Rena Inoue and John Baldwin wowed the crowd in St. Louis in 2006 when they landed the first throw triple Axel in history. Can the two-time U.S. pairs champions do it again?

And of course, Tanith Belbin and Ben Agosto are on a collision course to win their fourth consecutive U.S. title in ice dancing.

It will be fun-watchin', with many twists and turns along the way.

The things I'm anxious to experience are the sellout crowds and the excitement in Spokane during U.S. Championships week. Event organizers Barb Beddor and Toby Steward and the local organizing committee have spent the last three years generating a buzz for this 88th edition of the U.S. Championships. Several of the performances are sold out or are on the verge of being sellouts.

This atmosphere - the arena holds 11,000 spectators - will certainly help lift these skaters' performances to higher levels while creating lasting memories for the fans.

Beddor and Steward have also improved upon their popular FanFest zone that they debuted at 2002 Skate America. This is a place where fans can go between performances and get autographs, check out the latest results, watch skaters being interviewed on television, feast on delicious fare and make calls back home to their family and friends. It's all free and a place I plan to frequent as much as my time will allow.

Another thing I'm looking forward to is staying at the historic Davenport Hotel. Built in 1914, this hotel has a reputation for being one classy place.

If you can make it to Spokane, I'll see you there. If you can't make it, ABC and ESPN will once again bring you all the exciting action.

### Cohen withdraws from U.S. Championships

Olympic silver medalist Sasha Cohen announced Dec. 22 her withdrawal from the 2007 State Farm U.S. Figure Skating Championships in Spokane, Wash., Jan. 21-28. Cohen said she is not retiring and plans to return to competitive figure skating in the future.

"I have every intention of competing in future competitions," Cohen said. "My major goals are the 2009 World Figure Skating Championships in Los Angeles and the 2010 Olympic Winter Games in Vancouver. I love the thrill that competition brings. and I'm not ready to give that up, but I'm the type of person who is all or nothing. When I train and compete, it's my life. I can't be there just to be there. These past few months, I've really enjoyed skating simply for the love of it."

Cohen is a six-time U.S. medalist - including her first gold in 2006 - a three-time World medalist and the 2006 Olympic silver medalist. She also competed at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games, finishing fourth, and was the 2003 ISU Grand Prix Final

"These past few years have been incredibly intense and demanding, so I need a little downtime from competing," Cohen said. "I have competed in two Olympics, and there's nothing as thrilling as that, so I know I want to be in Vancouver for the 2010 Olympics."



This will be just the second U.S. Championships since 1998 in which Cohen will not take part. She sat out the 2001 event because of a lower back

"We will miss Sasha at the U.S. Championships this year, but we respect her decision to take a break from competition," U.S. Figure Skating Executive Director David Raith said. "When she returns, she will be a major part of U.S. Figure Skating's push for medals and success heading toward the 2010 Olympics. In the meantime, we look forward to watching and developing the deep field of U.S. ladies skaters at this year's U.S. Championships and beyond."



Johnny Weir stopped by the Quarryville (Pa.) Elementary School last month, where he made a donation for the purchase of books. While there, he talked to students and some of his former teachers. Weir grew up in Quarryville, a little town southwest of Harrisburg, Pa. According to Weir's mother, Patty, her son thoroughly enjoyed his time in elementary school and wanted to give something back. Patty's sister, Diane Neff, arranged the visit with the school's principal. Weir brought with him friends, Roman and Sasha Zaretski, who competed in ice dancing for Israel at the 2006 Olympic Winter Games. Weir talked to the students about setting goals and working hard to achieve them. He would also like to do something for the local fire department in the future.



### Lysacek earns USOC honor

Evan Lysacek was named United States Olympic Committee November Male Athlete of the Month, the organization announced Dec. 12. It was the first time Lysacek received the honor.

Lysacek won the gold medal at the Cup of China in Nanjing which took place Nov. 9-12. It marked the first ISU Grand Prix Series title for the two-time World bronze medalist. Along with his second-place finish at Skate America in October, Lysacek's placement qualified him for one of six spots at the prestigious 2006 ISU Grand Prix Final in St. Petersburg, Russia.

With a score of 220.04 points at the Cup of China, Lysacek missed his personal best by just one point and beat the second-place finisher at the event by nearly 20 points. He adds the Cup of China title to a long list of accolades that includes two World bronze medals, two U.S. medals, a Four Continents Championships title, three World Junior silver medals and a fourth-place finish at the 2006 Olympic Winter Games.

In winning the November honor, Lysacek beat out tennis player James Blake, triathlete Andy Potts, wrestler Jared Lawrence and snowboarder Scotty Lago, among others.

## Cleveland selected to host 2009 U.S. Championships

U.S. Figure Skating announced last month the selection of Cleveland as the host city for the 2009 U.S. Figure Skating Championships, tentatively scheduled for Jan. 18-25. The event, held annually since 1914, is the nation's most prestigious figure skating event. Over the course of a week the event will crown 12 national champions in ladies, men's, pairs and ice dancing on the senior, junior and novice levels.

"U.S. Figure Skating is extremely pleased to announce the city of Cleveland as our host for the 2009 U.S. Championships," U.S. Figure Skating President Ron Hershberger said. "The city and the local organizing committee have been wonderful ambassadors for U.S. Figure Skating in the past, which has included their hosting of the extremely successful 2000 U.S. Championships. We look forward to working with Cleveland to put on a top-notch event. More than 250 of our country's top figure skaters will call Cleveland home for this important week."

This will be the fourth time Cleveland has been awarded the U.S. Championships after hosting the event in 2000, 1964 and 1940. In 2000, Cleveland set the all-time total attendance record for the event at 119,044. The mark was later surpassed by Los Angeles during the 2002 U.S. Championships (125,345).

The U.S. Championships annually attract more than 1,500 figure skating athletes, coaches and officials to the host city. Recent host cities such as Los Angeles have reported economic impact in excess of \$30 million.

### Lang, Fitzgerald get engaged

Three-time U.S. ice dancing champion Naomi Lang got engaged to coaching partner Mark Fitzgerald Dec. 1 at the Disson Skating show "Fashion on Ice" at the Sovereign Bank Arena in Trenton, N.J.

During the break when the production crew set up for retakes, emcee Michael Weiss announced to the audience that it was his friend's 32nd birthday. Weiss brought the microphone to Fitzgerald, who hopped onto the ice in skates.

Fitzgerald, who competed at the 1999 World Championships with partner Elizaveta Stekolnikova, then wondered aloud what the best present was that he could possibly get. The cast members stepped back as Lang began to realize what was coming next. With a gentle push by Weiss, Lang skated toward Fitzgerald.

At center ice, Fitzgerald pulled the ring box from his pocket and got down on one knee. He proposed to Lang, who greeted his question with a long kiss and a shower of tears.

Fitzgerald, remembering he was still holding the microphone in his hand, said to the audience, "I think that means yes."







MLBAM will develop, manage, operate and maintain the official web site and interactive media properties of what will be known and operated as Ice Network.

The doors are now wide open for fans to enjoy interactive media opportunities that ultimately will include blogs, podcasts for handheld devices, news, stats, video and athlete involve-

"This partnership is a huge step toward the future for U.S.

Figure Skating and signifies our aggressive pursuit of capturing new exposure and revenue opportunities through interactive media," U.S. Figure Skating Executive Director David Raith said. "This season, our intent is to continue working behind the scenes, so that for next season, you'll see what Ice Network is all about with the full package of capabilities."


In successive phases of the arrangement, MLBAM will oversee online ticketing and merchandising, as well as content services and the sale of advertising and sponsorships, in conjunction with U.S. Figure Skating, for Ice Network.

Cohen wins fans' hearts at Marshalls Challenge

lympic silver medalist Sasha Cohen used a new program and an old one to win the fans' vote Dec. 10 at the 2006 Marshalls U.S. Figure Skating Challenge,

televised live on ABC.

Cohen received 53 percent of the vote in the final round to beat out Johnny Weir, Rena Inoue and

John Baldwin and Kimmie Meissner, Cohen and Inoue and Baldwin were the top votegetters in the initial round for West Coast skaters, while Weir and Meissner won the East Coast votes.

Fans were able to vote three times during the competition – once for their favorite West

Coast skater, then their favorite East Coast skater, and once in the final round. Voting was available in-arena, via 1-900 numbers, and on U.S. Figure Skating Online.

The West Coast opened the show with Katy Taylor showing off a new short program to music from the movie "Legends of the Fall." The music fit her well, but she fell on her first jump, a triple flip. She went on to land a double Axel and triple Lutz-double toe combination.

Inoue and Baldwin's romantic skate to "Mandy" by Barry Manilow hit a chord with the audience. They included side-by-side double Axels, a throw triple, and varied lifts. Evan Lysacek then brought out an old outfit to skate to Andrea Bocelli's "Ave Maria." He landed two triple jumps and flowed across the ice with ease and emotion.

Cohen debuted a new exhibition number to a medley of "West Side Story" music, including "I Feel Pretty," "Cool" and "Maria." She landed a double Axel, a triple Salchow and two split jumps. Her spiral sequence hit just the right note with the crescendo of "Maria." She won more than half of the votes for the West Coast, with Inoue and Baldwin just beating out Lysacek.

Hughes opened the East Coast team with an energetic version of "Proud Mary," and Tanith Belbin and Ben Agosto followed up with their tango original dance.

Weir entranced the audience with Frank Sinatra's "My Way,"

landing four triples, and his blades cut a silent edge around the ice. The expert judges - Peggy Fleming, Dick Button and Peter Carruthers - praised Weir's emotion. Although the judges gave their opinion of the skates, their votes did not count. Meissner tried out a new program to Avril Lavigne's "Keep Holding On," which she dedicated to her "Cool Kids." Meissner supports children with cancer through her Cool Kids campaign. She landed two double Axels and two triples, and showed a different side to her personality with her hair down and whipping across the ice. Weir led the votes, and Meissner just beat out Belbin and Agosto for the second spot. Meissner opened the final round with "Unwritten" and included two double Axels, a triple Lutz, and a fall on a triple flip. Inoue and Baldwin skated their "Soul of Spain" competitive short program and even tried the crowd-pleasing throw triple Axel, although Inoue Weir used a modified version of his 2006 competitive free skate to "The Swan," and once again floated across the ice. But even his excellence couldn't overcome the lyricism of Cohen's "God Bless America" program. She also included a double Axel and a triple Salchow, but it was her presentation and flexibility that stole the show - and the Marshalls crown.

# U.S. skaters overcome adversity in France

kating in Paris usually has a special flavor that most competitors like, be it the gourmet food, sightseeing or local atmosphere. Yet this year's Trophée Eric Bompard, which took place Nov. 16-19, was quite different, and none of the American skaters really had the time or mood to truly enjoy being in Paris.

For the first time in years, only four American skaters in two categories competed at the event. The U.S. team was small in numbers but strong in quality, as Kimmie Meissner medaled in ladies, and Rena Inoue and John Baldwin finished on the podium in pairs.

The ladies competition was the fiercest of all. World champion Meissner faced off with Japan's Miki Ando and Korea's Yu-Na Kim, with Kim winning both sections of the competition and the title.

Meissner was busy finding new dresses after her luggage was lost during her plane trip, and she could not enjoy her stay as much as she would have liked. She endured a fall on the opening triple Lutz combination of her short program and had to fight in the free skate to claim the bronze medal.

She attempted her triple Axel for the first time in about a year. She did not land it properly, however, and the judges graded it as a missed double.

"Obviously, it was not my best program, but I am happy that I tried the triple Axel," Meissner said. "I really focused on doing my most difficult jumps here.'

Ando skated a wonderful short program to "Sheherazade" and successfully landed her triple Lutz-triple loop combination. Her elements did not quite match Kim's, but her components were slightly better, and the two women started the free skate with a 0.2-point difference. Ando fell on the opening triple Lutz of her free skate, however, and even though the rest of her program was flawless, she could not catch up with Kim

"After falling, it was hard to continue," Ando said.

Kim successfully landed her triple flip-triple toe combination in both her short program and

"I was so nervous," Kim said, "but I decided to skate without pressure and it worked."

It was Kim's first senior Grand Prix Series

Zukowski placed seventh in her first Grand Prix event and said she loved the experience.

