists Energetics completed a back lunge intersection and back shoot-the-ducks while holding each other's blades. Team Paradise of Russia, the dominating team in both events, started the long program with a lengthy unconnected portion of solo spins that may have appealed to European judges who seem to like program "highlighting."

Team Paradise also showed aggressive

speed and smooth flow, despite the absence of a major technical move such as a back lunge intersection.

Cullen was pleased with their finish.

"I think my girls are the best judges, and they thought they were great," she said. "That's the best when they say that."

THE NATIONS CUP

The U.S. teams celebrated three medals and the second-year honor of receiving the 2001 Nations Cup, an award to the country with the best overall showing (for all divisions combined) at the competition.

"We're proud to represent the U.S.," agreed Ice Mates Kristina Pan, 14, Kristina Sheehin, 13, and Mitchell.

"I realized when we were out there that it's more than competing. It's making friendships," said Hockette Jillian Kramer, 16.

"It's easier to form bonds with U.S. teams while abroad," said Katie Newman. "There's less competition and we can be united."

In the midst of the awards ceremony, the U.S. teams were only lacking in one key area. The next item of protocol for American skaters: making them comfortable with cheek-kissing, European style.

A Look Towards Governing Council

The Synchronized Team Skating Committees have been working hard to represent their various sections and functions. Comprised of athletes, coaches, judges and parents, these committees look at the issues and needs of the synchronized skating community and make recommendations for process and rule changes. Recommendations for rule changes are submitted two times during the calendar year -- once in the fall at the annual meeting of the Board of Directors and again at the spring meeting of the Board of Directors. All proposals are then presented at the annual meeting of the Governing Council for ratification.

In an effort to better understand the role of these committees, let's take a brief look at a few of the committees and some of the issues they've been working on.

The **Synchronized Team Skating Committee** oversees the standards for the marking and judging of all synchronized skating events. Found in the USFSA Rulebook under Skating Standards Regulations (SSR 20.00 – 27.00), changes to this area are typically driven by the International Skating Union. This committee also looks at the rules pertaining to clothing and skate blades. One rule change that was approved during the Fall Meeting was a revision to the existing costume rule restricting sequins and rhinestones on the skater's clothing.

The **Synchronized Team Skating Competitions Sub-Committee** has jurisdiction over all USFSA synchronized skating

competitions held on ice in the U.S. This sub-committee sanctions both sectional qualifying and non-qualifying competitions and ensures compliance and coordination with the Competitions Committee rules. The rules pertaining to synchronized team skating competitions can be found in the USFSA Rulebook under Competition Rules for Synchronized Team Skating Championships (CR 40.00 – 63.00).

New issues that the Synchronized Competitions Sub-Committee will be bringing forth in May are a revision to the Close of Entries date for the first qualifying competition. Currently set at Dec. 15, this closing date for entries often conflicts with the holiday season. The committee is recommending that the date be moved up to Dec. 1. The committee also recommends a clarification of two rules -- the automatic bye rule for synchronized skating teams assigned to international competitions and the crossover rule defining on which additional teams an athlete can skate.

The **Synchronized Skating Development Sub-Committee** is a planning committee that develops recommendations for programs to bring synchronized skating athletes to their fullest potential, consistent with the spirit of the rules, regulations and goals of the USFSA. This committee looks at athlete train-

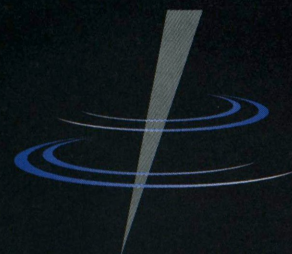

Todd Eldredge Helps Light Up Utah's Olympic Torch Route

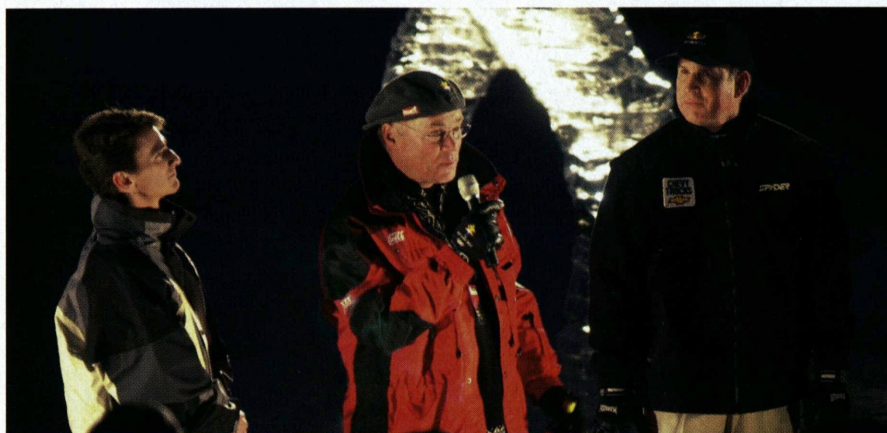
Five-time U.S. champion and current U.S. silver medalist Todd Eldredge helped kick off the year-out celebration for the 2002 Olympic Winter Games on Feb. 8 in Salt Lake City.

Eldredge, who was in Utah for the Four Continents Championships, was part of the ceremony to announce the route the Olympic torch relay will take through Utah. The torch will begin its journey Dec. 4, 2001, in Atlanta, Ga., and wind its way across the U.S. People hoping to see the torch can check out www.saltlake2002.com and see a map of the torch route. The torch will arrive in

Utah on Feb. 4 for its five-day journey to the Opening Ceremonies (Feb. 8).

The torch ceremony was held at the city's Gallivan Center. The route through the state of Utah was represented by ice sculptures identifying major state landmarks. At a signal, a flame streaked across the route, ending in Salt Lake City.

Eldredge spoke about the Olympic Torch symbolizing the eternal flame that burns within his own athletic experiences, and how it has been fueled by the support of family, friends and fans.

Another Year, Another Surprising Finish

To U.S. skating fans, the names "Tai and Randy" are synonymous with great pairs skating. They're also synonymous with Olympic heartbreak.

Five-time U.S. champions Tai Babilonia and Randy Gardner were certainly considered favorites for 1980 Olympic gold after winning the 1979 World Championship (one of only two U.S. pairs to ever win the World title). However, back for another shot at Olympic glory was the legendary Irina Rodnina, who won Olympic gold in 1972 with Alexsei Ulanov and in 1976 with Aleksandr Zaitsev. Although Rodnina and Zaitsev did not compete in the 1979 Worlds, they were obviously favorites for gold as well.

The skating world never found out who would have won the battle.

Gardner had suffered an injury two weeks before the Games. He was given medication before the short program, and he and Babilonia went on the ice to warm up. However, it was painfully obvious that Gardner's leg could not hold him up and they were forced to withdraw. They later also withdrew from the 1980 World Championships due to the injury. Not surprisingly, Rodnina and Zaitsev won their second consecutive Olympic gold medal.

Babilonia and Gardner, however, went on to have successful professional careers. Both are still immensely popular in the skating world.

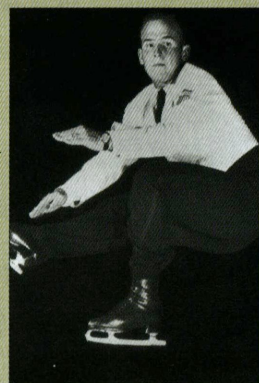

A Look at a U.S. Olympic Champion

Dick Button

One of the most recognizable faces in figure skating today, Richard "Dick" Button is also one of the sport's greatest athletes.

Considered one of the pioneers of modern free skating, the New Jersey native first began skating at age five. In 1943, he placed second at his first competition -- the Eastern Sectional novice men's event. After that,



he never finished lower than first in any U.S. Championship he entered. That included the 1946 Eastern Sectional junior pairs competition with partner Barbara Jones -- his only foray into the world of pairs skating.

Button was the first U.S. skater to win an Olympic gold medal, a feat he accomplished in 1948 at the age of 18 (making him the youngest-ever men's Olympic champion). He later defended his Olympic title in 1952 and is one of only three male skaters to win the Olympic title more than once (Gillis Grafstrom of Sweden won three times, while Austria's Karl Schafer won twice).

Button boasts a number of "firsts" in skating competition -- the double Axel; three consecutive double loop jumps; and the flying camel spin (his own invention). He is also the first man to land a triple jump (the loop), which he did at the 1952 Olympics.

After skating, Button was graduated from Harvard Law School and eventually turned his attention to television. His voice has been heard on figure skating broadcasts since the 1960 Olympics, and his honest commentary is known to delight fans and raise interesting discussions. He is a member of both the U.S. and World Figure Skating Halls of Fame.

Seems Like Old Times

It's been nearly 30 years since Bratislava has hosted a major skating event -- many things are different, including the skating. The results at this year's European Championships, held Jan. 21-28, however, seemed all too familiar.

The last time Bratislava held a major skating competition -- the 1973 Worlds -- it was revolutionary.

Not only was it in a different country than it is now, it was also the first time that a short program was used at a major championship. The era of emphasis on free skating was about to begin.

Just how much free skating has progressed was evident in an old film of Ondrej Nepela in a downtown museum. Nepela won the World competition at the rink, named for him after he died in 1989. A good routine in those days included two triple jumps.

Now the women are doing two triples -- in a row -- and the men are ready for quad-triple-triple.

This year's revolution at the 2001 European Championships involved the list of judges. The International Skating Union (ISU) decided it was better to designate the judges as ISU, rather than by country, in official scoring sheets or on the public scoreboard to avoid any hint of bias. However, the judges' names were listed and their countries were easily obtainable with the help of the Internet.

