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
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

International assignments announced for synchronized skating teams

Collins, '76 Olympic Team to be feted in Saint Paul

One of the behind-the-scenes gatherings at the 2016 Prudential U.S. Figure Skating Championships promises to be extra special as U.S. Figure Skating's Athletes Advisory Committee honors one of skating's most beloved figures, longtime Minnesota resident Tom "Tommy" Collins, as well as members of the 1976 U.S. Olympic Team.

Collins, the man behind the Champions on Ice tour, is still adored and appreciated today by generations of elite skaters who performed in his wildly popular, exhibition-style ice shows that toured from

The best skaters on the planet, both amateur and professional, entertained packed major arenas from coast to coast, and Collins was committed to taking care of his incredible talent. There were chartered flights, Broadway shows and healthy paychecks, because Collins wanted to make sure that the only thing the skaters had to worry about was putting on a great performance.

"Tom Collins isn't just the most successful skating entrepreneur and promoter in history," USA Today sports columnist Christine Brennan said. "He's also skating's nicest quy. Tom not only paid the salaries of countless skaters for decades, he also made sure that they and their families had food, clothing and supplies — especially those from other countries who came to America with nothing. Tom Collins' generosity, insight and enthusiasm forever changed the sport of figure skating for the better."

Names of stars such as Brian Boitano, Michelle Kwan, Scott Hamilton, Debi Thomas, Katarina Witt, Nancy Kerrigan, Alexei Yagudin, Elvis Stojko and Dorothy Hamill lit up marquees during the height of figure skating's popularity. Friendships were forged between skaters from different countries and a tight-knit fraternity was created that still exists today.

"I've got memories that will last a lifetime," Collins, a member of the U.S., Canadian and World Halls of Fame, said. "What I've been through in my life with skating has just been unbelievable. People say I'm famous; well hell, the skaters made me. Without the skaters I wouldn't be anything."

Kwan said Collins was like a father to her and all of the skaters.

"Every skater was his child and he wanted to care for them," Kwan said. "And it wasn't just on the tour, but throughout the competitive season he would stay in touch with everyone. I was 13 when I started on the tour. I was the baby, the rookie. He and the whole Collins family took me under their wing. They made sure I had friends to hang out with and they took care of my mom, who was traveling

"Tommy loves figure skating and he treated the tour as a passion, but he made sure we had fun, too. It was a labor of love for him."

Collins, who grew up in a small gold mining town 400 miles north of Toronto, loved ice skating as a child and performed with Holiday on Ice as a young man before going on to work in the entertainment industry with such musical greats as Neil Diamond, John Denver and Bob Dylan. That's where he learned how to market entertainers, promote rock 'n' roll shows and, most notably, how to take care of his talent.

"Why do we love Tommy?" Boitano said. "One of the many reasons is that Tommy is a skater first and foremost and he never forgot what it was like to be one."

For his first two decades, Collins' shows toured right after the World Championships and included all the champions and medalists from the World and Olympic Winter Games. His Champions on Ice tour became an annual event due to the sport's growing popularity after the 1988 Calgary Olympic Games that featured champions and medalists such as Boitano, Witt, Debi Thomas, Kitty and Peter Carruthers, and Elizabeth Manley.

The tour's popularity, though, reached its highest point in 1994 following the Tonya Harding-Nancy Kerrigan scandal.

"It [the tour] blew the roof off all the buildings in America," Collins said. "We would do two and three shows in a town. It was just unbelievable. Nothing could be bigger than 1994."

Several members of the 1976 Olympic Team, who will share in this special reception in Saint Paul, were also big names on the Collins tours, including four-time U.S. champion Linda Fratianne.

This year marks the 40th anniversary of the 1976 U.S. Olympic Team, and Jim Millns, who with ice dance partner Colleen O'Connor earned the bronze medal, is excited to see many of his former team-

"As monumental of an event ['76 Olympics] as that was, you get caught up in life and you kind of forget about some of that stuff," Millns said. "But then you go back and start to reminisce and memories just flood out, all of the good stuff comes out. I'm excited about that.

Even though I've crossed paths with virtually everyone from the team intermittently, it's been se" many years and I'm so anxious just to sit and visit with these people."

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Kansas City to host 2017 U.S. Championships

Jazz, barbecue and figure skating will be on the menu next January when Kansas Citym Missouri, hosts the 2017 Prudential U.S. Figure Skating Championships.

"We are thrilled to host such a prestigious event," said Kathy Nelson, a member of the Kansas City Host Committee and President/CEO of Kansas City Sports Commission & Foundation. Joining the Host Committee are Visit K.C. and the Sprint Center.

Two venues less than 10 miles apart will house the U.S. Championships Jan. 14–22, 2017. All senior and junior events will be at the downtown Sprint Center. Silverstein Eye Centers Arena in Independence will host all juvenile, intermediate and novice events.

Outside the venues, Kansas City won't disappoint. With two large and distinct entertainment areas — the Power & Light District and the Country Club Plaza — there will be plenty of dining, shopping and fun to be had.

If you're a foodie, you'll enjoy exploring what Saveur magazine calls "America's next great culinary destination." For those seeking some nightlife, there are 40 live jazz clubs. And history buffs certainly won't want to miss the National World War I Museum.

In between figure skating sessions, sports fans can take in The College Basketball Experience, conveniently located inside the Sprint Center.

Nelson and the Host Committee are excited to share the U.S. Championships with this sports-minded region.

"Part of our mission is to bring events to Kansas City that provide opportunities for our community to engage in sport, either through participation or spectating," she said. "We believe once fans watch this sport in person, they may be then tempted to participate, which could then help grow the sport of figure skating even more in our community."

Olympic champs among performers at tree lighting

The lighting of the Christmas tree in Bryant Park has become a holiday tradition not only for residents of New York City, but for everyone watching on NBC nationwide. On Dec. 1, the annual celebration kicked off with the Tree Lighting Skate-Tacular, a first-ever performance of an original theatrical ice production, starring Olympians Nancy Kerrigan and Johnny Weir, Olympic champions Meryl Davis and Charlie White and Brian Boitano, and the U.S. synchronized champion Haydenettes.

Narrated by actor Danny Aiello at the Bank of America Winter Village at Bryant Park in New York City, the show featured music from Big Band Holidays, a new album by the Jazz at Lincoln Center Orchestra with Wynton Marsalis, and a holiday tale

about a special family on the night before Christmas, written for Bryant Park by New York playwright Jon Caren. The event concluded with the lighting of the famous 55-foot tree, followed by public skating at The Rink at Rockefeller Center to live music curated by Jazz at Lincoln Center.



Skating community honors fallen officer

Police officer Garrett Swasey, the 1992 U.S. junior ice dance champion, was laid to rest Dec. 4 after a memorial service attended by an estimated 5,000 people in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Swasev, 44, died in the line of duty Nov. 27 while responding to a live shooter at a Planned Parenthood office in Colorado Springs. Police officers and other first responders from across the nation filled the chapel of New Life Church.

The figure skating community also paid its respects. Childhood friend and two-time Olympic medalist Nancy Kerrigan, dance partner Christine Fowler-Binder and Olympic silver medalist Paul Wylie flew to Colorado Springs to honor Swasey. They were joined by friends from the Broadmoor Skating Club and U.S. Figure Skating staff. Up until his death, Swasey was coaching ice dance at the city's Sertich Ice Center.

Swasey and Fowler-Binder moved to Colorado Springs in 1991 to train under coach Sandra Hess. After his competitive career, he coached in Wisconsin and Colorado. In 2009, he became a police officer at the University of Colorado Colorado Springs.

On Dec. 11, Cheyenne Mountain High School's hockey team paid tribute to Swasey before its game with Pueblo County. As both teams lined up at their blue lines, Broadmoor SC coach Erik Schulz, who trained with Swasey in the early 1990s, skated to center ice and placed a bouquet of white flowers on the ice. U.S. champion Jason Brown and 2014 U.S. junior silver medalist Jordan Moeller then skated out in tribute and faced the crowd for a moment of silence. Schulz is a UCCS graduate; Brown and Moeller attend UCCS, where Swasey served.

Swasey's wife, Rachel, requested that money donated during Brown and Moeller's "pass the skate" be given to the U.S. Figure Skating Memorial Fund, which supported Swasey as a competitor. Chevenne Mountain donated the game's ticket revenue to the fund as well.



Sladky featured in People magazine

In November, Judy Sladky was recognized for more than just her five U.S. ice dance titles and four World medals with partner James Sladky. The now-65-year-old Indiana native was recently featured by People magazine for her work as Snoopy — a character she has played for nearly four decades after being handpicked for the role by Charles Schulz, aka "Sparky," at the Redwood Empire Ice Arena, which is also known as Snoopy's Home Ice.

"I am 4-foot-10 and Sparky said, 'You are Snoopy, you act like him, you make me laugh, you're it," Sladky told People. "I never auditioned. He just called me and said, 'We are doing a TV special, "Snoopy's Musical on Ice," and will you be my Snoopy?' I have been [playing him] ever since."

After 37 years and 175 appearances last year alone, Sladky shows no signs of slowing down, even after skating in countless shows, throwing out numerous first pitches at Major League Baseball games, flying in zero gravity, doing backflips on trampolines, performing on a flying trapeze, and promoting the 2015 full-length feature The Peanuts Movie. When the magazine asked how long she intended to play the role, she responded with "Forever!" without missing a beat. "I have to make it to the Oscars."

