



## Heiss remembers her first double Axel in 1956

#### A look back

With all the focus on the triple Axels being performed by female skaters these days, it is worth going back in time – almost 50 years – to the first double Axel done by a woman.

"I needed it," said Carol Heiss Jenkins last November at the NHK Trophy, in between talking to numerous Japanese reporters about her student, Miki Ando, and Ando's quad. "I was the first one to land it cleanly. I had to do it. I believe that helped make me World champion in '56 in Garmisch."

She was just 16-year-old Carol Heiss then. Later she married Hayes Alan Jenkins, who won the men's Olympic figure skating gold medal in 1956.

Heiss said that her first victory over 1956 Olympic champion Tenley Albright was aided by a then-unknown jump for ladies – the double Axel.

"Before that, there was a little three turn, a little cheated," Heiss said. "It was something that nobody had. In those days we had the compulsory school figures, and it was difficult. I needed something that was different, and that was it."

She had just lost to Albright at the 1956 Olympic Winter Games in Cortina d'Ampezzo, Italy. Two weeks later, in the middle of February, the two rivals were in Garmisch-Partenkirchen, Germany, for the World Championships. This time Heiss did the double Axel well for the first time in a major championship.

It did not happen overnight.

"It took me forever, almost 2 1/2 years," Heiss said. "The first one I landed was when I was 15, in 1955, but after Worlds. I didn't have it clean at Worlds in 1955. Nobody did. And that's when I thought if I could do that, maybe that would give me the edge. Everybody is always looking for the edge."

It did give her the edge. After finishing second to Albright four times at the U.S. Championships, as well as the 1955 World Championships and 1956 Olympics, Heiss finally beat her.

She took the next four World Championships and the 1960

Olympic gold medal in Squaw Valley, Calif.

Unlike the triple Axel, which only a half dozen women have done in competition as of December 2005 – almost 17 years after the first by Midori Ito at the 1989 Worlds – it didn't take long for others to do the double Axel once Heiss had done it.


"By 1960, Barbara Roles, myself, Sjoujke Dykstra, everyone on the podium, probably all the tops ones (had landed it)," Heiss said.

Now, the big thing is the triple Axel done by Mao Asada when she was just 14, and the person who did the first double Axel is impressed.

"I think it is awesome. I think it is wonderful. You see it is a difficult jump, even for boys," Heiss Jenkins said.

Favorite sports team: That's definitely the Washington Redskins. I was born and raised in Washington, D.C. It has (laughs) certainly been a tough 10 years rooting for them. I grew up when Joe Gibbs was on the first run with the Redskins, winning Super Bowls. No matter how difficult it's been, I continue to sit in front of the TV and hope they will win again.

Favorite dish: Pizza. I could have pizza and ice cream every night the rest of my life and be happy. I can't do that, but I would.

Dream vacation: I've already had that. Wrightsville Beach (in North Carolina) - evert year. I drive down with my family. It's the most relaxing place you'll ever find, just laid back and great for the family. The people are extremely friendly. You will see people walking, jogging or biking every morning in this big park. If it were just my wife and I, anywhere in the Caribbean would work. Sit back on the beach and hop on a Wave Runner together.

If a movie were made about your life, what's the title, and who plays

you? I guess the standard answer would be Brad Pitt – not because I look anything like him, but because he's the best-looking guy in Hollywood. Do you follow a strict diet? I've always been strict about that. I'm comfortable and in shape at 165 pounds, but for skating competitions I have to come in around 145 pounds.



I would train more efficiently. You can get what you need to get done in 45 minutes, instead of 1½ hours of wasting time and unnecessary repetitions.







## 'Ice Diaries' set for broadcast on TLC

The Learning Channel (TLC) will broadcast this month the first of six episodes of "Ice Diaries," a documentary/reality project following four Olympic hopefuls during 2005the 06 competitive season leading up to the 2006 State Farm U.S. Figure Skating Championships.

The show, which began taping in early October, will focus

on 2005 Grand Prix Final participant Alissa Czisny, 2005 U.S. fifth-place-finisher Bebe Liang, 2005 U.S. junior champion Sandy Rucker, and Danielle Kahle. Camera crews were allowed access to the skaters in their homes, at practice and competitions, and in social settings.

"People will be getting a full look for the first time at what high-level figure skaters who want to make the Olympics go through," one of the show's co-creators, Scott Williams, said. "It's the first time a television audience will see that in that kind of detail."

The first and second one-hour episodes will air Jan. 7, with the following four episodes being broadcast each of the next four Saturdays.

Williams believes the show will not only be educational to viewers but also its stars.

"These skaters, it's very new to them to be in the limelight and be the center of attention," Williams said. "They'll be more prepared to deal (with the amount of media) at big competitions, like nationals. It's not going to be a surprise to them."

"Ice Diaries" is produced by TWI, the media/content arm of sports marketing firm IMG, in association with Turtle Island Productions. Co-creators Williams and Dan Marinelli conceived the project in early 2005, with a pilot that included the recently retired Jennifer Kirk.

## Nam relishing second opportunity as pairs skater

It's been a long and winding road to St. Louis, Mo., and the 2006 State Farm U.S. Championships for Naomi Nari Nam.

She showed endless potential, finishing second to Michelle Kwan at the 1999 U.S. Figure Skating Championships in Salt Lake City. Then just 13, she was considered the complete package, with a gold-medal winning smile to boot.

But injuries threw her skating career off course.

In July of 2000, Nam started to experience tendonitis in her hip. At the time, she thought nothing of it and simply took some time off before the 2000-01 season. A few months later, while training for a Junior Grand Prix event, Nam tried to perform a triple Lutz, heard something pop and quickly fell to the ground in pain.

"I didn't know what happened," Nam said, "but I knew it was bad."

Nam was diagnosed with a fracture in her growth plate. Though sidelined, Nam hoped to recover in time to compete at the 2001 U.S. Championships. She was forced to withdraw the day before the competition, however, as her hip continued to give her problems.

"I was crushed," Nam said. "Things were going really, really well. Then, the day before the U.S. Championships, it started hurting again. I was just devastated."

Upon the recommendation of 1998 Olympic champion Tara Lipinski, Nam saw the same doctor in Florida who performed surgery on Lipinski's hip months earlier. As it turned out, Nam was diagnosed with the same injury as Lipinski, torn cartilage in her hip joint. She underwent surgery a day later.

While recovering from the injury, Nam was able to enjoy life as a normal teenager. She graduated high school, attended prom and got her first job. During that time, Nam admits she was on the fence about making a serious attempt at a comeback. Her experience, though,


as a part-time coach helped refuel her competitive fire.

"I was coaching one day and thought, 'I love coaching, but I can't do this the rest of my life," Nam said. "I was still young. I could still have a career if I worked at it, so I decided to start skating again."


Nam toiled with singles in 2004 before making the switch to pairs and teaming with fellow Californian Themistocles Leftheris. The pair immediately gelled on the ice despite the fact that Nam had no previous experience in pairs.

At the 2005 Pacific Coast Sectional Championships, Nam and Leftheris ran away with the competition, winning by 23 points with a score of 150.06, qualifying them for U.S. Championships.

"I feel like I've gotten a second chance from God," she said. "I feel so blessed that I have the ability and love to skate. I just feel blessed."

#### Lipinski elected to United States Skating Hall of Fame

Tara Lipinski, the youngest Olympic gold medalist in ladies figure skating, was recently elected to the United States Skating Museum & Hall of Fame.

Her induction is scheduled during the 2006 State Farm U.S. Figure Skating Championships in St. Louis in January.

Lipinski holds the distinction of being the youngest ladies figure skating champion at three major competitions. At 14, she captured a gold medal at the 1997 U.S. and

World Championships. One year later Lipinski, who was 15 years and 255 days old, won the ladies competition at the 1998 Olympic Winter Games in Nagano, Japan, making her the youngest ladies figure skating Olympic gold medalist.

Her triumph in Nagano made her the sixth American woman to win an Olympic figure skating title. Lipinski also has a place in the record book as being the first skater, regardless of gender, to complete a triple loop-triple loop combination in a national or international competition.

Lipinski's early sports career was not spent figure skating but competitive roller skating. She began roller skating at age 3 and by 9 had become a national age-group champion. At 6 she decided to add figure skating to her athletic repertoire and in 1994, at age 12, won the U.S. Olympic Festival.

The Olympic gold medalist has remained active in many charitable organizations, including serving as spokesperson for Boys and Girls Clubs of America, Tobacco-Free Kids and the National Youth Anti-Drug Media Campaign.

#### Kwan featured in anti-doping campagin

Michelle Kwan is one of 10 U.S. Olympic hopefuls featured in an anti-doping public service announcement (PSA) launched by the United States Anti-Doping Agency in conjunction with the United States Olympic Committee.

The "Celebrating the Value of Fair Play" campaign features television, radio and movie theater public PSAs aimed to promote fair play, respect and integrity in sports.

Kwan along with moguls skier Jeremy Bloom, bobsledder Vonetta Flowers, speed skater Jennifer Rodriguez and short track speedskater Apolo Anton Ohno are featured in the movie theatre PSA, which can be seen in Chicago, Dallas, New York and Los Angeles.

