



From the President ...

Reflections on the Winter Games

t this writing, as I wait in the airport to leave Salt Lake City, the 2002 Olympic Winter Games are a fresh and exciting memory. But the closing of the Games also brings a touch of melancholy to an event so long anticipat-

ed. The massive corps of beautifully organized volunteers remains friendly to the end, albeit sad to see us go.

It seems like it's been a lifetime since we arrived in Utah. Dealing with the mundane but important details such as credentialing, hotel accommodations, transportation routes and locating venues was the first order of business upon arrival. We found the venues to be surrounded by metal detectors, security personnel and wands. Amazingly, we got used to them as the Games progressed.

It was with a sense of excitement that we bundled up, looking like stuffed penguins, and boarded buses for the Opening Ceremonies. It was bitter cold, but the organizers kept us busy as participants with our white paper ponchos, flashlights, flutes and colored cards. How proud we were to see the U.S. Team march in and to realize how important figure skating was to the overall integrity of the ceremonies.

As competition began in other sports, and our skaters settled into practice routines, the USFSA hosted two international social events: one, a dinner for the ISU Council, technical committees, referees and judges, and the other, a luncheon for federation presidents. International relationships are important to maintain and, as the international representatives for the USFSA, we were happy to act as hosts.

Things at that point seemed to be moving along quite nicely — then along came the pairs event. Could we ever have predicted how much our world would instantly change? Life at the Olympics for some of us became one of stepping over reporters and cameras everywhere in the hotel, attending huge press conferences, holding meetings constantly to monitor developments, drafting responses to press queries, and generally trying to act with a measure of reason as events swirled around us.

While there was an immediate public reaction to perceived "unfair" judging, the minute a judge admitted that she was pressured to affect the result the issue became supercharged. The integrity of the entire judging system became the issue. Athletes and many others publicly expressed their lack of confidence in the current judging system.

The USFSA will continue to press for a full and complete investigation of any charges of improper conduct. Appropriate remedies must be applied if any wrongdoing is uncovered; we must be vigilant in our efforts to keep the system competent and fair. With the continuing interest of the news media in Salt Lake, we remained aware of the perceptions that the general public was developing regarding our sport. We may now have the opportunity to enact some long overdue changes in the system to eradicate the effects of judges' misconduct, however uncommon it may be. Our U.S. judges are the best in the world and work hard to maintain their integrity. We need to make sure the public knows that.

No matter how much the controversy threatened to take over the spirit of the Olympic Games, in the end it was the athletes and the events that kept center stage. I am in awe of all of them. There are so many stories of exceptional circumstances under which many of them competed. Our skaters deserve credit for keeping themselves focused on the competition during all the turmoil and delivering incredible performances. Our medal winners — Sarah Hughes, Michelle Kwan and Timothy Goebel — made us very proud, as did the rest of the skaters on the team. These marvelous people represented not only the USFSA but also their country in exemplary fashion.

Now that the 2002 Olympic Winter Games are over, we once again begin planning for the next quadrennium. We hope the sport will be stronger as a result of these Games and look forward to building a bright future for our next Olympians.





Sarah Hughes on the Wheaties Cereal Box

America's newest Olympic ladies champion has been honored on the cover of the fabled orange Wheaties box. At a press conference in late February in Salt Lake City,



Wheaties announced the release of a new package honoring Sarah Hughes.

"Winning a gold medal is something that I've dreamed about for most of my life," said Hughes, who began figure skating at age 3. "To top it off, now I have my own Wheaties box. This is really a dream come true."


Gymnast Mary Lou Retton, a Wheaties alum and winner of five gold medals in Los Angeles in 1984, helped Hughes unveil the package.

"Sarah reminds me so much of myself when I was her age competing on the world stage," she said. "The thrill of appearing on the Wheaties box is something I will never forget, and I'm so happy for Sarah to be sharing in this great honor."

The 18-ounce package was available nationally beginning in March and continues Wheaties' storied tradition of honoring great athletic champions dating back to Johnny Weismuller and Babe Didrickson in the 1930s. Other notable winter sports honorees include Kristi Yamaguchi, Eric Heiden, the 1980 U.S. men's hockey team and the 1998 U.S. women's hockey team.

"There were so many great performances in Salt Lake City, but Sarah's breakthrough triumph in figure skating truly captured the country's imagination," said Wheaties Marketing Manager Brian Immel. "She undoubtedly represents the very best of the championship ideals that have made Wheaties 'The Breakfast of Champions' for nearly 80 years. She is a great addition to the elite group of athletes who have graced the cover of the Wheaties box over the years."

Hartsells End Longtime Partnership

1999 U.S. pairs champions Danielle Hartsell and Steve Hartsell (Westland, Mich.) informed the USFSA in February that they are ending their longstanding partnership.

"Over the past year we thought about retiring but decided to stay in and compete for a spot on the Olympic Team," Steve said. "When we didn't make it, we thought about another year but then decided that this is the best decision for both of us."

The brother-sister duo had a successful career that included a U.S. pairs title in 1999, a World Junior title in 1997 and a 10th-place finish at the 1999 World Championships. Since first competing in 1991, the Hartsells competed in 11 U.S. Championships and won three national titles — intermediate (1991), junior (1995) and senior (1999). The duo also represented the U.S. at 20 international competitions earning a total of eight medals.


Over the past few seasons, the Hartsells have battled injuries that limited their ability to compete including missing the 2000 State Farm U.S. Championships and withdrawing prior to the free skate at the 2002 U.S. Championships.

"We are most proud of overcoming the many obstacles that we faced throughout our career," Steve added. "Danielle and I are best friends on and off the ice, and it was that special friendship that helped us be successful and get through the tough times."

Steve, 24, is in the process of looking for a new partner and plans to continue his competitive career over the next four years. Danielle, 21, plans on relocating to Richmond, Va., and will explore educational opportunities while teaching figure skating in the local area.

The USFSA was also notified in January that four other pairs teams have ended their partnerships.

Senior pairs team **Laura Handy and Jonathon Hunt** ended their two-year partnership following a sixth-place finish at the 2002 State Farm U.S. Championships in Los Angeles. Handy and Hunt represented the U.S. in four international competitions



including an eighth-place finish at Skate America 2001.

Senior pairs **Jennifer Don and Jered Guzman** ended their one-year partnership following a 10th-place finish at the 2002 U.S. Championships.

The second-year team of **Janey Mayne and Josh Martin** announced an end to a partnership that saw them claim the silver medal at the 2002 U.S. Championships on the junior level. Mayne and

Martin were the 2001 U.S. novice champions.

The novice pairs team of **Colleen Okolski and Benjamin Okolski** ended their six-year competitive career following a fifth-place finish at the 2002 U.S. Championships. The brother-sister team will pursue new partners for the future. The Okolskis claimed the U.S. pairs title on the juvenile and intermediate levels from 1999–2000.

Skating Management Firm Created

Champions on Ice founder and producer Tom Collins, skating executive Michael Collins and prominent entertainment producer Lee Marshall have joined forces to form Collins-Marshall Management, L.L.C. — the first company specifically designed to provide complete management and marketing services to figure skaters. Tom Collins will serve as chairman, while Michael Collins and Marshall will be responsible for the

day-to-day operation. Offices will be located in Minneapolis and Cleveland.

"In creating Collins-Marshall Management, we have filled a void that exists in the sport of figure skating today," Marshall said. "With our combined experiences throughout the skating and entertainment industries, we will develop CMM into the premier management company in the world of figure skating."

U.S. Championships Set Cable Ratings Record

Skating fans tuned in to the 2002 State Farm U.S. Championships ladies free skate in record numbers on Sat., Jan. 12. According to Nielsen ratings, about 2.99 million households were watching ABC Family as Michelle Kwan scored two perfect 6.0s marks en route to winning her sixth U.S. ladies title.

That added up to a 3.45 rating, making it the most-viewed skating event ever shown on cable television.

Due to a scheduling conflict with the NFL, the ladies final was televised live on ABC Family instead of its regular spot live on ABC.

ESPN's broadcast Fri., Jan. 11 of the ladies and pairs short program also enjoyed a large audience. The numbers indicated that it was the sixth most-viewed skating telecast of all time.

ABC's Jan. 10 broadcast of the men's free skate posted a national rating of 5.8.

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
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
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




Olympic description of the control o

Gold medals and a place in history awaited a number of athletes at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games in Salt Lake

City, Utah. A controversy in the pairs event nearly overshadowed the competition, but bronze medals from Timothy Goebel and Michelle Kwan, along with a stunning and surprising gold from Sarah Hughes, helped turn the attention back to the skating.



Pairs: Controversy Results in Two Golds

omewhere in the middle of all the controversy surrounding the pairs at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games there was a competition — a glorious competition set apart from the judging scandal (see page 23). What might be the saddest part about all the controversy is that because of the hoopla, perhaps many people forgot about all the terrific performances that were displayed from more than just the top two teams.

For instance, China's Xue Shen and Hongbo Zhao almost nailed an historic throw quadruple Salchow. Russia's Tatiana Totmianina and Maxim Marinin added to the technical bar by hitting side-by-side triple Salchows. And then, there was the top American pair of Kyoko Ina and John Zimmerman.

Ina and Zimmerman probably have never felt anything like they did at center ice on the night of Feb. 9. Competing in their first Olympic Winter Games together, Ina and Zimmerman were greeted by the crowd of 16,089 at the Salt Lake Ice Center with thunderous applause during the short program and that's no exaggeration.

On the first night of skating competition in the 2002 Olympics, Ina and Zimmerman didn't know that they were following a marvelous procession of pairs teams - all the top duos skated technically precise and artistically elegant short programs. All they knew was that it seemed the crowd had been holding its breath until they hit the ice.

"It was so exciting to be out there," Ina said. "The crowd was incredible; everyone was behind us. We couldn't have asked for a better performance [than] what we did, considering we didn't know what to expect. I think we did all right."

They did more than all right. The team's most obvious error was on the triple toes, but even that was minor as Zimmerman struggled with the landing.

"I just fought for the landing," he said. "You could obviously tell I was struggling with it. I don't think I two-footed it."

Ina and Zimmerman's scores ranged from 5.3-5.5 for required elements and 5.5–5.7 for presentation (the majority being 5.6). That was good enough to put them in fifth place for the evening in a sparkling show of pairs skating.

1999 World champions Elena Berezhnaya and Anton Sikharulidze from

Russia were the third team to skate in the short program and delivered an excellent show. Their scores were hard to beat but still left some room — 5.7-5.8 for required elements and 5.8-5.9 for presentation. Berezhnaya skated well despite the lingering effects of a sunburn she suffered earlier in the week.

"Well, I just try to handle it," she said. "It happened."

In second place were 2001 World champions Jamie Salé and David Pelletier of Canada. They also skated beautifully but had a freak fall on their closing pose when Pelletier hit a rut in the ice. Both skaters fell to the ice completely but still came up smiling.

"I'm not even sure what happened," Salé said. "It was the weirdest thing ... I didn't even know it was happening until I was on the ice. I just thought I came all the way to the Olympics to do that. I really want to skate every moment, and I did - especially at the end."

Shen and Zhao were in third with their own solid performance.

Tiffany Scott and Philip Dulebohn, who were only skating in their second competition all year, had difficulty with the side-by-side triple toes and the throw triple Salchow. Scott fell on the side-byside jumps and then slipped off her edge on the throw triple.

"I had already checked out and landed it, and then all of a sudden I was on my butt," Scott said.

Dulebohn agreed that the fall was just one of those things.


"I would say that it was kind of a flukey mistake," he said. "We haven't really missed that element all week in practice I don't think - not once. These things happen. You just pick up and move on, and that's what we're going to do - the best we can."

Scott and Dulebohn were in 11th after the short program and said their experiences at the Olympics were priceless.

"I know we felt really good being out there representing the United States in Salt Lake City," Dulebohn said. "We're really proud to represent our country. ... We wish we had skated better, of course. It would be nice to have a second chance. We're only human. We're here, and we're proud to be here, and that's what's most important."

Ina and Zimmerman, who were in fifth behind Russians Totmianina and Marinin, still had a shot at the bronze medal.

"We're just going to be a little bit more




spot-on two nights from now," Zimmerman said. "We gotta do it."

And that they did.

Before the whole skating world turned upside down, Ina and Zimmerman had a singular moment in the spotlight during the free skate. In fact, they may have been waiting their whole lives for that moment — one moment when everything was perfect, and the eyes of the world looked down on them with

adoration. They had the moment for a full four and a half minutes, and then some, at the Salt Lake Ice Center.

It didn't matter that the three-time U.S. pairs champions ended up finishing fifth at the Olympic Winter Games, just out of the medals. In less than a year, Ina and Zimmerman,

who finished seventh at the 2001 World Championships, have transformed themselves from two skaters who happened to be a team to a solid example of what pairs skating is all about — skating as one.

