

#### LETTER from the EDITOR

# Record crowds, great skating make for memorable U.S. Championships

On most days skaters toil in a relatively empty arena, trying to perfect their Lutzes. Axels and artistry for a program they hope to put out in front of a large, appreciative audience.

It's hard, detail-demanding work that goes unnoticed except for the

coaches, parents and club mates who support their skating dreams on a daily basis.

At the 2007 State Farm U.S. Championships in Spokane. Wash., the top novice, junior and senior skaters in the land got the chance to experience that adrenalin rush that comes with performing in front a sold-out arena.

For those few minutes on the ice in Spokane, skaters forgot about those cold, early-morning practices, and basked in the applause of each well-executed jump, lift and spin.

Without a doubt, the U.S. Championships in Spokane will go down in the history books as one of the best in the event's 88-year history. Many of the longtime media types and skating aficionados did nothing but rave about the way Spokane stepped up and supported the event, and how the skaters consistently delivered the goods on the ice.

U.S. Figure Skating President Ron Hershberger greeted reporters one day during the weeklong event, grinning from ear to ear.

"This has been an enormously welcoming city from the moment we arrived," Hershberger said. "Everything has been perfect. The community spirit and involvement have been tremendous."

When Hershberger showed up for the novice compulsory dance early in the week and witnessed a packed house of more than 4,000 fans at the Convention Center arena, he realized then that these U.S. Championships were going to be something special. And he was so right.

A U.S. Championships' record 154,893 fans walked through the turnstiles during the weeklong event, shattering the previous record of 125,345 set in Los Angeles in 2002.

Their unbridled enthusiasm was apparent from the moment the national anthem ended and the first skater glided onto the ice.

"The fans were amazing," ladies champion Kimmie Meissner said. "However you started off your program, you could always finish strong because the crowd pushed you."

Like Meissner, men's champion Evan Lysacek couldn't say enough about the way Spokane supported the skaters.

"It was bigger than skating or gold medals or silver medals or bronze medals," Lysacek said. "It helped us as a sport to move forward."

Arguably the top highlight of the event came on the final night of competition when Lysacek produced one of the most memorable free skates in U.S. Championships history. His opening guad toe-combination set the tone for a magical "Carmen" program that finished with 10,000 people on their feet cheering, and Lysacek on his knees, face in his hands, immersed the moment.

Alissa Czisny's personal-best free skate also made my highlight reel. Her signature spins and spirals left the crowd cheering for more. After Czisny landed a triple Lutz toward the end of her program, her coach, Julie Berlin, erupted with joy.

"It was the greatest coaching moment of my life." Berlin said.

It was also great to watch the relatively unknown pairs team of Brooke Castile and Ben Okolski win a title, and Ryan Bradley finally make it to the medal stand after six years of finishing between sixth

The novice and juniors didn't disappoint either. The show put on by junior ladies Caroline Zhang and Mirai Nagasu demonstrated that the future of U.S. Figure Skating is a bright one.

With this year's competition in the books, it's now time to look ahead to Saint, Paul, Minn, and the crowds that await to cheer on skaters at the 2008 U.S Championships.

official publication of the NGB had just published a piece predicting the outcome of the event?

If you want to have the expert writers take us "down memory lane," that's fine. If the writers want to make their own predictions in their own publications, that's fine as well. But for the official publication of the host organization to publish these is out of line.



# College suiting Goebel just fine


When 2001 U.S. men's champion, 2002 Olympic bronze medalist and two-time World silver medalist Timothy Goebel enrolled at Columbia University School of General Studies last fall, he wanted to just blend in.

"For the most part, I've been able to do that," he said.

Now in his second semester, Goebel, 26, loves life in New York.

"I hate driving," he said. "With the subway, even though it's dead time, I can get stuff done, like reading. I don't ever have to drive anywhere, which I love. I walk to school. Everything is so convenient. I'm really happy here."

This semester he's taking economics, calculus, Russian and a required music course. He plans

on majoring in math, which he expects to be incredibly challenging but will ultimately make it easier for him to find a job. Although he'd previously taken courses at Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland and Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles, his first semester at Columbia was stressful.

"The first month I lost like seven or eight pounds," Goebel said. "I would forget to eat. Now I look like a little kid with a lunchbox. I bring little snacks and stuff for the day."

Columbia has a beautiful gym on campus, and he works out almost every day.

"I'm in pretty good shape," he said. "I don't do cardio anymore because it's boring, and I don't have to. I do more upper body weightlifting than I used to, so I don't have skinny arms anymore, which is kind of nice."

Once a week he teaches at Riverbank State Park in Harlem - just north of the Columbia campus – for Figure Skating in Harlem. After making appearances with the group over the past couple of years, he enjoys working with the girls on a regular basis.

"It's a really good program and the kids are great," he said. "They really, really want to be there.'

He also quest coaches with some of his friends in the area and will probably be doing more coaching in the coming months. Although he's been trained as a technical specialist, he passed on working regionals and sectionals this year, preferring to focus on school. By next season, he will probably be ready to take on some competitions.

Goebel admits he misses training and competing, "competing probably more than training. I really did like to compete. And I miss a lot of the people."

He is glad that Brian Joubert of France has equaled his accomplishment of three quadruple jumps in a program.

"I respect the people who are going out and going after the stuff," he said. "The whole point of sport is to be doing more, not less. If you're not doing a quad, it's not a senior program.

"I did triple Lutz-triple toe to win junior when I was 15. I understand with program components it's a whole different ballgame now, but that was stuff my generation - me. Alexei Yagudin, Evgeni Plushenko and Takeshi Honda - was doing when we were 14 and 15 in juniors. Now that's acceptable in a senior Grand Prix. I don't think that part is moving in the right direction."

One thing is sure: Goebel does not intend to return to challenge the current stars of the sport.

"I had a good run," he said, "and I'm glad to have moved on."

The senior championships will air March 11 at 7 p.m., with a second air date of March 17 at noon.



# Cream rises

### Meissner, Lysacek rally for gold at Four Continents

he best international lineup of skaters in the history of the ISU Four Continents Figure Skating Championships converged on Colorado Springs, Colo., Feb. 7-10. In such a strong field, the United States held its own, winning half of the 12 available medals at the event, including gold in ladies and men.

#### LADIES

A disappointing short program finish was all the motivation Kimmie Meissner needed when she took the ice for the ladies free

World and U.S. champion Kimmie Meissner rallied from a disappointing short program to win her first Four Continents Championships title.

The reigning U.S. champion regrouped nicely in front of an enthusiastic crowd to overtake the 24-woman field and claim the title with a score of 172.75 points. U.S. silver medalist Emily Hughes placed second, and Canada's Joannie Rochette earned the bronze.

U.S. men's champion Evan Lysacek hit his opening quad-toe combination again during his free skate en route to the Four Continents Championships crown.

In the short program, Meissner fell on her triple Lutz-triple toe combination and also had trouble with her layback spin. Those mistakes landed her in sixth place, a little more than four points behind short program leader Rochette.

Meissner connected on the opening triple Lutz-triple toe in her "Galicie Flamenco" free skate and finished her program in strong fashion, her only stumble coming during the third of 13 elements, when she popped the front end of a triple flip-triple toe combina-

"I was pretty disappointed with myself after the short because I do train so much every day," Meissner said. "I know I have that jump (Lutz). I can do it in my sleep. It really makes me mad when I miss something that to me is really easy. I guess I was a little angry at myself."

Hughes took the lead momentarily with a score of 166.60 after turning in a personal-best free skate.

Performing to music from the ballet "Sylvia," Hughes skated well despite leaving her first two combination jumps on the shelf. She later tacked on a double toe-triple toe.

"This is the first time I'm going out there and doing all the triples," Hughes said. "Even though I didn't do some combinations, I'm really happy about getting my personal best, which is always a goal of mine. I'm hoping to build on that for Worlds."

Rochette, 21, popped both of her triple Lutzes in an otherwise strong free skate. The reigning three-time Canadian champion finished with a total of 165.90 points.

Alissa Czisny came in fifth.

#### MEN

U.S. champion Evan Lysacek admitted he didn't have his best stuff in the men's free skate, but it was good enough to rally from nearly 11 points down to win his second Four Continents Championships title.

Lysacek's free skate score (159.23) and total score (226.27)



were international personal bests, and he needed every one of those points to edge short program leader Jeffrey Buttle of Canada. Colorado Springs' own Jeremy Abbott grabbed the bronze in his first major international competition.

After opening his short program with a triple Axel, Lysacek struggled with the front end of his triple Lutz combination and doubled the back end. He followed that with a double flip, something rarely seen from the two-time World bronze medalist.

He turned it around in the free skate, executing his opening quad toe-triple toe, though not quite as smoothly as he did at the U.S. Championships.

"I've been practicing the quad really well and it wasn't one of my better ones, but when the time comes I like to try and fight for every point," Lysacek said.

Buttle botched both of his planned triple Axels in the free skate, doubling his first and a singling his second.

"Today, it wasn't really a technique issue on the Axel," said Buttle, who scored 223.96 points. "In the short program I was just a little bit outside the circle, so that's what caused me to step out, but today there was really nothing wrong with it. I just wasn't aggressive with the snap going in."

Abbott found himself in second after the short program, and with the locals cheering loudly, he turned in a solid effort in the free skate to total 203.22 points.

Ryan Bradley fell from third after the short program to fourth overall.

#### PAIRS

Two-time Olympic bronze medalists Xue Shen and Hongbo Zhao of China won their third Four Continents Championships title, but their victory was overshadowed by a gruesome on-ice incident.

Skating first of the nine teams in the free skate, Canadian Jessica Dubé was struck under her left eye by her partner Bryce Davison's skate during a side-by-side spin, causing her to fall face down on the ice. She was transported to Memorial Hospital, where she underwent surgery to repair the wound. Dubé was released the following day.

She and Davison, who recently won their first Canadian title, fully intend on competing at this month's World Championships.

Shen and Zhao's country mates, Qing Pang and Jian Tong, captured the silver with a score of 185.33, while Rena Inoue and John Baldwin of the United States claimed the bronze medal with a score of 175.48.