### Joubert makes **Bompard history**

No French skater had ever won the men's competition of the French stage of the Grand Prix Series.

"I was really eager to do it this time," Brian Joubert said after his short program. He landed his quadruple toe-triple toe loop combination in the short program. He could not repeat it in the free skate, however, and he tripled his planned quadruple Salchow. He, nonetheless, won both sections.

Joubert credited his new coach, former French national champion Jean-Christophe Simond, for his faultless programs.

"Now I feel much more secure. Everything is planned for me, and I know what I have to do," Joubert said. "Just to tell you, I have not missed one single triple flip since September 6th."

Alban Préaubert, also from France, won the hearts of his home crowd with an enthusiastic and humoristic free skate to finish second.

"I am well ahead of my own targets," Préaubert said.


Russia's Sergei Dobrin and Ilia Klimkin took third and fourth place, respectively.


### **Inoue and Baldwin** secure silver

Inoue and Baldwin won far more than a silver medal in Paris. Baldwin had to overcome a high fever, which nearly prevented the duo from skating at all. He eventually overcame the fever, and they recorded the highest element scores in both the short program and free skate. In the free skate, Baldwin fell on their side-by-side triple toe but quickly regrouped. Inoue almost landed their signature throw triple Axel, which got additional credit for highlight distribution.

Veterans Maria Petrova and Alexei Tikhonov won in Paris for the first time in their career. Their new program, skated to Beethoven's "Moonlight Sonata," was an instant success with the crowd.


"Maria had wanted to skate to this music

for a very long time," Tikhonov said, "but we felt that you need to have grown enough to be able to skate to it. At our age, we feel that we can."

The Russian pair really seemed to enjoy their skating as well, with enhanced expression and emotion. Tikhonov said that they decided to skate competitively for one more year "at the request of the Russian Skating Federation. So now we skate not only for the judges and the elements but also for the audience, for our friends and for ourselves. So we put far less pressure on ourselves."

World champs sweep ice dancing

Albena Denkova and Maxim Staviski, the current World champions from Bulgaria, won all three sections of the competition, ahead of France's Isabelle Delobel and Olivier Schoenfelder, and Italy's Federica Faiella and Massimo Scali.

The compulsory Westminster Waltz and the original tango were skated on the same day.

"It was a tough day," Denkova said.

"In fact," Staviski added, "it was as if we lived several days into one. We woke up and ate and went skating and slept three times today."

In the free dance, the French duo had a higher element score than the Bulgarians, who won by the margin of 0.06 points.

Faiella and Scali maintained third place, even though Canadians Tessa Virtue and Scott Moir received higher element scores. The Italians presented what should soon become their trademark lift. She carried her partner upside down, his head near the ice and his skates to the sky, in a long diagonal. It was so successful that they presented that feat again during the final exhibition.

### Against doctor's orders

Inoue and Baldwin would never have imagined the nightmare that was awaiting them in Paris.

"Given the circumstances," a relieved Baldwin said after their successful short program, "it is good we went through it. I was diagnosed with shingles in the middle of last night. I had to skate with a 104 fever."

In fact, a doctor had been rushed to Baldwin's room at 2 a.m. the previous night and ad-

When asked how they had made the decision to skate in spite of the doctor's advice, Baldwin laughed and said, "Because the doctor did not come all the way from California to Paris to skate, and the doctor did not train so hard and also the doctor does not have a partner who deserves to compete as well."

"We were really well trained," Inoue said, "so I knew we could get through this."

"It will make us stronger," Baldwin added.

### Wardrobe crisis

Meissner's adventures in Paris were certainly most unlike anything she would have imagined.


"They've lost my suitcase," Meissner said.

What do you do in a foreign city when you have lost what you need most to compete, with only 48 hours before your competition starts?

Meissner and U.S. team leader Sharon Wiggins had to rush through Paris on Wednesday night to have a new dress made. On Thursday, she had a fitting session and an interview with ABC scheduled before the opening draw. Her schedule was so tight that it was finally decided that ABC would film the fitting session. Meanwhile, someone was nice enough to send several dresses via air from the United States.

On the next day, Meissner finally got her luggage back. Respecting all the efforts that were made to help her, she decided to skate her short program in one of the dresses she had received from the United States and her free skate in the dress that was made for her in Paris.

After being awarded her bronze medal, Meissner realized she would not have time to visit or shop around Paris. Last year, she was happy to have bought blue jeans in Paris. At least this year she will have many dresses to take back home.



# Lysacek savors first Grand Prix gold medal

van Lysacek secured his first gold medal on the Grand Prix circuit thanks to a strong performance of his "Carmen" free skate at Cup of China, Nov. 8-12, in Nanjing.

Teammates Tanith Belbin and Ben Agosto earned a silver medal in ice dancing, while Emily Hughes collected a bronze in the ladies event.

In second position after the short program, Lysacek landed seven triple jumps and only stepped out of his first triple Axel. He placed second in October at Skate America.

"Tonight was a little difficult for me just because of jetlag and everything," Lysacek said. "I was glad to get out and to deliver an OK performance. Obviously, there are plenty of things I want to get home and improve on before the

Grand Prix Final. We're all kind of starting out the season; it's early, and I think for this early I feel good about the performance that I gave today.

silver medal.

"This is a good confidence boost for me for the rest of the season. It was kind of a tough loss to get second in my home country at Skate America, so this feels like a little bit of redemption."

With the win, Lysacek became the first skater to qualify for the Grand Prix Final, which was held Dec. 14-17 in St. Petersburg, Russia.

Sergei Davydov from Belarus garnered his first Grand Prix medal when he took home silver. The 27-year-old produced two solid performances. His only mistake was a double flip in the free skate to "Don Quixote." Canada's Emanuel Sandhu, 27, placed third. He underrotated his quadruple toe loop in the short program. The quad was better in the free skate, but he made a few other mistakes.

Scott Smith placed

Tanith Belbin and Ben Agosto, 2006 Olympic silver medalists, showcased their "That's Entertainment" free dance at Cup of China. The most decorated ice dancers in U.S. history claimed the

> third in the short program. He decided not to risk the quad Salchow but hit a triple toe-triple toe instead. In the free skate, the student of Mark Mitchell and Peter Johansson reeled off six triple jumps but still slipped to fourth.

### Belbin and Agosto debut 'That's Entertainment' program


Russia's Oksana Domnina and Maxim Shabalin, ninth at the 2006 Olympic Winter Games, edged Olympic silver medalists Belbin and Agosto to earn the gold medal in Nanjing.

Belbin and Agosto debuted their new free dance to "That's Entertainment," and while it is a pleasant program, it lacked mileage. The couple did not have much time to prepare for the new season after a busy year and the long exhibition tour this summer. Belbin and Agosto didn't make any major mistakes but appeared hesitant in places. It was all Domnina and Shabalin needed as the flamboyant couple put out a powerful performance of Polovetsian dances to overtake the Americans and win their first Grand Prix gold medal.

"I think everyone understands now, particularly a few years into this new judging system, how challenging it is to create new elements and to have time to prepare new programs, and so I think that everyone stepped up to this challenge quite well this year," Belbin said.

"As far as our personal performance goes, obviously we can do a much better job than we did here today, but it is a good place to start from. I think we just need more time with this program to become more solid and more confident. Our result here doesn't change our plan for the season and the growth that we need to make with this program. We'll just keep our heads high and continue on training. We've been skating together for nine years, and this isn't a bump in the road that we can't overpass."

Russia's Jana Khokhlova and Sergei Novitski

finished third with consistent and technically difficult programs. Their free dance is set to "Concierto de Aranjuez," and they use Khokhlova's flexibility in their lifts and spins.

### Hughes claims first Grand Prix medal

Hughes, fifth at Skate America in October, performed a solid short program en route to a bronze medal, her first on the Grand Prix circuit. 2004 European champion Julia Sebestyen of Hungary returned to the top of the podium after two difficult seasons with disappointing results. Japan's Yukari Nakano captured the silver medal.

Hughes won the short program with a strong performance of her "Carmen" program. She underrotated three jumps in the free skate and recorded just two clean triples and, as a result, the 17-year-old slipped to third.

"Coming into the free skate, I was in the lead, and that's a new spot for me," Hughes said. "I'm two spots higher than at Skate America, but there are still a lot of things that could have gone better today. Overall, I'm very excited. It's my first Grand Prix medal. I had really great practices, I had a great warm-up and just in the program I felt a little shaky. I really tried to get over the jumps, but some of them weren't really there.

I still feel like it was a better program than I did last time, and that was one of my goals coming into this competition."

Sebestyen, 25, didn't skate her best, but it was enough to win in Nanjing. She doubled the flip in her short program and landed three clean triples in the free skate, but two of them were high triple Lutzes.


Nakano presented a new short program to "Memories of a Geisha," but her triple Lutz was cheated and downgraded. The 2006 Grand Prix Final bronze medalist appeared nervous in the free skate and made a handful of mistakes.

### Vlassov and Meekins sixth in Grand Prix debut

World Junior pairs champions Julia Vlassov and Drew Meekins turned in a good short program with a solid double Axel and throw triple loop. However, they were a bit shaky in their free skate to "Warsaw Concerto" in their Grand Prix

Vlassov, who usually is consistent with her jumps, fell on the opening double Axel and then again on the throw triple loop.

Olympic bronze medalists Xue Shen and Hongbo Zhao won the event. Their short pro-



gram was flawless, and their free skate was excellent, too; they only aborted the last lift.

Their teammates, reigning World champions Qing Pang and Jian Tong, weren't yet in top shape. She struggled with the side-by-side toe loop, and they, too, ran out of steam at the end and missed the last lift.

Germany's Aliona Savchenko and Robin Szolkowy nearly beat the World champions, but they made some minor errors as well and settled for the bronze medal.



hen Johnny Weir was at the Olympic Winter Games last February in Torino, Italy, he made no secret of his affinity for all things Russian.

At practice, he wore a warm-up jacket with the letters of the former Soviet Union (CCCP), a gift from Olympic and World pairs champion Tatiana Totmianina.

He made more than one visit to the Russian

House, the unofficial – or official – headquarters for Russian partying and spoke more than a few words in Russian there.

Needless to say, Weir felt right at home when he was in Moscow for the Cup of Russia, which was held Nov. 23-26.

"I just love walking around and seeing Moscow," Weir said.

He is well liked in Moscow. Signs for him in English and Russian hung around the arena, including a huge one that read: "We love you, Johnny" that was accompanied by a huge photo

After both of Weir's programs, he was besieged by girls seeking to give him a stuffed animal, a balloon, even a dozen roses, in return for a photo or a quick hug.

"I am just so excited when I am in Russia and Moscow and St. Petersburg, and I am looking forward to seeing more of Russia and more of the country," Weir said. "Maybe next summer on vacation I can visit the Black Sea and see some of

the smaller cities.

"I love to go shopping. It is a little overpriced since everything is about double of what is in the States. I love to see the ancient buildings. I love just seeing as much as I can in the few hours free I have away from skating."

He now is working with a former Russian, Marina Anissina, who moved to France and won the 2002 Olympic ice dancing title with Gwendal Peizerat.

Weir said he couldn't work with Tatiana Tarasova, so he turned to Anissina.

"I didn't have time to come to Moscow because of a heavy touring schedule," Weir said. "It was something out of convenience and I thought she was a great choreographer. I wanted to see what kind of direction she would take me in as far as the new programs were concerned."

However, the enthusiasm for Moscow and Russia didn't carry over into his skating. He salvaged a silver medal, although he had only the fifth-best free skate.

"It is still the beginning of the season," Weir said. "I didn't start training until August. I have been sick off and on since I have been home. I have been very busy. I haven't had time to get into the groove really."

He opened with a triple Axel that was barely held and did not follow it in combination. He had a double loop, then a pair of single Axels and another shaky triple. Weir had only one combination, which came in the final minute.

Yet, he saw something positive. "The thing I was happy with was that I made the mistakes and came back," Weir said. "In Canada everything kept unraveling and kept getting worse and worse. Toward the end (here) I found some energy and found some power and made it to the end without falling down. That was a plus. The performance was better than Skate Canada."

Then he gave a final tribute to the Russian fans.

"Having the support of the audience here helped me get through the last two minutes and helped push me to go," Weir said.