In addition to movie theatres, Kwan's PSA can be found in the program for the 2006 State Farm U.S. Figure Skating Championships and this edition of SKATING magazine.

The USOC and USADA featured similar PSAs featuring U.S. Olympic hopefuls leading up to the 2004 Olympic Games in Athens, Greece.

## 'Olympic Ice' program to kick off nightly competition

Figure skating fans will receive more than their standard competition fix when the 2006 Olympic Winter Games get under way next month in Torino, Italy.

A nightly, hourlong program titled "Olympic Ice" will

provide fans an all-access pass inside the figure skating competition, which is considered the Winter Games' showcase event.

"Olympic Ice" will be televised on the USA Network between 6-7 p.m. ET, prior to each evening's competition. The show will run from Feb. 10-24. Mary Carillo and two-time Olympic champion Dick Button are the program's co-hosts.

Torino will be Carillo's eighth Olympic assignment and fifth with NBC, while Button is a longtime ABC figure skating analyst.

The program, Button said, won't be full of canned emotional features and pre-determined interviews. Instead, it will be dedicated to giving viewers an entertaining mix of breaking news, in-depth analysis and exclusive athlete interviews.

"I think fans can expect a wide variety of stuff," said Button from his Park Avenue apartment in New York City. "It's not the aim to fill the hour with pre-canned features, the kind of thing you see all the time. It's a mix of opinion, debate about competitors, their performances and the scoring system.

"There will be a lot of interviews with coaches, choreographers and skaters themselves. We'll be backstage, and it won't be overly produced. It will be done right in the rink and around the rink. It's a warm-up for the evening event and a cool down from the night before. It doesn't recap as much as analyze."

Button, who won Olympic gold in 1948 and 1952, said the program is geared toward figure skating fans who can appreciate good skating.

"We will assume that the audience has a great knowledge as a starting point," Button said. "That pleases me no end because I have to assume now that people know a lot more about skating than they did, for example, 10, 20, 30, 40 years ago.


"Through the years the audience has become exceedingly educated and knowledgeable, so this program will take that as a basic root and begin to follow it through from there. Also, we don't have to be too serious about it. At least I hope we don't. And I hope they don't kick me out if I make some comments that the authorities may not appreciate."

For Button, this will be the 15th Olympics he's been a part of as a competitor, analyst or spectator.

The show will also utilize NBC's skating experts and the unique resources of NBC's production team.

Handling NBC's broadcast of the competition will be Scott Hamilton, Sandra Bezic and Tracy Wilson. David Winner, who produced the recent Marshalls U.S. Figure Skating Challenge in Boston and the State Farm U.S. Figure Skating Championships in St. Louis, will produce the competition at the Olympic Winter Games.

## State Farm is there


"It meant that, although skating was a large part of my life, my academic endeavors were also rewarded," Horstman said.

## Corporate sponsors making a difference for skaters

## Education, skating offer lessons for a lifetime

Courtney Sayther lives her life by a quote from author Paula Rinehart that says, "Real success is measured only by the courage it takes to do and say what needs to be done or said."

"I'm not sure what I'm destined to accomplish with my life, but whatever it is, I want to do it with courage, humility and a vision of what is right and true," said Sayther, a 1999 Scholastic Honors Team scholarship recipient.

Sayther's convictions are testament to an education and a skating career that have prepared her for a successful life.

She received her degree (with honors) in conflict studies from DePauw University in Greencastle, Ind., and is currently living in Boston and working as a leadership consultant for a nonprofit women's organization at Harvard University. She's also working on her master's degree in dispute resolution/mediation at the University of Massachusetts Boston, where she'll graduate in May.

"Skating taught me about the importance of discipline and follow-through," said Sayther, who today skates just for fun. "I know that I have been successful in my academic and work environments because of the work ethic I developed throughout my skating career. Just like skating, everyday life is filled with challenges, twists and turns. You can either deal with them head on, with confidence and endurance, or you can back down and let them conquer you."

In addition to her parents, Sayther credits her skating coach, Missy McCandless-Servin, for empowering her to "dream big."

Earning a Scholastic Honors Team scholarship meant a lot, she said, as she embarked on her college career at DePauw.

"It was an incredible honor," Sayther said. "To receive a State Farm scholarship at the end of my skating career was very reassuring."

Katie Bach (2001) – "I want to apply my skills as an engineer to help people. I plan to work in the medical device industry, where I can work on products to help save lives. I also feel very strongly about environmental conservation issues and would like to help influence change in that area."

Lisa Horstman (2003) – "There are those skaters who concentrate wholly on skating and neglect or simply get by in their school work. I was not one of those skaters, and the Scholastic Honors Team rewarded me for balancing school and skating. It was nice to get that kind of recognition."

Laura Nelson (1998) – "I'll never forget the awards ceremony (scholarship recipients) right before the men's free skate at the 1998 U.S. Championships. I arrived in Philly and literally ran into the arena just in time to accept the award. It was special to share the experience with my friend and teammate Alison Martinez. It was a great weekend and an Olympic year, so there was a lot of excitement in the air. Michelle Kwan gave two of her best performances of her life, which added to the magic. I was – and still am – honored to have been mentioned among such a talented group of students and skaters."

Matthew Inman (2001) – "I work as a figure skating researcher at ABC Sports in New York. I feel very fortunate to have landed a job, straight out of college, that has merged two of my passions: a love of figure skating and desire to gain more knowledge.

I think corporate sponsorships send a great message that high-level skating and academics don't necessarily have to be mutually exclusive."

**Kimberly Kroh (2004)** – "I hope that someday I can be part of Engineers Without Borders, a nonprofit organization that sends engineers all over the world to implement sustainable living technology in underdeveloped nations.

One of the most memorable moments in my life was traveling to Atlanta to receive my Scholastic Honors Team award. Staying in the official hotel, getting my picture taken for credentials, and watching my favorite skaters compete live were all amazing experiences."

Elizabeth Belleau (2004) – "I used to think that I wanted to be a physician or a surgeon, which I may do at some point. Right now, though, my goal is to help those with emotional challenges by becoming a psychologist.

State Farm's support of figure skating and skaters is great. The fact these corporations recognize the importance of pursuing a college degree by providing a scholarship to a figure skater is very affirming."


The Chevy Scholastic Honors Team is perhaps my most memorable skating achievement, simply because it integrated the two most important aspects of my life at that time."

I picked up the phone and thanked him and showered him with all of the joy he brought to my life. He passed away three weeks later. What I've learned in this life is letting the people you love know that you love and care for them. We all have a short time here on this Earth."

Jordan Miller (2003) – "My long-term goal outside of skating is to practice criminal defense because I believe in standing up for the rights of the accused. For this and all other aspects of my life, the determination and persistence I learned from skating will be most useful."

Jenni Tew (1999) – "I am currently an interior design student and owner of a small business catering to figure skaters in the areas of costume design, music editing and choreography.

Being a member of the Scholastic Honors Team was an honor and a privilege, and I'm very proud of such an elite group. To me, it was a validation on my hard work and achievement in two of the most important areas of my life: my education and skating career. I'm happy that I was able to do both without one or the other suffering."



Frozen in Time: The Enduring Legacy of the 1961 U.S. Figure Skating Team by Nikki Nichols is the first book on one of the most heartbreaking tragedies in the history of American sport. It honors the 45th anniversary of the plane crash that killed all 18 members of the U.S. Figure Skating Team, along with 16 of their friends, family and coaches, in February 1961. In the following excerpt, the skaters prepare to board the plane to the World Championships in Prague, a destination they will never reach. The next morning their plane will crash in Brussels, Belgium.

"There it is!" she exclaimed. She tugged her mother, Maribel, away from an ongoing conversation and the two gushed over what they saw. A ravishing Laurence, clad in a bright red dress and gliding backward on a pond wearing her famously big smile, was on the cover of Sports Illustrated. The headline read "Laurence Owen:

At the airport, Daniel Ryan - who coached ice dance champions Larry Pierce and Dee Dee Sherbloom - called his wife, Rose Anne, one last time before boarding Sabena Flight 548. He had a few simple and loving requests. "Promise me three things that you will go to church, always keep smiling and take care of yourself."

Steffi and Sherri Westerfeld called their mother, Myra, one last time, too. Myra was biting her nails down to the stubs over the prospect of her little girls flying over the ocean to a foreign, communist land. Her voice choked as she bid farewell to the girls, who were also overcome with emotion and excitement.

As the group of skaters walked through the terminal, Laurence Owen glanced over her shoulder and noticed America's Most Exciting Girl Skater." Maribel bought several copies, and they planned to read the article on the plane. The other skaters were impatient to see it. One can only imagine how this lavish praise of Laurence must have hurt Steffi, who had come so close to being America's number-one girl skater. If Steffi possessed any teenage jealously at all, she remained poised throughout the fussing over Laurence.

The anticipation was building and hearts were racing as the passengers were rounded up into the boarding area. They were escorted on a bus to runway 22R. The entire 34-member U.S. figure skating entourage started filing up the steps of the plane, bundled in their traveling coats. On their lapels they wore the special commemorative pins minted for the Worlds meet.