Shen and Zhao nailed their triple toe loops and landed their typically huge throw triple loop to grab a sizable lead over Pang and Tong after the short program. They also delivered a strong free skate performance to Jules Massenet's "Meditation from Thais," executing back-to-back throw triples late in their pro-

"It felt good today, and I'm very happy and just a little bit tired," Shen said.

Reigning World champions Pang and Tong turned in a crowd-pleasing free skate to Andrew Lloyd Webber's "Phantom of the Opera."

Inoue and Baldwin struggled with their second double Axels and their signature throw triple Axel in their free skate, but Baldwin did execute his opening triple toe loop.

"It felt really good because I'd missed it five times in a row this season and at four Grand Prix competitions," Baldwin said.



The two other U.S. entries, Brooke Castile and Ben Okolski, and Naomi Nari Nam and Themi Leftheris, finished fifth and sixth, respectively.

#### ICE DANCING

One got the feeling that if there was a fourth dance segment, Tanith Belbin and Ben Agosto would have come out on top.

The reigning four-time U.S. champions went from second after the compulsories to first following the original dance and back to second at the conclusion of the free dance, flip-flopping throughout the competition with Canadian champions Marie-France Dubreuil and Patrice Lauzon. Belbin and Agosto's silver medal snapped their three-year winning streak at the event.

Belbin and Agosto's new "Amelie" free dance remains a work in progress.

"Right now it's at a stage where we just need to think so much about performance, emotion, connection, and also every

element," Belbin said. "We want it so that it's more of an autopilot kind of performance, from a technical standpoint."

Dubreuil showed no ill effects of the displaced femur with which she competed at the Canadian Championships in January. In a strong ice dancing field, her and Lauzon's elegant "At Last" free dance was the best this Four Continents Championships had to offer.

Canada's Tessa Virtue and Scott Moir blew away their career-best free dance score, totaling 93.99 points. The tension they displayed during their "Valse Triste" free dance was palpable, and their superior skating skills were evident.

U.S. bronze medalists Meryl Davis and Charlie White acquitted themselves well with a fourth-place finish, as did Kim Navarro and Brent Bommentre, who came in fifth.

pionships in 1990 at the Broadmoor. Inoue skated pairs for Japan, while Baldwin was a singles skater who claimed a bronze medal at that event.

"One time at Christmas (Inoue and Baldwin met 10 years later in California) I pulled out this VHS tape of that 1990 competition and there was this little girl doing this layback spin," Baldwin said. "Rena said, 'That's me.' That was a lot of fun to watch."

It was Inoue's first international competition.





# Thomas fulfills lifelong dream

When I interviewed Debi Thomas for this piece, I told her a story about the night in 1986 when she won the U.S. ladies title. To my amazement, she'd never heard the story, so I've decided to repeat it here.

Thomas was the first black skater to win a U.S. Championships senior title. The first black skater to ever win a U.S. title was Atoy Wilson, who claimed the novice men's crown in 1966. Years after Atoy had skated off to "Holiday on Ice," his mother, Thelma, continued to attend amateur competitions because competitive skating was her passion. Anyone who ever encountered Thelma Wilson would never use the word "demure" to describe her.

As spectators stood waiting for the ladies medal ceremony at the 1986 U.S. Championships, I saw Thelma, and for once she was silent. I asked her if she was OK, and she answered, "You dream your whole life about something, but you don't believe you'll actually ever see it."

Since that night more than 21 years ago, I've known that Debi Thomas' achievements were about so much more than continuing the brilliant tradition of American ladies skating.


Fittingly, Thomas' life has been about so much more than a successful skating career, which included a second U.S. title in 1988, the 1986 World title, two other World medals (1987 and '88) and the 1988 Olympic bronze medal, which was the first Olympic Winter Games medal won by a black athlete. She also won three World professional titles and toured with "Stars on Ice" for four seasons before retiring to attend medical school.

This autumn, Debra Thomas, M.D., will begin the next phase of her life when she begins work at the Carle Clinic Association in Urbana, Ill. It is one of the largest multi-specialty medical groups in the country, with 321 doctors. Although there are 11 orthopedists on staff, the clinic was looking for someone with Thomas' specialty – adult reconstruction (hips and knees) – that had fellowship training. She is currently completing a one-year fellowship at the Dorr Institute for Arthritis Research and Education at Centinela Freeman Regional Medical Center in Inglewood, Calif. She works with patients who have had joint replacement for the first time and those who've had prior surgeries that need to be redone.

"The Carle Clinic is a great opportunity," Thomas said. "It took me so long to get to where I wanted to be. I'm excited to finally break out and do what I want to do. I love what I do."

Thomas, who will turn 40 on March 25, said at the age of 5 she declared she was going to be a doctor.

"Pretty much everything I say I'm going to do, I mean it," she said, admitting the only thing she may not accomplish is her dream to be an astronaut.



"It took me longer to get to where I want to be in orthopedics than I meant to, so the astronaut thing may be the one thing I don't end up doing. Although I imagine that before I die there will be civilian flights in space. So, there's still hope.

"When I get free time to write my autobiography, I'll talk about how it wasn't easy getting here at all. I had all kinds of failures. You have to keep going. If you really believe in something and it's really what you want to do, you have to be able to take some hits and keep going. If you commit to that, then you'll eventually get to where you want to be."

None of her journeys in life have been easy. After landing on the U.S. podium in novice, she did not even qualify for sectionals as a junior. She almost quit skating, but instead changed her perspective. She started skating for herself. Although winning medals was

great, what motivated her was achieving the perfect performance. That is why the 1988 Olympics remain a disappointment.

"Before '86 nationals, when I would compete, if I'd make a mistake I used to tell myself, 'There is no way you're making another mistake in this program." she said. "I would really fight for it. Then, after '86 nationals, when I had this performance that brought people to their feet, it was like, 'OK, it has to be like that every time because anything less than that is just not going to be satisfying.' My mental approach was more about trying to skate this fantastic program than trying to win or trying to skate as clean as I could.

"When I two-footed the triple-triple at the Olympics, I didn't fight. If I had realized that America and the world were watching and pulling for me and biting their nails, I think I would have done a little more. ... I know so much about psychology now, that I know it's all psychology."

One of the people who saw Thomas on television and enjoyed her skating was Christopher Bequette, 42, a former football player and non-practicing attorney turned financial planner whom she married during her final year of medical school at Northwestern. She gave birth to their son, Christopher (Luc) Jules Bequette II on July 1, 1997, less than a month after graduation. She took a few months off and then became involved in research. After completing an internship. Thomas was intent on doing a residency in orthopedic surgery. When she didn't initially receive offers, she returned to research until she found a residency in her desired specialty.

"I knew what I wanted," she said. "I sort of had a back-up plan. I have an undergraduate engineering degree. If I really never got into orthopedics, I could

have been an engineer. There are all kinds of alternative careers that I would love to do if I had the time.

"I knew if I didn't make it, it wouldn't be the end of the world, but I knew that's what I wanted to do and what I was meant to do."

She chokes up when speaking of one of her mentors, Dr. Carl L. Nelson, who died in January 2005 before Thomas completed her residency. His support and encouragement meant the world to her.

Just as she was determined to do the right residency for her, she has also been picky about where she would practice medicine. She declined numerous offers until she found the Carle Clinic. She wanted a center of excellence for arthritis care and she wanted the ability to continue her work in joint replacement. She's working on new techniques that involve minimally invasive surgery - incisions as small as 10 centimeters for hip replacements - and alternative pain management. She recently co-wrote a paper for "Clinical Orthopedics and Related Research" about the psychology of joint replacement patients.

With her medical career now moving into high gear, she thanks her husband for his willingness to relocate for her career and for his unwavering support.

"He has been a rock," she said. "I couldn't have asked for a better partner. He compromises a lot. He drives me nuts sometimes, but I cannot thank him enough."

They're both trying to instill in Luc a sense of determination and focus.

"He's a great kid and a smart kid," Thomas said. "I'm trying to teach him how to live up to his potential and do things the best he can do them."

While she loved her skating career, Thomas always planned beyond it.

"I could see 10 to 20 years into the future," she said. "My mother (Janet) was happy for me to be in skating, but I had to keep my grades up. She kind of knew that I couldn't rely on skating for the rest of my life. Whether I became famous or whatever, she iust knew that as a black woman you need to have an education and you need to have a plan. There really wasn't much of an argument there. I agreed with her, especially when I had three triples in juniors and didn't even make it to sectionals.

"I was an emotional skater and I thrived on adrenalin," she said. "It was all mental toughness. That's what makes you able to go through life and get kicked down and fail and have to come back. I've always been that kind of person." -

# 'Coming of age'

Meissner leads next generation, wins gold

immie Meissner knew it was going to be tough.

Nine-time U.S. champion Michelle Kwan was in Beijing, fulfilling a mission as the country's first public diplomacy envoy. Olympic silver medalist Sasha Cohen, winner of last year's U.S. title, was auditioning for acting roles.

"It's different that there's no national champion here," Meissner said. "It's really up in the air. It will be exciting to see what

At the 2007 State Farm U.S. Championships in Spokane, Wash., the next generation stepped up to the plate.

"These young women know there are openings to make the U.S. World Team," 1984 Olympic champion Scott Hamilton said. "Kimmie is World champion, but she is going to be challenged. For the audience, it's fresh stories and a youthful exuberance. The new generation is kind of coming of age."

Meissner, who won the U.S. silver medal last season and took home bronze (behind Kwan and Cohen) in 2005, accepted her unaccustomed role as the favorite.

"There was a lot of pressure, but I think I do well under pressure," she said. "I enjoy competing; it's one of the better things I do. Plus, the fans were amazing. However you started off your pro-

gram, you could always finish strong because the crowd pushed you."

That turned out to be a good thing because the ladies competition proved that it's OK to make a mistake, as long as you recover quickly.

After winning the short program with a clean, crisp performance, Meiss-

ner ran into trouble at the start of her free skate to flamenco music from "Galicia," the Spanish home of her maternal great-grandfather.