Times have changed, but times have also stayed the same.

At the 1973 Worlds, the Soviet anthem was played twice for winners in the pairs and ice dance events. This year, with the Russians reverting back to the old anthem with new lyrics, it was heard three times. Russians continued their domination by taking the men's, ladies and pairs events. The only gold that eluded them was the one in ice dancing, although the event had a Russian presence on all three steps of the podium.

Since 1996, when Irina Slutskaya won the first individual title for a Soviet/Russian woman, skaters from that country have won 21 of the 24 titles, losing just the 1996 men's event and the last two dance events.

This year's championships were held in Bratislava, Slovakia, barely an hour away from Vienna, site of last year's Europeans.

It also seemed light years away from the site of the 1999 competition -- Prague. Prague was the capital of the former Czechoslovakia before it split in 1993 after the 'Velvet Revolution' following the fall of communism in Eastern Europe.

Slovakia has been living in the shadow of the Czech Republic since the split, and did its best to provide a showcase for its first major international sports championship.

The large rink, built more for its powerful hockey teams, was rarely more than half-full at times and hasn't changed much since 1973.

The skating has.

RUSSIA, RUSSIA, RUSSIA

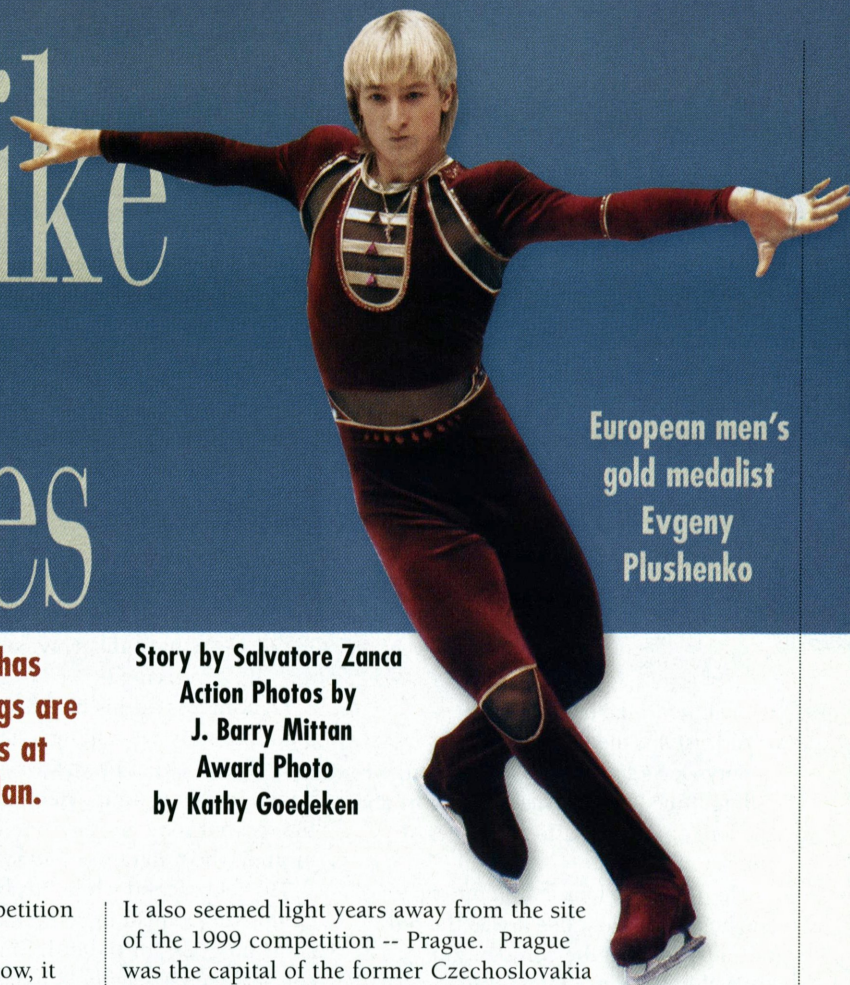
With the Russian sweep of the medals in the ladies event all but assumed for the third straight year, the only interest for many was who would do what triple-triples as they started their run to the Worlds and the confrontation with Michelle Kwan.

Irina Slutskaya didn't do any; Maria Butyrskaya did the only one of the competition -- a shaky one at best; Viktoria Volchkova talked about one.

Slutskaya started the real emphasis on the combination when she beat Kwan last year at the Grand Prix Final, but the 21-year-old Russian was not in the same form she was in Lyon.

Slutskaya arrived in Bratislava after a bout with the flu that made her lose a week of training since the beginning of January. Her temperature ran as high as 38 degrees (more than 100 F) during the illness. Still, she was good enough to gain her fourth European title. Only Sonja Henie and Katarina Witt (six each) and Sjoukje Dijkstra and Surya Bonaly (five) have won more titles.

Although she didn't miss anything, her technical marks ranged as low as 5.4 and it took her three tries to complete a

the long program.

This year, the four-revolution jump probably decided the title in favor of Plushenko, as it did in the World Championship when Yagudin completed his and Plushenko missed, although he stubbornly continued trying it.

Yagudin missed his in the short program in Bratislava, taking a heavy fall on a patch of ice that he was wary of when he fell in the warmup. He didn't blame the ice, but took another line into the jump in the program -- and still fell.

He held second while Plushenko was completing a quad in combination in the short program for the fifth time this season -- three GP events, Russian nationals and this competition.

Then it was a quad battle in the long, with each completing two quads and seven triples to make it three for each throughout the three phases of the event.

About a dozen others tried or thought about the quad, but only one, Vitaly Danilchenko, completed the jump.

Plushenko is growing, both as a skater and a human being. He connected with the audience, showing good emotion in his program to a mix of movie music.

That newfound emotion was more apparent after he finished -- pumping his fists three times, then making Andre Agassi-type bows and kisses to all four sides of the stadium.

Plushenko's free skate achieved a rarity; he received 6.0s in both scores -- one for technical merit and two for artistry.

The emotional change showed even more in his exhibition number, done in day-glo lime-yellow pants, a Caribbean top and a floppy hat. This was a long way from the exhibitions the Soviets presented in their numbers 28 years ago.

"I grew up. I became more mature," Plushenko said.

And there is more to come.

He even did a quad-triple-triple a couple times in practices, as he and Yagu-

din raise the technical bar nearly every competition, continuing to challenge each other.

"We all have to keep working and to progress all the time," Yagudin said. "I keep learning something else, new elements, new spins and steps. Of course, skating gets harder from one year to the next."

France's Stanick Jeannette took third this year, succeeding 2000 bronze medalist Dmitri Dmitrenko, who followed Alexei Urmanov (1999) and Alexander Abt (1998) for the bronze medal behind the usual two.

Abt came full circle. He made the 1998 team as a substitute Russian, but still came in third. He lost his spot on the team to Urmanov the following year, and was in third this year entering the long program despite a sinus infection that hit him just before the qualifying.

He managed to get through two portions of the competition, but his body gave way in the long program, and he missed out on a chance to reclaim the bronze.

TWO FOR FOUR

Elena Berezhnaya and Anton Sikharulidze are virtually unbeaten in four years at the European Championships -- yet have just two titles to show for it.

They received a 6.0 in the short and won in 1998. They led after the short program in 1999, but had to withdraw the afternoon of the free skating when Berezhnaya caught the flu.

The flu was again the culprit in 2000. They won outright, but had the title taken away when the results of a drug test came through nearly two months later at the World Championships. She was found to have taken a banned substance in a flu remedy, which caused them to give up the title and withdraw from Worlds.

This time, Berezhnaya was careful and they won their second title, although there were questions on their placing

triple Lutz in the long program.

At least she didn't fall.

Butyrskaya finished second despite falling three times between the short and the long -- compared to five times at Russian nationals.

Her triple toe loop-half loop-triple Salchow was shaky, but it was the only one attempted in the competition.

Volchkova talked about one.

"Without a triple-triple combination, it would be very difficult to win a medal at the World Championships," she said.

A good short program was more than enough to put Volchkova in contention for the bronze, which she held with a lackluster free skate.

Although the Russians struggled, they still were ahead of the rest.

"There is a lot more pressure at the Russian championships," said Volchkova.

The best of the rest included Elena Liashenko of Ukraine, who has been between third and seventh since 1995.

Sarah Meier, the 16-year-old Swiss, was consistent in all three phases to gain fifth. Julia Sebestyen of Hungary had the third-best free skate with six triples, but her 11th-place finish in the short spelled doom.

FOUR, FOUR, FOUR, FOUR

Over the past four years, it has been simple. Alexei Yagudin and Evgeny Plushenko each won two golds and two silvers. There has been a different third-place winner in each of the four years.

Yagudin has completed quads in each of the last four years. The two Russians completed four quads between them in

after she fell in the short program.

Their Chaplin-esque routine in the long was charming enough for the judges and they won.

In second was a Russian pair as expected, but not the usual one. Tatiana Totmianina and Maxim Marinin overcame their own problems to give one of those once-in-a-career performances.

They split with their coach three weeks earlier after Russian nationals and practiced without one in Bratislava. They still produced what they called their best skating ever.

"It's possible that our skating had something to do with that," Marinin said. "There was no pressure. Our job was to show what we are capable of,"

Sarah Abitbol and Stephane Bernadis of France won their fifth bronze medal, including the one from moving up from fourth a year ago when Berezhnaya and Sikharulidze lost their title.

Their only mistake was a slight touch-down by Abitbol on a throw move. That was good enough to beat the defending World and European champions, Maria Petrova and Alexei Tikhonov.