Hamilton spreads U.S. Championships excitement

Scott Hamilton, a U.S., World and Olympic champion, traveled to Saint Paul, Minnesota, December 3-5 to spread the word about the 2016 Prudential U.S. Figure Skating Championships.

"When things like this roll around, you always hear people say, 'Oh, if only we'd known,"' Hamilton said in a radio interview with KS95 radio's morning show. "Well now you've got one month!"



Former ice dance medalist thriving in law enforcement career

Although he hasn't been involved in skating for more than a decade, Michael Verlich still has an idea for an ice dance program he wants to choreograph. A medalist in ice dance at the U.S. Championships at both the junior and senior levels, he worked as a coach and choreographer for nearly a decade, but turned his attention to another profession in the late 1990s.

"I have a program idea in my mind," said Verlich, 49, a sergeant with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department. "I still wish that someday possibly I would be able to choreograph this program to 'Funeral for a Friend' by Elton John for a team. I have this whole concept for it."

As competitive skaters, Verlich and partner Jeanne Miley were known for their high-energy free dances and incredible audience rapport. The two teamed up midseason when his then-partner quit; he and Miley were already attracting attention by the time the U.S. Championships rolled around.

Verlich's late mother was a skater and took him and his brother to the rink. Around age 9, he met coach Darlene Gilbert and began ice dance. When he started competing at the national level in the mid-1980s, there were few teams from the West Coast, and sometimes he felt underappreciated. He and partner Jill Heiser won bronze in junior dance at the 1985 U.S. Championships. They competed in seniors for a couple of years, until she quit and he teamed with Miley. There was so little time to prepare for their first nationals, Miley just slotted into the programs that were already choreographed. Right from the start, their chemistry was obvious.

"I can actually think back to the days of when we first started skating together," Verlich said. "We tried out and did some stroking laps and circles. In my mind I can feel what she feels like to hold on to going round in the circles even to this

A special memory is the 1991 Olympic Festival in Los Angeles, because he loved the multisport format. They competed through the 1992 season and then Miley retired. Verlich teamed with Jennifer Nocito for about a year and a half and then he too was ready to move on.

When the rules opened up allowing competitors to coach, Verlich started doing some coaching. After ending his competitive days, he turned his attention to coaching and choreography full time. He was traveling all over the U.S., working with various coaches, including Igor Shpilband.

"I did choreography for singles," Verlich said. "I did a lot of stroking and power classes to build up endurance. My primary thing was dance. I partnered a number of people through tests."

He said he'd have to look at old notes for names, but he thinks he worked with some of the prominent names in the sport when they were starting out in ice dance.

In 1997, the opportunity arose to do police work and he joined the Compton, California, police force. When that department disbanded and the city of Compton contracted with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's office in September 2000, he left coaching to go into law enforcement full time.

Today, Verlich's job entails supervising about 100 people, ranging from uniformed sheriffs to security assistants. The Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department oversees anything that involves transit, including metropolitan buses and trains, from San Diego to Malibu and beyond.

We deploy along the Southern California railways, freeways and everything like that," Verlich said. "If you're on a bus or train and a crime occurs, one of our guys is going to take care of you."

His job entails both an administrative component — handling evaluations and complaints — and fieldwork. There are offices in downtown Los Angeles at Union Station and in Watts. A third office will be opening shortly.

While some people may wonder how he made his way from the ice to law enforcement, Verlich said police work was the only thing other than skating that really captured his attention. As much as he loved choreography and coaching, being self-employed had frustrations. He appreciates a job that comes with retirement benefits. His training and focus as a competitive athlete still come into play.

"The dedication to a competitive sport such as skating, your body's pretty conditioned," he said. "Even now, my body responds really well to any type of rigorous thing that I will put it through. It's muscle memory and a lot of things that 20-someodd years of skating provided.

"In skating, there are so many details that you have to think about," he continued. "You have to be an extremely detailed thinker based on technique, musicality, athleticism and everything like that. The ability to multitask is one of the most valuable things that came with me from my upbringing in skating.

"When you're in police work, there are a lot of different factors that you have to take into consideration. There's officer safety. There's the situation that you're in tactically — where you're going to be, what type of cover you're going to use, how big is the opponent that you're against. All of these things have to come into your thought process. That ability to multitask is hugely important as far as keeping safe out here."

It wasn't easy to go from being semifamous, traveling the world to compete and being asked for autographs, to chasing perpetrators, but he discovered he thrived on the work.

He found a life partner in Yvonne, his wife of six years. Verlich was diagnosed with cancer in 2011 and had a tumor removed from his lower intestine. Unsure whether children are possible after chemotherapy, they've started trying and are letting nature take its course. In the meantime, they dote on their three shih tzus.

Verlich remains close with Gilbert and they see each other fairly frequently. He keeps in touch with skating friends via Facebook and tries to see people in the Southern California area in person when he gets the chance.

He doesn't follow skating closely, but he took great pleasure in seeing Meryl Davis and Charlie White win Olympic gold in Sochi.

"It was well-deserved," he said. "We competed internationally — not just my partner and I, but we as in the American ice dance teams - a long time and let's face it, those Eastern bloc judges were not giving any support. It was a struggle just to get recognized on the international circuit, let alone at the World-medal level.

"Credit a lot of people like Igor Shpilband that really brought life to the ice dance program," he added. "You get people into it at a young age and you can produce champions."

It's a decisive 'No' as to whether he'd ever considering competing in adult dance, but thanks to YouTube the past remains vibrant.

"Every year at holiday time when people start putting up holiday decorations, my videos resurface," he said. "Someone pulls them up and throws one up in the middle of a briefing. I have to explain to the new employees that I'm supervising that I used to do this."

A great story has all of the essential elements: charismatic characters, obstacles to overcome and the ability to stand the test of time. Sports, particularly figure skating, have no shortage of compelling stories to share with their audiences. One storyline that continues to resonate with nearly every fan is the one of "The Waitress and the Truck Driver."

The story of Calla Urbanski-Petka and Rocky Marval, the two-time U.S. pairs champions and 1992 Olympians, is full of twists and turns, and their journey to success was anything but a straight path.

Both started skating when they were young — Marval at age 6 and Urbanski-Petka as a toddler. Urbanski-Petka didn't take up pairs skating until she was in her 20s — a relatively late age. And though it's been widely reported that she paired up with Marval in 1990, it was actually four years earlier that they first skated together.

"I believe it was for the junior pairs test, but we broke up before we went to regionals that same year," Urbanski-Petka said.

In 1990, they came back together. Coached by Ron Ludington, they rapidly climbed the U.S. and international ranks.

"We had quick success after skating together for a short amount of time," Marval said. "We were second at nationals in 1991 and made the World Team that year. We won Skate America in the fall and medaled at the NHK Trophy. It came very quickly for us."

Ric LaCivita, a producer for CBS Sports, met the dynamic duo in early 1991. LaCivita was overseeing figure skating coverage for the network at the time. Though he was a skating novice, he knew immediately that Marval and Urbanski-Petka weren't the average "cookie-cutter" figure skaters.

"They were very different people," LaCivita said. "Calla was so charismatic — tough, a street fighter and, no doubt in my mind, she was beyond determined. She was 30 or 31 (at the time) so she was old for a skater. She didn't fit the mold but to me she was so very real and so very different than what I, as a newcomer, had seen in the world of skating. Rocky was quiet but also had an inner resolve. There was a strength behind his puppy dog eyes."

As different as they were in personality, they did share some common ground.

"They had similar backgrounds — blue collar, two young athletes who had pulled themselves by their bootstraps," LaCivita said.

To pay for skating expenses, Urbanski-Petka worked as a waitress, while Marval co-owned a small trucking com-

"'The Waitress and the Truck Driver' was a headline that would resonate with any audience," he said. "Calla and Rocky were the 'every person.' They represented the hardworking, assembly line, unionized laborers. They represented the stay-at-home moms who had dreams, and the ladies out there on their feet for 12 hours pulling down minimum wages and hoping for a good day in tips. Rocky was the guy driving the truck 20 hours a day, hauling goods across the U.S. of A."

It wasn't long before TV audiences across the globe knew the team's story. "We loved it; it made us household names," Marval said.

Urbanski-Petka and Marval finished 10th at the 1992 Winter Olympics. They continued to train and won their second U.S. title in 1993. But soon after, they parted ways.

"The partnership was successful on the ice, but we butted heads," Marval admitted. "It wasn't always a smooth training environment."

They each found a new partner and worked toward making the 1994 U.S. Olympic Team. Marval and his partner, Natasha Kuchiki, finished fourth at that year's U.S. Championships, while Urbanski-Petka and Joseph Mero placed seventh.

But a few months later, with the encouragement of their choreographer Phillip Mills, Urbanski-Petka and Marval were a team once again.

"He was instrumental in bringing us back together," Urbanski-Petka said.

Mills, who first worked with the team in 1992, knew they had something special together.

"Although Calla and Rocky were so talented and capable, and they could skate with anyone, I really felt that the magic was in them together as the powerhouse pairs team they had always been,"

The team competed one last time in amateur competition, at the 1994 Goodwill Games in St. Petersburg, Russia, before moving on to their professional careers. Marval spent 10 years working as a sports agent and Urbanski-Petka coached. They have performed together occasionally since that time, most recently in late 2010.