The Americans skated beautifully to "Variations on a Theme by Paganini" with their only mistake a slight touchdown by Ina on their side-by-side double Axels. The crowd erupted with deafening applause, and Ina and Zimmerman were able to share their golden moment with 16,458 of their closest friends.

"It was so much fun," Ina said. "In one way, I wish it could last another four minutes, [but] I'm glad it ended when it did because I don't think I could contain my excitement anymore. I was just so

happy out there."

Both skaters had huge grins on their faces well before they finished, and they even shared a spontaneous hug just before their final pose. Ina's first comment when she came out of the kiss and cry was one simple word — "Wow!"

"After that last throw jump, I knew we had it," Ina said. "It was just a matter of containing our feelings and not doing anything stupid. I just kept thinking 'stay calm, stay calm, stay calm,' and I couldn't stay calm anymore."

Both skaters believed that technically and emotionally, this was the best they had ever skated the program. Moreover, the audience response gave them an extra push.

"I can't even tell you about the crowd," Ina told reporters. "They were the best. Without them we couldn't skate this well because they pumped us up so much. It was so thrilling, and I was so honored."

Zimmerman also couldn't stop smiling.

"What we did out there was our gold medal," he said.

Scott and Dulebohn dropped to 13th overall after she fell on both throw triple jumps.

"The throw [triple] toe has been off this past week actually, so I thought it was a good attempt, and I stood up on it in the warm-up," Scott said.

Scott, 24, and Dulebohn, 28, were not sure what their plans would be once the Olympics ended. "I would like to experi-

ence this again, but I think we're going to take it year by year and see how our bodies hold up," Scott said. "We're no spring chickens."

For the final group, the tension for the free skate began in the warm-up when Sikharulidze and Salé collided. Salé stayed on her knees for a few seconds before getting up, but both skaters were able to perform with no serious effects.

When the skaters hit the ice for their programs, no one knew what was to come.

Berezhnaya and Sikharulidze, who were Olympic silver medalists in 1998, skated a classical program with graceful lines and expression. Technically, however, it wasn't perfect. Sikharulidze stumbled out of the side-by-side double

Axels, and both throw jumps were a tad shaky on the landings. The team was penalized a little for its technical marks, receiving 5.7s–5.8s. However, the judges threw up a tough-to-beat string of 5.9s (with two 5.8s) for their wonderful presentation.

Salé and Pelletier skated their "Love Story" program with breathtaking precision — the same program that earned them 6.0s at the 2002 Grand Prix Final. The Canadians landed side-by-side triple toes, a double Axel-double toe sequence and two throw triples (Salchow and loop). It was a magical moment on the ice for them after a year of preparation and pressure. Pelletier pumped his fists and kissed the ice as the fans leapt to their feet. The crowd was definitely behind them, shouting "six, six!"


"We skated our hearts out," Salé said. The judges gave the gold to the Russians in a very controversial 5-4 decision.

"I ... have (not) yet realized what happened," Sikharulidze said about winning the gold. "It might take a while for me to realize it."

Salé and Pelletier were of course disappointed with the silver after skating so well. Little did anyone know at the time that allegations of misconduct on the judging panel would quickly surface.

"What we can't control, we can't control, and that's the way it is," said






Pelletier about the judging. "If I didn't want this to happen to me, I would have went down the hill on skis."

Pelletier added that the free skate was the culmination of the toughest six months of his life, with all the pressure the team felt to win a gold medal. Pelletier said that kissing the ice after the program was a reflection of all that pressure.

"It was six months of people's expectations coming out of me," he said. "I'm a human being. Of course I'm sad to come in second. That's the way it is."

Amid a swirl of rumors over the next few days that the French judge, Marie-Reine Le Gougne, had been pressured to vote for the Russians, the IOC awarded a second gold medal to the Canadians (see page 23). The Russians and the Canadians then had a second medal ceremony on the night of the original dance.

Shen and Zhao won the first-ever medal for their country in Olympic pairs



competition by capturing the bronze.

The team attempted a throw quadruple Salchow, which has never been landed in a major competition. Shen looked like she landed it, but lost an edge at the last second.

"I feel that we did very well tonight and that we did our best, even though we didn't quite make the quadruple throw," Shen said.

Ladies: Hughes Rises Above the Field

arah Hughes must have felt like she was dumped right down in the middle of a tornado. One minute, she's just fighting for a spot on the medal podium after finishing fourth in the ladies short program at the Olympic Winter Games. The next, she's the shining star of world figure skating with an Olympic gold medal around her neck. By now, the story behind her win is one of many enduring legacies of the Games, and it brought Hughes, who hasn't yet won a U.S. or World title, unexpected glory.

Hughes' victory was a spectacular accomplishment, which helped affirm America's status as the preeminent force in ladies figure skating. After finishing fourth in the short program, Hughes had no pressure on her in the free skate. She brought her game face to the final day of figure skating competition, spinning out one of the most technically ambitious ladies programs ever. However, for all the sheer excitement her win created, it also meant heartbreak for another of the U.S.' top hopefuls — Michelle Kwan.

Nobody could help but see the parallels between 2002 and 1998 for Kwan. In 1998, although Kwan skated very well, Tara Lipinski defeated her with a more technically demanding program. This year, Kwan was again defeated by a young rival, but the four-time World champion also did not perform up to her usual level of ability and sophistication.

It also can't be forgotten how close the U.S. came to a medal sweep. Sasha Cohen, who had never even been to a World Championships, was third after the short program, and had it not been for two mistakes in her free skate she might have also medaled. Instead, Cohen finished fourth, proving she will be a force to be reckoned with in the

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years to come.

It all started in the short program where it was a red, white and blue night at the Salt Lake Ice Center. The U.S. ladies contingent, one of the strongest ever to be sent to an Olympic Winter Games, lived up to its well-deserved reputation, placing first, third and fourth.

Kwan found herself in an unfamiliar position after the short program — in first place ahead of Irina Slutskaya. She hasn't beaten Slutskaya in a short program in a major competition in a few years, but her performance in the Olympic short was worthy of the reward.

With her stirring performance at the 2002 State Farm U.S. Championships in January, Kwan served notice that she was more than ready to contend for gold again in Salt Lake City. If there were any lingering demons, she put them to rest in the short, flying across the ice with unmatched grace and a sense of freedom.

Although her required elements marks ranged from 5.5–5.8, Kwan collected a string of 5.9s for presentation to lead the hunt for the elusive Olympic gold. She cleanly landed her triple Lutz-double toe combination, a double Axel and triple flip in her program to Rachmaninoff's "Piano Concerto No. 3."

"Oooh, I didn't like the technical marks, but I did like the artistic marks," Kwan said. "Close call ... we're seeing a lot of 5-4 [splits in the panel], aren't we? I like it in my favor."

In contrast to her routine at the 1998 Olympic Winter Games, Kwan had been in Salt Lake City since Feb. 6, enjoying every moment of the Olympic experience. She experienced it even more when she stepped on the ice, as the crowd roared its approval with a glittering wave of American flags.

"I feel really good, and the audience was incredible," she said. "I saw the American flags. I just wanted to concentrate and take my time ... one thing at a time."

Skating with impressive speed and power, Slutskaya nailed her elements with precision, including the more difficult triple Lutz-double loop combination. She won four of the nine first-place marks.

"It was great,"
Slutskaya said.

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"Of course I was a little nervous, a little bit more because it is the Olympics. My legs after the triple flip were so tired. My legs felt like they went into the ice — it felt so hard.'

Sitting in third place after the short program was Cohen. The fact that the 17-year-old U.S. silver medalist had not yet competed in a World Championships certainly did not matter in the short program. She placed ahead of former World champion Maria Butyrskaya of Russia (fifth) and Hughes (fourth). Cohen skated with lyrical flow and solid consistency, earning exceptionally high scores despite skating sixth in the draw order. She collected six 5.8s for presentation a significant achievement considering that at the time two previous World champions and a three-time World silver medalist were left to skate.

They (the marks) were higher than I expected," Cohen said. "I was just happy I got the marks I deserve."


Because of her age and relatively little senior international experience, Cohen's placement was testament to her technical skills and mature presentation. While Lipinski was the reigning World champion heading into Nagano in 1998, Cohen had only two senior international medals - a gold medal at the 2001 Finlandia Trophy and a silver at the 2001 Trophée Lalique.


"When I got on the ice I couldn't believe it was finally here — the moment I waited for my whole life," Cohen said.

Cohen said her nerves disappeared once she got on the ice.

"I just felt absolutely calm, no pressure," she said. "I just thought to myself, 'You have one chance. I don't want any regrets and fight for everything."

order, also hit her triple Lutz-double loop combination, a triple flip and double Axel. Although her presentation marks were as high as 5.7, the judges gave her marks as low as 5.1 for required elements. Regardless, she was poised for a medal in fourth place, giving the U.S. the possibility of a sweep in the event.

"I'm really happy with my skate," Hughes said. "I've been practicing extremely well. It meant a lot to me to skate well in front of all these people that support me. This is home."

Hughes said she was disappointed that her draw order translated to a practice time at 7 a.m. that morning but that it didn't affect her performance.

"It was so early, I wasn't able to practice in this rink before I did my short (program)," she said. "So it made it a little bit more difficult, but it turned out great."

Hughes added that she had to refocus before beginning her program after the enormous ovation from the crowd.

"I've never had a crowd get that enthusiastic about me," she said.

At that time, Hughes had no idea exactly how enthusiastic a crowd could get about her.

Entering into the free skate, Hughes had no expectations of winning gold. She knew mathematically it was possible, but realistically, the chances were slim. Not only would she have to win the free skate, beating Kwan, Slutskaya and Cohen in the process, but Kwan, the leader after the short, would have to finish no higher than third. Going into the free skate competition, that all seemed highly improbable — until Hughes hit the ice.

Skating second in the final group after Butyrskaya, Hughes tore the house down with one of the most technically demanding free skates ever done by a woman in Olympic competition. She was simply wonderful, landing two triple-triple combinations — a triple Salchow-triple loop and triple toe-triple loop — along with three other triples (seven total). She was an athlete at the top of her game — focused and without the pressure the top three competitors felt.

"Tonight, I didn't really go out and skate for a gold medal," she said. "I went out to have a great time. I said 'This is the Olympics. I want to be the best.' And it's amazing, really, truly amazing."

For skating so early in the final group, the judges rewarded Hughes with high marks — 5.7–5.8 for technical merit and 5.6–5.8 (mostly 5.8s) for presentation. The crowd rewarded her with something even more special.

"At the end of my program, there was just a huge roar, and I'm never, ever going to forget it," she said. "I was just in shock. I've never, ever skated that way in my life, and I just thought if there was any place to do it, this was it."

Hughes would have to wait a while to find out what color medal, if any, she would receive.

Cohen was the next of the big guns to skate. She had a good skate, although it lacked the technical precision of her short program. She attempted a triple Lutz-triple toe combination, but sat

down on the ice on the second jump and later had a wobbly triple Lutz. She landed six total triples in her program to "Carmen," but it wasn't enough to overtake Hughes.

"I'll take that," Cohen said. "I was really nervous. I'm just happy I did six triples."

For Kwan, the title was essentially hers to win or lose. Unfortunately, she didn't have her best skate on the one night it meant so much to her. She had trouble on the opening jump of her triple toe-triple toe combination, which made her unable to pull off the second triple. She settled for a double. After a nice triple Lutz-double loop combination and double Axel, she fell on her triple flip, which did not bode well for her gold medal hopes.

"I heard the audience try to lift my spirits when they started clapping in the middle of the program," Kwan said. "I made a few mistakes, but I kept on going strong. It just wasn't meant to be tonight."

Hughes had raised the bar technically on Kwan, and Kwan wasn't able to answer back. Her scores left her second in the free skate, but still first overall before Slutskaya skated.


"The Olympics are always an historic moment," Kwan said. "Tonight was just not my night ... it was a bummer."

The competition then rested on Slutskaya's shoulders. She could win the free skate and capture the title outright. She could finish second in the free skate behind Hughes, which would give Hughes the win. Or she could finish behind Hughes and Kwan in the free, which would give Kwan the gold.

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Slutskaya's program turned out to be good, but not spectacular. She landed five clean triples and put her hand down on a sixth, but did not do any tripletriple combinations. The program also lacked some of the fire in presentation that she has shown in previous victories. Her scores resulted in the unpredictable scenario that gave Hughes the gold medal. Slutskaya was not entirely pleased with the marks she received.

"I skated well tonight, but it's upsetting that I again lost over the second mark, as if I'm not artistic," she said.
"But apparently that's life. I lost again on the second mark, and I really worked hard on my presentation. I think I made a lot of progress."

Hughes and coach Robin Wagner were in the dressing room backstage when they learned that Hughes had won the gold medal. In one of the most emotional moments of the Games, the two hugged and cried with joy and surprise over the results.

"Some people never have the performance of their life," Hughes said.