The atmosphere was electric as they moved closer to the door of the plane, but the call "Wait!" shot from the tarmac below. An Associated Press photographer wanted to capture this triumphant moment on film for the morning papers. Deane McMinn, the team manager, rearranged everyone according to who he felt should be more center stage in the photos. On the far left, Deane held up a white cardboard sign that read, "U.S. Figure Skating Association." Ladies champion Laurence Owen was to his left, and sported the large and warm smile for which she had become famous. Steffi occupied the desirable middle front of the photograph, and Rhode Michelson, the bronze medal winner, was off to her right. The men's champions filed behind them, some with their feet on the ground, and others half-perched on the stairs to the plane. The next rows were a mélange of pairs teams and ice dancers. Larry Pierce, near the top of the stairs, held up all five fingers—to signal the middle finger times five, a joke he knew his good friend Ron Ludington would especially appreciate when he saw the next morning's sports section. The flashbulbs popped, capturing the glowing faces of the U.S. team.

With a photographer's "thank you and bon voyage," the skaters trampled up the stairs, medals bouncing on their chests, and lucky silver dollars jangling in a few pockets.

## Hopeful and guarded

Kwan used to dealing with adversity during stellar career

As Michelle Kwan took the ice for her highly anticipated first competition of the season at the Marshalls U.S. Figure Skating Challenge in Boston on Dec. 11, it was obvious that her heart was still in the sport. Skating to "Totentanz," the short program she is preparing for the State Farm U.S. Championships, and "You Raise Me Up," Kwan overwhelmingly won the spectators' hearts - and votes - at the fan-driven competition. But after a less-than-perfect performance, the question on everybody's mind seemed to be, for how long can her body hold up? The day before the event, Kwan described herself as "lucky" to avoid major injury over the course of her career. But this would not be


the first time she has triumphed over similar setbacks.

"I've done this before," she said. "Before the '98 Olympics I remember during Christmas I was still having trouble with my double Axel, and I had just gotten my cast off."

In December 1997, after spending three weeks off the ice to recover from a stress fracture in her left foot, it was unclear whether Kwan would be ready to compete at the 1998 U.S. Championships. She went on to make history by receiving the most 6.0s in the event's history and earning a spot on the Olympic team. She then won the silver medal in Nagano.

As a friendly exhibition event, the Marshalls Challenge did not count for anything, except as a chance for Kwan to get out in front of a crowd and under the spotlights. Since straining a ligament in her left hip in October, Kwan had progressed by December to two one-hour training sessions per day, up from one daily 30-minute practice when she first began her recovery. She began jumping again only two weeks before the Boston competition.

The jumps were Kwan's weak points in her performance, as she stumbled on a few triple jump attempts. Even before the competition,



Kwan seemed unsure whether her hip would be ready.

"It was a little hard for me," Kwan said. "My hip is not that great. I'm not 100 percent, but I'm getting better. I'm walking, and I'm skating. And, actually, it feels better to skate than to walk."

The hip pain, which was initially so intense that Kwan struggled just getting out of the bathtub, is now "manageable." Kwan was optimistic about her chances of being ready for the U.S. Championships in January, but also realistic.

"I definitely want to be in better shape," she said. "I have a couple of weeks, which I have to use wisely. At this point I have to push. I just have to be careful how much I push. I have to make a decision on my body, too. When it says no, you've got to stop."

After such a long and accomplished skating career – five World titles, nine U.S. titles and two Olympic medals, although neither of them gold – the 25-year-old Kwan seems to be taking the recent developments in stride.

"I've been through so many nationals and competition that this kind of brings up another challenge, I suppose," Kwan said. "But the new (scoring) system is a big enough challenge, so I would rather have that as my main focus."

Kwan has competed in one major competition under the new scoring system, the 2005 World Championships.

Asked whether she has any worry going forward, Kwan responded, "You have to push that aside, because this is what I have. This is it. I can't change anything that's happening. It's my body, and this is the best I can do."

### **Skating Idols**

#### Fans vote Kwan, Weir as favorites at Marshalls Challenge

Forget the judges. At the Marshalls Figure Skating Challenge in Boston on Dec. 11, there were no points and no required elements. Just a lot of fans – casting more than 100,000 votes with seat-side keypads, telephones, text messages or over the Internet – to choose their favorite skaters in the first-ever spectator-driven skating competition.

After each voting period ended, an unofficial panel of ABC judges weighed in with their critiques but kept the mood at this stress-free exhibition competition upbeat.

Michelle Kwan, competing with a hip injury and in her first competition of the season, won the ladies event. For the men, despite a fall in his first performance to "Unchained Melody," current U.S. champion Johnny Weir was the winner.

Kwan was joined by Sasha Cohen, Emily Hughes and Alissa Czisny, the only U.S. skater to make it to the Grand Prix Final in Tokyo. Weir competed against Michael Weiss, Timothy Goebel and Matt Savoie, who, despite his last-minute addition to the program, was the overwhelming choice of the ABC judges in the first round.

After each group of four skated its first program, fans at home and in the arena narrowed the field to two. Another round of performances by the top two gave spectators another chance to vote.

The eight skaters relished the chance to perform for fun in the middle of an intense season.

"I think in an Olympic season like this, when every event matters so much and we're all adding up points every day and night, it's going to be nice and just skate and do whatever we want," Cohen said before the competition.

The day before the competition, both Cohen and Kwan joked about asking their friends to vote for them.

"You'd better vote for me, or I'm never going to talk to you again," Kwan told her friends.


Apparently, their friends were listening.


After the first round, Kwan and Cohen came out on top. In the second round, Kwan skated to "You Raise Me Up" while Cohen chose "Romeo and Juliet," a version of the free skate she will perform at the State Farm U.S. Championships, although fans did not get a full preview of the choreography changes Cohen is in the process of making. Cohen's near-perfect performances won the praise of the judges, but fans, who were ecstatic to see Kwan skating again, awarded Kwan 59 percent of the vote in the final round.

Weir and Weiss were the top two men's picks. Although Weir won the overall competition with an overwhelming 64 percent of the vote, Weiss wowed the audience with three back flips, including one with a full twist – the tornado – something he would certainly not be able to do in a serious competition.

But after it was over, that's what all eight of the skaters had on their minds. With only four weeks until St. Louis, there were more points, and tougher judges, to start thinking about.

Jim Yamaguchi represented his daughter, who on Nov. 16 gave birth to a baby girl, Emma. She and husband, professional hockey player Bret Hedican, also have a 2-year-old daughter, Keara, and live in Raleigh, N.C.

Tenley Albright, an Olympic champion and 1988 U.S.

Olympic Hall of Fame inductee, was the presenter for Yamaguchi.

Yamaguchi is a member of the 2006 class that features members of the 1984 U.S. men's gymnastics team, track and field sprinters Evelyn Ashford and the late Bobby Hayes, swimmer Rowdy Gaines, gymnast Shannon Miller, late hockey coach Herb Brooks, Paralympian Diana Golden-Brosnihan, late speedskater Jack Shea and special contributor Dick Ebersol.

Yamaguchi gave a videotaped acknowledgement of the honor during the ceremony.

A nationally televised special aired earlier this month enabled sports fans to relive the moments that catapulted the Class of 2006 inductees to U.S. Olympic Hall of Fame status.

"It's such a huge honor, and seeing the other group of nominees who are being inducted, I feel humbled to be joining such an incredible list of athletes and Olympic ambassadors," Yamaguchi said from her Raleigh home.

"I have so many great memories of the Olympics and feel fortunate to have had that experience, so this makes it feel that much more special."

Yamaguchi, who turned 34 the day before the induction, said her most vivid memories of the 1992 Olympic experience in Albertville, France, are her on-ice performances, but she admits standing on the podium is extra

special, too.

"I remember extreme emotions, feeling really proud," said Yamaguchi, who is also a two-time World champion (1991,'92) and a World Junior pairs champion with partner Rudy Galindo ('88).

"At the same time I was pinching myself, saying 'OK, is this really the Olympics? Is this really happening? How can I be so lucky to be standing here at the top of the podium?" I think I was calmer than I expected. I think I was just trying to savor every moment."


Since her competitive days, Yamaguchi has remained in the skating picture and has performed professionally. She recently helped host a television skating special with Scott Hamilton.


Yamaguchi has also been busy with her decade-old "Always Dream Foundation," which helps different children's organizations.

Today, the majority of Yamaguchi's time is spent keeping up with her daughters and watching her husband play for the Carolina Hurricanes.

The U.S. Olympic Hall of Fame was established in 1979 to celebrate the achievements of America's premier athletes in the modern Olympic Games.

To date, 182 athletes (including six U.S. teams) and special contributors to the U.S. Olympic movement have been enshrined, including figure skating greats Dick Button (1983), Peggy Fleming (1983), Albright (1988) Hamilton (1990) and Dorothy Hamill (1991).

## Steady and sure

Two-time Olympian Weiss looks back fondly on 'a great ride'

Michael Weiss is wait-

ing. Hanging out.

Sticking around.

He's in an airport, ready to go home.

But what a voyage it has been.

Not this plane trip, mind you, but

his figure skating career. Weiss is still among the best, both nationally and internationally.

He is approaching his 30th birthday, and he just finished his second decade as a skater. He's covered enough ice to span Antarctica. He's as recognizable as they come in the sport.