### Where are the Russians?

Something was missing at the Cup of Russia this year: A Russian winner. For the first time since the Cup of Russia became a Grand Prix in 1997, there was not a Russian victor.

In each previous year, there were three or four winners in the four disciplines. Last year, pre-Olympic favorites Evgeny Plushenko, Irina Slutskaya, Tatiana Totmianina and Maxim Marinin, and Tatiana Navka and Roman Kostomarov all won.

This year, the winners hailed from France,

Switzerland, Germany (with a former Ukrainian skater) and the United States. Brian Joubert claimed the men's event as he performed two different quads and added another toe loop to enter Tim Goebel territory. (Goebel became the first

to accomplish this feat in 1999 and did it other times in the next three seasons through the 2002 Olympics. Japan's Takeshi Honda did it at the 2003 Four Continents.)

Joubert scored a total of 31.50 points on those three jumping passes - perhaps a record, especially since he did his solo quad toe loop in the second half of the program and earned bonus points.

> It certainly was different from the last time he skated a free skate at the Luzhniki Ice Palace at the 2005 World Championships.

> There, he had a chance to beat Stephane Lambiel for the title - especially after Plushenko withdrew due to injury. But Joubert made mistakes on every jump and dropped to sixth.

> Now, two coaches later, things are different.

> "In 2005 I was not able to do three quads in the free program," Joubert said. "And I was very fragile mentally. I am very strong technically and mentally."

> He credits two-time European silver medalist Jean-Christophe Simond, who has instilled in Joubert more confidence. Oddly, Simond was a compulsory figure specialist and not a top free skater.

> Sarah Meier took the ladies event with four triple jumps. The last time she was on the podium for an international event was in 2000, when she finished behind Jennifer Kirk and Deanna Stellato at the World Junior Championships.

> With her victory over the rest of the top European rivals, she may be the favorite at the European Championships in January.

Pairs went to the German team of Aliona Savchenko and Robin Szolkowy.

Tanith Belbin and Ben Agosto won the ice dancing event but needed some help. Maxim Shabalin stumbled out of a twizzle in the original dance, allowing Belbin and Agosto to take that portion of the event by 5.66 points.

They were outscored by 4.67 in the other two portions of the event by Domnina and Shabalin.

They weren't discouraged.

"In a normal season, three months into our training we would still be at home polishing, working out some of these kinks," Belbin said. "Now we are three months into our training, and we are on the international scene. We'll get there for the World Championships."

## Hat trick times two

### Japanese women, men steal show

t was like a pre-national championship before the real one at the end of December.
At the NHK Trophy in Nagano,
Japan, Nov. 30-Dec. 3 – the last of six
competitions on the Grand Prix circuit
– three Japanese ladies had their sights
on the podium. The men's race pitted three former Japanese World Junior champions.

In the end, all earned medals.

Mao Asada had pressure on her. She needed to win to qualify for the Grand Prix Final. At last year's Grand Prix Final, Asada defeated Irina Slutskaya, the reigning World champion and the Olympic favorite at the time. Asada won easily with a routine that included a triple Axel.

This time, Asada beat Slutskaya again — sort of — without the triple Axel. Asada scored 199.52 points in both the short program and free skate. That is the highest score ever in the Grand Prix series, bettering the mark of 198.06 that Slutskaya recorded at the Cup of Russia in November 2005.

Asada was not perfect. She stepped out of her triple Axel and had a messy combination at the end of the routine.

Skating to the violins of "Hungarian Rhapsody," she momentarily landed the triple Axel on one foot but stepped out.

"At Skate America, I could only do a single Axel. This time, I did the 3-1/2 turns, but my landing was not so great," Asada said.

But she still won handily over last year's World silver medalist, Fumie Suguri, and Yukari Nakano, who is also on the short list of ladies who have done a triple Axel.

Suguri started well, with five triples without a hitch. She then singled her last attempt.

"My condition wasn't really, really good, and I got a cold from my mom before this competition," Suguri said.

In the men's event, two-time World champion Stephane Lambiel of Switzerland may have known something when he withdrew due to illness

It might have been tough for him to beat Daisuke Takahashi and Nobunari Oda as both posted higher scores than Lambiel ever got.

Lambiel won the World title in 2006 with 233.99.

At NHK, Takahashi scored 247.93 points to hold off Oda and his 244.56. The home ice and crowd may have helped.

Takahashi opened his program with a quad and then reeled off eight triple jumps to "Phantom of the Opera."

"I did the quad early in my routine, and that took a lot of pressure off," Takahashi said.

The quad probably made the difference in the scoring.

Oda performed eight triples with his routine to Tchaikovsky.

"I was rather nervous in the short program," Oda said. "If I were not, perhaps I could have performed better."

China's Xue Shen and Hongbo Zhao captured the pairs title. They competed an abbreviated season last year after he tore his Achilles tendon, but they still managed to win a bronze medal at the Olympics.

Still not looking like they did before the injury, Shen and Zhao managed to beat Olympic silver medalists Dan Zhang and Hao Zhang.

Shen and Zhao were hit with a two-

point deduction for ending six seconds after their music ended.

"We didn't have enough time for the last lift left," Hongbo said.

Canadians Marie-France Dubreuil and Patrice Lauzon used a version of "At Last" to claim the ice dancing event.

They said they have been busy since their victory at Skate Canada in October.

"We changed our short program and parts of our free dance," Dubreuil said. "So it was a hectic 2-1/2 weeks."

Russians Jana Khokhlova and Sergei Novitski finished second. Melissa Gregory and Denis Petukhov of the U.S. won the bronze medal and qualified for the Grand Prix Final.

The up-and-coming American team of Meryl Davis and Charlie White finished fourth with a string of level fours.

### Coach compares Kwan and Asada

Japan's Mao Asada surprised a lot of people this past summer when she suddenly left famed Japanese coach Machiko Yamada and went to Lake Arrowhead, Calif., to train with Rafael Arutunian.

With rinks closing and her coach getting more work from others, Asada decided it was time to make the move to the West Coast.

She and older sister, Mai, are renting a place in Lake Arrowhead and learning English. Being there, Asada is able to avoid some of the media attention she received in Japan.

But during the NHK Trophy, Asada was thrust back into the spotlight. She conducted 20 television, radio and print interviews during the three days of competition. Before the exhibition, Asada was bounced around from TV studio to makeshift TV studio to benches on the kiss-and-cry area.

Despite it all, Arutunian guided his prized pupil to an important victory. After her bronze medal finish at Skate America in Hartford, Conn., Asada needed the win to earn a spot in the Grand Prix Final and defend her title.

Her confidence also needed a boost after the poor free skate in Hartford.

When it was over, Arutanian stood back



from the fuss while Asada's manager and handlers herded her from interview to interview.

Arutunian compared Asada to another skater he coached over the past two years, Michelle Kwan.

"They are somehow similar, both very smart and talented, incredibly talented," Arutunian said.

There is only one difference.

"Michelle was mature, experienced and powerful — she knows what she wants," Arutunian said. "(Mao) is powerful. I think she knows what she wants, but she is still a young girl."

Kwan was 23 years old when she turned to Arutunian at the end of 2003. Asada turned 16 in September.

The difference in age shows up in the triple Axel for which Asada — not Kwan — is known.

Arutunian had a wish for Kwan.

"I was always telling her, 'I wish you could do the triple Axel," he said.

To which Kwan would answer, "Rafael, you are too late, you're too late."

"I always wanted her to do it, and I was thinking she could do it," Arutunian said. "She is a person who could do it."

However, he has a wish for Asada.

"I wish her luck," he said. "I just wish her luck, nothing else. I think she has almost everything, and hopefully she is mentally strong enough to handle all that success."

Why luck?

"You never can manage what comes, what can drop you from there," Arutunian said.

#### **NHK NOTES**

Geoffry Varner was a star baseball player growing up in California. He almost made it to the Little League World Series.

"I was the second baseman," he said. "I led off. Our team got to the California finals, but we lost. I played baseball until I was 12. I wanted to continue playing, but I had to choose which sport."

He said he was not hassled when people realized a figure skater was fielding ground balls and getting base hits.

"I was really good at it, so no one gave me a hard time," Varner said.

Now, instead of searching for a walk, Varner is searching for a triple Axel. In both tries at the NHK Trophy, he scaled it down into a double Axel and finished 10th.

"It is like a day-by-day jump now," he said. "It just depends on what day it is."

Before the NHK Trophy, the last time Daisuke Takahashi and Nobunari Oda met in competition was at the Japanese national championships last December in Tokyo, which determined the sole men's Olympic berth for the Japanese team.

Oda outscored Takahashi in the finals and was awarded the championship trophy. He looked to be heading to Torino, Italy.

Or was he?

A scoring error in the program credited Oda with an extra jump. When the mistake was checked and Oda's jump total adjusted, he was behind Takahashi.

Oda cried when he had to give back the trophy. but nearly a year later he looked at it realistically.

"It was my mistake," Oda said.

Takahashi went to the Olympic Winter Games and finished eighth.

"At first I was embarrassed to take it," Takahashi said. "Then I accepted it as it was and went to the Olympics as Japanese national champion."

Oda went to the World Championships and placed fourth, earning his country two spots for the 2007 World Championships in Tokyo.

\* \* \*

For those who understand the little letters and numbers on the judges' detailed scoring sheets - and even for those who don't - it was very consistent for Meryl Davis and Charlie White's free dance.

"All level fours," White said.

"And no minuses." Davis said of the ones and twos following the performed elements.

It was quite appropriate they came in fourth in their first year of senior competition.

The winners of the event, Canadians Marie-France Dubreuil and Patrice Lauzon, received five level threes, a level two and some minuses scattered on their sheet.

Davis and White were five points better than the Canadians in base value of the technical elements, although they were more than 10 points behind them in the program component scores.

Still, it was good to see the fours.

"The hard work pays off," White said. "You go out there and hope you are going to get level fours, but when it turns out you do it, it's fantastic."

### Spokane gears up for State Farm U.S. Championships

in Spokane, Wash., this month for the 2007 State Farm U.S. Championships. At stake are national titles in the senior, junior and novice ranks and an opportunity to represent the U.S. at the World Championships

he best figure skaters in the United States arrive

The local organizing committee reports that ticket sales have been outstanding, with several of the performances sold out or nearly sold out. ABC, meanwhile, has put together a broadcast schedule that promises to capture many exciting moment of this marquee competition.

in Tokyo, Japan, in March.

In this post-Olympic season, there are several compelling storylines that have created a buzz in U.S. figure skating circles.

Arguably the most intriguing battle is in the senior men's division where three-time U.S. champion Johnny Weir will attempt to win a fourth consecutive title. Brian Boitano was the last man to accomplish that feat from 1985-88.

Weir's main competition likely will again come from Evan Lysaeck, who won a silver medal last year and a bronze in 2005 at the U.S. Championships.

Both skaters, however, suffered hip injuries during the Grand Prix Final in St. Petersburg, Russia, in mid-December, and how much that will hinder their performances remains a big question.

Scott Smith, fifth at last year's event, and Ryan Bradley, 2006 eighth-place finisher, figure to be strong medal contend-

The senior ladies event could provide equal drama involving World champion Kimmie Meissner and U.S. bronze medalist Emily Hughes.

Meissner placed second at Skate America and third at Trophee Eric Bompard during the Grand Prix campaign. She finished second to Sasha Cohen at last year's U.S. Championships and was third in 2005.

Hughes placed fifth at Skate America and third at the Cup of China this season

Alissa Czisny, Bebe Liang, Christine Zukowski and Katy Taylor are other contenders for the podium.

Olympic pairs skaters Rena Inoue and John Baldwin are the favorites to win their third U.S. title. Their throw triple Axel last year in St. Louis was one of the most memorable moments of the competition.


Ready to make some noise in the pairs ranks are Naomi Nari Nam and Themi Leftheris, who finished fifth at the 2006 U.S. Championships in their first year together. They also won their first Grand Prix medal, at Skate America, this season.


Tiffany Vise and Derek Trent could be a threat; they placed sixth last year. Also, two first-year senior teams - Julia Vlassov and Drew Meekins, and Kendra Moyle and Andy Seitz - may be factors.

Ice dancers Tanith Belbin and Ben Agosto will attempt to win their fourth consecutive U.S. title. The Olympic silver medalists won gold and silver medals during the Grand Prix season but were forced to withdraw from the Grand Prix Final when Agosto suffered a back injury.