"The last time Calla and I skated together was for the Caesars event (The Caesars Tribute: A Salute to the Golden Age of American Skating, in Atlantic City, New Jersey) in December 2010," Marval said. "We only practiced together about four times before we skated in the show. It was the first time in 10 years we had skated together."

Today, they are still closely connected to the skating world. Marval is the general manager and skating director at The Igloo in Mount Laurel, New Jersey. Urbanski-Petka now lives in Florida and is a coach at the Palm Beach Skate Zone, as well as the president of the Palm Beach Figure Skating Club.

"What I learned at the Skating Club of Wilmington and at the University of Delaware (where Urbanski-Petka trained for several years), I'm passing the traditions on to the new generations here," she said.

In addition, Urbanski-Petka is continuing her education in the sport.

"I'm working on my masters rating now, trying to put a stamp on this part of my career," she said.

Family is a focus for both skaters as well. Urbanski-Petka has been married to her husband Ed for 13 years, and has a 7-year-old daughter, Olivia. Marval and his wife, two-time Olympic bronze medalist Isabelle Brasseur, have a daughter as well. Gabriella Marvaldi is a rising pairs skater on the junior circuit with her partner Cody Dolkiewicz.

Urbanski-Petka and Marval's contribution to figure skating has not been forgotten, Mills said.

"I think what made Calla and Rocky special was the fact they were great ambassadors for our country," he said. "They worked harder than anyone and never expected anything handed to them that they did not earn. They are two of the finest people I have ever worked with."

And 20-something years later, they continue to inspire others.

"I believe Calla and Rocky embodied the very best of the American athlete," LaCivita said. "They overcame every obstacle put in their way to climb to the very top of their sport in this country. They put in the work, the effort, and paid the painful price of pushing their skills toward excellence. They were the underdogs who did not know the word quit."



Ice dancers Madison Chock and Evan Bates emerged with the only medal for the United States — a silver — at the 2015 ISU Grand Prix Final, Dec. 10-13, in Barcelona. Two ladies, one pairs team and three ice dance teams represented the country at the event.

The Michigan-based team, silver medalists at the 2014 Grand Prix Final, also in Barcelona, placed second in the short dance but had to fight through their recently revamped free dance and placed third in that segment.

"We pretty much rechoreographed about half of this program in the last three weeks," Bates said. "It was a new challenge. To come to the Grand Prix Final, where you're expected to be in tip-top shape, with a program that feels new, is difficult. Considering the circumstances, we did well.'

The 2015 U.S. champions and World silver medalists, Chock and Bates finished with 177.55 points. Canada's Kaitlyn Weaver and Andrew Poje defended their title with a score of 182.66, while Italy's Anna Cappellini and Luca Lanotte secured the bronze medal with 176.37 points.

Chock and Bates' coach and choreographer, Igor Shpilband, began rechoreographing their free dance to "Concerto No. 2" by Rachmaninoff following the team's silver-medal performance in early November at Cup of China.

"These were changes we felt we needed to make," Chock said. "We need more time to train the movement and the nuances of the program. We really want to make the most of it and give it all we've got."

Team USA's Maia Shibutani and Alex Shibutani fought their own battle, as Alex became ill before the team's free dance.

"All today he's been extremely sick," Maia said after the event. "At practice this morning we weren't able to do much. He really decided from the beginning that he wanted to fight through it. For me, that was so emotional because he's not just my partner, he's my brother, he's family."

The Shibutanis, who train in Michigan under Marina Zoueva, qualified for the Grand Prix Final with the top overall score of the Grand Prix Series, which they earned at NHK Trophy two weeks before the Grand Prix Final.

Madison Hubbell and Zachary Donohue finished sixth with 163.20 points after Donohue fell in the free dance.

"It took us by surprise," Hubbell said. "It was one of those things, a fluke. We're proud of how far we've come this season and the GOEs we're getting on elements now, as well as pretty good levels. We're looking forward to getting more training heading into nationals."

WAGNER, GOLD FINISH OFF PODIUM

Ashley Wagner and Gracie Gold, who train in California, struggled at times en route to fourth- and fifth-place finishes, respectively.

Wagner, the three-time and reigning U.S.

champion, placed sixth in the short program before rallying with the third-best free skate, setting a personal-best score by more than eight points. She finished with a score of 199.81.

"Part of my problem is that I don't have an exact explanation as to why I skate one way or the other," Wagner said. "That's going to be my biggest challenge yet. This competition shows that I'm human and I make mistakes, but that under pressure, if I get myself into the right mentality, I can keep it together."

Wagner has qualified for four consecutive Grand Prix Finals, winning silver in 2012 and bronze in 2013 and 2014. Last year, she also finished sixth after the short program and third in the free skate, but ended up on the podium.

"The long program is a little bit less daunting, because there is room for error and there's room to make up points," Wagner said. "This sport isn't about being a long program or short program skater, it's about being the whole package. That's my mission."

Gold, the U.S. silver medalist, placed fifth in both of her programs. Gold qualified for the Grand Prix Final last year, but had to withdraw due to a stress fracture in her left foot.

"It's a good program, but a program is only as good as the skater," Gold said of her mistakefilled free skate to Stravinsky's Firebird. "I had had a second and part of a first place in my Grand Prix this year, but Japan Open was the



same result (fifth place). Japan Open definitely took some of the wind out of my sails. The Grand Prix events were OK, but I haven't been able to get back to the standard that's required at this level."

Looking forward, Gold said her coaching team will need to re-evaluate the jump content in her programs.

"I've only done one clean program this season," she said. "At this point, you should be skating clean programs. I'm pretty far behind in that regard and my consistency is lacking."

Still, Gold said the U.S. Championships provide great motivation to improve, with her goal of winning the title and a medal at Worlds still intact.

Russia's Evgenia Medvedeva won gold with 222.54 points. Japan's Satoko Miyahara took the silver medal with 208.85 points. Russia's Elena Radionova claimed the bronze with 201.13 points.

SCIMECA AND KNIERIM CHALK ONE UP TO EXPERIENCE

Alexa Scimeca and Christopher Knierim, the first U.S. pairs team to earn a Grand Prix Final berth since 2007, placed seventh with 177.42 points.

The Colorado Springs-based team hit a tough stretch in their free skate, including problems with their opening quad twist and side-by-side triple Salchows.

"There wasn't any pressure put on us to do well here, but I think it weighed a little that it's been a long drought since an American team was here for pairs," Scimeca said. "Deep down, we wanted to stand at the top. There was a little bit of that going on subconsciously. That's what happens when you want to be the best."

Russia's Ksenia Stolbova and Fedor Klimov earned the gold medal with 229.44 points. Canada's Meagan Duhamel and Eric Radford secured silver with 216.67 points, while Russia's Yuko Kavaguti and Alexander Smirnov collected the bronze medal with 206.59 points.

HANYU SHATTERS RECORDS

Olympic champion Yuzuru Hanyu of Japan destroyed the record book with an overall score of 330.43 points. His record-breaking free skate included three quads, including one in combination with a triple toe. He also landed two triple Axels in combination.

His training mate, Javier Fernandez of Spain, won the silver medal with a score of 292.95, while Japan's Shomo Uno claimed the bronze with 276.79 points.

Two-time U.S. junior men's champion Nathan Chen and U.S. junior ice dance champions Lorraine McNamara and Quinn Carpenter each won their first Junior Grand Prix (JGP) Final titles Dec. 9-13 in Barcelona, Spain, after competing in the JGP Series since 2012.

Chen, who trains in California, stayed undefeated in his 2015 JGP Series campaign, winning both segments in Barcelona in spite of two falls in his free skate.

"I'm very happy that I won this year; it's always been a goal of mine," Chen said after his free skate. "I want to clean everything up before nationals. I hope to skate better than I did today. I can do a lot better and that is not the skate I want to put out."

Chen ultimately won the title by 13.82 points, and he attempted three quadruple jumps, two successfully, in his free skate. He finished with 225.04 points, ahead of silver medalist Dmitri Aliev of Russia (211.22) and Sota Yamamoto of Japan (205.31).

Vincent Zhou, the 2013 U.S. junior champion, finished fourth after missing the 2014-15 season due to injury. Zhou earned a pair of silver medals to punch his first ticket to the JGP Final, finishing less than a point from the podium with 204.56 points.

McNamara and Carpenter, who won both of their JGP assignments in September, topped the podium by nearly eight points, despite falling short of the international-best scores they set earlier this

"Lorraine and I have had a long time since our JGPs," Carpenter said. "Maybe our scores weren't quite as good but you can't attribute that to our progress in general. I think score variation throughout the season is to be expected."

The Rockville, Maryland-based team finished with 158.26 points. The silver medal went to Alla Loboda and Pavel Drozd of Russia with 150.86, while McNamara and Carpenter's compatriots and training mates, Rachel and Michael Parsons, won the bronze medal. The sibling duo and U.S. junior silver medalists earned their highest-ever JGP Final finish with 144.41 points.

Russians Polina Tsurskaya and Maria Sotskova won gold and silver in the ladies event, scoring 195.28 and 184.01 points, respectively. The bronze went to Japan's Marin Honda with 178.64. Russia won its second title of the event in the pairs competition, where Ekaterina Borisova and Dmitry Sopot took top honors with 171.86 points. Their teammates Amina Atakhanova and Ilia Spirdinov won bronze with 162.00. The silver went to Anna Duskova and Martin Bidar of the Czech Republic with 162.33 points.