The 17 year-old from Bel Air, Md., put a hand down on her first jump, a triple Lutz, but came back strong to land five other triples and execute her step sequences with flair. Despite placing third in the free, Meissner's overall total edged Emily Hughes by less than a point, 181.68-180.86.

"I train my programs to be perfect and I train them with little mistakes, so I've learned over the years to keep going," Meissner said.


"It wasn't my best. The levels of some of my spins were not what we expected, which hurt my technical score. But except for the hand down on my first jump, it was good."

Meissner is the first woman since Barbara Roles in 1962 to complete the U.S. Championships triple crown: novice (2003), junior (2004) and senior champion.

But why no triple Axel, the jump she landed at the 2005 U.S. Championships?

"I've been working more on my triple-triple combinations and making [Galicia] a better program," Meissner said. "When (the triple Axel) goes in, whether I land it or not, it sometimes alters the rest of the program. I need more time to work on it. Hopefully it will be there at Worlds."

After placing third in the short, Hughes seemed well on her way to a clean performance in her free skate, to music from the ballet "Sylvia" when she fell on a triple flip. The Great Neck, N.Y., high school senior, who turned 18 in Spokane, finished with a flourish, landing two more triples and closing with fine layback





and combination spins to win the silver medal.

"I was really motivated to go out and skate a clean long program," Hughes said. "After the fall, I knew that couldn't happen, but I've learned to get up and keep going. I skated pretty good, except for that one jump. I took my time and did what I had to do."

The biggest "comeback" came from Alissa Czisny, who singled an intended triple Lutz in her short program and entered the free skate in fifth place. The elegant skater then won both the crowd and the judges with a mesmerizing routine to music from the soundtrack of the 1954 Audrey Hepburn film "Sabrina."

The 19 year old from Bowling Green, Ohio, landed five clean triples, including three in combination, and showed off her exceptional flexibility with the most impressive spins and spirals of the event. She won the free skate with 119.59 points and claimed the bronze medal.

"I tried not to think about how far I was behind after the short or how many points I had to make up," Czisny said. "I just wanted to entertain the crowd, and I'm so happy I could do it when I really had to."

In second place after a clean and speedy short program, Bebe Liang fell twice in the free skate and settled for fourth place.

"I got a little ahead of myself and rushed a bit. Next time I'll take things one at a time," Liang said.

Rachael Flatt, the youngest skater in the field at age 14, placed an impressive fifth with two solid programs.

Meissner, Hughes and Czisny will represent the U.S. at the World Championships in Tokyo this month.

#### **Champ turns editor**

While training for the 2007 State Farm U.S. Championships this winter, Kimmie Meissner helped create the first issue of "Cool Kids Connection." an inspirational newsletter distributed to 200 U.S. hospitals that treat pediatric cancer patients.

"The kids sent in poems, letters and artwork, and parents wrote survival stories," Meissner said. "I made time to (co-edit) the newsletter because I think it could make a difference."

Since joining the Cool Kids Campaign last spring, Meissner has visited hospitals, designed fundraising bracelets and hosted skating parties. For the newsletter, she even enlisted other students at Fallston High School for the cause.

"Our Spanish Club translated all of the (newsletter's) puzzles and some of the letters, so more kids could read it," she said.

One letter was particularly close to Meissner's heart

"There's a story from one girl, a skater, who was having a hard time getting through her program," Meissner said. "She thought it was a stamina problem, but it turned out to be cancer. She got through it and she's still skating today. She uses her skating to help cope."

A few days after her triumph in Spokane, the busy Meissner traveled to New York City to film her first national commercial for Subway restaurants.

"I always wondered whether they use real food when they film commercials," she said. "Well, now I know they do. I had to repeat my lines over and over, but it went really well."

#### Never too old

At age 26, Angie Lien - whose five trips to the U.S. Championships span more than a decade - has seen it all. When she placed seventh in the novice division in 1996, Michelle Kwan won her first U.S. title. Now the University of Minnesota graduate, who finished 20th in Spokane, is skating with a new generation.

"I still love the rush of competing, the chance to perform my programs for the audience," Lien said. "I'm telling all these young kids, 'You can go to college and still do this.' A lot of skaters think that after high school, they're done at this level. But there are college competitions and synchronized team skating competitions. You don't have to quit."

Lien is speaking from experience: she placed second at the 2003 World University Games and twice competed at the U.S. Collegiate Championships.

"Most of the girls I grew up with are skating on cruise ships or have normal jobs," she said. "But I guess I'm greedy because making it to nationals is always my big goal."

#### **Zukowski inspired in Weir camp**

Christine Zukowski, who placed 10th, arrived in Spokane with new coaches, Priscilla Hill and Carla Briccotto, and a new training partner, Johnny Weir.

The 17-year-old Philadelphian moved from the University of Delaware training center to the nearby Pond Ice Arena shortly after placing fifth at the NHK Trophy in November.

"When I practice with Johnny, I really get inspired, but I have to be more careful," Zukowski said.

toe and he was doing a quad. I turned my head to see if he would stand up, and I crashed. Of course, he landed his jump."

She added that Weir keeps her laughing.

"Johnny is hilarious. He's as funny at the rink as he is in some of his interviews."

Weir is happy to train with another elite skater.

"I've really been skating by myself the last year," Weir said. "Having Christine there pushes me. Before we left, she did a clean short program, so I said to myself, 'OK, I need to do a clean short.'"

"It's been really great for both of them," Hill said. "It's cool for Johnny to have someone to compete with. And it's great that they both jump lefty, so Christine can study his technique. I guess the Pond is the home of the lefties."


#### **Costume crisis**

She won the silver medal, but Emily Hughes counts herself lucky just to have made it out on the ice for her free skate.

"When I got to the dressing room, I looked down and there was no dress in my bag," Hughes said. "I was concentrating so hard on my skating I forgot to pack it. I thought I would have to go out in Iululemon (yoga-style) pants and a top. I said, 'Oh my gosh' and started running around in circles."

Hughes' coach, Bonni Retzkin, ran outside to catch the van to the skaters' hotel. She arrived back at the dressing room with just five minutes to spare, and Hughes took the ice in her lovely deep red costume.

"There's always some drama," Retzkin said.



# Leap of faith

Lysacek makes statement with historic performance

oments before taking the ice for his free skate warm-up on the last night of the 2007 State Farm U.S. Championships, Evan Lysacek got the news from his coach, Frank Carroll.

He'd be doing a quad.

That's the way Carroll does things, one of a hundred or so reasons why he's on the short list of "All-Time Greatest Figure Skating Coaches." By telling his prize pupil at the last possible second that he was going to attempt a jump he'd never landed cleanly in competition, it took one huge factor out of play: Lysacek's tendency to think too much.

In actuality, Carroll left Lysacek a minute or two to dwell on the impending task, so Lysacek did the first thing that came to mind: he left the main warm-up area, walked into a curtained-off space behind the mixed zone, grabbed a black plastic chair and set it down next to the platform on which the skaters stand when they do their post-skate interviews.

Then, he took a seat and stared straight ahead, moving nary a tensed-up muscle.

"What I try to do is get away from anything that could be a distraction," Lysacek said. "Seeing cameras and lights and people



running and celebrating because they're done and other people (upset with themselves) or sad because they didn't do well, that all affects your mental state. I try to stay away from all of it. It's something I learned from Frank, and it works really well."

It sure did that night.

We all know what happened next. The quad toe-triple toe combination. The seven ensuing triples. The collapse to the ice at the conclusion of his "Carmen" program. The capacity crowd at Spokane Arena giving him a standing ovation that seemed to go on forever.

Lysacek's performance will be replayed - whether on television, YouTube.com or in the minds of people who want a reminder of just how good this sport can be - as long as figure skating highlights are shown. It will be singled out as the precise moment when this 21-year-old man, who grew up outside Chicago and now makes his home in the Hollywood Hills; who had become as well-known for his recent history of failings in the short program as he had for his eye-catching looks and towering height (for a figure skater, at least); who had already made his mark on the World and, to a lesser extent, the Olympic scene; finally realized his potential in front of his countrymen.

With all the attention surrounding Lysacek's breakthrough, it's easy to forget the other stories that emerged from one of the most memorable U.S. Championships in years, chief among them Ryan Bradley.

Bradley's journey has been an arduous one. Since winning the junior men's title in 1999, he had yet to distinguish himself on the senior level, finishing between sixth and ninth at each of his six previous U.S. Championships appearances.

Known more as an entertainer than a serious competitive skater, Bradley changed that perception in Spokane. Landing just one fewer triple than Lysacek, Bradley went from third place after the short program to the silver medal.

But it was his post-skate celebration that really got people talking.

While in the kiss and cry with coaches Tom Zakrajsek, Becky Calvin and Damon Allen, Bradley saw his scores and placement come up on a TV monitor that only they could see. They started freaking out, and their excitement gradually spread through the

Bradley, however, needed to hear it to confirm that it was real.

"I don't like to count my chickens. I thought, 'What if that's not right?' I wanted to make sure that they announced it to the whole arena," Bradley said. "There was a moment of tension, and

> I was thinking, 'Just say second, just say second.' As soon as they did, it was pandemonium."

The emotions were too much for him to take sitting down (or even standing up), so after doing a quick interview with ESPN's Peter Carruthers, Bradley dashed onto the ice, did a half-victory lap, and punctuated it with a backflip.

Look out, Tokyo, here comes Ryan Bradley. "I thought if I snuck into that third (World team) spot, it would be like, 'Oh, Ryan Bradley made it to Worlds, but he made it in a weak year. He made it because all those guys (i.e. Timothy Goebel, Michael Weiss, Matt Savoie) dropped out," Bradley said. "Obviously, there was an opportunity because those men retired. But by

skating well and getting the crowd into it and placing ahead of Johnny (Weir), I feel like it really proved I should be there, that I deserve to be the one on the World team."

Speaking of Weir, the three-time and defending champion said he felt the world on his shoulders as he prepared to follow the spellbinding free skate of Lysacek and the thundering standing ovation that ensued.

While Weir skated around the rink, all eyes were fixated on the kiss and cry where Lysacek and coach Frank Carroll intently awaited the judges' marks.