They'll be tested by Melissa Gregory and Denis Petukhov, who have finished second the last three seasons at the U.S. Championships. A new coach and new training town have seemed to spark their careers. They placed second at Skate America and third at NHK Trophy, and qualified for the Grand Prix Final.

Morgan Matthews and Maxim Zavozin, and Kim Navarro and Brent Bommentre, fourth and fifth last year at the U.S. Championships, respectively, are other strong hopefuls for a medal. First-year senior team Meryl Davis and Charlie White are also podium contenders. They placed fourth at the NHK Trophy in December.



# Chang direction

Weir sets sights on No. 4 with bolder programs

hen he finished his last whirlwind of a season, Johnny Weir was done.

After a rollercoaster year - winning his third U.S. Championships, qualifying for the Olympics, then performing below his expectations in Torino, Italy,

and fighting back pain throughout the World Championships - Weir was burnt out and ready to hang up his competitive skates...at least for a little while.

"Last year was such a big year, and such a sort of disappointing one for me, personally and professionally, that I just wanted to get as far away from skating as possible," Weir said. "I don't think that I would have really been involved with this season as much. I would have taken off the Grand Prix or taken off nationals, something, if it hadn't been for Marina."

The Marina he's talking about is Marina Anissina, Weir's new choreographer, who breathed new life into his skating. After focusing on balletic, flowing skating for his entire career, Anissina suggested Weir make a change.

Instead of doing the same romantic style of skating, why not try a more athletic approach? She believed a new style might help revitalize his love for the sport.

It was a change and a challenge, both of which sounded seductive to Weir.


"I wanted to show a different side of me, and I wanted to sort of shed my image of the swan from last year, and do something different," Weir said. "I don't think my programs are totally way off in right field like if I'd gone from doing the dying swan to dueling banjos. It's not that drastic of a change. It's not very delicate and like a porcelain doll. It's more bull in a china shop."

So far, Weir is enjoying the change in scenery. He has two new programs to match his new aesthetic, no small feat in a post-Olympic season full of tours, international shows and traveling.

Things got even more interesting as he watched his Champions on Ice tour mates train well-oiled programs from the previous season to bring back in competition. Weir was still "fumbling through footwork making a new one."

But to him, doing an old program was not an option.

"I never felt that being safe was the best way to go as far as programs are concerned," Weir said. "You can't grow if you don't change things up. You can't improve."



That's the attitude Weir takes into this month's 88th State Farm U.S. Championships in Spokane, Wash. It'll be his 10th appearance at the event, and he has the chance to win his fourth consecutive U.S. Championships title. If he does wins it, he will be the first skater in 20 years to accomplish the four-peat. The last skater to do so was Brian Boitano from 1985-88.

Not that there's any pressure.

But what Weir said he's looking for isn't only the record (though, he admits, it is up there). He wants to be a career skater, and has his eyes on the gold medal at the World Championships.

And maybe, just a little further down the line, an Olympic gold might be a possibility, though he'll be the first to say there's some tough competition out there.

"I have four years to the next Olympics," Weir said. "[Evgeny] Plushenko may come back, he may not. [Brian] Joubert is very strong, Stephane Lambiel, plus [Evan] Lysacek. There's just a slew of international guys that could be the next Olympic champion. Everyone is so talented. It's hard right now to say who's going to be the next Plushenko, who's going to dominate the way he did.

"But of course, I'm hoping it's me."

Weir also sees part of his legacy as working with the next generation of skaters. He is doing a little coaching with his own coach, Priscilla Hill. He also sees his own skating school in the future or a camp for gifted skaters.

He took special notice of the United States' recent dominance at the Junior Grand Prix Final as a sign of the coming times. Junior skaters from the U.S. took up more than half of the slots (24) at the international event. Russia was second with 11. The United States went on to claim nine of the 12 medals and all four golds.

"We have so much depth in the sport in our country" he said. "I always want to be a part of that."

He also brings a message that he believes is a different, and important, one for the figure skating community to hear. Weir wants to encourage younger skaters to be themselves more, on and off the ice.

"I think a lot of people try to go that cookie-cutter route to get something out of it...[but] I've never seen what there is to lose in figure skating. I want to teach young skaters that you can be who you are, and you don't have to be afraid of anything."

Few should be shocked at the idea that Weir wants to go his own direction. He's a skater known almost as much for his flamboyant nature as for his elegant skating. While most skaters only get attention from fans of the sport and a precious few attain star status, Weir has become an almost cultural phenomenon, becoming a favorite topic on Internet blogs and message boards.

He's also just as surely a media darling. A favorite in mixed zones and press conferences around the world, reporters always know that when Johnny is at the podium, it's time to pull out the recorder. Though his answers are occasionally marked by the cringe-worthy comments, they're reliably intelligent and honest.

'Generally, if I just skated poorly, I'll tell you about it and why I skated poorly and what I thought could have been better," Weir said. "That's something that I've been taught

from a very early age. You have to be critical of yourself. You can't always be in the romantic story with yourself and in your mind. You never grow that way. You can't see your own faults, and, therefore, you can't get over them, and you can't improve upon them."

Though some (himself included) think of Weir as persona non grata in figure skating circles, that's not an issue that bothers him in the least. He feels that, despite how others view him, he's exactly where he wants to be, and, in that regard, has a lot to share with the skaters who will be coming up in the not-so-distant future.

"I want people to be intelligent about the image they're putting out there," he said. "Mine has not always been wonderful. I've done a lot of crazy things and said a lot of stupid things. But, in any event, I stand behind all of it and am proud of everything I've been able to say."



# Moments

### Veteran reporters take trip down memory lane

hroughout the years, there have been many riveting stories in the figure skating world. Who could forget "The Battle of the Brians," "The Battle of the Carmens" or Rudy Galindo's unfathomable rise to glory?

There were plenty of stories of heartbreak as well: Tai Bablionia and Randy Gardner being forced to withdraw from the 1980 Olympics, Debi Thomas' collapse at the 1988 Olympics, Christopher Bowman's rise and fall, and Todd Eldredge and Michelle Kwan's Olympic hard luck.

Of course, there are controversial stories, too: the infamous Tonya (Harding)-Nancy (Kerrigan) saga and the 2002 Olympic judging scandal are among those at the top of the list.

Through it all, there have been a handful of reporters who have traveled the globe to witness it all. Usually, these reporters tell other people's stories. They tell the public about the skaters' lives, the details of their short programs and free skates and their coaching changes. These people have been there when skaters have risen to the top of the podium and when they have (literally) hit the wall.

But who are these people who busy themselves with detailing the lives of skaters? It's easy to forget that there are always stories behind the stories - the text that comes after the headlines. The following is a look at a few of the veteran reporters, some of whom have written about figure skating in four decades.

When the 2006 State Farm U.S. Figure Skating Championships were held in St. Louis, nearly 300 members of the media were issued credentials. Television cameras followed every move that Sasha Cohen made. Skaters would be transformed into Olympians if they could hold the landing of a triple Axel. Tanith Belbin's citizenship status made national headlines.


That was hardly the case back in 1974 when a man named John Powers was assigned to cover the 1974 U.S. Championships in Providence, R.I. Hired as a sports reporter by The Boston Globe in 1973, Powers was asked by his editor two months later to cover the event. Powers was a Harvard graduate, but he was a rookie writer and had even less experience in an ice rink

Aside from growing up with a crush on Tenley Albright, Powers knew little about skating. The sport was rarely shown on TV, and most sports editors back then busied themselves with the traditional sports, such as baseball and football - especially in a city such as Boston where people breathed Red Sox baseball.

"My editor figured that a Harvard kid should know something about skating since Dick Button went there," Powers recalled. "So they sent me to nationals."

Even so, Powers wasn't assigned to actually cover the event. All he had to do was write one feature story. Gordon McKellen was the defending champion, so Powers thought it was a safe bet to focus on him. Powers caught up with McKellen in a corridor outside the dressing room - there was no fancy news conference back then - and pieced together a story for the Sunday paper. Powers cannot recall if U.S. Figure Skating even had a publicist on hand. Only two other reporters, Powers recalled, were at the event - one from The Associated Press and a local writer from The Providence Journal.

Little did Powers know then that he would ever cover figure skating's U.S. Championships again, let alone 21 more times. Nor did he realize he would become one of the leading experts on skating among sports reporters. He grew to understand the sport's many nuances and developed strong sources in the skating community. Over the years, he would

travel everywhere from Lake Placid, N.Y., to Lausanne, Switzerland, to write about figure skating. Based in Boston, Powers had plenty of good skating to cover in his own backyard, especially since The Skating Club of Boston is one of the nation's most storied and successful

Powers tracked the many ups and downs of Todd Eldredge, who was born in Chatham, Mass. And of course, Powers followed the careers of two other Boston skaters, Kerrigan and Paul Wylie. In 2001, he was the lead figure skating writer when the U.S. Championships were held in Boston.

The first time he covered figure skating in the Olympics was in 1980 in Lake Placid, N.Y., and he has covered every Olympic Winter Games since. Although he seen numerous amazing

in particular stands out in his mind. It was the free program that Kitty and Peter Carruthers skated at the 1984 Olympics.

The two were adopted by parents who lived in Burlington, Mass., so Powers got to know them over the years. The Carruthers were four-time U.S. champions, but they had only one World medal, a bronze, entering the 1984 Olympics. But they skated such a strong routine that the judges couldn't deny them an Olympic medal.

"I remember with about 20 seconds left in their program, when they finished all of their difficult moves, when they knew they skated clean and probably would win a medal, Peter looked at the judges and said, 'Yes!' " Powers said. "It just brought home to me how much the Olympics mean at that moment.

"The Olympics in 1984 wasn't so great for the U.S. Scott Hamilton won the Olympic gold medal, but even Scott wasn't happy with his performance. Rosalynn Sumners settled for silver. So, this moment with the Carruthers was one that I really remember well."

These days, Powers is still writing skating stories for the Globe, and Peter Carruthers has joined the media as a commentator for ABC.

Powers didn't start covering the U.S. Championships on a regular basis until 1980, when the event was held in Atlanta. That same year, another young reporter, Phil Hersh, made his debut at the U.S. Championships.

At the time, Hersh was writing for the Chicago Sun-Times and was assigned to cover the U.S. Championships in preparation for the 1980 Olympics. He didn't return to the figure skating championships until 1984, when they were held in Salt Lake City. Four years later, he was back at the U.S. Championships in Denver.

Ever since, he has been a fixture in the skating press box,

havng covered every U.S. Championships since 1988. He has missed just three World Championships since 1989.

Hersh has covered numerous major events, including World Cup soccer and the Tour de France, and he is the only American writer to have covered every outdoor U.S. Track and Field Championships. But skating has a special place in his heart. He is passionate about music, and he loves international travel. He also has taken to skating for its intrigue and human-interest stories.

"I love music, and I love opera," said Hersh, who now writes for the Chicago Tribune. "With figure skating, you've got opera and soap opera rolled into one."

The routines that stand out in Hersh's memory are the ones where the skater has literally transformed into a character on the ice. At the 1988 Olympics, Hersh said, Katarina Witt became Carmen. At the 1994 Olympics, Oksana Baiul was a swan. And four-time World champion Kurt Browning became Bogart.

Another instance which Hersh witnessed that transformation was at the 1996 World Championships in Edmonton. That's when Michelle Kwan performed her routine to "Salome." When Hersh first saw her perform the routine, her hair was in pigtails. She was hardly a seductress.

"It was a joke," Hersh said.

When he saw her skate the program at the U.S. Championships, it was improved, but in Hersh's mind, just "good."

Something happened between the U.S. Championships and Worlds.

At the World Championships, Lu Chen was the defending champion and skated an elegant routine to a Rachmaninoff concerto. Olympic champion Peggy Fleming told a national audience on ABC that the choreography for her program was "like a work of art." She floated through the




Meanwhile, Kwan was sitting in a closet backstage but could hear the judges "6.0s."

"Then Michelle goes out, and all of a sudden, she is Salome," Hersh said. "She left out a triple toe early in the routine, and then she adds a triple toe with about seven seconds to go. It was as if it was a basketball game, with Lu Chen hitting a three-pointer with 20 seconds to go, and Michelle comes back and does a reverse-360 to win."