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After a scintillating short program, Cohen delivered her "Carmen" free skate with her usual panache. However, errors on two jumps kept her off of the podium.

"I'm happy that I've been able to skate the best I can possibly skate tonight."

Wagner said she and Hughes weren't really watching Kwan and Slutskaya skate after learning they pretty much had at least a bronze after seeing Cohen's results.

"One of the NBC cameramen was filming our reaction to the final results, and I heard him say 'You have gold,'" Wagner said. "And I think we both were just so shocked because it really wasn't on the radar screen."

Onlookers were excited that after two weeks of judging controversies in figure skating, the ladies event was pretty much called as it was. Hughes skated the best performance of the top four, and the cards fell in such a way that she ended up

the winner.

certainly something good will be the final word for figure skating as we leave the Olympic Games."

The Russian Figure Skating Federation later protested the results based on Slutskaya's second-place finish in the short program and her low second mark in the free skate; however, the protest was denied.

The heartbreak for Kwan, who suffered through her second Olympic disappointment, was palpable.

"When I was really young, I had a dream at a competition in Las Vegas," she said. "I was talking in my sleep and kept saying 'It's OK. It's OK.' When I woke up, I told my dad it was a dream about skating and being nervous for the competition. Today, that's what I have to remind myself, 'It's OK, it's OK."

Hughes became the first skater who has jumped from fourth to first at the Olympics since the current system of short program-free skate was implemented at the 1992 Winter Games.

The U.S. has never swept the ladies competition at the Olympic Winter Games, but it's been close. This year's 1-3-4 finish parallels 1992, when Kristi Yamaguchi, Nancy Kerrigan and Tonya Harding finished 1, 3 and 4. The U.S. previously won two medals in the ladies event on four separate occasions: 1998 - Lipinski, 1st and Kwan, 2nd; 1992 — (see above); 1960 Carol Heiss, 1st and Barbara Ann Roles, 3rd; 1956 — Tenley Albright, 1st and Carol Heiss, 2nd. Silver medalist Irina Slutskaya

Men: Goebel Breaks 10-Year Medal Drought for U.S.

aul Wylie's silver medal at the 1992 Olympic Winter Games seems like ages ago. In many ways, it was. His extraordinary performance in Albertville, France, was before the Nancy Kerrigan-Tonya Harding scandal, which signaled the beginning of skating's most popular years. It was also before Oksana Baiul, Tara Lipinski and Michelle Kwan.

But it was the last time an American man won a medal in the Olympic Winter Games — until Feb. 14 in Salt Lake City. That's when Timothy Goebel, who had previously not even medaled in a World Championships, reeled off a great Olympic performance to capture the bronze.

Goebel's medal capped off a remarkable men's event which, after the pairs controversy, turned out to be extraordinary particularly for its ordinariness.

There were no major controversies, except for perhaps a few raised eyebrows at Russian Evgeny Plushenko's placement after the short program. Instead, the men let their skating do the talking.

Before the competition, Goebel, threetime Olympian Todd Eldredge and Michael Weiss were probably growing weary of one particular topic — the socalled invincibilty of the Russians, namely Plushenko and Alexei Yagudin. Those two skaters had combined to win the last four World titles.

"Yeah, the Russians may have won the majority of things, but just because you won the majority of things doesn't mean you're going to win [this] one time," Weiss said before the event.

It turns out the U.S. men's skaters were right — the Russians weren't invincible. Or, at least, one of them wasn't. Reigning World champion Plushenko fell on his quad toe loop in the short, losing control of his gold medal destiny in the process. Plushenko didn't talk to reporters after his program, although his coach, Alexei Mishin, did say that the Olympics were "over" for his prize pupil.

The Winter Games have become a place where strange things can happen, and predictions are thrown out the window. Two predictions did come true, however — a Russian, Yagudin, was first after the short, and an American, Goe-

bel, was in the medal hunt by cruising to a third-place finish.

"I was not expecting to be in this position, so it's just such a thrill to have skated so well and placed so well," Goebel said. "The crowd was absolutely amazing; I've never experienced anything like that in my life."

With an excellent quad-triple combination, a great triple Axel and triple flip, Goebel was right where he should be. He landed the first quadruple Salchow ever in Olympic competition. The U.S. silver medalist essentially did his job — skating with focused concentration.

"It's the best short program I've skated this year in competition," Goebel said. "To do it in front of my home country is just such a thrill. It gives me such a feeling of momentum and a feeling of confidence."

Goebel was the best of the U.S. Team that Tuesday night. Weiss kicked off the show by skating in the number one position. He two-footed his quad and tacked on a double toe, but he landed his triple Axel nicely despite an extreme lean in the air. Weiss' marks ranged from 4.9–5.4 for required elements and 5.5–5.6 for presentation. The two-time U.S. champion was somewhat satisfied with his marks, knowing that the judges had to leave plenty of room for the remaining men. It's difficult to speculate how much higher his scores would have been

"Unfortunately, the first position is a tough place to skate, especially at this competition because [there are] 29 skaters ... " Weiss said. "Some of the judges went out on the edge and gave me a 5.4 on the first mark, which I thought was a little more reasonable."

had he skated later in the order.

Eldredge, competing in his third Olympics, did not have the skate for which he had hoped. One of the most remarkable stories in figure skating, Eldredge regained his U.S. title after essentially taking two years off after the 1998 Olympics. He wanted one more shot at skating

Gold medalist Alexei Yaqudin his best at the Olympics after unsatisfying performances in 1992 and '98.

The 1996 World champion, who has landed two quads in competition, was landing quads with remarkable precision all week in practice before the short program. Therefore, he went for the quad toe-double toe combination and stood up, but he had difficulty on both landings. He then had an uncharacteristic fall on his triple Axel.

"Quite honestly the quad wasn't the problem," Eldredge said afterwards.

When asked what the problem was, Eldredge replied, "The triple Axel, when I ended up on my rear end. I felt great, which is what makes it a little bit more disappointing. I went for it (the quad toe), and it was probably one of the better ones that I've done lately in competition."

Despite finishing ninth in the short, Eldredge, gracious as always, said he didn't feel too bad.

"I thought I would be more upset," Eldredge said. "Before tonight I figured, 'You know you're going to be really upset if you don't go out there and skate great.' You know what, it just isn't the case. For whatever reason, I think just because of making the comeback — the decision — and following it through and doing as well as I have done — coming off of nationals and winning there. I have six titles. That's pretty darn good. I thought I'd be more disappointed than I am."


The biggest surprise of the night was Plushenko, who fell on his quad toe and ended up in fourth place. He received required elements marks as low as 5.3, but

presentation marks as high as 5.9.
Goebel's coach, Frank Carroll, later
wondered aloud to reporters that if
Plushenko receives a 5.9 for falling, what
does he get for standing up?

None of that mattered when Yagudin skated his "Winter" short program with style, speed and that elusive championship quality. He said he was focusing on himself and not on the fact that not-too-friendly rival Plushenko fell.

"I'm really happy with the work that I did

today, and I really concentrated on myself," he said. "So if you have any questions about his (Plushenko's performance), ask him."

Japan's Takeshi Honda was in second after a magnificent performance that included a clean quad toe and triple Axel.

"I'm really happy I did a clean short program. That's all," he said.

The free skate would mean different things to different skaters. For Eldredge and Weiss, who was in eighth, it meant another shot at redemption. For Goebel, it was a chance to position himself at the top of U.S. men's skating and among the ranks of the best in the world.

It turned out that the 21-year-old jumping giant had a date with history. Goebel landed his trademark three quads and a plethora of triples to take the bronze medal.

"I think it's great that we've gotten an American man back

on the podium," Goebel said. "We have so many great skaters. We sent a really strong team here. Unfortunately, the other two didn't have their best performances, but I think any of the three of us could have medaled. I'm just really happy it was me."

Goebel should be happy. Not only did he land four clean quads between the short program and free skate, but he skated all his other elements (except one step out on a triple Axel in the free skate) cleanly as well.

"I really went for it," Goebel said after his skate. "That's what Frank (Carroll, his coach) told me before I went on the ice — [he said] 'Go for it!'"

Goebel broke another Olympic mark by becoming the first skater to land three quadruple jumps in one program in Olympic competition. The bronze medal placed him back at the top of U.S. men's skating a month after he finished second to Eldredge at the 2002 State Farm U.S. Championships.

For his part, Eldredge also skated a solid performance, moving up from ninth after the short to sixth overall. He fell on his opening quad toe attempt but then landed eight triples in stunning fashion. By the time he was finished, most of the audience had forgotten about the failed quad toe, instead rewarding Eldredge for a gutsy comeback and a superb career. The judges also rewarded him with scores in the 5.3–5.6 range for technical merit and as high as 5.8 for presentation.

"I can leave [the] Olympics this time a much happier camper," Eldredge said. "To be able to finish out my Olympics in front of a home crowd — that's just awesome."

Eldredge also said that he was "100 percent" sure that this would be his last Olympic Games, which he confirmed the following week (see page 22).

Weiss moved up to seventh place after landing a beautiful quad toe-triple toe-double loop combination — the first time he has performed the combo in competition. He doubled a triple loop and stepped out of another triple.

"I was one or two minor mistakes from making a big jump out here," Weiss said.

"The one jump I'd like back is

the triple loop."

Like the other two Americans, Weiss was also thrilled to skate well in front of an enthusiastic crowd of over 16,000 at the Salt Lake Ice Center.

"It was really great," Weiss said. "The audience in Salt Lake City is incredible, unbelievable."

The gold was not in doubt as Yagudin skated his program to "Man in the Iron Mask" to near perfection. He landed two quads, including his own quad-triple-double combination and combined that with solid spins and unmatched footwork. He received four 6.0s for presentation, setting an Olympic record. No other individual skater has received more than one 6.0 in an Olympic Games. Yagudin recounted his feelings after winning the gold and talked about his rivalry with Plushenko and former coach Mishin (Plushenko's coach).


"I was like in a fog," he said. "I don't remember what happened ... It was like in some good dream. I just remembered, too, how many hard times and through how many good [times], and through [how much] happiness I went for four years, and my relationship with Mishin thrown in my face, and saying that I am not such a good skater from that side (gesturing toward Mishin). I was keeping that to myself until I actually won."

Plushenko also skated a solid program, debuting his free skate to music from "Carmen." He changed his free skate after losing to Yagudin at the Grand Prix Final in December. After he fell in the short, Plushenko not only had to win the free skate to capture gold, but Yagudin had to finish no better than third. Of course that didn't happen, but Plushenko still skated well with a couple of clean quads. He tried his quad-triple-triple combination, but two-footed the final triple loop.

"Today I am very happy with the free skate that I performed," Plushenko said. "I attempted to do the quadruple (toe)-triple (toe)-triple (loop) combination and (triple) Axel-triple flip, and I believe that I did a good job skating my free skate program. It was quite difficult to move up from fourth place to the second place, and I am very satisfied with getting the silver medal."

But for many fans of U.S. skating, the night belonged to Goebel, who ended a long drought for the American men with a bronze. Goebel made the most of his Olympic experience after the event, staying in the Olympic Village and making friends with other athletes. He also appeared on NBC's The Tonight Show.

Ice Dancing: French Rise Above Controversy

By the time the ice dancing competition started at the Olympic Winter Games, the discipline was ripe for major controversy. Dance had already been implicated in some circles in connection with the pairs controversy. However, by the time the medals were awarded, much of the talk of scandal had dissipated in a somewhat underwhelming competition.

After the compulsory dances (the quickstep and the blues), 2000 World champions Marina Anissina and Gwendal Peizerat of France were in the lead after winning both dances. In second were Russians Irina Lobacheva and Ilia Averbukh, which was somewhat of a surprise considering their highest-ever finish at the World Championships was third in 2001. The couple also missed most of the season this year due to a knee injury to Lobacheva. In third were 2001 World champions Barbara Fusar-Poli and Maurizio Margaglio of Italy, followed by Canadians Shae-Lynn Bourne and Victor Kraatz.

The top U.S. skaters were four-time U.S. champions Naomi Lang and Peter Tchernyshev in an 11th-place tie. Lang and Tchernyshev were 12th in the first dance and 11th in the second.

"I think we skated to the best of our ability out there," Lang said. "There was nothing more we could have done, even if the placement was not what we wanted. As far as I'm concerned, it's not over until we bow in the free dance."

Lang and Tchernyshev were skating in only their third competition this year

after they withdrew from the Grand Prix Series due to injury.

"Maybe the judging has something to do with that [since] we missed the first half of the season, and the judges didn't get a chance to see us," Tchernyshev said.

Lang and Tchernyshev, like most of the other U.S. skaters, were making the most of their Olympic experience, although they were all business on the ice. Tchernyshev turned 31 two days before the Opening Ceremonies, and the U.S. Team celebrated with him at a local restaurant.

The second American team, Beata Handra and Charles Sinek, were in 20th.