"Skating has brought me a lot, not just the financial security but the things you learn from skating," he said. "The goal setting, learning about desire and determination. All of that can be applied to success whether you are starting a business, pursuing your education, a relationship or anything else in life. That's what I've taken out of the sport. It's taught me how to deal with disappointment, to get back up and try again."

The sport has changed as much as the faces and names. Yet there is Weiss, still plugging away, skating well and competing for the love of it.

"The butterfly collars and sequins — it's come all the way back around," Weiss said with a friendly smile and chuckle. "Before I'm done, do you think we'll be seeing bell-bottom pants again?"

Bell-bottoms. Wow. But if one looks back, a young Michael Weiss is old enough to comment, even satirically, on skating fashion. Because he was there back when.

To be sure, he makes a living, but he still loves to be on the ice, whether it's the solitude of practice or the excitement of being in front of a large crowd.

"I was really lucky with how I was brought up, because my family played a large role in my skating, but more importantly how I grew up as a person," he said. "My parents always said skating was important, but so was school, and so was being a well-balanced person. I went to school normally, and my parents didn't take me out to train or anything. I still played hockey and went out with my friends."

He went on to graduate from Prince George's College with a business marketing degree and was a member of the Phi Theta Kappa honor society. He is a two-time Olympian gunning for a third chance to prove himself on the sport's biggest stage, and he has a list of national and international medals that are enough to drain a printer's ink cartridge. He has overcome several injuries, including a very rough 2000-'01 season.

#### Dynamic duo


In an unlikely, unforeseen pairing, Weiss is now working with Todd Eldredge, who knows a thing or two about excelling late in a career. That their partnership even happened has been one of the more pleasant surprises in Weiss' career.

"Over the years, it's always difficult when you are rivals, when you're the top guys going at it," Weiss explained. "It was always a very friendly rivalry – we were always friends, but guarded, because it's natural not to want to get too close when you are competing."

When Eldredge retired in 1998, the two became closer friends. And when Eldredge came back in 2002, they knew each other "in a different light."

"I've always had a lot of respect for his hard work and discipline," Weiss said. "He was always in shape when it was time to go out and compete. He had a similar respect for me going back to when we competed against each other."

So, when Eldredge retired a second



and final time, the two communicated. Eldredge had been through the stage Weiss was approaching and could offer invaluable insight. A working partnership ensued.

"I'm in a similar position to where he was at in 2002, when he was 31," Weiss said. "He was very much the veteran in Salt Lake City in 2002, and at 29, and

ultimately 30, I'll be the veteran in this group."

While Eldredge's technical help is important, it's more than that: Eldredge can offer perspective to the thoughtful and meticulous Weiss.

"He can give me some insight about what it's like at this point in one's career," Weiss said. "The way he train and

the way I trained are similar."

Ah, the similarities. With age comes not just perspective on life and skating but how skating fits into life.

"We are both very disciplined in terms of our skating," Weiss said.

Eldredge is also an inspiration.

"It's difficult to pick yourself up when things don't go well, and then you have to get back on the ice and start working again," Weiss said. "But it's like any job: You take on the world, do great one week, then feel horrible because you skate badly. But as long as the chart is continuously steady,

and in the long haul it's moving upward, then you should be happy and continue to move forward."

To endure, the veteran skater learned a new way to practice.

"You do your run-through, but you have to listen to your body," Weiss said. "When you are 19 or 20, you do 50 quads, and if you land 25, that's 50 percent. As you get older, it is the percentage you are looking for. If I hit two out of three quads, then I've hit roughly the same percentage as hitting 30 out of 50."

The focus now is on quality, age to repetition are in inverse proportion.

"I do five, six, maybe seven quads when things are going well, and even if they aren't, if it's not there on a particular day, there's no need to push it. I'll take the rest of the afternoon and rest and recover, which gives me a lot more desire the next day."


#### Different era

With a new judging system, the sport of figure skating continues to evolve.

"It has changed a lot over the years," Weiss said. "It's a different sport from when I began in it to where it is now. I was there at the end of figures when I was coming up, and then we moved into just the freestyles."

Then, the X-Games generation impacted the skating world.

"Then it moved to jumps – everything was jumps – the guy with the most jumps was going to win," Weiss said. "Then, in came the quad. First one and two, and then three quads! Now, the new judging system has created an-

other adaptation necessary to be successful. It's a combination of artistry and athleticism."

That's almost perfect for Weiss, who has always been into the artistry and adapted into the jumping and quad eras. Now the system seems almost tailor-made to Weiss because of his broad experience in the sport and being a part of that evolution.

He considers himself fortunate to have national and international experience under all the systems.

"A lot of guys brought up in this system will adapt very easily," Weiss said. "But a lot of guys from the past are set in their ways. I want to gear myself toward being very specific and setting up to get the most points."

Weiss can smile at how the sport has changed.

"Everything," he said, "comes full circle."

#### Winding up, winding down

The "ultimate" partnership has also helped him grow in the most important way. Lisa Thornton began as his choreographer, and while she's still very much involved in skating, she's also Lisa-Thornton-Weiss. The two have a girl and a boy, ages 7 and 6.

Lisa handles most of the business affairs, coordinates Weiss' media availability and plans his travel itineraries. She does all this while being a full-time mother.

"Lisa wears so many hats that it's unbelievable," Weiss said. "She is so capable. Anything she puts her mind to, she is great at. Not just choreography – though that's where we started – but choreography as it relates to life. She's a great mother. She's put together my

foundation. She also finds time two days a week to work in the custom wine selling business. I would be completely lost without her."

The Michael Weiss Foundation provides skating scholarships to youngsters who are chasing Olympic dreams and need some help to offset the considerable financial demands of the sport. Last month, nine scholarships worth \$28,000 were awarded.

"I love the kids who come in," he said, "and say, 'I finished first at juveniles,' but then add, 'And I have a straight-A average in school.' I'm so glad they realize the importance of that."

His children inspired the foundation, Weiss said.

"When you have two kids, you want to set a good example – to lead by example – because they are sponges and soak everything up," Weiss said. "My wife and I were determined to give back to figure skating and to help the next generation. It wasn't long ago I was in their position."

Not long ago?

"Well," he said with a smile. "It wasn't that long ago."

There is an ebb and flow to a career. Weiss has been on top, then felt his competitive life bottom out. He's picked himself up, and moved on and arrived back on top. He's about to get sky high in a few minutes – his flight is called for boarding.

"No big deal," Weiss said. "I've still got a minute."

A minute, or a few months. Weiss knows where he's going, when he boards this plane, and when he heads out to start "the rest" of his life.

"It really has been a great ride," he said.



U.S. Figure Skating judge Debra Allen DiCamillo died Nov. 22, 2005, in a head-on automobile accident near Kinston, N.C.

The family was on the way to visit relatives for Thanksgiving when the accident occurred.

Mrs. DiCamillo, 48, was a U.S. Figure Skating gold S/P judge, Gold MIF judge and a Silver Dance judge. She was also active in the St. Vincent Pallotti High School and Laurel, Md., Girl Scouts.

She's survived by her husband and daughter; parents, Mary "Criss" and David Allen; brother, Michael Allen; grandparents Irene and Ray Andes; and numerous other relatives.







## Ice-breakers

U.S. turns in strong showing at ISU Junior Grand Prix Final

here has been a lingering perception in the sport of figure skating that the United States' pairs and ice dancing teams cannot compete with those of Russia, Eastern Europe and Asia. Glancing at the results at the ISU Junior Grand Prix Final, that belief couldn't be further from the truth.

The United States has not won a World gold medal in pairs in 27 years and has never had a World dance champion, but several teams that competed in Ostrava, Czech Republic, will soon look to end that drought. For the second year in a row, skaters from the good ol' U.S. of A won three of the six medals presented in those two disciplines.

The U.S. winners at the event, which was held Nov. 24-27 at the ČEZ Arena, included: Austin Kanallakan (men, silver), Geoffry Varner (men, bronze), Julia Vlassov and Drew Meekins (pairs, silver), Mariel Miller and Rockne Brubaker (pairs, bronze) and Meryl Davis and Charlie White (silver, ice dancing). Those athletes were part of a 20-person U.S. contingent at the event, the largest this country has ever sent.

While Vlassov and Meekins finished third in both the short program and free skate, Miller and Brubaker took a more challenging route to the medal podium. Sitting fifth after the short, they rallied for a third-place finish in the free skate to claim the bronze for the second straight year.

Meekins was relieved that the events of last year's JGP Final, when he and Vlassov were third after the short but wound up finishing fourth, did not repeat themselves.

"The teams that came in ahead of us (last year), we had beaten in the past," Meekins said. "We knew we could have been in there. Before our free skate this year, I remember thinking, 'Don't let what happened last year happen again."

While Davis and White weren't able to match the success Morgan Matthews and Maxim Zavozin enjoyed at last year's final, when the pair earned top honors, their runner-up showing was nonetheless impressive. They were in third following the short program but vaulted over the Italian team of Anna Cappellini and Luca Lanotte to capture the silver.

"What helped us was our underdog status," White said. "We had nothing to lose. In the free dance, everything came together."