The announcement of those gaudy scores sent the audience into a frenzy once again, as Weir tried his best to maintain focus.

This night, turned morning on the East Coast, simply wasn't meant to be for the flamboyant Weir, who struggled on several elements and never threatened what Lysaeck just accomplished.

Weir called it the "most difficult performance of his career," but vowed to build on the experience and be on the medal stand at the World Championships.

While Lysacek, Bradley and Abbott (his fourth-place finish enabled him to skate in front of his hometown fans at the Four Continents Championships, where he came in third) were clearly the week's big winners, it was the sport of figure skating that benefited the most from these U.S. Championships. The Spokane community embraced the event as no host city ever has, and the men's champion took notice.

"It was bigger than skating or gold medals or silver medals or bronze medals...It helped us as a sport to move forward," Lysacek said.

#### Lysacek leaves mark

With his gold medal-winning performance in Spokane, Evan Lysacek became just the fourth skater in U.S. Championships history to claim senior men's bronze, silver and gold medals in consecutive years. Lysacek won the bronze in 2005 and silver in 2006. The other three skaters to accomplish that feat are Timothy Goebel (1999-2001), Kenneth Shelley (1970-72) and Robin Lee (1933-35).

Lysacek joins Parker Pennington as the only singles skaters to win U.S. titles in four divisions over the course of their careers. Lysacek was the U.S. juvenile champion in 1996, the novice titleholder in 1999 and the junior champ in 2000. Pennington has worn the crown in juvenile (1995), intermediate (1996), novice (1998) and junior (2001).

Lysacek is the fifth skater to win a U.S. senior championship while coached by the legendary Frank Carroll. The other four are Linda Fratianne, Christopher Bowman, Michelle Kwan and Timothy Goebel.

Lysacek joins the Jenkins brothers - David and Hayes - as the only U.S. men to win two or more World medals before claiming their first U.S. gold medal. Lysacek has won the World bronze medal each of the last two years. Similarly, David Jenkins won the bronze at the World Championships in 1955 and 1956 before winning his first of four straight U.S. gold medals in 1957. Hayes Jenkins won World

bronze in 1950 and 1952 before his run of four consecutive U.S. gold medals began in 1953.

#### Weir stays on podium

Depending on how you look at it, Johnny Weir achieved something rather dubious at this year's U.S. Championships. Winning the bronze medal after capturing three straight U.S. titles, Weir became the first senior men's skater in more than 70 years to earn a medal immediately following a title reign of three years or more. Of the nine previous senior men to win at least three U.S. championships in a row, none had even so much as medaled the year they were dethroned. The last - and only - senior men's competitor to finish in the top three the year he was knocked off the top of the podium was Roger Turner, who won silver in 1935 after a record seven straight U.S. titles from 1928-34.

#### **Abbott shines**

A number of competitors made their senior men's debut at the 2007 U.S. Championships, with mixed results. The most successful of those skaters was Jeremy Abbott, who did not even make it through the qualifying pipeline - finishing fifth at the Midwestern Sectional - in 2006. Abbott, skating eighth out of 17 competitors, found himself at the top of the standings after his free skate and had to sweat out nine more before his fourth-place finish was revealed. Other senior men making their first appearance at the U.S. Championships included Stephen Carriere (ninth), Jordan Miller (12th), Daisuke Murakami (15th), Craig Ratterree (16th) and Geoffry Varner (17th).

#### **Bradley breaks through**

Ryan Bradley's silver medal at the U.S. Championships in Spokane was his first on the senior level, coming eight years after winning the U.S. junior championship in 1999. That is the longest a U.S. junior men's champion has ever gone before winning his first medal as a senior. The previous high was seven years, a mark held by Paul Wylie. Wylie took the U.S. junior men's title in 1981 but did not win the first of his five senior medals until 1988, when he won the silver.

Bradley is just the second U.S. Collegiate senior men's champion to also earn a medal at the U.S. Championships. Bradley is the reigning two-time U.S. Collegiate senior men's champion. Wylie won the inaugural senior men's competition at the 1986 U.S. Collegiate Championships and, as previously mentioned, went on to win five medals at the U.S. Championships. Bradley is the only senior man to accomplish the feat in the same season.

# New kids on the block

Castile, Okolski steal show in Spokane

ne of 16 pairs teams at the 2007 State Farm U.S. Championships, Michigan's Brooke Castile and Ben Okolski arrived in Spokane, Wash., with just one goal: get noticed.

Their modest resumes had featured an eighth-place finish at the 2006 U.S. Championships and a silver medal in the junior ranks at the 2004 U.S. Championships. They finished second at the Midwestern Sectional to qualify for the big show in Spokane.

Based on those lukewarm results, their goal seemed like a logical one.

Cinderella, however, crashed the party at least a year early. Castile, 20, and Okolski, 22, third after the short program, delivered a personal-best, standing ovation-inspired free skate to the "Requiem for a Dream" soundtrack, overtaking defending champions and heavy favorites Rena Inoue and John Baldwin (178.40-178.15), each of whom had a fall during their free skate.

Naomi Nari Nam and Themi Leftheris, second after the short program, also had mistakes in their free skate and ended up with the bronze medal (168.49).

Castile and Okolski's improbable rise to the top of the U.S. ranks stunned everyone, including their coach Johnny Johns,



whose last pairs champions were 1999 titlists Danielle Hartsell and Steve Hartsell.

"We were obviously extremely pleased with how they skated," said Johns, who works with choreographer Marina Zoueva. "We figured it was good enough to get a medal. We weren't expecting to get this at all. I am still in shock. Usually this is a two or three-year project when you prepare a senior team. We were just trying to lay some groundwork, but they laid it pretty quickly."

Johns began coaching Castile and

Okolski last March at the Arctic Figure Skating Club in Canton, Mich., and there seemed to be instant chemistry between the coach and his eager pupils.

"They believed in me and I believed in them, and this is, like, crazy," Johns said. "They were focused all week. We talked about it last week, just to stay focused, that anything can happen, especially with the new system. This is just the beginning for them."

Castile and Okolski entered the free skate less than three points behind Inoue and Baldwin. Their first element, a triple twist, set the tone for their nearly flawless program. The daring element is performed by just a few pairs teams in the United States.

"It's always been our trademark element," Okolski said. "It's very explosive and it happens very quickly."

"There's so much contact between the guy and the girl, it's very dangerous," Castile said. "It takes a ton of energy, and it's a really hard element to do from day to day because if one thing goes wrong, the whole twist can go bad."

The only negative grade of execution in the tandem's free skate came on its level-four combination spin.

When it finished, the pair took a lap around the rink, enjoying every moment of its rousing standing ovation. Their score was 33 points better than their previous best, which was earned at the 2007 Midwestern Sectional in the middle of November.

"This is incredible," said Castile, who has skated with Okolski for five years. "It feels really good. It's really cool because all of our best friends are here who we train with as well as our friends from all over the country who we've gotten to know through skating, and they are just so thrilled for us, and that makes it even better."

The move to Arctic FSC, Castile said, was undoubtedly the key to taking the monumental step.

"That's been the most influential thing with our skating," she said. "We have an incredible group of coaches and skaters and so much support at that club."

The victory earned Castile and Okolski one of two U.S. berths at the World Championships in March in Tokyo, Japan.

Inoue, 30, and Baldwin, 33, followed Castile and Okolski

with their free skate to selections by Puccini. Things started badly when Baldwin fell on the team's side-by-side triple loop. Their signature throw triple Axel ended the same way, with Inoue falling on the landing.

"We skated well," Baldwin said. "We just missed a couple of our elements and that was the key to winning tonight, but I'm actually pretty happy with the performance considering what we've been through."

The loss prevented Inoue and Baldwin from winning their third U.S. title and second consecutive crown, but Baldwin said the emergence of Castile and Okolski bodes well for the future of pairs skating in the United States.

"They are a great team, and I think the U.S. is looking really strong," said Baldwin, who added that the champions' triple twist is something he and Inoue would like to incorporate into their programs for the World Championships.

"We'll put it in our program, too – as long as it's comparable to theirs," Baldwin said.

After Inoue and Baldwin left the door open, Nam, 21, and Leftheris, 24, skated last to the music "Caravan," and had a golden opportunity to seize the moment and a gold medal.

They started strong by landing their tripletoe-tripletoe sequence and triple twist, but Nam later fell on their throw triple Salchow and throw triple loop.

"We had a great opening, and I just think we need to stay focused throughout the whole thing," Nam said. "It's just another lesson learned, and we'll take it all in and be back next year."

Nam and Leftheris started skating two years ago and placed fifth at the 2006 U.S. Championships.

"They usually, obviously, skate a lot better than that, but it's nationals and you have to do it when they say your name, so sometimes it happens and sometimes it doesn't," said Karen Kwan-Oppegard, who with her husband, Peter, coach Inoue and

Baldwin and Nam and Leftheris. "It's all a learning process. You take what you learn today and make it work for you tomorrow."

Amanda Evora and Mark Ladwig placed fourth with a score of 158.66. They landed a throw triple Lutz, triple twist and throw triple loop to music from "West Side Story."

#### Close, but no cigar

Tiffany Vise and Derek Trent flirted with the figure skating record book in their attempt to land a throw quad Salchow, an element thas has never been landed by a U.S. team in a major competition. During warm-ups before the free skate, Vise and Trent nailed the highly difficult maneuver much to the appreciation of the 9,250 fans at Spokane Arena. During their actual free skate, however, Vise missed the clean landing and hit the ice. Last year at the U.S. Championships, Rena Inoue and John Baldwin executed the first ever throw triple Axel. Baldwin predicts that Vise and Trent will eventually land their throw guad in competition. Vise and Trent placed fifth in Spokane.

#### **Next stop: Tokyo**

By winning the U.S. pairs title, Brooke Castile and Ben Okolski earned one of two U.S. pairs berths for the World Championships later this month in Tokyo. "I'm going more with the mindset of experiencing everything there and learning from all of the other teams," Castile said. "I'm not going to focus on placement, just like we did here. We didn't expect anything from what we can't control but expected a lot out of ourselves, and we'll do the same thing for Worlds."