But in this pairs competition, if you beat one Russian pair, another will rise up for the challenge. That's exactly what Totmianina and Marinin did with their routine to "West Side Story."

"They skated like in a dream and that doesn't happen too often in a career," Bernadis said.

Nor does winning five bronze medals.

AFTER THE FALL

The rise of the Italians and the fall of the French was not only at this competition.

Throughout the Grand Prix season, the French World champions, Marina Anissina and Gwendal Peizerat, were vulnerable, losing a few first-place votes here, dropping an original dance there. They have tinkered with their program throughout the season.

When they lost the original dance at the 2000 World Championships with an obvious stumble, it was the first time they lost a portion of a competition all year. It forced them to come from second place to beat Italians Barbara Fusar-Poli and Maurizio Margaglio.

This event was the teams' first head-to-head battle of the season, and they split the opening compulsory dances. Then came the stunner -- the Italians earned a 6.0 in their snappy version of the original dance to take the lead.

The 6.0 was their first in international competition, but they did receive 24 6.0s at the Italian championship.

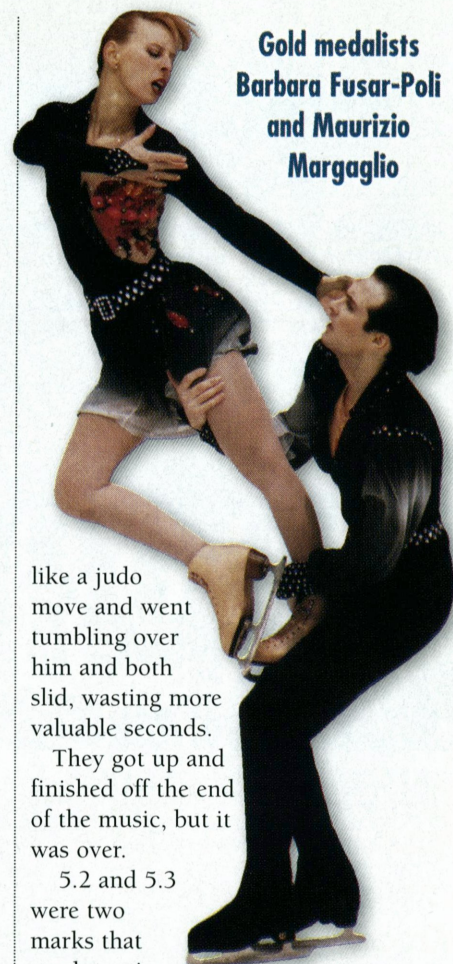
The free dance was wide open.

The Italians, to music from the movie version of "Romeo and Juliet," skated first in the last group and had to wait.

Two couples later, the French made their big move. As they went into their final moves, there were still speculation as to whether they had done enough.

On a simple move, Peizerat turned and started to fall, helped by Anissina leaning into him. She took him down

like a judo move and went tumbling over him and both slid, wasting more valuable seconds.

They got up and finished off the end of the music, but it was over.

5.2 and 5.3 were two marks that stuck out in the first set as they sat stunned in the kiss-and-cry area.

"It's a great lesson for us to understand the value of 10 seconds in life and the value of a few centimeters," Peizerat said after the free dance.

"This is sport. There are victories and there are mistakes," Margaglio said.

"Ice dancers rarely fall, but if they fall, they fall heavily," said Ilia Averbukh, who knows something of falling in the standings and coming back.

Averbukh and Irina Lobacheva edged Lithuanians Margarita Drobiazko and Povilas Vanagas for third.

Last year, the positions were reversed and it was the first time that a Soviet or Russian did not win a medal in ice dance since 1968.

Now the Russians are back on the podium, although they were never really away. Tatiana Tarasova coaches the Italians, and Anissina and Averbukh were together as juniors back in the old U.S.S.R.

The more things change, the more they stay the same.

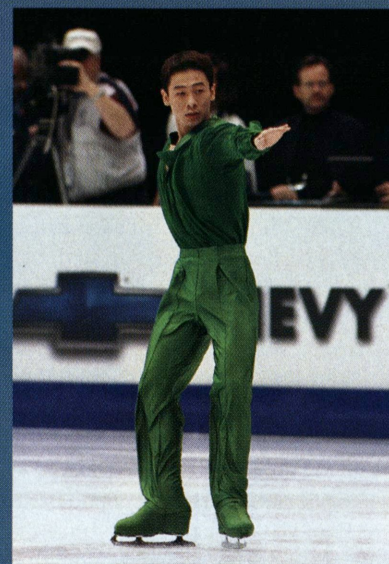

Salt Lake Saga

U.S. skaters won medals in every discipline at the 2001 Four Continents Championships in Salt Lake City, Utah. The competition served as a test event for the Olympic figure skating competition next year, and many athletes had their first tastes of what the arena and atmosphere will be like in February 2002.

With exactly one year to go before the curtain opens and Salt Lake City assumes its central place on the world stage, the international figure skating community took advantage of a sneak peek at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games as it gathered for the 2001 Four Continents Championships, Feb. 7-10, at Salt Lake City's Delta Center.

And, by the end of the official test event, the Salt Lake Organizing Committee, its volunteers and the Olympic ice were receiving rave reviews from the competitors and International Skating Union judges and officials alike.

"We have really enjoyed skating here," Canadian pairs competitor Jamie Salé said following the free skate. "Since the first day we got here, the practice rink, the atmosphere, the ice (at the Delta Center) has been great. It's very positive for us knowing that the Olympics are here next year."

The 2001 Four Continents Championships allowed organizers and volunteers to test their programs outside the glare of the blinding spotlight they'll face in a year. The event also provided an opportunity for the 110 skaters representing 13 countries of North America, Asia, Africa and Australia to work some kinks out of their programs before the all-important 2001 World Championships, March 18-25, in Vancouver, B.C., Canada.

For some, it was a chance to put disappointing performances at their recent national championships behind them. For others, Four Continents simply introduced one more hurdle -- either physical, mental or both -- that the athletes would have to overcome before Worlds and their final year-long stretch to the Olympics.

Perhaps in no discipline was the dichotomy more evident than in the men's competition.

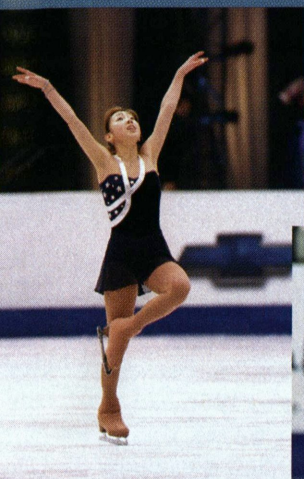
With reigning U.S. champion Timothy Goebel opting out of Four Continents to focus on the Grand Prix Final one week later in Tokyo, U.S. hopes for a first-ever men's medal in these intercontinental championships rested with Todd Eldredge, Michael Weiss and 2001 U.S. Championships bronze medalist Matt Savoie. Rounding out the international field of medal hopefuls were China's Chengjiang Li -- silver medalist in both of the previous Four Continents Championships -- and 1999 Four Continents champion Takeshi Honda of Japan.

The much-anticipated showdown between Eldredge and Weiss never really developed from the outset, as Weiss bailed out on his opening quad in the short program and two-footed a landing on his subsequent triple-triple combination. With Li and Honda also registering miscues in their performances, Eldredge took advantage of skating last by opting not to risk a quad attempt and instead opening with a triple flip-triple toe combination en route to a clean performance and a first-place standing.

"If everyone else had skated great, then I probably would have had to try it (the quad toe-double toe combination). It worked out," the five-time U.S. champion said. "That's what sports is all about. It's strategic. You don't have to go out there and kill yourself just to prove a point...you go out there to win."

What Eldredge failed to let on at that point was that another facet of sport -- injury -- had befallen him during a practice session earlier that day. The injury to his left ankle, which he later said he jammed during a landing on a jump, would force his withdrawal from the competition immediately following his warm-up for the free skate.

"I worked with the doctor today and did some different things," Eldredge said following his withdrawal. "Nothing



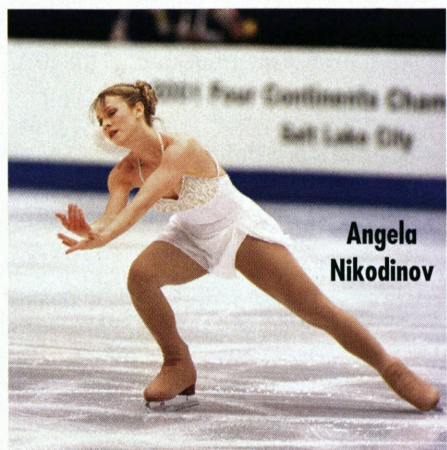

seemed to really make it feel good enough to go out and compete to the ability that I should be able to. It's very disappointing. Before the injury, things were going well."

Following subsequent evaluations in Salt Lake City, Eldredge announced that he would not compete in the Grand Prix Final in Tokyo in hopes of recovering fully for Worlds in March.

With the frontrunner out, the ensuing quadfest in the men's free skate opened the top spot for jumping sensation Li, who nailed a quad Salchow and quad toe loop-triple toe loop combination in his free skate. It also afforded Weiss, who delivered a solid, but not flawless free skate, a spot on the platform in the bronze medal position. Honda, while failing to deliver on a quad, did manage six clean triples to finish with the silver medal.

Li's win represented the first-ever by a

Chinese man in an ISU Championship.

"I'm very happy and I'm very proud," said the 21-year-old Li, whose childhood neighbor and friend was World Champion and two-time Olympic bronze medalist Lu Chen. "I think it is strongly associated with my previous training program."