Kanallakan and Varner, too, improved their standing after the short program. Occupying third and fourth, respectively, heading into the free skate, they each moved up a spot to earn their medals, albeit in different fashions. Varner took second in the free skate, while Kanallakan made his ascent despite coming in fourth.

Katy Taylor finished as the top U.S. ladies finisher, placing fourth.

# Team destiny

Gregory, Petukhov cherishing life on, off ice

ate intervened at the last moment for Melissa Gregory.

"I told my coach, Sandy Hess, and my mom that if I didn't have a partner by Sept. 1, I was going to go on to college and not pursue skating anymore," recalled Gregory of the night her life changed. "Denis' (Petukhov) plane arrived on Aug. 31 at 11:30 p.m."

Today, Gregory and Petukhov are four-time U.S. ice dancing medalists and two-time World competitors (placing 10th in 2005). In October, they won their first Grand Prix medal, a bronze at Skate Canada. They are strong candidates to qualify for the U.S. Olympic team. They are also about to celebrate their fifth wedding anniversary.

But on Aug. 31, 2000, at 11:29 p.m., Gregory was an ice dancer who'd been partnerless for almost two years. The only partner she'd ever had, James Shuford, the boy with whom she went from "yuck" at the prospect of holding hands to the 1998 U.S. junior ice dancing title, decided he simply didn't want to skate anymore.

"It was very hard," Gregory, 24, said.
"I skated by myself. I had numerous tryouts in the U.S., and none of them worked out. I taught. I finished high school. It was a difficult time because it's something that you really are passionate about and you really want to do, and you have this fear inside that it's not going to happen."

Petukhov, 27, who is from Kirov, Russia, had also seen a partnership dissolve. After winning two medals at the World Junior Championships with Oksana Potdykova, their partnership ended. A big motivation for him to get into skating was traveling and seeing the world, so it seemed natural that he took his partner search to the Internet, where he set no boundaries.

"I'm never afraid to take a chance on something," Petukhov said. "I always like to try challenging things and never fear them. It's a part of my personality.

"The first time we skated together it was exciting to be able to skate with somebody that was as good of a skater as he was and also had the same desires and dreams as I did," Gregory said. "All the other skaters that I tried out with before weren't really on the same level as I was mentally. I could immediately tell that

Although Gregory had not yet competed at the senior level, she could see that their styles matched. Each day they worked together she also saw that she'd met someone whose love for the sport and unwillingness to settle for mediocrity matched hers. During the time she skated alone, she had kept telling herself

she'd find a partner "if it's meant to be."

It turns out that much more than skating was meant to be. Since Gregory and Petukhov decided not to rush into competition, they spent a full year working on details. At one point they went to California to work with a ballroom dancing coach. While there, they became an off-ice couple.

"When Denis and I first started going out it was really unusual, like nothing I had ever seen," Gregory said. "It was almost like we were kind of caught in the middle of it. You say to yourself, 'There's nothing I can do about it. It's going so good, and this is so right. It feels wonderful. It was just meant to be."

On Feb. 2, 2001, they married. Since Petukhov's family had been denied visas to come to the United States, they decided Gregory's parents would not be at the ceremony either. They chose Las Vegas, although they want people to know that they dressed formally, had other way. It was perfect for us."

"My whole life was open with opportunities," Petukhov said. "I wasn't having a day when I decided, 'I'm staying in the U.S. and that's what I'm going to do.' It was one thing after the other. The life was so exciting here.

"We go together very well. We understand each other. We like to do the same things. On an everyday basis, it's so much joy and love. If you would have asked me 10 years ago I probably couldn't even imagine that this would be me. But right now I feel very comfortable."

Gregory and Petukhov made their competitive debut at the Lake Placid Ice Dancing Championships in the summer of 2001. At the 2002 State Farm U.S. Championships, they placed third. After repeating as bronze medalists in 2003, they decided to make a move. Hess, with whom they are still great friends, encouraged them to move to Connecticut and train with Nikoli Morozov.

Today they share practice ice with several other ice dancing teams, including World medalists bronze Elena Grushina and Ruslan Goncharov of Ukraine (whom Gregory Petukhov beat in the free dance at Skate Canada), Canadian

Canada), Canadian medalists Chantal Lefebvre and Arseni Markov, and U.S. competitors Kate Slattery and Chuen-Gun Lee, and

is close in age to his students. "I feel more like we're partners. We're making all the decisions 50-50. When he makes a correction, I take it that I have to fix it. He's my friend, and I trust his opinion."

After earning a silver medal at the 2004 U.S. Championships, Gregory and Petukhov made their World Championships debut in Dortmund, Germany, placing 12th.

At 2005 Worlds, where they finished 11th, they took to the ice with a new sense of purpose. On Feb. 22, 2005, Petukhov was sworn in a U.S. citizen, making the possibility of the Olympics a reality. He admits at first he felt a bit awkward skating in Moscow as an American, but by the end of the competition all his fears had faded.

These days home is an apartment in Hartford, Conn., which they share with their Weimaraner, Suede.

"Suede thinks he's human," Gregory said. "He sleeps in our bed, with his head on the pillow and his body under the covers."

Their free dance this season is "Romeo & Juliet." In keeping with the Latin original dance, Gregory, a lifelong blonde, has gone brunette. Her husband says, "She'd look good in any type of color," which is definitely music to her ears.

When not practicing, Gregory and Petukhov coach. It's important to make some extra money, as Petukhov's mother finally got that visitor's visa. At press time, he was hoping to bring her to the U.S. Championships in St. Louis (she's been to Worlds the last years).

Although they prefer to focus on one thing at a time, in all likelihood they will continue to compete – probably through 2010.

"We haven't reached our potential," Gregory said. "We still enjoy what we do. We love ice dancing. We love competing."

"I think we're very similar," said her partner and husband. "At competitions, we're charging from each other—our feelings, our nerves. We're becoming like one person."

Youth skaters dazzle crowds en route to national titles

new crop of young skating stars emerged in the shadow of the Rocky Mountains at the 2006 U.S. Junior Figure Skating Championships in Westminster, Colo., Nov. 30-Dec. 3.

From a field of more than 400 competitors, eight U.S. champions – four singles and four pairs and dance teams – were crowned in the span of four days.

#### Intermediate Ladies

Coach Nina Stark-Slapnik knew early on that Kristine Musademba had the potential to be a national champion.

When asked at what point she thought Musademba could earn that title, she responded, "The first time I saw her jump off the ice."

Musademba (Washington FSC) used her incredible leaping ability and grace to claim the intermediate ladies title. In her first appearance at the U.S. Junior Championships two

years ago, the soft-spoken Musademba finished ninth as a juvenile.

This time around was much sweeter.

"I'm very pleased," Musademba said. "It was really fun to do."

Coming in behind Musademba was Caroline Ferris (DuPage FSC), who set her program to Ennio Morricone's "The Mission" and "The Good, the Bad and the Ugly."

"The best part of my program was each jump," Ferris said. "Every time you land one, you get more and more excited."

Ellie Kawamura (All Year FSC) took the bronze, which she also did two years ago in the juvenile division.

"I was a little nervous," the diminutive Kawamura said. "My first jump wasn't as good as I had hoped."

Kate Charbonneau (FSC of Bloomington) rebounded from a subpar short program, after which she stood in ninth, to take fourth place.

She enjoyed gliding around the ice to "Firebird."

"I like all the sharp moments, while some parts are nice and smooth, which fits my skating well," Charbonneau said.

"They've improved a lot from last year," their coach, Jordan Bell, said. "They're a lot of fun to teach."

The silver went to Kurt Weiss and Emily Glassberg (Detroit SC), who were competing in their third U.S. Junior Championships together.

"It was cool to come here and be rewarded for our hard work," Glassberg said. "We hoped if we skated our best, it would result in a medal."

Being together for just six months didn't hinder Ashlynne-Marie Ragasa (Los Angeles FSC) and Mark Bernardo

(Glacier Falls FSC) much, as they captured the bronze.

"We wanted to stay aggressive and powerful, and make our coach (Peter Oppegard) happy," Ragasa said.

Kloe Bautista (All Year FSC) and Galvani Hopson (Los Angeles FSC) came in fourth.

#### Intermediate Dance

Tied with Lili LaMar of the Broadmoor SC and Chase Brogan of the SC of Hartford after the second dance, the team of Maia Shibutani and Alex Shibutani dazzled the crowd and judges with their free dance to take the top spot.

Maia injured her hip three weeks prior to the event, which kept her off the ice for two weeks. With just a week to train for the event, one would think they might be a bit rusty, but the Shubutanis' performance showed

anything but a lack of preparation.

"We felt great," Maia said. "The crowd was amazing. We had a lot of friends here from Colorado Springs. We really appreciate that."

LaMar and Brogan, dance partners for only eight months, settled for silver.

"We skated a nearly clean program," LaMar said. "We performed our program the best we ever have."

Bronze went to Ilana Morse and Jackson Raney (SC of New York), the 2004 U.S. juvenile champions.

"We could have done better," Morse said. "We didn't skate our best."

Madison Chock (All year FSC) and Kurt Lingenfelter (Detroit SC) placed fourth.