Team USA was not represented in the ladies or pairs events.

The 2015 ISU Grand Prix of Figure Skating Series made its final stop Nov. 27-29 at NHK Trophy in Nagano, Japan, where Team USA brought home four medals and punched four tickets to the 2015 Grand Prix Final.

U.S. silver medalists Maia Shibutani and Alex Shibutani won the ice dance title by more than five points, not only returning to the top of the Grand Prix podium for the first time in four years, but doing so by earning the highest overall score for ice dance in the 2015 Series. The siblings qualified for their third-career and second-consecutive Grand Prix Final with 174.43 points.

"Last time we won a Grand Prix was back in 2011, and that was also NHK Trophy, so today was just really special," Maia said. "It is a great way for us to continue our season and we're excited to go back to Barcelona for the Final."

Winning the bronze medal, Team USA's Madison Hubbell and Zachary Donohue set personal-best marks across the board en route to an overall score of 167.49 and their first trip to the Grand Prix Final.

Russia's Ekaterina Bobrova and Dmitri Soloviev won the silver medal (169.33), while Americans Anastasia Cannuscio and Colin McManus finished sixth (138.41).

U.S. pairs champions Alexa Scimeca and Chris Knierim added a bronze to their collection of Grand Prix Series medals following a second-place finish at Skate America a month earlier. The duo generated 190.66 points and became the first American pairs team to qualify for the Final since 2007.

'Compared to Skate America this (free skate) program had some improvements in the jumping passes and the throw Salchow, but we lost a lot points on the twist and the spins," Scimeca said. "Our goal for the next event would be to combine the strengths from our first and second Grand Prix to make a solid program."

Canadians Meagan Duhamel and Eric Radford won gold with 202.72 points, while China's Xiaoyu Yu and Yang Jin claimed silver with 191.02 points. Team USA's Jessica Calalang and Zack Sidhu finished seventh with a score of 150.26.

2013 U.S. pewter medalist Courtney Hicks recorded her highest-ever Grand Prix finish, earning personal-best scores in the short program and overall to win the silver medal. She finished with 183.12 points.

"It was the most complete skate I've done on the Grand Prix and it's the best long I've done in the past couple of years," Hicks said. "It just felt good to skate the way I have practiced."

Team USA's Ashley Wagner fought through her performances in Japan, settling for fourth place with 179.33 points. Wagner won her first assignment at Skate Canada, giving the three-time U.S. champion enough points to qualify for the Final. The feat marks the first time any U.S. lady has ever qualified for the event in four consecutive

Japan's Satoko Miyahara and Mao Asada won gold and bronze, respectively, with 203.11 and 182.99 points. American Mirai Nagasu placed fifth with 175.64 points.

Japan's Yuzuru Hanyu secured the men's event with the highest score in ISU history — 322.40. China's Boyang Jin grabbed silver with 266.43 points, and Hanyu's teammate Takahito Mura won bronze with 242.21 points. Team USA's Grant Hochstein finished fourth with a score of 235.63, while Richard Dornbush placed eighth with 217.50 points.







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Ross Miner stood on a Grand Prix podium for the first time in three seasons at Rostelecom Cup, the fifth of six stops in the ISU Grand Prix Series.

Miner, a three-time U.S. medalist, set personal-best scores across the board to win the bronze medal with a score of 248.92. He finished behind World champion Javier Fernandez of Spain (271.43) and 2014 World Junior silver medalist Adian Pitkeev of Russia (250.47).

"I went out there and I stayed calm, which is something I struggled with in the past," Miner said.

The medal marks Miner's first in the Series since placing third at 2012 NHK Trophy.

U.S. silver medalist Adam Rippon came back from a sixth-place short program with the second-best free skate, missing the podium by less than a point. Rippon earned a personal-best score of 169.86 points in the second segment, en route to a combined 248.63 points.

Polina Edmunds, the 2014 U.S. silver medalist, led Team USA's efforts in the ladies event, finishing just behind a home-country podium sweep by World bronze medalist Elena Radionova (211.32), Skate America champion Evgenia Medvedeva (206.76) and Olympic champion Adelina Sotnikova (185.11).

"I was excited to go to Moscow because I have native roots in Russia," Edmunds said. "I was happy to meet my relatives and friends there while representing the United States. My short program was great and I was happy to finally see my points rise. My free skate also went well. Last season I made mistakes in my short programs early in the season and this season I skated my programs more confidently in the Grand Prix."

Edmunds earned a personal-best score of 65.29 for her short program and finished the event with 183.20 points. Her teammate, Hannah Miller, finished 11th with 145.21 points.

U.S. pairs bronze medalists Tarah Kayne and Danny O'Shea finished fourth with 181.23 points.

"We are happy with our progress, and despite a slow start with a flawed short program, we rallied with a strong free skate," O'Shea said. "We are pleased to have moved up after the long, and feel that overall this program was an improvement from Skate America."


The segment score of 122.45 they earned for their free skate was an international personal best, while their overall standing marks the team's highest-ever Grand Prix finish.

Russians stood on the top two steps of the podium with Olympic silver medalists Ksenia Stolbova and Fedor Klimov taking gold (214.70) and Yuko Kavaguti and Alexander Smirnov winning silver (208.02). China's Cheng Peng and Hao Zhang won bronze (193.04).

Team USA didn't have any ice dance entries. The top step of the podium belonged to Kaitlyn Weaver and Andrew Poje of Canada (173.58). They edged Italy's 2014 World champions Anna Cappellini and Luca Lanotte (171.61) and Russia's Victoria Sinitsina and Nikita Katsalapov (167.40).







TRAGEDY FORCES AN END TO COMPETITION

Trophée Eric Bompard in Bordeaux, France, the fourth stop in the 2015 ISU Grand Prix Series, will be remembered for what happened off the ice.

Following the short program on the evening of Friday, Nov. 13, the host country was brought to its knees as reports of terrorism in Paris began spreading throughout the world. Coordinated attacks took place in six locations throughout the capital city, killing 130 people and leaving more than 350 wounded.

In the wake of the attacks, France declared a state of emergency, leaving the status of Saturday's events in question. Although the city of Bordeaux is situated approximately 360 miles south of Paris, and the ISU originally expressed its intention to carry on with the event as planned, at noon local time on Saturday, Nov. 14, the remaining segments of competition were cancelled.

"First and foremost, our thoughts and concerns are with those affected by this senseless tragedy in Paris," U.S. Figure Skating's High Performance Director Mitch Moyer said, following the announcement. "All Team USA athletes, coaches and support staff are safe and will begin the process of traveling from Bordeaux back to the United States. While the cancellation of Trophée Bompard is unprecedented, we fully support and respect the decision made by the French government. Today, our focus is on supporting the French, not the results of a sports competition."

After the short program, Team USA was poised to take home hardware, sitting atop the standings in both ladies and ice dance. Gracie Gold, the 2014 U.S. champion, earned a personal-best 73.32 points for an outstanding performance to "El Choclo" by Ángel Villoldo, and U.S. bronze medalists Madison Hubbell and Zachary Donohue scored 64.45 for their efforts to k.d. lang's "Hallelujah."

Gold was joined by Angela Wang, who placed eighth with 53.60 points. Max Aaron earned 72.91 points to finish seventh, while Marissa Castelli and Mervin Tran sat sixth in pairs with a personal-best score of 62.63.

On Nov. 23, the ISU announced that the results of the short program would count as the final result.

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A WARM RECEPTION

TOP SKATERS PRIMED TO LEAVE THEIR MARK IN SAINT PAUL

January temperatures in Saint Paul, Minnesota, drop well below the freezing mark, but figure skating fans will stay warm watching the hot storylines set to play out at the state capital's Xcel Energy Center Jan. 15–24.

There's Ashley Wagner versus Gracie Gold, a face-off of contrasting styles and high drama. Both earned spots at the Grand Prix Final in Barcelona this fall, where they placed fourth and fifth, respectively. Which athlete — polished entertainer or stylish technical powerhouse — will come out on top this time? Can a dark horse emerge and shake things up?

On the men's side, showman Jason Brown puts his exuberant performance quality up against charismatic Adam Rippon, while Max Aaron's quadruple jumping firepower may trump them both. Young guns, including Junior Grand Prix Final champion Nathan Chen, lurk in the wings.

Ice dance will be a feast for the eyes, with World silver medalists Madison Chock and Evan Bates squaring off against Maia Shibutani and Alex Shibutani, each team showcasing its own brand of musicality and choreography. And Alexa Scimeca and Chris Knierim, the first U.S. pair to qualify for the Grand Prix Final since 2007, just might hit the Xcel Center rafters with their soaring quadruple twist.

So buckle down and bundle up. With trips to the 2016 World Figure Skating Championships in Boston on the line, it's going to be a wild ride.

A rivalry for our time

Utter their names, and dramatically different profiles pop into the mind.

Ashley: gutsy, outspoken, determined to stay on top. Gracie: cool, sophisticated, with untapped depths of feeling. Their diverse styles create the defining rivalry of our era, and there are no signs it will end any time soon.