The Asian dominance was no less prevalent in the ladies competition. Japanese national champion Fumie Suguri and compatriots Shizuka Arakawa and Yoshie Onda took aim at the top of the standings in an error-plagued short program and nabbed second, third and fifth places, respectively.

Uzbekistan's Tatiana Malinina, the only competitor from the ladies field to qualify for the Grand Prix Final, stood atop the rankings heading into the free skate, while the United States' Jennifer Kirk managed a solid fourth-place standing. Miscues in the short resulted in a seventh-place standing for returning Four Continents champion Angela Nikodinov, and a ninth-place position for 1999 Four Continents silver medalist Amber Corwin.

The free skate provided plenty of

movement in the standings as Malinina failed to seal the deal with a tentative performance that opened the door for Suguri and others. Nikodinov, whose tremendous performance two weeks prior at the U.S. Championships had admittedly impacted her preparation for this event, awoke in the free skate with her rendition of "Sleeping Beauty" and made a monumental leap from seventh to second in the final standings. The jump even caught Nikodinov off-guard.

"I had my stuff packed to go back to the hotel," Nikodinov said. "I thought maybe I had gotten fourth or fifth. When I saw that I had placed second, I thought it was a mistake. It was a big surprise. A nice surprise, but a big surprise."

As impressive as Nikodinov's rebound, however, was Suguri's speed, composure and artistry in her free skate to music from "The Planets," which was clearly the class of the field.

"I really wanted to do my best here," Suguri said. "Today, my program was not 100 percent. It was maybe 80 or 90 percent. There are a lot of things for me to do before Worlds, especially the artistic part."

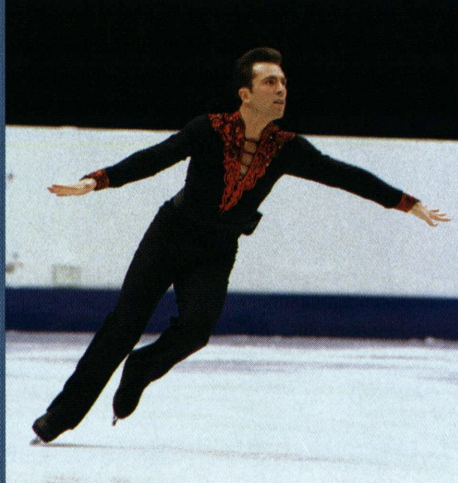
Michael Weiss overcame a disappointing short program to capture the bronze medal. He was the top U.S. men's finisher at the event. Matt Savoie was fourth.

Suguri further revealed that she continues to skate through pain caused by ligament damage in both of her ankles. The surgery that is required to correct the problem, however, necessitates a six-month recovery period that she says she and her doctors have agreed to forego until after the Olympic Games.

"My doctor and I talked and we decided this was a very important season in preparation for the Olympics," the 20-year-old Suguri said. "We decided on training to make the ankles stronger."

Onda, 18, delivered a technically sound program -- including seven clean triples -- but the presentation failed to impress a majority of the judges and she settled for the bronze.

While the singles competitions featured a great deal of movement within the standings from portion to portion, the pairs and dance fields established a clear pecking order that remained rela-



tively unchanged throughout all phases of the event.

In the pairs, Canadians Jamie Salé and David Pelletier continued their recent dominance of international ice -- which included wins this season at Skate America, Skate Canada and a second-place finish at Trophee Lalique -- with a solid short program that edged out Chinese standouts Xue Shen and Hongbo Zhao.

Shen and Zhao were delayed nearly 20 minutes from skating in the short due to an impromptu ice resurfacing made necessary when the dress of a previous skater was damaged -- spreading sequins across the ice.

"Our nationals was so-so," Pelletier said. "So, we just wanted to come in and do it better than we did two weeks ago and feel more comfortable skating. I think we accomplished that."

Americans Kyoko Ina and John Zimmerman agreed that they approached the short program with a great deal more intensity than they did two weeks earlier in Boston.

"We're perfectionists and little things just annoy us so much," Ina said. "Aside from our little quirks with it, it felt great."

The pair took a third-place standing into the free skate, while fellow Americans Tiffany Scott and Philip Dulebohn and Danielle and Steve Hartsell weighed in at fifth and seventh, respectively.

The pairs free skate featured the only perfect mark of the competition. Salé and Pelletier garnered a 6.0 for presentation in their flawless performance to Wagner's "Tristan and Isolde" to clinch their second straight Four Continents title.

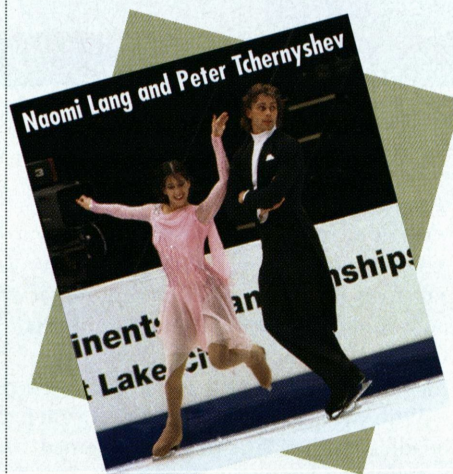
"Our long program felt really amazing," Pelletier said. "Two weeks ago at nationals, it didn't really feel good. We wanted to do a much, much better thing here -- to feel more relaxed and not feel the pressure of winning. Skating to win is not fun, but skating to enjoy it is...that's what we focused on today and we really enjoyed it."

Shen and Zhao captured the silver, followed by Ina and Zimmerman with the bronze. Scott and Dulebohn remained in fifth, while the Hartsells were ninth.

The Canadian medal haul at Four Continents also included the gold medal contribution of the veteran ice dancing duo Shae-Lynn Bourne and Victor Kraatz, who managed a clean sweep of the first-place ordinals in all phases of the dance competition.

Americans Naomi Lang and Peter Tchernyshev danced to a second-place finish after the Westminster Waltz and Silver Samba compulsory dances. They maintained that position throughout the final two phases to earn their third straight Four Continents medal.

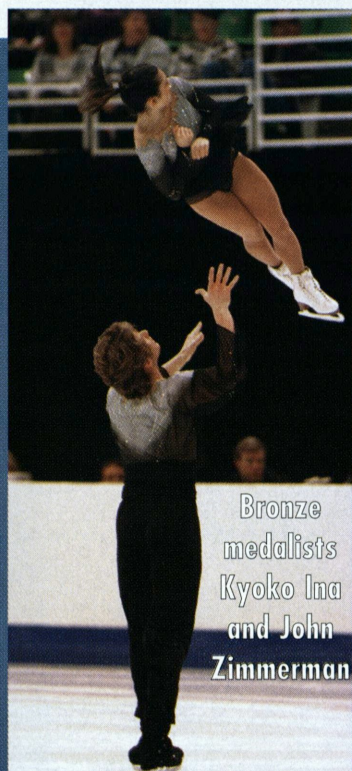
This Four Continents Championship was particularly rewarding for Tchernyshev, who not only turned 30 the day



before competition began, but was also competing in his first international competition as a U.S. citizen. His citizenship closed out an eight-year application process and cleared the way for he and Lang to compete for the U.S. in next year's Olympics.

"Actually it is a little different (competing for the first time as a U.S. citizen)," the St. Petersburg-born Tchernyshev said following the compulsory dances. "When we came out for the first warm-up, I could see ourselves actually competing here a year from now in the same rink representing the United States at the Olympics. Before getting my citizenship, I could not even imagine that."

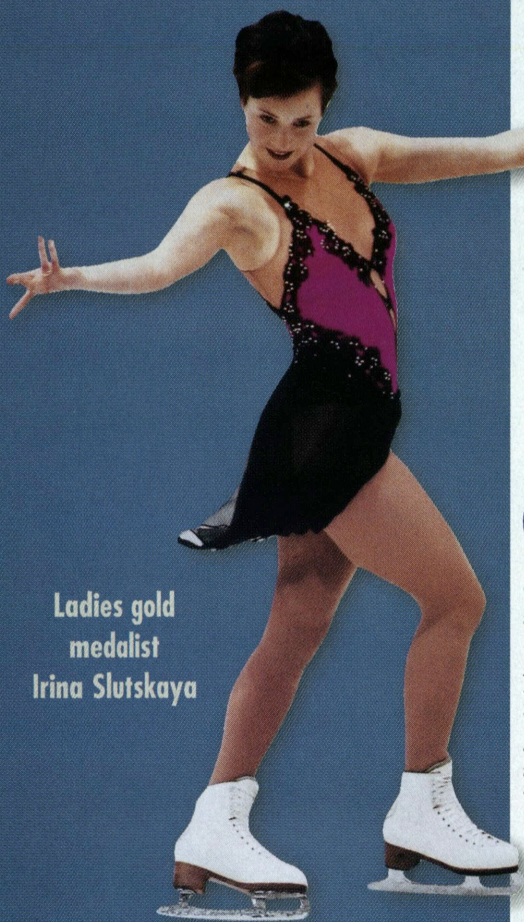

Grand Prix Gold

Irina Slutskaya and Evgeny Plushenko won their second consecutive ISU Grand Prix Final gold medals, while Italian dancers Barbara Fusar-Poli and Maurizio Margaglio took advantage of the absence of their top rivals to claim their first GP Final victory. The European hold on the four titles was broken by the magic touch of Canadian pairs skaters Jamie Salé and David Pelletier. The real story, however, was once again the grueling schedule endured by the competitors in the event's uncommon format.