"The quickstep got off to a bad start," Handra said. "Our beginning was a misinterpretation of the music. The dance, overall, could have had some more depth to it, but in general the dance went well."

Lang and Tchernyshev took over sole possession of 11th place after the original dance. Skating to music from "Carmen," they wowed the capacity crowd at the Salt Lake Ice Center and received scores of 5.1–5.3 for composition and 5.3–5.5 for presentation.

"We are thrilled with that performance," Lang said. "After the compulsories, we were so disappointed with our marks. We just wanted to show how tough we are and that we could fight."

At the 2002 State Farm U.S. Championships, their original dance earned one 6.0 for presentation. Tchernyshev said the pair just wanted to relish their Olympic experience.

"Naomi said to me before we skated, 'Let's just have a blast out there,'" Tchernyshev said. "Once we started the pro-

gram, the crowd picked up the rhythm, and that was great. We didn't expect the crowd to start clapping during the slow part of the program."

This year's rhythm for the OD was the Spanish medley, resulting in a procession of couples wearing red and black.

The competition held true to form as the top 10 teams all held their positions from the compulsory dances. Anissina and Peizerat presented a lively flamenco and tango to hold on to first place.

"I love doing Spanish dance, and it was Spanish emotion, not Russian," said Anissina, who is originally from Russia. The French had to hold off a great performance from Lobacheva and Averbukh, who earned a 6.0 for presentation.

"We are incredibly happy," Averbukh said. "One judge gave us a 6.0. In the Olympic Games, a 6.0! I was so tense we would lose to the Italians and lose the chance to challenge for the gold."


Still in third were Fusar-Poli and Margaglio, who kept their position despite a small glitch.

"My costume was under my skate," Fusar-Poli said. "I was a little in shock. I think experience helped us in that incident."

Fusar-Poli said she believed that they should have been higher than third after the compulsories.

"I was mad at the results for the compulsories because we did a good job," she said.

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"Everyone said we should be first and that's why I was mad. The first and second place couples had mistakes and we skated clean."

Handra and Sinek skated first in the original dance and dropped to 21st.

"This was great out there tonight," Sinek said. "We did a good job. The scores didn't reflect it, but they didn't reflect in our compulsories either."

The free dance was set up for all sorts of mysteries. Would the Russians surprise everyone by beating the French for gold? Would three-time Olympians Bourne and Kraatz, who were fourth after the original dance, move up to take the bronze from the Italians?

Despite falls by two of the top four teams in the free dance, there was no major movement in the final. Anissina and Peizerat opened the last group with their "Anthem to Liberty" program. It was clean and expressive but not especially moving. Nevertheless, they collected strong marks — 5.7–5.9 for technical merit and for presentation.

Anissina and Peizerat's program includes snippets of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s "I Have a Dream" speech. Peizerat disagreed with a comment that the use of the words might have been inappropriate to use for the competition.

"When you take risks about art, you will find people who think it is inappropriate," Peizerat said. "We are proud of using it to express the idea of liberty on

the ice."

It turns out that Anissina and Peizerat's marks were good enough for gold — but just barely. The French won on a 5-4 split over Lobacheva and Averbukh. It was the first gold medal in Olympic ice dancing for France. Their gold medal is only the third for France in Olympic Winter Games figure skating history. In 1928 and 1932, Andree Brunet and Pierre Brunet won the gold in pairs. The gold medal for France marks the first time a non-Russian team has won the ice dancing title in 18 years. Jayne Torvill and Christopher Dean of Great Britain won the gold in 1984.

"It is an historic day," Peizerat said in the post-event press conference.

Regarding the judging controversy in pairs, which also implicated ice dancing, Peizerat added that he believes the public will not think the dance competition is tainted.

"I think the public is smart enough to realize if there is something wrong or not," he said. "Tonight the competition was great."

Lobacheva and Averbukh skated an exceptional free dance to nearly steal the show.

"We are very happy to have won the silver tonight," Averbukh said. "We lost the gold only by one judge. It was a 5-4 decision. Each athlete is dreaming about the gold. The audience was wonderful, but it was hard to skate. I don't really know why. At the very end, I thought, 'Thanks, God. We made it through.'"

The battle for the bronze medal took a strange turn when Fusar-Poli and Margaglio had trouble in their "Disco Revival" program. Margaglio fell in a footwork sequence, leaving their chances for bronze up in the air. Fusar-Poli was visibly upset after the performance, sobbing openly in the kiss and cry.

Bourne and Kraatz, fourth-place finishers at the 1998 Olympic Winter Games, saw the door wide open for them. Skating to their popular Michael Jackson medley, the couple was having a good routine until the very end when they had trouble on their final lift and both sprawled to the ice. Their scores kept them in fourth place, while the Italians remained in third. It was the first figure skating medal ever for Italy.

"It was just at the last moment," a disappointed Bourne said. "I think it was the best skate that we've ever done. At the last second, we let it go. It's too bad

because we might have had the bronze. You always have to believe the chance is right there. We skated with our hearts tonight."

Lithuanians Margarita Drobiazko and Povilas Vanagas skated a clean and technically well-done program to finish fifth. They filed a protest of the results after the event saying the proper deductions for falls were not taken from either the Canadians' or Italians' programs.

"Falls during obligatory elements like steps and lifts don't change the opinion of the judges," Vanagas said. "That's very sad. It is a bad lesson for the future. We don't want the result to be changed. We just want to help those (skaters) coming after us."

The ISU referee dismissed the protest two days later, confirming that the nine judges "correctly applied all required rules and deductions."

Lang and Tchernyshev finished their first Olympics for the U.S. in 11th place. The Americans received a well-deserved standing ovation for their free dance to "Parisian Walkways," which won them

the gold medal at both the 2002 State Farm U.S. Championships and the 2002 Four Continents Championships.

"This has been the highlight of our career," Lang said. "We've never skated better, and it doesn't matter about the marks."

Tchernyshev said it is difficult to move up in the rankings at this stage of the competition.

"We didn't have a (North American) judge on the

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Six-time U.S. Champion Todd Eldredge Ends His Eligible Career at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games

After his third Olympic appearance, Todd Eldredge announced his retirement from eligible skating at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games. His senior career spanned 14 years.

s many people expected, the 2002 Olympic Winter Games turned out to be the swan song for sixtime U.S. champion Todd Eldredge. The 1996 World champion announced his retirement from eligible skating Feb. 20—the day before figure skating competition at the Winter Games concluded.

Who wouldn't want to retire at age 30? After all, if you're Eldredge, you already have a fantastic career behind you and limitless possibilities ahead. So retirement for the popular skater is really not an exact concept. He just won't be performing with the big guns in Olympic-eligible skating anymore.

"I'm very happy with the performance that I had in the long program here," Eldredge said. "I didn't have the result I was looking for, but I had a great performance, and I kind of want to end my career on a great performance and on a high. ... Therefore, I won't be continuing on and going to the World Championships this year."

Eldredge had all but confirmed his impending retirement after his free skate at the Olympics Feb. 14, telling reporters he was "100 percent" sure that this would be his last Olympic Games as a competitor. He made it official a week later, bowing out of last month's World Championships, allowing U.S. fourthplace finisher Matt Savoie a shot at his first World Championships.

Despite three Olympic appearances with no medals, Eldredge rightfully looks back on his career with no regrets. The qualities of a champion include more than just medals, and if that's the case, Eldredge has won gold many times over in the hearts of the world.

"My Olympic career has somewhat paralleled my entire career in that it's

had its high points and its low points," he said. "To finish it here on a high note with a good long program was a great culmination of all of the efforts I've put into skating in the Olympics."

He's been in the game a long time. Since he began competing on the senior level in 1988, Eldredge has seen champions come and go — Kristi Yamaguchi, Nancy Kerrigan, Paul Wylie and Tara Lipinski, to name a few. Eldredge was competing at the same level as all of them when they captured Olympic medals, and he is still performing to the best of his ability.

He won his first U.S. senior title at the age of 18 in 1990 — the same year Jill Trenary won the third of her three titles. He finished fifth in his first World Championships, setting him up as a regular contender at figure skating's annual premier event. Over the next 12 years, Eldredge would represent the U.S. in seven more World Championships, winning three silver medals, two bronze and the gold in 1996. In fact, Eldredge captured a medal every year from 1995–98 at the World Championships.

After the 1998 Olympic Winter Games, Eldredge took a break from the competitive circuit for two years, only to return in 2000 and win bronze at the 2001 World Championships. He regained the U.S. title in 2002 and leaves his mark in the record books with the second most U.S. titles by a man. He is tied with Dick Button and Hayes Alan Jenkins for most World medals won by a U.S. man with six.

Eldredge, however, won't disappear from the public eye. He will continue participating in USFSA open competitions and host a number of figure skating seminars in association with Chevy throughout the U.S. He also signed a contract to participate in the Target Stars on Ice tour.

What about golf? A known golf enthusiast, Eldredge plans to spend a significant amount of time playing the greens.

"I've got a bet with Todd Sand (former U.S. pairs champion) that when we turn 50, we're going to try out for the Senior PGA Tour. ... If not, there's always the


celebrity tour out there, and I've heard they do pretty well."

Eldredge will also leave the Olympics with one very important memory — carrying the World Trade Center flag into Olympic Stadium for the Opening Ceremonies with seven other athletes. It is something that he will never forget.

"It was one of the most proud moments I've ever had in my life," he said. "All the athletes that were there holding the flag were just a part of something with the entire Opening Ceremonies crowd. ... I don't think I've ever been in an arena where it's been completely silent — you could hear the crickets basically. It was just an amazing feeling."

And that's a memory good enough for gold.

Olympic Pairs Controversy Could Result in New Judging System for Figure Skating

he 2002 Olympic Winter Games were naturally the most anticipated event of the year in figure skating. Destiny awaited a handful of skaters who would claim gold — and this time two more athletes than usual would meet that destiny.

In an extraordinary decision, the International Olympic Committee (IOC), acting on a proposal from the International Skating Union (ISU), awarded a second gold medal to Canadian pairs skaters Jamie Salé and David Pelletier after allegations of misconduct on the judging panel. In the pairs free skate, Salé and Pelletier finished second behind gold medalists Elena Berezhnaya and Anton Sikharulidze of Russia in a 5-4 judges' split. Both teams are now officially considered gold medalists.

The second gold was awarded after ISU President Ottavio Cinquanta said the ISU Council had received enough evidence to show that French judge Marie-Reine Le Gougne was "responsible of misconduct" in the judging of the pairs event. Cinquanta had convened an ISU Council meeting Feb. 14 to discuss the allegations of misconduct. In the meeting, the ISU first decided to suspend Le Gougne immediately and then deliberated over the effects of such a decision. The result of the deliberation was then passed on to IOC President Jacques Rogge, and the executive board of the IOC agreed to award the second gold medal.

"It's not the situation we expected or wanted," Salé said after she learned of the second gold. "We feel honored that they wanted to award us the gold medal. We didn't ask for it. We just wanted what's happened to be resolved."

The ISU and IOC decision was a response to a whirlwind of accusations, denials, and media and public outcry over the result of the pairs event.

Referee Ron Pfenning submitted a report of possible misconduct after the post-event judges meeting. Pfenning's report included an allegation that Le Gougne had broken down in the meeting and said she had received pressure to vote for the Russian pair. Later, there were reports that Le Gougne made simi-

lar statements to ISU Figure Skating Technical Committee Chair Sally Anne Stapleford in a hotel lobby.

Cinquanta confirmed in a press conference in Salt Lake City that Le Gougne signed a declaration of misconduct regarding pressure from the French federation, but Cinquanta denied pressuring her into signing the document. Le Gougne has since denied being pressured by her federation to vote for the Russians and has appealed the suspension. She now claims that she voted for the Russians solely on the merits of their skating.

The scandal pushed figure skating to the forefront of the Olympic Games in a way no one had expected. Instead of celebrations of athletic prowess, newspaper headlines and magazines ran glaring remarks about the "diseased nature" of figure skating.

For its part, the USFSA released a statement supporting the need for further investigation in order to ensure fair judging of all athletes in all competitions.

Cinquanta later released a proposal to reform the figure skating judging process in order to weed out the possibilities of misconduct. It's important to note that the proposal is merely that at this point — a proposal. In order for any new judging system to take effect, it first

must be presented and accepted at the ISU Congress, which meets this year in Kyoto, Japan, in June. Although the proposal was not originally on the agenda for the congress, Cinquanta said it could be added if the congress deems the proposal "urgent." The basics of the proposed judging system, which would be merit-based, include:

- ✓ A dissolution of the current 6.0 judging system
- Jumps, moves, footwork, spins and lifts would be given a score based on degree of difficulty.
- A total of 14 judges (up from nine) would evaluate how well the skater(s) performed the move.
- A computerized system would randomly select the scores of seven of the 14 judges.
- The final score would be an average of the total points awarded by the seven judges selected.