Perhaps what is most incredible about the sport to Hersh is when skaters perform their best under the most pres-

"I'll never forget Brian Boitano skating the performance of





his life when the biggest prize of his life was at stake," Hersh said. "The same was with (Katia) Gordeeva and (Sergei) Grinkov in

"When skaters do it right, it's such magic," Hersh added. "People just don't realize how hard this sport is."

One such magical moment came in 1996. That was the year that everyone expected Eldredge to walk away with the title. No one had even thought much about another skater named Rudy Galindo.

As it turned out, Galindo was the one who everyone wound up talking about for years.

Galindo had achieved plenty of success as a U.S. pairs champion with Kristi Yamaguchi. But when Yamaguchi decided to focus her attention on singles skating, Galindo's career spiraled downward. At the time, he was living in a trailer home and was riding a bicycle to the rink. His sister, Laura, became his coach. He had lost his father and brother. At 26, Galindo decided to compete at the U.S. Championships one more time, mainly because they were being held in his hometown of San Jose, Calif.

Galindo was the type of guy people rooted for, but he wasn't considered a threat for the gold medal.

Third after the short program, Galindo was the last skater to take the ice in the free skate. He responded by producing a riveting routine to "Swan Lake," complete with eight triples, and the crowd in San Jose couldn't sit in their seats. A hometown hero - and a very unlikely one at that - made good in his hometown.

"It was such a stunning moment," Hersh said. "I noticed that my eyes were wet watching him. He had gone through so much agony. Finally, he arrived in ecstasy."

Hersh is far from the only reporter to recall Galindo's heroics as legendary. Anyone who was in San Jose that day will attest to that. Barry Wilner, a veteran reporter for The Associated Press, said that Galindo's program is his most vivid memory of skating. And like Hersh, Wilner has seen plenty of skating.

"I started covering nationals in 1986, but I've covered almost every major sporting event around," Wilner said. "Pretty much when people ask me the most exciting moment I've covered in sports, I tell them, 'It's not the World Cup. It's not the Super Bowl. It's Rudy Galindo in San Jose.

"The whole place was so electric. I will never forget it. It was like being at a heavyweight fight or Game 7 of a Stanley Cup Finals. Even afterward Todd said the right guy won."

Wilner, a native of Queens, N.Y., began working for the Associated Press in 1975. Over the years, he had dabbled a bit in figure skating coverage, and wrote a feature about Elaine Zayak, who trained on Long Island. But he was not the regular beat

Another writer had been covering the sport for the AP but she died of meningitis in January 1986. The U.S. Figure Skating Championships were going to be held on Long Island in February and Wilner's editor asked him to cover

"After I did that first event, I told my boss I'd like to do this again," Wilner said.

He's been doing it again and again. And again.


In 1982, the AP hired Marie Vichova Millikan, a Prague native who finished in the top half of the wom-

en's field in the 1968 Olympics, to assist Wilner with figure skating coverage. Since the articles from the AP are disseminated to news outlets around the world, accuracy is essential. Millikan taught Wilner how to spot the entries to different jumps and explained the intricacies of the sport to him. Wilner admits it took him nearly two years before he truly felt comfortable with his knowledge of the jumps. Now, it's second nature.

Millikan remains a part of the AP team. Nancy Armour, a writer based in Chicago, also covers skating for the AP.

Over the years, Wilner has had his share of skating stories, covering everything from the Tonya-Nancy scandal in Lillehammer and the judging scandal in Salt Lake City.

"I actually think coverage of the Tonya-Nancy situation was quite tame compared to what it would've been now with the Internet," Wilner said.



Still, there was never a dull moment when he was writing in Lillehammer.

"You never felt there was not going to be a story," Wilner said. "Every day, there was something we had to chase."

Wilner vividly recalls one day in Lillehammer when Harding and Kerrigan would have to share the same ice. TV cameras and writers packed into the small arena. Reporters stood on a wooden platform. The AP sent a columnist to cover the scene. Wilner, meanwhile, wound up watching the scene in a TV booth with Hamilton.

"He was making fun of the whole scene," Wilner said. "It turned out to be a great spot for me to be."

The 2002 Olympics were equally intense, with the cloud of the judging scandal hovering over the skating world. This time, Wilner wasn't with Hamilton when he was ranting about the final standings in the pairs event.

"I thought the Canadians should've won, but Marie thought the Russians should have," Wilner said. "Soon, it became clear this was going to be a big story. We had five people working on it, and the AP broke a lot of the stories."

But what Wilner enjoys most about covering figure skating is what happens on the ice. Covering the "Battle of the Brians" - the on-ice duel between Brian Boitano and Brian Orser at the 1988 Olympics in Calgary - was an incredible event for Wilner to witness.

"Both of them skated so well," Wilner said. "After Brian


Boitano skated, there was a feeling of relief on his face. Then Orser had to come right out after him, in Canada no less. And after Boitano won, there was no real sign of disappointment from the crowd. The Canadians are so knowledgeable about figure skating. I think Boitano was amazed that he won in Canada."

> Another memorable moment for Wilner came in Philadelphia at the 1998 U.S. Championships when Michelle Kwan performed a mesmerizing routine to "Lyra Angelica." At the time, Kwan was vying to reclaim the national title. She won in 1996 but lost to rival Tara Lipinski in 1997. The 1998 U.S. Championships served as the Olympic qualifier for the Games in Nagano, so the pressure was intense.

> > "I turned to Nancy (Armour) and said, 'You're going to see a lot of 6.0s here," Wilner said. "That's the only performance I said deserves a 6.0. It was breathtaking. It was probably the best I've ever seen her skate."

> > > Without hesitation, another veteran skating writer, Christine Brennan, agrees.

"My favorite on-ice skating perfor-



mances were Michelle Kwan's short and long programs from the 1998 U.S. nationals," said Brennan, who has covered 17 consecutive U.S. Championships, dating back to the 1990 U.S. Championships in Salt Lake City.

What Brennan knew was that Kwan had broken her toe earlier in the season, so there was some uncertainty as to how she would perform.

"Michelle certainly rose to the occasion during those nationals," Brennan said. "She performed her Rachmaninoff short program and Lyra Angelica long program magnificently, earning 15 perfect 6.0s from the judges for the two programs. They were the two best-judged programs ever performed by the same skater at a U.S. nationals, and they became two of Kwan's most renowned performances."

Brennan first covered the Olympics at the Summer Games in Los Angeles in 1984 while working at the Miami Herald. She later was hired at The Washington Post and covered her first Olympic Winter Games in 1988. She has covered the past 12 Olympics, winter and summer.

Like Powers, Hersh and Wilner, Brennan also became interested in the sport, both on and off the ice. She has written two prominent books about the sport, Inside Edge and Edge of Glory. These days, she follows skating as a columnist for USA Today.

Jo-Ann Barnas has also had an eventful career covering the skating scene. She first reported on figure skating at the 1985 U.S. Championships in Kansas City, Mo., when she was writing for the Kansas City Star. At the time, she recalled watching a young boy win the novice championships that year. That young boy was none other than Todd Eldredge.

Barnas didn't cover much skating after that, but a little more than a decade later, her path crossed with Eldredge again. Beginning in the 1996-97 season, Barnas started covering skating for The Detroit Free Press, and Eldredge - who was the reigning World champion at the time - was training with Richard Callaghan at the Detroit Skating Club. Barnas tracked Eldredge's career as he won U.S. Championships in 1997, 1998 and 2002. (He won six titles overall.)

The Detroit area has been so rich with figure skating talent that Barnas has often written about several local champions at the U.S. Championships. Ever since 1997, Barnas has had at least one Detroit skater or skating duo win a U.S. Championships title.

Ice dancers Elizabeth Punsalan and Jerod Swallow won ice dancing titles in 1997 and 1998. Naomi Lang, a Michigan native, and Peter Tchernyshev followed them with five titles, and Tanith Belbin and Ben Agosto have claimed the last three titles. Danielle and Steve Hartsell won the pairs title in 1999, and Lipinski claimed the women's crown in 1997.

Barnas was well aware of what she was getting into when she started covering skating in 1996. Detroit two years earlier is where the Tonya-Nancy incident took place. Skating's popularity exploded after that, especially in the Detroit area.

When Barnas took over the skating beat at the Free Press, her predecessor, Michelle Kaufman (now at the Miami Herald), told Barnas to pay close attention to Lipinski. "That girl is special," Kaufman told Barnas.

It's a good thing Barnas heeded that advice.

Lipinski won the U.S. Championships and World titles in

1997. Heading into the Olympic season, however, Michelle Kwan was deemed the gold-medal favorite. Barnas was in Philadelphia for the 1998 U.S. Championships. As she watched Kwan's programs, she was spellbound.

"Nearly 10 years later, it still takes my breath away," Barnas said. "It was so beautifully performed that it doesn't look choreographed. It was a Lori Nichol masterpiece."

Barnas even joked that she is thankful for YouTube.com so she can tune into Internet replays of Kwan's free skate.

But the best skating moment of Barnas' career was yet to

It came shortly afterward at the 1998 Olympic Winter Games in Nagano, Japan. Kwan remained the favorite, but Barnas was still keeping close tabs on Lipinski, her local skater and a strong medal contender.

As it turned out, Lipinski became the surprise gold medalist.

"At the Olympics, Tara just didn't embrace the moment but the pressure," Barnas said. "In the long program, she skated after Michelle Kwan, whose performance was easily good enough to win gold. But Lipinski's free skate included seven triple jumps, including an incredibly difficult sequence jump (a triple toe-half loop-triple Salchow), near the four-minute mark."

Lipinski stunned the crowd and herself by how well she skated. When she finished her routine, she skipped across the ice with excitement. She had produced magic from a bottle.

"It truly was an Olympic performance," Barnas said.

For Barnas, Lipinski's upset victory was front-page news. Not only did Barnas cover Lipinski's stellar routine, but she also covered Lipinski's every move afterward. Would she turn pro?

Lipinski made history in four minutes, but Barnas would be writing about her a lot longer than that.

Nowadays, Barnas continues to focus on Detroit-area skaters, and she still keeps plenty busy. She is so dedicated to covering skating that she often can be seen watching ice dancing practices.

"Especially in the weeks leading up to the Olympics, figure skating almost becomes a fulltime beat for me," Barnas said. "This past season was extremely busy because I was following Tanith Belbin and Ben Agosto, not only on the ice but off it, too."

Belbin, a Canada native, didn't know until a couple of weeks before the 2006 U.S. Championships if she would, indeed, gain her American citizenship. If she did, she could compete in the Olympics. If not, she and Agosto, who missed the 2002 Olympics

because of her citizenship issues, would have to sit out a second chance at the Games. With help from Congress, Belbin earned her citizenship, and Belbin and Agosto not only won a U.S. title but a trip to Torino, Italy.


"At the Olympics, they became the first U.S. ice dancing team since 1976 to win a medal," Barnas said. "That was frontpage news in Detroit - and the day after, and the day after."


What has made skating so special to Barnas and other reporters is the relationships that are developed through the sport. Reporters see skaters through their ups and downs, as they battle

> injuries and as they skate their hearts out. The skaters get to know the reporters, too. And, often, a mutual respect grows.

"I've gained a lot of trust with (Belbin and Agosto)," Barnas said. "I think, over the years, because I've known them since they were kids and they understand that I cover skating like it was any other beat, they respect me. I take it seriously."








# Love of skating still drives Tickner

After failing to qualify for the 1976 Olympic Team, Charlie Tickner had a decision to make. At 22, people in the sport were telling him to retire, but he disagreed.

"My performance in '76 wasn't a true evaluation of my ability or my potential," Tickner said. "I knew I had more to offer."

In 1977, at age 23, Tickner won the first of four U.S. senior titles and in 1978 he claimed gold at the World Championships. He finished his amateur career with bronze medals at the 1980 Olympic Winter Games in Lake Placid, N.Y., and the 1980 World Championships in Dortmund, Germany. After recently watching a tape of one of his amateur free skates, he noted it might score well under the international judging system.

One of his most popular moves, the delayed single Axel, would likely not be found in a current day senior program, but Tickner does teach it to his students at Ice Oasis in Redwood City, Calif.