Inoue and Baldwin are the other U.S. team that qualified for Worlds.

#### Learning curve

Julia Vlassov and Drew Meekins chalked up their first U.S. Championships as seniors to experience. The Massachusetts duo incorporated side-by-side triple Salchows in their programs for the first time, which they failed to land in the short program. That miscue landed them in ninth place entering the free skate, where they attempted the element again. This time they landed it but with negative grade of execution marks. "We didn't have any huge goals of medaling or qualifying for Worlds in our first year," Meekins said. "We were just mainly looking to get experience." Said Vlassov, "Our main goal for next year is to work on our skating skills and become a real senior team; we just need to polish things up because we have the elements down."

#### **Handy man**

Coach Todd Sand made a trip to the local hospital after he cut his hand while trying to tighten the blade on the skate of junior pairs skater Joseph Jacobsen prior to the short program. "The screwdriver slipped and he cut his hand, so he's at the hospital getting stitches," Jacobsen said. "I feel pretty horrible, but it kind of took my nerves off the short program. I was ready to go." Sand and wife, Jenni Meno, are three-time U.S. pairs champions and coach several teams, including senior pairs Katie Beriau and Alexander Merritt.

#### Still goin' strong

Baldwin competed in his 21st consecutive U.S. Championships. He skated in his first U.S. Championships in 1986, and claimed the U.S. novice title in 1987. Inoue is a three-time Olympian. She skated singles for Japan at two Olympic Winter Games before competing as a pairs skater with Baldwin at the 2006 Olympic Winter Games in Torino.

#### Youth movement

Ten of the 16 pairs teams at the U.S. Championships in Spokane were first-year senior teams. "It's great to see such depth with the U.S. pairs teams. I think we have a big future in front of us," Baldwin said. Kendra Moyle and Andy Seitz were the highest placing first-year team; they finished sixth with 148.70 points. Moyle and Seitz, the 2006 U.S. junior champions, placed fifth in the short program and ninth in the free skate.



# Change is good

Belbin and Agosto notch No. 4 with new free dance

ach of the ice dancing medalists at the U.S. Championships experienced their own "season of change" in

Many wondered if three-time and defending U.S. champions Tanith Belbin and Ben Agosto would scrap their "That's Entertainment" free dance and create a new one in time for the U.S. Championships after a silver-medal finish at Cup of

China and a lukewarm response at Cup of Russia.

Just one week prior to the event, that question was answered when the team announced it would debut a new program to music from the "Amelie" soundtrack.

The free dance, though rough but packed with difficulty, was unveiled to a crowd of more than 10,000. Belbin and Agosto took the ice as the final skaters of the competition and delivered another clutch gold-medal performance. Only their two step sequences did not receive level fours, and the performance also received no negative GOEs.

Despite their success, they admitted it was difficult changing their free dance mid-season.

"We thought it was going to be hard enough to put just one free dance together after returning home so late to training," Belbin said. "To do two was quite an accomplishment; nothing that we could have foreseen possible before we attacked it.


"We're so pleased with the change we made. I think it was a gutsy move on our part, and it was the right one. Tonight, we did a great job with it being so new, and it has limitless potential, and we're only beginning with it. We just feel so proud to be able to put out a program we feel is more true to what we're capable of."

Four-time U.S. silver medalists Melissa Gregory and Denis Petukhov received a standing ovation for their "Adam and Eve" free dance to music by Yoev Goren.


This season, the team focused on using totally original music to help broaden the idea that there are other music choices available.

every time we perform it; we just absorb the audience in with us. We can't wait to work harder and at Worlds have the best performances."


Last year, Gregory and Petukhov moved from Simsbury, Conn., to Newark, Del., to train with their new coaches, Natalia Linichuk and Gennadi Karponosov, the 1980 Olympic ice dancing champions.

"This year, we had a change of coaches and we attribute most of our skating right now to the support of our new coaches," Gregory said. "They've been wonderful for us and pushed us further than we thought we could go. There is still more time between

> now and Worlds, and we feel we can improve more and more. We're going with a full tank and our mind is open and we're ready to fight."

Meryl Davis and Charlie White, who train in Canton, Mich., with coach Igor Shpilband and are training mates of Belbin and Agosto, continued their successful season by winning the bronze medal.

Davis and White finished fourth at their senior Grand Prix events, receiving all level fours on their elements (for their free dance) at the NHK Trophy. Moving up to the senior level at the U.S. Championships was an easier step than they expected. The couple spent four seasons working their way up the junior ranks, missing the 2005 U.S. Championships because of an injury to White before coming back to win the junior title in 2006.

"This year has definitely been a surprise for us on the senior circuit and at nationals," Davis said. "It's really different than what's happened to us when we were at the last two levels."

"Coming in we didn't have a lot of expectations for placement," White said. "Instead we were focusing on skating well. Skating well and achieving a good place would obviously be great. It's an honor to be with the two U.S. superpowers of the past couple of years."

Belbin believes the U.S. is stepping it up in ice dancing, beyond the top three.

"I think that year after year, as we keep raising the bar, we see the teams getting stronger and stronger," Belbin said. "Whereas, just a few years ago, we just had maybe one-two in ice dancing, now we have depth even beyond this World team."

Davis and White look forward to making their senior World Champioships debut. Alongside Belbin and Agosto and Gregory and Petukhov, he and Davis will travel to Tokyo this month.

"They've [Belbin and Agosto] done a great job of making a name for the U.S. in our sport, and it's phenomenal just to be here with them," White said. "We're really looking forward to going to Worlds and learning from them and hoping to follow in their steps."

Belbin and Gregory agreed.

"I can't wait to go to Worlds with these guys because we know we can do the best, and I think the United States is starting to make a name for itself in our sport," Belbin said.

"We're at a great time for U.S. ice dancing," Gregory said. "The level has been brought up so much and it's really at a time now that it's really special to be part of it. For us to have three couples for now the second year in a row, it's a strong team, and we're looking to definitely do it again."

#### **Full plate**

One of the busiest duos at the U.S. Championships was at the boards rather than on the ice. The coaching tandem of Igor Shpilband and Marina Zoueva not only had two of the top three teams at the senior level in Tanith Belbin and Ben Agosto, and Meryl Davis and Charlie White, but they were also working with seniors Mimi Whetstone and Chris Obzansky; juniors Shannon Wingle and Ryan Devereaux, and Brianne Oswald and Buck Withrow; and the novice teams of Madison Chock and Greg Zuerlein, and Megan Evans and Nathan Truesdell.

#### Winning streaks

Since competing at their first U.S. Championships in 2000, Belbin and Agosto have won five gold and three silver medals. Melissa Gregory and Denis Petukhov have a similar streak going. The 2007 silver medalists have won two silver and four bronze medals since they debuted at the 2002 U.S. Championships.

#### 'Heroes'

Sixth-place finishers Jennifer Wester (with husband and partner Daniil Barantsev) competed with a knee injury at the U.S. Championships. She credits the medical staff with helping her get through the week, calling them her "heroes."

#### What a trip!

During the awards ceremony, Kim Navarro was so excited to receive her medal that she accidentally tripped en route from the ice to the podium. She recovered quickly with the help of Brent Bommentre, her skating partner of two years, and was all smiles as Ron Hershberger, president of U.S. Figure Skating, put the fourth-place medal around her neck.

#### Mission accomplished

Obzansky, who took a two-year break from skating to complete a Mormon mission to the Baltics, returned to the U.S. Championships with new partner Whetstone.

#### Love on the ice

Gregory and Petukhov were one of two married couples competing at the U.S. Championships in ice dancing. The team, which married on Feb. 2, 2001, was joined by Wester and Barantsev, who tied the knot on May 6, 2006.

#### Down but not out

At the 2006 U.S. Championships, C.G. Lee collided with another skater in a warm-up, forcing him and partner Kate Slattery to withdraw after the original dance; Lee suffered a concussion and a broken nose

in the accident. Although Lee fell during the Golden Waltz at the 2007 U.S. Championships, no injury was involved, and Slattery and Lee skated their original and free dances.

#### Strong bond

Davis and White have the longest partnership in U.S. ice dancing, with 10 seasons of competitive experience under their belts. At this event, Davis and White skated a strong Golden Waltz and free dance. with only their original dance containing an error, a fall by White at the end of their step sequence.

#### **Expert instruction**

Caitlin Mallory and Brent Holdburg learned the Golden Waltz from the creators themselves, Marina Klimova and Sergei Ponomarenko. Mallory and Holdburg are coached by Klimova and Ponomarenko in San Jose, Calif. Ponomarenko laughed, "If I had known it would be made into a compulsory dance, I would have made it harder."

#### Years gone by

The youngest and oldest senior ice dancing competitors at the U.S. Championships were separated by 11 years. The youngest dancers were Isabel Elliman (16) and Charlie White (19), while the oldest were Kim Navarro (25) and Denis Petukhov (28).

Attendees continued to rotate through presentations throughout the day. Topics included media training, proper off-ice warm up and cool down and the international judging system.


In addition, all skaters were able to practice judge a junior or senior event within their own skating discipline, with the help of a certified technical specialist and judge.

## Passionate fan gives Spokane two thumbs up

Seattle's Andy Depew has attended the last 20 State Farm U.S. Championships, and this latest one in Spokane, Wash., tops them all when it comes to local support and fan enthusiasm.

A U.S. Championships record 154,893 fans walked through the turnstiles during the weeklong event, which shattered the previous record of 125,345 in Los Angeles in 2002.

"I would say as far as promotion to the local community to get them out here, I think it's the best I've seen," said Depew, who sat in the front row with his wife and several longtime friends. "There have been a lot of places we've been to where the locals don't even know what's happening or where to get tickets, but everyone seemed to know about it here."

Depew is one of figure skating's most ardent fans. Retired, he and wife, Evelyn, attend virtually every skating event they can, no matter when and where it might be.

"I've watched the little novice skaters go through the senior level, and I kind of feel attached to them,"

said Depew, a member of Friends of Figure Skating. "I come to show them my support. I just know how much work they put into this. I'm addicted to it. I want to come and see them all do well, and I like them equally."