The proposed system is meant to reduce the possibility of bloc voting in international figure skating and ice dancing competition. Details still need to be worked out.

"This project is a total revolution in the history of the International Skating Union," Cinquanta said. "I promise you



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Cantinents A GOLDEN OPPORTUNITY

The U.S. captured gold medals in the ladies and ice dancing competitions at the Four Continents Championships in Jeonju, South Korea, as well as a silver in ice dancing. Since several Olympians chose not to compete in this event, many young, rising stars had a chance to show the world what they're made of.

he fourth Four Continents Championships in history took place in Jeonju, South Korea, Jan. 24–27. As they were close to the Olympic Games, many competitors who qualified for Salt Lake City didn't compete in Korea in order to prepare for the biggest competition of the season. Four Continents was an opportunity for the upand-coming skaters to prove their talent and skills.

The U.S. won the titles in dance and ladies and one silver medal in dance at the event.

KIRK'S FIRST WIN SINCE WORLD JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS

Jenny Kirk highlighted her season with a gold medal — her first in an international senior event and her first title since she became the 2000 World Junior champion. Kirk wasn't 100 percent healthy as she had sustained a groin injury in practice, but she was able to hold it together well. She placed third in the short program. She didn't make any major mistakes, but the judges deducted points for "flutzing" and a lack of speed.

Kirk delivered a strong free skate that contained five triples (with some wobbly landings). She stepped out of the triple flip and didn't go for the triple toe-triple toe combination because of the injury, but overall she left a good impression with her "Danse Macabre" program.

"It feels great," Kirk said. "I haven't won anything since [the World Junior Championships]. It's been a hard season, so it feels really good ... There were so many great skaters here [that] I just was hoping to skate well and maybe pull a medal."

Two Japanese skaters finished second and third. Shizuka Arakawa is a technically strong skater, and it was a close decision between her and Kirk. Arakawa was ranked second after a clean short program. She had some problems at the beginning of her "Turandot" free skate, but she nailed a triple Salchow-double loop combination and went for a triple toe-triple toe-double loop combination in the last seconds of her program.

"Today I'm pleased with the result, but I could have skated better," Arakawa said. "My triple toe-triple toe-double loop was very consistent in practice, but it's difficult to do it in competition. It wasn't perfect today. I can also do triple-triple-triple in practice. I will try it in competition when it's solid."

Yoshie Onda had hoped to improve from last year's bronze medal, but she was too nervous and slipped from first after the short to third overall. She clearly won the short program to fast drum music with high jumps and strong spins, although her presentation doesn't yet match her jumping skills. Onda attempted the triple Axel in the free skate, but she fell. The mistake seemed to have intimidated her, and most of her jumps looked shaky.

American Ann Patrice McDonough had a good chance to medal, but nerves got to her as well. The Korean-born skater was a star for the local media that was interested in her story.

"I'm so happy to be here. It's an honor," McDonough said. "It's my first time back since I was a baby. I can't speak Korean, so my mum has to translate."

The 2001 World Junior silver medalist stepped out of the landing of her double Axel in the short program to place fourth. She struggled with some elements in the free skate as she stumbled on a triple flip, doubled a toe loop and made other mistakes, which dropped her one spot to fifth overall. Excellent spins and good presentation were her strong points.

Andrea Gardiner was the substitute for Angela Nikodinov, who withdrew before the event citing fatigue. Gardiner had trouble with the technique of some of her jumps, and due to these mistakes she finished 11th. It's been a hard season, so it feels really good...There were so many great skaters here [that] I just was hoping to skate well and maybe pull a medal.

CHINESE PAIRS TAKE TWO MEDALS

China celebrated a successful pairs event, even without its star team of Xue Shen and Hongbo Zhao.

Qing Pang and Jian Tong won their first major international title. The couple finished first in the short program with a clean skate that featured their trademark high double twist. They retained the lead in the free skate, although they made one mistake when Pang doubled the toe loop in their double Axel-triple toe loop sequence. On the other hand, Pang and Tong produced strong triple throws and a triple twist in their performance to stay on top.

"We are very glad to have won our first gold medal at an ISU Champion-ships," Tong said at the post-event press conference. "Of course, the strongest three teams from China, Canada and the USA didn't compete. We are part of the younger generation, and we regard this competition as a preparation for the Olympic Games. For us, it was impor-

tant to do our best so that people get to know us."

Another up-and-coming team, Annabelle Langlois and Patrice Archetto of Canada, claimed the silver medal. The team placed second in the short program. They landed side-by-side triple toe loops and a throw triple Salchow, but Langlois was too fast going into the lift, and they had to alter it.


"We didn't do the right lift," Langlois said. "We went up wrong, but we saved it and did [the] lift anyway, just not as hard as usual."

Their free skate was strong, but some little mistakes prevented them from winning the title. Archetto singled the side-by-side triple Salchow, and Langlois just saved the landing of the triple toe loop. The throws also could have been more solid, but the lifts were very difficult.

2001 World Junior champions Dan Zhang and Hao Zhang captured the bronze at their first international senior event.

The young Chinese skaters have pro-

gressed significantly since last year. They had to skate first in the short program and put in a clean performance. Their free skate to "Coppelia" by Delibes was very ambitious — the team completed two side-by-side triples (toe loop and Salchow — Dan put her hand down on the Salchow), two triple throws and strong lifts. They decided against their famous quadruple twist that they have landed twice at the World **Junior Champion**ships because Hao was sick with a cold and didn't feel too well.





"Our free [skate] wasn't bad, although we had a mistake on one element," Hao said. "The right spirit was there, although I have been sick the last three days with fever up to 39 (Celsius)."

The U.S. pairs teams didn't medal this year. Stephanie Kalesavich and Aaron Parchem were the best U.S. team finishing fifth. They were third in the short program although Kalesavich two-footed the triple Salchow. Unfortunately, Kalesavich and Parchem struggled again with their side-by-side jumps in the free skate. He fell, and she singled the first attempt, then she fell on the second attempt of the triple Salchow. The skaters also need to include more difficult lifts.

It was the first international competition for the two other U.S. pairs teams. Rena Inoue and John Baldwin, Jr. had a solid short program, although he doubled the side-by-side toe loop. Inoue, who formerly competed in singles for Japan, fell hard on the throw triple loop in the free skate, and the couple dropped to seventh.

Kathryn Orscher and Garrett Lucash had a good start into the competition with the short program, where they landed all their elements but looked very cautious and slow. The free skate proved to be more difficult for them although they tried their best and finished in 10th place overall. Orscher missed both throws, falling on the triple loop and doubling the Salchow. It was obvious that they still are a new team, but they do have potential, and hopefully they will give themselves the time they need to develop.





GOLD AND SILVER FOR U.S. ICE DANCING

The U.S. ice dancing teams had a strong showing finishing first, second and fourth.

For U.S. champions Naomi Lang and Peter Tchernyshev, Four Continents was an important last test before the Olympics. Tchernyshev had suffered from shin splits earlier this season, and the couple wasn't able to compete in the Grand Prix Series events. They used this opportunity to skate their new programs in front of international judges.

The compulsory dances at Four Continents were, like at Europeans, the Ravensburger Waltz and the blues. Lang and Tchernyshev skated solid compulsories, but they made a timing mistake in the waltz. Their original dance to a selection from Bizet's "Carmen" has a lot of character and includes an interesting side-by-side footwork line with crisscrossing moves. However, the dance could have had more technical content.

Unfortunately, this is even more true for their free dance. This program was an exhibition program and still looks a lot like one, although they made a lot of changes to transform it into a competitive dance.

"It feels wonderful," said Lang on recapturing the title they had won in 2000 for the first time. "We had to work really hard this week. Now we know we can do our program no matter how tired we are [or] how jet-lagged we are. We know we can go through it anyway."

Tanith Belbin and Benjamin Agosto once again proved their talent by finishing a clear second. Their original dance to a flamenco and tango is very strong, and they skated it well in spite of some little problems in the side-by-side footwork line. Their free dance, "The Plight of Sarajevo," impressed again with innovative lifts, good footwork and strong presentation.

"We feel so confident about this free dance. We really enjoy it," Agosto said. "We're very happy to finish off the week with this performance and to take this [medal]."

He added some details

about their choice of program.

"It was Igor's (Shpilband, their coach) idea," Agosto said. "He brought us the music, and he told us the story that he had in his mind about the people of Sarajevo, his experience of winning [the World Junior Championships] in Sarajevo, all the happiness he associated with that and also all the sorrow that is brought by war and continuous struggle. I think we kind of grasped these concepts. Especially after the events of Sept. 11, we saw some of those same circumstances in our own country."

The bronze medal went to Megan Wing and Aaron Lowe of Canada. They skated well in all phases of the competition. Their free dance is set to very modern, techno-like music and is interesting to watch.

"We skated it much better than at our Canadian Championships," Lowe said. "The air, the size of the rink, even the people responded quite well. I thought they would be much more reserved, but they were right there."

The third U.S. team, Beata Handra and Charles Sinek, came in fourth. They need to work on their technical content in the original dance as well as their free dance to "Samson and Delilah."

NO MEDALS FOR U.S. MEN

The U.S. men returned home without any medals, although Matt Savoie and Johnny Weir were strong contenders.

But Savoie had bad luck — he fell sick with food poisoning and couldn't skate his best.

Jeffrey Buttle of Canada surprisingly won the event, beating the much more accomplished Takeshi Honda of Japan and China's Song Gao. Buttle was second in both the short program and free skate but managed to win overall — Savoie had dropped from first to fifth and Honda was too far behind after the short program.

Buttle deserved the title. He landed a triple flip-triple toe loop combination in the short, although his triple Axel was not clean. The entertaining and well-choreographed program to Fellini's "La Strada" really points out the artistic side of Buttle. The 19-year-old completed six triple jumps in the free skate, including two Lutzes and a triple Axel. He only missed a triple toe loop, putting his hands down on the ice. Buttle also got extra points for his original combination spin.

"The biggest experience I'm taking away was just to be out there with these big names," Buttle said. "To some people, skating last is a bad situation to be in, but I did good, so I'm happy. I chose the music to my program because I liked it, so I enjoyed skating it, and the joy came across."

Honda, the clear favorite, was too nervous again. His short program was a disaster as he fell on the quadruple toe loop and the triple Axel. The Axel worked in the free skate but not much else did. Honda landed a triple flip and a triple Salchow, but he fell on his quad toe loop, doubled the loop and stepped out of the landing of the Lutz. He still was ranked first in the free skate and moved up from fifth to second overall.

"I'm upset," Honda said. "I did well in practice and in the warm-up, but I was tired. I felt stressed out. But I have to deal with it and move on."

Gao picked up the bronze medal. He was slow in both programs, but he was able to turn in two clean performances. The only glitch was a double loop in the free skate.

"Coming here, I had hoped to medal," Gao said. "I could have done even better here."

This was his first international senior event as he didn't make the national team last season and was too old to compete on the junior circuit.

Ask Mr. Edge

Mr. Edge gives some helpful tips and answers more of your important questions.

y, oh my, oh my ... What have we here? Tis the smell of fresh spring flowers in bloom. Hark! What is that I hear? Tis the sound of the birds as they return to their summer homes, not to mention waking me up at the crack of dawn.

Ah yes, spring is in the air, and the weather is just so nice. I've come down with spring fever of the worst kind.

This month, I've decided to give my mind a rest and ruffle through all those e-mails I've received during the past few months and answer some questions.

Ready or not, here we gooooooooo ...

Q: What kind of boot and blade should I buy? I'm a Basic Skills Freestyle 2–3 skater and don't have a clue. Ohio

Mr. Edge: No need to fret my dear. Most people at your level are still unfamiliar with what to buy. I would first suggest that you contact a reputable dealer in your area. Start by asking around and see who most people recommend. Take a serious look at the Riedell line but nothing higher than the Silver Star model and either an MK Professional, Coronation Ace or Coronation Comet blade. This should carry you through to the next level.

Q: I have tried different boots out and narrowed my choices down to two brands that fit perfectly, but one requires a skating blade 3/4" longer than the other. Which blade would allow me to maximize my true potential (i.e. speed, power, edge control)? I do both freestyle and ice dance. Rochester, N.Y.

Mr. Edge: Oh well, you can't have your cake and eat it, too. If only there was such a skate that would allow you to do everything. You might need to start saving money and plan on two pairs of skates — one for freestyle and one for dance. P.S. Be sure your blades are always

sharpened properly and regularly, and you'll have no problems. Personally, I would go with the shorter blade.


Q: How do you know if your boot gives you enough support or if there is enough padding in it? Erie, Pa.