"Not necessarily as something they're going to do in a program, but because it's a bigger jump," he said. "Hopefully when they start working on double Axels it will make them a little easier and give them a better takeoff."

Tickner, 53, has no issues with the changes in the sport.

"It's called progress," he said, but he does try to instill good basic skating qualities in his students. He teaches all levels from beginners to senior as well as a substantial number of adult students, with whom he enjoys working with due to their genuine enthusiasm.

"I don't take students because they're good and they're going to get somewhere," Tickner said. "I take them because they want to learn."

After turning professional in 1980, Tickner toured with Ice Capades for five years. That's where he met his wife of 22 years, Kathy, who was a line skater and show publicist in the company. In 1985 both were eager to start a family, so they transitioned to a more settled lifestyle. Tickner coached and continued to perform in shows and small tours until 1994, and Kathy became a teacher. She runs the art and drama departments at their local middle school.

"Does a pretty amazing job," Tickner said.

They have three sons: Jonathan, 19, a sophomore in college studying music; Jake, 14, a freshman in high school; and Jordan, 12, a seventh grader. All the boys are both athletic and musical, but there are no skaters in the bunch. They all played soccer, and Jake is now a competitive freestyle skier. In fact, most winter weekends are spent in Lake Tahoe, where everyone in the family loves to snow ski.

In February 2005, Tickner attended the 25th anniversary of the Olympic Winter Games in Lake Placid, which he described as exciting and emotional. While there, fellow 1980 Olympic Team member Lisa-Marie Allen mentioned an upcoming seminar in Dallas for potential technical specialists for the international judging system. Tickner con-



tacted longtime friend David Kirby about attending.

"At the time I wasn't really interested in being a caller," Tickner said. "I felt I was going to learn because this system is going to be part of this sport. Coaches who don't learn it are going to be behind the eight ball. At the seminar I thought, 'This is very cool,' so when they asked if I was interested I said, Absolutely."

Tickner was a technical specialist for the novice and junior men's competitions at 2006 State Farm U.S. Championships and he's scheduled to work at the 2007 U.S. Championships in Spokane, Wash.

"It's a great system," he said. "Is it going to be perfect? Probably not. People say, 'Judges can still do some maneuvering in the component scores.' I think people forget that this is a subjective sport. Each one of us has an opinion. "Now the winner is not always who does the most

jumps. It's who does the best jumps, the best spins and has a good program. It's much more of a total pack-He admits calling footwork is challenging, as is getting students to work on difficult footwork. He also works with his students to have positive at-

"My advice to people is if they like to skate, they shouldn't necessarily look at where they finish," Tickner said. "If you really like it and you work hard, I think people will be pleasantly surprised with how well they do."

After all, it worked for him.

ingzhu Li knows a thing or two about coaching champions.

She coached Lu Chen, who was the 1995 World titlist and two-time Olympic bronze medalist.

Li is now in charge of Caroline Zhang, who romped to big victories this season and dominated the competition at the Junior Grand Prix Final, presented Dec. 7-9, in Sofia, Bulgaria.

Zhang won the event by 20 points over fellow American Ashley Wagner, who collected a silver medal. Megan Oster of the U.S. earned the bronze medal.

Li compared her two champion skaters.

"They have very good coordination," Li said. "She (Zhang) has more flexibility, but Lu-Lu had more stamina and power. They have pretty much the same technique at the same age."

In addition to the flexibility, where Zhang bends her back to touch her skate and then brings her foot above her head in spins and spirals, Zhang has the jumps, too.

"Lu-Lu was 11 when she was able to land the five triples," Li said. "Caroline was a little older. She could do all the triples last year (when she was 12), but not very cleanly."

Zhang went through the short program and free skate without an obvious problem, and even does triple Lutz-double toe jumps as a warm-up before she competes.

"I get nervous when they announce my name," Zhang said. "I don't get nervous when they start my music."

However, there is one obstacle facing Zhang.

Zhang is just 13 and faces the same age dilemma as Kimmie Meissner, Mao Asada and Yu-Nna Kim as needing to wait until she is past 15 years old to compete in senior international championships.

For Zhang, that will not happen until the 2008-09 season. Until then, she will have to be content with doing well in the junior competitions and senior Grand Prix events next year.

She will have another year of juniors at the 2007 State Farm U.S. Championships, where she hopes to make up for last year when she was expected to do well but a virus sapped her and she finished eighth.

But with Meissner, Asada and Kim now in the senior ranks, it looks good for not only for Zhang, but also the other American ladies at the Junior World Championships in Oberstdorf, Germany, in February.

A sweep of medals is possible but that doesn't guarantee future success. The Russian swept the junior ladies at World juniors in 1996 and 1998 and none of those skaters made an impact on the senior level.

On the other hand, Meissner and Katy Taylor, second and third in 2004, won the World and Four Continents titles in 2006.

### U.S. dominates competition

It was a good thing organizers of the Junior Grand Prix Final had extra U.S. flags around.

They received a lot of use.

So did the recording of the Star-Spangled Banner, which was played four consecutive times at the victory ceremonies. And the announcer probably got bored introducing skaters "...of the United States," which she announced no fewer than 68 times during the competition between introducing the skaters for warm-ups and before they headed out on the ice.

With Caroline Zhang, Stephen Carriere, Keauna McLaughlin and Rockne Brubaker and Madison and Keiffer Hubbell, it was U.S.A. all the way.


Four victories, nine medals and the first sweep of gold by any country at the final since the series started in 1997-98.

Zhang led the ladies' sweep of the top four positions. After her 50-point victory at the Mexico City

event in September, it was a matter of how many points she would win by here. It was 20. She scored 162.68 points with Ashley Wagner next at 142.01 and Oster third with 135.73. Melissa Bulanhagui of the U.S. placed fourth.

Carriere led the U.S. men's cause, winning the gold medal with a score of 188.13. Brandon Mroz captured the silver with a mark of 168.06.

In his free skate, Carriere put an end to the drama with a superb effort. His program included a triple Axel and toe loops, with one and two arms over the head.

"After Budapest (in August) I came back and said, 'Let's do something different,' and I decided to do two arms over the head on the double toe and my coaches said, 'That looks good and let's do that," Carriere said.

McLaughlin and Brubaker had a few mistakes in their routines but still remained unbeaten in their first season together, scoring 146.61 points.

"We've obviously been doing better longs," Brubaker said. "We didn't have a big mistake, just some little ones. We held back a little bit, but at the same time I feel it was a big step," Brubaker said of their routine to different versions of music from "Romeo and Juliet."

Jessica Rose Paetsch and Jon Nuss came in as the least experienced of any of the American pairs and wound up with a

"To come in here and to compete against some of the senior level teams of our country and to medal is definitely exciting,"

Russian couple Ksenia Kresnilnikova and Konstantin Bezmaternikh placed second, the only non-Americans in the top two in any of the events.

The Hubbells and second-placed Emily Samuelson and Evan Bates are both coached by Iouri Tschesnitchenko and Iaroslava Netchaeva.

They agree to a certain extent.

"I think it is the hard work that pays off and the desire to provide the best we can for our skaters," Netchaeva said. "They happen to work hard and that is what makes the winning combination."

After a tight compulsory and original dance, in which the top three were separated by less than a point, the Hubbells broke it open with a Latin dance which included a serpentine step sequence, the only couple to show it at this level.

They scored 154.15 to Samuelson and Bates' 151.98.

### **IGP Notebook**

Doug Williams was the team leader of the largest international contingent in U.S. Figure Skating history, which posed some special problems in dealing with the five men, five ladies, five pairs and two dance teams.

"There are 24 people," Williams said. "The logistics of getting organized, of getting everybody here, to get all their coaches and their families, makes it an even larger task. You start with 24 and by the time we were finished we had 64 people.

"Before I left home I made sure I had enough food for 24 people. Enough breakfast

bars, snack bars. I carry my goody bag everywhere I go, which has everything from Kleenex to screwdrivers, aspirin and everything else." But there are unexpected things. One flight was diverted to Belgrade and required a 10-hour bus ride to Sofia, which arrived early in the morning.

He said the International Skating Union kept him informed of the comings and goings.

There are also the little things.

"The one that I was least prepared for was Stephen Carriere. For his short program, he brought the wrong pants. The shirt was supposed to snap on but he needed a safety pin. I only had one so I had to do some digging and searching for other ones. It took a while. That caught me off guard. I had the sewing kit though."

A few hours after he won the men's title, Stephen Carriere was showing another talent - as tour guide of Sofia.

He had been there before, so in a car back to hotel from the rink after doping control, he pointed out the sights of Sofia ...well some of them.

"Over there is the restaurant where we had the team dinner last year," Carriere said. "And then we walked around and we found this place for coffee. We found out it was the place to see and be seen."

His skating improved too from the previous visit, when he finished first in a Junior Grand Prix event there last year.

"This year, I knew about it. I've been to Bulgaria before," Carriere said.

He also benefited from a sixth at the Junior Grand Prix Final last season.

"Last year, I had no experience in a Junior Grand Prix Final," he said. "I didn't know what it was like going into it, so I was glad I was able to improve my position."

### Juveniles, intermediate skaters take center stage in Cleveland

ight champions were crowned at the 2007 U.S. Junior Championships, the marquee event of the season for juvenile- and intermediate-level skaters. More than 370 U.S. figure skaters showcased their skills during the competition, held at Ice-

### Intermediate ladies

Land USA in Cleveland, Nov. 29-Dec. 2.

Gretchen Donlan improved upon her fifth-place finish last year on the juvenile level by winning the intermediate title with a score of 102.36.

The 2007 New England Regional intermediate champion used her flow and superior grace to capture the short program, edging clubmate Bryna Oi and DuPage SC's Agnes Zawadzki.


Donlan, a member of the Skating Club of Boston, rebounded from a fourth-place finish in her qualifying group (points do not carry over), and her lyrical movements overcame the fact she only had a single Axel. Her straight line step sequence to end the program was given a level three, and she received three +2 grades of execution (GOE).

"Today I skated well," Donlan said after the short program. "I wasn't as scared as I was yesterday, and I didn't do well. I was kind of afraid of the ice."

Donlan's soft skating style can be attributed in part to ballet training and the skills of her coaches, she said.

"Mark (Mitchell) is really talented in that field," Donlan said.

In her free skate, Donlan started slow but rallied to place second behind Zawadzki.

"It was not a perfect skate because I was a little shaky in the beginning, but I felt better as I went on," Donlan said. "I feel fortunate to have won, and I can't wait to see everyone again at all the competitions next year."

Entering the event, Donlan said she didn't think she had enough firepower in her routines to win.

"I didn't have a double Axel or any triples in my program," she said. "I knew that I had to skate my best and stay focused to do well."

Donlan will move up to novice next year.

"I'm looking forward to training really hard to get the more difficult jumps," she said. "I am lucky I have great coaches and a supportive family to help me train."

Zawadzki, who rallied to win the silver medal, said she didn't feel any pressure during the competition en route to her personal-best score.

"It was a great experience for me," Zawadski said. "I had lots of fun. I wasn't very nervous. I just did my thing and see what would happen."

### Intermediate men

Seventh-grader David Wang returned to his school in Lake Arrowhead, Calif., a bit of a celebrity after his classmates found out he'd won the intermediate title.

A pair of second-place finishes in the short program and free skate elevated Wang (All Year FSC) to the title.

"It was in the Mountain News, and a lot of people read about it," said Wang, who last year

finished fourth in the juvenile division.

Dane Carter (North Atlantic FSC) finished with the silver medal, winning the short program and placing third in the free skate. Joshua Santillan (All Year FSC) rallied from a ninth-place finish in the short program to win the free skate and secure a bronze medal.

Wang, a student of U.S. Figure Skating Developmental Coach of the Year Tammy Gambill, said he was "pretty confident going in, but a little surprised" at how well he did. Wang finished with a score of 109.12, three points ahead of Carter.

"We have been putting a lot of time into my jump techniques to make them more consistent and so the quality would be better," he said. "And we've spent time working on my levels with my spins and footwork to make those more secure."

Wang, who trains three hours a day in Riverside, Calif., will likely move up to the novice class next year, he said.

"I want to train hard this year, so next year in novice I can make nationals," he said.