Many thought the 20-year-old Gold, with big triple-triple jump combinations and powerful, long-limbed elegance, would be firmly ensconced as leading U.S. lady by 2016. But Wagner, at age 24, refuses to stop improving. This fall, the three-time and defending U.S. champion performed her best international short program ever to win Skate Canada. Her fourthplace finish at NHK Trophy had a few stumbles, but she qualified for her fourth straight Grand Prix Final, the only U.S. lady to ever do so. There, after a disappointing short, she skated a lights-

out free program including a flawless triple flip-triple toe loop.

"Going into competition, I need to get myself to a place where I let myself do the job, stop thinking so much and let muscle memory take over," Wagner said. "That's usually for me a recipe for success."

"I like the way Ashley looks right now," Rafael Arutunian, who has coached Wagner since 2013, said. "She has really improved herself these last few years with me. She is right in there competing with all of the other top girls. She can do clean triple-triples; she has proved that"

Gold, the 2014 U.S. champion who placed second to Wagner last season, could be unstoppable — if she can, as her coach Frank Carroll has said, "get out of her own mind." Too often, a botched spin or miss on a usually reliable jump has marred an otherwise superb program, as at 2015 Progressive Skate America, when a mistake on a triple flip very likely cost the gold medal.

"I often can psych myself out and it's been a mental game for me, but I'm getting on top of that," Gold said. "I really want to be at the top in everything I do this year."

If anyone other than Wagner or Gold wins in Saint Paul, it will be a huge upset. Still, ice is slippery and talent abounds. Speedy powerhouse Courtney Hicks won the silver medal at NHK, defeating Wagner along the way. Reigning U.S. bronze medalist Karen Chen has shrugged off months-long boot issues, and with her first-ever international senior medal at Golden Spin of Zagreb in November, may be rounding into form at just the right time. No one should count out 2014 Olympian Polina Edmunds, the willowy teen with creative programs, challenging elements and competitive fire.

Brown hopes to deliver again

The bronze medalist at Skate America in late October, Brown withdrew in late November from NHK Trophy in Japan. The Chicago-area skater trained with restrictions through much of December, and with guarded optimism, remained hopeful of resuming his normal practice regimen toward the end of the month.



2016 PRUDENTIAL U.S. FIGURE SKATING CHAMPIONSHIPS

When properly trained and healthy, Brown has proven he can captivate an audience with his unequaled performance qualities and effortless athleticism.

"Both of my programs are extremely challenging and portray characters I've yet to explore thus far in my career, so it's been fun channeling different sides of choreography," he said. "Every year my choreographer (Roehne Ward) pushes the boundaries of my transitions and choreography, and I feel that this shows in my two programs this year."

If Brown is to repeat as champion, he may have to successfully land a quad jump in his free skate. The 2014 Olympian integrated a quad toe into his free program for the first time at Skate America, but fell on the attempt.

Brown figures to be pushed by several proven performers, including Max Aaron, whose career has enjoyed a resurrection this season. The 2013 U.S. champion won Skate America with personal-best international scores across the board. In addition to his outstanding jumping ability, the Arizona native has significantly improved his mental approach and performance side.

"It's a performance, it's not all about jumping," Aaron said. "I was continuing to do that and it doesn't get you very far. Having a performance and enjoying it, listening to the music the entire time ... It feels good to do that."

Adam Rippon, the 2015 U.S. silver medalist, and Ross Miner, the bronze medalist at 2015 Rost-elecom Cup in Russia, figure to challenge for their first U.S. title. Rippon set a U.S. record for his free skate at the 2015 U.S. Championships, and this fall recorded the second-best free skate at Rost-elecom Cup. Miner, who hails from Boston, won his first Grand Prix Series medal in three years in Moscow.

Other challengers for the crown and a spot on the podium include former U.S. junior champions Nathan Chen and Vincent Zhou. Both teens impressed at the Junior Grand Prix Final, where the 16-year-old Chen included three quads in his free skate, landing a perfect quadruple toe combination. Zhou, just 15, tried two quads himself, and although he didn't land them, executed a solid triple Axel-triple toe.

Also on the rise is Grant Hochstein, who enjoyed a strong Grand Prix campaign with a pair of

fourth-place finishes. Hochstein is a veteran skater, having competed at six U.S. Championships in the senior division.

Scimeca and Knierim prepared to repeat

Alexa Scimeca and Christopher Knierim plan to marry this summer, but the defending pairs champions have a title to defend first.

The Colorado Springs-based team enjoyed a productive Grand Prix season, taking silver at Skate America and claiming the bronze medal at NHK Trophy in Japan. Their efforts earned them a spot at the Grand Prix Final, where they placed seventh.

"Although we haven't peaked yet this season, we feel more prepared heading into Saint Paul than we have in the past," Scimeca said. "Being together for our fourth season has really proven that commitment and longevity will assist in us gelling as a team more naturally."

Their short program to music from the heavy metal band Metallica has been a big hit with judges and fans.

"Metallica ('Nothing Else Matters') is a raw and edgy piece of music," Knierim said. "The strength behind the music brings us alive during the footwork sequence. It's the most empowered we've ever felt on the ice."

Tarah Kayne and Daniel O'Shea, the 2015 U.S. bronze medalists, built momentum during the Grand Prix campaign, finishing sixth at Skate America in October and fourth at Rostelecom Cup in November.

The Florida-based team attempted a throw quad Salchow in their free skate at Skate America, but in Saint Paul, their goal is to skate two clean, stylish programs, including a new short to Irish singer Hozier's soulful "Take Me to Church."

"We're excited about the music, it really makes us want to move out there," O'Shea said. "Our focus in Saint Paul is to do all of our elements — side-by-side triples, triple throws and the twist — bigger and better."

Also expected to challenge for the title are the teams of Marissa Castelli and Mervin Tran, and Gretchen Donlan and Nathan Bartholomay.

Castelli, a two-time U.S. champion and Olympian with former partner Simon Shnapir, teamed up with Tran before last season. Tran won the 2012 World bronze medal with Narumi Takahashi while competing for Japan. Their chemistry and individual experience could lift this Montreal-based team to the top of the podium.

Donlan and Bartholomay debuted at the 2015 U.S. Championships, where they placed seventh. The Florida-based team missed competing at Skate America this fall when Donlan came down with an acute viral illness. Both have great experience, with Bartholomay having qualified for and competed at the 2014 Olympic Winter Games with former partner Felicia Zhang.

Other teams to watch include 2014 U.S.

junior champions Madeline Aaron and Max Settlage, who placed fourth last year; 2015 U.S. junior champions Caitlin Fields and Ernie Utah Stevens; and Jessica Calalang and Zack Sidhu, who placed fifth at the 2015. U.S. Championships. New pair Jessica Pfund and Joshua Santillan could also shake things up with their consistent triple jumps and throws.

Ice dance field loaded with talent

This fall, the U.S. became the first country to ever field three ice dance teams at the Grand Prix Final, proving the discipline's depth not only internationally, but at home as well. As the nation's best ice dancers descend on Saint Paul, fans will see how some of the world's top teams stack up against each other for the chance to compete at the World Championships on home soil.

Madison Chock and Evan Bates claimed their first U.S. title last season. After winning the silver medal at the 2015 World Figure Skating Championships, they appeared to be taking over where six-time U.S. and two-time World champions Meryl Davis and Charlie White left off.

This season, Chock and Bates repeated as Skate America champions before settling for second place at Cup of China and a second consecutive silver medal at the Final. Together with coach Igor Shpilband, the Novi, Michigan-based duo have worked tirelessly to perfect their free dance, set to Rachmaninoff's "Piano Concerto No. 2."

"Through this program's four minutes, we want to show what path life takes you on and how you deal with it," Chock said. "There are downfalls, there are happy moments, there are sad moments, there are tough moments. That's what we're trying to evoke."

Maia Shibutani and Alex Shibutani, who have stood on the senior podium each of the last four years, will challenge Chock and Bates for

their first U.S. title. The "ShibSibs," who train near their rivals in Canton, Michigan, placed second at Skate Canada before earning the highest total score of any team during the 2015 Grand Prix season to win Japan's NHK Trophy, their first Grand

Prix Series title since 2011. They placed fourth in Barcelona, earning a standing ovation for their free dance to Coldplay's "Fix You."

"Alex and I are growing up; we have more of a sense of who we are as a team and as individuals," Maia said, "That's showing through in our skating and programs."

Madison Hubbell and Zachary Donohue made the leap from Michigan to Montreal, Quebec, this spring to train under two-time World silver medalists Patrice Lauzon and Marie-France Dubreuil. It's proving to be a good move. The team won Trophée Bompard in France, took bronze at NHK, and earned their first-ever berth in the Final, where they placed sixth.

Kaitlin Hawayek and Jean-Luc Baker also have their eyes on a medal. The 2014 World Junior champions, fourth in the U.S. last season, placed fourth at Skate America before withdrawing from their second Grand Prix assignment due to illness. Most recently, they earned the silver medal at Golden Spin of Zagreb. Delaware-based Anastasia Cannuscio and Colin McManus, fifth in the U.S. last season, earned their highest international scores ever this fall and hope to crash the medal

LYSACEK AND WEIR DUELED TO EPIC FINISH IN SAINT PAUL

Considering all the decimals involved with the international judging system and the numerous factors that go into computing a figure skater's score, it seems almost unfathomable that there could ever be a tie.