Mr. Edge: This is an important question for everybody to understand. The amount of support and thickness of padding kind of go hand in hand - but not always. If someone has very narrow ankles, more padding is a must in order for the boot to properly wrap around the ankle area. However, you can have a boot with very little ankle padding yet it will be very stiff. If you take the same narrow ankle and place it in this boot, the boot will break down sooner because of the void around the ankles. Something is going to give when landing jumps either the ankle is going to break or the boot is. In this case, the boot will give out long before the ankle will. If you can no longer land your jumps without feeling the boot collapse under you, then it is time for new ones.

Q: My daughter, a flyweight 9-year-old, is just beginning to jump and is ready for a good pair of skates. I haven't skated since Gustav Stanzione made me a pair as a young man. What's a good boot for my daughter to begin her serious interest with? Denver, Colo.

Mr. Edge: Be sure and find someone who knows boots and how each of them fit. The shape of her foot and the narrowness of her ankles will play a big part in determining which boot she will finally end up with. Being the lightweight that she is, be sure not to oversupport her or she will end up with nothing but problems in the future.

Last, but not least, the final entry for this month's column:



Mr. Edge: Ice dancers usually use a deeper hollow, but individual partners in the same team may not necessarily use the same hollow. It will depend on the following:

1. What a skater has grown used to 2. Angle of lean for a shorter vs. taller skater

A deeper hollow is required for a deeper angle of lean without slipping out of the ice. One could use a shallower hollow providing the edges are finished off properly — that is leaving them very sharp as to allow for greater edge bite. Lastly, your hollow radius would not have evolved to a 1/2" over the years. This is something that the sharpener has complete control over. There are various settings on a sharpening machine that can be used to put any number of different hollows into the blades when sharpening.

Well, skating fans, once again it's time to say so long until next month, and happy skating to one and all. Be sure and not break any bones out there.

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



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


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So Cool! Ice Time with ... Ann Devlin

53-year-old Ann Devlin has proven that by setting goals, anyone can make their dreams come true. She just recently passed her junior freestyle test and now has her sights set on the ultimate — the senior tests.

he junior freestyle test, with its required double jumps, spin combinations and flying spins, can be a daunting challenge for anyone at any age. For 53-year-old Ann Devlin, who passed the test on Dec. 16, 2001, it was "a major hurdle ... a triumph," she admitted.

But Devlin wasn't concerned about her age when she faced this next-to-the-highest level test. After all, she was 48 years old when she passed her novice test five years ago. Her biggest challenge when she stepped on the ice at the Norwich Skating Club's test session last December wasn't the birthdays, it was the butterflies.

"To be perfectly honest, the hardest part was to actually go through with it," Devlin reflected. "For me, performing under the pressure of tests is very difficult. It's a lot harder than anything else I have to do. It makes everything else pale by comparison. I definitely wasn't sure I was going to pass the test."

It took a re-skate of her double flip and the double toe loop-double loop combination jumps, but in the end two of three judges gave her a thumbs-up.

"At first I was ecstatic, then incredulous — it was hard to believe that I had finally passed the test," she said.

THAT'S SO COOL

"The younger skaters were just in awe of her," said Jennifer Goulet, one of the judges on the panel that day. "They were just shocked, I think. They stood there and watched her take her test ... in sheer appreciation of what she was doing."

They even stopped during the warmup to ask the test chair what Devlin was going to do, Goulet reported. When they found out it was the junior freestyle test, they said, "That's so cool!"

The 31-year-old judge was also in awe of Devlin's accomplishment.

"Her program had a lot of the connecting moves that I don't usually see," Goulet continued. "She skated exceptionally well to her choice of music. She had good flow [and] she knew what she was doing. I thought ... for someone 53 years old to take a junior freestyle test, that was the coolest thing."


However, she insists that age wasn't a factor in determining Devlin's marks.

"She has to do what's on the test," Goulet said. "She did a tremendous job. This says something for the sport, especially the adult portion of the sport ... to show that someone is so determined."

A GREAT ROLE MODEL

Debra Adams, Devlin's coach, who admitted she never thought she would be teaching a 53-year-old junior lady, is also proud of her student.

She is a "great role model for my younger skaters," Adams said. "She joins them in my off-ice class. They look at her like she could be their mother, but she has this wonderful ability to perform



Adams was surprised that adults can get just as nervous as the kids can.

"I found out working with Ann that she's just as vulnerable to nerves," Adams said. "It's as hard for her as it is for anybody. It doesn't change as you get older."

However, Adams reported that Devlin is making excellent progress on conquering those pesky nerves.

"She is learning to fight through [them] and to focus on the next element versus the one that has passed so she can put aside what mistakes she has made," Adams said.

BATTLING THE BUTTERFLIES

Even Devlin's work as a professor of psychology at Connecticut College doesn't give her an edge.

"Knowing and giving positive feedback to yourself are two different things,

especially when it's something you care a lot about," Devlin said. "It was terrible when I started taking these tests again. I had such bad memories of it as a child. And, if you develop negative patterns early, those are hard to break."

But change is possible, Devlin is quick to point out, "or else psychologists would be out of business!"

It helps to keep skating in perspective, Adams reminds her.

"I tell all my students to remember on a scale where this stands in [their] life. It's important, but it's not ... a life or death situation out there," Adams explained. "Ann does this because she enjoys it; she loves a challenge. But she has a husband (David) and a 17-year-old daughter (Sloan). She has another life — skating is just one part of her life."

Add in regular mental runthroughs, double run-throughs on ice and staying in shape, and you have a recipe for success.

"I've never treated her differently than my other skaters," said Adams, who is also trying to teach Devlin to have a more aggressive and competitive spirit.

"I refuse to let her stop a program," Adams said. "She's breathing hard, but she does them."

Adams worries how much she can "push someone that age. We agreed she would let me know if I've pushed her too far."

Devlin doesn't mind being pushed, although she does

acknowledge that at age 53, "You have to take better care of yourself than when you were younger - stretch more, [do more] office training. It may not be as easy as it used to be, and the time to recover from intense exercise may take longer," said Devlin who, by the way, learned the double flip

and double

GOAL SETTING STRATEGY

The best weapon against nerves, Devlin has found, is to set goals.

Lutz as an adult.

When she first returned to the ice in 1979 after a 12-year layoff, she would just "skate around" on her lunch hours when Connecticut College built a campus rink. Then a friend invited her to skate at the Cromwell rink, where she began taking lessons with Vera Bowen, who helped her through the junior moves and novice freestyle tests. Devlin became Adams' student two years ago.

"I decided if I was going to make any progress, I needed to have some goals, so I decided to start taking lessons," Devlin said. Regular goal-setting sessions quickly became a part of Devlin and Adams' relationship.

"In retrospect, I'm absolutely convinced that having these goals has made me a better skater," she said. "That's what it's really about for me. I just love to skate, and I love to jump, but having goals does promote increased competency in skating. Without those you kind of struggle with

'What am I doing?' and 'Why am I doing this?' You could just quit at a given point if you don't set goals that you are trying to achieve."

BASIC HISTORY

A solid background in the basics also helps Devlin, especially when tackling the double jumps. As a youngster in Ann Arbor, Mich. (she was once a member of the Hockettes synchronized skating team), she passed her fifth figure test and the complete silver dance test.

"I never tested freestyle — they were linked to sixth, seventh and eighth tests then," explained Devlin, who quit skating when she graduated from high school in 1967. "The highest, technically, for me was a double loop. I don't ever remember doing jump combinations as a kid."

Devlin admits, however, that freestyle is her first love.

"I wasn't a big fan of school figures, but I know they were important," she said. "Let's put it this way — I have no concept of a circle!"

So, it's not surprising that her advice to other adult skaters is to "learn the basics — learn good edges and body position, because without that you really can't advance to a higher level. Unless you feel secure on your edges, it will limit you a lot," Devlin said.

WHAT LIES AHEAD

As a challenge from her coach, Devlin moved up to the championship masters

The Test

Devlin had to hit a number of tough elements to pass her junior freestyle test. Per the 2001—02 USFSA rulebook, those elements are (Devlin's elements are in parentheses):

- ✓ Three different double jumps, including a double flip
- ✓ Jump combination with two double jumps (double toe-double loop)
- ✓ Jump sequence with a double jump at the end (Axel-half loop-mazurka-double toe)
- ✓ Combination spin (camel, layback, sit/back sit spin, flying spin and layback spin)
- ✓ Flying sit spin and layback
- ✓ Step sequence, footwork

ladies level this year. At the 2002 Eastern Adult Sectional Championships in February she earned a bronze medal, which means she qualified to compete at that level at the U.S. Adult Figure Skating Championships in Ann Arbor this month.

"I'm not putting too much pressure on myself," said Devlin, who won her junior masters III event last year. "I'm just doing it."

Her biggest challenge, however, lies ahead.

"The real goal I have is to actually finish testing," Devlin said.


That means first passing the senior moves in the field and then senior freestyle test — the highest and the last

Basic Skills Competitions: The First Steps on the Competition Highway

B efore organizing a Basic Skills competition, the first and most important step is to not only read the Compete With U.S. mission statement but also follow it. The mission statement reads: The purpose of the competition is to promote a fun, introductory, competitive experience for the beginning skater. The following article is a guided tour of the entire competition structure, including competition organization and eligibility.

ORGANIZATION

There will be many first time Basic Skills competitions throughout the country. Whether you are a seasoned competition chair or a first-time chair, you will need to familiarize yourself with the rules and procedures of running a USFSA Basic Skills competition. The USFSA Basic Skills Committee is available to help any and all competitions run as smoothly as possible while following the rules and guidelines set forth in the USFSA Rulebook and the Basic Skills competition manual.

Parents, skaters and coaches need to work together to run a successful competition. The average competition takes at least four to five months to plan. If your club or skating school is going to host a competition, remember the best thing any of us can do for the skaters is HELP. Always keep in mind it is better to be part of the solution than part of the problem.

TIMELINE FOR COMPETITION ORGANIZATION

Four months prior to event:

- 1. Select chair, co-chair and treasurer.
- 2. Determine dates and contact rink manager.
- 3. Create announcement.
- 4. Apply for approval of Basic Skills competition and Basic Skills approval number.
- 5. Apply for USFSA sanction if offering USFSA events (Pre-juvenile and above).
- Formulate initial budget —
 particularly the source of funding
 for printing and mailing (needed
 up front).

Three months prior to event:

- 1. Check on respective approvals, if not already received.
- 2. Invite judges and officials.
- 3. Estimate number of medals/ribbons needed.
- Contact vendors regarding availability and lead time necessary for ordering.
- Make contacts with vendors, inform them of competition dates and schedules, and inquire if they wish to commit to your event.

Two months prior to event:

- 1. Send announcement and entry forms out to competitors.
- 2. Host a meeting with committee people.

- 3. Make all banking arrangements.
- "Sell" the competition through members and instructors at your rink.
- 5. Solicit any competition sponsors/ free gifts.

Four to five weeks prior to event:

- 1. Entry deadline
- At closing date of entries, work quickly to set up groups and schedule, which will include ice makes and warm-up times.
- 3. Gather together program materials.
- 4. Order medals and ribbons.
- 5. Order competitor packet materials.

Two weeks prior to event:

- 1. Order the flowers.
- 2. Coordinate food and beverage needs.
- 3. Contact vendors and collect information regarding their needs.
- 4. Mail individual skating times with practice schedule to competitors.
- 5. Add information regarding general competition protocol.
- Send judges commitment confirmation along with judges schedule.
- Send accounting: (a) announcement,
 (b) listing of groups, (c) judges schedule.

One week prior to event:

- Update rink manager on needs for competition — do a "walk-through" if possible.
- 2. Send out media release.
- 3. Be sure all competitor packet materials have arrived begin filling packets.
- 4. Finish program contents and send to printer. If doing "in house," this can wait until the day before competition.

One day prior to event:

- 1. Set up all areas at the arena.
- 2. Finish filling competitor packets.
- 3. Finish assembling programs if done "in house," or see that they have been delivered from the printer.
- 4. Sort out awards and decide how they will be handled.

Day of event:

See that you have good ice, music, announcers, skaters, and start on time! Good luck — make it a fun day for all! Keep smiling!

ELIGIBILITY

What the Compete With U.S. manual says:

Basic Skills competitions are open to ALL skaters who are current eligible (ER 1.00) members of either the Chevy/U.S. Figure Skating Basic Skills Program and/or are full members of the USFSA. To be eligible, skaters must have submitted a USFSA membership application or be a member in good standing. Skaters who have passed no higher than the preliminary moves in the field, preliminary free skating, preliminary dance or adult bronze free skating tests and are currently enrolled in either a USFSA Basic Skills Program or are full USFSA members are eligible to compete. Eligibility will be based on skill level as of the designated closing date for entries. ALL BASIC SKILLS SKATERS, LEVELS SNOW-PLOW SAM THROUGH BASIC 8 MUST SKATE AT THEIR HIGHEST LEVEL PASSED. Skaters in other events may skate at their highest level passed or one level higher but not both levels.

Please note: If a skater competes in a nonqualifying competition in a "beginner or no test" category, then that skater must compete at the equivalent or higher level in a Basic Skills approved competition.