Carter, meanwhile, rose above the rest during a short program that earned him 37.33 points. Wang followed with a mark of 36.66, with John McKenna (Colonial FSC) in third at 35.83. Reigning juvenile champion Joshua Farris placed fourth with a score of 35.12. Only 10 points separated the first skater from the last.

Success might have seemed to be a long time coming for Carter, 16, who failed to make the final round in his last two appearances at the U.S. Junior Championships. But it was well worth the wait.

"[It feels] really great," Carter said. "I think I did pretty well. There was one only one small error."

That small error might have been only no-

ticed by Carter himself. He tacked on a double toe to his combination instead of his planned double loop.

What's unique about Carter is a problem skaters around the world wish they had: he doesn't get nervous. His secret?

"No secret," he said with a shrug, as his parents nodded their heads. "I just don't get nervous."

Free skate winner Santillan said after making a mistake in his short program, he was able to block those thoughts and focus on his free skate.

"I knew in the new judging system that if I gained enough points, I would be able to climb in the rankings," said Santillan, who featured three triples, two toe loops and one Salchow in his free skate.

### Intermediate pairs

Cassie Andrews and Nicholas Anderson made it two for two in U.S. title runs, winning the intermediate pairs title.


Andrews and Anderson (Indiana World Skating Academy FSC) claimed the juvenile title last year and scored 62.46 points this year to edge silver medalists Jessica Schilkey and Daniel Palmeri.

"We did our best," Anderson said, adding that he and Andrews weren't too nervous as the final pairs skated. "It didn't matter what happened after we skated because we knew we did the best we could."

The pair recorded the highest technical element score, landing side-by-side double flips, a throw double flip, a side-by-side double Salchowdouble toe combination and a throw double loop. They earned a level four for their side-by-side combination spin.

Next year it's on to novice for Andrews and

Anderson, and, with it, tougher elements.

"More difficult lifts, jumps and then triple throws," Anderson said.

Although Schilkey (Port Huron FSC) and Palmeri (Onyx-Suburban Skating Academy) had the second-highest technical score (26.90), they shined in program components (33.12). Their confident lifts and smooth skating helped overcome a few bobbles in the program. They also included two throws - a loop and Salchow - and received positive GOEs on their double Lutz-double flip sequence.

Schilkey and Palmeri also skate singles, so it's not surprising their jumps are strong. Palmeri was happy they won a medal despite the slight errors.

We were a little trippy today," he said. "It was nice the judges noticed our strong points even though we weren't at our best."

Unlike Andrews and Anderson, however, Palmeri said he couldn't really watch the rest of the field after their early performance.

"It was definitely nerve racking to be on top," Palmeri said, referring to their spot on the leaderboard for the first half of the competition. "But I couldn't watch. I kept coming out and checking to see if we were still up there."

The team competed as juveniles two years ago but then took a year off from pairs to focus on their singles skating. They plan to continue skating both disciplines.

Skating last, the Peninsula Skating Club's Taylor Hermerding and James MaMoody snuck in for the bronze medal with 49.60 points.

They landed side-by-side double Salchows, an Axel-double toe sequence and a throw double Salchow.

Jennifer Tingley and Michael Donovan (Jamestown SC) finished fourth landing a double Lutz-double toe sequence and receiving a level four on their combination spin.

### Intermediate ice dancing

Una Donegan and Andrew Korda (SC of Boston) won both compulsory dances and placed second in the free dance to emerge with the title.

Their score of 99.01 bested silver medalists Kate McDermott and Colin McManus (SC of Boston), who placed third in both compulsory dances and won the free dance to finish at 96.65.

Kassandra Hazard and Benjamin Nykiel (Bowie FSC) won the bronze medal, finishing with a mark of 93.62. Fourth place went to Lauren Ely and Travis Mager (Columbia FSC) with 89.06 points.

"This feels unreal," Donegan said. "Going into it, our goal was to make the podium, but to have been standing on the top at the end of the week is the greatest feeling ever."

Korda echoed his partner's sentiments.

"Going into the event, we knew we had strong compulsories, and after executing what felt like two effortless dances, we felt really good about our placement," Korda said. "Also, after skating the European (Waltz), where we were the last to skate, and

hearing that we had won, gave us a huge confidence boost going into the Foxtrot."

Still, Donegan and Korda knew they had to deliver a solid free dance to win the gold. And they did just that.

"It was actually the first time all season we competed a free dance without any costly errors," Donegan said. "Overcoming this gave us both a renewed sense of confidence, which had been the missing link all season. Having the lead after the compulsories took away some of the nerves and helped us relax into our skating for the free dance."

Last year, the pair finished ninth in the qualifying round.

McDermott and McManus, last year's juvenile champions, had only one negative grade of execution in their sparkling free dance. They received level fours on three elements - rotational lift, curve lift and twizzle sequence (which also collected three +2 GOEs).

### Juvenile girls

It was the squeal heard round the world - well, at least around the rink - and it came from one of the youngest and tiniest competitors skating at the competition.

Nine-year-old Nina Jiang (Texas Gulf Coast FSC) won the juvenile girls title with a spunky program set to music from "Beauty and the Beast," and, with it, she won everyone's hearts as well.

She scored 13 points more than she did while finishing second in the qualifying round. Her coach, Shanyn Vallon, said Jiang wasn't happy about some of her levels after the qualifying skate and was determined to improve and "finish everything."

Jiang said, "I was careful to get all my rockers."

His score of 70.10 was more than seven points higher than that of silver medalist Yasmin Sirai (SC of Boston). Jiang opened with an Ina Bauer into a single Axel, and followed that with a double Axel, double flip-double loop, double Lutz-double toedouble loop combination (although her foot hit the boards on the final jump), a double Salchow-double toe and a final double Lutz. Of course, she carried a smile from the moment she hit the double Axel.

With all that she can do on the ice, it's easy to forget that, off the ice, she's just a little girl, as evidenced by her answer to the question, "What's your favorite part of skating?"

"I like to fly... I like to do the Tinkerbells," she said, giggling.

Tinkerbells? That's what she calls working on the harness with Vallon. But working on the harness is only a reward. To get to fly, she must first do three double Axels in a row in practice.

Siraj, who beat Jiang in the qualifying round, scored 62.84 points with a quick program to "Istanbul (Not Constantinople)." The 10-year-old from Brookline, Mass., is part of the Mitchell-Johansson camp and has excellent overall skating skills. Her spins were well centered, and she showed off her flexibility with Biellmann positions in her spins.

"I was more nervous yesterday," Siraj said. "I just was not as nervous today because I knew I could do it."

Third place went to Viviana Mathis (SC of New York), a fireball decked out in a magenta dress. She was the early leader with 61.57 points, and that held up for the bronze medal. She hit a double flipdouble loop, double Lutz-single toe, two double Axels, a solo double flip and a double Salchow.

Shannon Brakke (Rochester FSC) was fourth with 58.95 points. She also landed a pair of double Axels (one in combination with a single toe) and hit a double Lutz-double toe combination.

### **Juvenile** boys

Jason Brown (Skokie Valley SC) changed his mantra right before the U.S. Junior Championships from "Confidence beats fear" to "Preparation beats fear."

So, when he took the practice ice at IceLand USA, Brown and his coach, Kori Ade, simulated the exact situations he would encounter during the championships.

The result was a personal-best program and a gold medal for the 11-year-old from Highland Park, Ill.

Brown, who didn't make the final round last year at the U.S. Junior Championships, finished eight points ahead of silver medalist Jay Yostanto (All Year FSC).

Both skaters won their respective qualifying rounds and elevated their performances in the final. Brown executed his program to the tune of 71.26 points, while Yostanto tallied 63.58 points.

Troy Tomasello (Strongville SC) secured the bronze medal with a score of 56.67. Edward Tea (Tri-Cites FSC) was fourth with 54.65 points.

"I skated as I had planned," said Brown, who will advance to the intermediate level next season. "Kory choreographed the program to the new judging system this year, before they started using it (for the juvenile level)."

That choreography served him well, as he was one of only three skaters in the final to earn at least level threes on three separate elements. He credited his two double Axels as keys to victory, however.

Ade, who has coached Brown for six years, said her prized student has a lot of natural talent and, with age and maturity, is realizing his full potential.

During the week before the U.S. Junior Championships, Ade mimicked everything that Brown would encounter. Once she told him that he was about to have his six-minute warm-up, but first he must tie his boots in one minute.

"We really decided he couldn't have been more prepared," Ade said.

Also, Brown spent time between the regional championships and the U.S. Junior Championships working on his triple jumps. That served Brown well at the competition, where he had to land his double Axels, his coach said.

"I think that's what led him to believe he

could land those double Axels, because they don't feel like they are the hardest tricks in his repertoire any more," Ade said.

Yostanto opened with a double Lutz-double toe and went on to land seven more double jumps. He earned a level three on his sit spin. Tomasello also landed nine double jumps.

### Juvenile pairs

The brother-sister tandem of Carly Powers and David Powers left IceLand USA as champions, edging silver medalists Kylie Duarte and Colin Grafton, 56.59-54.12.

Powers and Powers (Indiana World Skating Academy FSC) and Duarte and Grafton (Smithfield FSC) each won their respective qualifying rounds.

Rebecca Du and Steven Evans (Dallas FSC) claimed the bronze medal, and Brigitte Alanis and Chadwick Phillips (Los Angeles FSC) finished

Last year, Powers and Powers finished sixth at the U.S. Junior Championships, while Duarte and Grafton ended up fifth.

Powers' coach, Serguei Zaitsev, who also coaches the intermediate champions, said Carly and David's rise to the top was the result of hard work, effort and the desire to succeed.

"Because they had skated another year together at the same level, I felt they would be on the podium," said Zaitsev, who has been coaching the pair for four years. "They had been working really hard and smart, so I thought they could accomplish this."

One of the elements that put the tandem over the top was their inside forward death spiral, which graded out as a level three and received a +2 grade of execution.

Next year, Zaitsev will move the pair to the intermediate level.

"Hopefully we can return (to the U.S. Junior Championships) next year and present some interesting programs to watch," Zaitsev said.

Carly Powers said it was great to have all of their hard work pay off. Continued improvement and high competition finishes are goals moving forward.

Duarte and Grafton hit side-by-side double flips and earned a level three for their straightline step sequence. They ended the program with a difficult double Lutz-double toe combination.

"I thought we skated really well," Duarte said, "especially in the qualifying round. I tried to smile, perform my best and have fun. I love to skate with Colin. He's an amazing person and I always want to do my best for him."

Du and Evans had a double Lutz-double flip sequence, a throw Axel and a throw loop.

### Juvenile ice dancing

Joyyln Yang and Jean-Luc Baker swept both compulsory dances and the free dance en route to the juvenile title.

Yang and Baker (Palomares FSC) finished a little more than one point ahead of Elicia Reynolds and Stephen Reynolds (Tampa Bay SC), who claimed the silver medal, placing second in each of the three dances.

Laura Perry and Joshua Leggett (Detroit SC) took the bronze medal, and MacKenzie Reid and Christian Erwin (Wisconsin FSC) were fourth.

"We were surprised and excited at the same time," said Yang, who has been skating with Baker for just five months.

Last year, Yang worked on her international dances after receiving her gold test medal and competed in the pre-juvenile division. Baker, meanwhile, skated with a different partner at the U.S. Junior Championships and placed 10th in the qualifying round.

What a difference a year makes.

The pair credited their second and last lift of their free dance as an element that helped them gain the title.

"Jean-Luc is in a 90-degree spread eagle position with me positioned horizontally, laying on my front across his legs," Yang said.

The young tandem, whose idols are World champions Albena Denkova and Maxim Staviski of Bulgaria, Tanith Belbin and Ben Agosto, and Meryl Davis and Charlie White, plan to continue training and competing in future events.

- Learn respect for others

Success is the easily measured distance between your origin and your final achievement. Athletic participation and competition in figure skating allows your child the opportunity to develop and excel. 

# Secrets of success:

## Building a synchronized skating program

ith approximately 4,500 athletes on 280 synchronized teams slated to compete this month at the Eastern, Midwestern and Pacific Coast Synchronized Team Skating

Sectional Championships, the discipline of synchronized skating is becoming a staple of U.S. Figure Skating member clubs around the country.

Every team has its story. Some teams thrive and grow from the beginning. There are the programs that have grown steadily over the years and come to be fixtures on the competition landscape (think Chicago Jazz, the Colonials, Crystallettes, Team Elan and Hayden organizations). Then there are those that struggle each year to put their teams on the ice.