Given the conditions -- the jet lag, the brutal schedule, the icy rink, the different format -- the winners of this Grand Prix Final should have an asterisk, or an oxygen mask, attached.

However, out of the mouth of the youngest competitor -- 15-year-old Sarah Hughes -- oft times come skating gems: "When I skate, the judges and audience don't care if I'm tired or cold. They are just judging what I do."

Added Maria Petrova, "Even when your head is spinning you still have to skate."

And three-time World champion Alexei Yagudin said, "This is sport and you have to go by the rules and do your best all the time."

So Irina Slutskaya and Evgeny Plushenko's victories over World champions Michelle Kwan and Yagudin shouldn't be cast off so easily, no matter what the conditions. The same for the winners in pairs, Canadians Jamie Salé and David Pelletier.

In three of the so-called "Super Finals," it was the best of the year against each other. And the \$50,000 prize and \$10,000 participation bonus were deserved for the winners.

The ice dance victory by Barbara Fusar-Poli and Maurizio Margaglio may have been tainted by the absence of the French World champions, Marina Anissina and Gwendal Peizerat. But as Margaglio said, "It's not our problem. It's their problem."

The rules here were, of course, different from the 1999 and even 2000 GP Finals. They were also different from the individual Grand Prix events and the major championships, with qualifying rounds and then days off.

The need for different programs made most skaters scramble. Kwan was one of the few that came out with a new

routine and experimented with it while looking toward the real thing -- the World Championships.

Still, when the results are looked at years from now, it will be hard to separate Slutskaya's victory this year from the rest of her victories. The same goes for Kwan and Yagudin's losses, despite the schedule which was packed into 48 hours.

The women suffered the most -- two long programs within six hours on the second day -- leaving many scratching their heads as to what the organizers' motives were in arranging the schedule.

"No system is perfect. No person is perfect," Yagudin said.

Everyone was not perfect. Those that made the fewest mistakes won.

Whether the next Grand Prix Final, scheduled for two months before the Olympics, is another endurance test or a real preview of the Olympics -- as it was when Ilia Kulik and Tara Lipinski won in December 1997 -- remains to be seen.

THE FIRST DAY

The days blurred with the jet lag of more than 12 hours for the Americans, American-based Russians, and those that flew in from the Four Continents Championships in Utah.

Skaters came in as late as Tuesday night for competition beginning barely two days later -- difficult to adjust to under normal circumstances, much less skating three programs within 48 hours. Yet the short programs on the first day -- Friday to some -- allowed for the only day of really top skating.

The ice dancers started things off and the Italians gave two indications -- 1) on the ice, they were not to be beaten as they scored straight 5.9s for the second mark in the original dance; and 2) off the ice, they started the chorus of jet lag

and fatigue comments that echoed throughout the weekend.

The men were next, getting a veritable gift by the schedule makers. They went on second and would be the last to compete their free skates -- almost two days later.

So Plushenko and Yagudin continued their battle under moderately good circumstances. Yagudin gained the early edge in the short program as his presentation marks were just enough to offset Plushenko's technical advantage. The judges' marks were 4-3 for Yagudin.

The quadruple-triple combination that both have has replaced the triple Axel-triple toe loop combination, and it showed the widening gap between them and the rest.

With Todd Eldredge withdrawing because of the ankle injury suffered at Four Continents and Tim Goebel falling twice, it was up to Matt Savoie to hold up the American hopes.

He held up well with a clean short program that included four different triple jumps.

The pairs short program went to Russians Elena Berezhnaya and Anton Sikharulidze deservedly, although Salé and Pelletier were favored by two of seven judges.

The women were the last to compete, knowing that less than 16 hours later they had to compete again -- and again.

The two best were at extreme ends of the group -- Kwan led off and Slutskaya finished -- just as they did at last year's World Championships. Both skated well. The determining factor was probably Slutskaya's double loop at the end of her combination, compared to Kwan's double toe loop.

Everyone else behind them made mistakes as a prelude to the next day.

THE LONGEST DAY

The women and ice dancers had to compete twice on the second day, though the women had it worse. They were the last to skate on Friday night, had early morning practice on Saturday and were competing again just after noon.

Again, Slutskaya performed better than Kwan. Neither skater was clean, but both held up well considering the fatigue was starting to creep in.

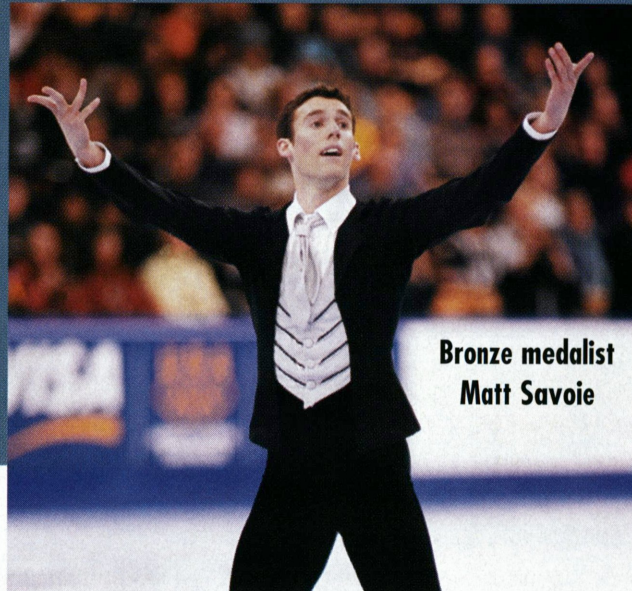
Hughes was in fifth place following a poor short program. However, she recovered to move up to third with a program that included her first triple-triple of the day.

Kwan's triple-triple attempt wasn't smooth and she doubled down two jumps. Slutskaya had her problems too, but she won again, this time with just a slim 4-3 decision.

Despite the mistakes, this was more significant than the later battle as both used their competition routines from this season -- Kwan with "Song of the Black Swan" and Slutskaya's "Don Quixote."

The men and the pairs went on to their second programs with the comfort that they would get almost a day of rest until they competed again.

The Canadians came out on top in pairs this time by a one-judge margin over the Russians. Although Xue Shen and Hongbo Zhao of China were in third, their impressive techni-

cal elements -- the height and distance on the throw moves -- drew gasps from the crowd. Still, the 5.7s for presentation hurt their chances to move up.

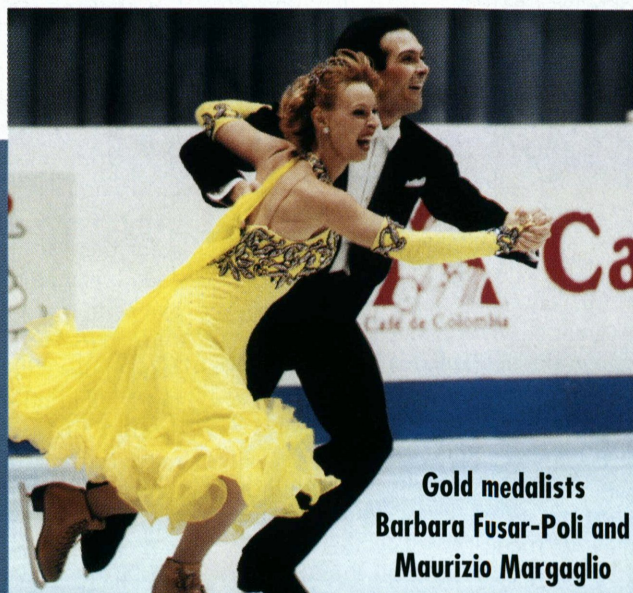
Contrary to the women, the men opted for old routines, saving their best for the next day. Plushenko gained the advantage, using last year's program to Russian folk music. He landed his quad-triple-double combination while Yagudin had to step out of his quad-triple in his two-year-old "Lawrence of Arabia" program.

The Americans were having their own duel and Savoie was winning without a quad. His seven triples kept him in third while Goebel went one-for-two on his quad attempts and remained in fifth.

The ice dance final went to the Italians as expected. With this year's routine set to "Romeo and Juliet," they earned a 6.0 from the Italian judge and an easy victory over Russians Irina Lobacheva and Ilia Averbukh.

The third-place battle was interesting. Lithuanians Margarita Drobiazko and Povilas Vanagas lost their third-place standing in the earlier round when she stumbled to her knees during a step sequence. But, they came back to grab the bronze by a 4-3 margin over Israel's Galit Chait and Sergei Sakhnovsky.

Although only one Russian couple was in the top four, there

Kwan once again scored high marks with her "East of Eden" program. She also debuted a new program to "Miraculous Mandarin." She won the silver medal after missing jumps in both long programs.

were Russian influences aplenty. Tatiana Tarasova works with the Italians and the Israelis. Drobiazko and Sakhnovsky are Moscow-born -- as is the missing Anissina.

Margaglio, the first of the winners crowned, emphasized how hard it was.

"I think this was the hardest competition we ever did," he said.

Imagine the women having to come back and skate and jump and spin for the second time within six hours.

"I usually practice before I compete," said Hughes. "Today, I didn't."

With another triple-triple combination, she easily held on for third over former World champion Maria Butyrskaya -- at 28 nearly twice as old as Hughes.

Then came Kwan vs. Slutskaya III.

Kwan took a calculated risk. She unveiled a new program -- Bartok's "Miraculous Mandarin." As if the jet lag and the fatigue weren't enough, Kwan had to deal with a new program.

"It was difficult mentally with the new program," she said. "I have had it for two weeks. I was not familiar with it and that made me a little nervous."