#### Juvenile Girls

Marissa Secundy (Broadmoor SC) executed a crowdpleasing free skate to emerge as the juvenile girls champion.

Secundy, performing to the music "Orange Colored Sky," nailed nearly all of her elements, including a double flip, en route to the victory.

"I am excited and shocked," Secundy said. "Fifty percent of me (thought I might have won it). I didn't get to see anyone else skate, so..."

Keauna McLaughlin (Los Angeles SC) placed second, while her clubmate, Margaret Stevenson, captured a bronze. Katlynn McNabb (Coyotes SC of Arizona) also picked up a medal for her fourth-place finish.

McLaughlin turned in a stellar effort in the qualifying round but hit a couple of snags during her free skate, popping two jumps.

One of her coaches, Nedda Soltani, said McLaughlin has had a history of having fine qualifying skates, but the second part of the competition has been "the burden, the work. So, this was a really big hurdle for us to come out and do it well."

#### Juvenile Boys


Joshua Farris (Seattle SC) pulled out the win in juvenile boys with centered spins, two double Axels and a split jump.

"We love putting on a show," Taylor said. "It goes so fast, but it's so much fun."


Jordan Sisson and Erik Kaiser (Rocky Mountain FSC) were pleased with their fourth-place finish.

# The wonderful world of goals and expectations

## Parents Committee Chair's letter

The Parents Committee and Headquarters put together new judging system guidelines and the new Parents Survival Guide to distribute information and offer educational material at regional and sectional competitions in lieu of parent meetings. The sectional championships and U.S. Synchronized Skating Championships will continue to hold parent meetings.

Parent seminars and meetings will also be held at the U.S. Junior Championships, Reach for the Stars and State Farm 2010 program.

The Parents Committee is working closely with the Professional Skater's Association and has targeted several nonqualifying competitions to host parent/coach meetings. These competitions include the 2006 Broadmoor Open, Liberty Open, Skate Detroit, Indy Challenge, Lake Placid Dance Championships and Golden West Championships.

With the new year upon us, many of us have created New Year's resolutions, maybe in the form of goals and expectations. Many of our skaters work closely with their coaches to create goals and expectations, but how do those things become valuable, ongoing tools? Very often they fall by the wayside, and we, just like our skaters, forget these resolutions, goals and expectations until the next January, and our goals are never realized. Dr. Alan Goldberg, sports psychologist, tells us how to make goal-setting and expectations effective and useful.

It's the start of a new

year and with that, along with their New Year's resolutions, many athletes set goals for the 2006 season.

"I'm going to finally make the varsity team." "I'm going to nail down that college scholarship." "I'm going to score double figures every game." "I'm going to land my Axel/double Axel." "I'm going to hit at least .350." "I'm going to break the pool and conference records."

Expectations, dreams, goals – call them what you may.

They are another one of the athlete's double-edged swords. When

you know how to properly use your goals and expectations, they can help you cut through obstacles, overcome blocks, motivate yourself to get back up after falling and, ultimately, carve your athletic dream into a wonderful reality.

However, when you misuse goals and expectations, when you bring them out at the wrong time, they can physically and mentally tie you so tightly in knots that you will consistently choke under pressure and perform below your potential.

If reaching your dream as an athlete is vitally important to you, if you want your son or daughter to really enjoy their sports experience and be as successful as possible, if you, as a coach, want your athletes to deliver in the clutch and consistently perform like champions, then it is critically important for you to understand the ABCs of goals and expectations.

We will explore how to use your expectations to motivate you to take your training to the next level without it interfering with your performance in competition.

#### Goals and expectations: What are they?

Even though these have slightly different meanings, I'm going to use them interchangeably for this article. Goals and expectations are related to the outcome. They are always future oriented. They reflect what you want out of your sport, from a particular season or from an immediate performance. Goals and expectations reflect what you hope to accomplish and what would make you

feel successful as an athlete.

Having goals or expectations is absolutely critical if you want to go anywhere in your sport. Your goals and expectations serve as a target at which to aim. They give all your training efforts a meaning and a direction. They also provide the fuel and energy that you'll need to consistently move toward success and turn your athletic dream into reality.

When you have goals and expectations, you are setting a higher standard of performance. You are challenging yourself. Such high standards and challenges are necessary for you to take your training to the next level. It is these inner demands that you place on yourself that will ultimately propel you toward your dream. In the end, the hope is that the demands you place on yourself will make you a much better person and athlete as they move you toward personal excellence. In this way, your goals and expectations help you "push your envelope" and step outside your comfort zone.

One of the key points that I want to make is that taking your goals and expectations with you when you go to practice is critical to your ultimate success as an athlete. In practice they represent an extremely valuable piece of training equipment. If you can ask yourself, "How is what I'm doing today going to help me get to my goals?" whenever you train, then the quality and intensity of your training will always be high. As a result you will be more focused, your practices will have more meaning to you and therefore, you'll accomplish far more than those who don't have a clear purpose in mind whenever they train. Asking yourself this one simple question in practice, over and over again on a daily basis, throughout the course of the season can easily make the difference between success and failure, winning and losing, successfully reaching your goals or not. But this is only one part of the championship formula when using goals and expectations.

One of the cardinal rules in sports psychology and peak performance is to take your goals with you whenever you practice and train, but never, ever, when you compete. Let me repeat this because it is so important. Do not bring your goals and expectations with you when you compete. Why?

While your goals and expectations may motivate and focus you in practice, they rarely work that kind of positive way in competition. Concentrating on your goals

when you compete, focusing on how important this game, match or race may be, thinking about the outcome of the contest and how you really need to beat this opponent or that one will distract you from what you need to focus on in order to perform to your potential. At competition time, your goals and expectations will weigh you down. They will tighten your muscles, kill your nerve and fill your heart with dread. It's this outcome focus on goals and expectations that is so poisonous to the athlete's performance.

An emphasis on outcome (goals and expectations) right before you compete will always crank up the level of seriousness of the performance and what's at stake, while simultaneously killing your fun and enjoyment. If you're not having fun going into and during a performance, then you will be physically and mentally tight, and it will be impossible for you to play to your potential. The secret to playing your best is being loose and relaxed while you're performing.

So take your goals with you when you train. Think about why you're training and try to connect what you're doing right now in practice with your ultimate goal. However, understand that when you go to compete you must leave your goals back home. When I work with athletes and teams I will frequently suggest to them the following simple exercise a few days before a big competition: "Write down everything that you want to have happen, all your outcome goals and expectations. Put them all down on paper and take one last good look at them. When you're done examining them, take all those outcome goals and lock them in a drawer, out of sight. Do not take them out and look at them until after the competition is over." This is the best way to ensure that you have the best chance to perform at your best.

# A sure bet

Trophee Eric Bompard brings out best of best

ric Bompard knows it's anyone's guess what the level of competition will be like at an ISU Grand Prix event.

"It's always a bet," said Bompard, the CEO of Eric Bompard cashmere company and sponsor of Trophee Eric Bompard, before the Nov. 17-20 competition in Paris, France. "You never really know who the competitors will be and what level the competition will reach."

U.S. team leader Susan Keogh could have reassured him right away that the skating would be tremendous, with the talents of Sasha Cohen and 2004 World champion Shizuka Arakawa slated to do battle.

"The men's competition should be great also, with Tim (Goebel) and Michael (Weiss), Brian Joubert of France and Jeffrey Buttle of Canada," Keogh said. "Also, two of our teams are doing their senior debut this season. They are very well prepared and ready to fight, so this should be interesting."

Keogh was dead on. The competition proved to be intense and featured surprises in each discipline.

#### ladies

Not many would have bet on the outcome of the ladies competition. Cohen, a clear favorite to win, finished second to upstart Mao Asada of Japan.

Cohen nonetheless skated beautifully. You always know when a real champion takes the ice: the audience suddenly concentrates, and the stands go completely silent. This happened when Cohen started her short program. She

had won twice in Paris and arrived as a star here. Her only mistakes were a twofooted triple flip in the short program and a fall on her triple Salchow at the end of her free skate.

Asada delivered two breathtaking programs and finished first in both sections of the event. She landed a triple flip-triple loop combination in the short program, and a triple Axel and triple loop to double loop-double loop in her free skate.

"It is a little disappointing not to win," Cohen said. "I was here to evaluate my programs and check what I needed to improve, which I did. It was a learning experience."

Skating last in both sections of the event, Kimmie Meissner had a few mishaps in her short program, but she rallied during the free skate. Her performance was packed with technical elements, including two triple-triple combinations and a double Axel-double loop-double loop, and she was credited with the second-highest technical elements score that evening behind Asada.

#### men

"I am here for a job," Goebel said before the event started.

Indeed, he practiced hard all week and managed to hold on to both of his programs. He did tumble on his triple Axel in both programs and could not land his quad in the free skate.

"I felt a bit shaky at the beginning," he said, "but it's coming."

Goebel finished fourth.

Weiss could not pull off a repeat of

his 2002 victory in Paris. He did finish fifth in the short program, just like in 2002. His free skate was a near disaster, however, with falls on both his quad and triple Axel. He finished ninth in the free skate and sixth overall.