Yet that's exactly what happened in 2008, the last time the U.S. Figure Skating Championships were held in Saint Paul, Minnesota.

Making things all the more guirky were the two athletes involved: Johnny Weir and Evan Lysacek — rivals on the ice and admittedly not friends off of it.

In the run-up to these championships, NBC fueled the drama by focusing on Weir and Lysacek's differences. Weir, an artistic skater training in gritty New Jersey, spoke openly of his personal dislike of his rival. Lysacek, an athletic skater training in sunny L.A., would not be baited into unbecoming banter, simply stating, "It's war."

How fitting, then, that the three-time champion from the East Coast would meet the reigning champion from the West Coast in the Midwest city of Saint Paul. The battle lines were drawn.

Weir won the first round, edging Lysacek by 1.35 points in the short program. But that slim margin meant the title was up for grabs. Would Weir hold on to earn his fourth U.S. title, or would Lysacek become a repeat champion?

Skating to Puccini's opera, Tosca, Lysacek two-footed his opening quad toe-triple toe combination and didn't showcase strong triple Axels. But in the second half of the program, Lysacek reeled in fans with his engaging footwork.

Weir, the last to skate, performed an emotional routine to "Love is War." Like Lysacek, it wasn't his best performance; he committed relatively minor mistakes near the end of the program, but the crowd loved it.

"The audience was standing before I had finished my program," Weir said, reflecting on that moment more than seven years

ago. "I thought I had won. I certainly felt the energy, having won three titles before. I knew what it would take to win."

As Weir skated to the kiss and cry, all eyes were on the scoreboard. In just its third year of use at the U.S. Championships, the IJS was hard for athletes, fans and broadcasters to wrap their heads around. As the scores popped up, Weir squinted into the monitor and then shrugged to his coach, Galina Zmievskaya.

Weir and Lysacek had tied with 244.77 total

A murmur rippled through the arena. NBC's

Bob Costas, Scott Hamilton and Dick Button debated what would happen. But in a short time, it was understood. The IJS tiebreaker awarded the title to the man with the most points in the free skate. And that man was Lysacek, whose 162.72 points were 1.35 points higher than Weir's free skate score.

"I had no idea what happened," Weir recalled. "All of a sudden, I had lost. Looking back on it, it's hysterical. But at the time, it wasn't so funny. Even Viktor Petrenko, an Olympic champion who was one

ered for the Olympic Team in 2010 if I didn't skate like I did in 2008."

While Lysacek and Weir both represented the United States at the 2010 Olympics, the Vancouver Games belonged to Lysacek, as he became the first American man since Brian Boitano in 1988 to win the Olympic gold medal. Weir placed sixth.

Today, the two stars have lives outside of the rink (although Lysacek tours some). Lysacek works for the Vera Wang Group as the department head of digital content and social media, visual displays and licensed product development in New York

Weir has teamed with Olympic champion Tara Lipinski and Terry Gannon as part of NBC's figure skating broadcast team. Which begs the question: Will Weir discuss that 2008 tiebreaking and heartbreaking moment at this year's U.S. Championships in Saint Paul?

"Tara and I are both very conscious about talking about ourselves too much," Weir said. "Yes, we get to wear amazing clothes, but we make a concerted effort to make our broadcasts about the people we're watching."

Let's hope he veers off script.

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Gustave Lussi and Dick Button

LYSACEK, COHEN, BELBIN AND AGOSTO, LUSSI HEADLINE U.S. HALL OF FAME INDUCTION CLASS

he U.S. Figure Skating Hall of Fame Class of 2016 is among the most memorable in recent history.

Evan Lysacek, Sasha Cohen, Tanith Belbin and Benjamin Agosto, and the late coach Gustave Lussi each contributed in a significant way to America's Olympic achievements in figure skating.

Lysacek demonstrated an exceptional level of skill, effortless movements and pure determination. In 2010 he became the first American man to win the Olympic gold medal in 22 years, defeating the reigning Olympic champion by skating two flawless performances at the Olympic Winter Games in Vancouver. Upon his induction, Lysacek, the 2009 World champion, will join his coach, Frank Carroll, and choreographer, Lori Nichol, in the U.S. Hall of Fame.

Belbin and Agosto epitomized exceptional elegance, musicality and unison. The team elevated U.S. ice dance by winning the Olympic silver medal at the 2006 Games in Torino. This was only the second time a U.S. ice dance team earned a medal since the discipline was included in the Olympic Program in 1976. Along with their two World silver and two bronze medals, Belbin and Agosto dominated U.S. ice dance for nearly a decade, winning five consecutive U.S. titles, and inspiring a new generation of American ice dancers.

Cohen expressed sheer artistry, beauty and movement in her skating routines, which led to her winning the 2006 U.S. Championships, two World silver medals, countless international and Grand Prix Series titles and the silver medal at the 2006 Olympic Winter Games in Torino. Cohen's skating performances were known for portraying the character of the music which was embraced by her adoring fans.

Gustave Lussi transformed figure skating like no other coach in the history of the sport. Having taught Dick Button — the only American two-time Olympic figure skating champion — throughout his amateur skating career, Lussi brought athleticism and innovation to the ice that changed figure skating forever. Generations of skating coaches owe a debt of gratitude to this highly esteemed teacher of six Olympic and 16 World figure skating champions.

The Class of 2016 will be inducted into the U.S. Hall of Fame on Jan. 22 at the 2016 Prudential U.S. Figure Skating Championships in Saint Paul, Minnesota.

Outstanding competitor highlights include top-four finishes and all Olympic, World and Grand Prix Final finishes.

EVAN LYSACEK

Olympic champion Evan Lysacek captured the gold medal at the 2010 Olympic Winter Games in Vancouver, the first American in 22 years to hold the men's title. Lysacek won 11 major titles including a World championship (2009), two U.S. championships (2007, 2008), the Grand Prix Final (2009), and two Four Continents championships (2005, 2007), making him the most-decorated U.S. male skater of the past two decades. In April 2012, Lysacek was appointed a sports envoy by the U.S. Department of State, a position under Sports and International Diplomacy. In 2010, Lysacek was runner-up on the 10th season of "Dancing with the Stars," named USOC Sportsman of the Year, was a Thurman Munson Award recipient and was the winner of the AAU Sullivan Award, recognizing the nation's best amateur athlete. Lysacek served as a spokesman for U.S. Figure Skating's highly acclaimed film RISE. In the years following the Olympic Games, Lysacek headlined two U.S. and one worldwide tour with Stars on Ice. In 2012, Lysacek announced his return to competitive figure skating with a goal of making the 2014 Olympic Winter Games, but a series of injuries and subsequent surgeries prevented him from competing. Lysacek continues to serve on the advisory board of Figure Skating in Harlem, which honored him for his contributions in 2015.

TANITH BELBIN & BEN AGOSTO

Tanith Belbin and Ben Agosto are Olympic silver medalists, four-time World medalists, three-time Grand Prix Final medalists and the winners of five consecutive U.S. titles, never finishing lower than second. From the start of the 2005-06 season up until the 2010 Olympics, they medaled at every event they finished with one exception — the 2008 World Championships (fourth). Their 2006 Olympic silver medal was the first U.S. Olympic ice dance medal in 30 years, and at the time was the highest finish by an American team. Despite finishing second at the 2002 U.S. Championships, they were unable to compete at the 2002 Olympics due to Belbin's Canadian citizenship; she became an American citizen on Dec. 31, 2005. Having lived in the Detroit area since 1998, she and Agosto competed for the U.S. and broke a 20-year

American ice dance drought at the 2005 World Championships, earning silver. In 2005, Belbin and Agosto won the SKATING Magazine Readers' Choice Award. In 2013, Belbin won the PSA Sonja Henie Award. Today, Belbin is a broadcaster, having worked for NBC at the 2012 Olympic Games in London: 2014 Olympic Winter Games in Sochi. Russia; and 2014 Youth Olympic Games in Nanjing, China. She does broadcast work for NBC, the U.S. Olympic Committee and icenetwork and has coached dance and singles since 2010. Belbin is a Figure Skating in Harlem Advisory Board member. Agosto also is a broadcaster for icenetwork. He is the director of ice dance at the Ice Den in Scottsdale, Arizona, where he is also a coach and choreographer. He also works as the power skating coach for the rink's junior Coyotes travel hockey program.

SASHA COHEN

Sasha Cohen is an Olympic silver medalist, three-time World medalist, 2002 Grand Prix Final champion and the 2006 U.S. champion. After earning her second World silver medal, the USOC named Cohen its female Athlete of the Month (March 2005). Cohen took a four-year break after the 2006 Olympics to pursue other opportunities, including skating tours, modeling and acting. She returned to competitive skating in the 2009-10 season with a goal of making the 2010 U.S. Olympic Team but chose not to compete in the Grand Prix Series. Cohen only competed in the 2010 U.S. Championships and finished fourth. Cohen holds the second-highest international total score (197.60, 2003 Skate Canada) for a U.S. woman. She won the 2004 SKATING Magazine Readers' Choice Award. In 2002, she performed at the Golden Jubilee of Elizabeth II to celebrate the queen of England's 50-year reign. She has served on the Figure Skating in Harlem Advisory Board, appeared on several TV shows, was an "Inside Edition" correspondent at the Academy Awards and wrote an autobiography, Fire On Ice.