Kwan two-footed the second part of the triple-triple combination, doubled the loop and singled the Axel. Still, she was positive about the program.

"I wanted to get some feedback on it," Kwan said. "I still haven't decided which I will use at Worlds."

Slutskaya chose last year's Carmen program. She beat Kwan for the third time in the third different way -- skating well in the short program, using this year's routine in the second part and then a fatiguing third program.

"It was hard," said Slutskaya. "But when you are on the ice, you don't think about it. You just try to skate well."

She went after her triple Lutz-triple

loop combination. She got around on the second part, but went down and laughed about it.

"There is nothing you can do," she said. "You fall and you have to go on."

She took six judges against Kwan's one. Many looked for extra meaning in Slutskaya's domination of Kwan -- it was the fourth time they met this season and Slutskaya's third victory.

But Slutskaya said it best: "We are all competitors. Sometimes she wins. Sometimes I win. That is life."

THE LAST DAY

Despite the extra rest, the pairs had it tough. They not only had the spins and jumps, but also the lifts and throws.

Salé and Pelletier won the title by dusting off last year's "Love Story." They even had an advantage there over the Russians. The Canadians used it at last year's Worlds while the Russians never got a chance to use the Tchaikovsky "Sentimental Waltz" piece in Nice.

No wonder Sikharulidze was not a fan of the recycling system.

"It is a new year. There should be new programs," he said. He explained it is not just getting music and putting some moves on it. It needs some feeling, as shown in the Chaplin piece they are using this season.

Both pairs looked tired and the blank expressions at the end of their routines showed it. The Canadians won, but it seemed like a hollow victory with falls, missed lifts and single jumps in evidence.

Silver medalist Sikharulidze was even too tired to participate in the inevitable look-ahead to the Worlds question.

"Right now I am thinking about rest and not about the World Championships yet," he said.

It was left for the men to salvage some pride for these tired championships. The intense rivalry between Yagudin and Plushenko pushes them in more than just skating. The showdown was even compared to the grand finale of a Sumo tournament by the Japanese announcer.

Yagudin was the one pushed out of the ring on this occasion, but not by much. Plushenko opened with his quad-triple-double, then he added a quad-triple and five more triples -- the fifth time this season he has done two quads in his program to a series of cuts from movie soundtracks.

Yagudin followed. Although tired, his only mistake was stepping out of the second quad. He started with a quad-triple, finished with eight triples and lost. Still he had two judges voting for him and his "Gladiator" routine.

Savoie, consistent again and without a quad, finished third, but in reality there was a huge gap between him and the top two. Goebel missed his first two quad attempts and backed off his third, placing fifth.

Plushenko has landed almost 20 quads this season in competition. Yagudin has been doing them in major competition since 1997 and was working on a quad Salchow at practice despite the fatigue.

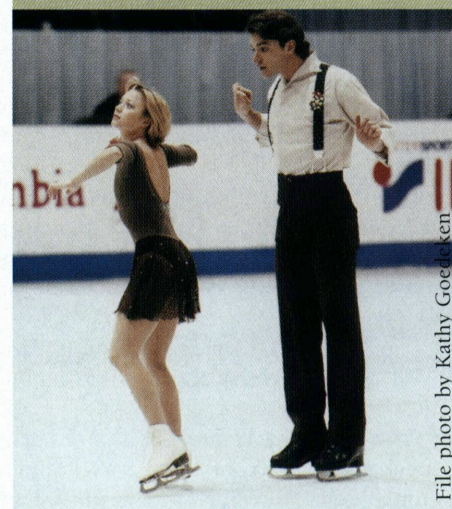
"We are both pushing each other. He has a step forward and I have to do the same," Yagudin said. "That's why we progress so much."

Their rivalry has pushed the technical qualities of skating into the new century.

Now if only the Grand Prix organizers follow with some decent scheduling.

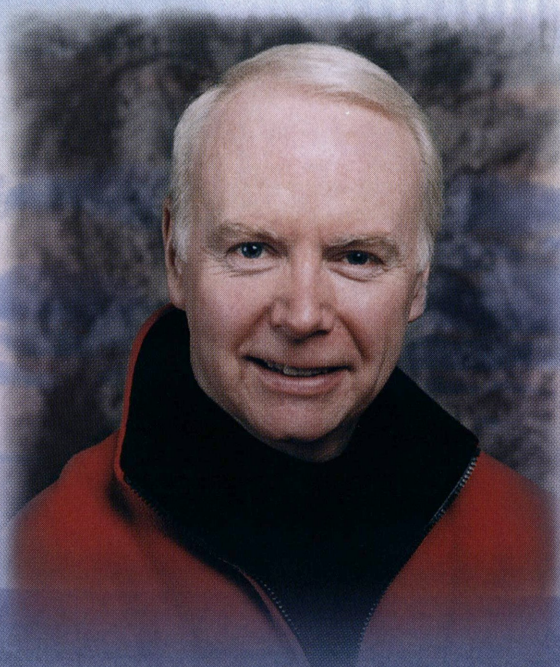

Lace 'em up!

Having a problem with your skates or boots? Can't find the answers? Well, you now have a source to turn to! Mr. Edge is here to answer all your questions. With many, many and many more years of experience and a never-ending resource list, he can help you solve your boot, blade and foot problems.



Greetings skating fans!!! It's springtime in the mountains. At least I think it is. With all the snow up here I can hardly tell. What a great year it's been for skiing and snowboarding. Maybe next year I'll get myself a deck and try my luck at boarding. Colorado sure is nice this time of year.

Well, it's that time again...time to "Ask Mr. Edge!" Your questions just keep getting better and better with every issue.

So many of you have asked how often skates should be sharpened and which is the best hollow to use. We talked about it last month, but it's so important that I'm going to go over it again!

How often your skates need to be sharpened and which hollow to use depends upon the following:

1. How hard or soft is the ice you skate on
2. How many hours a week you skate
3. Are you also doing dance and/or edge classes
4. How good your skate sharpener is (most important)

Example: If you are skating 10 hours a week, just doing freestyle, the ice conditions are average, and you have a very good skate sharpener, then you should need to have your skates sharpened about every six weeks.

If the ice is very hard and you have a good skate sharpener, then about every four weeks.

If your skate sharpener is only so-so, not matter how good, bad or indifferent the ice conditions are, you may be having to sharpen your skates every two-

three weeks.

If you are only doing freestyle, a 1/2" hollow in most cases is fine. This may change slightly pending ice conditions and weight of the skater.

For dance and very difficult edge work, a slightly deeper hollow is preferred. I would try around 7/16" or slightly deeper. The deeper hollow will allow for better edge bite into the ice.

Now that I've explained that little ditty, let's move on to more serious work.

Q: I'm an intermediate freestyle skater and after this upcoming competition, I will have new blades put on my boots. I now have Coronation Ace blades and will be moving up to Pattern 99. I'm kind of nervous about tripping because of the big toe pick, but I'm also nervous because they're expensive and I want to keep them in good shape. Could you give me some tips so my blades stay nice? I want them to last for a long time. St. Cloud, Minn.

Mr. Edge: No need to worry yourself about making the transition from one blade to the next. Going from Coronation Ace to Pattern 99 is almost always a natural transition. I've never known any skaters to have problems with these two blades. The average transition time is usually a couple of hours of practice time on the ice. Most problems come from breaking in both new boots and blades at the same time.

To keep your blades nice and clean, try the following:

1. After skating, wipe your blades dry and place them in soakers until the next use.
2. On an as-needed basis, use chrome polish and clean your blades -- no

need to remove them from your skates.

3. Be sure you have them sharpened by an experienced skate technician.

Our last question for this issue receives an award for the best question to date...

Q: I'm doing a project on the career of figure skating coaching. What should a good coach know about his/her skater's equipment? Clarence, N.Y.

Mr. Edge: It would really help if coaches would use the following checklist:

1. Realize that whatever boot they would like their student to be in may not necessarily be the best boot for his/her feet.
2. The fit of the boot should be very snug around the heel and ankle area with very little space between the instep and the side of the boot.
3. There should be very little room for growth lengthwise -- no more than 1/2 size for beginners and no room at all for advanced skaters. This will help reduce the risk of injury to not only the foot, but the knees and hips as well.
4. The arch of the foot should be firmly secured in the boot so it isn't moving or rubbing against the inside

of the boot. If the foot pronates (rolls inward), place an arch support of some sort in the boot.

5. Start your beginning skaters in a softer boot rather than a very stiff one. This will allow skaters to build up their own muscle strength in their ankles, which will aid them as they grow older and require stronger boots. They will find that they will not need as strong a boot as thought. This in itself will prevent many of the injuries that now exist.

6. When breaking in new boots, don't push the student to do his/her regular routine for about one to two weeks. Allow time for the boots to gradually break in. Too much jumping too soon will cause the boots to break down very early on.

7. The soles and heels of the boots should be waterproofed and sealed well enough so they won't dry-rot and cause the screws to start falling out.

8. Blades should be sharpened regularly. How often will depend on ice conditions and how good your skate sharpener is.

9. The choice of blades should be left entirely up to the pro. Most pros would have already skated on various blades throughout their career. They will have a good feeling for what works best for their teaching style.

10. Be sure and check that the student is properly putting on and lacing his/her skates up snugly enough. This will be the easiest way to tell if a skater is growing out of his/her skates or not.

Well folks, so ends another session with Mr. Edge. I'm glad to have been of service once again. Don't forget to keep those e-mails coming. Until next time, this is Mr. Edge saying...Have a nice day!