This fall 67 synchronized skating programs representing 168 teams, 2,695 athletes and 193 coaches in 22 different states completed surveys for U.S. Figure Skating. These surveys provided information on the structure of their programs, including their perceived success.

Overall, the results were encouraging. Fifty-two percent of teams reported that their programs were steady, meaning that they retained at least 70 percent of their athletes from year to year and replaced those skaters with new ones. An additional 25 percent reported that their programs were growing, while 16 percent of teams said that they were struggling to maintain their membership.

### Building a team what matters and what doesn't

No one ever said that building a synchronized skating program was supposed to be easy. In fact, "Building membership from the beginning is just plain hard," said Rebecca Stump, chair of the Professional Skaters Association (PSA) Synchronized Skating Committee.

Stump should know. Five years ago she started the Team Boston synchronized organization and had only one skater come to the first practice. Five seasons later, the organization will field three teams - pre-juvenile, novice and junior - at the 2007 Eastern Synchronized Skating Championships.

"I think the most important thing we did was use positive public relations," Stump said. "We treated



anybody with the slightest bit of interest in a very friendly manner. As a coach, I was willing to take anyone and train them to skate. I realized that to make it work, I needed to point out the positive contribution each individual brought to the team. I acknowledged a weak skater who had great team spirit or how helpful a stronger skater was to a struggling teammate. Surprisingly, this was the bond that kept the diverse group of skaters together."

In addition, the team, including Stump, volunteered to help with other club activities and even volunteered to teach Basic Skills synchronized skating classes for free. The organization continues to do all of these things.

What is exciting is that every program has potential. In comparing programs that were struggling with programs that were growing, the geographic location and size of the club were virtual non-factors.

There were growing teams from large clubs where the synchronized athletes made up less than 10 percent of the total membership, just as there were growing teams from small clubs who were actually increasing their club membership by attracting new synchronized skaters.

There were teams in rural areas, including several in the Pacific Coast section, that reported growing their membership in addition to having strong retention. There were struggling teams in these same areas. There were also growing and struggling teams in large metropolitan areas on the East Coast and the typical Midwestern "hot beds" of synchronized skating.

It comes down to being positive, motivated and determined, and understanding the advantages and disadvantages in your own area. How can you make this work for you?

Clubs in small towns have the advantage of fewer competing programs, and can build a program to meet the needs and goals of their own members. They also have the advantage of a small community atmosphere and can earn community support and local publicity.

Programs in larger metropolitan areas need to find their niche, too. With a large base of skaters comes the reality that these same skaters have more opportunities - more rinks and coaches to choose from, and more competitive opportunities not only in synchronized skating but in the other disciplines as well.

In either case, it is important that the leadership of the program constantly put themselves in the position of the athlete or parent asking the question, "Why should I skate for you?" Think about your program. Why would an athlete want to skate for you? Can you easily answer it? What sets your program apart, and what does an athlete stand to gain if he or she joins your team? When marketing your program and developing your strategic plan, you should constantly be promoting the positive aspects of your program and making sure that you are delivering on them.

### Success secrets

The two most important ingredients to developing a long-term successful program are 1) organizational leadership and 2) enabling the athletes to feel that they have a place to which to move up and continue being successful as they get older and improve

Overall, only 31 percent of programs had the position of director of synchronized skating. However, 47 percent of programs that were growing had an individual in that role, while only 18 percent of programs that were struggling did. A director of synchronized skating is an important and integral part of an organization, and his or her job description matters. This individual can be salaried, paid by the hour, volunteer or have the position tied into a head coaching position.

The director of synchronized skating should be held accountable for the success or failure of the program. At the same time, he or she should be empowered by the club, parents and others involved to make important decisions for the program.

His or her primary responsibility should be setting the strategic plan for the program and developing longterm goals and a road map to reach them. He or she should be responsible for the parents' education pro-

gram, overseeing the development of the coaching staff and managing the budget, and organization poli-

The job description for directors of struggling programs listed such key roles as "organizing the skater contracts," "ordering the dresses," "organizing paperwork" and "recruiting skaters." The directors of successful, growing programs reported duties such as "setting the program's strategy for increasing participation," "overseeing continuing education of the coaching staff," "setting athlete standards" and "overseeing the skill progression of the athletes as they move from level to level."

A director can and should be responsible for administrative tasks, but this should be in addition to, not instead of, much more crucial planning and strategy decisions such as grassroots development, setting athlete standards and developing the coaching staff.

"I had a five-year plan when I started Team Boston," Stump said. "By the end of the five years I wanted to have in place a grassroots feeder program, multiple teams and a team that advanced to the U.S. Synchronized Skating Championships. It was hard, and we had several stumbling blocks along the way, but I always kept sight of that goal and worked through the obstacles."

Five years after the lone skater showed up for practice, the organization achieved the final goal of their five-year plan.

Trying to run a synchronized skating organization without a director or a business plan is similar to trying to run a small business without a manager. It has a chance at success, but with a strong leader, direction and someone accountable for a business plan, it is much more likely to grow and become a permanent fixture on "Main Street."

### The coaching staff

The coach is the most critical individual in a synchronized skating organization. A great deal of an athlete's experience is determined by their coach. He or she designs the program, manages practice sessions, leads the athletes through competitions and sets the tone for the attitude of the team.

Coaches are professionals. They deserve to be treated as professionals, and they have a responsibility to deliver the tools their athletes need to reach their potential. They should have experience, be members of the PSA, and be participating in continuing education programs.

U.S. Figure Skating provides numerous tools for coaches to learn what is expected of them and to stay on top of the sport, most of which are available on U.S. Figure Skating Online. Seeking information as often as possible is a sign of a coach who is striving to provide his or her athletes will all of the possible advantages. Of programs that were growing, 65 percent of the coaches reported going to the U.S. Figure Skating's synchronized skating coaches' page daily, while 65 percent of coaches in struggling programs reported using this resource monthly, occasionally, rarely or never. If the coach is not motivated enough to seek out crucial information, he or she is selling the athletes short. It would be no surprise if these skaters became disillusioned, sought another program or left the sport all together.

### Making progress

Athletes need and want to feel like they are making progress and moving forward. This doesn't necessarily meaning winning medals - it means there always needs to be something for which to reach and achieve.

One of the biggest mistakes an organization can make is to "get comfortable" and allow the team or the athletes to sit in one level. While placing well at a competition is a great short-term reward and motivator, through the years skaters are going to need more than that.

There are 15 levels in synchronized skating, and the well-balanced programs, music length, skill and age requirements are carefully designed to allow fluid progression through the system. For example, the beginner level is designed to teach Basic Skills skaters the skills of the five basic elements and to serve as a stepping stone to preliminary or pre-juvenile. Juvenile is a stepping stone to learn the skills to be successful at intermediate, and so on.

In singles skating, a coach and athlete look ahead and create goals as to how they will progress through the levels.

Regardless of where a program is located, there must be opportunities for athletes to progress and move through the pipeline. There are several different paths a skating director can take. In a small program, it might mean creating a two- or three-year plan for a team to move up together - perhaps a pre-juvenile team can set its sights on competing intermediate two seasons from now. The coach could help them understand what needs to be done, give them markers and keep them motivated. When they reach that level, even if they don't win, they've achieved a huge goal. And, at the same time, the coach could be developing a beginner team that will start moving up the ladder as well.


Larger organizations can strive to build several teams so that different athletes can move up the ranks within the club, and do it at their own pace. Still another option is for multiple clubs to partner, fielding teams at various levels and encouraging athletes to move between them as their skills allow.

Regardless of the avenue to get there, a path to achievement and continued success is essential for athlete retention. The coach and skating director must be aware of this and guide athletes through the path. If there isn't a plan in place, skaters will leave on their own for better opportunities, or even leave the sport altogether.

As your team enters the competitive season, take some time to evaluate your program - what you are doing well, and what can be improved for next season.






Pizzo has learned a few things about himself in six years of skating. His biggest competitive challenge is controlling nerves and maintaining confidence to perform his best.


"I was so grateful when my doctor gave me the OK to get back on the ice." she said.

"I love that at any level you can skate beautifully with passion and grace." Schucker said.


Schucker's first real challenge came during her first competition when her coach called from Siberia where he was caring for his mother. Schucker's dance coach and fellow adult skaters lent support.


"I am honored to work with some of the most inspiring and motivating coaches," Schucker said.





When your music starts do you focus more on the jumps, or on your choreography?







n recognition of the 45th anniversary of the tragic plane crash that claimed the lives of the 1961 U.S. World Figure Skating Team, SKATING magazine launched a year-long series last spring profiling each member of the team. This is the series' final installment. In this issue, the team's family members who also perished in the Feb. 15, 1961 crash - Ann Campbell, Louisa Hartshorne, Nathalie Kelley, Richard LeMaire, James Scholdan and Sharon Westerfeld - are remembered with biographies provided by Nikki Nichols, author of Frozen in Time: The Enduring Legacy of the 1961 U.S. Figure Skating Team.



Campbell, 52, of Los Angeles, was the mother of ice dancer Roger Campbell and wife of Albert Campbell. She was a former ice dancer, who helped William Kipp coach her son and his partner, Dona Lee Carrier, to a silver medal at the U.S. Championships in 1961.

### Louisa Hartshorne

Hartshorne, 52, was the wife of longtime judge and official Harold Hartshorne. He was scheduled to judge the 1961 World Championships in Prague, and decided to bring his wife to they could enjoy Europe together.

### Nathalie Kelley

Dr. and Mrs. Vincent Kelly sent Nathalie from Boston to Colorado Springs, Colo., to chaperone her little brother, Gregory, who was a silver medalist at the 1961 U.S. Championships. She took a leave of absence from her job as a science teacher to help Gregory realize his dreams. At her parents' request, she boarded the plane to Prague to keep an eye on her brother. She had been a competitive skater in her teens, and was the eldest of six children.

### Richard "Dickie" LeMaire

LeMaire, 13, of Rye, N.Y., had just recovered from a bout with osteomyelitis and was going to Europe with his dad, judge Edward LeMaire, for the educational value. His great passion was rooting for the Yale football team.

### James Scholdan

Scholdan, 12, of Colorado Springs, Colo., was the son of Broadmoor Figure Skating Club coach Edi Scholdan, and brother of Ruth Scholdan.


### Sharon Westerfeld



# Mr. Edge

t is time to start another fun and exciting This is my sixth year of writing the "Ask Mr. Edge" column, and as is custom at the beginning of each year, I would like to thank you for making this happen. Without your readership, none of this is possible.

Next, I'd like to thank everyone who attended my seminars at the U.S. Junior Championships last month. I hope everyone enjoyed hearing what I had to say. I felt many - if not all - who attended came away with more knowledge than they had before the seminars.

difference between skating pain free or any of the fol-

- Blisters, pain and/or swelling of the ankle bones
- Blisters, pain and/or swelling of extra bone in the foot, called the navicular
- Difficulty with edges, especially outside
- Cramping in the arches
- Pain under the balls of the feet

Trying to correct this by using an arch cookie is sometimes not enough. It may also require the use of some sort of heel wedge, or even an orthotic. I find in most cases a combination of using a heel wedge

> with an arch cookie works best (except in more severe cases). I like placing the heel wedge under the insole and the arch cookie over the insole. Of course, they must be glued down so they won't slip out of place.

> If nothing else, remember this: if your feet are in a neutral position, the rest of your body will be, too. Straighten out your feet, and your knees, hips and back will follow suit, provided there are no other medical issues which may already be altering your body posture. Now it's time for "show and tell."

In taking a look at the picture of the feet, you will notice on the right foot,

just below the ankle bone, the navicular bone protruding. Also, notice that it is worse on the right. When placing the foot in a more neutral position, the navicular bone will be less protruding, as in the left foot. By remaining in a neutral position, you can reduce or even eliminate any chance of blistering or swelling around this area of the foot, while skating more comfortably. On a scale of 1-10, with 10 being the worst severe case of pronation, I would say the right foot is about a 5. If you want to know what a 10 looks like, just imagine someone literally walking on their ankle bones.

It's time to once again say goodbye. Have a great skate and good luck to everyone at the U.S. Championships.