What does it all mean?

It means that we are protecting the integrity of the Basic Skills competitions. There are two important elements of the eligibility statement.

The first element is that each skater must be a member of the USFSA. They may secure their membership as a full member or as a Basic Skills member. These memberships may be acquired through a full member club or a registered Basic Skills school. Without this membership, skaters will not be allowed to compete in any of the USFSA approved Basic Skills competitions.

The second element is the level skaters are allowed to enter. In order to try and prevent "sandbagging," the USFSA has mandated that all lower-level skaters are required to skate only at their highest level passed. If a skater is good enough to compete at the higher level, he/she should be able to pass that level in the lower categories. What all the parents, skaters and coaches must remember is that this is a Basic Skills competition. Remember the mission statement and follow it.

APPROVALS AND PROCEDURES

What the rulebook says:

CR 91.01. A USFSA sanction is not required for a Compete With U.S. competition. However, an approval number obtained from the appointed Basic Skills representative, Basic Skills Committee chair or USFSA Director of Developmental Programs is required.

CR 91.02. Skaters who have passed no higher than the preliminary free skating, preliminary dance or adult bronze free skating tests may skate in a Compete With U.S. competition. No USFSA sanction will be required. However, an approval number is required from the appointed Basic Skills representative, Basic Skills Committee chair or the USFSA Director of Developmental Programs.

CR 91.03. When Compete With U.S. competitions are held in conjunction with other nonqualifying competitions, a sanction must be obtained from the USFSA. In addition, an approval number must be obtained from the appointed Basic Skills representative, Basic Skills Committee chair or the USFSA Director of Developmental Programs.

CR 92.01. For all Compete With U.S. competitions, a copy of the announcement and an approval request shall be sent to the appointed representative for approval and issuance of a Basic Skills approval number 30 days prior to the release of the competition announcement to the public. The approval is to be publicly displayed from the time of receipt to completion of the competition.

What does it all mean?

In the simplest terms, it means that all USFSA Basic Skills competitions must be approved by your Basic Skills Committee Area Representative prior to mailing the applications to the skating public. The area representatives are listed in the official USFSA directory and are posted on the USFSA web site (www.usfsa.org).

What is the difference between an approval and a sanction? Again, keeping it as simple as possible, a competition sanction is required for any competition where official USFSA judges are required to officiate the competition. A Basic Skills competition does not require official USFSA judges — they are only recommended. If a Basic Skills competition was included as part of a regular compe

tition, then the host club would need both a sanction and an approval.

COMPETE WITH U.S. SUMMARY FOR SKATERS, PARENTS AND COACHES

Please take the time to read the entire competition application before sending it to the host club.

The competition is open to ALL skaters who are current members of either the USFSA Basic Skills Program and/or are full members of the USFSA.

Skaters who have passed no higher than the preliminary free skating, preliminary moves in the field, preliminary dance or adult bronze free skating tests are eligible to compete. Eligibility will be based on skill level as of the designated closing date for entries.

ALL SNOWPLOW SAM SKATERS THROUGH BASIC 8 MUST SKATE AT THEIR HIGHEST LEVEL PASSED. Skaters in other events may skate at their highest level passed or one level higher but not both levels.


If a skater competes in a nonqualifying competition (this includes all non-Basic Skills competitions, except synchronized competitions) in a "beginner or no test" category, then that skater must compete at the equivalent or higher level in a Basic Skills approved competition. The skater would have to compete in either Beginner A/B or higher.

Compete With U.S. competitions require three judges, not related to the competitor, for each event. Judges may be any official USFSA or Skate Canada judge, or any qualified eligible or ineligible person in skating who is a USFSA member and/or Basic Skills member appointed by the organization conducting the Compete With U.S. competition and who is at least 16 years of age. For Compete With U.S. competitions, all judges and other officials shall be approved by the member club or other organization sponsoring and conducting the competition.

All standard events must comply with the Compete With U.S. manual. Each competition has the option to hold some or all of the events. There is also the flexibility to hold new, creative events.

Skaters have fun; parents enjoy your children; and coaches encourage your skaters.

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
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Kids' Questions

Hey Jenny!

2002 Four Continents champion Jenny Kirk answers your toughest questions! The response to Kids' Questions continues to be impressive, so keep those questions and photos coming.

How old were you when you started to skate? When you first started skating, did you want to go for the Olympics, or were you just skating for fun and you progressed from there? Deanna Johnson, 7, Everett, Mass.; Tara, 16, Alpena, Mich.

JK: Before I started skating lessons, I was a pretty serious gymnast. Any dreams up until that point in my life of going to the Olympics were always associated with my gymnastics. After my ninth birthday, I decided that gymnastics was getting too dangerous for me. So, my mom decided to sign me up for figure skating lessons because I live in New England, and she figured I would like to know how to at least skate around the rink! I immediately loved skating! I found that skating combined the athletics from the gymnastics that I had taken so much of and the artistry from all the ballet classes. From there I entered local competitions, and the rest, I guess, is history!

What does your daily schedule consist of, and how long do you train each day? Devin Miller, 11, and Lanna Gallo, 13, Delaware

Cape Cod, and I go to Harwich High School from 7:30 until 11:00 each morning. Then I drive to the rink where I warm up for about an hour and begin skating at 12:10 p.m. I skate three hourlong sessions in a row and finish around 3:30 p.m. A couple of days a week I have a workout session with my strength coach after skating, and then I go home and start my homework!

Q: What is your most memorable skating moment? Danielle Barnet, 15, Wolcott, Conn.

Wow, this is a tough one! Of course, I have so many memories in my head from winning competitions and standing on top of the podium. However, probably the most memorable moment was when I finished my short program last year at

the U.S. Championships in Boston. The whole week I had to deal with pressure from the media because the U.S. Championships were in my hometown, and it had gotten to the point where it was a little bit overwhelming. To top it off, I had to skate my short right after Michelle Kwan and Sarah

Hughes, who each got standing ovations. I was really nervous because short programs are never that fun, and I knew I had to nail it! I just have the best memory of finishing my program, watching the people in the crowd stand up and getting this total rush from skating so well. A lot of times if I'm having a hard time during practice I think of that moment, and it makes me motivated to train.

Q: Congrats on your win at Four Continents! Since you didn't go to the Olympics, how did you use that time, and

what are your goals for next year? How will your experience this year affect your practicing and your competitions? Stacy, 16, Mountlake Terrace, Wash.

Thank you! After Four Continents, I took a little break from skating. I spent time resting my body and getting caught up on all my schoolwork. After taking time off I came back to the ice, and I got a new show program and started working on different elements that I want to put in my programs for next season. My goals for next year are to do well internationally and make the World Team. I feel like winning Four Continents has made me want to train harder for next season and has given me a lot of confidence in my skating.

Q: What is it like training with such a famous coach? Kara Francavillo, 11, Glen Rock, N.J.

JK: I have been very fortunate to have had Evy and Mary Scotvold as my coach-

es. I have learned so much from both of them. They have given me a lot of knowledge on what it is like to be a skater at a top level because of their experience with coaching many other successful skaters.

What is your favorite part of your long program in 2002? Alan, 10, Fort Myers, Fla.

part from my long program, I would have to say, is my footwork at the end. I really like how the music builds, and at this point in my program I can always start to feel the excitement from the audience. Also, the only other jump I have left in my program is a triple Salchow so I know all I have to do is hold on and enjoy the end of my program.

Q: Can you give me any advice or tips on landing a double Axel? I loved your "Puttin' on the Ritz" program. Kaitlin, 14, Lincoln, Neb.

JK: Thank you! Well, I think a lot of people would agree with me when I say

the double Axel is probably one of the hardest jumps you will ever have to learn! One thing you should try is if there are off-ice mats in your rink, practice the

jump off the ice everyday. This will get your body into the feeling of the 2 1/2 rotations. If you've mastered that, then put two-pound weights on each of your ankles and practice it this way. Just remember to always be careful and be patient!

When competing in a big competition like the U.S. Championships, what do you think about when you're on the ice? Alynn Amelia, 12, Yarmouth, Mass.

One of the most helpful tips on competing that I have ever learned is not to think while I'm skating. I usually try to completely clear my head before my program begins and then just let my body do what it has been trained to do. I never like to think before I go into my jumps, but sometimes during my choreography I think about how cool it is that I'm performing in front of so many people!

Q: You travel all over the world to places that you've never been before. How do you prepare yourself for your trips and the conditions you might encounter? Do you enjoy traveling? Bernadette, 10, West Bahlou, Kan.

W: I love traveling to different cities within the U.S. and various countries. Although, sometimes it's tough because you can never really prepare for what you might encounter when you arrive at certain places. I think the hardest part of traveling for me is knowing what type of weather to pack for! For example, when I went to L.A. for the U.S. Championships, it was so warm it felt like summer. I couldn't believe that I was walking around outside in a tank top when it was 30 degrees back at home! Then, a week later I went to Korea where the rink was freezing, and I had to deal with a mixed bag of

weather. I think it's important to keep an open mind when traveling and just take what you can from the experience!

What are your goals on ice and off ice in four years? If college is in your mind, what are

you going to major in? Victoria Cai, 12, Millis, Mass.

JK: I've decided that I am going to hold off on college applications for at least another year. It's been tough this last year in keeping up with school and skating, and I've decided that I want to give 100% to my training the next four years. My goal for next year is to make the World Team and do really well internationally. I think winning Four Con-

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
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Good Experiences, Great Friends

and Lifelong Memories

SKATING magazine and Director of Synchronized Skating and Collegiate Programs Kelly Hodge recently conducted an essay contest among members of the USFSA synchronized skating teams who had international assignments this year. Athletes wrote about their experiences with synchronized team skating and how international assignments have helped improve team cohesiveness. Miami University senior Carla DeGirolamo, an accounting and marketing major and USFSA double gold medalist (dance and MIF), was the winner. This is her story.

ynchronized skating has been a part of my life for as long as I can remember. Now in my 11th season, I have seen this sport evolve over the years from "precision skating" to synchronized team skating. It's funny to think back to the early 1990s when marching crossovers were the thing to do, and fluorescent dresses and team warm-ups flooded the stands. Triangle and box intersections were unheard of, and no one had even thought of doing a back lunge intersection!

Throughout the years, the sport has evolved dramatically with the senior division going from 32, to 24, and now 20 athletes. Costumes are now elegant, and programs are jam-packed with intricate and difficult maneuvers all performed with unbelievable speed and flow.

I have dedicated so much of my life to this sport that it has become a part of my identity. Throughout my years in school, I have always been known as "the skater." To this day, when I encounter someone that I haven't seen in years, the first thing they always ask me is if I am still skating. I, of course, am proud to say, "Yes!"

I have been a member of the Miami University varsity synchronized skating team for the past four years. I consider myself very fortunate because I have been given the chance to live out my childhood dream ... to be on the Miami team! If anyone would have told me when I was 12 years old that I would be here [at Miami] today, [and] also a member of synchronized skating's "Team USA," I never would have believed it! My experience has been so much more than I could ever

have asked for when I was that wide-eyed kid who looked up to the older skaters.

Throughout my 11 years of skating on a synchronized team, I have learned an expanse of lessons that will be of great value throughout the rest of my life. First, teamwork is not only vital to success in synchronized skating, but it is also important outside the ice rink. Being a member of a team with 23 other people who have 23 different backgrounds, skating skills, life experiences and personalities is certainly not an easy task, but for synchronized skaters, it is a necessity. We have to mold 24 people into one unit, doing exactly the same thing at exactly the same time — an amazing concept when you think about it — but that's what we do everyday. Trust, patience, cooperation, hard work and passion are some of the qualities that this type of teamwork helps synchronized skaters to acquire — all essentials in meeting our goals.

The importance of good time management is another thing I have learned from my years of synchronized skating, especially from being a college athlete. I have learned that planning ahead is essential so that you don't get behind in your work. Some people think that I have had to give certain things up to be a serious synchronized skater, but I don't look at it that way at all. I have had amazing experiences and opportunities given to me, things that many people never get to experience in their whole lives. Honestly, I just love to skate, and that's why I am still here ... everything else has been a wonderful bonus.

Skating with 23 of your closest friends and being able to share the happy times and lean on them in the hard times is just such an amazing experience! Skating on a college team, we each have only four years to skate, and it is always sad when each class graduates. But we all still keep in touch, and when we do get together it is as though nothing has changed. One of the up-sides to skating in college is that we add new members to our "family" every year ... we always joke around that sooner or later, wherever we go there will be a Miami alum to visit!

MEMORIES

I have so many great memories from synchronized skating, but there are a few that definitely stand out in my mind.