Depew became a skating fan more than two decades ago while working briefly with the father of Olympic silver medalist Rosalynn Sumners. At the time, Rosalynn was 8 years old.

"He said at the time that she's going to the Olympics," Depew said. "I thought, 'Oh sure.' He said, 'You should see some of her local competitions and so I went to those. I ended up meeting people from work who were either judges or skaters themselves, so it just became a fascinating thing."

Too much irrelevant commentary on skating telecasts also prompted Depew to attend the events

"There was one day when I was really upset." he said. "They were talking about something other than what was happening. Evelyn told me, 'Why don't we just go in person?' so basically that's what we've been doing.'

Like clockwork, Depew submits his ticket requests and money up to three years in advance of the U.S. Championships to ensure getting the best seats. He tries to sit as close as possible to the action so his friends won't hear him cheering on the skaters.

As with each of the last 20 U.S. Championships, Depew had his favorite moments from Spokane.

"I think Evan's (Lysacek) performance for me was the best," he said. "Again, I've been trying to support him for as along as I can and to see him complete (all the elements in his free skate), it was hard for me to contain my emotions.

"Then, of course, Ryan Bradley has tried for so long. He's always been the best entertainer there is as far as I'm concerned, and he finally put it all together, too, and that was terrific."

Depew also likes to gamble, so he made sure to try the penny slots at the Northern Qwest casino in Spokane before checking into his room.

"We kind of casino-hop our way to the skating events," he joked. "We combine both of our addictions."

# Peanuts' creator Schulz inducted into U.S. Figure Skating Hall of Fame

Ever see a beagle try to land a double Axel? For more than 50 uninterrupted years Charles Schulz, the creator and cartoonist of the comic strip Peanuts that debuted on Oct. 2, 1950, delighted more than 335 million readers worldwide with his unforgettable char-

Schulz's comic strips detailed the Peanuts gang's adventures - and misadventures - on the ice. They reflected the cartoonist's intimate knowledge of figure skating acquired from his real-life experiences; in fact, in 1969 Schulz built the Redwood Empire Ice

Schulz's widow, Jean, accepted the award on behalf of her late husband. Family friend and 1984 Olympic gold medalist Scott Hamilton and World Figure Skating Museum President Jan Serafine honored Schulz's widow with a Hall of Fame medallion and a commemorative silver bowl

For the second year in a row, the U.S. Figure Skating Alumni Association invited former U.S. champions to attend the State Farm U.S. Championships.





# A plentiful crop

# Juniors prove ready and willing to make their mark

he United States dominated the competition during the Junior Grand Prix season and won nine of 12 medals, including four golds, at the Junior Grand Prix Final. This rare collection of superb skaters displayed their many talents on home soil during an unforgettable week in Spokane, Wash.

#### Ladies

Two of the brightest stars on the horizon for the United States put on a show as Mirai Nagasu (Arcadia, Calif./Pasadena FSC) and Caroline Zhang (Irvine, Calif./All Year FSC) battled for supremacy in the junior ranks.

In front of more than 6,000 fans at the Spokane Arena, Nagasu, 13, landed five triples and combined that with spectacular spins to capture the free skate and finish with 155.46 points. Zhang, 13, fell on a triple flip midway through her program and finished second with a score of 151.88 points. Last year's fourth-place finisher, 15-year-old Ashley Wagner, moved up one spot to claim the bronze medal with marks totaling 145.86 points.

Although Nagasu's win was a major surprise, considering how Zhang dominated the Junior Grand Prix circuit, she didn't exactly come out of nowhere. Anyone who watched Nagasu's lyrical performances on IceNetwork.com at both the Southwest Pacific Regional and Pacific Coast Sectional knew she had what it took to challenge Zhang. What's not clear, however, is whether Nagasu knew she had it.

"It hasn't sunk in yet," she said. "I wasn't expecting to win."

Coached by Charlene Wong, Nagasu won both the regional and sectional titles this year after a disappointing 2005-06 campaign. She finished fifth as a novice at the 2006 Southwest Pacific Regional, failing to qualify for the Pacific Coast Sectional.

"Last season was a disaster because I didn't make it out of regionals," she said. "I was one of the people who expected to go, and that maybe made me overconfident. This year I worked to live up to my potential."

Nagasu's jumps included a triple Lutz-double toe combination and a triple loop-double loop combination. She attempted a second triple Lutz late in the program, but it was downgraded to a double. On her level three layback spin, she earned six +2 grades of execution and a rare +3.

She also earned level fours on her spiral sequence and final combination spin.

"She's incredibly disciplined, very driven," Wong said. "She has a passion for skating, and when you combine that with talent and discipline and determination, I think she has what it takes to make a good career for herself."

Nagasu led by less than a half point heading into the free skate after Zhang fell on a double Axel in the short program.

Zhang's fall in the free skate sealed the deal for Nagasu, but Zhang, one of Nagasu's best friends, put her placement in perspective.

"It's great to be able to medal," she said. "Last year I was eighth, so this is a big step."

Zhang opened with a smooth triple Lutzdouble toe-double loop combination and then did a back spiral into a double Axel. After falling on the triple flip, she went on to land a triple loop, triple Lutz, a triple flip-double toe and triple toe-double toe combination.

"It was OK, besides the flip," Zhang said.

"I could have landed it, because I landed them all in warm-up today...it was just a stupid thing. I wasn't paying attention much on it."

Skating last, Wagner (Alexandria, Va./Washington FSC) also made only one mistake in her program falling on a triple Lutz near the end of

She was pleased she moved up in the standings this year, albeit only one place over last year's fourth-place finish.

"It might not seem like that big, one placement up, but I feel like I've grown so much in my skating this past year with all my international experience," Wagner said.

Blake Rosenthal (Radnor, Pa./SC of Wilmington, finished fourth with 130.99 points.

#### Men

Reigning U.S. novice champion Eliot Halverson (St. Paul, Minn./St. Paul FSC) won backto-back U.S. titles by securing the junior men's gold medal at the 2007 State Farm U.S. Championships in Spokane, Wash.

The last man to pull off double victories in consecutive years was Evan Lysacek, who won the novice title in 1999 and followed it up with junior gold in 2000.

"I feel incredible," said Halverson, who earned a score of 187.79. "That was definitely the program I wanted to do. I wouldn't change anything."

Brandon Mroz (Colorado Springs, Colo./ Broadmoor SC) won the silver medal with a score of 178.56, while his training mate, Austin Kanallakan captured the free skate en route to the

Halverson's program combined music from "Beetlejuice" and "The Nightmare Before Christmas." While he was solid in his jumping technique, landing six clean triples (the back end of a triple Lutz-triple toe combination was downgraded), it's his smooth-as-butter presentation that sets him apart.

"I think that (presentation) is really important for me, and it's always been something that I concentrate really hard on doing in practice," he said. "I don't think about it during competition. In practice I will work on that a lot, and when it comes to competition I can just focus on the jumps."

With two U.S. titles under his belt, Halverson now will focus on the next step in his career. One of his goals is to work on the triple Axel. Although he has landed them in practice, Halverson and coaches Ted Engelking and Ann Eidson chose not to include it in his free skate. Landing that, and continuing his success internationally, will be part of his plans.

"I'm so excited about everything that will come with my skating career and with my life," he said. "I think as I get older I think about how much I've changed just from a couple years back, and it gets me so excited for what's going to happen in the next 10 years, 20 years. So this is just another stepping stone in my long career plans."

American junior men, including Halverson, had extraordinary success on the international circuit this year. The 16-year-old, who was adopted from Bogota, Colombia, as an infant, won two medals in the Junior Grand Prix Series but failed to qualify for the JGP Final.

Mroz's only major free skate error was a bad stumble out of the double Axel, but he had a few bobbles throughout his free skate.


"Going in second, you have that feeling of you're up there but if you want to move up you've got to throw down the gauntlet," he said. "I've been in this situation before. I've been in better and worse spots, so I know how to deal with the pressure. I've gone through that all season."

Kanallakan found himself sixth after the short program and skating seventh overall. Maybe that took some of the pressure off, because he managed to win the free skate by a sliver over Halverson, 122.90-122.67. His element score of 68.04 outpaced the field, but the deficit was too much to overcome the leaders.


He landed seven triples, including an opening triple flip-triple toe combination that received all positive grades of execution. For the first time, he also landed both double Axels in his program.

> "I just took everything one step at a time and took my time in everything," he said. "I didn't get into the choreography as I usually do, but it was still pretty good." Fourth place went to Cur-

ran Oi (Wellesley, Mass./SC of Boston), with 170.50 total points.

#### **Pairs**

Rockne Brubaker (Colorado Springs, Colo./Broadmoor) became a two-time U.S. junior pairs champion, as he and new partner Keauna McLaughlin (Los Angeles, Calif./Los Angeles FSC) ran away with the title.

Brubaker, 20, won the U.S. junior title with Mariel Miller in 2005, but after their split shortly before the 2006 U.S. Championships, Brubaker had to watch the national event from the stands.

In February 2006, he paired up with McLaughlin, and with only a few months training, they won two Junior Grand Prix Series events and the Junior Grand Prix Final.

Now, they're U.S. junior champions. "This year has probably been my favorite

year," Brubaker said. "We have an awesome relationship and have so much fun."

McLaughlin, 13, and Brubaker had the most ambitious free skate, including two throw triples for the first time in their careers. Brubaker said they wanted to try the throw triple loop because if they made the World Junior Team, they didn't want that competition to be the first time they attempted it.

"Probably about seven months ago, Keauna hadn't even tried a throw triple, and here we are

at nationals doing two of them," Brubaker said.

The team opened their free skate to a mix of "Romeo and Juliet" music with their magnificent triple twist—something not many of the U.S. senior pairs skaters are doing. Brubaker said they moved from double to triple twist in practice quickly because of McLaughlin's solid technique, and because it's her favorite move. They received five +3 grades of ex-

ecution and four +2s for the move.

Bianca Butler (Dana Point, Calif./All Year FSC) and Joseph Jacobsen (Lake Arrowhead, Calif./All Year FSC) capped what could have been a disappointing season with a comeback and the silver medal. In early fall, Butler suffered a concussion during the short program at the Junior Grand Prix event in Norway. They withdrew from the event and did not receive a second assignment.