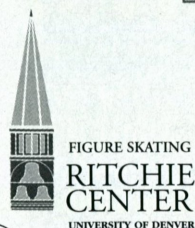

because they want to show improvement in every competition until then.

"Besides," Tchernyshev says with a smile, "we have to make it there first."

That is almost a given. But this pair that has never taken anything for granted isn't about to start now. Down the road, they are hoping to stay together competitively, even if it stretches into 2006.

"We want our fans to know that our long term goals are to stay together after the Olympic Games, maybe even to the next Olympics," Tchernyshev says. "We know we'll still have potential in our skating that we need to discover and explore."

Lang says they are having too much fun and improving so much that they couldn't possibly shut down the on-ice partnership.

"We really are happy," Lang says. "We enjoy skating together. We have our bad days. We're committed as skating partners."

That commitment, and more time, is all that stands between the pair and higher international placings, according to someone who has been there -- Zhulin.

"Absolutely, they have very big potential," Zhulin said. "In Salt Lake City, it's my guess they could be on the podium, though it will be tough because they've only been at this level for three years, and sometimes that's not enough time. But I can tell you definitely I will push them hard, so you never know."

Chevrolet/USFSA Team 2006 is a Big Hit with Novice Athletes

Novice athletes spent some time learning valuable lessons about being a top-notch competitor at the Chevrolet/USFSA Team 2006 seminar, held yearly in conjunction with the U.S. Championships.

This year's U.S. Novice Championships wrapped up with the annual Team 2006 program, a joint effort by Chevrolet and the USFSA designed to enrich and educate America's elite novice-level athletes.

The event took place over a two-day span following the novice competition. All 85 of the event's novice athletes attended this comprehensive seminar series, which provided them with a full range of tools to effectively move into the elite junior and championship competitive levels.

"This program was developed by the Athlete Development Committee," said USFSA Senior Director of Athlete Programs Christy Krall. "Its primary purpose is to provide these athletes with the knowledge they need to climb to the elite figure skating levels."

The Team 2006 program was also offered to the parents and coaches of this year's competitors. According to USFSA officials, this contingent represents an essential component in the overall development of the sport since they provide the primary support system for the individual athletes.

The intensive program addressed a variety of topics, all pertaining to the vital aspects of elite national and international-level figure skating. It featured seminars on media training, off-ice strength and conditioning, sports psychology, nutrition, judges' education and periodization training. The classes were conducted by various acclaimed sports education experts from all over the U.S.

"We want to cover a variety of different topics in order to enrich and motivate the athletes, their families and their coaches," said USFSA Director of Athlete Programs Nicole Stocker.

The program was established in 1997 by USFSA officials and Chevrolet to help refine and develop America's aspiring skating stars. USFSA Athlete Development chair Sharon Wiggins and the PSA have been crucial in helping pull together the outstanding agenda of events and instructors over the years. Many athletes who have participated in this program have gone on to achieve success at the national level. This group includes Sasha Cohen, Benjamin Agosto, Jessica Valentine and Matthew Kossack.

This year's Chevrolet/USFSA Team 2006 program kicked off with a keynote speech by famed Olympic gymnastics coach Bela Karolyi. He cited the importance of hard work and good training, urging the athletes to focus primarily on these elements, rather than only on the competition results.

Karolyi's speech motivated many of the athletes.

"He really inspired me," said Colleen Okolski, who placed fourth in novice pairs with her brother, Ben. "It was amazing to think that someone who has achieved so much in sports as an Olympic coach was there talking to us."

The athletes also participated in extensive off-ice strength and conditioning classes, designed to help increase their technical skills and prevent any injuries.

"The off-ice training has proven to be a key element in the development of the skaters," said Stocker. "In fact, many of the top winners have in-depth off-ice training regimens."

The judges' education seminar was another pivotal learning experience for the members of the Team 2006 program. This forum allowed the skaters, parents and coaches to evaluate various other U.S. Championship events, and provided them with a hands-on perspective of the complex judging process.

"The judges' education class is important," said Krall. "It helps give this group the whole focus of the competition from the judge's role. It helps make them understand how credible the judges are."

The program also helped build strong relationships among this year's competitors. At the program's conclusion, many of the skaters were seen exchanging e-mail addresses and telephone numbers with one another.

"There was a lot of camaraderie among all of the athletes -- it was a great atmosphere," said Stocker. "I think many of them will have a bond and friendship that lasts for a long time."

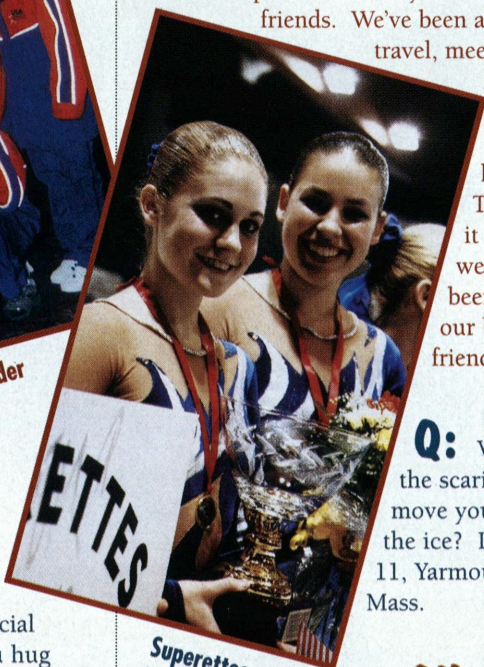
We talk constantly about anything that pops into our heads. But, when we compete we all focus on the same goals and what we can bring to the performance.

Q: How do you feel about missing the national competition and a chance to win a gold medal by going to the World Junior competition? Stacy, 15, Boston, Mass.

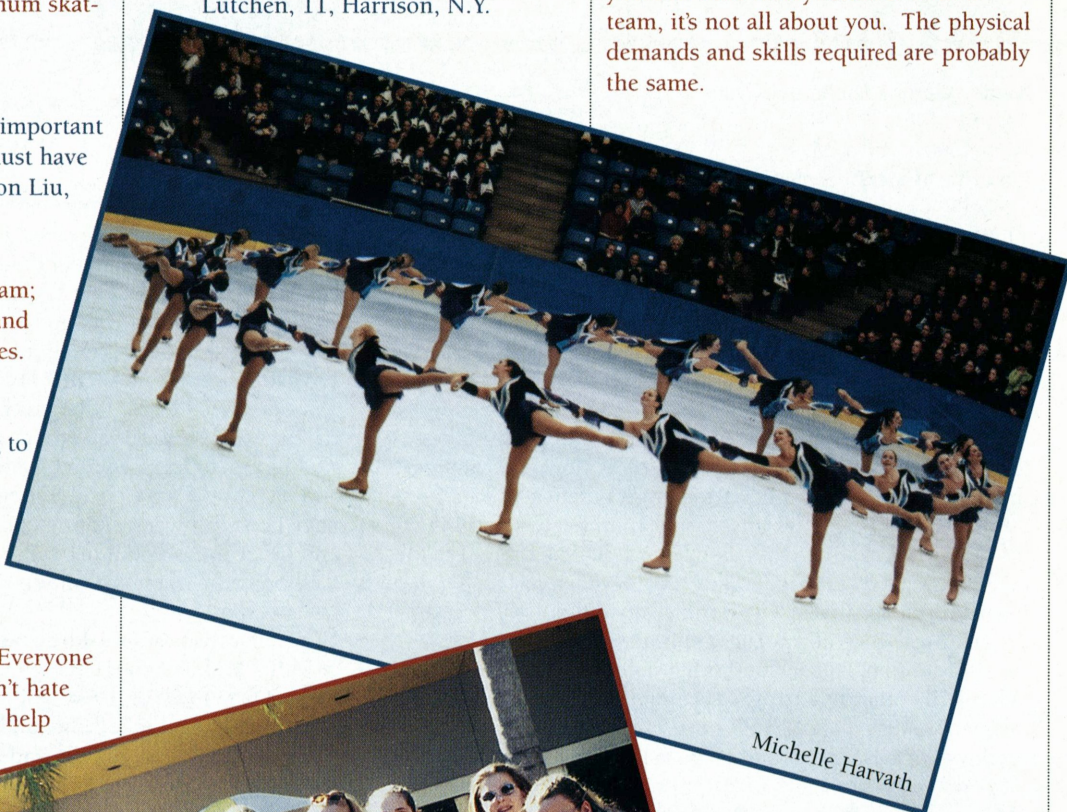
SU: We are very honored to represent the U.S. at Junior Worlds, but we are a little sad not to be going to nationals. We always enjoy competing with the best teams in

Hometown: Millis, Mass.

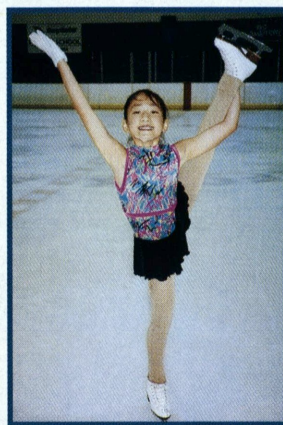

such as your goal for the year, the month and even each practice session. It has also taught me how to use my time efficiently.