OUTSTANDING COACH

GUSTAVE LUSSI

Gustave Lussi coached six Olympic champions and 16 World champions, but his contributions to the sport are best exemplified by his most noted student, American Dick Button. The only U.S. figure skater to win two Olympic championships (1948, '52), Button was Lussi's student his entire nine-year amateur career. In his seven senior seasons, Button won two Olympic gold medals, five World titles, three North American crowns and even the European Championships, prompting the event to no longer invite North Americans. His seven consecutive U.S. titles are a men's record. In Button's entire career, he was beaten only once (at the 1947 World Championships by Switzerland's Hans Gerschwiler). Together, Lussi and Button transformed the sport by accentuating athleticism and developing elements such as the double Axel, the "Button camel" (a flying camel spin) and the first triple jump (the triple loop, performed at the 1952 Olympics). Lussi went on to coach U.S. Olympic champions Hayes Jenkins, David Jenkins and Dorothy Hamill at various stages of their careers. Lussi also coached Olympic champions Barbara Ann Scott (1948, Canada) and John Curry (1980, Great Britain). One of Lussi's final students was American Paul Wylie, who earned the 1992 Olympic silver medal. Lussi wrote the seminal work "Championship Figure Skating." He was inducted into the inaugural class of the World Figure Skating Hall of Fame in 1976 and the PSA Hall of Fame in 2002.

TRY SOMETHING NEW

PAIRS GREAT TELLS SKATERS TO KEEP THEIR OPTIONS OPEN

It has been said that a team can accomplish much more than an individual. Pairs skating illustrates this assertion well. After all, a singles skater can't perform high-flying lifts, a death spiral or a split triple twist on his or her own.

One person who understands this is Kyoko Ina. Her list of accomplishments is long: five-time U.S. pairs champion (1997, 1998, 2000, 2001, and 2002), 2002 World bronze medalist and three-time Olympian (1994, 1998, and 2002). Ina began her amateur career as a singles skater, representing Japan.

"I had competed as a singles skater for 14 years prior to trying pair skating," she said.

In the 1990s, Ina competed in both singles and pairs for the U.S. In 1995, she finished fourth in singles at the U.S. Championships. That same year, she won the silver medal in pairs with partner Jason Dungjen.

"At first I wasn't sure if pair skating was for me, so I continued to compete at both for several years before realizing I enjoyed the challenges and company pair skating presented to me," Ina said. "I realized I loved to be lifted and thrown as much as I loved to jump and spin on my own."

In an effort to promote pairs skating in the U.S., Ina participates in a mentoring program for pairs athletes and coaches. Her successful skating career, as well as longevity on the national and international scene, make her a great example for today's skaters to aspire to.

"The mentoring program is still in the planning stages," Ina said. "Our ultimate goal with the program is for U.S. skaters to win World and Olympic medals. We realize that it takes time to build up a great program. We're working toward the 2018 Olympics and will hopefully build upon those results in 2022."

In the late 1990s, Ina had the opportunity to work with legendary Russian pairs coach Tamara Moskvina. Moskvina's wealth of knowledge and respect in the skating world had a positive effect on Ina's skating.

"I was privileged to be the only non-Russian pair team lady ever coached by Tamara Moskvina, and though we have incredible coaches and talented athletes here in the U.S., there is something to be said about Tamara's consistent track record of producing champion after champion," Ina said.

Ina hopes to impart Moskvina's coaching ways and guidance to the new generation of skaters, she explained.

"Even after turning professional (in 2002), I still have a close relationship with her and she continues to advise me with skating and life," Ina said. "I know I am very fortunate to have had this opportunity and I am excited to be able to pass along what she has taught me through lessons and experiences."

The pairs culture in the U.S. hasn't been as strong as it is in other parts of the globe, and this

is why the work Ina is doing is vital in developing a deeper pairs program. Ina, who is coaching in the Albany and Saratoga Springs area of upstate New York, believes there are many challenges for pairs skaters in the U.S. to overcome.

"I think the biggest challenges are logistics and the

opportunity for different options," she explained. "In the U.S., we have so many great training facilities that we think there is possibly something better offered somewhere else. There may be a better girl or boy at one facility, so one partner would have to make the sacrifice to relocate. Financially, it is a huge commitment, so if it doesn't work out in a quick period of time, it's hard to stay committed and look past the initial new partnership period."

Interpersonal issues may plague teams as well. Ina said.

"I have found in many cases we look for a different solution rather than work through difficulties," she said. "Pair skating is more than just

having two people get together and skate. We try to make it look like a fairy tale partnership, but it takes a lot of work especially if you are putting two people together that are already set in their ways and have been brought up differently.'

Having a common ground, especially when it comes to goal-setting, can make or break a team, Ina said.

"The other challenge is when one partner may have different goals than the other," she said. "Of course, goals will change; however, these are things that should be discussed from season to season with the skaters and the coaches. There should be a plan for short- and long-term goals."

To be among the best pairs skaters in the world today, skaters are required to be well-rounded in their technical skills sets.

"Pairs skating has always been demanding mentally and physically," Ina explained. "You had to be good at everything; now, you have be great at everything. In the past, there was a stigma of 'if you weren't a good jumper, you went into pairs.' Today, the teams at the World Championships are doing side-by-side triple Lutzes and triple-triple combinations, along with quad throws and quad twists. Don't forget that they still have to lift, spin, and be able to skate well."

Pairs skating may serve as an opening for some skaters to break into higher levels of the sport as well.

"There are many opportunities for good skaters, even at the regional and sectional levels," she explained. "There are many skaters that end up just on the cusp of not making it to section-

als or nationals, and I realize it's frustrating for them. I saw so many good skaters in the singles events at the recent Eastern Sectionals and I wish they would give pair skating a chance. Many of them had great short program skates and not the greatest free program. In pair skating, you don't need to complete as many solo jumps - this may appeal to someone who cannot handle the multiple jumps in a free program."

For skaters who keep their options open, it can serve them well.

"If your goal is to make the Olympic team,

you have to give yourself the opportunity to do it," she said. "There can only be so many singles skaters that make it to the Olympics. If you're getting consistent results that you aren't happy with, what's the harm in trying another discipline?"

And taking a risk may work in the skater's favor, Ina said.

"It's about opening the skaters' eyes," she said. "When you don't make it to the top levels (of the sport), it can be discouraging. There may be more opportunities open to you if you're willing to try something new."

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





Donna Schuele introduced her son, Michael Valdez, to skating when he was 5 years old. The two went on to participate in the activity together, taking group and private lessons.

Schuele, a college professor and lawyer, would like to compete in pro-am competition and perhaps judge once she has time. Valdez, who lives and trains with three other skaters, said skating is still something that he shares with his mom.

"It's cool to have a parent who skates," Valdez said. "She understands what I'm going through and we can talk about skating together."

Community means everything to Valdez as he pursues his Olympic dream. Meeting "The Moms" (Cheryl Davis and Jacqui White, mothers of Olympic champions Meryl Davis and Charlie White) in 2014 gave Schuele insight into what it takes to support

Serving as a test chair and junior board parent adviser, Schuele recognizes the nurturing coaches in Valdez's career.

"They had enormous patience in bringing him along," Schuele said. "I feel like I've achieved nurturing a passion for the sport in my son."

ERIN KRENTZ - 53, MASTERS SENIOR Glencoe, Illinois, Skokie Valley SC **BRIAN KRENTZ** - 20, JUNIOR SC of Boston

When her youngest son, Brian, decided to pursue a competitive skating career, Erin Krentz couldn't have been happier. As a parent, she wanted her children to be physically active, allowing them to choose their own sports.

"I wanted them to see their hard work become accomplishments," Erin, an adult competitor and Skokie Valley SC board member, said.

Erin, who placed third in championship masters at the 2003 U.S. Adult Championships, appreciated the hard work that Brian put in to rise to the junior level, both domestically and internationally. He competed at the 2013 U.S. Championships and at the 2013 ISU JGP Baltic Cup.

"My children knew I appreciated their effort no matter what," Erin said. "I understood firsthand the difficulty of what they were doing. That said, Brian skated some brilliant performances that were a pure pleasure to watch."

Brian loved the excitement of competitions, he said, adding skating taught him physical and mental limits, and how to train and push through them.

"I skated because there was nowhere else I'd rather be," Brian said. "I truly loved the sport."

He credits coaches Cindy Caprel and Kristen Mita for shaping him as a person and skater, and counts himself lucky for all the friendships he made.

A Harvard University student and member of Harvard men's ultimate Frisbee team, Brian no longer skates but appreciated his mom's support of his skating over the years.

"She's been to almost all my competitions and always has words of confidence," said Brian, who helped critique Erin's programs and offered advice on her jumps. Erin still occasionally takes lessons and has been active in her club as a corresponding secretary, junior activities chair and chair of the Illinois High School Figure Skating Competition.

TAMI SCHIERN - 43, ADULT PRE-BRONZE FREE SKATE **CORA SIBULKIN** - 11, PRE-PRELIMINARY DARLA SIBULKIN - 9, BASIC SKILLS 4 Calabasas, California, All Year FSC

Within the first month Tami Schiern began skating lessons, she fell backward, hitting her head on the ice. Hospitalized, Schiern was tempted not to

"I skated again to set an example for my daughter," Schiern said. "I'm so glad I did."