Butler said they considered it a bump in the road, and she didn't let it hold her back too long.

"Actually, right when we got back from Norway, she went out there the first day and tried (the throw jump they fell on) again," said Jacobsen. "I'm very proud of her. She was very brave about it."

They also had a triple twist and landed a throw double loop and double Lutz-double flip sequence. She fell late in the program on a throw triple Salchow

Although they finished fourth in the free skate, reigning novice champions Jessica Rose Paetsch and Jon Nuss (Centennial, Colo. /Broadmoor SC) won the bronze medal by a mere .20 points.

"It wasn't our strongest performance of the year, but overall I thought it was pretty good," Nuss said.

Kaela Pflumm (Laurel Hollow, N.Y./Univ. Delaware FSC and Christopher Pottenger (Coppell, Texas/Dallas FSC) finished fourth with 90.75 points. ■



#### Ice Dancing

Ann Arbor, Mich., is officially the home of rising U.S. dancers. Couples from the home of Maize and Blue occupied the top three spots on the podium of the junior ice dancing event in Spokane, Wash, with just .17 points separating the gold and silver medalists.

Emily Samuelson and Evan Bates, second after the compulsory and original dance events, earned all level fours for their elements en route to winning the gold with marks of 167.65. Their program to "Thalia's Hits Remixed" maximized the technical difficulty while also showcasing Samuelson's flexibility and their expression, creating a fun performance for the audience.

The team had some ground to make up after their mistake in the original dance.

"We were definitely a little nervous, but I'd say we were excited," Samuelson said. "We just wanted to show what we could do in the free dance - that's all that really mattered. The fall in the original dance - it's unfortunate, but those things happen. We just had to bounce back."

Samuelson and Bates are the first team to be rewarded all level fours at the U.S. Championships since the international judging system was introduced at the 2006 event.

Lynn Kriengkrairut and Logan Giulietti-Schmitt finished fourth in the free dance but were able to retain third place with marks of 142.92.


"It didn't really hit me until the end of the free dance," Kriengkrairut said. "I was sitting there and I looked around and just went 'Wow."



In a competition filled with skaters making great leaps up the standings - as well as precipitous drops down them - it was Angela Maxwell's consistency

that paid off.

Maxwell (Dallas FSC) finished second in the short program and free skate to take the novice ladies title. She made her own great leap, of sorts, as she improved on her 11th-place finish from 2006.

"I just wanted to do a little better than last year," Maxwell said. "I did not expect this. I'm a little bit in shock right now."

Maxwell landed a double Axel, triple Salchow-double toe combination and a triple toe in her short program, after which she was 1.71 points behind the leader, Carolyn-Ann Alba (All Year FSC).

Skating first in the second and final group of skaters in the free skate, Maxwell performed her "Children of Dune" program with ruthless efficiency. Her triple toe-double toe-double loop combination was the high point-earner of the evening, garnering her a whopping 7.77

Kristine Musademba (Washington FSC), the 2006 U.S. intermediate champion, vaulted from fifth after the short program to winning the free skate (by .12 points over Maxwell) and taking the silver. After stepping out of the first jump - a triple loop - in her "Malagueña" program, Musademba made virtually no errors. Her triple toe-double toe combination received positive GOEs from eight of the nine judges, earning her almost seven points.

On the other side of the coin was Alba, who ran into some problems in her Spanish medley free skate. About halfway through she fell on her triple toe, and she seemed to lose focus after that, as the landings on many of her jumps were shaky. She settled for the bronze.

Deedee Leng (DuPage FSC) went from ninth place after the short program to losing out on the bronze to Alba by less than a quarter of a point (124.75-124.51).

The first question from a reporter after Armin Mahbanoozadeh secured the novice men's title had nothing to do with his electric free skate.

But it was a predictable one: "How do you pronounce your last name?"

"It's Mah-ban-ooz-za-deh," he said. "It's pretty phonetic actually."

In front of an appreciative crowd of 6,808, Mahbanoozadeh reeled off a series of triples en route to the second-best free skate and novice crown. He finished seventh last year at the novice level.

It was tight at the top of the leaderboard after the short program, with seven men all passing 40 points and less than a point separating the top three. Mahbanoozadeh held the lead with a score of 45.50, with Scott Dyer close behind at 45.43 and Alexander Johnson third at 44.62.

Mahbanoozadeh's only miscue in the free skate occurred near the end of his technically challenging performance to "Symphony No. 5" by Tchaikovsky, when he fell attempting a triple toe. He regrouped with a level-four combination spin to finish strong, scoring 138.77 points.

"I've been practicing hard all year," he said. "I've made a lot of my triples consistent, and at sectionals I had a really good skate and posted the highest score in the nation. So, I felt confident going into here."


Johnson also showed dramatic improvement from last year - he placed ninth in the novice class - and earned the silver medal with a score of 135.90. Skating to "Autumn" from "The Seasons" by Glazunov, he took the lead from Anchorage, Alaska's Keegan Messing late in the competition despite having a few miscues along the way.

For me that was really good, and it was a personal best, so I'm happy,"

Johnson said.



Sporting matching black pants and NASCARthemed tops, Tanovich and Chau, both from Southwest Florida FSC, brought the house down in the short program, earning the highest technical elements and program components scores en route to a mark of 45.47.

> Their "Don Quixote" free skate was a hit with the Spokane Arena denizens, as many of the fans in attendance rose to their feet at its conclusion.

"(The best part of the program was) hearing the crowd at the end. They went nuts. It was great to hear that," Tanovich said. "We had the crowd behind us the whole program."


Yankowskas (Colonial FSC) and Cohen (Elite Training Academy) clawed their way back onto the podium despite a disappointing short program that left them in fourth. They were not terribly pleased with their performance of "Swan Lake" either.

"It wasn't our greatest program, but we put out everything we had. A couple elements were shaky," Cohen said. "Two of our lifts weren't as great as they usually are."

Their silver medal marks a huge improvement over their showing last year in St. Louis, where they came in 10th.

Third place went to the Aaron Parchemcoached team of Jaylyn Kelly (Lansing SC) and Gabe Woodruff (Detroit SC), who finished just .06 points (117.02-116.96) out of the second spot. They went through their "Corpse Bride" program relatively cleanly, but their program components score (36.10) lagged behind, as they posted just the sixth-highest mark in that area.

Brynn Carman (Broadmoor SC) and Christopher Knierim (Broadmoor SC) rose from eighth place after the short program to take fourth overall.

FSC) after the compulsories by a little less than a point, 49.87-48.90.

The Shibutanis, who won the 2006 U.S. intermediate title, skated an elegant and technically sound performance that included effortless lifts and good speed.

The program had special meaning for Maia and Alex.

"We kind of tossed (the "Geisha" program idea) back and forth with (our choreographer) Tom (Dickson)," Maia said.


"We were trying to come up with something that would be unique, something that we could really feel a connection to," Alex said. "With our Japanese heritage, we thought we could make a connection to the audience - and between ourselves - that would really make the program something special for us."

Bailey and Herring finished second with a score of 106.36. Their free dance to "Harem" by Sarah Brightman was well choreographed and appealing to the audience, but it was marred by an unexpected stumble by Herring just before the ending. The relatively new team (they had been together just nine months at the time of the U.S. Championships) had limited expectations heading into the season and was pleased with the results.

"At the start of the season, we really weren't even thinking about nationals," Herring said. "As our season progressed, we were hoping to skate our best and maybe be middle of the pack and hope for good results."

Two additional University of Delaware FSC

teams took the final two steps on the novice ice dancing podium. Anastasia Cannuscio and Dean Copely won the bronze with their energetic performance to music from "Mr. and Mrs. Smith," and Isabella Cannuscio and Ian Lorello finished third in the free dance and fourth overall.

Within a year, Elena Cockerell's coaching progressed them to split twist lifts and death spirals. Kim loves throw jumps and she is looking forward to overhead press lifts without the harness.

"Elena is my mentor, motivator and the best cheerleader any adult skater can have," she said.

Kim, a computer programmer, and Tim, a graphic designer, agree this is the healthiest they have ever been.

"We have found a foster family at the rink," Kim said. "Skating has added strength to our marriage tenfold."

After the 2007 U.S. Adult Championships, the Minariks aim to one day compete at silver and gold before moving to the standard track.

"Moving across the ice is a unique feeling, and it's quite invigorating," Tim said. "I do my best to never take that for granted."

And Emily?

"We are raising the best little girl. Nothing compares to that," he said.



#### **EVA ALESSANDRA**

Hyannis, Mass. Age: 56 Home Club: Lighthouse FSC

Skating is Eva Alessandra's passion.

"I loved it as a child and still do," Alessandra said. "It is the closest thing to feeling like a bird. Yep, there have been a few bad landings.'

An 80-mile round trip from her small western Massachusetts town for skating lessons was too extravagant for her family to afford, so Alessandra skated on local ponds. She colored in her Carol Heiss books and dreamed about lessons. Skating twice a week for the past eight years, Alessandra recalls excitement at finding an adult group lesson when her son began skating.

"I didn't know you could learn to skate over age 12," she said.

Energetic and determined, Alessandra challenges herself to go as fast as she can. Her biggest challenge is program endurance.

"Skating is so hard for adults to learn." she said. "Passing tests and competing is such an accomplishment."


Skating has affected her life in indescribable

When you first started ice dancing did you ever picture yourself so famous? Do you enjoy being in the public eye?

*Kim:* We don't consider ourselves famous, but I am flattered that you do. I will say it is pretty cool to be in the public eye. One thing that

makes it really cool is the idea that we could be role models to younger skaters. I was so lucky to grow up with a ton of really great role models and I hope that Brent and I can take this opportunity to do the same for other skaters.

**Brent:** I don't think I ever pictured myself as being famous. When I was growing up I just focused on working hard. I'm honored that I have come to a point in my career where people can look up to me and see something they admire.

What is it like to compete at the U.S. Championships?