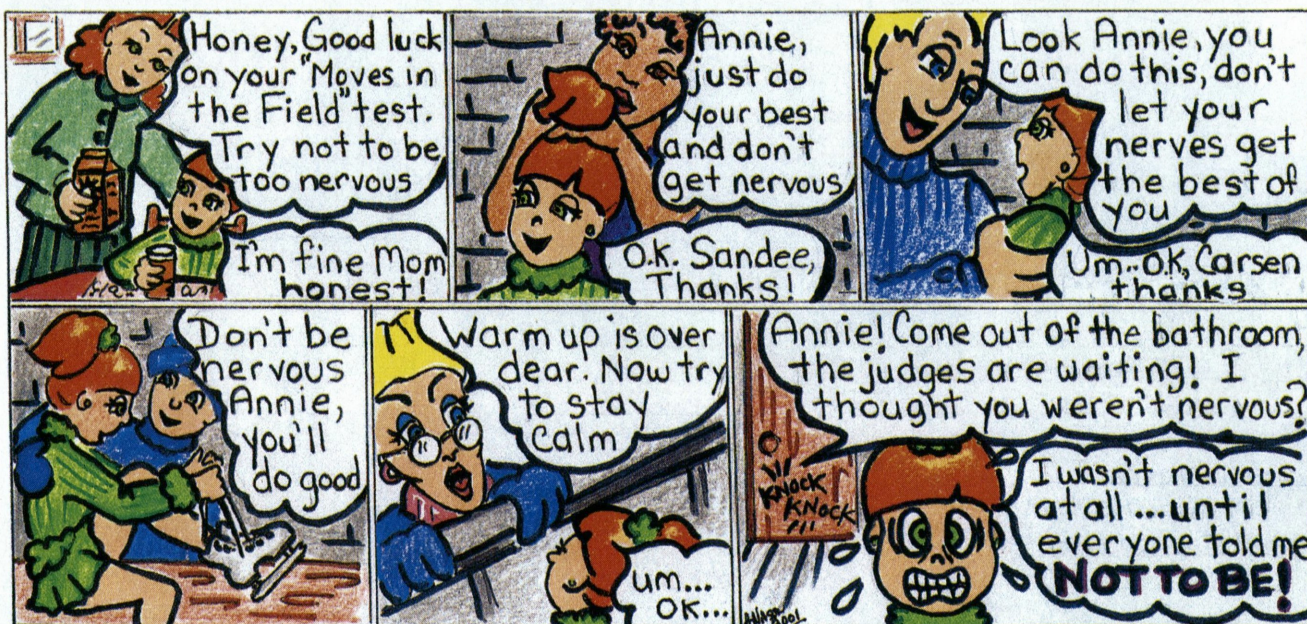
Goals: My goal in skating is going to nationals, Worlds and the Olympics. I also want to go to college and become a software engineer just like my dad because I am very good at computers.

Come Skate with U.S.

Skate With U.S. instructors are often the first link young skaters have to the USFSA. These instructors encourage skaters to have fun, and in some cases, move up the ladder of skating success. However, in order to give new skaters the best training possible, Skate With U.S. instructors must be qualified, knowledgeable and always willing to learn new techniques. In this month's issue, SKATING pays tribute to the teachers and gives some useful tips to help make instructors as qualified as possible.

A Tribute to our Teachers

Basic Skills group lesson instructors are perhaps some of the most influential people for skating programs and for the sport of figure skating. They are introducing the sport to the future generation of skaters, judges, officials and fans. They are the first impression this future generation will have with the sport of figure skating. Their enthusiasm and demeanor can encourage future skaters to continue signing up for more classes and develop a life-long bond with the sport we all have grown to love. Enrollment in the Chevrolet/USFSA Skate With U.S. Basic Skills Program is higher than ever and it's time to thank the skating directors and instructors for a job well done!

A strong Skate With U.S. program is made up of 3-25 staff instructors, depending on the size of the skating school. Each program should employ a wide range of talent, i.e. full-time competitive coaches, recreational instructors, junior instructors and program assistants to serve the needs of the customer base. Most importantly, the staff must be well-trained and teach quality skating techniques. A good skating instructor must be knowledgeable about the sport, enjoy people, keep skaters enthusiastic about learning and have a positive approach to teaching.

Skate With U.S. instructors wear many different hats when on the job for the USFSA. Not only are they promoting the sport by teaching skating

skills, they are also teaching life lessons such as winning and losing, the value of hard work, practice makes perfect, getting along with others and having fun. During one session of group lessons, teachers demonstrate skating elements, evaluate abilities, check equipment, play games, wipe tears, act as a positive role model, conference with parents, encourage skaters to try a little harder and praise them when they do.

A good instructor is always looking for ways to improve his/her coaching abilities. There are many resources available for skating instructors to become effective teachers. To become a good instructor, one must be willing to learn all the time. The Professional Skaters Association (PSA) provides coaches training and certification programs that have been designated as the accepted USFSA coaching programs under the United States Olympic Committee requirements. The PSA provides a number of opportunities throughout the year for coaches to improve their knowledge of coaching and gain new coaching techniques.

Other great resources to gain knowledge about the overall profession of teaching skating include observing private and group lessons under a variety of coaches and instructors; taking local college courses on education, psychology and communication; and learning from pre-school and kindergarten teachers, local libraries and small business schools. Different opportunities to expand a coach's knowledge may be available in each local community.

Basic Skills workshops like the one shown below help instructors learn important techniques for teaching young skaters.

Tips for Great Group Lessons

- ◆ Keep skaters moving! It keeps them interested and warm.
- ◆ Give short, precise instruction.
- ◆ Break down skills into smaller, easier steps for skaters to master.
- ◆ Use positive feedback -- "Great job, good effort, keep trying!"
- ◆ Deal with discipline issues immediately and tactfully.
- ◆ Be organized! Have a plan for the lesson time and entire session.
- ◆ Know what you are teaching.
- ◆ Give rewards immediately -- badge and report card after evaluation, stickers after lessons, certificates for participation, congratulations and smiles!
- ◆ Have fun!

The USFSA will be hosting five Basic Skills Instructor Workshops this summer. We have targeted high growth areas such as the Detroit metro area, Dallas area, Atlanta, Stamford, Conn., and Salt Lake City. All workshops will be held during the months of July-September to get ready for the new season. Topics will include teaching techniques, teaching tips, testing standards, customer service, marketing, promotion, safety and communication with skaters and parents. PSA credit will be given for participation in these workshops. Please consult USFSA Headquarters and upcoming editions of SKATING for more information on the dates and locations of these workshops.

Grow Your Own Instructors

Every rink is faced with the challenge of hiring qualified skating instructors. With the flood of younger skaters entering the teaching field each year, the challenge for every rink is to ensure that these new instructors are able to teach effectively. One solution is to use the Professional Skaters Association (PSA) Apprentice Program, which is an established program that can be customized to the various disciplines of figure skating.

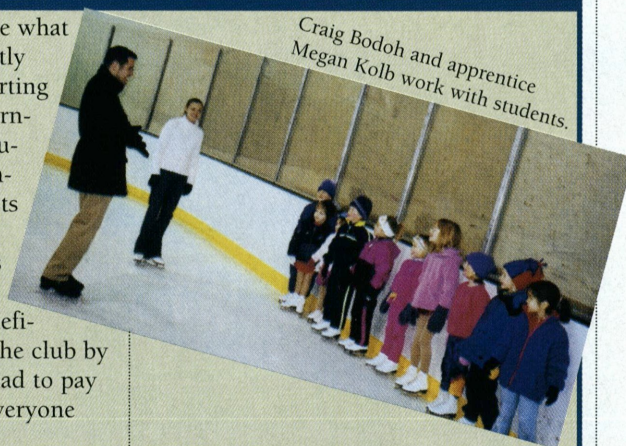
The PSA Apprentice Program is designed so that a Master Rated coach mentors a less experienced coach. Most applications of this program have been targeted to the private lesson arena. The Kettle Moraine Figure Skating Club (KMFSC) in West Bend, Wisc., utilized the apprentice program this season to grow its own instructors by inviting two accomplished young skaters to participate in the apprentice program. In looking at the requirements of the program, the club decided to use actual group lesson time as the training ground for these new apprentice coaches. The new instructors observed me teaching classes and I observed the apprentices teaching their own classes. In addition to on-ice observation and instruction, we included off-ice class time after each on-ice session to discuss what had been covered. This was also supplemented with videotapes such as the USFSA Basic Skills tape, a PSA video on group lesson instruction and the Gus Lussi skating technique video.

Since this was the first time I had

acted as a mentor, I wasn't sure what to expect. I have been pleasantly surprised. In addition to imparting knowledge, I found myself learning many things from these students. It has truly been a learning experience for all. The costs for the program have been borne by both the participants and the figure skating club. This partnership has been beneficial to both the students and the club by reducing the cost each party had to pay and ensuring ownership for everyone involved.

Some practical suggestions to make this program work for you:

- ◆ PSA requires 30 hours of program participation before the certificate is awarded. Track the hours using a separate column for each participant.
- ◆ Be very clear on what the end product is going to be. The domain of group instruction is very large and the program can easily be sidetracked.
- ◆ As a benefit of having part of the apprentice program paid for by the club, ask for a commitment of service back to the club with an agreed upon amount of time.
- ◆ Treat the participants with respect. Yes, they may be inexperienced, but they also have a wealth of knowledge from their skating backgrounds to draw on.
- ◆ The minimum age for participation is 16 and the participants must be a member of the PSA.



The end result is that we now have two new instructors whose teaching abilities can be relied upon by the club. The KMFSC has gained qualified coaches for group lessons and private students alike. These new instructors have achieved confidence in their teaching abilities. The instructors have the means for more success in their careers. I feel that I am a better instructor for having participated in this program. A win-win-win situation for all!

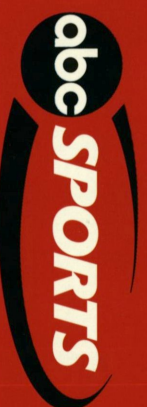