Schiern's two daughters, Cora and Darla, took up skating five and three years ago, respectively.

"Cora saw a girl at an outdoor rink spinning in a skating dress and asked for lessons," said Schiern, who began taking lessons herself shortly after. "I wanted to learn about her new sport and not sit around. I had no idea I'd actually learn jumps and

Darla joined the fun with the chance to play a pixie fairy in their rink's ice show.

"It was so exciting," Darla said.

Scheduling is challenging, with a sitter taking the girls to the rink after school. Schiern meets them for freestyle most nights, and they work with a team of coaches who are related to one another (Bianca Marro Jewell, Perry Jewell and Brianna Weissman Barajas).

"I think our coaches appreciate my understanding of the sport," said Schiern, who aspires to compete at the national level. "I try not to coach from the sidelines."

Schiern, a public school psychologist, volunteers at competitions and assists backstage at twice-yearly rink shows; both girls participate in Theatre on Ice and Darla practices synchronized skating.

"I'm almost always at a competition," Schiern said.

Both girls enjoy their mother's participation.

"I like laughing at her when she falls," Darla said. "Skating means having fun and never giving up."

"I like to show my mom the right way to do things," Cora said. "I love learning new moves and landing new jumps. I feel happy when I've accomplished that."











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The Joyce Komperda Athlete Support Fund was established in 2009 by Joyce Komperda in honor of her parents, who enrolled her in her first figure skating lessons for health reasons. From that moment on, Joyce became an avid skater and passionate advocate for the sport. When Joyce's parents passed away, she elected to honor them by investing the monies she inherited to help support the dreams of intermediate, novice and junior skaters who demonstrate a love of skating as well as financial need. Three awardees were determined by Joyce for the 2015 season; each skater will be awarded \$5,000.

JOSIAH CURLEY is a student at the University of Oklahoma, majoring in the petroleum engineering program. As a home-school student with three older siblings, Curley worked to graduate from high school with an associate's degree in mathematics from Tulsa Community College. He has been a skater since the age of 5, and he attributes his introduction to the sport to his father, who is currently battling cancer. Thanks to the sacrifices of his family, he has been able to excel in skating over the last 14 years, though a recent foot injury has left him off the ice since last March. He has been a Basic Skills instructor for the last two years at the Tulsa Figure Skating Club, his home club. He hopes to get back to training and being a Basic Skills instructor at his new local rink, the Blazers Ice Center, once he fully recovers.

KAYLA GABRIEL, a freshman at Niles North High School in Skokie, Illinois, began skating at the age of 9. She made quick progress, skating competitively within two years of learning recreationally, no easy feat, considering at the age of 1 Gabriel was diagnosed with profound hearing loss, and received a cochlear implant when she was 2 years old. A student of ballet and tap dance to help with coordination, she is now working on her junior moves-in-the-field test and credits her coach, Debbie Storey, for helping her become the skater that she is. At the 2014 Upper Great Lakes Regional Championships, Gabriel's first regional competition as a preliminary-level skater, she placed fourth, and she is now pursuing the goal of making it to the sectional championships. Gabriel had the privilege of participating in the opening ceremony of 2014 Hilton HHonors Skate America.

GIA KOKOTAKIS is a student at Windward Preparatory School in Los Angeles, and recently made the dean's list. A singles skater, she placed third at the 2015 Prudential U.S. Figure Skating Championships at the intermediate level despite suffering an injury just before the 2015 Southwest Pacific Regional Championships. With hopes of becoming an Olympic competitor, Kokotakis is the vice president of the All Year Figure Skating Club's junior board, and has received the United States President's award for serving more than 100 hours of community service with her skating club. In addition to skating, she enjoys surfing and reading and speaks both French and Greek.

The 2016 synchronized skating season is upon us, and 11 U.S. junior and senior teams are preparing to make their mark on the international stage.

Based on last year's success, both domestically and internationally, teams were selected to be part of the International Selection Pool. After successful monitoring and competing early this season, teams were named to Team USA and assigned international competitions. Here is a look at where Team USA is headed in 2016.

Grand Prix Final DECEMBER 10-12, 2015

For the first time, synchronized skating was part of the Grand Prix Final in Barcelona, Spain. Five of the top senior teams in the world took the ice in the free skate-only competition. The United States was represented by the Haydenettes of Lexington, Massachusetts, the 23-time U.S. champions and four-time World bronze medal-

The Haydenettes finished fifth with a score of 106.81 points.

"We had to cram a little bit," Haydenette Lindsay Grajek said. "We pushed our programs a lot faster and a lot further than we usually do, but we knew this was what had to be done since we were coming to such a big stage. We

all worked together and came together more than we ever have to really push ourselves."

Leon Lurje Trophy JANUARY 16-17, 2016

The Haydenettes will again compete on the international stage when they travel to Gothenburg, Sweden.
"We aim to showcase a realm of emotions

while keeping the audience begging for the next surprise," Tessa Hedges, member of the Haydenettes, said of the team's short program, titled "The Spell." Their free skate is to "Street Beats."

The Skyliners, U.S. junior champions, will join the Haydenettes at their first of two international assignments. The New York-based team will perform to a Michael Jackson medley for its short program and to music from Les Misérables for its free skate.

Mozart Cup JANUARY 22-24, 2016

Miami University, from Oxford, Ohio, will represent Team USA in the senior ranks for the second year in a row in Salzburg, Austria.

"Our goals aim high; if you don't skate to win, you never will," Miami coach Carla De-Girolamo said. "We are out to win the national championship and move up in the World stand-

The RedHawks will skate their short program to "Breath of Life" by Florence and the Machine and their free skate to a Latin dance medley.

The Lexettes, U.S. junior silver medalists, will join Miami and make their international debut with new coach Maikki Merilehto. She was named the head coach of the Lexettes in the summer of 2015 and is a three-time World champion in synchronized skating with Marigold IceUnity

The team will skate to "Feeling Good" by Ms. Lauryn Hill and Flo Rida for its short program and "A Day in Bollywood" by A.R. Rahman for its free skate.

Neuchâtel Trophy JANUARY 30-31, 2016

Third at the 2015 U.S. Synchronized Skating Championships, the Skyliners senior team looks to build on last year's breakthrough campaign in Neuchâtel, Switzerland. The Skyliners' short program is to music from the motion picture Nine, while their free skate is to music from the The Mission.

Chicago Jazz, of the Chicago FSC, will compete in the junior division. The team will skate its short program to music from the musical



Chicago and its free skate to Carousel.

Fond du Lac Blades junior team, of Fond du Lac, Wisconsin, returns to the international stage for the first time since 2006. Its short program is to "Dancin' Fool" by Barry Manilow, and the team will perform its free skate to music from Pirates of the Caribbean.

French Cup **FEBRUARY 5–6, 2016**

The Crystallettes, from Dearborn, Michigan, and the Skyliners junior team venture to Rouen, France, for what is typically the most competitive of international events leading up to the World Championships.

The Crystallettes are skating to "Juicy Wiggle" by Redfoo and "Derp" by the Bassjackers & MAKJ. Their free skate is to the music from the movie Coraline. Throughout the program, they are creepy dolls trying to hide the fact that they're

Skyliners coach Josh Babb is excited for his junior team to have the opportunity to be seen by international officials twice before what they hope will be a Junior World Challenge Cup berth.

"Our goal is to win a national title and medal at our internationals and the Junior World Challenge Cup," Babb said. "The more we can get out there and compete, the more prepared we feel."

Trophy D'Ecosse FEBRUARY 12-14, 2016

Team USA will compete for the first time at the international competition in Dumfries, Great Britain. The California-based ICE'Kateers and Team del Sol will both compete in the senior division, with Team del Sol competing internationally for the first time since 2002.

ICE'Kateers competed at the French Cup last season, and look to improve upon last year's results. They will skate their short program to "Forever Young" by the Tenors. Their free skate is a space race theme. Team del Sol will skate its short program to "Skyfall" by Adele. Its free skate is a Bollywood theme.

Spring Cup FEBRUARY 19-21, 2016

The final international event before the 2016 U.S. Synchronized Skating Championships takes place in Sesto San Giovanni, Italy. Miami University will compete in its second international competition of the season.

Adrian College, from Adrian, Michigan, will make its international debut. Its short program is to "To Love You More" by Celine Dion, and its free skate is to the music from the movie Gone with the Wind. Chicago Jazz junior team will join the senior teams when it competes at its second international competition of the season.

ISU Shanghai Trophy MARCH 4-6, 2016

At this new invitational event, the Haydenettes are excited to make one more push prior to what they hope is a successful World Championships. Six countries were invited to participate in this event that will include synchronized skating and a short-track event.

"I think that the Shanghai Trophy will be an important event to finalize our presence internationally," Hedges said. "This event will be about portraying the whole package that a team needs to medal at the World Championships."

ISU Junior World Challenge Cup MARCH 11-12, 2016

Two teams will be selected at the 2016 World Junior Team Selection Event in Dearborn, Michigan, February 12-13, to represent the United States in Zagreb, Croatia.

ISU World Synchronized Skating Championships APRIL 8-9, 2016

Two senior teams will be selected at the 2016 U.S. Synchronized Skating Championships in Kalamazoo, Michigan, February 24-27, to compete at the 2016 ISU World Synchronized Skating Championships in Budapest, Hungary.