First, a season at Miami would not be complete without a travel fiasco ... it seems to have become a tradition! For instance, my freshman year we were on our way to the airport headed to Toronto, Canada, for our international assignment when we got caught in a blizzard on the highway for three hours. Needless to say we missed our flight and had to catch one the next morning. Then, my sophomore year, we were headed to Helsinki, Finland, for the Finlandia Cup competition. This time we made it to the airport on time only to find out that our flight had been canceled! We did find another flight and arrived in Helsinki on time, but our luggage did not! I have many special memories from being a member on an international team and representing the United States all over the world. I love being able to wear the red, white and blue as a member of Team USA. I like to travel abroad with the other U.S. teams and get to know them, instead of just knowing of them.

One of my favorite memories of an international competition is when we competed in the Prague Cup last year and took first place. It is so special to me because it was Miami's first international gold medal and also because we were able to achieve this victory for the United States. I remember feeling such a sense of pride when they raised our flag, and we sang the national anthem — a cappella! Competing at the World Championships was also such a great honor and so much fun!

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
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


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
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How'd You Do That Quadruple Toe? - Part 2

In this continuing series, SKATING finishes its look at the quadruple toe loop. It is hoped that this information will help coaches better teach this jump to their skaters.

Part 2 of this series on the quadruple toe loop presents an analysis of the techniques used by four senior men performing quads during the 2000–01 competitive season. The relationships between the skaters' techniques with both jump height and rotational velocity are discussed. Refer to part 1 of this series for basic characteristics of the quad toes and the November 2001 issue of SKATING for definitions of terms.

TECHNIQUE ANALYSIS

▶ How did the skaters get the rotations they needed for the jumps?

Skaters need to generate rotational (angular) momentum for the jump while they are still on the ice. The skaters' rotational momentum will be maintained during the flight phase of the jump, allowing the necessary rotations in the air to be completed. The skaters control the speed of rotation by adjusting their body positions (moment of inertia).




Figure 1. Moment of inertia about a longitudinal axis through the trunk for a landed and not landed quad toe loop. Notice that the not landed jump is more open (larger moment of inertia) at take-off and for the first part of the jump.

In the quadruple toe loops, the skaters began to bring their arms and legs in toward their bodies before their left toe pick entered the ice (Figure 1). At the instant of take-off, they were already in a fairly tight body position and continued to bring their arms and legs into their bodies quickly until they reached their tightest rotating position (decreasing their moments of inertia). Thus the speed of rotation of the skaters was increasing while they were still on the ice and continued to increase while in the air. The tightest body position was then held until they began to check out just before landing.

Moment of inertia for a successful and unsuccessful quad toe loop

▶ How do skaters' body segments contribute to developing rotational velocity?

While on the ice, the skaters' arm, leg and trunk movements generate forces against the ice that enable the skaters to develop rotational momentum for the jump. Rotational momentum was created prior to toe pick during the skaters' three-turn approach. Between toe pick and take-off, the shoulders (which were initially less rotated than the hips at tap) turned faster than the

hips so that the shoulders had rotated past the hips by take-off (Part 1). At this time, the skaters were pulling the arms in toward the body decreasing the moment of inertia (notice the right arm in Figure 2). The turning of the shoulders, pulling in of the arms and positioning of the glide (right) leg parallel to the take-off (left) leg were influential in increasing the rotational speeds of the skaters between toe pick and take-off (Figure 2).

In the landed jumps, the skaters typically had smaller moments of inertia from toe pick all the way through to landing. The shorter (but not too short) pick distances and proper free (right) leg positions at take-off contributed to the smaller moments of inertia, which made it easier for the skaters to obtain tight rotating positions quickly after take-off.

Rotational velocity of skaters and moments of inertia of arms and legs




Figure 2. Rotational velocity (speed of rotation) of a skater during press up (from toe pick to take-off) along with the moments of inertia of arms and legs about a longitudinal axis through the trunk. The rotational velocity increases as the skater turns 199 degrees on the ice prior to take-off. Notice that the moments of inertia of the right arm and left leg decrease most at the beginning (increasing rotational velocity). Also note that the moment of inertia of the right leg decreases gradually throughout the whole phase as this leg is brought next to the pick (left) leg.

▶ When do the skaters generate vertical velocity in preparation for take-off?


For most skaters, their centers of mass (COMs) began to rise just after toe pick (Figure 3). This occurred as the knee of the gliding (right) leg began to straighten (extend), and the skaters pressed up off the pick. The skaters had positive vertical velocities (upward speed) through this entire phase of the jump. Greater vertical velocity (upward speed) at take-off results in steeper take-off angles, higher jumps and more time in the air. Vertical velocity at take-off was similar for both the landed and not landed jumps. Both groups developed sufficient velocity to be in the air for at least 0.63s.

How does the toe pick contribute to developing vertical velocity?

The knee of the pick (left) leg was slightly bent (flexed) at the tap. This knee then either bent (flexed) slightly more or remained fixed prior to straightening (extending). To control the bending (flexing) of the knee, the muscles of the skaters' left thigh (quadriceps) contract, generating take-off force for the jump. This force augments the downward force the skaters are applying against the ice through the straightening (extending) of the glide (right) leg. The straightening of the glide leg is followed by a quick extension (straightening) of the pick (left) leg that further increases the skaters'


downward force (Figure 4). Thus during this phase, power strength and timing are important. As approach speed increases, the easier it is for the skater to develop large forces as the pick enters the ice; however, the approach speed must be kept under control.

▶ How do the arms and glide (right) leg of the skaters contribute to developing vertical velocity?

During take-off, the contributions of the arms and glide (right) leg to the heights of the skaters' jumps were minimal. In landed jumps, only an average of 2.2% of the vertical momentum of the skaters came from the relative contributions of the arms and free leg. Recall that the glide (right) leg was brought to a position parallel to the take-off leg, not up and through. In not landed jumps, the arms and free leg had a slightly higher contribution (4.3%). Thus, in landed quad toe loops, the skaters used little upward drive of the arms and free (right) leg to obtain height, but rather used these limbs to develop rotational speed.

Knee flexion angles from toe pick to take-off

Figure 4. Knee flexion angles for the pick (left) leg and glide (right) leg for a landed quadruple toe loop. The knee angles are plotted from the instant of toe pick to take-off. Note that the glide leg leaves the ice before the tap leg.



▶ How does the toe pick affect the skaters' horizontal velocities?

When the tap entered the ice, the skaters' horizontal velocities (forward speed) decreased due to the backward force of the pick slowing the skater. Figure 3 illustrates the increase in vertical velocity (upward speed) and the decrease in horizontal velocity that occurs from toe pick to take-off.

▶ What did the skaters do to carry speed out of the jump?

As mentioned previously, the horizontal velocity (forward speed) of the skaters slowed from toe pick to take-off. To optimize both horizontal velocity (needed to carry speed out of the jump) and vertical velocity (upward speed) for take-off, skaters should benefit from a controlled fast approach. Excessive speed that disrupts the rhythm and timing of the jump, however, is detrimental.

CONCLUSIONS FOR PART 1 AND 2

The purpose of analyzing the quadruple toe loop was to

determine important features of the jump that may help coaches to teach this difficult jump to elite skaters. Based on the jumps that were studied, the following factors appear to be important aspects of successful jumps:

1. Controlled fast approach. Vertical velocity (upward speed) was generated after the left toe pick entered the ice, and the skater pressed up with both legs for take-off. More speed can be converted in the upward direction with a controlled fast approach. A controlled fast approach also helps ensure that the skater carries adequate horizontal (forward) speed through the jump to the landing. Quadruple toe loops typically have a slightly slower approach speed than triple toe loops.

2. Appropriate body position at the time the toe pick enters the ice. For landed quads, the knee of the glide (right) leg was bent (flexed) with the skaters hips rotated on average 45 degrees into the jump. The shoulders were not as open as the hips. The pick occurred behind the right hip on a slightly bent knee on average 30 inches behind the glide (right) foot. The shorter (but not too short) pick distance reduced the skaters' moments of inertia allowing them to generate a greater rotational speed on the ice in preparation for take-off.

3. Appropriate body movement and arm positioning. The arms were pulling in by the time of toe pick, increasing the skater's rotational speed well before take-off. As the skater pressed up off the pick, the shoulders rotated faster than the hips so that the shoulders were ahead of the hips at take-off. Simultaneously, the free (right) leg was brought to a position just parallel to the take-off (left) leg, further contributing to an increase in rotational speed at take-off. Vertical velocity came primarily from extension of the legs pressing against the ice, whereas the arms and free leg (once off the ice) contributed primarily to the rotational speed.

4. Appropriate control of body position and rotation speed in the air. Despite the tight (closed) body positions at take-off, the skaters continued to decrease their moments of inertia (closed position) in the air in order to increase rotation speed. Their tightest body position was held until just before landing. A quick, strong check out is necessary.

COACH'S SUMMARY

Rotation is the key to the quad and must be initiated early. The arms and legs must pull in sooner, the rotations must be faster, and the arms and legs must stay in longer as compared to a triple. Specifically, the right arm starts coming in prior to toe pick and is almost in by take-off. The free leg (right) attains a position parallel to the take-off leg (left) at take-off and does not move up and through as in the Axel. Height comes from pressing up off of both legs.

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A Golden Opportunity

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Savoie won the short program. He did his elements, but he wasn't really confident on the jumps. His spins still were the best of the field.

"I wasn't really happy with [the program] — it was messy," Savoie said. "But at least I stood up on everything and ended up well. [On] all the jumps, I struggled with the landings, and that was pretty obvious. I was pretty happy with my presentation, but the jumps could have been much stronger."

The food poisoning really affected him in the free skate. Savoie doubled the Salchow as well as his second Axel and fell on the Lutz at the end. He landed four clean triples, but it wasn't enough to stay in the top three.

Weir would have needed more speed and attack in his programs to finish on the podium. The judges had him third in the short program after he messed up the triple flip.


"I don't know. I was just a little tentative on it, and I switched some edges going into it," Weir said about the mistake. "Overall, I think the program was a little shaky. I was a little tired. [The U.S. Championships] were last week. I was pleased that I went out and didn't fall all over the ice, I guess."

Weir has a very nice free skate to music from Chinese movies, but he failed to complete a clean triple Axel. This mistake turned out to be costly, because the 2001 World Junior champion slipped to fourth overall, although he hit six other

triples and had excellent spins.

Derrick Delmore was gutsy — he attempted the quad Salchow in the short program and almost had it. He crashed on the quad Salchow in the free skate and made some other errors to finish 10th overall.

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
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
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

this system will reduce to a minimum the possibility of bloc judging."

Following Cinquanta's proposal, USFSA President Phyllis Howard released a statement on behalf of U.S. Figure Skating fully supporting any initiative that will increase the opportunity for all athletes in all disciplines to compete on a level playing field and be fairly judged.


The media and public outcry after the pairs free skate was intense due to what was perceived as an unfair result. Figure skating is inherently a subjective sport, but the crux of this particular matter wasn't subjectivity but misconduct. Through it all, both pairs teams handled themselves with extreme poise in an unfamiliar situation.

"It's not about us and the Russians," Pelletier said. "It's about the sport we love dearly. ... I hope it's not over, that they (the ISU) don't stop cleaning house now."

The Russians also accepted the awarding of the second gold medals with class. They joined Salé and Pelletier at the Salt Lake Ice Center for the second medal ceremony, and Berezhnaya sang happily with her national anthem as the Russian flag was raised for a second time. Sikharulidze also stated that he was pleased with the resolution of the matter.

"I'm very happy because I think now, after all these kinds of problems, we're all happy," he said after the second medal ceremony. "I think the audience must be happy as well because it's the right decision."

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

panel, and it's hard to be taken into consideration unless you skate two heads above the competitors, and I guess we weren't skating two heads above our competitors," he said.

Lang and Tchernyshev know they have to "wait their turn" to move up in the ice dancing ranks, but they don't plan to wait around without working hard.

"It doesn't mean that we just have to sit on our butt and wait," Tchernyshev said. "Year after year we have to show the judges that we are improving. It's not just waiting with the same kind of level of skating. You have to wait but at the same time show progress all the time — then you are going to be taken into consideration."

Lang also added that they plan to use this experience to help them in four years.

"We took in every experience," she said. "As soon as we stepped on the ice, we tried to draw in every moment that we could so next Olympics we'll know what to expect."

Handra and Sinek had a new challenge in their free dance to "Samson and Delilah" — illness. Sinek had a sinus infection, which he said began to develop the night before the free dance. His fever ran as high as 102 degrees the day of the final.

"The last 30 seconds of the program I just couldn't breathe," Sinek said. "My legs didn't move very well. I didn't feel good about it, but we didn't fall. We did our steps, [and] we were pretty much on time. We ended the program right on time. I gave it my all. I gave it my best because I didn't give up and try to use this as an excuse as to why I fell apart at the end of the program."

Handra and Sinek, who finished 23rd in Salt Lake City, also told reporters that they would be performing in the Opening Ceremonies for the 2002 Paralympic Games on March 7 in Salt Lake City.