Emily Stevenson, 11 Southborough

Kim: I think the U.S. Championships is one of the most exciting competitions of the season. All the skaters have worked so hard leading up to the moment and all the fans seem so eager to watch the skating. There is so much energy buzzing around all week. One of my favorite parts is the 20-minute warm-up the day of the free dance. A lot of fans come out and cheer on everyone. It is a great honor to be a part of it.


*Brent:* For those of you who have never experienced the U.S. Championships, even as fans, I recommend it highly. I think that at our championships the level of skating is higher than in any other country in the world. For Kim and I, it's the highlight event of our season. We try and give our best performances to our best fans.

You are a great dance team to watch because you skate with so much energy and style. How many hours per week do you spend on off-ice training to get your presentation to its highest level?

Kim: Most of our off-ice training focuses on strength and conditioning, though it would probably be helpful to find off-ice exercises to work on our presentation too (thanks for the good idea!) Right now, to improve our presentation, we like to set specific intentions with each program run-through we do. For instance, one day we may want to focus on the music, while another day we may work on our connection with each other.

Brent: This is a complicated question to answer. I think that we back our skating with great life experiences. We've had the opportunity to experience emotions outside of skating that allow us to convey real emotions on the ice. One of our focuses for this year is to include more depth in our presentation by challenging ourselves with new dance classes and styles.



What is your favorite program to compete: the compulsory dance, the original dance or the free dance?

Kim: At competition, I like to think that my absolute favorite program to perform is the one I am performing at that moment. There are as many challenging things as there are fun things about each event, but I like to just focus on the fun things when I am about to compete.

Brent: Free dance, hands down. I get more excited for each event and the free dance is the biggest out there. It has the most reward and the most risk; and I love the pressure that places on me to perform.

When you get on the ice to start your program what do you think before the music starts? Are you excited or nervous?

Kim: I get both excited and nervous. Brent and I usually talk to each other right before we take our beginning place. We like to get connected and set a few goals together. I try to keep all these thoughts running as the music begins.

Brent: Excited. We train very hard, even when we are at competitions, so that we can trust ourselves when the time comes to compete. Right before the music starts I think about how fun the program is going to be.

What was your favorite original dance rhythm? Kaitlin Greer, 17 Corvallis, Ore.



# Adult skaters face unique problems

his month I was going to give you a glimpse into what's new in equipment, but I was sidetracked when an adult skater strolled through my doors.

She mentioned some problems that she frequently encounters while skating. After listening to her, I realized I've never taken the time to analyze the needs of the adult skater, and how those needs differ from those of the younger, more agile skater.

Reality check: skating isn't quite like riding a bicycle. Bikes go in straight lines and make wide turns. Skaters don't.

Let's start with how good a skater we think we are compared to how our coach or other people see us. Now, couple that with thoughts of youthfulness dancing in our heads...could this be an accident waiting to happen?

With that in mind, what are the needs of the adult skater who is 40 years and older?

#### Skate safely

- 1. Stretch before skating. No matter what your age, there are exercises one can do to limber up.
- 2. Don't do too much at one time. What you were able to do as a young skater, you can no longer do without feeling it in some way, shape or form. In other words, skate in moderation.
- 3. Know when enough is enough. When your body starts talking back to you, i.e. lower back pain, take a break, sit down and have a cup of java. It's OK to relax, take your time and talk to other skaters. Remember, this is quality time for you, so
- 4. Don't spend weeks or months trying to perfect a certain element. Be content with your ability to do it and move on. I'm not saying you shouldn't strive for perfection, but listen to what your body is telling you and try to separate it from your ego.

Allow me to share with you an example of what it might be like when your ego decides to take on the rest of your body.

Ego: I can't wait to get out on the ice to-

Body: Do I really have to go skating? I was out way too late last night.

Ego: Mind over matter, that's all. I'm going to do that sit spin.

Body: Remember pal, your lower back is in no shape to be bending up and down. If you're not careful, I'm going to put you in the hospital.

Ego: My shoulder feels fine today. A bit stiff, but fine. All I need to do is get out there and flail those arms around to loosen up that shoulder joint.

Body: Wouldn't listen to me, would you? Now take that to the doctor. Better yet, take two Aspirin and call him in the morning.

Ego: My skates fit fine. Let's get up and

Fifteen minutes later...

Body: What is that burning and cramping in my feet? I'm sure it's nothing. It'll go away in a bit.

Later that evening...

Body: Hey, ego, I thought you said my skates fit fine? Now look at me - sitting here soaking them in this hot tub of water. I have better things to do than sit around soaking.

I think you get the point.

If you are still competing, you have all the more reason to heed the above illustration. Don't feel like you have to push yourself so hard that nothing else matters. Remember, most of us do have to get up the next morning and earn a living. The last thing we need is an injury that would prevent us from doing so.

#### Equipment needs

Q: How come I no longer fit into my skates? They worked so well for me 10 years ago. A: Well, folks, the sands of time have shifted in more ways than one...deal with it. Adults who skated when they were young have the worst feet I've seen. Here are some tips on how deal with them.

- 1. Pay special attention to getting the proper size boot for your feet. You're not going to grow out of them any too soon, so spend a few extra dollars and go custom, if for no other reason than to get some extra bells and whistles that will make the boot easier to break in and a bit more comfortable. Sometimes it helps to have an extra quarter size added to give you just that little bit of extra wiggle room for your toes.
- 2. Don't get over-booted. I almost always see this with adults, who need their boots to bend much easier. Wearing a nice, soft, supple boot works best.
- 3. Fit of the boot. Without a proper fit, your dogs will be barking at you every time you're finished skating. Be sure to wear a thin, lightweight sock when being fitted for new boots. Proper fit and support go hand in hand.
- 4. Blades. No need for those extra large toe picks. Small-to-medium-sized picks will be just fine unless you're still able to pop off a few doubles. Just remember to buy a quality freestyle blade that will make jumping and spinning much easier for you. For some extra added stability, you may want to put on a blade that goes end to end on your boots. Doing this, however, will make your spins a bit more dif-

If you're new to skating, you may simply just want to buy an entry-level skate, knowing that within a year you'll be upgrading to a much more expensive boot and blade.





# World University Games leave lasting impression

tephanie Roth, Michael Peters and the Miami University synchronized skating team got a taste of Italy in January. They battled fellow college students from all over the world for international recognition and med-

als at the World University Games in Torino.

The World University Games, a global sporting event held every two years, unifies athletes from a variety of disciplines and nations, allowing them to live together for a week of intense competition and celebration of culture.

All skating events were held at the Palavela, the 8,000-seat arena that was upgraded for the 2006 Olympic Winter Games. During the weeklong competition, athletes lived and dined at the Olympic Village.

Roth and Peters were chosen to compete based on their performance in August at the U.S. Collegiate Championships held in Anaheim, Calif. The U.S. Collegiate Championships is the only event open exclusively to full-time college students at the junior and senior levels.

In Torino, Roth (Brookdale Community

College) placed ninth out of 31 senior ladies representing 21 countries.

"I don't think I could have expected or hoped for a more fulfilling experience," Roth said. "The Olympic Village was such a comfortable and positive place for an athlete to be."

Roth returned to the competitive arena in August to participate in the U.S. Collegiate Championships. She had suffered a back injury, undergone surgery and had been off the ice since January 2006.

"I was super satisfied with how I skated," Roth said. "It was a triumph for me after having such a disappointing end to last year."

In the men's event, Peters (University of Illinois) finished 12th out of 32 participants.

Peters became eligible for the World University Games when collegiate champion Ryan Bradley declined in order to participate at the 2007 State Farm U.S. Championships in Spokane, Wash. Peters was excited about performing his programs in front of a supportive audience at an international event.

"Men's short had an almost sell-out crowd,

and the noise level in that building was awesome," Peters said.

"I hate competing in front of an audience that just kind of sits there. These people were cheering everybody on, good skate or bad. All in all, it was just about the most fun I've ever had at any competition, at home or abroad."

Peters won a bronze medal at the 2005 State Farm U.S. Figure Skating Championships at the

Miami University was selected to compete based on its gold medal performance at the 2006 U.S. Synchronized Team Skating Champion-

Miami University skated strongly, placing placed fourth behind teams from Sweden, Finland and Russia.


#### BY STEPHANIE ROTH, BROOKDALE COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Airport staff and travelers gather to watch, wondering whether we are dancers, gymnasts or synchronized swimmers.

Late in the evening, we find that our flight to Prague is canceled. Twenty dejected skaters are shuttled to a hotel to catch up on sleep and dream about skating.

Early Thursday morning, we find out our flight is delayed once again. Déjà vu. As a result, we miss our scheduled morning practice. Hoping to catch a flight as soon as possible, our team manager tells us to prepare our hair and makeup for competition, and to put on our tights and earrings, so we can change quickly once we arrive at the arena for evening practice.

Sadly, we miss this opportunity to warm up and run through our programs, as we don't arrive in Prague until around midnight. While it is unfortunate that we miss our second practice, we are grateful to finally be here.

We wake up Friday morning feeling tired from days of traveling and head to the practice arena. Even though the arena is freezing, it feels good to be on the ice.

We compete our short program late Saturday night, giving an entertaining performance. Our scores improve from previous competitions, and we place fourth with roughly 51 points, while the Haydenettes are first with 56 points.

Later, we find out that the scores were not added correctly. The scores are eventually adjusted, which changes the placement of a few teams. We stay in the same position, but we now have 56 points.

Our free skate starts around 7 p.m. on Sunday. Everyone is anxious to see how the crowd will react to our Hawaiian-themed program. Gratefully, the audience loves it. We end up with roughly 107 points, which, at the time put us in second place, with the Haydenettes and the Rockettes still to skate.

After what seems like eternity, our team manager comes running in shouting, "You got third." We are all jumping up and down, screaming and embracing one another. The awards ceremony is surreal; it is such an honor to represent the U.S. on the podium. One of the goals we set for the season was to medal at our international competition, and we did that. The Prague Cup is a success.

"I just thought this was a great opportunity to


introduce and inspire more people to figure skate here in Florida, as well as a fun, unique and exciting experience for my skaters to perform," Marino said.