Victory came down to French favorite Joubert and Canada's Buttle. Buttle won both the short program and free skate without a quad, while Joubert landed his cleanly in each program. Joubert was credited with higher technical marks in the free skate, but he could not match Buttle's component score in both sections.

#### pairs

"I am excited about getting extra points with our throw triple Axel and side-by-side triple Lutz," John Baldwin said before the free skate.

He and Rena Inoue had just finished fourth after the short program. The duo did not quite achieve Baldwin's hope, as he singled his triple Lutz and she double-footed the landing of the Axel. Yet their powerful and otherwise perfect program allowed them to beat their personal-best score and hang on to their fourth-place finish.

During the exhibition, they offered the audience a perfect throw triple Axel.

Brooke Castile and Ben Okolski moved up two places after the short program to finish sixth overall.

"We are very proud of our performance," Castile said of her first Grand Prix event. "This is the best overall program we have done in competition so far."

if 2005 World champions Tatiana Totmianina and Maxim Marinin could generate deep emotion, the Russian duo offered a moving short program set to "Snowstorm," a Russian movie where a man and a woman show how much they care for each other. Although skating just before midnight in Paris, their free skate included their trademark side-byside triple jumps (a Salchow and a toe loop in combination). A fall on their throw triple Salchow, however, almost cost them first place in the free skate.

China's Qing Pang and Jian Tong nearly overtook the Russian duo. They outscored the Russians in the technical elements and were only defeated by a paper-thin 0.02- point margin.

#### ice dancing

Ice dancing standings will always remain somewhat of a mystery. Some seem to always remain the same, while others change all of a sudden without any notice. This was proven again in Paris.


The podium remained unchanged

from the compulsory dance to the final standings. Elena Grushina and Ruslan Goncharov of Ukraine took the lead right away in the Ravensburger Waltz, with Isabelle Delobel and Olivier Schoenfelder of France taking second and Federica Faiella and Massimo Scali of Italy third.

Behind them, however, the event witnessed major changes: Morgan Matthews and Maxim Zavozin of the United States came back from sixth to fourth place, while the French, Nathalie Péchalat and Fabian Bourzat, rallied from eighth to fifth.

Matthews and Zavozin arrived in Paris with their World Junior title and a fifth-place finish at Cup of China. The pace of their skating was certainly one of the fastest in Paris – just like their progression in the competition standings. Finishing sixth after the compulsory dance, they ended up third in the free dance and fourth overall, convincing everyone in the stands that they would wind up much higher in the years to come.





# Host with the most

Japanese skaters put on show at NHK Trophy

Competition organizers along the routes of the Grand Prix Series can usually count on the fans supporting their skaters.

Probably one, maybe two local entrants per discipline get applause, no matter how well they skate or whatever the results.

This time the host country outdid itself during the NHK Trophy, Dec. 1-4, in Osaka, Japan.

A half-dozen Japanese singles skaters, with berths in the Grand Prix Final at stake and, more importantly, with the task of impressing their federation officials for Olympic Team spots, needed to deliver outstanding performances.

The Japanese ladies in particular were in form and made every practice a showcase. There was Miki Ando attempting her quadruple jump. There was Yukari Nakano working on her triple Axel. Fumie Suguri may not have those things in her repertoire yet but she does possess some things the other two don't have – two World bronze medals.

If one looked hard enough around Osaka, one could have seen former World champion Shizuka Arakawa, who was not competing at NHK, discreetly practicing with Nikoli Morozov. And, youngster Mao Asada and her triple Axel were on the minds of many.

The three top Japanese men were on hand, and with only one Olympic spot available, the competition was bound to be tense.

Although the Japanese pairs and ice dancing teams are improving, they didn't create much excitement except when Utako Wakamatsu said she eliminated herself from Olympic consideration. That was, however, for the Canadian team and not the Japanese team.

As with Wakamatsu, the Japanese skaters are mostly practicing elsewhere in the world and made the NHK a homecoming of sorts. Suguri, who spent time in Chicago, finished second and Ando, who is working in Lakewood, Ohio, finished fourth. Arakawa made her way to Japan via Connecticut, while two Japanese men work almost side by side in Ontario, Canada.

The women's event provided a mini-preview of the Japanese championships minus Arakawa and Asada, but then Arakawa bypassed the free skate of last year's nationals and Asada, as is well-known, is not in Olympic consideration. But none of the Japanese women were in first after the short program.

The leader was Carolina Kostner of Italy, who was in questionable shape and admitted she was not interested in peaking too soon after a seventh-place finish at Skate Canada.

"It is a working process to be in top form for February and March," Kostner said. "So we started really low. I have to admit that at Skate Canada I was not in top form."

Kimmie Meissner, in third place after the short, had yet to complete a triple Axel this season in competition and needed it to be in contention for a medal.

After dropping from third to fifth in the free skate, matching her placement at Trophee Bompard in Paris, she and coach Pam Gregory admitted there is a transition from the junior to the senior international circuit. She had a good short but faltered in the free skate. In Paris it was the opposite.

"I think we are learning what things are about," Gregory said. "Now we know some things."

Meissner was given credit for seven triple jumps in Paris, but she was only credited with three in Japan.

"The long here was nothing to be ashamed of," Gregory said. "Fifth is still good."

Meissner knows what is ahead.

"Go back home and work hard," she said.

Elena Liashenko of the Ukraine was inconsistent but finished third overall.

Still, it was the Japanese ladies who grabbed everyone's attention.

Suguri put out a performance that had the audience cheering and her crying after her move from sixth to second.

"It was so hard after my (groin) injury, I missed two months of practice," Suguri said. "I shouldn't have cried at the end, but I was thinking how hard it was (to come back) after my injury, and I was very emotional in that moment."



Ando didn't try a quad, stepped out of a combination and had scratchy landings on others. That still allowed her to remain in fourth and qualify for the Grand Prix Final.

Kostner, meanwhile, completed just one triple jump and is still searching for the form that pushed her ahead of Michelle Kwan at the 2005 World Championships

While Meissner shied away from a triple Axel, Nakano tried hers and fell. She then rallied and held on for the rest of her program through six triples, although one was counted down to a double.

"The only thing that frustrates me is (missing) the triple Axel," said Nakano, who finished with the gold medal. "I still have to work on that. After the fall on the triple Axel, I hoped that it wouldn't affect the rest of my program, and I tried to forget about it."

#### men

There was little to quibble about in the men's event as Nobunari Oda and Daisuke Takahashi earned their way to the Grand Prix Final with top performances.

Takahashi had a majestic short program but faltered a bit in the

free skate. Oda, meanwhile, had a little hometown help to win the gold.

"I didn't feel any pressure," Oda said. "On the contrary, I had my family members here who can't come often to events, and I enjoyed it."

After missing the opening triple Axel, Oda settled down to seven triple jumps, including a triple-triple double that allowed him to stay ahead of American Evan Lysacek.

Lysacek was third in the short program and won the free skate to place second overall.

"There is room for improvement because I spent the last month getting a new free skate, so I devoted only a little time to the short," Lysacek said.


In the free skate, he debuted his new "Carmen" program and put in a strong performance. However, he was hurting with another hip injury, this time on the right side.

"It occurred two weeks ago, and I had to be careful because it could turn into another stress fracture," he said.

Even though his second-place finish qualified him for the Grand Prix Final, Lysacek withdrew five days later due to the injury.

# Globetrotters

U.S synchronized teams primed for international competition

ast season marked the first time the ISU judging system was used for synchronized skating. The new system, however, was utilized only at the World Synchronized Skating Championships and World Challenge Cup for Juniors.

This season, not only will the two world events be judged under the new system but so will every ISU competition.

The U.S. teams did their homework in 2005, and in the free skate at the World Championships, the Haydenettes posted the third-highest mark for technical element scores while Miami University finished seventh, the highest place yet for a second U.S. team at Worlds.

events leading up to the World Championships.

Beginning Jan. 12, the top 10 synchronized teams in the United States will compete around the world at five

The Crystallettes will kick off their season at the Cup of Berlin.



#### Cup of Berlin

Crystallettes coaches Shannon Peterson and Holly Teets say their greatest assets are their ability to evaluate progress and implement change. The coaches, who are sisters, establish goals, evaluate effort and performance, and adjust along the way. It is this approach that has kept the Crystallettes on the podium at the U.S. Synchronized Skating Championships the past several years, and it's what could make them strong under a judging system that everyone is still learning.

The Crystallettes will be the first team out this year, traveling to Berlin, Germany, for the Cup of Berlin. Their short program, performed to Donna Summers' "Last Dance," is sure to light up the arena, and their free skate, "A Tribute to John Williams," includes various popular pieces by the composer, including music from the films "Harry Potter" and "Finding Neverland." The team's goal for the Cup of Berlin is to "have a clean performance and medal," Peterson said.

#### Cup of Nottingham

U.S. Figure Skating will send the University of Michigan, which finished fifth at the 2005 U.S. Championships, and the U.S. junior pewter medalist Colonials to Great Britain for the Cup of Nottingham. These teams will be accompanied by a team leader who is new to the "officials" side of international competitions but who is anything but new to synchronized skating.

Former Haydenettes coach Lynn Benson will be at rinkside as the teams skate for the gold.

"Lynn has been in the forefront of our sport in the United States, and in the world, for years, and has been a mentor to me for years," University of Michigan coach Brooke Sloan said. "I could not have asked for a better choice."

Sloan is beginning her first season with Michigan, but, like Benson, is well known in the synchronized skating community. Sloan led Team Élan's junior team to the U.S. title in 2004 and on two trips to the World Challenge Cup for Juniors. Michigan is looking to improve the quality of its skating as well as its national standing.

During the 2004 season, the Colonials junior team skated a short program to music by Celine Dion and loved it. This year, the team is performing another short program to a Dion song, this time to "I'm Not Sorry." Just like the past few seasons, the short program is being choreographed by Anu (Jääskeläinen) Oksanen, coach of 2004 World champions Marigold Ice Unity of Finland.

The team's free skate, choreographed by coach Merita Mullen, is in contrast to last year's.

"Last year we skated to "I Would Do Anything for Love" in a tribute to love and its power over us," Mullen said. "This year we decided to skate to music depicting love gone wrong, as a fun contrast. The skaters love the powerful, occasionally sad and cynical music; some of it pokes fun at the heartbreak we have all experienced."

#### Czech Open

With the 2006 World Championships being held in Prague, the Czech Federation moved the annual Prague Cup to a smaller city, Pardubice, to hold the Czech Open.

Team Élan, the reigning U.S. pewter medalists, will lead Team USA. This year's squad is quite experienced, as coach Jeannine Weinschrod begins her 15th season, and captains Laura Friedman and Lisa Lucido have 22 years of combined experience as synchronized athletes.

The team is taking a new direction with its free skate.

"The free skate is a blend of a contemporary rendition and the original score from the movie 'Grease,' Weinschrod said. "I hope that the familiarity of this piece will inspire the audience to sing along and really become a part of the program."

Weinschrod has also increased the team's training regimen. In addition to the regular nine hours on the ice the team devotes to working on the choreographed program, Team Élan has added three hours each week of off-ice training. The training sessions consist of exercises to promote unison and execute a single style while performing the step sequences.

Joining Team Élan in Pardubice is Chicago Jazz, which is sending teams at both the junior and novice levels. Led by coach Lisa Darken, the junior team does not want to place too much emphasis on the results, but it hopes that 2006 will mark its fifth consecutive trip to the World Challenge Cup.

The team trains approximately 10 hours a week, working both on and off the ice. This year its programs are to "Alexander" by Vangelis for the short program and "Man of La Mancha" for the free skate.

Chicago Jazz novice, the defending U.S. champions, will skate to "Carmen" by Bizet.

#### French Cup

U.S. Figure Skating is sending a pair of national championship teams to Rouen, France, to take on some of the top teams in the world. The Haydenettes, coached by newcomer Saga Krantz, will have their first opportunity to show off a new style to an international audience.

Krantz, who moved from Finland over the summer, is only the second coach in the 26-year history of the Haydenettes. She has big shoes to fill, replacing Benson, who led the team to a record 15 U.S. titles.



As the Haydenettes continue their quest for a world medal and to improve upon last year's fourth-place finish at the World Championships, the French Cup will be an extremely important event for them.

Their main competitors, black ice of Canada, which last medaled at Worlds in 2002, and finished just 6.95 points behind the Haydenettes at last year's Worlds, will be present. World bronze medalist Marigold, which finished one place ahead of the Haydenettes last year, and reigning World champion Team Surprise of Finland are also in the field.

With Krantz' extensive background in music, having studied at a conservatory in Finland, the team has selected unique pieces for both of its programs. The free skate is to music by composer Newton Howard and includes cuts from "The Interpreter" soundtrack. It also includes "Journey to the Heart" by Rene Dupere. The team's short program is composed by Harry Gregson-Williams, and the theme of the music translates to "This is the Way to the Stars," quite appropriate for a team searching for, and so close to, an elusive world medal.

The Hockettes of Ann Arbor, Mich., had their most successful season ever last year. Jumping all the way from fourth place in 2004 to become the 2005 U.S. junior champion was quite an accomplishment and will be hard to match. As coach Erin Donovan starts her third season with the team, she has set her sights high.

"We want to defend our national title and improve our standing at the World Challenge Cup for Juniors," Donovan said.

The team starts its season with a summer training camp and choreography weekend, where they learn the entire free skate to accelerate its progress throughout the season. The Hockettes have selected "Copacabana" by Barry Manilow for their short program and "Walk Like an Egyptian" by The Bangles for their free skate.

The Hockettes will take on Canada's black ice junior team, ranked No. 4 in the world, and the Muskeeters of Finland, the current World Junior champions.

#### Spring Cup

For the third consecutive season, Miami University's synchronized skating team of Oxford, Ohio, led by coach Vicki Korn, will make the trip to Milan, Italy, for the

Spring Cup. The competition starts Feb. 10, 2006, about the same time that all eyes will be on Torino, just a 45-minute train ride from Milan, for the opening ceremonies of the Olympic Winter Games.

Athletes on Miami's 2006 team come from 10 different states and boast a combined 196 years of synchronized skating experience. Every one of them has at least one U.S. Figure Skating gold test.

The reigning U.S. silver medalists finished a respectable seventh at the 2005 World Championships and are hoping to match that this year.


The team's free skate, set to "Canto alla Vita" by composer Josh Groban, was choreographed by Sarah Kawahara.



Morgan: Focus, focus, focus and, oh yeah, definitely chocolate.


Maxim: I don't really think we have any, except for getting

Q: I have been skating for two years and was having some problems with my jumps. I am seriously considering ice dancing. Did either of you skate singles first, and then switch to dancing, and if so at what level did you stop?

Johanna Tramm, 13 Los Angeles, Calif.

Morgan: I competed both freestyle and pairs through the novice level before I made my final decision. It is possible to do both freestyle and dance at the same time, but make sure you have a passion for dance before switching. A few bad weeks working on your jumps is not enough reason to change disciplines.

Maxim: I never skated in singles competitively. I started learning it at the age of 14 and my parents just told me to switch to ice dance because they were professional ice dancers and they coached it as well.

Q: Maxim, how difficult is it waiting to get your citizenship, knowing that with it you could potentially go to the Olympics?

Maxim: I try not to think about it because I really can't do anything about the issue. Sometimes I get anxious, but I don't have the power to get it sooner.

Q: When did you start skating together, and how old were you?

Morgan: We started skating together in March of 2001. I was 13 and Max was 15. We first skated together at the Professional Skaters Association tryouts in Boston.





# Ask Mr. Edge

Happy New Year! Welcome to the fifth anniversary column of "Ask Mr. Edge."



With all the hype about new lightweight boots and how much easier they are to jump in, let's turn our attention to a little-known product that is quickly becoming the talk of the industry.

Paramount blades: "The next generation of figure skate blades."

Utilizing space-age materials and high-tech manufacturing techniques, Paramount blades are lighter, stronger and hold an edge longer than conventional blades. If that's not enough, they're even available in different colors to match your skating outfits.

Paramount blades use a frame that is computer-machined from one solid piece of high-strength aluminum alloy, making it easily 50 percent lighter than most conventional blades. Its unusually unique diamond-shaped cross-section provides more overall strength and a beautifully shaped design. Using an aluminum frame makes it possible to anodize the blades into a number of different colors.

Attached to the frame via high-tech bonding glues (such as those used in military aircraft) is a runner made of a high-strength durable stainless alloy, available in both a 420SS and 440SS. In addition to resisting rust and corrosion, this alloy provides great edge retention.

#### Paramount blade advantages:

- Extremely lightweight, making it easier for smaller skaters to jump higher with less effort. Note: A combination of softer and lighter boots will also help.
- 2. Stronger framework. More power is added to each stroke you take on the ice.
- 3. Many different colors are available, allowing you to match your outfits accordingly.
- 4. Stainless steel runners not only resist rust and corrosion but also allow for greater edge bite and less frequent sharpening. Note: A very good sharpening will also allow for greater edge bite but will not hold up as long as with a stainless steel runner.
- 5. Sizes range from 8¼ 11.



#### Paramount blade disadvantages.

- Not all colors are readily available for immediate delivery.
- Currently, there is only one toepick design for freestyle.
   I'm told that an intermediate design is not far behind and should be ready sometime this year. There is also a dance model.
- 3. Depending on your sharpening machine, you either need a special clamp design or some modifications made to your machine before sharpening them. Current price is around \$325 for a new clamp and \$40 for modifications. The stainless steel blades are extremely difficult to sharpen and take much longer. You'll need a different grit wheel to make it easier to sharpen. Expect to pay more for a sharpening on these particular blades. Dealers may be hesitant to carry these blades because of this.
- 4. Some people say the blades are very loud on the ice. Personally, I think it's the sharpening and the fact that they were left too sharp, not to mention the acoustics in the rink.
- 5. Sizes not available below 8¼ or over 11.
- Current price: \$469 for the 440SS and \$369 for the 420SS

So, what do you think, readers, is it a plus or minus in your books? I think the advantages outweigh the disadvantages for most skaters, but certainly not all. Is this the future of where skate blades are going? Perhaps, but only time will tell. In an effort to improve your overall skating, I think we should at least take a good hard look at these remarkable blades and judge for ourselves based on individual needs and preferences.
